#### MASONIC RECORD





#### ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

I shall try to set forth such matters as may need actions or approval of this Grand Lodge along with such happenings or events which I consider to be of more than usual interest and importance.

#### NECROLOGY

In the past year we were saddened by the summons of two of our Most Worshipful Brethren who were called to their Eternal Home; M. . W. . Brother William Ballou Wanner in June 1975 and M. . W. . Brother Herbert T. White in October 1975. Both brothers served Masonry in many stations over the years and their devotion shall long be remembered.

We also were saddened by the loss of two of our Deputy Grand Custodians, W.'. Ward L. McGlashan of Benkelman and W.'. Ernest E. James, Emeriti of Omaha. W.'. Brother James was responsible for passing me in my original proficiency some 12 years ago. The patience and understanding of these dedicated brethren is tremendous.

In all, 944 of our brethren were called this past year to their Eternal Rest. A full report will be given by the Committee on Fraternal Dead later with full acknowledgement of tributes due to their memories.

#### **CORNER STONES**

On August 30, 1975, the Grand Lodge laid the cornerstone and dedicated the new Masonic Temple of Mizpah, Lodge No. 302 at Omaha. We are grateful to W. George S. Holman and for the years ahead.

On May 8, 1976, the cornerstone and dedication ceremonies were held at DeWitt Lodge No. 111 where a new temple was also honored. W.'. M.'. Max Waldo presided and the accomplishment of the brethren of DeWitt Lodge no. 111 should be most gratifying. W.'. Bevin B. Bump gave the cornerstone address and V.'.W.'. Brother J. Dallas Gibson the dedication address. Both orations were well received, the day was beautiful and this new temple is a joy to behold.

On May 15, 1976, the Grand Lodge Officers laid a cornerstone on the Carles Geil Elementary School in Gering. This school honored Charles Geil, a brother of Scottsbluff Lodge No. 201, who is 96 years old and had served on the Board of Education for 45 years. It is so nice to honor a dedicated brother, not only for his faithfullness to his lodge over the years, but for his other achievements. Scottsbluff Lodge No. 201 at Gering is to be commended for the fine work they are doing and have done over the years.

A special thanks are in order to our Grand Marshal Harold C. Wurdeman for the very effective handling of all arrangements for these ceremonies. He certainly has everything in order and we do appreciate his loyalty in a job well done.

#### CONSOLIDATIONS

During the year, two consolidations of Lodges occurred.
On June 18, 1975, I approved the consolidation of Beemer Lodge No.
253 of Beemer with Wisner Lodge No. 114 of Wisner, and on February
20, 1976, I approved consolidation of Signet Lodge No. 193, at Leigh
with Northern Light Lodge No. 41 at Stanton.

#### **BY-LAWS APPROVED**

During the year I approved amendments to the By-Laws of 54 Lodges. Many of them were By-Law changes necessitated by the increase in Grand Lodge dues for 1976 form \$2.00 to \$3.00.

#### REINSTATEMENTS

Thirty-six applications for reinstatements were approved during the year.

#### TRIAL COMMISSIONS

During the year I appointed three trial commissions. A member of Grand Island Lodge No. 318 in Grand Island, was found guilty as charged and expelled.

A member of Wahoo Lodge No. 59 was found guilty as charged and expelled.

The Trial Commission appointed for a member of Wahoo Lodge No. 59 has not completed its findings as of May 24, 1976, and the final report has not been received. I expect to report fully at the time of the 119th Communication.

I dissolved a Trial Commission appointed by M.'.W.'. Brother Don Swanson to hear testimony against a member of Oasis Lodge No. 271 at Morrill, since action taken at the 118th Annual Communication, charges no longer applied.

#### GRAND REPRESENTATIVES RECOMMENDED

I recommend the following to be Grand Representatives of other Grand Jurisdictions: W.'. Eugene Sibley, California; W.'. Donald Meinershagen, Belgium; W.'. Richard Scheef, Costa Rica; W.'. William Steen, Greece; W.'. Glen Sperry, Kansas; W.'. Wade Shepherd, Massachusetts; W.'. Kenneth Parke, New Hampshire; W.'. Sidney L. Bliton, Scotland; W.'. Robert L. Little, Utah; W.'. Edgar Bredermeier, South Australia; W.'. Henry Schemmel, West Australia. Commissions have been received and granted as received. Likewise, those Grand Representatives to be commissioned have been approved as recommendations received.

#### **DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS**

Following the recommendations of our Committee on Work and the specific recommendation on our Grand Custodian W. Ralph W. Gerry, I appointed four new Deputy Grand Custodians; W. Don L. McCoy of Co-

vert Lodge No. 11 in Omaha, W.'. Ralph E. McNulty of Meridan No. 188 of Cozad, W.'. Alfred V. Peltzer of Crystal Lodge No. 191 of Scotia and W.'. Everett K. Dappen of Robert W. Furnas Lodge No. 265 of Scottsbluff.

Two Deputy Grand Custodians resigned their commissions this past year and we are most grateful for their services over the years in our behalf; W... Wayne O. Thompson of Scottsbluff No. 201 and W... Paul Jacobsen of Merna No. 171.

#### **DISPENSATIONS**

Some twenty-six special dispensations were granted during the past year. These ranged from permission to confer degrees without regard to time, examine in proficiency, elect and install, move charters temporarily, move charters permanently etc...Permission for floats in parades were denied on three occasions. Permission to change regular meeting dates without a bylaw change were also denied.

#### **DECISIONS**

- 1. Masonic Temple Craft of North Platte wanted authority to sell their building, Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 is a renter for their lodge facilities. I ruled this was not for us to say as to what they might wish to do.
- 2. Victory Lodge No. 310 in Valley asked permission for their renter, a grocery store, to allow the renter to seek an off-sale beer license. The permission was granted.
- 3. Ashlar Lodge No. 33 in Grand Island sought permission for Robert W. Boon, General Chairman, to solicit neighboring lodges for the Food Truck for the Nebraska Masonic Home. It was granted.
- 4. A member of Relief Lodge No. 219 was issued a cease and desist order on soliciting a circular letter without the Grand Master's permission.
- 5. Fremont Lodge No. 15 asked for a dispensation to do courtesy work on a petition of Faith Lodge No. 181 on a brother who presently owns a bar. Since he did not own the same at the time of balloting on his petition, I ruled he should be allowed to receive his degrees and granted the dispensation.
- 6. In a controversy arising from the morning of a charter of Crusade Chapter Order of DeMolay from Bee Hive Lodge No. 184 to Miloma Lodge No. 328 I ordered equipment of the chapter be delivered to Grand Lodge office on or before January 30, 1976.
- 7. Permission granted to Walter Miller Executive Secretary Order of De-Molay to send circular letter to all lodge brothers for funds for the De-Molay Foundation.
- 8. Conrad Hahn, Executive Secretary of Masonic Service Association sought permission for funds for relief of Guatemala earthquake disaster. Since we do not recognize the Grand Lodge of Guatemala, this was referred to the Committee on Fraternal Relations.
- 9. Siloam Lodge No. 147 in Stuart asked permission for other groups to use their facilities. I ruled that this was up to them, but they must not interrupt any lodge activities and the group and/or groups must abide by their by-laws and also those of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.
- 10. On three seperate requests, permission was asked to have a float in a parade while all were denied. A suggestion was made in each case to have a display window of interesting memorobilia, properly labeled and attractively done, set up in a location on main street.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. I submit for approval the following recommendation of the Grand Lodge Office Committee: that Sec. 1-105 Mileage and Per Diem be amended to read, "12 cents per mile for each mile traveled going to Grand Lodge, to be estimated by the most direct route and ten dollars per day for each day's attendance."
- 2. At the present time our Grand Lodge Law has a provision referred to as perpetual jurisdiction over a petitioner. I would like to recommend that we amend this provision by limiting this jurisdiction to a period of two years, and that it be referred to the Committee on Codification of the Law with a proper resolution to be presented to this Annual Communication for a vote thereon.

#### BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

The Work of this committee has been most gratifying. We have more flags flying in front of our Masonic Temples in Nebraska than ever before (a large percentage 24 hours a day). I must commend the individual Masters who have recognized and taken an active part in these worthwhile activities. I find that there has been better Communication within the individual lodges simply because more brothers have been activated to help in these endeavors.

#### PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

The Nebraska Masonic News was published quarterly. If your lodge wants to be represented you must get information to the Grand Secretary.

#### YOUTH COMMITTEE

This committee consisting of Wayne Pauley, Robert Bell and William Hurst are striving for further activities. I have enjoyed wonderful cooperation from many of these youth groups and their appreciation is overwhelming. Their greatest need is advisory help, how better could we serve our lodge's future.

#### MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

Our visitation program begun this last year has progressed most satisfactorily. W.'.F.'. Alan Wolcott is doing a tremendous job and I am going to refer you to his complete report to be presented later. I am pleased to announce that we are extending our efforts in this direction by inaugurating a program in Lincoln to cover the hospital area there. M.'.W.'. Herbert A. Ronin is to be commended for his help in establishing this worthwhile project and also for the support given by the Scottish Rite bodies. For your information, they are funding one half the cost of this function.

#### THE MASONIC HOMES

The status of our Nebraska Masonic Home and the Masonic Eastern Star Home for Children reports will be given by Brother William F. Patterson and W. Joe Lindquist in their detailed reports. I would like to report that The Nebraska Masonic Home was the recipient of a gift from a most gracious benefactor. It is presently being processed. It could mean that our Endowment Fund could be increased by as much as sixty-five percent. This will help tremendously toward the goal that the Board of Trustees has been working, to attempt to have the Endowment Fund, fund the expenses of the Home on a current basis. What a joy to know that we do care. May our light always shine in this our obligation to our fellow-man.

#### ANNIVERSARIES

Five individual lodges celebrated their 100th anniversaries this year. On June 24th, York Lodge No. 56 under the leadership of W.O.L. Donohoe, entertained the Grand Lodge and their guests in a fine fashion. We traveled to Syracuse on June 28th when Mt. Moriah No. 57 celebrated theirs. I remember that day as being extremely warm as I excused all brothers in the afternoon from wearing their coats. About five of us traveled to a member's home where I presented a 50-year pin to Brother Emil Dahmke who was unable to attend.

On September 11, Wahoo Lodge No. 59 had a fine Centennial program highlighted by our own M.'.W.'. Brother Ronin giving his usual inspiring talk. On September 14, we journeyed to Mosaic Lodge No. 55 where a fine banquet was served in the Holiday Inn. There were five 50-year pins presented on this occasion.

On November 6, the Grand Lodge went to Orleans where a fine Centennial celebration was held. Melrose Lodge No. 60 had two speakers that evening and a lot of fun was had by all who attended.

On June 25, the Grand Lodge was grateful for a pleasant evening at Hastings as Midwest No. 317 held a 50th anniversary. These special activities are wonderful and the hospitality is always great. May each of these lodges continue their good work.

On February 21, the Grand Lodge assembled at North Platte to aid Worshipful Master Veon Seaton and his committee in burning the mortgage on the Masonic Temple.

#### GRAND LODGE AREA MEETINGS

We held eleven area educational meetings throughout the state this past year. The Chairman M.'.W.'. Lou Sylvester did a remarkable job. I asked Grand Lodge officers to be present and each was given a particular job to do. We tried to segment the meeting into about 6-8 different areas stressing audience participation. I felt that real progress was made this year. I would hope we would have invitations next year from different lodges who would like to sponsor one of these meetings. They are fun, invigorating and gives the lodge a chance to be a part of this festivity. I can only say, "Try it... you might like it."

#### **VISITATIONS**

I was privileged to attend the Grand Lodge sessions of Iowa, Missouri and Kentucky. I came down with the flu as I was about to leave for the Grand Lodge of Kansas. R.'.W.'. T. Leo Stines, W.'. Harold C. Wurdeman and their wives attended the Grand Lodge of Idaho. W.'. Warren D. Lichty and Margaret attended the Grand Lodge of Minnesota and I have asked our Grand Orator W.'. Bevin B. Bump to represent me at the Grand Lodge of South Dakota.

I made other various visitations throughout the state some seventy five in number. I apologize for the one I missed. One out of seventy five is good for me. I went anywhere anyone asked me, subject to the date. On several occasions I had to regret as many dates sought were on the same night. The 50-year pins presentations always gave me a thrill. The youth presentations brought tears to my eyes. The eight installations in January were most gratifying. I enjoyed every visit I made and I certainly thank all for the many courtesies shown me and Virginia.

#### STATE OF THE CRAFT

I can report that the ritual work being done in the state is excellent. I can also report that the active lodges, those who are pursuing their objectives are busy. We are still losing membership, but I feel we now recognize it. We must bring out our leaders, those in our ranks who are capable to push their talents farther. There is no part or field within Masonry that cannot be extended. We have a tremendous job to do yet, if we want our children's children to celebrate the Tri-Centennial of this great country. Masonry is a privilege, yours and mine to enjoy, but with it comes the responsibility to fulfill our obligations to ourselves, our country, and to God. May we all pull in harmony those ties which are so dear in each of our hearts.

I know not how to show my appreciation for this wonderful opportunity that you have given me this past year. Cooperation with all has been most satisfying. I haven't asked anyone to do a job for me who hasn't tried. The Past Grand Masters, my own Grand Lodge Officers, the officers and brethren within the individual lodges, the youth groups, the other Masonic Bodies, each and everyone has been most helpful. I feel very confident that your Grand Lodge Officers are most capable of carrying on, and that we shall enjoy excellent leadership in the years to come. To this end, I pledge my continued support.

I must thank the individual lodges for all of their courtesies shown. From your ranks come the leaders of tomorrow. If I were to make a wish for you, each of you, it would be that you might have had the opportunity, the challenges that you have granted me. For all of these wonderful things, Virginia and I thank you.

#### CENTRAL SCHOOLS

#### LODGE CERTIFICATION

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

Your committee on Fraternal Relations respectfully reports that the Grand Lodge of Venezuela is now recognized by this Grand Lodge and that representatives are being exchanged.

This has been a quiet year as far as requests for recognition are concerned.

The Grand Lodge of Guatemala is not recognized by our Grand Lodge. They are recognized by 42 Grand Lodges in the United States and by the Grand Lodges of England and Scotland. I would recommend to this Grand Lodge that recognition be granted to the Grand Lodge of Guatemala and that representatives be exchanged.

The Committee on Information for Recognition report each year at the Grand Master's Conference. They outline prerequisites by which a Grand Jurisdiction could be judged and define those standards as follows:

- 1. Legitimacy of Origin
- 2. Exclusive territorial jurisdiction
- 3. Adherence to the Ancient Landmarks -- specifically a belief in a Supreme Being
- Volume of the sacred law as an indispensable part of the furniture of the Lodge.
- 5. Prohibition of politics and religion.

Of course, the role played by the commission is to advise the Members of the Conference that a particular Grand Jurisdiction has complied with these standards and that it has reached the point where it is eligible for recognition. It is also the duty of the Committee to consider the status of a Grand Jurisdiction which for some reason or other has lost its eligibility and now seeks to regain its former status. In either case, the role of this committee is advisory. It is then up to the particular Grand Jurisdiction to take its own independent action. Whether a Grand Jurisdiction affords recognition or not is strictly their own business.

The Grand Lodge of Cuba is still laboring under difficult circumstances, however they do hold their Grand Lodge Communication in Havana.

Language barriers hinder communication with many of the overseas Grand Lodges, by the same token they sometimes have trouble with our requests.

During the past few years many new Grand Lodges have been instituted in Brazil. Many of these are recognized by Grand Lodges in the United States. I would recommend that these requests for recognition be studied very carefully and that we follow the guidelines set forth by the Grand Masters Conference Committee on recognition.

#### W. ROBERT A. METCALF, COMMITTEE ON MASONIC-EASTERN STAR STUDENT FUND

M. W. Grand Master, the Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund respectfully reports: We received two applications from young men at the Home in Fremont to continue their education.

Edward Swanson wants to attend the University of Nebraska at Omaha where he will study psychology. He will start school in September, 1976.

Byron Holmstrom wants to attend the University of Nebraska at Lincoln. He will major in Business Administration. Because of military obligations, he will start school second semester.

Total amount needed for these two young men is \$2,200.00. The Grand Chapter, Order of Eastern Star has approved \$1,100.00 dollars of this amount.

#### M.'.W.'. HAROLD HULTMAN, GRAND MASTER

We will now hear the report of the Youth Committee.

#### W. WILLIAM HURST, MEMBER OF THE YOUTH COMMITTEE

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, Past Grand Masters, Distinguished Guests and brethren. I was most interested in hearing the statistics given this morning by our Grand Master, with regard to the break down in ages of people in Mexico. I just happened to check a few days ago and according to the 1970 census of population in Nebraska, there were almost 140,000 young people in the State of Nebraska between the ages of 5 and 9. These young people would today, for the most part, except for religious reasons and to those at the tail end of that age group, be eligible for participation in our Youth groups in this state. At the same time, there were in excess of 208,000 men between the ages of 20 and 44. Again, except for religious reasons, most of these would be eligible for participation in Masonry. It is perhaps for this reason that your Grand Lodge is interested in supporting these youth. At least year's Annual Communication, we suggested a number of ways in which the communication problem between Masonic lodges and the Youth groups might be overcome. And it has been encouraging to know that there has been quite a bit done by the individual lodges and particularly by your Grand Lodge officers. I can state on the basis of personal observation that your Grand Master and others of the Grand Lodge have been participating in various Youth activities all over the state.

The Grand Lodge has devoted time in the area of Education Committee meetings to giving the Youth not only recognition at the meals afterward, but our Brother Duke Lichty, over here, has spent time explaining just what the Youth Organizations are about.

We have heard from one particular lodge, who took the time to write us, to inform us of their involvement with the Job's Daughters Bethel meeting in their Temple and it is most encouraging, and as a side note, the Past Master who wrote us the letter informed us that while his son is now dating one of the girls in that Bethel and has recently turned 19, the boy is putting in a petition to that lodge. He doesn't know whether or not is is attributed to the Fatherly influence or the influence of the young lady, and we don't follow that up. We, have however, just scratched the surface and as your Grand Master noted in his address, the two areas where these groups need assistance is in leadership and membership. With 36,000 Master Masons in the State of Nebraska, it is inconceivable to believe that we would have less than 10,000 young people participating in these organizations with all of the daughters, grand daughters and sons, nephews, neices, and neighbors, who must be available and yet it is less than 10,000 participating in the Youth groups.

We would suggest that your leadership is needed, more than just getting your name on the line as one who is on an advisory council or guardian. You make your participation active. These young people certainly appreciate any time that can be devoted to them. In conclusion, Sir, we would recommend the following, that the Grand Lodge establish a fund of \$300.00 beginning next year to be used in a scholarship fund, which is to be divided into \$100 for each of the three Youth groups in the state, and to be presented to the outstanding youth in each group at their respective Annual meetings. The guidelines in selection of the outstanding Youth in each of the Youth groups is to be made by the group and each year presented to the Grand Lodge for approval before the scholarship is issued. It is our opinion that a project such as this by the Grand Lodge recognizing our Youth, is one more way of showing our interest in them and increasing their knowledge of Masonry.

Brother Austin, I believe you are 81 years old, and it is certainly a pleasure, on behalf of the Grand Lodge, to present this little token of appreciation to you at this time for your devoted services over the past 50 years. God Bless You, and may you live many, many more years and enjoy the fruits of Masonry.

# W. BYRON C. JENKINS, GRAND SENIOR DEACON, CHAIRMAN OF BI-CENTENNIAL

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, Past Grand Masters, Distinguished Guests and brethren all. Before I begin this report, I would just like to make note of the fact that 200 years ago today, June 11, 1776, the first Constitutional Convention was called to order.

#### REPORT OF THE BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

This is the third report of this committee to the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge. The first, in June 1974, consisted of recommendations for the Bi-Centennial celebrations. The second, in June 1975, presented plans for implementing the previous recommendations.

Now that we are in the midst of these celebrations we are at last seeing the fruits of our labor. We have not accomplished all we set out to do. Some Lodges are carrying out little or no celebration. From observation at our Grand Lodge Area Education Meetings this past year, they are the same Lodges that are having problems in other areas.

Some Lodges have really entered into the spirit of the Bi-Centennial. Our Most Worshipful Grand Master, had the privilege of installing the officers of Nemaha Valley Lodge No. 4 at Brownville. The Brother installed as Master was in full colonial dress. The members and guests at a Bi-Centennial Celebration at Bellevue Lodge No. 325 were escorted to dinner by a member in the uniform and carrying a musket of the 1st Maryland Foot Regiment of 1776.

Many Lodges used the celebration theme in decorations and remarks at installation, as well as other meetings. Pilot Lodge No. 240 held a dinner that went far beyond their expectations, with over 180 in attendance, with many Brethren and friends from surrounding towns joining them.

At our last Grand Lodge session, a luncheon was held for all Senior Wardens or their proxies. This luncheon was held for the purpose of presenting more fully our program and presenting each with a kit of materials for their use in planning their Lodge celebration for this year. Included in this kit was a questionnaire to be filled out and returned to the committee by April 1st of this year. From the questionnaires returned we find 81% of our Lodges have erected flag poles and are displaying our American Flag. We would recommend that the incoming Grand Master continue to promote this project until all of our Temples are flying the Flag.

Eighty-four percent of our Lodges have definite plans for some type of observance. Ninety-seven percent have made improvements to their Temples in the "clean-up/fix-up" campaign. Fifty-eight percent have sought participation of all appendant bodies using their Temples. Fifty-four percent have presented books on Masonry to public libraries. Seventy-one percent are displaying or planning a display of historic memorabilia, and of course all Lodges are using the commemorative dues card.

The speakers bureau, though not overworked, has provided speakers for several of our Lodges.

This evening a program will be presented as a part of our Grand Lodge Celebration of this 200th year of life in our Nation. We hope you will enjoy it and gain some further light on Masonry.

Although our work will not be finished until the end of 1976, we wish to thank you for the privilege of serving this Grand Lodge, and all Lodges in the Jurisdiction. We sincerely hope we have carried out our assignment to the satisfaction of all concerned.

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, I move the adoption of this report. Motion carried.

#### M.'.W.'. HAROLD HULTMAN, GRAND MASTER:

The hour has arrived for the election of Grand Officers and voting on the Resolutions that were proposed last year.

No. 1 BE IT RESOLVED: THAT Section 2-904 - "GROUNDS FOR DISQUALIFICATIONS" delete the following wording:

"... who is engaged in the manufacturing of intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, nor one who is engaged in the sale of such intoxicating liquors as a beverage, nor one ...".

Received the necessary two-thirds majority and was adopted.

No. 2 3-102 Masonic Offenses - Enumerated Add a new paragraph. (d) to read as follows:

The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, in a lodge building or on the property of any lodge holding a charter under this Grand Jurisdiction."

This resolution was amended by the Codification of Law Committee to read as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED - Section 3-102 MASONIC OFFENSES - ENUMERATED

Add a new paragraph (i) as follows:

The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official ceremony of any Masonic lodge or appendant body thereof, in any portion of a lodge building where Masonic activities are held.

This resolution received the two-thirds majority vote and was adopted. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

That Article X, paragraph 5 - Grand Master - be amended to read:
 To grant dispensations to confer the degrees upon candidates without
 reference to time.

This amendment would delete the words "ballot for and"

2. That the original Article X, paragraph 5 is hereby repealed.

This amendment received the necessary vote and was adopted.

 $M.^{\cdot}.W.^{\cdot}.$  John F. Futcher presented the following resolution, which was seconded by M. $^{\cdot}.W.^{\cdot}.$  Lewis R. Ricketts at the Annual Stockholders meeting of The Nebraska Masonic Home. This resolution was passed at this meeting and is now presented to the Grand Lodge for final action.

RESOLVED: That the First Paragraph of Article III of the Articles of Incorporation of the Nebraska Masonic Home be amended to read as follows:

The business of this Corporation shall be to aid, care for, and maintain needy, distressed, infirmed, unfortunate and elderly Freemasons, their wives, widows, mothers, daughters, and sisters, and female members of the Order of The Eastern Star, and for this purpose and to this end, it shall have authority. (this adds the words "infirmed, unfortunate and elderly Freemasons")

The resolution was voted on and was adopted.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION

W. Phil Lorenzen, 10, presented the report in the absence of M. W. Charles F. Adams, Chairman, which was adopted.

The 66th Annual Meeting of the Association was held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on Monday, February 16, 1976, at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. This change of the place of the meeting was made this year in order to coordinate with the activities of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America which held its meetings in Philadelphia as a part of the Bicentennial observance. The Nebraskans in attendance included M.'W.'. Harold Hultman, Grand Master, R.'W.'T. Leo Stines, Deputy Grand Master, M.'W.'. Norris W. Lallman, Grand Secretary, M.'W.'. Herbert A. Ronin, Past Grand Master, M.'W.'. Louis V. Sylvester, Past Grand Master, M.'W.'. John H. Brown, Past Grand Master, M.'W.'. Carl R. Greisen, Past Grand Master (Honorary) and your Chairman.

Because of the illness of the President of the Association, M.'.W.'. Raymond C. Ellis of New York, it became my duty, as First Vice President of the Association, to preside at the meeting, as well as at the joint meeting of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors the preceding Sunday noon and at the ceremony of placing a wreath at the George Washington statue at Freedoms Foundation on the Monday morning prior to the business meeting of the Association. This last mentioned event took place at Valley Forge, some thirty miles west of Philadelphia. Busses took the delegates from the hotel, leaving at seven a.m. The wreath was placed at the foot of the heroic size statue of our Brother George Washington kneeling at prayer in the snow that terrible winter at the military encampment at Valley Forge, I was assisted by M.'.W.'. Marvin E. Fowler, Past Grand Master of the District of Columbia and Secretary-Treasurer of the Association. I gave a short tribute to Brother Washington following which we were all guests of Freedoms Foundation for breakfast, returning to the hotel in time for the Annual Meeting which was opened at nine a.m.

Under the leadership of M. W. Brother Ellis, President of the Association, the Endowment Fund continues to grow and it is the hope of the officers and directors of the Association that it will soon be of sufficient size to provide the necessary income for the maintenance and operation of the Memorial building. As I mentioned in my report last year, special emphasis is being placed on Bicentennial Contributions of \$1,000.00 or more which will entitle the contributor, whether an individual or a Masonic organization, to be listed on the bronze plaque to be installed in the Memorial building. To be thus inscribed, the contribution must be made during the calendar year of 1976.

In conclusion, let me again remind you all that a visit to the Memorial in Alexandria, Virginia, should be included in your activities whenever you are in the vicinity of our Nation's Capital. It will be a most rewarding experience.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL DEAD

W. Gail Axen, 235, Chairman presented the report.

M. W. Grand Master, Masonic brethren: Since the beginning of this country, there have been deaths of Masonic brethren and also short memorial services as are being conducted this afternoon for them. It is then, M. W. Sir, that I submit the report of the Committee on Fraternal Dead. Making us all mindful, within this room, of the shortness of time and life itself.

Our Grand Lodge reports the death of 944 Brethren, during the 1975-1976 year, who have passed from our Lodges to their eternal abode, over which the Supreme Grand Master of the Universe presides. To these Masonic Brethren, we owe the highest degree of gratitute for their service to their lodges and their Masonic brothers.

Your Committee reports the death of two Past Grand Masters and two Deputy Grand Custodians, one Emeritus and one regular of our own Jurisdiction during this past year. The Masonic record of these brethren is as follows:

M. W. Past Grand Master, William Ballou Wanner, was born September 23, 1892 at Falls City, Nebraska and died June 13, 1975. He was the 79th Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Nebraska, having been installed in 1943. He also served as Grand Marshal of the Grand Lodge in 1944.

M. W. Herbert T. White, Past Grand Master, was born November 21, 1897 at Lockwood, Nebraska and died October 12, 1975 at Omaha, Nebraska. He was the 90th Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Nebraska having been installed in 1955. He was the presiding officer of the Grand Chapter (1970), the Grand Council (1948), the Grand Commandery (1961), of the York Rite Bodies of Nebraska. In 1953, he served as Potentate of Tangier Temple of the Shrine and from 1952 to 1955 he was President of the the Board of Trustees of The Nebraska Masonic Home.

W. Ernest E. James, 1, Deputy Grand Custodian Emeritus, served this Grand Lodge from 1948 to 1960 as Assistant Custodian, born December 15, 1889, died February 7, 1976. W. Ward L. McGlashan, 180, served this Grand Lodge for 9 years as Deputy Grand Custodian.

We thank God, for the privilege of having known and worked with these Brethren. We owe the highest degree of gratitude for their service to our Grand Lodge, their local lodges and to their Masonic brethren. Our prayerful sympathy is extended to their families and friends.

Our Grand Secretary has received Memorial cards during the past year, from 22 Jurisdictions listing the deaths of 25 Past Grand Masters and 2 Grand Tylers of the United States; four Past Grand Masters from Canada, 1 Grand Master of Peru, one Grand Master of Turkey, one Grand Master of Japan, one Grand Master of Puerto Rico and two Grand Masters of Mexico.

"In the name of God, we pause to pay tribute and honor to our Brethren who have passed into their eternal rest. Their contribution should remind and help us to fit ourselves as living stones for that House not made with hands eternal in the Heavens."

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, I have asked W.'. Brother Edward H. Lockwood to play for us an organ solo entitled "Be Thou My Stay" and may we in reverence unto those who are passed from our lodges, now participate in

this manner, fully realizing the shortness of time of our own lives, and that these eulogies which we have now performed could well be ours in the days to come.

M.'.W.'. Sir, I would remind us all that we forget not the opportunity that has been given us to do this thing in reverence for that which has been afforded to us. I would ask that at the conclusion of our report that V.'. W.'. J. Dallas Gibson, Grand Chaplain lead us in prayer.

#### V.'.W.'. J. DALLAS GIBSON, GRAND CHAPLAIN

Almighty God and Heavenly Father, you have created us in your image and breathed into mankind the breath of life. We rejoice in and thank you for creating us as individuals and for your redemptive power which enables us to know, love and serve your Holy Will. We thank you for these our brethren who are dear to our hearts, whose labor continues to inspire and strengthen us until we have completed our pilgrimage on earth. May we rejoice in the joys of their labors and service in Masonry. We know that if our tabernacle was dissolved, we have a building of God, a house not made with hands eternal in the Heavens. May Thy comforting peace and abiding strength sustain the families of these our Brethren, that when at last Thou dost call us unto Thyself, may we so live and labor here that we will hear Thee say to us, "well done good servant, enter now into the joy of Thy Lord." Accept of our gratitude and of our submission to Thy divine providence, for in the Master's name, we pray. Amen.

M.`.W.`. Sir, I would thank Brothers Edward H. Lockwood and J. Dallas Gibson for being a part of this report and on behalf of the Committee, move its acceptance. Motion carried.

# M.'.W.'. JOHN F. FUTCHER, PAST GRAND MASTER, CHAIR-MAN OF GRAND TRUSTEES:

You will recall at the last Communication we promised that if you fully cooperated with us in matters to be discussed relative to our Retirement Plan we would give you a full report of what had been accomplished in our negotiations.

You passed three resolutions as follows:

First, you authorized the Grand Master to adopt for you a Pension Plan containing provisions in general similar to our Plan of 1965, but one which would meet requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and the newly ennacted Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974. This has been done and the Plan has been put into effect. The new or amended Plan does two things as now required by Law that the former Plan did not; that is the interest of the Employee becomes vested in the contributions made on his behalf after ten years of Employment and the employees have certain options such as a joint and survivor benefit.

Second, you also authorized the Grand Master to purchase on behalf of the Grand Lodge a Participating Deposit Administration Policy. This has been done in accordance with our representations to you and your directive. Such a Policy has been entered into with the Bankers Life of Nebraska. The Insurance Company has guaranteed us 8% return on our deposits for the first year. Thereafter the guaranteed rate is gradually reduced for future years.

Third, you further authorized, upon the aforementioned steps being taken, the Grand Trustees to liquidate the Assets of the Retirement Fund either at private or public sale and to deposit the proceeds of the sale and other cash in The Fund with the Insurance Company. The Board considered the sale of the Assets of the Retirement Fund at public sale, but upon investigation the best estimates indicated a sale in this manner would result in a loss over our Book Value and would necessitate an increase in the Deposit with the Insurance Comapny of \$7,000.00 to \$9,000.00 yearly to amortize the difference between the amount received at the sale and \$301,505.00. The latter sum is the amount used to compute an Annual Deposit of \$16,000,00 with the Insurance Company on the Policy. The Board therefore directed the Nebraska Masonic Home and the Grand Lodge to purchase from the Retirement Fund at Book Value their respective percentages previously deposited in the Retirement Fund. In accordance with the contributions made by the respective bodies, this would entail the purchase by the Grand Lodge of 15.5% and the Home of 84.5% of the Assets of the Fund. The Board further directed the Chairman after completion of the purchase to deposit \$301,505.00 with the Bankers Life Insurance Company of Nebraska to initiate a retirement Program in accordance with the Plan approved by the Grand Master. This meant that the Grand Lodge would have to purchase from the Retirement Fund \$46,700.00 of securities and the Home \$254,700.00. Funds were obtained to accomplish this from maturities, calls of securities and by accumulation of money over a period of time in anticipation of this necessity. As for the Home, a portion of the money was obtained because of the large amount of receipts from new guests entering the Home, thereby reducing the amount necessary to be transferred from the Endowment and Bequest Fund to the General Fund.

The next step was to allocate to each of the bodies their proportionate share of the securities in the Retirement Fund in as fair and equitable a manner as possible. This was done by computing the average weighted yield of each security. The allocation was accomplished within 6/100th's of a basis point and the securities were registered in the names of the respective purchasers.

We trust that all this meets with your approval.

#### GRAND LODGE ACCOUNTS

Our Certified Public Accountant's preliminary report of the Operations of the Grand Lodge reveals Revenues for the use of the General Fund of \$156,084.00 for fiscal year ended 1976 (1975 - \$150,984.00; 1974 - \$148,218.00), with expense of operation for 1976 of \$122,127.00 (1975 - \$121,096.00; 1974 - \$135,297.00).

Changes of income in 1976 over 1975 were a loss of dues receipts of \$2,000.00; an increase in initiation fees of \$800.00; a decrease of insurance premiums received of \$1,000.00; an increase in the sale of supplies of \$1,000.00; and an increase in investment income of \$5,600.00. Expenses of operation of the Grand Lodge in 1976 was \$1,000.00 more than in 1975, leaving a surplus of Revenues over expenditures in 1976 on a cash basis of \$23,957.00. As I explained last year, this size of a balance is accounted for by a reduction in our annual contribution to the operating expense of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home at Fremont. We may anticipate that our contributions will increase in future years. Assets of the Grand Lodge were in 1976-\$998,479.00 compared with \$962,685.00 in 1975 (an increase of \$35,794.00) and \$1,035,310.00 in 1974.

#### Nebraska Masonic Home Accounts

Assets of the General Fund (which is the operating fund) of the Home at year end amounted to \$181,756.00. This was comprised of Cash of \$87,141.00 and Investments of \$94,097.00. Investments were Savings Accounts, Certificates of Deposits, mortgages and real estate, all received from guests of the Home upon admission and will be disposed of at the earliest convenience and used to pay operating expenses of the Home.

Income of the General Fund of the Home in the year ended April 30, 1976 amounted to \$457,899.00. This income was received from the following sources:

I would point out that of the income received to the General Fund during the year, 71% of the Total was received from the residents of the Home.

The Operating expense of the Home for the year was \$554,668.00 (1975 - \$479,077.00) making an operating deficit of \$86,769.00.

The Endowment and Bequest Fund of the Home is the one into which is Deposited all sums given to the Home, except those received from the Residents of the Home, the Per Capita Tax, and gifts specifically designated to the operation of the Home. The Total Assets of the Endowment and Bequest Fund at years end were \$5,111,628.00. This is an increase over 1975 of \$795,185.00.

Income to the Endowment and Bequest Fund last year comprised Investment Income and Endowments and Bequests as follows:

The statements of comparative assets and liabilities and the analysis of surplus or fund balances fairly and accurately reflect the financial condition of both the Grand Lodge and the Nebraska Masonic Home. These statements have been prepared by our independent Auditor and will be printed in these proceedings.

May I say in closing that it has been a distinct honor to serve you as a member of the Grand Trustees and as Chairman. I express my thanks and appreciation to each and every member of the Trustees for their whole-hearted support and cooperation. Their advice and experience in all investment matters has been of inestimable value to this organization. I deeply, deeply appreciate their counsel and friendship. Our meetings are held in harmony and with a dedication of purpose to preserve our assets and to invest the funds of our fraternity as prudently and wisely as possible.

To this we continue to pledge our efforts.

I doubt, if anyone in the room knows exactly all the things that John does to make this report as complete as it is. We sincerely thank you, John.

#### GRAND ORATION

Friday evening June 11, 1976 — Grand Lodge Banquet by W∴ Bevin B. Bump

The Grand Master has asked me to give a short address. About the shortest one that I know is my own, which is 342 Main St., Chadron, Nebraska. I am really pleased to be with you again. As you see I haven't lost too much weight since last year. I am wearing the same shirt I wore last year - same suit. I didn't wear my vest tonight because I wanted to be sure I could eat. I had corned beef and cabbage today and it was so good that I ate so much — I couldn't get my vest on.

My doctor told me the other day that rich foods are like destiny - they too, shape our end. Seriously, the other day I got on the scales and a little flag came up and said, "One person only!" I put my coin in the slot and out came my little fortune card. My wife, my beautiful wife, Maxine, picked up the card and started to read it to me. It said, "You are a leader with magnetic personality and strong character. You are most intelligent, witty and attractive to the opposite sex." She paused for a moment and said, "They got your weight wrong too!"

I must say it is a pleasure to see all the Past Grand Masters here this evening and as I look at them all there with those bright and shiny faces, it reminds me of a poem that I have to share with you. It goes like this:

Womens' faults are many Men but have only two Everything they say and Everything they do.

If that doesn't remind you of them, how about this:

It is easy enough to be pleasant When life flows 'round and 'round, But the man worth his while, Is a man who can smile, When his garter is coming down.

The other day I sent Joe Tye this poem, because I read it and I like it and I thought he might like it.

Say it with flowers;
Say it with eats,
Say it with kisses;
Say it with sweets,
Say it with jewelry and;
Say it with drinks,
But be mighty careful,
What you say in ink.

Joe sent one back to me, (you know how Joe is) and it said:

Don't worry if your job is small, and your rewards are few, Remember that the mighty oak, was once a nut like you.

Somehow, John Brown got the message that I liked little poems. Joe must have told him, - anyway, I got one in the mail from John. It said this:

Ruth rode on my motorcycle
- on the seat in back of me,
I took a bump at 55
and rode on ruthlessly.

I understand the other day that Tom Aron employed Joe Tye for a little legal matter - Joe gave him a bill. When he gave him the bill, he said, "Please pay down \$100.00 and \$25.00 a week for ten weeks." Tom said, "That sounds like buying a car." Joe said, "I am."

It just happened the other day: a stranger walked up here in Omaha and asked Lou Sylvester, "Pardon me, are you a resident here?" He said, "Yes I am. I have been here going on some fifty years now. What can I do for you?" The man said, "I am looking for a criminal lawyer. Do you know one?" Lou said, "I am pretty sure we have one but we haven't been able to prove it."

I understand that when Judge Herb Ronin first went on the bench, he had a case where they brought the defendant in and he said to this defendant, "You have been accused of stealing a chicken. Have you anything to say about it?" The defendant looked up to him and said, "I took it for a lark." Herb said, "Well, it is a poor resemblance - fifty days."

I understand that before Jack Hendrix went on the District Bench, he and Frank Mattoon had a rather important case in the western part of the state. We do have those now and then. This happened to be a case where Jack Hendrix was examining a witness who was a lovely, fetching blonde with blue eyes. Jack leaned forward in his chair and said, "Where were you on Monday night?" In a soft voice, she smiled and said, "Automobile riding." "Where were you on Tuesday night?", he asked. "Automobile riding" was her reply. Still he leaned closer and asked, "What will you be doing tommorrow night?", at which time Frank jumped up and said, "I object, your Honor," The Judge said, "Why would you object?" Frank said, "Because I asked her first."

I didn't know what to think tonight when this wonderful Grand Master of ours introduced me and said, "I don't know about this man's future." I don't know what he was talking about. But I told him I would get even and I would like to tell you a few things about him. I am sure you haven't heard before and probably never will again, but I understand that he and our Grand Marshal, Hank Wurdeman, were playing golf the other day. They both sliced their drives into the rough and they were both searching for the golf balls for quite some time. A very beautiful and charming little lady came up to them and said, "I hope I am not intruding, but would it really be cheating if I told you where they are?" They said, "No. Do you play golf?" She said, "No, I know very little about golf. I couldn't even tell you which end of the caddie is which." So they played the next hole and the Grand Master said to the Grand Marshal, "Well, how do you like my game?" Hank said, "Well, I suppose it is alright, but I still prefer golf."

I understand that the other day Virginia said to him, "You think so much of your old golf game that you don't even remember when we were married." He said, "Of course, I do, my dear - it was the day I sank that thirty foot putt."

You will recall the day at Grand Lodge, when the Grand Master introduced Wayne Campbell and he said something about him being a cowman. I want to tell you why he did that because at one time he said to Wayne, "How long should a cow be milked?" Wayne answered, "As long as a short one."

It is so nice having a friend in the crowd. I have to tell you a couple of short ones about Ralph Gerry because every year I have to tell you about some of the dinners we have had together. This last time we had dinner together, I complained to Ralph, "Look here, my soup has a dead fly in it." He said, "Yes, I know. It is the heat that kills them." Ralph Gerry was the one who taught me how to eat peas. He always eats peas with honey. It isn't because they taste good. They stick to his knife much better.

As your Grand Orator, I do have an opportunity to give you a message, and I will tonight. Also, as your Grand Orator, I am sure I always feel that this is the best part of the program. But I will try to be brief, and I do have some things and thoughts that I would like to review with you. As you will see, some of them are not my words, but I am sure that as they are said, you will remember them.

It was a few weeks ago that I attended a Rotary Meeting where I heard a speaker give a report on various dooms day predictions. You know the kind the population explosion, the world running out of natural resources, lack of food to feed the world etc., etc. He read at length from a publication written by some East Coast economist that our capitalistic system was bad, that our form of government would not last and that people would go to the ways of the dinosaurs and vanish. I tell you, I was really upset. I was so upset that I went to the library and I checked out this publication and I read it. As I read it. I became angry and the more I read, the angrier I became, All at once, I realized that the author did not mention, did not consider or take into account, as he analyzed the various problems he presented, two most important things: our heritage and our faith in God. I feel if he had, I am sure the end result would have been different. The next week I returned to Rotary, ready to debate the Devil himself, but I did not have to. The speaker this time, was a gentleman of Spanish-American descent, who spoke on how fortunate he was to be an American. He told us that we should all take America in gratitude and not take it for granted. That it was much better to have an unequal distribution of wealth, rather than an equal distribution of misery. He hoped that we as a people did not encourage the welfare of the poor at the expense of wealth, so that the incentive to achieve eventually is destroyed. That in America, not only could you still dream, but you could still have the opportunity to live that dream because of our American heritage and that we must all keep our faith in God. For religion without faith in God means that life has not meaning or purpose. HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR AMERICAN HERITAGE AND OUR FAITH IN GOD?

The Sunday World Herald of June 6, 1976, its front page right hand column, carried a story by Bernie Bookbinder of News Day. The headlines, and I am sure you saw them read, "Happy People Hold Dim View For U.S.". This news item stated that as the Nation enters its third century and the Americans proceed, there are two different versions of the future: a bright one for themselves and a dim one for the country. I quote, "This sense of hesitancy and events, even pessimism, emerges from an extensive News Day inquiry into the hopes, fears and attitudes of Americans, about their lives, their country and the very survival of their present form of Government." Still quoting, "They do not believe that America is becoming a better place in which to live. They have serious doubts about the ability of the Democratic Capitalistic system to endure." If you read that article and you looked next to it in a box surrounded by black, you would see there were the important findings of the survey.

If you read that survey, it said that 54% of the people believe that America's form of government will survive to celebrate another 200 years, while only 32% think it will be overthrown. It would appear that the majority of those polls believe that the American form of government would survive rather than doubt as the article would lead you to believe. Let's go back in our history to 200 years ago during the birth of our country, and if you would obtain a similar poll at that time, I am sure that you would have found the following: One third of the population at that time were lovalists and sympathetic to England; one-third of the population at

that time were indifferent, and could care less. That doesn't have a new sound does it? One-third of the population at that time was involved and actually carried on the American Revolution that gave birth to this great country of ours. HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR AMERICAN HERITAGE AND OUR FAITH IN GOD? It was considered important 100 years later as the President of the United States gave his second inaugural address on March 4, 1865, as he said, "with malice toward none, with charity for all. with firmness in the right as God gives us, to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the Nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow, his orphan and to do all which may achieve and cherish the just and lasting peace among us and with all Nations." Not long thereafter this great man met his untimely death at the hands of an assassin and, of course, you all know his name was Abraham Lincoln. The same Abraham Lincoln, who at the age of 19 stated, "I never behold the stars that I do not feel that I am looking in the face of God." I can see how it might be possible for a man to look down upon the earth and be an atheist, but I cannot concieve how he could look up into the Heavens and say, "There is no God." HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR AMERICAN HERITAGE AND HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR FAITH IN GOD?

One hundred years later and now in our time, another President of the United States, who had also later met an untimely death through the hands of an assassin, considered it most important when he stated at his inaugural address, "In the long history of the world, only a few generations have been granted the roll of defending freedom in its hours of maximum danger. I do not shrink from this responsibility. I welcome it. The energy and faith and devotion which we bring to this endeavor will light our country and all who serve it and the glow from that fire can truly light the world, and so my fellow Americans, ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country." My fellow citizens of the world ask not what America will do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of man. With good conscience, our only sure reward with history, our final judge of our deeds, let us go forth to lead the land we love, asking His blessing and His help, but knowing that here on earth, God's work must truly be our own.

HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR AMERICAN HERITAGE AND HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR FAITH IN GOD? Well, it is still important today, to our present President and I am thankful to say, President Ford, who when asked what American means to him said, "God and Man made America what it is, but America was also made of us, what we are."

Unlike most nations of history, we are a mixture of a multitude of races, nationalities, religions, and cultures. Who can identify us as Americans simply by how we look and how we act and how we worship or how we spell our names? Yet, we know who we are and we have been saying ever since Daniel Webster and before, "Thank God, I am an American." American society is still not perfect, but it is still the best there is.

We continue to move on in the course set by our constitution to secure the blessings of Liberty to ourselves today and our posterity tomorrow. I am just as optimistic about America's future as I am of America's past. Some how we must, and I know we will find ways to make America a more perfect union forever, beautiful and free.

HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR AMERICAN HERITAGE AND HOW IM-PORTANT IS OUR FAITH IN GOD? Let me share with you for a moment. the prayer of Thomas Jefferson, the same prayer that we are told he said each day during his Presidency and then until his death. As he knelt, he said, "Almighty God who has given us this good land for our heritage, we humbly beseech Thee that we may always prove ourselves a people mindful of Thy favor, glad to do Thy will. Bless our land with honorable industries, sound learning and pure manners. Save us from violence, discord and confusion, from pride and arrogance from every evil way. Defend our liberties and fashions into one united people, the multitude brought hither out of many kindreds and tongues. Endow with the spirit of wisdom those to whom in Thy name we intrust the authority of government, that there may be justice and peace at home and through obedience of Thy law, we may show forth Thy praise among the nations of the earth. In time of prosperity, fill our hearts with thoughtfulness, thankfulness and in the day of trouble, suffer not our trust in Thee to fail."

Last week at the invitation of the Grand Master, the Grand Lodge of South Dakota, I had the privilege of attending their Grand Communication. Maxine and I drove through the State of South Dakota, We passed by Mt. Rushmore and that is a great shrine of democracy. Who should look down upon me but George Washington, Brother Mason and Father of our Country, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Theodore Roosevelt, the old rough rider. I recall some of his words that went like this, "No matter how honest and decent we are in our private lives, if we do not have the right kind of law and administration, we cannot go forward as a Nation. We must have the right kind of character - character that makes a man, first of all, a good man at home, a good father and a good husband." This, then reminded me of something I once read, the author is unknown - it went like this: "The things that will destroy us are politics without principle, pleasure without conscience, wealth without work and knowledge without character, business without morality, science without humanity and worship without sacrifice. HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR AMERICAN HERITAGE AND HOW IMPORTANT IS OUR FAITH IN GOD?

Well, I believe that to a Mason it is most important that we are duty bound by our obligations to meet, act and live by the principles of Masonry, thereby, continuing that Heritage for those who shall follow after us. And so to collect my thoughts that I have expressed to you this evening, let me deliver this short reading I have prepared to dedicate to you and all of us. For the following is dedicated to the most endangered species of all, ourselves.

Those who find laughter in everyday life and in everyday jobs they achieve in, Those we elect to keep our respect and stand up for what they believe in.

Doctors who still make housecalls in in spite of the malpractice,
Teachers, who teach and create an interest in knowledge.
Lawyers and judges who you know you can trust,
Makers of autos that nothing can bust,
Guys who think work is an absolute must,
They each are endangered species.

People who simply refuse to grow old, whatever the season or weather,

People content when the family meant much more than just being together.

Folks who know children inherit the earth are their sons, daughters, nephews, and nieces, Kids, who have chances their folks never had,

They are each an endangered species.

Big guys who look after little guys
Husbands who aren't too demanding,
Painters whose art comes from the heart
and wives who are most understanding

Lovers, who marry and marry for life, not just until the honeymoon ceases,

People who aren't

just along for the drive

And folks who do think show business ought to be live

And daughters home by 1:35

They are all each an endangered species.

All the people who work with their hands, who bring us our music and laughter,

Each of us through his own conscience is true, and all of the kings who will come after,

All of the people whose courage and love can make this planet where peace is,

The brown, yellow, the black and the white, from workers in the field to spacemen in flight,

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REINSTATEMENTS

W. Donald R. White, 327, Chairman, gave the report which was accepted.

Since our Grand Lodge meeting a year ago, this Committee has received and acted favorably on 36 applications, which is again a few more than we had the year before.

This made for a busy year for our Committee but it is a very rewarding activity and we sincerely enjoy doing what we can to enable these worthy Brethren to once again become active Masons in their respective Blue Lodges. They are needed there, as you know.

At this time I would like to call to your attention to something of importance. This is a matter that should have the careful attention of the presiding Master of the Lodge and the Secretary.

These applications must be completed in their entirety. We find very frequently that this is not being done. It is then necessary that the Application for Reinstatement be returned to the Lodge and this causes undue delay in our making a decision on the matter of reinstatement.

I call to your attention the matter of the Investigating Committee of the Blue Lodge. We find quite often that this has not been done and there will be only the signature of the Master and the Secretary. An Investigating Committee must be appointed by the Master and this Committee must function properly. All this must be done before we, the Committee, can do our part.

We do ask your kind consideration in this respect since we do want to make it possible for every eligible Mason to again become active in his Blue Lodge just as soon as possible after the application has been submitted.

Once again we thank you for your support and cooperation.

# REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

M. W. Merle M. Hale, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

The Grand Lodge Office Committee met in the Grand Secretary's office on May 6th. A proposed budget for routine office and special items was prepared and has been submitted to the Appropriations Committee. The significant changes from last year are as follows:

- (1) Payroll for this Communication (ie., per diem and travel expense for delegates) was increased from \$7,000.00 to \$11,000.00. This is contingent upon approval of the Grand Master's recommendation to increase the mileage and per diem expense.
- (2) Grand Lodge Delegates Dinner increased from \$1,350.00 to \$2,500.00. This is the subsidy necessary because the amount charged the Delegate does not cover the cost of the dinner.
  - (3) \$3,000.00 was included for printing new Code Books.
- (4) Grand Lodge Office Supplies account was reduced \$6,500.00 as this account was increased that amount last year to cover the cost of printing 5,000 new Monitors.
- (5) A cost of living increase of approximately 6.5% is recommended for the Grand Lodge office staff (Grand Secretary, Grand Custodian and clerical help). We believe this is in line with the cost of living index rise and it approximates the Social Security increase of 6.4% effective July 1st of this year.

We commend the Grand Lodge office staff for another year of dedicated and efficient service. Special recognition should be given the staff and Committee Chairmen for the fact that the total expended last year was \$15,435.38 under the Budget allowed.

#### REPORT OF THE TEMPLE BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

M. W. Russell L. Fickes, 33, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

Centennial Lodge No. 326, Omaha, is looking for a suitable building to use for a Temple. Their efforts, to date, have not been successful. There has been no other activity reported to the Temple Building Advisory Committee.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

M. W. Louis V. Sylvester, Chairman presented the report which was adopted.

Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Your Committee is pleased to advise that no matters relating to the esoteric or monotorial work as adopted by this Grand Lodge, have been submitted to the Committee during the year. This leads us to the conclusion that the Grand Custodian and our Deputies are covering the work thoroughly and proficiently and their efforts are being well received by the Brethren, the result being that our work continues to remain at a high standard of excellence.

Agreeable to action of this Grand Lodge a year ago, 5,000 Monitors were reprinted during the year and are now available through the Grand Lodge office. These Monitors reflect the corrections of a few minor errors found in the old Monitor, and the addition of the adopted Memorial Service.

The annual report of the Grand Custodian has been submitted to us and continues to reflect the dedicated services rendered by him and the Deputies. This Grand Lodge, indeed owes continued thanks for their devotion.

All vouchers and expense items of the Grand Custodian were submitted to and approved by the Committee. For the first time in years the appropriation was exceeded by a very small amount, brought about by increased activity of the Grand Custodian and the office, but principally by the increased cost of travel. We have examined the proposed budget of the Grand Custodian and approve his request for an appropriation of \$9,100.00 an increase of \$500.00 over a year ago, made necessary as pointed out by the above comment, to the increase in travel expense.

The Grand Custodian was re-examined in both the Esoteric and Standard floor work and found to be most proficient in both.

After proper certification as to their proficiency, the committee approved and recommended to the Grand Master, the appointment of Worshipful Brothers Everett K. Dappen and Alfred V. Peltzer, as Deputy Custodians in districts 30 and 27, respectively. The appointment of these two brethren assures devoted continuity in these districts and we welcome them to the fellowship of the Deputy Grand Custodians. In addition we regretfully note the retirement of two of our most distinguished Deputies, Worshipful Harold D. Weddel of Lexington and Alfred R. Kenoyer of Scotia. Both of these brethren have served with distinction, Brother Wedell for 37 years and Brother Kenoyer for 15 years. Their retirement is a distinct loss to this Grand Lodge. Your Committee heartily endorsed the recommendation to the Grand Master that they be accorded emeritus status.

For the first time in several years no member of the Committee was present at the Annual Custodian school held in Grand Island. However, we are assured that the Deputies passed a very satisfactory examination in the three degrees and we can be certain that the high standard of perfection at which they have arrived will be maintained in this jurisdiction.

In general, the work throughout the State is being carried on in a most efficient manner and we owe to the Grand Custodian and his Deputies, a deep sense of gratitude for their devotion and loyalty.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

M.'.W.'. Louis V. Sylvester, 281, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Your Committee on Masonic Education has just completed, what the members feel, was one of the most successful and rewarding years of recent times.

Shortly after Grand Lodge a year ago, the Committee sat down with the Grand Master and several of his officers to discuss ways and means whereby a program of Masonic Education could be made meaningful and interesting to the lodges and brethren involved.

Out of this meeting came an entirely new format, one which involved each of the Grand Lodge officers, as well as the Committee members. The program was designed around audience participation with each grand Lodge officer making an assigned presentation on a particular subject. Subjects embraced Youth Activities, The Nebraska Masonic Home, Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children, Suspensions for non-payment of dues, Cornerstones and Dedications, Ritual and Law, Leadership and Bi-Centennial celebrations.

At the banquet in the evening, the program was designed to educate the local lodge leadership in how to present a program that might ultimately lead to petitions for the degrees. Each host lodge and as many others as was convenient to do so, were urged to bring non-masons and their wives to the banquet that the presentation might be as realistic as possible. Reports now being received indicate that this type of meeting does and will bear fruit. A total of eleven meetings where held, all located geographically so that every lodge in the State had the opportunity of being in attendance. Of our 242 lodges, 187 were represented during the afternoon sessions, with a total attendance of approximately 750. When viewed from the standpoint that these meetings are geared principally for the officers and Educational Committee members of each Lodge, these figures are most impressive and leads your Grand Lodge Committee to the conclusion that this type of program will be accepted by the Brethren.

Your Committee has been active in individual areas also, providing speakers for Lodge Guest night programs, furnishing Masonic Educational material and counseling with Lodge officers in their individual efforts to provide leadership and Education for their lodges.

The Mid-West Conference on Masonic Education, comprising twelve States, was held this year in LaCross, Wisconsin. In attendance from Nebraska were our Deputy Grand Master, T. Leo Stines, your Chairman and their wives, together with Committee members Wayne W. Reese and Alfred G. Wurst. These meetings are most worthwhile and afford those in attendance an opportunity to learn of the Educational programs being carried on by sister jurisdictions, new Educational material developed, all of which is made available for use by any member Grand Lodge.

Your Committee wishes to express its appreciation to M.'.W.'. Harold Hultman, Grand Master, and his Grand Lodge Officers, for their encouragement and help in presenting this year's Educational program. Plans are now going forward for what we hope, will be an even greater year in Masonic Education.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RETURNS

W. James R. Kimmel, 3, presented the report which was adopted.

Your Committee on Returns respectfully submits the following report:

The Committee has examined the Monthly and Annual Returns of 243 Lodges for year 1975 and find that in general, these reports are satisfactorily prepared by Lodge Secretaries.

We wish to stress the importance of Lodge compiling their Monthly reports and Annual Returns in every detail as provided for without omissions in order to maintain proper and correct records in Lodges and Grand Secretary's Office.

The following omissions errors on reports can and should be avoided by strict compliance by Lodge Secretaries in compiling these reports in every detail as provided for without exceptions.

- 41 Lodges neglected to apply imprint of their Lodge Official Seal on Annual Returns.
- 9 Lodges failed to show name of their Bronze Jordan Medal Member or explanation of omission.
- 8 Lodges omitted Financial Statement as provided for on the report.

Several Lodges failed to show names of Officers for the year and to apply Master's and Secretary's Signature to reports.

The Committee finds it necessary to cite Lodge No. 291 for their failure to remit their Annual Return Fees or show cause why they are in violation and recommends the application of provisions of Section 2-601 be imposed.

It is the recommendation of the Committee that Lodge Secretaries continue use of Monthly Progress Form and be in balance with Monthly and Annual Reports before mailing to the Grand Secretary's Office.

We wish to highly commend the Grand Secretary and his efficient staff for the excellent manner in which these records are maintained and for the courteous cooperation extended the Committee while checking these Returns.

This report was accepted.

#### REPORT OF THE RELIEF COMMITTEE

W. Earl W. Schultz, 75, presented the report in the absence of the Chairman Paul L. Toombs.

Your relief committee has had a reasonbly routine year. We have had no requests from the constituent lodge for any help and have taken care of our routine payments to an amount of \$600.00 and while we expended a specific sum of \$100.00 for relief to one recipient after the tornado we received a contribution from Iowa City Lodge No. 4, Iowa City, Iowa in the amount of \$50.00 and the Masonic Service Club of Johnson County, Iowa in the amount of \$25.00 so our total expenditures were \$625.00 net. With a membership of somewhat over 36,000 members that amounts to less than \$.02 per member.

Our committee is ready and willing to advise with the lodges at any time they may have a relief problem. We commend them for the fact that no case has come to our attention this past year.

This report was accepted.

## REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

My Brethren:

On behalf of the officers and trustees of your Home, I am pleased to give you our report for the past year.

It has been a good year with the ususal amount of troubles and correspondingly, the pleasant side has had its innings as well.

Our Superintendent, Raymond F. Evers reported at the Annual Meeting of Stockholders in January 1976 that our population was a little below 80. The average age of both men and women was 84. The average age at admittance was 77. You can see that on the average, even at a high age, we keep our residents an average of six years.

We had 10 admissions and 9 deaths. The average age at death was 85 years.

The per capita cost of maintaining a resident in the Home in 1975 was \$6,623.32 per year. This figure has constantly risen each year for a long time.

As always before, I wish to impress upon you that loving care is the golden thread that runs all through your Home. It is surprising what this does to many of our residents.

They come to us, many of them, ill and beset by the cares of life which, at their age, makes life very miserable. Once established in the Home, the anxieties of life are completely gone. Kind people and excellent diet does the rest to make very happy people out of our residents.

This sort of handling and care has been going on since Raymond's father, William Evers, was our Superintendent, so it comes naturally.

So much for our residents except to remind you that they like company. Each Lodge who has a resident in the Home would learn what happiness they can bestow if at some time in the year they visited their Brother or Sister. I urge you to do it. Many of our residents have outlived all their relatives. The remaining friends become most precious.

Our project of installing door closures is completed. This moved slowly but now these doors, activated by smoke, close as a safety measure.

Just as we were completing this, an anonymous giver asked the cost. When told, we received a check for the entire operation. We cannot give credit as we would like to do but we can say "thank you and God Bless you."

We have also been working a long time on a stand-by generator. This is just being completed. To those of you who might not understand what this is, it is an auxiliary system to provide power and light in case of a power failure in our area.

I am sure all hospitals have this installation and a number of the new Nursing Homes. We are some of both and after a couple of years of checking and discussion, we felt it was in no way an extravagance but very much a necessity.

We made the winter in good shape. I am sure I told you before we installed sometime before, reserve oil tanks. Our supplier urged it and it proved very useful.

Raymond Evers, our Superintendent, at a recent meeting, explained a problem we have at the Home. For church services and all other occasions when residents gather in the Chapel, we have not enough room in the balcony to accommodate all the wheel chairs. We have had this for some time but it is increasing.

Raymond had material showing a wheel chair lift to the main floor of the Chapel where there is plenty of room for a great number of wheel chairs.

The Board considered the estimated cost and adjourned without decision. This was talked around for a week or so until one day we received a phone call. It was our anonymous giver of the door closures. The conversation wasn't very long. We were told to go ahead and get the "lift" and it would be paid for.

The "lift" is in, serving its purpose beautifully and at no cost to the Home. It was paid for by our friend.

This was no small gift. Somebody who cared and loved his Brother Man enough to do this saw it through. We are deeply grateful. This sort of giving without thought of reward gives everybody a feeling that God is in his Heaven and this world isn't all bad.

We've had gifts before as I have reported to you but the intervals between them is pretty wide. We are always deeply grateful.

This thought brings thoughts of the Endowment Fund, a perfect place for gifts, large or small. Facing as we have the past several years, a declining population in Grand Lodge, Endowments become more and more important since our per-capita tax goes down each year the population drops.

With all this, we continue to encourage Endowments to make certain the life of your Home. This year has been one of pleasant surprises and the Fund has grown. We are grateful that we are being remembered. We can express our appreciation in the way this Fund is managed and that will always have our careful attention.

Just briefly I should mention what I am sure is obvious. Our costs continue to rise. With all our efforts, the budget again this year exceeds last year's. Unless and until inflation reverses, this will continue with us just as it is continuing to do with you and me in our private lives.

With our loss by death of M.'.W.'. William B. Wanner and M.'.W.'. Howard J. Hunter, we lost two good Trustees. M.'.W.'. Herbert T. White, Trustee Emeritus also passed away.

W... Brother Earl H. Furman, one of our old and valued Trustees retired and he with Mrs. Furman is living at the Home now. W... Brother Earl became Trustee Emeritus.

All this left the Board three vacancies. They have been filled by three eminent men. Brother Frank V. Lawson, Jr., Trust Officer of the First National Bank of Omaha and a member of the Grand Trustees was added. W. Brother William A. Pettengill, Past Master of St. Johns Lodge, Omaha and owner of Johnson Hardware Company became our second addition. Finally elected Trustee was Brother Robert M. Spire, a fine attorney, active in Masonic matters. Brother Spire's father served this Grand Lodge long and faithfully. This new personnel fills out to 15 our proper number of Trustees.

The holiday season is always marked by the great big semis rolling in from outstate loaded with food.

Just before Thanksgiving they came. W.. Brother Bob Boon of Grand Island and his group as well as W.. Brother J.C. Peterson of Scottsbluff and his group arrived at the Home and the big semis were there as usual. These two leaders and all the Lodges in their areas really make Thanksgiving and put a big push to Christmas.

The residents look for them; so does the entire Home staff. It is cause for celebration. I sometimes wonder who gets more fun; the boys who come in the semis or our residents and staff.

This event means that Masons, countless ones all over these areas, have joined together to make this trip possible. It is a tremendous contribution to our food supply and in times like these, it becomes each year more priceless. We thank all associated in this endeavor and may God Bless you.

Christmas is over. The big tree and the trees on each floor all are down. With a mild winter, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day was dry and pleasant. Company came and somewhere in that company was two Santa Clauses.

Christmas Eve the Masters and Wardens had made possible a lot of presents for each resident. There was entertainment by our residents, good food and Santa.

The last present was to the Home. It came from Denney's Restaurant. Our name was picked to receive a gift from all their employees. It turned out to be an R.C.A. XL 100 Color T.V. Set. This we needed badly. We express here our gratitude to these nice people as well as our own Masters and Wardens wherever you are.

Time and space limit my thanks and we owe so much to so many. A few among the many we say "thanks" to: all the Lodges, Chapters, Councils, Commanderies, Masters and Wardens, Order of the Eastern Star Chapters, and the Youth Groups, to name a few.

We are indebted to Sister Virginia Jones, Worthy Grand Matron and Brother Dr. Robert Bass, Worthy Grand Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star for their generous support this year. We thank you both.

Our Grand Master, M.'.W.'. Harold Hultman is a great gentleman. He is a valued member of this Board of Trustees where his judgment and advice is treasured. We now express our appreciation for his ever faithful help as Grand Master.

Our Superintendent, Raymond F. Evers, is a talented Administrator. We are in his debt for his faithful efforts.

Our Secretary, M.'.W.'. Norris W. Lallman never tires and smoothly keeps things going for us. We love him.

To my Brother Trustees - they need no glory. No words I could say here could measure their faithful dedicated worth to our Home. I salute them.

As to my Brethren, I thank you. I thank you for reading this report, for thinking of your Home. Lastly, I thank you for the privilege of serving you in the Administration of this, Masonry's greatest charity - our Home.

## REPORT OF THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

M. W. Donald R. Swanson, Past Grand Master, presented the report in the absence of M. W. Herbert A. Ronin. Report adopted.

It has been my privilege to serve as one of the Executive Commissioners of the Masonic Service Association for the past 13 years. This is a National Masonic Organization with 43 of our Grand Lodges including Nebraska comprising its constituent members. I represent the Central Division of 10 states.

The service of the M.S.A. is divided into two separate divisions, the Masonic Education and the Field Service with its agents in the various Veteran Hospitals in the U.S. As to the first division, there are the monthly short subject bulletins and various reports on surveys and Masonic Articles which are sent to the Chairman of the Masonic Education Committee of each of our lodges for the benefit of the membership.

While Nebraska has participated in the Educational division since 1960, it was not until February, 1975 that our Grand Lodge engaged in the Veteran Hospital visitation program by a trained M.S.A. Agent. This was a Masonic service that our Grand Lodge has long desired to perform, but refrained because of its expense. The Nebraska Scottish Rite Foundation agreed to fund half of the expense of this service as a pilot program at the Omaha Veteran Hospital which was agreed to by our Grand Lodge. Our Grand Master and the M.S.A. appointed Brother Alan Wolcott of Omaha to be the Field Agent. His fine report is being made to this Grand Lodge at the session. The expense of this operation is \$3,750 each year which sum is shared by our Grand Lodge and the Scottish Rite Foundation.

Consideration has been given to the employment of another Masonic Field Agent for the Veteran Hospital at Lincoln. One of our fine disabled Masonic brothers, a member of Craftsman Lodge No. 314, has been an active volunteer worker there, and has offered to serve as the M.S.A. Field Agent without pay and on an expense reimbursement basis. It will be necessary that he be trained at the Des Moines, Iowa facility which will require some extra initial expense. It is estimated that this expense for the year would not exceed \$1,250. Our Grand Master has asked our Scottish Rite Foundation if we would pay for half of this expense, to which it has agreed, for the record year. This would make the Grand Lodge expense for the two Field Agents of the M.S.A. not to exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 for the next year.

Brethren, this program is Masonry in action, and at nominal expense. Both of these Brethren are willing to serve as Field Agents because they have the time and love to be of service to the needs of a brother in distress! This is a Grand Lodge program which we of the Scottish Rite consider a privilege to assist in its funding.

The Annual Meeting of the M.S.A. was held last February at Philadelphia at the time of the Grand Masters' Conference. Our new M.S.A. film, "Brotherhood of Man" was shown, and is a fine one! Our Grand Lodge has this film which is available for showing at our lodges. It relates the need for and the beginning of the Masonic Field Agent service in our hospitals. It won the silver award at the International Film Festival at New York. Our Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Past Grand Masters, Louis V. Sylvester, Carl R. Greisen; our Grand Secretary M. W. Norris W. Lallman, and myself were in attendance at this Annual Meeting. Our Grand Master served as Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relief.

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, I move the acceptance of this report including the approval of the sum of \$2,500.00 as an appropriation for this expense. Motion carried.

# REPORT OF THE MASONIC-EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

#### M. W. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER

Joe Lindquist, President of The Board of Trustees of The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children is ill and unable to be here and he asked that I give his report for him.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren:

I have an abiding belief that those who must give reports and those who must listen will both be better served if the message is conveyed without unneccessary verbiage. With this overriding thought in mind, I'll proceed.

It's my privilege to bring to you the traditional greetings from the children at the Home, and to extend to you the best wishes of the Board of Trustees.

I'm pleased and satisfied to report that good health and happiness prevail with the children at the Home. Like any large family, there have been some rough spots along the way, and now and then a minor crisis will arise; however, for the most part, it has been another successful year as far as the welfare of the children is concerned.

The Board of Trustees has approved a 1976-77 budget encompassing expenditures in the amount of \$163,780.00. The inescapable facts facing the Board when it works on a budget is that the cost of food, clothing, utilities and salaries continues to rise, Additionally, cottages are increasingly showing the ravages of old age, and repairs and replacements become more frequent. In the opinion of the Board, a budget reflecting an increase of less than 10% over the previous period represents conservative fiscal management.

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the operation of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children, its management is entrusted to a Board of Trustees consisting of 14 members with the Grand Master A. A. A. M. and Worthy Grand Matron Order of the Eastern Star serving as ex-officio members. The Board meets on the second Tuesday of each month, and any Mason wishing to do so may feel free to attend. Candidly speaking, the Board of Trustees is gravely concerned that more Masons do not take an active interest in the Home. It is a joint endeavor of the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, and in all sincerity, gentlemen, the efforts and accomplishments of the ladies on behalf of the children are far greater than ours. The roll of Masons in the operation of the Home should become one of energetic participation. There are many areas in which we Masons can take part, and thereby lend a helping hand to a beneficial purpose.

There have been several changes in the composition of the Board membership. The retiring members are E. Forrest Estes, Clyde Birch and Kay Palmer. Their fellow Board members wish to thank them for their efforts. The new members are James Bradley, Fred Moshier and Donald Swanson.

In August of each year, a day is customarily set aside for the purpose of acknowledging the efforts of the children in their 4-H work. This event is designated as Achievement Day. The affair is open to the public and it's a fun day for the children and for those who attend. If you would like to enhance your understanding of the Home's operation and establish a little rapport with some of the children, I urge you to be in attendance at next year's event. The cost of sending out advance notice is prohibitive; thus, if you're interested in attending, I suggest that you call or write for the date sometime early in July.

A serious problem at the Home has arisen with regard to the employment of house parents. It's been extremely difficult and sometimes impossible to find people who have the necessary qualifications and who are willing to accept employment. It may very well be that both salaries and working conditions at the Home are not as they should be in the context of today's labor market. Under any circumstances, a problem exists and the Trustees must find a solution without delay.

The Board of Trustees wishes to thank all who have remembered the Home in any manner whatsoever. Throughout the year, there have been numerous gifts and bequests and each, irrespective of amount is significant and meaningful.

It is with regret that the Board of Trustees accepted Brother Fred Mulford's resignation as Superintendent, to become effective May 31, 1976. Fred faithfully attended to the needs of the children for approximately  $8\frac{1}{2}$  years. During the period of time I've known Fred, he has been energetic, competent, cooperative, loyal, conscientious, and above all, a dedicated servant. I assume he has not been without fault, but on the other hand, I'm confident that his overwhelming concern for the welfare of the children overshadows any minor imperfections he might have had. We'll deeply miss Fred, but there are those who will miss him more . . . the children who know and have known Fred will never forget him. We thank you, Fred.

To our new Superintendent, Mr. Herbert Hjortsvang, I forewarn that you have a tough act to follow, but your qualifications and past performance record indicates that you will rise to the occasion. We are looking forward to working with you.

For many months last past, I've had an inward feeling or a sort of subconscious awareness that the Board of Trustees is taking on a new dimension.
There seems to be an ever-present desire on the part of the individual Board
members to examine the scope of the Home's operation with a view to enlarging and upgrading its programs. More and more, the Board seems to be focusing
its attention on what can be done to better enable the children to function
in society, both while at the Home and after leaving. I personally find this to
be a welcome shift in emphasis. By providing the children with necessities of
life, such as food, clothing and shelter, we discharge only one facet of our
obligation. If we are to make available to these children the benefits, responsibilities and consequences of a home life, in its literal context, then
we must constantly strive to achieve meaningful and effective programs for
their benefit. When used in connection with the operation of a children's

home, the term "Trustee" implies much more than mere fiscal responsibility. While prudent money management is of great importance, the decisions in this regard are miniscule when compared to the awesome responsibility of deciding what is best and proper to assure adequate physical, moral and mental development. The emerging philosophy of the Board appears to be one of "total involvement".

In conclusion, I once again invite all of you to visit the Home and see for yourself what can be accomplished with a lot of love and hard work.

# W. ALAN WOLCOTT, FIELD AGENT FOR THE VISITATION PROGRAM:

#### MSA - - HOSPITAL VISITATIONS

In accordance with your request of recent date, I am submitting herewith a resume of activities of the Masonic Service Association as pertains to the Omaha Veterans Hospital. The Masonic Service Association has recently completed one year (February 1975) of hospital visitation service along with various affiliated services such as readiness to aid other volunteer units insofar as compatible with the principal function of our service - i.e. visitation with patient personnel. The progress of this program in general, in my opinion, has enjoyed a high degree of success during this first year. As is true with any new project, its implementation required several months for myself as Field Agent to become familiar with not only the physical plant of a large hospital such as the Omaha Unit, but also to acquaint as many of the hospital as possible, especially the nursing and medical people on each floor of the purpose and reason for being of such an organization as The Masonic Service Association. For the most part, and with almost no exception, the personnel had no knowledge of our organization at the start of this program. Pamphlets, brochures and personal visits have, to a great extent, acquainted all the hospital personnel with our organization and its purpose and aims. With no exception, all those contacted in such a manner have heartily endorsed our program.

Prospects for the immediate future for the continued favorable acceptance of our program appear bright. The enthusiastic response and appreciative comments from the patients themselves, as well as the favorable reaction from all phases of the hospital personnel -- management, nursing and medical, in my opinion bodes well for the future of our program.

During the past month it has been my good fortune to recruit a deputy representative to assist me - Brother Robert May - who for the past several years has been an enthusiastic and dedicated hospital volunteer. Brother May is a Scottish Rite Mason of many years standing, and is very well thought of among his co-workers at the hospital. With his help I feel sure that we can increase the present number of visitations from approximately 125 per month to a substantially greater number of contacts. Also with Brother May's assistance it will be possible to implement an occasional entertainment diversion for the enjoyment of the patients.

M.'.W.'. Grand Master, just a few remarks to my written report. I have been privileged serving as Field Agent at the Omaha Veterans' Hospital, as you know a more or less infant service pertaining to the Omaha Veterans' Hospital. I would simply like to say, that it is the most intangible service. but with great material rewards as far as I am concerned. My duties there have been for the past year, truly and simply a visitation program along with some exterior help of other volunteer units which has not interferred with the main purpose of the organization. If any of you brethren could see the light that shines in the faces of these Veterans, that are bedridden at our Omaha Hospital, I think you would agree with me that it is a service that is most rewarding and most gratifying. As far as I am personally concerned, it makes me almost get down on my knees and thank the good Lord every night that I am in such a position that I can still get around. It has been my good fortune, over the past year, of contacting or visiting perhaps an average of about 125 to 130 patients a month. During the past month, I have been fortunate enough to acquire the services of the Association Visitation personnel, a man who has been a volunteer there in the hospital for several years. I think with his help, we should be able to increase the service there at the hospital. I am particularly happy to hear and to know that this service is being inaugurated at the Lincoln Hospital. I like to feel that our success in Omaha, has been responsible partially for the interest of the Lincoln Veterans' Hospital.

# REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

M. W. Donald R. Swanson, 54, Chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Jurisprudence, which was adopted section by section, then as a whole.

The Decisions, Dispensations and Recommendations are listed in the Grand Master's report. The Jurisprudence Committee refers to those parts of the Grand Master's report.

#### DECISIONS

- 1. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 1.
- 2. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 2.
- 3. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 3.
- 4. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 4.
- 5. We recommend that Decision No. 5 be amended to read: "that Fremont Lodge No. 15 ask for a dispensation to do courtesy work on a petition of Faith Lodge No. 181, on an Entered Apprentice Mason, who presently owns a bar." We recommend that Decision as amended be approved.
- 6. The Committee wishes to amend Decision No. 6, inserting the words "assuming the equipment was owned by the DeMolay Chapter".

  We recommend approval of Decision No. 6 as amended.
- 7. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 7
- 8. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 8.
- 9. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 9.
- 10. We recommend the approval of Decision No. 10.

#### DISPENSATIONS

The next order of business was the approval of his dispensations which were referred to in a paragraph indicating there were 26. Those decisions were provided to us on a separate sheet. We have reviewed them and there were two of them to move their charter to new buildings. There were four of them to move their charter for one day for degrees, installation for this An-

nual Communication. There was one to solicit food, there were two to expedite the work with less time between degrees that is prescribed. There were two post and examine for proficiency brethren who had let the time expire. There was one asking for dual membership, there were three to hold a delayed election for an election of an officer, and there were seven to install officers after the original installation ceremony. The Committee recommends approval of these twenty-two dispensations. I so move.

# R. W. T. LEO STINES, DEPUTY GRAND MASTER:

Brethren, it has been moved and seconded that we accept the twenty-two special dispensations. All in favor, vote with the usual sign of a Mason when voting. Down hands. Opposed same sign. Carried.

# M.'.W.'. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER:

Dispensations No. 7 and 9, I will read and then give our recommendations. Right Angle Lodge No. 303, permission to move their regular meeting one week because of New Years Day. Granted. Liberty No. 300, permission to move regular meeting because of holiday to fulfill joint installation on January 8, granted. The Committee recommended disapproval of these two dispensations. I so move.

# R.'.W.'. T. LEO STINES, DEPUTY GRAND MASTER

Brethren, you have heard the recommendation of the committee, disapproval of these two dispensations. All in favor signify by the usual sign of a Mason when voting. Down hands. Opposed same sign. Carried.

# M.'.W.'. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER:

Dispensations No. 20 and 21 - same subject. Right Angle No. 303 - permission to change regular meeting without by-law change -- denied. Liberty Lodge No. 300, permission to change regular meeting without by-law change - denied. The Committee recommends the approval of this action. I so move. Motion carried.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

No. 1 - I submit for approval the following recommendation of the Grand Lodge Office Committee: that Section 1-105 - MILEAGE AND PER DIEM - be amended to read, "12 cents per mile for each mile traveled going to Grand Lodge, to be estimated by the most direct route and ten dollars per day for each day's attendance". After checking with the Appropriation Committee and finding that raises the cost of an Annual Communication approximately \$4,000, the committee recommends approval of that recommendation. I so move. Motion carried.

Recommendation No. 2 - At the present time our Grand Lodge Law has a provision referred to as perpetual jurisdiction over a petitioner. I would like to recommend that we amend this provision by limiting this jurisdiction to a period of two years, and that it be referred to the Committee on Codification of the Law with a proper resolution to be presented to this Annual Communication for a vote thereon. After much heated discussion, the Jurisprudence Committee recommends the amendment of the two year period, to read three year period and that upon balloting, a majority, not unanimous approve the recommendation. As Chairman of the Committee I so move the adoption of that recommendation. Motion carried.

#### AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

In the Advanced Proceedings, the Grand Master lists his approval to the amendment of the by-laws of fifty-four lodges. Many of whom were by-law

changes necessitated by the increase of the Grand Lodge dues in 1976 from \$2.00 to \$3.00. At the examination of the amendments, the Committee recommended approval of that action. I so move. Motion carried.

The report of the Jurisprudence Committee, as a whole, was approved.

## M.'.W.'. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER:

Further action of the Jurisprudence Committee adopted after it was duly moved and seconded, that the proposed revision of the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Nebraska as submitted to the subordinate lodges and as further amended by the Jurisprudence Committee, be referred to the Committee on Codification of the Law, to be proposed as bylaws by said Committee at this communication, as permitted by Section 1-316 of the By-laws.

Now, if you will turn to the copy that was mailed to you of the By-laws, which you were requested to bring with you, we would review with you the changes that are being changed in the Jurisprudence Committee, those that would have some subsidies changed. There were some other typographical that we would also have changed. Turning first to page 36 under Section 2-501 - MEETING PLACES - It makes reference in there that other Orders may be permitted to use the Lodge hall, and it says, "It may, however, be used by other secret orders if their principles are not unmasonic." The amendment would strike the word "secret" so that it would read: "only be used by other orders."

On page 37, under Section 2-504 - The second paragraph reads, "a lodge cannot be called off from one day or night to another day or night, except in cases of trials and funerals". Because of the change that was proposed last year in Section 2-504, in which you may open an emergent lodge and keep it open all year, the words "and funerals" was deleted from that Section. The next one is on page 38 under Section 2-508 - PUBLIC PROCESSIONS AND SERVICES - No subordinate lodge shall participate in promiscuous parades or processions. That was amended to read "no subordinate lodge may, without the Grand Master's consent" participate in parades or processions. If you have the approval from the Grand Master, you may participate in a parade.

On page 73, under Section 3-911, in which we have several requests from Secretaries of lodges, to include in that section a clarification of what the lodge should ask for from an applicant who is asking for reinstatement after three years of suspension for non-payment of dues. In the contents of the Section where it states "Each application for such reinstatement shall be accompanied by a statement showing the financial and physical condition of the applicant", we wish to insert after the word "accompanied" the phrase "by the dues for the year for which suspended, the dues for the current year and" the physical statement. Those are the subsidies changes which would be proposed by the Jurisprudence Committee to the copy to be given to the Codification Committee.

With those changes, I would then move for the approval of this recommendation from the Jurisprudence Committee to the Codification Committee, the revision of our proposed by-laws. Motion carried.

# M.'.W.'. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER:

Further action of the Jurisprudence Committee, it was duly moved and seconded and approved that a resolution be referred from the Jurisprudence Committee to the Committee on The Codification of the Law, to replace the resolution which was balloted upon yesterday and in which, in the opinion of the Parliamentarian of the Codification Committee, that it was improperly received because it did not have unanimous consent for the amendment made thereto. This resolution would be proposed that Section 3-102(d) amended to include a new resolution to be numbered (i) "the dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors including wine and beer except in an official ceremony of any Masonic Lodge or appendant bodies thereof, in any portion of the lodge building where Masonic activities are held". I would move the approval of this motion, that the resolution be referred from the Jurisprudence Committee to the Codification Committee and they in turn will present it to you for your approval as a By-law. Motion carried.

# M.'.W.'. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER:

Having adopted the various sections of our report, I would not move that the report be adopted in total.

# R.'.W.'. T. LEO STINES, DEPUTY GRAND MASTER:

It has been moved and seconded that the report be adopted in its entirety. All in favor vote with the usual sign of Masons when voting, Down hands. Opposed same sign. Carried.

# M.'.W.'. DONALD R. SWANSON, PAST GRAND MASTER:

If I might at this time, I have, as an individual, a motion for amendment to the Constitution of this Grand Lodge, which I would present to the Grand Lodge. WHEREAS: your Committee on Revision of the By-laws of this Grand Lodge, have also been instructed to study the Constitution of the Grand Lodge, and has taken this task in hand and whereas the copy of the proposed Constitution as amended to realize by this Committee has been submitted for consideration to the subordinate lodges except for the further proposed amendment of deleting Section 1 sub-section (e) of Article X and renumbering this sub-paragraph, Such amended proposal is attached to this motion and made a part thereof by reference, Now, therefore, I undersigned Donald R. Swanson, as Chairman of the Committee for the Revision of the By-laws and member of this Grand Lodge, move the proposed Constitution and all Articles and Sections therein contained, and as attached herefore be adopted including all the amendments thereto contained, and that the exisitng Constitution and the Articles and Sections thereof be repealed.

It has also been seconded by five or six members of this Grand Lodge. You would understand that this Constitution proposal change would lay over and be submitted to your subordinate lodges for balloting during the year.

# M.'.W.'. NORRIS W. LALLMAN, GRAND SECRETARY:

I have several resolutions that have been presented before this Grand Lodge opened, to be presented at this Grand Lodge Communication. Either of these would require unanimous consent to be adopted at this Communication.

No. 1 BE IT RESOLVED: that Section 3-102 sub-section (M) THE POSSESSION OR USE OF ALL KEYS, CIPHERS or printed material relating to the ritualistic work of Ancient Craft Masonry, be deleted from the by-laws.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT an additional section be added to the by-laws in the proper place to read "The Grand Lodge will issue each subordinate lodge 6 copies of the ritualistic work of Ancient Craft Masonry".

This resolution will be acted upon at the 120th Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge in June, 1977.

The following resolution was presented:

BE IT RESOLVED - That section 2-605 - LODGE DUES - be amended as follows:

Lodge Dues - The dues assessed by all chartered lodges shall be payable on January 1st of the year for which they are assessed and shall be come delinquent February 1st of the same year.

On or before thirty days before the last stated meeting of the lodge held before March 31 of each year, it shall be the duty of the secretary to notify each member in writing, who may be in arrears for dues for the current year, of such fact and request payment thereof before March 31 of that year; and if such member fails to pay his dues on or before March 31 of such year he shall stand automatically suspended for non-payment of dues on April 1st of the current year and entry thereof shall be made in the minutes at the first subsequent stated meeting of the lodge. It shall be the duty of the secretary to notify by written notification all members automatically suspended for non-payment of dues. Provided when the post office address of the suspended member is unknown, notice shall be mailed to his last known post office address.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

M. W. Grand Master and Brethren:

Your Committee on Codification of the Law has worked with the Committee for Revision of the By-Laws and the report of that Committee containing a complete revision of the By-Laws has been submitted by mail to the subordinate lodges to study. This report has also been referred to the Jurisprudence Committee which has approved the same, and by your action in approving the report of the Jurisprudence Committee, this report has been referred to the Codification Committee for codification. We have also taken into consideration the actions of this session of the Grand Lodge.

With the permission of the Grand Master, I will omit reading the entire report of these By-Laws, and I now request that permission. I will now go through the proposed By-Laws as submitted to the subordinate Lodges and point out the changes brought about by the actions of this session of the Grand Lodge, to correct some typing errors and to make some minor changes by the Revision Committee since this report was typed.

With me here is the Chairman of the Revision Committee, M.'.W.'. Donald R. Swanson and we, with those other committee members who may be present, will be pleased to attempt to answer any questions that you may have.

Your Committee on Codification of the Law now submits this report of the proposed revision of the By-Laws of this Grand Lodge as changed by this presentation, and move the adoption of these proposed By-Laws, including all Sections and Paragraphs thereof in toto.

Section 1-105 - MILEAGE AND PER DIEM - This was just passed here this morning. We have changed the mileage from 10¢ to 12¢ instead of stating "going to" Grand Lodge, we have inserted "one way" to Grand Lodge, and we have changed the \$5.00 per diem to \$10.00 per diem.

In order to codify and take care of the change regarding perpetual jurisdiction which was just made this morning by your acceptance of the report of the Jurisprudence Committee and the matter was referred to us and we have prepared, we feel sure, by making changes in a number of by-laws which would be affected by this action. The first one is Section 2-804 which was entitled Perpetual Jurisdiction. We are amending that to read as follows: Section 2-804 - JURISDICTION. If a petitioner has a lawful Masonic residence at the time his petition is received, the subordinate lodge retains jurisdiction of such petitioner for a period of three years from and after the date such petition has been formally accepted. A lodge does not lose jurisdiction, during said three year period of time, by a petitioner's removal, though permanent, previous to receiving the degrees, unless it waives such jurisdiction. It may waive such jurisdiction over a petitioner, Entered Apprentice or Fellow Craft, who has permanently removed from the jurisdiction. The only changes that we are making are just to take care of the three year jurisdiction.

Section 2-904, entitled Previous Rejections. To make that correlate with action this morning, we will amend Section 2-904 to read as follows:

Section 2-904 - PREVIOUS REJECTION - No subordinate lodge shall initiate into the mysteries of Freemasonry any person whomsoever, without first being satisfied that no petition has been formally accepted from said petitioner by some other lodge within the preceding three years. If it shall appear that any petitioner has made application to another lodge, which application has been formally accepted by that lodge within the preceding three years, except those mentioned in Section 2-806, such petition shall not be referred to the committee as provided by Section 2-905, until receipt of a waiver from such other lodge, which waiver shall be by unanimous ballot of the lodge wherein petitioner first made application for initiation. Provided, that where such petition recites a former application, which has been formally accepted within the preceding three years, to a lodge which is now extinct, a waiver shall be obtained from the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master when Grand Lodge is not in session.

If I can digress just momentarily, there is another change by action taken at this session.

Section 2-902 - QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES - and by your vote yesterday, we have deleted section or paragraph 5 of these qualifications. This paragraph read: "that he be not engaged in the manufacturing or sale of a beverage of intoxicating liquor, including wine and beer. That paragraph 5 will be deleted from the printed material and we have renumbered the paragraph 6 to read paragraph 5.

Going ahead now with the subject of the three year matter, we have a-mended Section 2-906 - NO WITHDRAWAL - After a petition has been read and formally accepted by a subordinate lodge, it cannot be withdrawn. Upon such formal acceptance the petitioner becomes, and thereafter remains for a period not to exceed three years, the material of the lodge un-

less a waiver is made by unanimous ballot. Provided, however, that when a petitioner is found to be ineligible by reason of physical defects as set forth in Section 2-902 (5) above, or when the petitioner is found not to be within the jurisdiction of the lodge, such petition shall be withdrawn before ballot thereon and the fees accompanying such petition shall be returned to petitioner. An objection made prior to the ballot upon a petition shall not operate as a withdrawal of such petition.

The next one to be changed in conjunction with the three year jurisdiction is on page 50 Section 2-912 - REMOVAL OF OBJECTIONS. We have amended that to read: A petitioner against whom objections have been made may petition anew as soon as the objections are terminated as set forth in Section 2-1101 (f). Such new petition shall follow the same course as an original petition for initiation.

Section 2-1101 - OBJECTIONS Sub-paragraph (f). This defines the termination of an objection. We have amended to read as follows: "An objection shall terminate three years after being made or shall be terminated earlier by the death of the objector, by being withdrawn by him, by his ceasing to be a Master Mason in good standing or upon his demitting from the lodge, unless renewed by him at that time. Also in keeping with this change, we are amending Section 2-1101 - OBJECTIONS BY DELETING PARAGRAPH (g) and paragraph (i) which had to do with terminations and have already been covered, then the other subsection following (g) will have to be re-lettered in order to conform.

In keeping with the action taken here this morning again as the result of the report of the Jurisprudence Committee, having to do with Masonic Offenses and this is a part of Section 3-102 entitled ENUMERATED OFFENSES. We will add a sub-paragraph (i) to include the following newly enacted offense, which will read as follows: "The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official ceremony of any Masonic lodge or appendant body thereof, in any portion of a lodge building where Masonic activities are held."

With the permission of M. W. Grand Master, we will not read then, these 74 pages of proposed decisions. We have, I think covered the latest revisions that have been put in since this was printed and sent out to the subordinate lodges. Your Committee, then, on Codification of the Law, submits this report including the 74 pages or whatever of proposed revisions as amended here this morning. We move the adoption of these revisions including all its chapters, sections and paragraphs in toto and further move that the existing by-laws be repealed.

## M.'.W.'. HAROLD HULTMAN, GRAND MASTER

You have a motion before the house to accept this report. What is your wish? All those in favor, signify by the usual sign of a Mason when voting. Down hands. Opposed same sign. Carried.

#### W. BERNARD T. PIPHER:

One final brief motion, in order to get this revision into printed form, it will be necessary, of course, for some introductory material to be prepared and an index to be prepared, and your Committee would therefore, move that the revision committee and Codification Committee working with them and the office staff, be authorized to prepare this material for printing by indexing and working up some suitable introductory material.

## M. W. HAROLD HULTMAN, GRAND MASTER:

I am certain that they don't want you sending them out a varifax copy, so we have a motion before the floor. What are your wishes? All those in favor, signify by the usual sign of Masons when voting. Down hands. Opposed same sign. So ordered.

## W. BERNARD T. PIPHER:

This report, M.'.W.'. Sir, is respectfully submitted by your Committee, consisting of Gladwyn A. Youngs, 210; Joseph N. Lindquist, 1 and myself from No. 31. We sincerely appreciate all of the help and assistance of the Past Grand Masters who worked on this revision and especially M.'.W.'. Brother Donald Swanson, and I move the adoption of the report as a whole.

## M. W. HAROLD HULTMAN, GRAND MASTER

We have a motion before the house that this report in full be adopted. All those in favor, signify by the usual sign of Masons when voting. Down hands. Opposed same sign. Carried.

I would like to remind the Grand Lodge Communication that one of the toughest jobs that we have had this last year, has been the work that these brothers have gone through. I feel that there are definitely two committees in Grand Lodge which have worked way beyond the call of duty, and this is one. I wonder if we could give the Codification of the Law Committee, a standing vote of appreciation.

#### W. BERNARD T. PIPHER:

Thank you, M.'.W.'. Grand Master, but I feel that should include M.'.W.'. Brother Swanson for his work.

# M.'.W.'. HAROLD HULTMAN, GRAND MASTER:

Last year at this time, as I was about to assume the duties of Grand Master, W. Brother Don asked me what he could help me with the most this year, and I said, "M. W. Sir, are you volunteering to try and get us a new law Book? I will accept gratefully your volunteering to do this." M. W. Brother Don consented that this would be one thing that he would put all of his efforts in this year. I want to compliment you, Don, on an excellent job. Thank you.

At this time we will hear the final report of the Appropriation Committee by Brother Walter Truex.

## W. WALTER TRUEX:

M.W. Grand Master, brethren of the Grand Lodge. This is the final report of the Appropriations Committee for this year's budget. This includes the period of May 1, 1976 to April 30, 1977. Our final report is exactly the same as the Preliminary report which I presented to this Grand Lodge yesterday.

# THE ROLL OF DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren, these together with the Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

Note: From 1880 until 1910, there were no recorded appointments of brethren to serve as assistants to the Grand Custodian. In 1910 Brother Robert E. French did hold special meetings to examine and instruct brethren who were willing to become "assistants" in the work. Thirteen brethren were nominated and approved for appointment as assistants. After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians". In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians". The following brethren appeared in the records as "assistant custodians" or at times as "Deputy Custodians."

## MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A. L. ) "In the year of light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A.L.L.) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. Dep. ) "In the year of the deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A. O. ) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A. Beo. ) "In the year of the blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. M. ) "In the year of the world."

#### RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons — Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1976 and 4,000-5976

Royal Arch Masons — Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1976 and 530-2505.

Royal and Select Masters — Add 1,000 years to current year, thus: 1975 and 1,000-2976.

Knights Templar — From the Chrisitan era take 1,118; thus 1,118 from 1976-857.

Order of High Priesthood — To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1976 - 3888.

Scottish Rite - Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1976 and 3,760 - 5936.

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
