Frank J. Mattoon was born July 21, 1922, at Beatrice, Nebraska, the son of Harold and Annette Mattoon. He was graduated from Beatrice High School in 1940, and from the University of Nebraska in 1947 with an A.B., and from the College of Law in 1949 with an LLB degree. He served as President of his social fraternity, Beta Theta Pi, and is a member of Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity.

M.W. Brother Frank was married to Treva Mutchmore in August ,1944, and they have two children, Steve and Susan. Brother Mattoon served with the 70th Inf. Div., and the 16th U.S. Constabulary in the European Theater in W.W. II, and was discharged a Captain in the Infantry in 1946. He was decorated with the Combat Infantry Badge, and the Bronze Star with Cluster for outstanding service for his country.

After graduation from Law College, Brother Frank was a trial examiner with the State Railway Commission in 1949 and 1950, and since Sept. 1950, he has been engaged in the practice of law with the firm of Martin, Mattoon and Matzke in Sidney, Nebr., where he has won the reputation as an excellent attorney. He has been active in many professional efforts in the State and American Bar Associations, as well as in the American Legion; Veterans of Foreign Wars; Sidney Rotary Club; Elks; and an Elder in the Light Memorial Presbyterian Church in Sidney, Nebraska..

M.W. Brother Frank served our Grand Lodge as Grand Orator in 1968 and 1969, and was appointed Grand Junior Deacon by M.W. Brother Hugh W. Eisenhart in June of 1969. He was elected Grand Junior Warden in 1970; Grand Senior Warden in 1971; Deputy Grand Master in 1972; and was elevated to the office of Grand Master by his brethren in 1973. He has served with great distinction and dedication.



While you have a chance to communicate. I hope you communicate with each other. M.'.W.'.Grand Master, I think that is the name of the game in which we are engaged. and we are glad to be a part of your communication on a real level of human beings.

M.'.W.'. CHARLES F. ADAMS, PAST GRAND MASTER:

ADDRESS OF WELCOME AND RESPONSE

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, delegates to this 117th Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Nebraska, I did not know that ordinarily on this program, there was a place for a welcome. Brother, Grand Master, right now with all these people here and everybody at work, it seems, in this wonderful delegation, I don't know what to say about a welcome. LARRY D. MCKEE, MASTER, BEATRICE LODGE NO. 26

Thank you, M. W. Sir, Distinguished Guests, Masters of Subordinate Lodges, brethren all:

I would like to read you a little letter that I got first. It says, "Worshipful Master and Dear Brother McKee: Worshipful Frank J. Mattoon, Grand Master, request that you give the Response to the Address of Welcome at 10:15 a.m. Friday, June 14." He made the letter short and I am sure I will try to make the response short. M. W. Sir, I don't think I have ever seen this many Masters at one Grand Lodge meeting, I am sure that it is because of your work in the Grand Lodge, going out to see the different lodges, that they are here. But to talk to the rest of the members of this meeting, I think most here are Masters. I would like to direct most of the remarks to the Masters. I know when I was installed as Master of Beatrice Lodge, to me, it was probably the greatest day of my life. And I think if you look back, you can remember when Harry S. Truman was installed as Grand Master of Missouri, he said at that time, "that no greater honor could be bestowed on any man." If you remember, he caused quite an uproar in the Senate and the House. But I think that is the way we all feel. I think Masters of these lodges are the backbone of Masonry and I am glad to see you all here. I have one little personal appeal, I don't know how to go about it, but the All Faith Chapel in Beatrice is about ready to be built. If anybody has any information as to how we go about getting the corner-stone laid, we would like to have a cornerstone laying in Beatrice, and when we do, we would like to invite everybody down to it. Thank you M. W. Sir.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND LODGE, ANCIENT FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA

I extend to all of you a most hearty welcome to this the 117th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

The Annual Communication plays a vital role in the progress of Masonry in our great State. It is gratifying to note that there are in attendance a large number of the Masters and Wardens of the constituent lodges, Past Grand Masters, Distinguished guests representing other bodies and other jurisdictions and other interested Masons, who by their presence, exhibit their interest in our great Fraternity.

It does not seem possible that only a few short months ago, I stood here on this podium and outlined the program for the coming year. How rapidly it has drawn to a close, but how gratifying was the experience! I shall cherish it for the rest of my life, fully recognizing that there is much yet to be accomplished in the future for the enhancement of this Society dedicated to the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.

At the outset of this Masonic year, your Grand Lodge Officers initiated various programs designed to stimulate and revitalize Masonry in Nebraska, I hasten to express my sincere appreciation to the Grand Lodge Officers who have cooperated wholeheartedly in the development of the program. I have had the occasion of serving many organizations in various capacities, but I can truthfully say that this group of dedicated Masons are among the finest with whom it has been my pleasure to serve. I am certain that the future of Masonry in Nebraska is in excellent hands. In like manner, your Grand Lodge Officers have received the support, assistance and guidance of the Past Grand Masters who have actively participated in the activities of the Grand Lodge when called upon to do so. We recognize these Past Grand Masters as the "backbone" of Masonry. I would be amiss if I did not also recognize the Grand Custodian and his fine group of Deputy Grand Custodians who are charged with the continued degree of proficiency of Masonic work. It is my pleasure to report to you from my contacts with the Grand Officers of other Jurisdictions that Nebraska is truly the envy of many of the other Jurisdictions with regard to our system of maintaining our proficiency in degree work. Further, the committees of the Grand Lodge responded wholeheartedly to their respective duties.

While serving in Grand Lodge over the past few years, I noted that a negative attitude was developing in some areas with regard to the effectiveness and relevancy of Masonry. A number of Masons were becoming discouraged by the problems which confronted the Grand Lodge and our constituent lodges. To this end, a program was developed designed to assist the constituent lodges and to strengthen leadership in all areas, with its central theme to promote and encourage Masonry in Nebraska, using as a vehicle specific programs designed to stimulate and encourage and strengthen constituent lodge activity and to offer guidance to the Masters, Wardens, other officers and committees. The success or failure of Masonry is directly dependent

upon the initiative and leadership of our constituent lodges. To emphasize this point, we have attempted to recognize the importance of the function of the Masters of the lodges by a special seating arrangement and their personal presentation to this Grand Lodge Communication. It is our way of expressing gratitude for the leadership exemplified by these dedicated Masons.

Prior to the commencement of this Masonic year, a detailed program was disseminated to all Grand Lodge Officers in order to present a coordinated effort to accomplish the objectives to which I have previously referred.

We recognized that total development and overwhelming accomplishments in one year was not possible, but I submit that the application of the basic principles hereinafter discussed will bear fruit in the years to come.

The program was later disseminated to all lodges through communications initiated through the Grand Lodge Office. It was generally well received and I am happy to report that there were definite results and enthusiasm generated.

Specifically, the areas to which I have referred are: Coordination with Youth Groups, establishment of plans for a 1976 Bi-Centennial activities, sustaining membership, Master Wardens' conferences and leadership training, improvement of local lodge facilities and stimulation of public relations programs.

We attempted to initiate and expedite the program by special communiques to the lodges and also through our Official Representative Visitation program, (newly initiated this year), as well as through the efforts of your dedicated Deputy Grand Custodians.

I fully recognize that to elaborate upon each area is somewhat time consuming. However, this must be considered from the point of view that a complete record is necessary for the future development, modification and execution of a program which will be beneficial to our Fraternity.

(a) Official Visitation Program: The idea for this program was borrowed from the Grand Lodge of South Dakota with which it had experienced a high degree of success. There are approximately 250 lodges in Nebraska making it virtually impossible for your Grand Master to visit each lodge. Further, as evidence of this point, there are many of our lodges which have never had the opportunity to receive the Grand Master or other Grand Lodge officers or representatives in their respective communities. Approximately 60 lodges were selected this year to receive a personal representative of the Grand Master. The officers of the Grand Lodge and a number of Past Grand Masters participated in the program and were received in the capacity of a personal representative. Fifty visitations were completed. The program had many unexpected affirmative results, among which were the stimulation of a specific program for the planning of Centennial Celebrations for the next year, consideration of establishment of two DeMolay Chapters, plans for improvement of local lodge facilities and plans for

publication of local lodge bulletins. Further, the lodges were given the opportunity to exhibit proficiency in receiving the Grand Lodge Officer and appreciated the opportunity to discuss specific problem areas. On the other hand, the representatives themselves reported enthusiastically their pleasure in establishing a new relationship with their Brother Masons, (other visitations I shall discuss in some detail later in this report). One of the functions of the representative was to discuss fully the annual program to which I now direct my remarks.

(b) Youth Activities:

For many years, we have recognized that the future of Masonry lies in our youth groups -- DeMolay, Job's Daughters and Rainbow for Girls. At various times and in many instances, specific programs have been encouraged to assist in any way possible these fine organizations. Your Grand Lodge officers initiated a program wherein a special Grand Lodge Youth Committee was appointed to study the entire situation and to devise ways and means of coordinating with and encouraging these organizations, and thereafter to disseminate specific plans and goals to the constituent lodge committees on youth. In like manner, the constituent lodges were encouraged to establish a Youth Committee with the Junior Warden designated as the Chairman. This plan has worked well in California. I have received reports that many of these committees have been established as well as personal knowledge that the Grand Lodge Committee has been appointed. Specifically, the areas which can be developed are assistance with membership, physical presence at meetings and degree work, invitations to youth groups to put on displays of a portion of their degrees or ceremonies as guests of the local lodge, sponsorship of DeMolay Chapters where none exist, sponsoring DeMolay clubs in small communities, attendance at installation ceremonies and physical presence at meetings upon invitation.

We also established a more prominent place on the Grand Lodge program for the presentation of representatives from the Youth groups at the Annual Communication and initiated a proclamation of DeMolay Month which is a continuance of a prior Grand Lodge program.

I have had many comments from responsible DeMolays showing a deep appreciation for the fact that we reduced our age of admission to 19 years. This year we have initiated a number of DeMolays and other young men of this age group.

There have been reports of stimulation in the above areas, specifically, two lodges are considering the sponsorship of new DeMolay chapters.

(c) Bi-Centennial Committee:

In 1976, our country will observe its 200th birthday. As we all know, Masons played an active role in the establishment of this great Democracy and have participated in the history of our country in vital areas. We recognize that the 1976 celebration will afford Masonry a great opportunity to point with pride to this record and to enhance the awareness of our citizenry of the important role which Masonry has played in the history of our country and in which it is now engaged in our every day community life. This presents a unique opportunity. To this end, a Grand Lodge Bi-Centennial Committee has been

appointed which will report its findings to you later in the program. Our constituent lodges have been encouraged to establish Bi-Centennial committees and to make plans for a 1976 celebration. Materials are in the process of being disseminated to local lodges and we have received reports that many of the constituent lodges are progressing well with plans for 1976.

(d) Sustaining Membership:

For years, we have recognized that many of our members have lost interest in Masonry and have been suspended for nonpayment of dues. It is extremely important that we now direct a conserted effort to prevent these suspensions. Most Worshipful Brother John A. Bottorf initiated a very ambitious program to accomplish this result and many other Grand Masters have considered this situation in prior years. Our committee on sustaining membership has been actively working on programs designed to assist the constituent lodges in establishment of their respective committees with the primary mission to prevent suspensions and to encourage reinstatement. No member should be suspended for nonpayment of dues until he has been contacted by two of the brethren of the involved lodge. This approach should rectify many unfortunate situations. Further, where a Brother has been suspended previously, the Committee on Sustaining Membership should contact him to encourage reinstatement!

As a part of our problem of membership, we should take cognizance of the programs initiated by our Scottish Rite bodies where guest nights are encouraged and used as a media for information about Masonry. In this connection, our Scottish Rite brethren pay for the dinner and conduct a program to explain the principles of our great institution. This year I have encouraged these programs but have cautioned that where such a program is initiated, there should be no reference to a "higher degree" of Masonry, nor should there be any suggestion of solicitation or invitation. Incidentally, these same activities could be utilized to advantage to communicate with sojourning Masons in their respective communities.

(e) Master and Wardens Conferences:

Your committee on Masonic Education initiated programs designed to assist with leadership training through the media of Masters and Wardens conferences. The areas which received specific treatment were as follows:

- (1) Blue Lodge Operations, leadership and training
- (2) Indoctrination and orientation of officers to include duties, responsibilities, prior planning, activities of lodges, etc.
- (3) Stimulation of membership and prevention of suspensions.
- (4) Specific Problems of local lodges:
 - (a) Lack of new blood in rural areas.
 - (b) Downtown lodge problems in urban areas

The concept of a conference was designed to stimulate attendance and to give our brethren an opportunity to discuss Masonry while traveling to and from the conference. A concentrated type of program was introduced. We recognized that the problem of attendance reared its ugly head, but I have personally observed that those in attendance received great benefit from the presentation of the program. Six areas were selected in key locations. The program under M.'.W.'. Brother Howard J. Hunter was well received, and the dedicated members of his committee presented programs which were stimulating, inspirational and educational.

(f) Improvement Of Lodge Facilities

We have long recognized that the condition of the lodge is extremely important in a total lodge program. Our temples are truly the "Shrine" of Masonry which houses its Great Lights. We have encouraged all lodges to make immediate plans for improvement of lodge facilities commencing with minor items and then to project a five-year program. Many lodges have responded with affirmative action in these areas including outdoor carpeting and hand rails, new signs and lights on the outside of temples, road signs, painting and general cleanup. In one instance a lodge considered a new building and in another, the installation of an escalating chair for elderly members.

Adequate signs with appropriate insignia are necessary for the immediate identity of the location of the lodge which many times is extremely difficuly to ascertain. Further, an announcement of the time of regular meeting by road signs has been a project in a number of states and enjoyed a measure of success. The results this year have been gratifying, but there are many areas of improvement which should be considered by the local lodges.

(g) Public Relations

One of the critical areas in the administration of Masonry is the lack of communication between Grand Lodge, on the one hand, and constituent lodges and individual Masons, on the other. To this end, the Public Relations Committee, under the chairmanship of Lester Way and the supervision of R. W. Brother Donald R. Swanson, is in the process of studying the feasibility of a statewide publication which will ultimately reach all members. The frequency and extent of the publication are directly dependent upon available funds. Constituent lodges have been requested to make certain that its Public Relations Committee is active in publicizing local events involving the lodges and also in preparing a news letter or some other type of direct communication with the brethren. There have been four examples of such communications commenced during this year, and plans are under way in a number of other lodges.

Many lodges have had publications of this nature for a number of years. These have been well received by the brethren and have resulted in greater activity in dissemination of Masonic news and education. We have urged all lodges to give immediate consideration to publications of this nature.

The Grand Lodge in like manner should place priority and emphasis upon a Statewide publication to the extent of making funds available from our present appropriations and income.

* * * *

I am hopeful that the above program will be continued by the Grand Lodge and that we will be in a position to continue revitalization and renewed dedication to the end that Masonry in Nebraska will continue to be one of the significant cornerstones of our society.

CORNERSTONES AND DEDICATIONS

Your Grand Lodge had the privilege of laying cornerstones for public or educational buildings on six occasions which were truly highlights of this Masonic year. The officers and brethren of the participant lodges are to be congratulated for sponsoring this opportunity of exhibiting the true worth of our fraternity as an integral part of community life. Moreover the occasion of laying cornerstones affords a unique opportunity to the fraternity to bring to the public the principles and ideals upon which it is founded. Wherever possible, our constituent lodges should utilize every endeavor to encourage and promote the laying of cornerstones for public, religious, charitable and educational buildings.

The particular occasions were the North Platte Valley Historical Association at Gering, (Scotts Bluff Lodge No. 201), Buffalo County Courthouse and Buffalo County 4-H Building at Kearney (Rob Morris No. 46), the Senior-Junior High School at Callaway (Parian No. 207), Masonic Temple at Stanton (Northern Light No. 41) and Emerson Junior High School at Grand Island (Ashlar No. 33 and Grand Island No. 318). Again, congratulations to the brethren of the participant lodges. (Acknowledgements to Grand Senior Deacon A.B. Saum and Grand Marshall Harold C. Wurdeman).

In a similar vein, progress of the Masonic fraternity was placed on display at Dedications at Humboldt (Humboldt No. 40), Harvard (Harvard No. 44), Neligh (Trowel No. 71) and Stanton (Northern Light No. 41). The officers and brethren of these lodges in like manner are to be congratulated for recognizing that the improvement of the physical facilities reflects a true respect for the shrine of the Great Lights of Masonry. In connection with the above, formal approval for construction and remodeling of temple buildings was granted to Northern Light No. 41 at Stanton (above) and Oakland Lodge No. 91 which I understand plans a cornerstone ceremony and dedication next fall.

VISITATIONS AND CEREMONIALS

Visitations and participation in Ceremonials and related activities were screened to reflect relevancy to the promotion of the specific administrative programs heretofore discussed. In general, your Grand Master traveled over 28,000 miles, due in part to the length and breadth of our great State. The visitations were of great benefit, and I am certain that close coordination with constituent lodges, appendant bodies, youth organizations and other associated orders will be instrumental in strengthening Masonry in Nebraska.

- 1. The Official Visitation program was a great success due to the efforts of the participating Grand Lodge officers and Past Grand Masters. It will be possible to cover all of the lodges in Nebraska in four or five years. In addition to this program, the Grand Lodge officers visited or were received by approximately 25 additional lodges and participated in installations, regular meetings, emergent communications, youth group activities, presentation of 50 year pins, etc.
- 2. Youth Organizations Your Grand Master attended the Job's Daughters Grand Bethel in Lincoln and DeMolay Conclave in Chadron, and was represented by M.'.W.'. Brother Elmer E. Magee at the Grand Assembly Rainbow for Girls at Crete. I also had the pleasure of twice installing the officers of the Sidney DeMolay Chapter and attending the installations of the DeMolay Chapter at Alliance and of Sidney Bethel No. 25, International Order of Job's Daughters. It was a personal pleasure to Mrs. Mattoon and me to have had the pleasure of observing the installation of our daughter Susan as Honored Queen.
- 3. Personal Visitations and Ceremonials — I was officially received or was a guest at Humboldt No. 40 - Harvard No. 44; Scotts Bluff No. 201, Gering; Oasis No. 271, Morrill*; Mitchell No. 263*; Bayard No. 301*; Nebraska No. 1, Omaha; Plattsmouth No. 6; Fremont No. 15 (installed officers); Lincoln No. 19 (Mother Lodge); Beatrice No. 26; Lancaster No. 54, Lincoln (Gold Jordan Medal presentation); Ashlar No. 33, Grand Island: Northern Light No. 41, Stanton; Harvard No. 44; Mosaic No. 55, Norfolk; York No. 56; Trowel No. 71, Neligh; Frank Welch No. 75, Sidney, (Table Lodge reception); Ogallala No. 159; Culbertson No. 174; Alliance No. 183; Golden Fleece No. 205, Chappell; Parian No. 207, Callaway; Gothenburg No. 249; Robert W. I had the pleasure of presenting W. Brother George H. Murphy with the Gold Jordan Medal in Lincoln on February 8, 1974, a truly memorable occasion. During the year I also presented eight 50-year pins and one 25- year button.

In addition, on January 8, 1974, I had the pleasure of raising my son, Steven Frank Mattoon, to the sublime degree of a Master Mason. This was a challenging and rewarding experience.

4. Our appendant bodies are of great assistance in promoting Masonry in Nebraska. I was cordially received and entertained by the Scottish Rite Brethren in Lincoln, Omaha and Alliance and was prevented by inclement weather from attending the Grand York Rite Ceremonial in Hastings. The Shrine Ceremonial and Game in Lincoln on August 17 and 18, 1973 and Grand Chapter O.E.S. in Lincoln on May 14, 1974 were among the highlights of the year, as well as the Plattsmouth Home and Board visitation on October 8, 1973.

- 5. The Grand Masters Conference in Washington, D.C. in conjunction with the George Washington Memorial and Masonic Service Associations, and a visitation of the Scottish Rite Temple, were inspirational.
- 6. Although the emphasis on visitations was directed toward the State of Nebraska, I had the pleasure of attending Grand Lodge Communications in Wyoming and Colorado. R.'.W.'. Brother Donald R. Swanson served as my Personal Representative at Communications in Missouri, Kansas and Kentucky; R.'.W.'. Brother Harold Hultman the Grand Lodge of Iowa, and M.'.W.'. Brother Louis V. Sylvester the Grand Lodge of South Dakota. I am grateful to these Brethren in releasing me for intra-state administration.

1. AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

The following amendments to By-Laws of subordinate lodges were approved: Increase in dues -14; increase in degree fees -1; increase in secretary's salary -2; change relating to regular meeting date -7; increased Tyler's fees -1; relating to trustees and relief funds -1; general revision of By-Laws.

The following consolidations were approved:
Ramah Lodge No. 275 with Elwood Lodge No. 167;
Fairfield Lodge No. 84 with Clay Centre Lodge No. 139;
Sterling Lodge No. 70 and Mount Hermon Lodge No. 231 with Tecumseh Lodge No. 17.

It is unfortunate that some of our lodges find it necessary to effect a consolidation with a lodge in a neighboring community. The obvious result is the complete elimination of Masonry in a given community. Further, consolidations should be approved only after the Grand Lodge officers have exhausted every effort to revitalize the interest of the Brother Masons of the lodge for which the application for consolidation has been submitted for approval.

GRAND REPRESENTATIVES

During the year, I appointed the following Grand representatives of other jurisdictions near Nebraska: S.E. Torgeson, Norway; Donald R. Swanson, New Zealand; and Harold Hultman, Wisconsin.

It is worthy to note that Brother Torgeson plans to attend the Grand Lodge Communication of Norway in response to his appointment.

NECROLOGY

During this year, four distinguished Masons directly associated with the Grand Lodge have been called to eternal rest: Worshipful Brother Clarence Gene McNamee, Deputy Grand Custodian Emeritus — December 25, 1973; Worshipful Brother Ralph I. Berry, Deputy Grand Custodian Emeritus — April 5, 1974; Worshipful Brother George B. Pribyl — April 12, 1974; and Worshipful Brother J. Frank Heywood, Holder of the Gold Jordan Medal, who had just celebrated his 100th birthday — November 10, 1973.

Many of our brethren throughout the State have also passed beyond. The Committee on Fraternal Dead will offer tribute to the memory of all of our deceased brethren during this Communication.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS AND DISCIPLINARY ACTION
I appointed three trial commissions for alleged violations of the
Masonic Code.

A member of Midwest Lodge No. 317, Hastings, Nebraska, was found guilty as charged for violation of Section 3—102 (a). The Trial Commission held "that Masonry would be best served by healing the charges and that no further penalty be assessed." This decision was founded upon character references and the fact that the Brother had completed rehabilitation—approved.

Charges were preferred by Bellevue Lodge No. 325 against a Brother for violation of Section 3-102 (d) for engaging in the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage. The charges are pending.

Twelve Master Masons in good standing filed a complaint against the Master of a lodge for engaging in the business of the sale and dispensing of liquor as an alcoholic beverage and requested that the Jewel of Office of the Master be suspended. I ordered an immediate investigation of the charges and thereafter issued an order to the Brother to show cause why his jewel should not be suspended for violation of section 3-102(d) of the Masonic Code. In response, the Brother presented evidence that he had divested himself of all interest in the business of selling alcoholic beverages and had ceased any activity relating thereto. Accordingly, I issued an order that his Jewel of Office should not be suspended but that he be reprimanded for violation of Section 3-102 (d).

Twenty-nine Applications for reinstatement were approved by me during the year. In one instance, the constituent lodge had approved an application for reinstatement which was subsequently disapproved by the Grand Lodge Committee. However, the Committee did not present its specific reason for disapproval of the application. I therefore approved the application.

I have observed that the area of reinstatements offers a fertile field in which we can direct a concentrated effort to inspire Brethren who have been suspended for nonpayment of dues to renew their Masonic association and become active members of the various lodges. I therefore recommend to the Committee on Sustaining Membership that the encouragement of reinstatement in such cases be included in its program.

DISPENSATIONS

 Dispensations to permit conferring of degrees without regard to time were granted to: Melrose Lodge No. 60 (2); Mizpah No. 302; Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 and Lancaster Lodge No. 54.

- Upon good cause shown, dispensation was granted to North Star Lodge No. 227 to examine for proficiency in the Master Mason, a brother who was raised on January 25, 1967.
- 3. Robert W. Furnas Lodge No. 265 and Solomon Lodge No. 10 were authorized to move their respective Charters to an outside location for conferral of the Master Mason Degree upon assurance that the location would be duly tiled.
- 4. Oakland Lodge No. 91 was authorized to move its Charter from a temporary location to the remodeled Temple.
- 5. Special dispensation was granted to Northern Light Lodge No. 41 to move its Charter from the Congregational Church in Stanton, Nebraska, to its new lodge facilities.
- 6. Wisner Lodge No. 114 and Creighton Lodge No. 100 requested dispensation to change their regular stated meeting because of a conflict with Christmas and New Year's Days, respectively. No provision of the By-laws of these Lodges permitting such action was submitted. I therefore denied the requests for dispensation in both cases.
- 7. Special dispensations were granted to Nebraska Lodge No. 1 and Barneston Lodge No. 165 to hold elections on dates other than those specified in their respective By-Laws. Dispensation was granted in each case with the stipulation that no less than seven days notice of change in date of election was to be mailed to every member of the lodge.
- 8. Omaha Lodge No. 288 advanced its election from December 4, 1973, without receiving special dispensation, although the same had been requested upon brief notice. I declared the election null and void and directed the Lodge to call a special meeting for the purpose of election of officers and required that notice be mailed to all members no less than ten days prior to the date selected. The Lodge compiled with this requirement and proceeded to hold its election on a newly scheduled date.
- 9. Mt. Zion Lodge No. 161 and Corinthian Lodge No. 83 were granted special dispensation to elect and install their respective Junior Wardens out of time.
- Cement Lodge No. 211 was granted special dispensation to install its Treasurer at the regular meeting in February. Oasis Lodge No. 271 was granted special dispensation to install four of its officers out of time due to various conflicts.
- 11. The following lodges were granted special dispensation to install officers out of time:
 - a. Kimball Lodge No. 294 to install officers on December 27, 1973 instead of during the month of January, 1974.

- b. Liberty Lodge No. 300 to install its Senior Deacon on February 7, 1974, or at any other regular meeting within a two month period thereafter.
- c. Mt. Zion Lodge No. 161 to install its Junior Warden immediately after the election for which special dispensation was granted above.
- d. Corinthian Lodge No. 83 to install its Junior Warden immediately after the election for which special dispensation was granted, above.
- e. Cement Lodge No. 211 to install its Treasurer at the regular meeting in February, 1974.
- f. Oasis Lodge No. 271 to install four of its officers at the regular meeting to be held during the month of February, 1974, or on any other date selected by the Worshipful Masters not by the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge.
- g. Potter Lodge No. 313 to install its officers at its regular meeting in February, 1974.
- h. Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 to install its Senior Steward after the regular installation.
- i. Hartington Lodge No. 155 to elect officers upon ten days notice and to install immediately thereafter, during the month of March, 1974.
- Acacia Lodge No. 34 to install its Secretary at its regular meeting in March, 1974.
- k. Falls City Lodge No. 9 to install its Junior Deacon at its regular communication on March 14, 1974.

DECISIONS

Lancaster Lodge No. 54 received a Petition from a candidate who 1. formerly resided in the state of Florida. While in that jurisdiction, he filed a Petition for initiation with a Florida lodge. Before any action was taken on the Petition, he was transferred to overseas duty with the United States Navy. The Grand Secretary made several inquiries of the Grand Lodge of Florida with regard to the Masonic record of the candidate in that State. No reply was received, and there was no affirmative evidence that the Petition of the candidate had ever been acted upon by the Grand Lodge of Florida or any subordinate lodge. I therefore held that there was insufficient evidence to conclude that the Grand Lodge of Florida obtained jurisdiction over the candidate by the mere filing of the application. As such, the candidate was not precluded from filing an appropriate Petition for the degrees of Masonry with Lancaster Lodge No. 54 and to receive the degrees, if otherwise qualified.

- 2. Fremont Lodge No 15 submitted the question of whether or not initiation fees for the degrees of Masonry should be returned where a Brother received the Entered Apprentice Degree and was not inclined to advance. Five years has elapsed since the Brother received the degree. I held that under the provisions of Section 2-606, the unearned portion of the fees should be returned to the candidate or, upon his acquiescence, to his Father who had paid the same. (See Decision 1951-6; approved).
- 3. The following factual situation was presented by Lincoln Lodge No. 19. A petition was received by a candidate who had been rejected in 1948 by Lancaster Lodge No. 54. A request for Waiver of Jurisdiction was submitted to Lancaster Lodge No. 54 which was rejected in due course. The questions presented were:

(a) "Since it was our request for a Waiver of Jurisdiction that was denied, and not the candidate's petition; how soon can we request another Waiver of Jurisdiction?" and

(b) "Can we request another Waiver of Jurisdiction from the same Petition; or do we have a new Petition each time our request is turned down by Lancaster Lodge No. 54?"

I submitted to Lincoln Lodge No. 19 the following opinion:

(a) Under the provisions of Section 2-910 and 2-801, the rejected petitioner was entitled to petition Lincoln Lodge No. 19 for the degrees of Masonry.

(b) Under the provisions of Section 2-909 and 2-906, it was essential that a waiver be obtained by Lincoln Lodge No. 19 from Lancaster Lodge No. 54 before said Petition could be officially received in the manner set forth in Section 2-809.

(c) The By-Laws of the Grand Lodges of Nebraska do not provide that any particular length of time to expire before an additional request for waiver might be filed with Lancaster Lodge No. 54. However, I recommended that a reasonable time elapse between such requests for waiver of jurisdiction.

(d) There is no provision in said By-Laws with regard to a requirement that each request for waiver must be founded upon a new petition. Therefore, I concluded that requests for waiver might be submitted upon the basis of the original Petition filed with Lincoln Lodge No. 19.

- 4. Adequate evidence having been submitted by the Grand Custodian with regard to errors which occurred in the history of the certification of two Brothers, I held in both cases that the records be healed to conform to the evidence submitted although there was some contrary evidence in the records of prior Grand Lodge Proceedings.
- 5. Silver Cord Lodge No. 224, voted not to require annual dues for members who have been Master Masons over 50 years unless they wished to continue paying the same. The record was not clear whether or not a resolution had been formally introduced to amend the By-Laws of the Lodge specifying the waiver of payment of dues under the curcumstances above recited. I ruled as follows:

- (a) That the request was premature inasmuch as the record was not clear as to whether or not the proposed amendment had been adopted by the Lodge; and
- (b) That the waiver of dues would be tantamount to the issuance of a life membership, contrary to Section 2-405.
- (c) Further, I commented that the relief now provided in Section 2-603 should be sufficient to accommodate hardship cases which was urged as the basis for the proposed amendment. I further commented that in other jurisdictions which had adopted such measures, the financial status of subordinate lodges had been adversely affected.
- 6. In a case where charges were pending against a Brother for violation of Section 3-102 (d), the lodge requested a ruling as to whether or not the factual situation presented constituted a violation of Section 3-102 (d). The inquiry was submitted in order to prevent undesirable circumstances in the future. Further, the Lodge requested a ruling as to whether or not the Grand Master could dismiss the charges after the same had been filed by the Junior Warden of the lodge.

I held that the Grand Master has no authority vested in him under the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Lodge to dismiss charges properly filed for the reason that charges "may not be withdrawn except for cause and with the consent of two-thirds of the members of the Lodge present." Therefore, the authority to dismiss charges is vested exclusively in the constituent Lodge.

I further held that the Grand Master should not submit a formal opinion with regard to whether or not a given statement of facts constituted a violation of the Masonic Code in future cases, particularly where charges based upon the same currently were pending. This would involve an adjudication prior to trial and could be tantamount to amendment of the By-Laws or Constitution, as the case may be.

7. A proposed amendment to the By-Laws of North Star Lodge No. 227 was submitted for approval which provided as follows:

"To qualify for election to Junior Warden or Senior Warden a brother must have demonstrated proficiency in the work of the Senior Deacon. Such proficiency attested to by a personally proficient member of this lodge."

In disapproving the proposed amendment, I held that Section 2-301 of the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge stated unequivocally the qualifications for officers of constituent lodges and that any additional requirements established by the By-Laws of a constituent lodge were invalid and beyond the authority of said Lodge.

Further, such a requirement contravened the right of any Master Mason in good standing, who has complied with Section 2-402, to hold an elective office in his lodge and further limited the power and authority of the members of the constituent lodges to elect officers inasmuch as under the proposed By-Laws, must have been examined and declared proficient by a member of the lodge before becoming entitled to the elective position.

THE STATE OF THE CRAFT

From my personal observations and reports received from various sources, it is apparent that Masonry in Nebraska "is not dead, is not dying and is not even sick!" The statement I made at the beginning of the year. I am more firmly convinced than ever of its truth. This does not mean that we should merely stand still in reflected glory. There are areas of concern which dictate the exertion of leadership and renewed dedication. We should always remember to "accentuate the positive" and "eliminate the negative". Alluding to our problems without consideration of solutions will avail nothing. On the other hand, if all of us show that degree of leadership and concern, required in a given situation, solutions will be found to alleviate the troublesome areas, and Masonry will continue to be a vital force in our society.

I conclude therefore, that the condition of Masonry in Nebraska is good notwithstanding some evidence of inactivity and declining membership in some of our lodges. Where such problems exist, the reasons can be found in the truism that "Masonry is not lazy, but there are lazy Masons." Recognition of this principle is the key to further progress.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Youth Committee should be designated and established as a Standing Committee of the Grand Lodge; and accordingly, the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge. A. F. & A. M. be amended in the following manner:
 - (a) That portion of Section 1-301 shall be amended to provide as follows:

"The Standing Committee shall be following: Jurisprudence, Fraternal Relations, Fraternal Dead, Masonic Relief, Temple Building Advisory, Masonic Education, Board of Grand Trustees, Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund, Applications for Reinstatements, George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, Nebraska Work, Finance, Appropriations, Grand Lodge Offices, Lodge Advisory, Public Relations and Youth Committee, ***"

(b) Section 1-329 Shall be enacted to provide as follows: "1-320. The Youth Committee shall initiate specific plans and programs for the support, encouragement and stimulation of DeMolay, Job's Daughters, and Rainbow for Girls Organzations."

- 2. Due to the substantial increase in the cost of operation of motor vehicles, the By-Laws of Grand Lodge should be amended to provide for an increase in mileage allowance from 10¢ to 12¢ per mile.
- 3. Our Grand Lodge is far behind many of the other jurisdictions insofar as published communications to Lodges and members is concerned. This failure of communication makes it extremely difficult to conduct the administrative functions of the Grand Lodge and to stimulate Masonic Programs throughout the State.

Therefore, I recommend that an initial appropriation in the amount of \$2,500.00 be adopted as a priority item for the ensuing year.

- 4. The Grand Lodge should actively support the campaign for additional funds for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, through our companion committee. The Memorial is truly a proper and effective "show case" of Masonic principle, standards and history.
- 5. I recommend a greater degree of participation in the Hospital Visitation Program of the Masonic Services Association, by the appointment of a representative in the Omaha area, and an appropriation be designated sufficient to achieve the same.
- 6. I specifically endorse and submit for approval the following proposed recommendation of the Deputy Grand Master:
 - "I recommend that the Stockholders and the Board of Trustees of The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children amend the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws of said corporation to admit to the Home only children whose parent or grandparent is, or was if deceased, a member in good standing in either a subordinate Masonic Lodge in Nebraska or a subordinate chapter of The Order of Eastern Star in Nebraska."
- 7. I recommend the continuance of the Official Visitation Program and the other administrative programs, heretofore submitted in detail in this address.

CONCLUSION

I can think of no more fitting way than to close my remarks with an expression of appreciation:

- 1. To M. W. Brother Norris W. Lallman who presented me the opportunity to serve as Grand Orator, and to M. W. Brother Hugh W. Eisenhart who appointed me as Grand Junior Deacon of this Grand Lodge.
- To the Grand Lodge for electing me to the position of its Grand Master.
- 3. To the Officers, Past Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Custodians, Committees and all of the Brethren who have given of their time, talents and efforts in furthering the principles of this great fraternity and who have served so masterfully this year.
- 4. To my wife, Treva and my family for their support, inspiration and understanding during this busy and sometimes frustrating year.

- 5. To my office assistants and associates who worked with me and assumed many of my professional responsibilities.
- 6. To the Officers and Brethren of Frank Welch Lodge No. 75 for the reception, photograph, hat, carrying case and their general support; and for assuming the responsibility of opening and closing a special communication at this Grand Lodge Communication.
- 7. To all Nebraska Masons with whom I have had the privilege and pleasure to serve for your friendship and cooperation; and most certainly to our gracious hosts at this Communication, the officers and Brethren of Rob Morris No. 46, Ashlar Lodge No. 33, Grand Island No. 318, Mid-West No. 317, Hastings No. 50 and Granite No. 189; and to Chairmen W.'. Brother A. B. Saum and W.'. Brother Rollie Dunn, the committee and those who participated in the opening ceremonies.

This has been a rewarding year which I shall treasure for the rest of my life. Thank You, Brethren.

REPORT OF THE GRAND CUSTODIAN

TO THE GRAND LODGE OF THE MOST WORSHIPFUL AND HONORABLE FRATERNITY OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA.

The Annual report of the Grand Custodian is hereby fraternally submitted:

Your Grand Custodian has been extremely busy this past year with Central Schools at Neligh, Hastings, Stromsburg, Seward, Aurora, Wilber, Fairbury, Wymore, Beatrice, Nelson, Superior, Plattsmouth, Nebraska City, Springfield, Weeping Water, Cozad, Ogallala Benkelman, Cambridge, Arapahoe, Tekamah, Schuyler, Ainsworth, Loup City, Ord, Valley, Randolph, Tecumseh, Humboldt, Auburn, Falls City, Walthill, Mullen, Gordon, Minatare, Sidney Lincoln and Omaha. The ritual in Nebraska remains at an all time high.

LODGE CERTIFICATION

Sorry to report a loss of eight lodges over last year making a total of 130 certified lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction. Bancroft Lodge No. 145 is back after an absence of four years. Following is a compiled list of all Lodges with number of years each has been consecutively certified. A record such as this has never before been researched therefore, I would request all lodges to check their own listing and report any errors to the Grand Custodian.

(a) That the request was premature inasmuch as the record was not clear as to whether or not the proposed amendment had been adopted by the Lodge; and

(b) That the waiver of dues would be tantamount to the issuance of a life membership, contrary to Section 2-405.

- (c) Further, I commented that the relief now provided in Section 2-603 should be sufficient to accommodate hardship cases which was urged as the basis for the proposed amendment. I further commented that in other jurisdictions which had adopted such measures, the financial status of subordinate lodges had been adversely affected.
- 6. In a case where charges were pending against a Brother for violation of Section 3-102 (d), the lodge requested a ruling as to whether or not the factual situation presented constituted a violation of Section 3-102 (d). The inquiry was submitted in order to prevent undesirable circumstances in the future. Further, the Lodge requested a ruling as to whether or not the Grand Master could dismiss the charges after the same had been filed by the Junior Warden of the lodge.

I held that the Grand Master has no authority vested in him under the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Lodge to dismiss charges properly filed for the reason that charges "may not be withdrawn except for cause and with the consent of two-thirds of the members of the Lodge present." Therefore, the authority to dismiss charges is vested exclusively in the constituent Lodge.

I further held that the Grand Master should not submit a formal opinion with regard to whether or not a given statement of facts constituted a violation of the Masonic Code in future cases, particularly where charges based upon the same currently were pending. This would involve an adjudication prior to trial and could be tantamount to amendment of the By-Laws or Constitution, as the case may be.

7. A proposed amendment to the By-Laws of North Star Lodge No. 227 was submitted for approval which provided as follows:

"To qualify for election to Junior Warden or Senior Warden a brother must have demonstrated proficiency in the work of the Senior Deacon. Such proficiency attested to by a personally proficient member of this lodge."

In disapproving the proposed amendment, I held that Section 2-301 of the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge stated unequivocally the qualifications for officers of constituent lodges and that any additional requirements established by the By-Laws of a constituent lodge were invalid and beyond the authority of said Lodge.

Further, such a requirement contravened the right of any Master Mason in good standing, who has complied with Section 2-402, to hold an elective office in his lodge and further limited the power and authority of the members of the constituent lodges to elect officers inasmuch as under the proposed By-Laws, must have been examined and declared proficient by a member of the lodge before becoming entitled to the elective position.

THE STATE OF THE CRAFT

From my personal observations and reports received from various sources, it is apparent that Masonry in Nebraska "is not dead, is not dying and is not even sick!" The statement I made at the beginning of the year. I am more firmly convinced than ever of its truth. This does not mean that we should merely stand still in reflected glory. There are areas of concern which dictate the exertion of leadership and renewed dedication. We should always remember to "accentuate the positive" and "eliminate the negative". Alluding to our problems without consideration of solutions will avail nothing. On the other hand, if all of us show that degree of leadership and concern, required in a given situation, solutions will be found to alleviate the troublesome areas, and Masonry will continue to be a vital force in our society.

I conclude therefore, that the condition of Masonry in Nebraska is good notwithstanding some evidence of inactivity and declining membership in some of our lodges. Where such problems exist, the reasons can be found in the truism that "Masonry is not lazy, but there are lazy Masons." Recognition of this principle is the key to further progress.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Youth Committee should be designated and established as a Standing Committee of the Grand Lodge; and accordingly, the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge. A. F. & A. M. be amended in the following manner:
 - (a) That portion of Section 1-301 shall be amended to provide as follows:
 - "The Standing Committee shall be following: Jurisprudence, Fraternal Relations, Fraternal Dead, Masonic Relief, Temple Building Advisory, Masonic Education, Board of Grand Trustees, Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund, Applications for Reinstatements, George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, Nebraska Work, Finance, Appropriations, Grand Lodge Offices, Lodge Advisory, Public Relations and Youth Committee, ***"
 - (b) Section 1-329 Shall be enacted to provide as follows: "1-320. The Youth Committee shall initiate specific plans and programs for the support, encouragement and stimulation of DeMolay, Job's Daughters, and Rainbow for Girls Organzations."

- 2. Due to the substantial increase in the cost of operation of motor vehicles, the By-Laws of Grand Lodge should be amended to provide for an increase in mileage allowance from 10¢ to 12¢ per mile.
- 3. Our Grand Lodge is far behind many of the other jurisdictions insofar as published communications to Lodges and members is concerned. This failure of communication makes it extremely difficult to conduct the administrative functions of the Grand Lodge and to stimulate Masonic Programs throughout the State.

Therefore, I recommend that an initial appropriation in the amount of \$2,500.00 be adopted as a priority item for the ensuing year.

- 4. The Grand Lodge should actively support the campaign for additional funds for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, through our companion committee. The Memorial is truly a proper and effective "show case" of Masonic principle, standards and history.
- 5. I recommend a greater degree of participation in the Hospital Visitation Program of the Masonic Services Association, by the appointment of a representative in the Omaha area, and an appropriation be designated sufficient to achieve the same.
- 6. I specifically endorse and submit for approval the following proposed recommendation of the Deputy Grand Master:
 - "I recommend that the Stockholders and the Board of Trustees of The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children amend the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws of said corporation to admit to the Home only children whose parent or grandparent is, or was if deceased, a member in good standing in either a subordinate Masonic Lodge in Nebraska or a subordinate chapter of The Order of Eastern Star in Nebraska."
- 7. I recommend the continuance of the Official Visitation Program and the other administrative programs, heretofore submitted in detail in this address.

CONCLUSION

I can think of no more fitting way than to close my remarks with an expression of appreciation:

Your Grand Custodian has been extremely busy this past year with Central Schools at Neligh, Hastings, Stromsburg, Seward, Aurora, Wilber, Fairbury, Wymore, Beatrice, Nelson, Superior, Plattsmouth, Nebraska City, Springfield, Weeping Water, Cozad, Ogallala Benkelman, Cambridge, Arapahoe, Tekamah, Schuyler, Ainsworth, Loup City, Ord, Valley, Randolph, Tecumseh, Humboldt, Auburn, Falls City, Walthill, Mullen, Gordon, Minatare, Sidney Lincoln and Omaha. The ritual in Nebraska remains at an all time high.

LODGE CERTIFICATION

Sorry to report a loss of eight lodges over last year making a total of 130 certified lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction. Bancroft Lodge No. 145 is back after an absence of four years. A record such as this has never before been researched therefore, I would request all lodges to check their own listing and report any errors to the Grand Custodian.

WALTER MILLER, EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF DEMOLAY.

Brother Herb, on behalf of the International Supreme Council of Order of DeMolay, our Grand Master, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to place about your neck, the collar and the jewel attached, and as an active member of the International Supreme Council of DeMolay, present to you my hearty congratulations and wish for you many years to wear this collar for the continuance of your tremendous support for the young men of DeMolay.

M.'.W.'. HERBERT A. RONIN, PAST GRAND MASTER:

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, my brethren and guests and my dear friend Brother Walter Miller: First I want to say that I deeply appreciate and treasure this award of the International Supreme Council of DeMolay, and I want to pledge to you, Brother Walt, my very best in being worthy of this award, May I also say, that it is particularly gratifying and pleasing to me to have Walt Miller present this collar jewel of this new office to me. I know most of you here are quite well aware that Walt Miller has been a dynamic executive officer of DeMolav here in Nebraska. And I am also certain that many of you do not realize that he has been an active member of the International Council Order of DeMolay for a goodly number of years. As a matter of fact, his leadership in DeMolay goes back to the time when he was still living in Chicago, in the days of Dad Land, the founder of DeMolay was actively the head of DeMolay and the Grand Master.

Nebraska owes a great deal to our Executive Officer Walt Miller and so for these reasons, Walt, plus the fact of my high esteem that I personally hold you, I treasure this presentation and I thank you again for doing it.

FRIDAY, JUNE 14 — AFTERNOON SESSION

At 2:30 p.m. the Grand Lodge was called from refreshment to labor.

REPORT OF THE BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

W. Byron C. Jenkins, 325, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted:

On behalf of the Bi-Centennial Committee I have the honor to present the following report. During the Committee's meeting our discussions have covered a wide range of subjects. This report however does not include all topics and possibilities, but is an outline of the specific recommendations that we consider to be urgent at this time.

First of all we should recognize that we are not necessarily celebrating a given date, or even a given year in planning 1976 celebrations, even though some may choose to do so. We are celebrating 200 years of development in a part of the North American continent, and the part Masons played in this development during the entire 200 years. The date 1776 has been selected as a starting point as the Declaration of Independence was signed in that year.

It is, of course, impossible for this committee or any other to come up with a complete plan of celebration to be strictly followed by all Lodges and to fit the needs and abilities of all Lodges. It is the purpose of your local Lodge committee to adapt the outline to fit the needs of your Lodge. To assist you with this planning we expect, in the coming year to prepare materials for distribution to all Lodges and at next years Grand Lodge session there will be a Bi-Centennial kit for the use of all Senior Wardens in preparing for the year of 1976 when by the Grace of God they will be serving as Master of their respective Lodges. For the purpose of carrying out the preparation and distribution of these materials we have requested that the Committee on Appropriations include \$1,000.00 in the Budget for our use.

The committee has requested the incoming Grand Master to appoint two more members to the committee for the purpose of organizing a speakers bureau. If your Lodge has no one in its ranks or no contacts to find a speaker for a public meeting of celebration, the bureau will attempt to fill your void.

Your committee further recommends that:

- An announcement be made at public installation of Lodge Officers in January 1976 to the effect that the year of 1976 will be celebrated as the Bi-Centennial year by the Lodge.
- The clean up fix up campaign be pushed especially in the year 1975, so that all Temples are presentable for the Bi-Centennial year.

- 3. A special dues card be made available to commemorate the Bi-Centennial year.
- 4. Flag poles be erected where space is available, or some method of attaching a support for a flag be made to the outside of all Temples.
- 5. The Flag be flown every day especially during the Bi-Centennial year.
- 6. The Grand Lodge purchase six, 13 star flags to be used at all Grand Lodge functions during the Bi-Centennial year.
- 7. Books on Masonry be bought by the individual Lodges for donation to public libraries and to public school libraries.
- 8. Your Lodge form and conduct trips to places of Masonic interest in the State.
- A search be made of your storage rooms to ascertain if any items of Masonic historic interest can be found to put on display in your Lodge.
- 10. Table Lodges be extensively used for celebration in 1976.
- 11. All Lodges meet at one time and date on call of the Grand Master for a special program with all Masons in the State carrying on the same program at the same time.
- 12. All Lodges have at least one open public meeting in celebration in the year 1976.
- 13. A special time be set aside during Grand Lodge June 1976 for a celebration.
- 14. All appendant bodies be invited to join with us in the year 1976 in celebration of the Bi-Centennial.

I would like to close this report with the words of John Adams speaking of the Declaration of Independence in July 1776 and I quote, "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows and games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations from one end of this continent to the other this day forward forevermore."

REPORT OF THE

SUSTAINING MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

W. Alfred B. Saum, 46, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

Early this Grand Lodge year the Sustaining Membership Committee mailed a letter to the secretary of each subordinate lodge stating that the purpose of this committee is to assist the subordinate lodges in preventing suspensions, encouraging reinstatements, encouraging good men to become associated with our Fraternity, without solicitation, and contacting graduating members of the Order of DeMolay and acquainting them with the purposes and goals of our institution and made the following suggestions:

Each lodge should have a Sustaining Membership Committee to assist the Secretary in contacting Brethren with reference to paying their dues and preventing suspensions.

All sojourning Masons should be invited to attend all lodge meetings and social functions and also invited to affiliate with the local lodge. In case a Brother, for sentimental reasons, desires to retain his membership in his home lodge, it should be suggested that he become a dual member of the local lodge, thereby giving him a voice in the affairs of the lodge. Guest nights have also proven very successful, as non-masons and their ladies are invited to a dinner, after which a talk on Masonry is given or a film shown.

The secretary or a member of the Sustaining Membership Committee, should get in touch with each suspended member and inform him how he can reinstate and that he can reinstate at any time within three years by paying the unpaid dues.

Reports from lodge secretaries and members of the Lodge Visitation Committee indicate increased lodge activity with reference to new petitions, increased degree work and attendance and more interest and activity in a number of lodges.

This committee recommends that the committee be continued in future years.

REPORT OF THE

MASONIC-EASTERN STAR STUDENT FUND

M. W. Elmer E. Magee, 227, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, and brethren: I think I should say, the Masonic-Eastern Student Fund is a Student Committee, it is one which jointly with the Eastern Star, supervises those who have graduated from High School from the Masonic Home, and have gone to some type of higher learning. Now after saying that, I want to tell you that there are none, either girls or boys, who are under the supervision of this Committee. All that have been under their supervision have either graduated or passed through their training. There is no person, girl or boy, who is eligible for going on to college or technical school this year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON YOUTH

M. W. John H. Brown, 1, Chairman, presented the report which was accepted.

Thank you, M.'.W.'. Grand Master. The intent and purpose of this Committee, as on several occasions today, has been rather thoroughly explained. I think you are all aware of the fact that our Grand Lodge is back of these Youth Organizations with the Committe which was originated less than a year ago and which is formerly planned to .work with the Youth Groups in conjunction with Grand Lodge. Allen Robertson, said to you this noon, that it was very important to have

strong advisors. I want to just take a moment to say something about the Advisors. There are in many areas of the State, Advisors working, putting many hours with DeMolay. Sometines these good brethren, these good Masons are criticized for not attending lodge more than they do, or maybe they are so tied up with work with DeMolay and trying to look after their family matters, that they don't get to lodge. Masonic people, or any one else for that matter, make donations to the DeMolay Foundation. Any contribution that you make to the DeMolay Foundation, is tax deductible and we have had evidence thus far that there are a number of brethren very willing to help DeMolay on this basis. I close this with just a note of appreciation to M. W. Brother Joe Tye and congratulations on his receiving the Fifty year pin. Brother Joe has been a stalwart in DeMolay in Nebraska, and I hope he will continue. Thank you, M. W. Sir. I move the adoption of the report. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE

COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES

W. Clarence M. Pierson, 19, Chairman, presented the report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Grievances reports that an investigation was made into the merits of the Petition for Restoration of a former member of Lancaster Lodge No. 54, A.F.& A.M., Lincoln, Nebraska, and recommends that the Petition be granted and that he be restored to good standing as a Mason.

Your Committee finds from its investigation that this former member was expelled from membership on February 5, 1958; that he petitioned for restoration in Lancaster Lodge No. 54, A.F.& A.M., Lincoln, Nebraska, on July 6, 1973; that the investigating committee voted favorably for restoration and his Petition was granted and your Committee offers the following Resolution and moves its adoption:

"BE IT RESOLVED that the petition of a former member of Lancaster Lodge No. 54, A.F.& A.M., Lincoln, Nebraska, for restoration be granted and that he be restored to good standing as a Mason."

Your Committee on Grievances reports that it has examined the report of the Trial Commission of Mid-West Lodge No. 317, A.F.& A.M., Hastings, Nebraska, relating to a complaint filed against one of its members and the finding of the Trial Commission relating to the penalty and recommends that the finding of the Trial Commission be affirmed and offers the following Resolution and moves its adoption:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC

NATIONAL MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION

M. W. Charles F. Adams, 68, presented the report of the Committee which was adopted and the recommendation approved:

I come before you not only as Chairman of this Committee but also as the First Vice President of the Association. I am pleased to report that the 64th Annual Meeting of the Association was held in the Memorial Building at Alexandria, Virginia, on Monday, February 18, 1974. In attendance from Nebraska, in addition to your Chairman, were M.'.W.'. Frank J. Mattoon, Grand Master, R. W. Donald R. Swanson, Deputy Grand Master, M. W. Norris W. Lallman, Grand Secretary, M. W. Herbert A. Ronin, Past Grand Master, and M. W. Louis V. Slyvester, Past Grand Master.

In our report to you last year we were able to tell you of the final completion of the Memorial Building and of the tentative plans to increase the Endowment Fund to a total of \$5 million. This would require an additional \$1.5 million to be added to the \$3.5 million now in the fund. With a \$5 million Fund, the Memorial should be self-sustaining and would thus eliminate the necessity of having annual contributions from the several Grand Lodges in the United States. For example, most Grand Lodges, including Nebraska, are charging each Entered Apprentice Mason the sum of \$1.00 and this, in turn, is forwarded to the Association for inclusion in the Maintenance Fund. This year we have six hundred new Masons in Nebraska and hence we will contribute \$600.00 to the Maintenance Fund.

The Endowment Fund is another matter. Our President, M.W. Raymond C. Ellis, Past Grand Master of New York, has worked out the details of a plan by which the \$1.5 million needed can be added to the Endowment Fund by the support and co-operation of the several Grand Lodges. This will be done by securing Life Memberships from individual Masons and Masonic organizations of \$100.00 each and by securing Sustaining Memberships from individual Masons and Masonic organizations of \$1,000.00 each.

Nebraska has 1.08% of the Masonic population in the United States. Our quota, so to speak, is 108 Life Memberships of \$100.00 each and eleven Sustaining Memberships of \$1,000.00 each. It has been many years since our Grand Lodge, out of Grand Lodge Funds, has contributed anything to the Memorial. In order to properly discharge our obligation, as Nebraska Masons, to this great Memorial, erected and maintained to commemorate our Nation's greatest Mason of all times, Brother George Washinton, your Committee recommends an appropriation, for this year only, of \$1,000.00 with which to purchase one Sustaining Membership in the Memorial Association. The name of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska will be permanently inscribed on a bronze plaque which will be installed in the Memorial Building which will show the names of all Sustaining Members.

In closing this report, may I say that the Jurisprudence Committee has indicated its approval of the recommendation set forth herein and that I have personally conferred with the members of the Appropriations Committee and have been assured by them that this item will be included in next year's budget if this report and this recommendation is adopted and approved by this Grand Lodge.

If any Brother, for himself or for his Lodge or other Masonic body, wishes to become a Life Member or a Sustaining Member, please communicate with Grand Secretary Lallman or with me.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL DEAD

W. Gail Axen, 235, Chairman, presented the report.

"In the name of God, we pause to pay tribute and honor to our Brethren who have passed into their eternal rest. Their contributions should remind and help us to fit ourselves as living stones, for that House not make with hands eternal in the Heavens."

Our Grand Secretary has received memorial cards recording the death of Brethren from other Grand Jurisdictions during the past year, and we find that during that time, forty-one Past Grand Masters, one Grand Junior Warden, one Grand Secretary, one Grand Orator, and one Grand Assistant Lecturer.

The Jurisdiction of the District of Columbia reports the death of one Past Grand Master.

Reports from the Jurisdiction of Canada show that three Past Grand Masters passed away.

The Grand Lodge of Cuba has notified our Grand Secretary of the death of one Past Grand Master.

The National Grand Lodge of Iceland reports the death of one Grand Master.

The Grand Lodge of Costa Rica reports the passing of one Grand Master.

Reports received, tell of the death of Henry Wilson Coil, Sr., author of Coil's Masonic Encyclopedia.

In our own Jurisdiction of Nebraska, we find recorded the names of 959 Brethren, who have passed from our Lodges to their eternal abode, over which the Supreme Master of the universe presides. To these Brethren, we owe the highest degree of gratitude for their service to their Lodges and their Masonic brothers.

Our Grand Secretary received notice of the death of John Franklin Heywood, the oldest living Mason in Nebraska, 100 years and twentyone days, and holder of the Jordan Gold Medal of Masonry.

It is with profound sorrow that our own Grand Lodge records the deaths of Ralph I. Berry, Deputy Grand Custodian, Emeritus; and Clarence G. McNamee, Deputy Grand Custodian, Emeritus.

The Masonic records of these W. . Brothers are as follows:

W.: Ralph I. Berry was born June 3, 1903 and passed away April 5, 1974 at Lincoln.

W.: Clarence G. McNamee was born in Norfolk, Nebraska October 24, 1897 and passed away December 25, 1973 at Norfolk, Nebraska.

To all these Brethren we owe the highest degree of gratitude for their service to their Lodges and to their Masonic brothers. May we thank God for the privilege to have known and worked with these beloved Brethren. Our prayerful sympathy is extended to families and friends.

We, the members of your Committee, close this report with the request to the M. W. Grand Master, that he ask the Grand Lodge to stand in honor to our departed Brothers.

We ask as we continue with our Report that we be mindful of all of our brothers who are not able to be present this day, who are residing in Rest Homes, in the Plattsmouth Home and throughout the Masonic World, that we forget them not in our prayers and that we consider ourselves very fortunate and give thanks to God each day. Thus, to all of these brethren our brothers, we owe the highest degree of gratitude for their services to their lodges and to ourselves. We thank God for the privilege of having known and worked with these beloved brethren. Our prayful sympathy is extended to their family and to their friends. Now, we the members of your Committee, M. W. Grand Master, close this report with the request you would again ask the Grand Lodge to stand in honor of our departed brethren. and in the absence of our music this afternoon, which we had planned, on behalf of your Committee, thanking our Grand Chaplain and our Grand Musician Ed. Lockwood, may we all stand by your privilege and join in the first verse of a hymn "Blest Be The Tie That Binds". May we be mindful, Brethren, of the words we are saying as we in memorial of those who have gone before us.

M.'.W.'. FRANK J. MATTOON, GRAND MASTER:

At this time we will discuss the proposed amendments to the By-Laws and the Constitution that we will vote on. M. W. Grand Secretary will you read the amendments?

RESOLUTION NO. 1--BE IT RESOLVED: that section 1-407--Allocation of Funds, be amended to read as follows: The per capita tax of \$5.00 shall be divided as follows:

The Nebraska Masonic Home..... \$2.00 To the General Fund....... 3.00

The initiation fee of \$10.00 and all affiliation fees shall be allocated to the General Fund.

This resolution would increase the per capita to the General Fund by \$1.00. Resolution No. 1 did not receive the necessary two-thirds vote and was defeated.

RESOLUTION NO. 2--BE IT RESOLVED: That Article II Members be amended to read: The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior War-

den, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Tyler, Deputy Grand Custodians with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Master and Wardens or their proxies, duly constituted, of the chartered lodges under its jurisdiction; and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of a subordinate Lodge. (This change would include the Deputy Grand Custodians as members of Grand Lodge).

Resolution No. 2 (Constitutional amendment) did not receive a majority vote and was defeated.

REPORT OF BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 1974

M. W. John F. Futcher, 302, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted:

The Board of Grand Trustees submits this report of its activities. For the first time in two years your Board of Grand Trustees is at full strength. In September of last year our Most Worshipful Grand Master completed our membership by adding Brother George T. Harris, a Professor of Economics at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, to our group.

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS OF THE GRAND LODGE

In analyzing the operations of the Grand Lodge it is interesting to note how consistent the total revenues and total expenses were this last year when compared with the year ended April 30, 1973, notwithstanding the increase in costs of all goods and services. Income for the use of the General Fund of the Grand Lodge amounted to \$148,218. 00 with expenses of operation of \$135,964.00. Last year the income was \$142,008.00 and the expense \$135,397.00. The only material increase in income arose from investment income and initiation fees. Investment income was \$54,683.00 compared to \$48,379.00 in 1973. Initiation fees were \$1200.00 larger at \$6,000.00. Due to the increase in investment income and initiation fees and the holding of the line in expenses there was a surplus of income over expenses, of \$12,000.00.

The Assets of the General Fund of the Grand Lodge in 1974 remained about the same as in 1973 at \$1,035,310.00. There were no purchases of long term investments (as there was no cash accumulation or maturities.)

The Retirement Fund of the Grand Lodge had revenue as follows: (Total 44,000.00) Contributions \$26,048.00 (Grand Lodge \$4,057.00 Home \$21,991.00) and Investment Income of \$18,050.00. Benefits paid amounted to \$5,512.00. This left an Asset Value in the Fund of \$287,427.00 all of which is invested in long term securities. Last year's Retirement Fund Balance was \$248,904.00. An increase of \$38,523 for 1974 over 1973. (This Fund is accumulated to pay future liablities arising out of payment of retirement benefits).

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

Turning now to the revenues, expenditures, transfers and changes in Fund Equity of the Home for the year ended April 30, 1974. We have two Funds in the Home accounts. The operating fund which we call the General Fund out of which all expenses of operation are paid and the Endowment and Bequest Fund into which all gifts, bequests of securities and property are put.

Revenues to the General Fund totaled \$331,869.00 comprising per capita tax (\$77,721), Cash from members (\$194,532), donations to this fund (\$16,904) and receipts from Seal Program (\$42,712).

Total expenditures of the General Fund amounted to \$448,014.00 consisting of operating expenses (\$432,266), Seal program expense (\$14,848) and a special item of furniture expense (\$900). The expenses exceeding the revenues by \$116,145.00 monies were transferred from the Endowment and Bequest Fund from time to time in the amount of \$149,500.00 to defray expenses and to have some capital on hand.

Revenues to the Endowment and Bequest Fund amounted to \$318,594.00, Comprising investment income (\$236,194), gain from the sale of investments (\$3,597) and Endowments and Bequests received (\$78,803). Expenses of this Fund were \$326.00. Bequests received in 1974 were the smallest received since 1969.

There is more Investment activity in the Endowment Fund because there is greater income and a larger number of items of investment. This last year the Board of Grand Trustees have confined all its purchases to fixed income securities. Except for some short term purchases, all investments were in the range of $8\frac{1}{4}$ to $9\frac{1}{2}\%$ return. All purchases were of the highest rated securities.

The Assets of the Endowment and Bequest Fund consist of cash, bonds, stocks and a few mortgages. We had hoped that the book value of the assets would reach the four million mark this year. It did close at \$3,987,897.00.

Probably more important, we can report that there are no bonds in default as to payment of principal or interest, and all stocks are regularly paying dividends. Our mortgage loans which are all made to lodges are current as to principal and interest payments.

During the year your Board of Grand Trustees conformed to the requirement set out in the law for it to perform. It met for the required number of meetings and reviewed the investment portfolio in all funds. During these meetings it directed the purchase of some \$550,000.00 principal amount of long term investments and the sale of \$250,000.00 of securities held in various funds. It administered the retirement fund and provided service to employees of the Home concerning their right and privileges under the plan. All members of the Board are hopeful that their service has been satisfactory to the Grand Lodge and the Grand Lodge Officers.

In view of certain suggestions we have received concerning the Retirement Plan, we would suggest to the in-coming Grand Master that a committee be appointed to review the operation of the plan, and to consider the possibility of the benefits becoming vested after a specified number of years employment.

This report being prepared from the penciled report of the CPA we request authority to attach to this report the usual figures from the final audit when it is received.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

W. George W. Rosenlof, Grand Historian, gave the report, which was adopted:

At this, the one hundred and seventeenth Annual Communication, we are met once again not only to recount the past achievements of this Grand Body but to be reminded of the still unfinished business remaining on our trestleboard and to concern ourselves with those new circumstances and challenges that must be met in justification of the terms and ideals for which our Fraternity was founded and established.

It was just seventeen years ago that we celebrated our Centennial, and what a glorious event that was. Who can ever forget those days of reassurance—those days of renewed strength and determination to carry on when lagging spirits, if there were any, were rejuvenated and once more made strong.

At the time of our founding, there were just three charter lodges: Nebraska Lodge No. 184, Illinois; Gidding Lodge No. 156, Missouri; and Capitol Lodge No. 101, Iowa. These were located respectively in Bellevue, Nebraska City, and Omaha. We should remind ourselves that Nebraska was but a Territory and not to become a sovereign state until 12 years later. It was only a few months later that the number of chartered lodges had increased to six, with two in Omaha together with four lodges in Nebraska City, Brownville, Dakota City, and Plattsmouth.

It is not our purpose to once more write a complete history of Masonry in Nebraska. That was done in 1962. We have since then completed a number of independent historical accounts and several annual reports of a more or less historical nature. The Grand Historian's report for this communication is largely confined to the Proceedings of This Nebraska Grand Lodge in 1874, just one hundred years ago. The Grand Lodge held in that year met in Omaha on June 24th to 26th. Sitting in the East was the Most Worshipful Grand Master Martin Dunham, the eighth in succession and the third Grand Master of Capitol Lodge No. 3. It is recorded that he was best remembered for his wisdom, his faithfulness, and his dedication to the duties and responsibilities of his high office.

In his Annual Address as the Grand Master, he noted that peace and harmony had prevailed throughout the jurisdiction of Nebraska. He called upon the brethren assembled that they should, first of all, offer heartfelt thanks to the Supreme Architect of the Universe for the blessings bestowed upon the Fraternity, permitting it to assemble under such "auspicious circumstances" and further praying that the "light of His countenance" might continue to shine upon them all, and that all that was to be accomplished would merit His approbation.

Present at the Communication were the official representatives of all but two of the almost 50 existing lodges. The Grand Secretary stated in his official reports that the total membership of Master Masons had increased to 2,268, and that the total number of new initiates was then 286. The number passed was 258 and that, all told, the number raised to the sublime degree of Master Masons during the year was 542. On the other hand, 17 had passed into chapter of the eternal, and some 217 members had been lost for other reasons.

The nine newly chartered lodges were:

1. Rob Morris Lodge No. 46, Kearney

2. Salem Lodge No. 47, Salem

3. Fairmont Lodge No. 48, Fairmont

4. Evening Star Lodge No. 49, Sutton

5. Hastings Lodge No. 50, Hastings

6. Fidelity Lodge No. 51, David City

7. Hiram Lodge No. 52, Arlington

8. Charity Lodge No. 53, Red Cloud

9. Lancaster Lodge No. 54, Lincoln

It should be noted that Rob Morris Lodge No. 46 was originally located at Gibbon, as Gibbon Lodge No. 46, some 12 miles from Kearney. Because of the extension of railway facilities, Gibbon was not able to make the hoped-for growth and progress. By a unanimous vote, Gibbon Lodge requested permission to remove its furniture and place of meeting to Kearney in 1875. Two years later the members made a further request that the name of the lodge be changed to its present name of "Rob Morris Lodge No. 46".

A second item of interest relating to the formation of new lodges was the approval of a request to create a lodge under dispensation at Salem. This was approved on February 21, 1873. The dispensation was extended in 1874, and finally approved to receive its charter on June 26, 1874 as Salem Lodge No. 47. Your Grand Historian, feeling it inappropriate to make any comment on Salem Lodge No. 47, will simply say that seventeen years later, in June, 1891, a speical commission was appointed by the Most Worshipful Grand Master Bradner Slaughter to proceed in accordance with the constitution and by-laws to examine all charges filed and determine guilt or innocence of the accused. This commission did, in September, 1891, make known its decision that the accused was guilty of unmasonic conduct. In 1892 the charter of that lodge, No. 47, was cancelled and the accused sitting master was expelled.

The Most Worshipful Grand Master also announced that he had granted dispensations to open lodges at Norfolk, York, Syracuse, and Arlington.

During this year of 1974, eight of the nine chartered lodges named above will be having their centennial celebrations. This is the largest number of centennial anniversaries held in any one year prior to 1974. Congratulations and best wishes for continued growth and prosperity are extended.

Nearing the conclusion of the Annual Communication in 1873, a resolution was presented by the Grand Junior Warden, Alfred G. Hastings, the portent of which called for the appointment of a special committee consisting of the Grand Master-elect, together with Past-Grand Masters Wheeler, Furnas, Deuel, and Hill, to "take into consideration the propriety of organizing a Masonic Life Association for this Grand Jurisdiction, and that the said special committee be required to report a constitution, by-laws, and such other forms and blanks as are necessary for the operation of such an association, and to report its findings and recommendations at the next Annual Communication in 1874".

Past Grand Master Wheeler, speaking for this special committee, did on June 25, 1874, make a report stating that this committee had, after due consideration, made a careful study of the proposal and respectfully recommended the organization of such a "Life Association". Furthermore, the committee had examined a number of existing plans, each of which had some features worthy of note. Action taken by the Grand Lodge was that final recommendations be considered at the Annual Communication in June 1875, Brother George H. Thummel, Grand Junior Warden at that time, reported for the special committee that it had adopted a "code of laws" and had duly and legally incorporated the proposed "Life Association" as required by Nebraska law and had elected a "board of directors", and had prepared a "form of application" to be submitted by any brother wishing to apply for insurance. This report was concurred in and approved by the Grand Lodge. Beyond this, there has not appeared any evidence that the organization was actually completed and made operative.

At the request of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, the Grand Historian has prepared a somewhat abbreviated historical account of the Grand Lodge, bearing upon the relations it bore to the founding and continuing participation and support of the Grand Lodge to the Grand Chapter Order of Eastern Star. That appendent body is this year celebrating its One Hundredth Anniversary and will, among other things, publish the materials we prepared.

Recently there appeared in the Nebraska State Journal an interesting account of the early activities of the Order of Eastern Star, more especially the organization of Electa Chapter in Lincoln, and also of Vesta Chapter in Omaha, both established in 1874. It is known that our Past Grand Master Robert W. Furnas was the first Worthy Patron of Electa Chapter, Order of Eastern Star. As is well known to all Master Masons, Robert W. Furnas was not only the fourth Most Worshipful Grand Master of Nebraska Masons, but also from 1873 to 1875 was the Governor of the State of Nebraska. He has affectionately been known as the "Father of Nebraska" and also as "Father of the Orphans Educational Fund". For more than a quarter of a century, he safeguarded this sacred fund entrusted to him and which every Master Mason knows was the forerunner of the Nebraska Orphans Home at Fremont, sponsored by both the Order of Eastern Star and the Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

We should take just pride in having had a part in founding the Order of Eastern Star in Nebraska and giving it continuing financial assistance, and also in supporting in so many ways its accomplishments for the orphan children and youth of our Jurisdiction.

We rejoice with the Order of Eastern Star in the celebration of their Centennial in this Year of our Lord, 1974. No one can fully appreciate, nor even know, how much good has been accomplished in these one hundred years of its existence.

It is not possible to conclude this Annual Report of the Grand Historian without making some reference to the contributions that were made by the Masonic Fraternity in Nebraska in the one hundred and seventeen years of its existence. It has ever been concerned with one of its basic responsibilities of preserving our free and democratic form of government.

In 1919 our Most Worshipful Grand Master, speaking of the future of Nebraska Masonry, spoke these words:

"Masonry is a progressive institution and should keep pace with the progress of the world, meeting conditions as they arise, adequately adapting ourselves to the changed and ever changing conditions of the world."

One year later, in 1920, Grand Master John J. Tooley concluded his annual address in these words:

"The outlook for Masonry as a force in civic and social affairs was perhaps never more inviting than at the present time. Indeed, the application of Masonic principle is sorely needed in the everyday walks of life. This demand must be recognized. The day has gone by when men of affairs in any society will be satisfied to rest upon the laurels of past achievements."

If these words were spoken today, they would have been no less pertinent. We are still confronting these same basic and primary challenges. Brotherly love, relief, and truth are as demanding upon us as they have been in the ages that have passed. Faith, hope and charity are as transcendent to us in 1974 as they were in the days of Christ. Masonry today has its lessons yet to be taught and yet to be learned. We are its votaries and we dare not evade the issues nor avoid the tasks that are before us. Very recently we were reminded that we dare not forget that in the long history of mankind, "every great nation which has risen to power has eventually declined." This has been true from the time of the Stone Age till now—from the civilizations of the Egyptians, the Phoenicians, the Babylonians, Assyrians, Persians, Greeks, Romans, and Turks, to the more recent days; Spain and Portugal in the Western Hemisphere; the Netherlands in the Far East; France in Indo-China. Threateningly in our own generation, we are witnessing what some may call the decline in power of the British Empire-a nation on which, as someone has said, "the sun never set".

In our own beloved land we are witnessing the loss of moral and spiritual power—the very assets for which masonry has valiantly stood and fought for two hundred years. As was recently said by the noted economist, Herbert Prochnow, and quoted from "The Freeman"

"Confronted today with the challenge of major world problems, we must remain strong, we must hold fast in our minds and hearts to those great ideals and eternal values upon which our freedom and even survival may ultimately rest."

Yield then to the clarion call of Masonic Brotherhood. Stand fast to its ideals.

I conclude this report with sincere gratitude to you, Most Worshipful Grand Master Mattoon, for permitting me to serve you and all the Brethren as Grand Historian. I am grateful for all the kindnesses shown me in so many ways by so many of my Brethren during recent months. Thank you so very much. I regret not having been able to do all that I had hoped to achieve during this past year of service.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REINSTATEMENTS

M. W. Norris W. Lallman, Grand Secretary, presented the report of the Committee on Reinstatements which was adopted.

The Committee on Reinstatements has been busy indeed this year.

We acted on a total of 29 applications. We are very grateful for this activity.

In filling out your applications be particular to include all information as this is very necessary and also saves the returning of the application for more information.

Thanks for your wonderful support and cooperation.

It is hoped by the Committee that no Brother in the State of Nebraska will remain unnecessarily suspended.

At 5:00 p.m. Grand Lodge was called from labor to refreshment.

GRAND ORATION

Friday Evening, June 14, 1974—Grand Lodge Banquet

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, M.'.W.'. Past Grand Masters, Grand Lodge Officers, wherever you are, Distinguished Guests, my brethren, beautiful ladies and to the few brethren who will listen to my remarks until the end, which I will always remember as really grand brethren.

Thank you, M.'.W.'. Sir, for those kind remarks that you made in your introduction. I was just sure you were going to say, that our next speaker of the evening is a man who needs all the introduction he can get. Really, that is a tough act to follow. You will have to remember there were two of them and there is only one of me. My, this is really a big crowd. They may not look that big to you down there, but from up here, it looks mighty big.

I was very appreciative of the remarks of my colleague and the learned counsel of M.'.W.'. Joe Tye this afternoon, that he made on the floor of the lodge when he said so many nice things about me and urged you all to attend this dinner this evening. I understand we have a little over 750 people here this evening and also that we would have had quite a few more, but after Joe made his announcement as to who was going to speak this evening, there was a rush at the registration desk, as I understand it, some 150 tickets were turned in and money refunded before the Grand Tyler could stop it.

I would like to make a couple of announcements. If I mention anyone by name, if I say anything about them, I want you all to know that anything I say is said with brotherly love and affection, believe me. First announcement. I was real pleased to hear this afternoon that one of my life time friends was just appointed to the office of Grand Junior Deacon. He was announced as Warren D. Lichty, Jr. I have known him all my life as "Duke". The announcement is, "Duke", the light up there is pretty poorly, you're sitting under that spot light, would you move over just a little bit."

I really can't help remember that when I was first contacted by M.'.W.'. Frank, who is a long time friend since law college, when he inquired if I would be interested in the obligation and responsibility to the office of Grand Orator. I asked him what the job entailed. His reply, was that it would be a wonderful experience, that I would meet some really fine people, would probably have one oration or two to give and, of course, the oration at the Grand Lodge. Well, I am here at Grand Lodge and I think probably the reason you have all stayed, you are just here to see whether or not your Grand Orator falls off this stage up here. There is no question that this has been a memorable experience this past year from the time that M.'.W.'. Brother Harry Spencer introduced me at the installation as "Bevin", until this banquet this evening.

You fine people that I have met, and you have opened your hearts to me, have been most kind beyond my expectations, from the Grand Lodge Officers to the wonderful Masons and wives all over the state. As we not only had a dedication and a couple of corner stones that Frank spoke of, but as it turned out we traveled the state of Nebraska from corner to corner, for two lodge dedications and six corner stones, and the experiences we have had I will always remember, Frank.

I recall as I arrived in Neligh, Nebraska for my first time as Orator, I can tell you I was highly nervous and I truly felt that I was standing in the northeast corner of the lodge. As I approached R. W. Brother Leo Stines, I asked him what time it was, and he looked at his watch and he answered, "it was 12:00." My, I thought it was much more than that. He said, "no". He says if you will look at my watch right here, it always gets up to twelve and starts all over again. Needless, to say this gave me the confidence that I needed to proceed and I gave my first oration that evening. I would like to explain that I generally have three speeches, the first one is the one I have read now, the second one is the one you actually hear and the third is what I wished I had said after it was all over with.

I can tell you that that evening I had written my speech out because it was the first one and I was real pleased that Past Grand Orator, W... Brother Jack H. Hendrix was not present that evening, since I remembered the time when I had written my speech out instead of using notes, and I asked the good Judge, "what did you think of it?" He pondered for a moment and said, "I only have three criticisms to make. First you read it, second you read it poorly, third it wasn't worth reading."

Yes, as a freshmen member of the Grand Lodge team, I have really enjoyed my experiences this year. Like the time in Stanton, Nebraska, and I was riding with W. Brother Ralph Gerry, Grand Custodian, chief of the work and I happen to notice the wall of a building that contained a considerable amount of graffiti. You know what graffiti is, that is the printing and scribbling of words and sayings on fences, walls and buildings, and I really thought everyone knew what graffiti was, so I turned to Ralph and said, "I hate graffiti." He said, "me too, but then of course I hate all Italian food."

I promise tonight not to make the same mistake that I made some time back after a short dinner speech when I said, "Now if I have talked too long, it is because I don't have my watch with me tonight and there is no clock in this hall." Where upon Grand Marshal, W. Brother Harold

Wurdeman arose in a stately manner, as he always does, and said quite loud enough for everyone to hear, "if you will turn around, you will notice there is a calendar up on the back of the wall."

Now, I suppose speeches are an occupational hazard with lawyers, preachers, graduation orators, Past Grand Masters, and there have been a few occasions where I have been accused of giving long speeches and I had considerable trouble trying to figure out what to say tonight. For the past six months, I have been going around and I went to R. W. Brother Donald R. Swanson for sage, counsel and advice, and I kept saying to him, "what shall I speak about?" Yesterday, he met me at noon, I don't know why we always made it noon at 12:00, and he said, "my mind is now clear, why don't you speak about 12 minutes." Well, I have just shared some of the moments that I have had during the past year. Now I would like to share with you some of the thoughts that I have had during this, particularly during the six corner stone laying ceremonies that we participated in this past year.

Some of you have already heard some of the things that I will say tonight, and if it sounds to you that I am repeating myself, I ask that you bear with me for if it is a repetition of my thoughts already expressed, it is only because of my sincere belief in what I said before.

I really have become particularly fond of the corner stone laying ceremony, as a Mason, a student of history and a lawyer. The language of this ceremony has a deep meaning to me even after the ceremony has been completed.

In the beginning, the Grand Master says, from time immemorial, it has been the custom of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons to lay, when requested, to do so with their Ancient form, the corner stone of buildings erected for the Worship of God, for Educational or Charitable objects or for the purposes of the administration of justice and free government and no other buildings. This corner stone, therefore, we may lay in accordance with our law and gladly do so, testifying thereby our obedience to the law and our desire to show publicly our respect for the Government under which we live.

Like a bell, the words "time immemorial, building erected for the Worship of God, Educational, Charitable objects and for the purposes of the administration of Justice and Free Government, as well as testifying thereby our obedience to the law and our desire to show publicly our respect for the Government under which we live", keep ringing in my head and mind throughout the entire ceremony. The words, "time immemorial" immediately trigger my thought to the Masonic Fraternity. The Masonic Fraternity stands before the world today, not merely as the marvel monument of antiquity, older and larger and wider spread than any other human institution, but having maintained for so many centuries, the essentials of its primary organization. It has, indeed outlived the circumstances which gave it birth. The necessities which called it into being has long ago ceased to exist. Originally, a company of builders whose monuments of rare skill now adorn almost every part of the old world, the hand of time has brought its operative labors to a close. But the everlasting principles upon which it was founded, are as intact today as when the corner stone was brought forth from the rubbish and raised to its Masonic position.

Since it was founded, dynasties have come and gone, nations have been born and buried, and countless orders and societies have been organized and gone the way of all the earth. Our Order has maintained its ancient organization. Teaching its lessons of love, peace on earth, good will to men, and today is greater and stronger than it ever was before. Then the words "worship of God" educational and charitable objects come into my thoughts, and reminds me that it is true, our Fraternity has no more Cathedrals or monuments to build, but is has a noble work to do, the administration of justice and free government and the bell rings again. I am wondering what, and remembering that we are laying a corner stone, gladly testifying our obedience to the law and our desires to the public to show our respect for the government under which we live, and I have a deep feeling that ever since the days of Hiram, King of Tyre, did the Masonic Fraternity have a nobler mission to perform than it has in this day and age. For today, there seems to be a cloud of distrust which is spreading across our country and it has been said that because of the many tragic things that have occurred in our country today; that it would appear that the American people have lost confidence in most of our established traditions and institutions: that there is at this time in the history of our country, a lack of confidence in the church, our fellowman, the business community and our government. If this is true and this situation does exist, then there is an extreme and urgent need for all of us to do everything that we possibly can to help restore this confidence. What better way can we, as Masons, help to restore this confidence, then by re-dedicating ourselves to the principles of Masonry. To recall the obligations that we bound ourselves while kneeling at the Altar, and remembering the responsibilities that we all owe to God, to our country, to our neighbor and to ourselves which are never to be forgotten. And what better way can we as Masons, help to better restore this confidence than by being living examples each day. For what is a Mason and a member of this great Fraternity, and what does he believe.

Briefly, I recall, that no man has to be a Mason because he believes in God and to eternal life, but no one can be a Mason unless he does.

Every man who lives by principle is not necessarily a Mason, but no man can become one unless he exhibits some evidence of living by standards. He must be accepted by the quality of his life and it is something for which he strives. Masons measure life by the symbolic application of the Square and Compass and the Holy Bible. Masons employ the plum, trowel and the level in their appraisals, for they do not guess, they try to measure and measure up. They, of course, are human and subject to failure, but they hold the standards and strive for excellence. There is no question that the Brotherhood and the quality for which Masons strive, are based on order and personal character. Masons do not count in disloyalty or rebellion, and are charged with the duty of being quiet and peaceful citizens, true to their government and justice to the country. All Masons believe that our duty to our neighbor, is to act upon the square and do it unto him as we would wish he would do unto us. Yes, I am proud that I am a Mason, and as I listen to the corner stone ceremony, I said to myself, as I say to all now, be proud that you are a Mason, and for the short period of time that you have the opportunity to be a Mason, work as best you can and in the service to God, your country, your neighbor and your community, so that they may be proud of you.

If there is this lack of confidence in the church, our fellowman, the business community and our government, perhaps we, as active Masons can do something to help restore it.

So this evening, let's all re-dedicate ourselves to the principles of Masonry and on this very evening, make a new covenant in our hearts, that we will truthfully and fearlessly discharge them. And with our renewed dedication, I am confident that Masonry will continue to be one of the significant cornerstones of our Society.

I thank you for your kindness, you have been a lovely audience and may I say to all of you, have a good day.

At 8:30 a.m. the Grand Lodge was called from refreshment to labor.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GRAND LODGE OFFICES

M.'.W.'. Merle M. Hale, Past Grand Master, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted:

The Grand Lodge Offices Committee is pleased to report that the responsibilities of the Grand Lodge offices have been capably discharged during the past year by our Grand Secretary and his efficient staff. We were deeply saddened in April by the sudden passing of our Bookkeeper, W. Brother George B. Pribyl. He was devoted to his work and very efficient. His place will be difficult to fill.

Our Committee recommends that the mileage rate authorized for automobile travel of Grand Lodge Officers and Committee members on Grand Lodge business be increased from 10ϕ to 12ϕ per mile. This will not include Committee meetings held in conjunction with the Grand Lodge sessions.

We have recommended to the Appropriations Committee that the salary of the Grand Secretary be increased from \$11,340.00 to \$12,000.00 per year. This is less than \$100.00 per year more than a 5% increase. We have also asked that the sum of \$20,000.00 be allowed for Grand Lodge Office Staff salaries. This is approximately \$200.00 more than a 5% increase and will permit us to make a merit increase for one employee which we believe is warranted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

M. W. Louis V. Sylvester, 281, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

Your Committee on Work is pleased to advise that all matters pertaining to the Grand Custodian's office have been expeditiously handled during the year and the Work goes forward in its usual high degree of proficiency, both esoterically and ritualistically. For this we continue to be indebted to the Grand Custodian and the Deputies for their intense devotion and faithfulness.

The report of your Grand Custodian has been submitted to Committee and reflects the large increase of Central Schools of instruction, over the record of a year ago. This has been accomplished by the continued good health of our Grand Custodian following his severe period of illness more than two years ago. Of the 38 districts assigned to the Deputies, difficulty is experienced in only two where the Grand Custodian has been unable to secure the services of a Deputy. Several qualified brethren are under consideration for these districts at present, and it is hoped that these areas will soon be covered. In the meantime, the Grand Custodian has been personally conducting the work in these districts, successfully keeping the work by the lodges at a high level of proficiency.

All vouchers and expense items of the Grand Custodian were submitted to and approved by the Committee on Work. Again we are pleased to advise that in spite of the increase in mileage granted by Grand Lodge a year ago, the Custodian's office operated well within its budgeted appropriation, and, in fact, ended the year with a modest unexpended balance. The Committee has examined the proposed budget of the Grand Custodian and we approve his request in the amount of \$8,600.00, exclusive of the Grand Custodian's salary. This is the same amount requested and appropriated last year. In view of the continued inflationery spiral, the Grand Custodian is to be complimented for his efforts to maintain the regular schedule of his office, and that of the Deputies, without increased cost.

At the request of the Grand Custodian, the Committee was pleased to recommend to the Grand Master the appointment of Worshipful Brother, Mannie O. Hansen, as Deputy for District 35 to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Worshipful Brother, Walter Brown, occasioned by his health. Subsequently, the Committee approved the recommendation of Brother Brown and Worshipful Brother Glen Binder to be commissioned Deputy Custodians Emeritus. Brother Binder was forced to resign after twelve years of faithful service, because of the pressure of personal business.

A few matters relating to the Floor work in the degrees were brought to the attention of the Committee by the Grand Custodian. These were of such a minor nature, so isolated, and insignificant, that the Committee ruled the Grand Custodian should use his own best judgement when the questions might be raised in a school.

The Grand Custodian was again examined as to his proficiency, both in the esoteric and floor work, and your committee is happy to advise that he retains an extremely high degree of proficiency in these matters. In addition, as is required, all Deputy Custodians were examined during the annual Custodians School in September, held in Grand Island. Two members of your Committee were present at this school and personally witnessed the proficient manner in which all work was done by these dedicated individuals.

Another rewarding year is passed and the Committee again calls the attention of the Grand Lodge to the hard work contributed by our Grand Custodian and his Deputies, and humbly acknowledges our gratitude for their dedication and devotion.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RETURNS

W. James R. Kimmel, 3, presented the report which was adopted:

Your Committee has examined the Annual Returns of subordinate Lodges for the year 1973 and find that in general, these reports are, with but few exceptions, satisfactorily prepared by Lodge Secretaries.

These Annual Reports are due to reach the Grand Secretary's Office on or before February 10th. The Committee finds that several Lodges were late in filing their Annual Returns and two Lodges to date had not yet filed their 1973 reports and are subject to penalty.

Annual Returns requires imprint of Lodge Seal of which 32 Lodges were not in compliance.

These Reports should be personally signed by the Master and Secretary for the year provided on the returns and contain names of all Lodge Officers for that year.

Name and date of presentation of Bronze Jordan Medal Member should be shown on each year's report. 16 Lodges omitted the name of their distinguished Member.

Returns should be complete in every detail with both copies mailed to avoid unnecessary correspondence. The Committee suggests that Lodge Secretaries make continued use of the monthly progress report, keeping it up to date to avoid errors in Membership Accounting.

We wish to highly commend the Grand Secretary and his efficient staff for the excellent manner in which these records are maintained and the courteous co-operation extended the committee while checking these annual returns.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MASONIC RELIEF

W. Paul L. Toombs, 290, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted:

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Your Relief Committee has had a year with some new features as compared to former years with just financial expenditures.

Our total expenditures for our regular annuitants and special assistance was \$1,600.00 and at a membership figure at end of the year of 38,088 this apportions out to \$.042 per member. We have lost one of our regular annuitants due to her entrance into the Plattsmouth home. This year we have rendered advice and counsel to a friend of an Arizona lodge and two of our own Nebraska lodges. We helped with financial assistance in one of the above cases. This gives us a feeling that we are really doing something else besides spending money when we can help out in cases of need.

If any of the constituent lodges are desirous of communicating with the committee on any case, we are most happy to be of assistance. No doubt each lodge is already handling their own problems very ably. We would like to make the suggestion that when Relief problems arise in the case of a brother who is also a Veteran of the Armed Forces, our Nebraska Veteran's Aid Committee helps in immediate case of need. This should be explored in each case.

REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

My Brethren:

On behalf of the Officers and Trustees of your Home, I am pleased to give you our report at this Communication.

As to our residents, the number fluctuates. As this is being written, there are just under eighty. This is about average.

With an average age above eighty, nursing care is still a first requirement. Our staff is skilled in this sort of care and distinguish themselves in its application.

Good food, plenty of it in a balanced diet, round out the loving care our residents have always received.

We have always stressed the fact that these two ingredients, mixed with understanding love not only will aid in extending life but most importantly, add zest to it.

Here are some figures you might find interesting:

I don't know how much credit we can take for these figures but we think we are on the right road.

As the years have gone by, better medical care has been indicated. This includes dental care as well. Much more is being done in the dental department since we have equipped our own dental room given us by thoughtful friends. I have reported to you before on this. We are just ready to receive some additional equipment as a further gift. Good dental hygiene is not restricted to the young and we are proving it.

We lost this year Brother George B. Pribyl. Perhaps many of you didn't know George. He was a quiet man. He handled our accounting in the Grand Lodge office. He was faithful and valuable. He is missed very much.

There is always a new challenge to your Trustees. Building maintenance, applications of admission, budget matters and a great number of other items are disposed of as they appear.

In our annual report we touched on the "Energy Crisis." There were daily contradictions at first. It leveled off and as you know, fuel during the winter was one problem. We came through it and now have a reserve fuel tank which our gas supplier urged we get. It is there, ready for next winter.

Our contract for electricity has been increased as we expected. The cost is greater and it is an interruptible contract so the new larger oil tank may get good use next winter.

This year we have been remembered in wills and bequests. It is a little bit unnerving to be notified your Home has been remembered in the Will of someone who has passed away and find, as we often do, that this was not a person of great wealth or importance but rather just a loving Brother like you and me who quietly, without notice, had his Will so drawn.

You wish so very much that you could say "thank you" for a gift that helps insure this Home continuing to eventual total endowment. We can only show our appreciation by forever conserving these gifts. It is never spent. The income can be used in operating the Home but not the principal. This Endowment Fund continues to grow.

I can give you no encouragement as to the cost of operating your Home. Everything we use or consume is escalating in cost. I see no end to it. When we send you Seals or tell you in the Home News that we always need funds, you had better believe it. It is a condition not of our doing nor can we control it. You know this. It is happening in your own life as well.

If you want to keep your Home fulfilling the purpose it has been doing all these years, you must realize it needs your support. This is not requested, it is expected.

The Seal Fund is doing well. This year it will average just about what it did last year.

Last year, in Grand Lodge, you will recall the Home was presented the keys to a new "Sunshine Buggy" by the Mobile Nobles of Tangier Shrine Temple. The Buggy was yet to be delivered.

Your Home News carried an item of the actual delivery of this beautiful wagon on September 30, 1973. This buggy has been in use ever since and daily. Some residents of the Home who had never left the building since they came there, have been out in it. It is specially equipped for wheel chairs with a special lift so they need never leave their chair. We again express our appreciation for this very functional piece of equipment.

For many people, Thanksgiving brings thoughts of pumpkins and turkey. It is different with your Home. It means that W: Bob Boon of Grand Island and his group as well as W: J.C. Peterson of Scottsbluff and his group ride again. Ride again they all did this Thanksgiving with those big semis loaded to the roof with food.

Every resident in the Home knows days ahead and when they arrive, everybody has a big visit and a good time. This means that Brother Masons

all over those areas have helped make this annual trip possible. With food costs as they are, this becomes a wonderful contribution indeed. We thank them all. They really fix up Thanksgiving.

We've finished Christmas. As always, the Masters and Wardens all over the state have seen to it that each resident had presents. There was candy and a real big fat Santa Claus.

We express our appreciation to the Omaha Masters and Wardens for putting this together and through them, all their Brother Masters and Wardens for making such a wonderful Christmas for our residents.

Many other gifts came at this time from other kind friends to round out the happiness of our residents. It was a great Christmas and the warm glow of it still remains.

We owe so much to so many. Space will not permit but a brief mention of friends to whom we owe so much. The Lodges, Chapters, Councils, Commanderies, Masters and Wardens, Order of the Eastern Star Chapters, The Youth Groups, to name a few. Thank you all.

We are indebted to Sister Irene Berry, Worth Grand Matron and Brother Charles A. Kurtz, Worthy Grand Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star for their generous support this year.

Our Grand Master, M.W.: Brother Frank J. Mattoon has had a steady helping hand all year. We are most grateful for his valuable help.

Our Superintendent Raymond F. Evers, is known to all of you. Sometimes I wonder if he ever stops working. Cheerful, helpful, ready for any job that needs doing.

Our Secretary, M.W.: Brother Norris W. Lallman, spends hours every day for the Home. Unpaid by us, he works because of his love for our Home. Furthermore, he knows his job.

Then, my Brother Trustees on whose behalf this report is made. You, my dear Brethren of this Grand Lodge, are indeed fortunate that such men as these faithfully serve you and our Home. I cherish their friendship and the opportunity to sit with them.

Finally, to those of you in the afternoon of life. If you seek peace and happiness and the preservation of your dignity in this troubled world, there are no absolutes.

There is however, your Home, dedicated over all these years to the very things you seek. Look it over. It may be better than you think.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PRESIDENT MASONIC-EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

W. Ralph R. Carleton, 306-1, presented the report in the absence of the President. The report was adopted.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, distinquished guests and most of all, to all of you brethren who make it all possible, I bring you the greetings of the Board of Trustees, the Superintendent and his staff, and greetings from those wonderful children, who, through no fault of their own, make it possible for all of us to do something worthwhile in life.

If this report were to contain nothing more than the message that all is well with the children at the Home, it would be sufficient and complete within itself, and, such is the case. All of our children are healthy, happy and active and those of us who directly participate in the operation of the Home are very proud. Let's take a brief look at what has been going on at the Home during the past year.

Many of the boys continue to show an interest in DeMolay and several are presently serving as officers. 4-H work plays a very prominent part in the Home life, and some of the children participated at the Dodge County and Fremont County Fairs. Some of the boys are active in Little League Ball, and athletic activities at the high school. One young lad has compiled an outstanding athletic record. Scott Swift has a wrestling record of 13 wins, 1 loss and 1 tie. Scott is also a starting offensive lineman on the Jr. High football team. Seven boys are presently engaged in various part-time activities and Lennie Nelson has earned enough money to pay for a trip to Europe this summer so that he can go along with the other members of his German Club.

Scholastic awards for the boys went to Bryan Holstrom, Tom Nolan and Scott Swift. The Scholastic awards for girls went to Karla Neils, Carol Minard and Viki Buci. Viki Buci, in addition to being scholastically inclined, is quite an athlete. On May 9, she won a gold medal in the quarter mile at the District Girls' Track Meet held at Burke High School in Omaha, Nebraska.

The Citizenship awards went to George Buci, Carol Minard, Ronald Nelson and Lee Ann Kilpatrick.

I could go on and on about the activities of the children and their accomplishments, but I think the foregoing should very clearly point up the fact that the operation of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children is a success. The emphasis at the Home is on family life, and those who are charged with the day-to-day operation of the Home are to be commended for their efforts. The Superintendent, Fred Mulford, the Assistant Superintendent, Ford Delp, and all of the housemothers and assistant housemothers are responsible for the success. While it's true, these people are salaried employees, they render services far out of proportion to the remuneration they receive. I extend my personal appreciation and congratulations to Fred, Ford and all of the housemothers and assistant housemothers for their superlative efforts.

The matter of maintaining the property at the home is a neverending quest. During the last year, the trim on all of the buildings was painted, repairs to the plumbing and some of the roof areas became necessary and major repairs and renovations were made in the Assistant Superintendent's home. As it is in your own home, it becomes necessary to occasionally replace items like vaccuum cleaner, refrigerators, dishwashers, rugs and other items of household furnishings. Much remains to be done. The driveways and parking areas need to be hard surfaced, the drainage sewers are presenting serious problems and the tennis courts are in need of resurfacing and painting. Many other items require attention; however, they are far too numerous to mention. Not all is bad, however. The beautiful sign, which was the project of Past Grand Matron, Mary Ann Watchorn and Past Grand Patron, Olen A. Brake, has been completed with the exception of lighting and landscaping. At the recent Grand Chapter Session of the Order of the Eastern Star, Past Grand Matron, Irene Berry and Past Grand Patron, Charles Kurtz, presented the Home with the sum of \$4.557.96 for the purpose of hardsurfacing the driveways and parking areas, other concrete repair work as needed and for repairs and decorations in the Administration Building.

The financial situation at the Home continues to show progress. The responsibility of handling the investment portfolio is entrusted to a Finance Committee, and believe me, that committee, along with all of the other committees, has done an outstanding job. Speaking of finances, it comes to my mind that there is a considerable amount of misunderstanding about the financial situation of the Home. Any member of either Grand Body who has questions about the Home's finances, should not hesitate to ask questions. There are no secrets, nor is there any mystery about the financial operation of the Home. In this regard, let's take quick glance at the over-all financial picture for the next fiscal year. The estimated cost of operating the Home will be approximately \$131,170.00. The income to defray the cost of operations is derived from payments by parents and guardians, memorials, contributions and donations, bequests, interest and dividends from the endowment fund, and an annual contribution in an equal amount from the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter. During the last fiscal year, the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter each contributed the sum of \$24,030.00; thus, the per capita expense to each member of each Grand Body was approximately 65¢. Remember that figure....65¢ per member.

There are many people and many organizations who contribute in one form or another to the Home. There are all sorts of contributions in the form of time, money and effort and each contribution, in whatever form or in whatever amount is appreciated. The lack of time and the risk of overlooking someone or some group prevents me from extending the Home's appreciation on an individual basis; however, I am compelled to extend special thanks to the members of the Order of the Eastern Star and to the many Masons who have made contributions and to the members of the Shrine who have provided the children with a Christmas Party, permitted them to attend the annual picnic at Peony Park in Omaha, and made it possible for them to attend the annual Shrine Football game in Lincoln. The public school officials in Fremont have extended many courtesies and many of the students at Midland College have volunteered tutoring services. The list of thank you's is endless, so I'll end by once again thanking Past Grand Matron, Irene Berry, and Past Grand Patron, Charles Kurtz, for the monies from their project and for their regular appearances at the meetings of the Board of Trustees. Also, I commend Brother Harold Hultman and particularly Brother Donald R. Swanson for their assistance and cooperation.

During the last year, there were changes in personnel on the Board of Trustees. The services of Robert Metcalf, Lillie Smith and Frances Bullis will deeply be missed. The three new members are Dorothy Shaw, Corinne Nevins and Elmer Sells. It seems only fitting that I should mention that Lil Smith served on the Board for many years, and that Frances Bullis furnished the Board with dedicated service and was an inspiration for all for over 20 years. There must be something genuinely worthwhile involved to inspire people to serve for such a long period of time.

I personally thank the Board of Trustees for allowing me to serve as President during the past year and I am grateful to each and every member of the Board for the help and support they've given me. Each Board meeting has been an experience within itself, and I assure you, no one can question the dedication and sincerity of the Trustees.

During the time I've served on the Board of Trustees and as the Home's President, one fact has been clearly brought home to me. There are far too many members within both of our Grand Bodies, but particularly within the Grand Lodge, who are unaware of the existence of the Home, and who have little or no knowledge of how the Home operates. Also, it's been brought to my attention recently that there are some members who take exception to the Home's continued existence. It would be improper for me to use this Report to advocate my personal beliefs in this regard; however, I cannot in good conscience, fail to comment that all Eastern Star members and all Masons should be proud of the great humanitarian success that has been achieved through the operation of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children. The 65¢ contribution made by each Mason and each member of the Order of the Eastern Star entitles them to look with pride to the Home in Fremont, and to share in the experience that the beautiful lessons of morality and charity that we are taught are exemplified through this joint endeavor of the two Grand Bodies. It's quite a bargain for a 65¢ investment, and as I write this report. I can't help but think of something that happened at the Home during the last year. In the early part of 1973, the Board of Trustees received advice that it would receive title to a farm in Wayne County, consisting of approximately 100 acres. The gift to the Home came through a Testamentary Trust made by a resident in West Point, Nebraska, Harry Grunke. The value of the farm is in excess of \$50,000.00, and to date, the Home has received income from the operation of the farm in excess of \$16,000.00. The unique, but extremely gratifying part of the foregoing story is that Mr. Grunke was not a Mason nor a member of the Eastern Star. He must. however, have had faith in the operation of the Home, and in the future of our children

REPORT OF THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

M. W. Herbert A. Ronin, 210, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted:

M. W. Grand Master and Brethren:

The Masonic Service Association once again serviced the Grand Masters' Conference held in Washington, D.C. during the week of February 22, 1973. The Annual Meeting of the M.S.A. was also held at this time which was attended by the Grand Masters of the 44 Grand Lodges who are members. Our Grand Master, M. W. Frank J. Mattoon, our Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Donald R. Swanson, M. W. Norris W. Lallman, and M. W. Louis Sylvester and myself were also in attendance.

Digests, Short Talk Bulletins and reports were distributed by the M.S.A. to those designated by our member Grand Lodge Jurisdictions. Plans are being perfected for observance of the Bi-Centennial of the birth of our nation. The meeting of the Conference will be held in Philadelphia in the year 1976 with special programs appropriate to the occasion.

The Masonic Service Hospital Visitation Program continues to expand and to be one of the finest demonstrations of Masonry in action! We now have trained Masonic Field Agents in the two-thirds of the Veteran's Administration Hospitals in 33 of our states. The number of hospitalized veterans since the Vietnam War continues to grow each year. Nebraska joined the Masonic Service Association for educational purposes but has not participated in the Hospital Visitation Service which requires additional expense. Our Field Agents are usually Masons who are retired from their usual vocations and enjoy this benevolent work even though their compensation is limited.

Our Grand Master served on the Hospital Visitation Committee of the M.S.A. and received first-hand information of this activity and expressed his hope that it might be implemented in Nebraska at the Veterans' Hospital in Omaha as a pilot project. I am gratified that he has made this a recommendation in his Report to this Grand Lodge. Our neighboring jurisdiction of Wyoming, North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas enthusiastically maintain Hospital Visitation programs.

Our Deputy Grand Master, R.'.W.'. Donald R. Swanson, is familiar with and is in favor of this recommendation of our Grand Master. The Masonic Service Association will train the Field Agent at no expense to us, except transportation and lodging expenses incurred during his training at a hospital which would probably be at Des Moines. I have also assured our Grand Master that the Scottish Rite would pay for half the entire expense of this activity for the next year. This would be a Grand Lodge activity, the selection and control of the Field Agent would be under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge and the M.S.A.

I recommend appropriation of \$1,000.00 for Veterans' Hospital service in Nebraska, which sum can only be expended under the express approval of our Grand Master. In the event of the adoption of this report, I would be delighted to hear from any Master Mason who would be interested in becoming a Field Agent for the Veterans' Hospital at Omaha.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

W. Bernard T. Pipher, 31, Chairman presented the report.

Your Committee on Codification of the Law submits its report and recommends amendments to the By-Laws of this Grand Lodge as follows:

That paragraph two of Sec. 1-301 of the By-Laws be amended to

read as follows and that otherwise said section not be changed: Sec. 1-301 -- ENUMERATION AND CLASSIFICATION. -- (paragraph two amended only)

The Standing Committees shall be the following: Jurisprudence, Fraternal Relations, Fraternal Dead, Masonic Relief, Temple Building Advisory, Masonic Education, Board of Grand Trustees, Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund, Applications for Reinstatement, George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, Nebraska Work, Finance, Appropriations, Grand Lodge Offices, Lodge Advisory, Public Relations and Youth. Except as otherwise provided by these By-laws, all Standing Committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members and shall be appointed by the Grand Master within ten days after his installation.

That the original paragraph two of said Sec. 1-301 and all subsequent amendments thereto be repealed.

Moved and seconded that this section of the report be adopted. Carried by unanimous vote.

That Section 1-327 of the By-laws be enacted to provide as follows: Sec. 1-327 --YOUTH -- The Committee on Youth shall initiate specific plans and programs for the support, encouragement and stimulation of the Order of De Molay, International Order of Job's Daughters and Order of Rainbow for Girls. I therefore, move the adoption of this portion of the report.

M.'.W.'. FRANK J. MATTOON, GRAND MASTER

You have heard the motion, is there a second? All in favor, signify by the usual sign of a Mason when voting, down hands, opposed same sign. Carried.

W. BERNARD T. PIPHER

Your Committee also recommends that the approved decision of the Grand Master, which are not repetitive of existing annotations, should be placed in the code as annotations to the pertinent sections.

We move the adoption of this report as a whole. Motion carried.

M. W. CHARLES F. ADAMS, PAST GRAND MASTER

THE ROLL OF ASSISTANT CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren, these together with the Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

Note: From 1880 until 1910, there were no recorded appointments of brethren to serve as assistants to the Grand Custodian. In 1910 Brother Robert E. French did hold special meetings to examine and instruct brethren who were willing to become "assistants" in the work. Thirteen brethren were nominated and approved for appointment as assistants. After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians". In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians". The following brethren appeared in the records as "assistant custodians" or at times as "Deputy Custodians."

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A. L.) "In the year of light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A. L.) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. Dep.) "In the year of the deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A∴O∴) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A. Beo.) "In the year of the blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. M.) "In the year of the world."

RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons — Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1974 and 4,000-5974.

Royal Arch Masons — Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1974 and 530-2499.

Royal and Select Masters — Add 1,000 years to current year, thus: 1973 and 1,000-2974.

Knights Templar — From the Chrisitan era take 1,118; thus 1,118 from 1974 — 851.

Order of High Priesthood — To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1974-3880.

Scottish Rite – Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1974 and 3,760 – 5729.
