



BIOGRAPHICAL HAROLD C. WURDEMAN

M. W. Harold C. Wurdeman, the 116th Grand Master of Masons of Nebraska was born on May 8, 1911 at Columbus, Nebraska, the son of Charles and Elise Loseke Wurdeman.

He attended the Columbus Public Schools and graduated in 1928. He received his degree in Civil Engineering from Iowa State College in 1932 where he was a member of Delta Upsilon Fraternity.

On September 19, 1936, he was united in marriage with Irene Helen Miller of Marshalltown, Iowa. Three daughters, Gail, Sara and Susan and three granddaughters, Kelly, Annette and Jennifer Aerni became members of the family.

He has been a member of The Federated Church of Columbus (Congregational) for more than fifty years. He has served one or more terms on the several church boards and continues to serve as an usher one month each year.

He is a member of the Columbus Rotary Club, BPO Elks Lodge 1195 and was a member of the Columbus Chamber of Commerce, where he served as a member of their Board of Directors.

He is a partner in the Firm of Reed, Veach, Wurdeman & Associates, Architects and Consulting Engineers of Columbus, Nebraska, from which position he officially retired as of June 1, 1976. He has since served the firm on a part time basis as Architect and as a full time consultant and as engineering consultant. This situation was a result of his ever expanding Masonic duties and activities. He is a Registered Professional Land Surveyor in Nebraska, a Registered Professional Engineer in Nebraska and a Registered Professional Architect in Nebraska, Kansas and South Dakota.

Harold C. Wurdeman was initiated June 24, 1964; passed August 19, 1964 and Raised September 23, 1964 in Lebanon Lodge No. 323, Columbus. He served as Master of that Lodge in 1968. He received his Certificate of Proficiency in 1966 and has regularly renewed it to the present time.

2, 1975; Worthy Patron 1977 and 1978. On April 16, 1980 he received the DeMolay Honorary Legion of Honor Award.

LODGE: He was appointed Grand Marshal of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in 1971 by M. W. Russell L. Fickes. He was re-appointed to this position by the following four Grand Masters: Howard J. Hunter — 1972; Frank J. Mattoon — 1973; Donald R. Swanson — 1974 and Harold Hultman —1975. Consequently, these five Grand Masters knew that all cornerstone ceremonies and Lodge dedications would be conducted with dispatch and decorum.

He was appointed in the advancing line of the Grand Lodge as Grand Junior Deacon by M.'.W.'. T. Leo Stines in 1976. He was appointed Grand Senior deacon by M.'.W.'. Alfred B. Saum in 1977. Elected Grand Junior Warden in June 1978, Grand Senior Warden in June 1979, Deputy Grand Master in June 1980 and was elected and installed as the 116th Grand Master of The Grand Lodge of Masons of Nebraska, June 13, 1981.

M.'.W.'. Harold C. Wurdeman has demonstrated his intense devotion to the ideals and principles of Masonry through the years and since receiving his Certificate of Proficiency in 1966, has been a stickler for perfection in the Esoteric Ritualism of Masonry and its various appendant bodies.



The Grand Lodge was then closed in ample form.



RESPONSE TO THE ADDRESS OF WELCOME M. W. JOSEPH C. TYE, PAST GRAND MASTER

M. W. Grand Master, Grand Lodge officers, Distinguished Guests, Delegates and Masons all. It is a real pleasure for me on behalf of Rob Morris Lodge No. 46 to welcome this 125th Annual Communication. It is particularly pleasing because this is the fourth time the Grand Lodge has convened in Kearney, Nebraska. At the beginning of the Grand Lodge in Nebraska, of course, we started in Omaha, and for many, many years Grand Lodge and Omaha were synonymous. It didn't seem to be possible that Grand Lodge would ever convene in any place other than Omaha. Some time after the commencing of the Grand Lodge, our brethren visited other jurisdictions and learned that in some jurisdictions in the United States, the Grand Lodges didn't always convene in the same city but methods differ in the particular states. Many of you know of the friendly combat between the Metropolitan City of Omaha and the Capital City of Lincoln, and so there ensued something of a contest to see if Lincoln could not get Grand Lodge to convene in Lincoln. And ultimately that came to pass and we have convened in Lincoln a few times. Shortly after that, M. W. Brother Bottorf came from over near Hastings, from the village of Sutton and decided to try and meet in Hastings, which he did. We met over there, got along very well, and then stronghearted Mattoon from out at Sidney, decided we would try it in Kearney. He talked with a few of the Kearney members and most of us were very pessimistic, we were afraid that we couldn't get city boys to come out in the country to meet. They rather threatened us and said, "we are not going to drive off out there in the country, you fellows have always come to Omaha, and you can come down to Omaha again."

But Frank Mattoon staved by his guns and had that first meeting in Kearney in 1974. Much to our surprise and ultimate pleasure, we learned that the representation at that communication was the largest we had ever had. Following that in 1978, M. W. Brother Saum who was a Kearnevite and a member of Rob Morris Lodge No. 46, held the annual meeting that year in Kearney. And following that, M. W. Brother Hendrix had the meeting in Kearney. This year M. W. Sir, we are pleased that you have returned to Kearney and we welcome you, we trust you will have a pleasant and enjoyable meeting, and that you will consider Kearney again in the future. In that vein I feel I must mention the fact that there was some talk back in 1977 about the Grand Lodge quarters in Omaha, and I see our good friend M.W. Hultman made a report at the Annual Communication in 1978, that for the time being, they would remain in the quarters in Omaha. Since then, it seems and I have heard a little talk about it, vesterday, that there is some consideration of moving the headquarters out of downtown Omaha. Of course, as we country boys know, downtown Omaha is deteriorating. It isn't even a good cow town down there any more. You can't buy anything, they have got some high priced offices, the parking space has gone up sky high, there are no hotels down there. I don't know what this Hilton place is, but the cost is so we country boys can't afford to stay there. So they are considering moving out of downtown Omaha, going out into the suburbs where some people can afford to stay, but it just occurred to me that with that situation, there might be some thought about moving the Headquarters entirely outside of Omaha. And with the experience we have had at Kearney with our Annual Communications, maybe Grand Lodge better take a look at Kearney. We are close to the Interstate, we have some air service vet, we have some parking space, our hotels are not as high as they are in Omaha. While Lincoln and Omaha fight it out, lets move the headquarters outstate somewhere. I don't know about Lincoln, we don't pay much attention to Lincoln anymore.

Thank you, M. W. Sir, for the opportunity to welcome you, come again, have an enjoyable meeting, and Kearney will welcome you back next year, and the year after that.

RESPONSE WAS GIVEN BY M.'.W.'. HARRY A. SPENCER, PAST GRAND MASTER

M. W. Grand Master, Harold, I thank you for the privilege of responding for all of our Grand Representatives from other Jurisdictions near Nebraska, to your gracious and sincere welcome. I use this occasion to tell you I am still grateful to you for coming down to Lincoln last December to present me my Commission as the Representative of the United Grand Lodge of England. The Mother Grand Lodge of the World. All Nebraska Masons owe their Masonic existence indirectly to one of the two Grand Lodges of England, which issued charters to those American lodges through which came the organization of our Grand Lodge. A brief note on the History of the Lodge I represent may not be out of order. On June 4, 1717 four London Lodges organized the Grand Lodge of England, known as the Moderns. In 1751 the Grand Lodge we referred to as the Ancients came into existence.

These two lodges united in 1813 to form the United Grand Lodge of England, which I now have the pleasure to represent. I am particularly pleased to represent the United Grand Lodge of England, because I was born in England. I am sure every Grand Representative here shares the same feeling of pride that I do, in the representation of his Jurisdiction. As Grand Representatives we represent in Nebraska the interest of the Grand Lodge by which we have been accredited. In this way, we attempt to maintain the unity and the universality of Masonry. We realize in accepting our appointment as Grand Representative, we assumed a certain responsibility. We are expected to keep that Lodge informed as to the status of Masonry in this Jurisdiction. In doing so, we should write to the Grand Secretary of the Grand Jurisdiction, we individually represent, extending our greetings and summarizing the principal actions taken at this 125th Communication, which we feel may be of interest to it. M.: W.: Grand Master, we congratulate you on the work you

There were 127 Masters of subordinate lodges introduced themselves and were individually greeted by the Grand Master.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

Brethren:

In compliance with Article X, Section 3, paragraph (b) of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge, I submit this report of my official acts during this past year.

I must first express my appreciation to the members of this Grand Lodge for having accorded me the honor of serving as your Grand Master. It has been a busy year. The day following my installation, Lebanon Lodge No. 323, AF & AM and Harmony Chapter No. 13, O.E.S. held a reception in Columbus for all Grand Lodge Officers and their wives. I want to take this opportunity to thank them again for such a fine reception. By nine o'clock the next morning I was in Schuyler participating in the ground breaking ceremony for the new Masonic Temple for Acacia Lodge No. 34. And so it went.

Being fully aware that this office has responsibilities as well, as honor, I made every effort to do those things required of me, those things expected of me and those things I thought should be done. I hope my actions this past year will merit the approval of this Grand Lodge.

I welcome all delegates and guests to this 125th Annual Communication of our Grand Lodge. I hope that you who are delegates will actively participate in the business presented and vote for the good of Masonry.

To our distinguished Guests I bid a special welcome. We are honored by your presence and hope you will enjoy your visit as much as we enjoy having you.

NECROLOGY

During the year just passed one of our Past Grand Masters, Edward F. Carter and 914 of our Brethren passed beyond the sable curtain to that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveler returns.

Later in this session proper tribute will be paid to our departed Brethren by the Committee on Fraternal Dead.

I believe this is the appropriate time to announce that M.'.W.'. Brother Louis V. Sylvester has volunteered to locate the graves of all deceased Past Grand Masters and see that they are properly cared for. I would like to see an individual or a committee appointed each year to follow up on this work to assure continual care of the graves.

CENTENNIALS AND ANNIVERSARIES

On June 23, 1981, at the invitation of the Worshipful Master, I attended the Charter Night activities of Lincoln Lodge No. 19. The lodge was opened and I was properly received after which a dinner was held in the Temple dining room. I was invited to make a few remarks and some introductions after which the guests were shown the film "Symbol of Pride".

On June 28, 1981, at the invitation of the officers and brethren of St. Paul Lodge No. 82, I attended their Centennial Celebration in St. Paul. Following a dinner at the American Legion Hall, the guests assembled at the Masonic Temple for a program of musical selections and a history of St. Paul Lodge. I gave a short address and presented St. Paul Lodge No. 82 with a Centennial Certificate.

On September 16, 1981, at the invitation of the officers and brethren of Composite Lodge No. 81, I attended their Centennial Celebration in Rising City. Following a dinner at the Rising City Fire Hall, the guests were entertained by musical selections and a history of Composite Lodge No. 81. I made some introductions and presented Composite Lodge No. 81 with a Centennial Certificate. Our Grand Orator, Worshipful Brother James N. DeMoss gave an address appropriate for the occasion.

CORNER-STONE AND DEDICATION CEREMONIES

This past year the Grand Lodge conducted more corner-stone and dedication ceremonies than we have in any one of the past twelve years that I have been participating in them. The Grand Lodge laid six corner-stones and dedicated five Masonic Temples. I believe this is a good sign that Masonry in Nebraska is alive and well.

Probably the highlight of my year was having the honor of laying the corner-stone for and dedicating my own Masonic Temple in Columbus.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mosaic Lodge No. 55 in Norfolk for arranging the corner-stone ceremony for the Senior Citizen's Center and for sponsoring the event. There are buildings, without a masonic connection, all around the State for which we could lay corner-stones if somebody thought about it and did something about it.

The support of the Grand Lodge Officers at these events was most gratifying. At the ceremonies in Columbus, all of the 13 Grand Lodge officers were present and there was a fine delegation of Past Grand Masters. At the dedication ceremony in Papillion, 12 of the 13 Grand Lodge Officers were present.

I must compliment our Grand Marshal, W.'. Brother Bill Keller, for the fine manner in which he performed his many duties in connection with these ceremonies.

I was permitted to participate in all of the corner-stone and dedication ceremonies conducted by the Grand Lodge in the 1970-1971 Masonic year, the year before I was first installed Grand Marshal. I have now actively participated, in one capacity or another, in every Corner-stone ceremony and every Dedication ceremony conducted by the Grand Lodge for twelve consecutive Masonic years.

GRAND LODGE AREA EDUCATION MEETINGS

The Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Education continued the program initiated by M.'. W.'. Brother Byron C.Jenkins. Last year's program was intended to reach all lodges east of Nebraska Highway No. 14 and this year's program was intended to reach all lodges west of that highway. I use the word "intended" because all lodges did not accept the invitation to attend.

The theme of these meetings was "Leadership", the lack of it and the great need for it. This will be more fully covered in the report of the Committee on Masonic Education.

I must express my appreciation to M.².W.². Brother T. Leo Stines, Chairman of the Committee on Masonic Education, for his work in arranging the schedules, notifying the lodges involved and taking care of so many details and then acting as Master of Ceremonies for the meetings.

CUSTODIANS

After our Grand Custodian was elected Grand Secretary at the 124th Annual Communication, it became necessary for me to appoint a new Grand Custodian. It was my pleasure to appoint W.⁻. Brother Mannie O. Hansen, a Deputy Grand Custodian, to the office of Grand Custodian and he has been doing a fine job in fullfilling the duties of that office. I attended the Deputy Grand Custodian's School in Grand Island last September and, in my opinion, he conducted the school in a most competent manner.

On the recommendation of our Grand Custodian, and with the approval of the Committee on Nebraska Work, I appointed Augustine (Gus) Scolaro Deputy Grand Custodian to replace our new Grand Custodian. I presented W.'. Brother Scolaro with his commission at a dinner in Omaha on July 24, 1981.

During this last year I have called on a number of Deputy Grand Custodians for help or for information about a lodge in their area and I have received some prompt and complete replies. These dedicated Masons represent the Grand Lodge in their areas and they are doing a fine job.

REINSTATEMENTS

I approved 31 applications for reinstatement this past year, none were rejected. All applications were approved by the committee appointed by the subordinate lodge and by the Grand Lodge Committee on Applications for Reinstatement.

Some of the petitioners answered the questions concerning their financial condition, some put in the word "personal" and some left the spaces blank. This might have been sufficient cause to reject the petition but I believe some of these petitions would have been withdrawn if the petitioners were required to furnish the information which they considered personal. Another petition indicated that the petitioner was in poor health, had no job and an inadequate income but I approved it because it had been approved by the committee appointed by the subordinate lodge and by the Grand Lodge Committee on Applications for Reinstatement.

Later in this report I will recommend that the requirement for a financial statement to be included with the petition for reinstatement be deleted from the By-laws of the Grand Lodge. I consider it an invasion of privacy, it is not being used and the decision to approve or reject a petition for reinstatement should be based primarily on the report of the committee appointed by the subordinate lodge. This committee is expected to have made a complete investigation of the petitioner before approving or not approving the petition.

BY-LAW AMENDMENTS

During the year I approved 39 by-law amendments for subordinate lodges.

31 involved changes in dues and/or fees,

3 involved revising special funds,

1 involved changing date of auditing,

1 involved changing the date of the lodge memorial service,

2 involved changing the time or day of the regular meetings,

1 involved changing the salary of the Secretary.

CONSOLIDATIONS

During the year four consolidations were approved.

Eminence Lodge No. 223, Giltner, with Keystone Lodge No. 62, Phillips Gladstone Lodge No. 176, Ansley, with Custer Lodge No. 148, Broken Bow Antelope Lodge No. 276, Elgin, with Trowel Lodge No. 71, Neiligh, Bladen No. 319, Bladen with Charity No. 53 Red Cloud May 6, 1982.

Several other lodges have indicated a desire to consolidate but we are still trying to get them active rather than lose them by consolidation. In a number of cases this has been accomplished and Masonry in Nebraska is stronger because of it.

Ronin, PGM and Chairman Emeritus of the MSA as the Liaison Coordinator for the Grand Jurisdiction of Nebraska.

At the annual meeting of the Association, held in conjunction with the Grand Masters' Conference in Washington, D.C., I served as Chairman of the Finance Committee. Our recommendations included a change in dues structure and an increase in dues for member jurisdictions. The recommendations were approved.

On March 21, 1982, in company with M. W. Herbert A. Ronin, PGM, M. W. Warren D. Lichty, Jr., PGM, W. Jack Youngs, Grand Historian and Brother Bob

Adamsheck, Field Agent, I visited the Veteran's Hospital in Lincoln. I came away with a much better idea of the services the Field Agents provide and how much the patients appreciate them. These Field Agents contribute most generously of their time and I wish all of you could appreciate them as much as I do after having made that visit.

GRAND MASTERS' CONFERENCE

On February 22, 23 and 24, 1982, I attended the Conference of Grand Masters in North America in Washington, D.C. Others in the Nebraska delegation were M. W. Brother Herbert A. Ronin, PGM, R. W. Brother Paul R. Pierce, Deputy Grand Master and R. W. Brother Ralph W. Gerry, Grand Secretary. At the conference in Orlando, Florida in 1981 I was elected a member of the 1982 Conference Committee and served in that capacity in planning the 1982 conference in Washington.

The first morning the annual meeting of the George Washington National Masonic Memorial Association was held at the Memorial. Lunch on that day was served at the Scottish Rite House of the Temple, headquarters of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction. I highly recommend a visit to each of these magnificent structures to anyone visiting in our Nation's Capitol.

The Grand Masters' Banquet was held on Tuesday evening and the Nebraska delegation had Brothers J.J. Exon, Senator and Hal Daub, Member of Congress as our guests.

I was represented by M. W. Frank J. Mattoon at the regular meeting held by Kimball Lodge No. 294 on June 7, 1982. In attendance as special guests were two Past Grand Masters, Harold Mai and Floyd Holland, two Grand Lodge Officers and officers and members of Cheyenne, Pine Bluffs and Burns, Wyoming. Fellow Crafts and Entered Apprentices. The meeting was well attended. W. B. George E. Stieduhar and his officers should be congratulated for leadership, proficiency and initiative.

GENERAL PERMISSIONS

Permission was given to Kimball Lodge No. 294 to hold a regular meeting on a date other than that called for by their by-laws.

Permission was given to the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research to circulate a letter to all lodges requesting information of historical value.

Permission was given to Corinthian Lodge No. 83 to enter a float in a local parade.

Permission was given Ashlar Lodge No. 33 to solicit lodges within approximately 100 miles of Grand Island to participate in the Robert W. Boon Memorial Food Truck to the Masonic Home in Plattsmouth.

Permission was given to Harvard Lodge No. 44 to permit the Methodist Church to use the basement and back room of their temple for Sunday School classes on Sunday mornings.

Permission was given the Greater Omaha Masters and Wardens Club to solicit all lodges in the State for donations to their annual Christmas Fund Drive for the Plattsmouth and Fremont Homes.

Permission was given to Beatrice Lodge No. 26 to permit the Beatrice Elks Lodge to use their temple for Ritualistic and Degree Team Proficiency.

Permission was given to Porter Lodge No. 106 to extend the time for a Brother to pass his examination for proficiency in the Master Mason Degree.

Permission was given to Walter Miller, Executive Officer in Nebraska, Order of DeMolay, to solicit gifts to the Nebraska DeMolay Foundation.

Permission was given to Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, to distribute George Washington posters to subordinate lodges in Nebraska.

PERMISSIONS TO MOVE CHARTERS

DISPENSATIONS

During the year I approved 15 dispensations. Due primarily to the bad weather, I granted 9 dispensations to elect to install officers at a time other than the regular periods. I also granted 6 dispensations to confer one, two or all three degrees out of time. I waived the requirement for the fee in cases where the dispensation was required because of bad weather over which the lodge had no control and in cases where the candidate was a member of the Armed Forces.

DECISIONS

I contacted Merna Lodge No. 171, Merna and Zeredatha Lodge No. 160, Reynolds, about having missed two consecutive Annual Communications. Each lodge gave a satisfactory explanation and was forgiven.

I received a letter from the Masonic Temple Craft of Omaha, owner of the

Downtown Omaha Masonic Temple Building prior to the sale of that building, asking if the Grand Lodge office and the several lodges now renting space in the building could continue as tenants if the top two floors were rented to a tenant selling alcoholic beverages. I informed them that in my opinion they could not and further that I would oppose retaining the name "Masonic Temple" for the building.

I received a letter from the Supreme Council Order of the Amaranth requesting the names of the Masters of all of the subordinate lodges in the Grand Jurisdiction of Nebraska for the purpose of acquainting the Masons in Nebraska with their Order. I replied that the Order of the Amaranth was not included in the exceptions enumerated in Section 3-102 (h) of the Grand Lodge By-laws and therefore no Mason in Nebraska could join their Order unless our By-laws were revised. Therefore there would be no need for them to have the names of the Masters of our subordinate lodges. Their reply, of course, was that they would like to have us change our By-laws to permit Nebraska Masons to be members of the Order, but I do not plan to make it a recommendation.

I received a letter from William H. Campbell, formerly a member of John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290, Omaha, seeking restoration. He was expelled by action of the Grand Lodge at the 124th Annual Communication. I replied that restoration can only be granted by the Grand Lodge meeting in Annual Communication and explained how he might submit a petition for restoration.

I received a letter from a Brother asking if a regular meeting of a subordinate lodge could be open in the Entered Apprentice degree so all Masons could attend. I replied that our By-laws state that eight Master Masons, members of the lodge, must be present but do not specifically state that the lodge must be open in the Master Mason degree. Section 2-1001 states "None but Master Masons, members of the lodge, can vote —". In my opinion, the intent of the law is clear and conducting regular meetings in a lodge open in the Master Mason degree has been a well established custom and I could not approve any change from that practice.

After considerable investigation and exchange of correspondence, I cleared the record of Brother Harold O. Simon, a member of Gothenburg Lodge No. 249, Gothenburg. While a member of Cambridge Lodge No. 150, Cambridge, Brother Simon was suspended for non-payment of dues in December, 1939 and was reinstated in April, 1945. During this time he served in the Armed Forces. He was never notified of his suspension and continued to make payments on his dues. His back dues were paid in full at the time of his reinstatement.

In a similiar case, I cleared the record of Brother Guy DeVore, a member of Keystone Lodge No. 62, Phillips. Brother DeVore was raised in January, 1924, expelled in May, 1936 and restored in June 1944. This would make him eligible for a 50 year badge in 1982. However, there was some question about a suspension in 1950. The records of Keystone Lodge No. 62 and the records

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of the Grand Lodge do not agree on this, but the records of Keystone Lodge No. 62 show that his dues were paid during that period. Since the record was not clear and since his dues were all paid, I directed that the records be cleared of any reference to a suspension in 1950, and that he was eligible to receive his 50 year badge in 1982. I did not clear the record of his expulsion in 1936.

I was informed by the Grand Secretary that a Nebraska lodge had been asked for a waiver of jurisdiction for a Nebraska resident who wanted to join a lodge in Iowa. A member of the lodge placed an objection with the Master and the matter was not presented at the meeting. I replied that a subordinate lodge cannot issue a waiver of jurisdiction from the entire Grand Jurisdiction of Nebraska. Such a waiver would have to be approved by every lodge in the State or by the Grand Master. My reply also stated that if I were requested to grant this waiver, I would not do so in view of the objection which had already been made. I did not receive a request to grant a waiver of jurisdiction.

McCook Lodge No. 135 requested permission to use the lodge funds to purchase material to construct a wheel chair ramp at the home of a brother. I ruled that this was in fact, contributing to the relief of a brother distressed and approved the use of lodge funds.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The last sentence of Section 2-305 of the Grand Lodge By-laws reads as follows: "An irregular installation as a Warden will not render him ineligible." This same sentence appears in some of the older editions of our By-laws but I do not think it accurately reflects the intent of the law. I recommend that the last sentence of Section 2-305 be amended to read "An irregular installation as a Warden will not render him eligible."

The first sentence of Section 2-501 of the Grand Lodge By-laws reads as follows: "A subordinate lodge cannot meet in a private house, in a hall over a saloon or over or in a public dance hall." I believe the word "saloon" has a little different meaning today than it had when this phrase was written into our by-laws. On at least two occasions in the past the Grand Master has approved a meeting place over an establishment which sells beer because the establishment did not conform to his definition of a saloon. These decisions were approved by the Grand Lodge. To avoid further attempts to define a saloon, I recommend that the first sentence of Section 2-501 be amended to read as follows: "A subordinate lodge cannot meet in a private house or over or in a public dance hall".

The second sentence of the second paragraph of Section 2-502 of the Grand Lodge By-laws reads as follows: "This majority, however, must be at least equal to the majority of the members residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the lodge." I believe this sentence should have been deleted when the State became one concurrent jurisdiction. I recommend that the second sentence of the second paragraph of Section 2-502 be deleted.

The second sentence of Section 3-911 of the Grand Lodge By-laws reads as

follows: "Each application for such reinstatement shall be accompanied by the dues for the year for which suspended, the dues for the current year and a statement showing the financial and physical condition of the applicant and his immediate family". Earlier in this report, under reinstatements, I enumerated several reasons why I believe the requirement for a statement of financial and physical condition should be removed from this section. I recommend that the second sentence of Section 3-911 be amended to read as follows: "Each application for such reinstatement shall be accompanied by the dues for the year for which suspended and the dues for the current year".

During this past year I came to realize how much Grand Lodge business, involving many of the Grand Lodge officers, is conducted by telephone. I recommend that all future lists of Grand Lodge officers, published in the annual Proceedings and in the Secretary's Desk Book, include both the home and business telephone numbers of all Grand Lodge officers.

As costs continue to increase with ever rising prices and our income continues to drop with declining membership, we are approaching the point where our expenses will exceed our income. The Board of Grand Trustees recommends an increase in the per capita tax to keep our income from falling below our expenses. I recommend that the per capita tax be increased \$2.00, from \$5.00 to \$7.00, starting January 1,1983 and that Sections 1-406, 2-601 and other applicable sections of the Grand Lodge By-laws be amended accordingly.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

I have traveled across the State as a Grand Lodge officer for eleven years and I have seen a positive improvement in the State of the Craft. We are seeing more young men brought into Masonry and we are seeing more young men filling the chairs in our subordinate lodges. I believe it is a good sign that we dedicated more Masonic Temples this past year than we have in any one year for at least the past twelve years.

We do have some lodges, both small and large, which need help. Since my lodge has about 200 members, I may be somewhat prejudiced in favor of smaller lodges, but I believe the trouble with some of our larger lodges is that they are too large. They are too impersonal and may have hundreds of members on the roll who do nothing but pay dues. Those who actively participate in the activities of the lodge represent a small percentage of the total membership. I would like to see about ten more lodges formed and limit the membership of all subordinate lodges to about 400 members. I would like to make this a recommendation but I am sure it would not be accepted, for financial reasons if for no other.

A number of smaller lodges have expressed a desire to consolidate. By correspondence and personal visits and by delegating others to represent me, I have tried to encourage these lodges to do those things which could keep them active and again become an active participating part of masonry in Nebraska.

We have many dedicated Masons in Nebraska who give generously of their

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time to help lodges that want help. We have had excellent cooperation from some of the appendant bodies and I believe our efforts have already saved some lodges which we might otherwise have lost by consolidation.

Our Membership Committee, under the leadership of Charles W. Amidon, Grand Senior Deacon has been doing a fine job and we are now seeing the results of their labor.

In general, the State of the Craft is good and improving. If we continue to work with the weak and inactive lodges it can be even better.

APPRECIATION

I am indebted to so many persons that I could not possibly name them all here, but I will point out a few to whom I wish to express my sincere appreciation.

To my wife, Irene, for more reasons than I could enumerate here.

To the Grand Lodge officers and Past Grand Masters for their cooperation and support. In particular, to M. W. Brother Russell L. Fickes for first appointing me Grand Marshal in 1971 and to M. W. Brother T. Leo Stines for appointing me Grand Junior Deacon in 1976.

To the officers and brethren of Lebanon Lodge No. 323 in Columbus for a wonderful reception for the Grand Lodge officers and their wives and for their gifts and for opening and closing a lodge of Master Masons for this Annual Communication.

To the Grand Secretary and to the entire Grand Lodge office staff for their cooperation and assistance.

To the members of this Grand Lodge who, by their vote, gave me the opportunity to serve as Grand Master.

This has been a most interesting experience and I hope my conduct has been such as to merit the approval of the Craft.

ALASKA

IRAN

Iranian Masons who have fled their country can now be assisted by the Commission if they so desire to affiliate with a regular Grand Lodge. Masonry as an organization no longer exists in Iran.

ITALY

Although Lodge P-2 was suspended by the Grand Orient in 1976, appropriate action by the Grand Orient was not executed until 1981. Licio Gelli has now been suspended and charges filed against him. The commission recommends no action at this time.

BRAZIL

Grande Loja Da Guanabara appears to have some connection with Lodge P-2 Italy. At least no explanation has been forthcoming on their connection with Gelli.

NIGERIA

The Commission reported in 1981 that the United Grand Lodge of England had voted to sponsor a United Grand Lodge of Nigeria. (This was reported in error.) There is no change in the situation in Nigeria.

THE NEBRASKA SOCIETY FOR MASONIC RESEARCH

W. B. Lynn Alexander, Secretary gave the report which was adopted.

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

I am very happy to have this opportunity to report on the status of the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research.

Formed on December 30, 1980 by four Masons who were interested in researching and preserving the rich heritage of Freemasonry in Nebraska, the Society now has 27 members from five states and one foreign country. Our Charter Membership will remain open until we have reached the number that represents the number of lodges in Nebraska.

The Society believes that Freemasonry had an intimate connection with frontier society and the growth and development of Nebraska. There is a wealth of historical material lost in the closets, attics, and basements of the lodges across the state. One of our objectives is to encourage lodges to search out this material and bring it to light where it can inspire and enrich the lives of present day Masons.

Although our Society is young and of limited resources, we have several on-going projects which we believe will be of benefit to the Craft. We are preparing the first edition of a publication to be called "The Nebraska Masonic Review," in which we will print new research as well as reprint articles of particular interest to Nebraska Freemasons. Another project involves a committee headed by Brother J. Eugene P. Jorgenson which assists lodges in presenting Table Lodges, and in displaying our collection of masonic artifacts.

On-going research projects at this time, include a study of Monitor Lodge U.D. in the 1st Nebraska Cavalry during the Civil War; the Masonic life of Worshipful Brother William Bowen, Grand Secretary 1872-1899; and the Masonic writings of Most Worshipful Robert E. French, Grand Master 1880, and Grand Custodian 1901-1927.

Several lodges and individuals have contributed and loaned materials to our long range goal of establishing a library and museum. We have brought a display of some of these items for the enjoyment of the delegates to this Communication. In order to assume liability for the care of this growing collection, the Society has been incorporated and has been granted non-profit status by the Internal Revenue Service. All contributions to the Society are now fully tax deductible.

We wish to extend our sincere thanks to The Most Worshipful Grand Master Harold C. Wurdeman, and Most Worshipful Byron C. Jenkins, both of whom during their terms have been of great help and encouragement to the Society. We also sincerely thank the Grand Secretary for his advice, and help in ways too numerous to mention during the past year.

The Society looks forward to the coming year and sincerely hopes that its work will prove to be of great benefit to the Craft.

I want to direct the attention of the Grand Lodge to our interesting display of artifacts in room 100. At that location, we will also be happy to talk to the brethren about joining our Society. I would also like to direct the attention of the Brethren present to the Square and Compass resting on the Holy Bible this morning. That Square and Compass set is the original set that was used at the First Communication of this Grand Lodge. On June 2, 1958, Grand Master, M : W : Robert C. Jordan, delivered his address to the second communicationof this Grand Lodge. He said, "I would suggest the priority of taking steps topreserve everything connected with Masonry in this territory. We may safelyinfer that in years hence, it will be interesting to brethren to refer to theProceedings of our day and generation." Today, The Nebraska Society for Masonic Research is dedicated to preserving and studying the history of Masonry just as M. W. Jordan suggested 124 years ago.

KIRK BROWN, STATE MASTER COUNCILOR, DEMOLAY

Grand Master Wurdeman, Brother Master Masons and friends. It is truly a pleasure and honor for me to be here and be able to speak to you, not only as the State Master Councilor but as a Master Mason. My year as State Master Councilor has been a great one and there have been many highlights, but I think perhaps, one of the greatest honors for me was back in July when I was raised to the degree of a Master Mason and our Grand Master was present. I will always remember and cherish that moment. It has been a successful year for us in DeMolay in Nebraska, and we are very proud of what we have accomplished this year. At the end of May, five months into the year, we have initiated as many members into DeMolay as we did in the first seven months in 1981. We finished 1981 in the top ten membership internationally and rank in the top ten again in 1982.

For the first time in a long time, we are having Masons come to us and ask how we can get DeMolay into their community. These figures I have given to all of you for comparison. Also comparisons can be misleading. While we are improving over the past few years in DeMolay, we are still a long way from where we can be and should be in Nebraska. We have areas where we would like to put DeMolay but there isn't the Masonic supporting interest there for DeMolay. The international status that I have talked about, in a way should reflect the problems DeMolay is facing around the world. When we go to our regional conferences, and when I was in Reno this spring for International Supreme Congress, we heard a lot of big talk from our fellow jurisdictions about all the great programs that they have and everything they are doing, and yet there is only one thing that I would change. I certainly wouldn't want their programs and everything that they do because they aren't having nearly the success that we are. But if I could take just one thing from these jurisdictions, it would be the strong support that they receive from all the Masonic bodies in their areas.

I really often cringe when I stop and hear them talk about the support that they give and the contributions that they get from their Masonic bodies. Especially when I think about the little things they are doing with all that they get. I can only dream about what we could do here in Nebraska with that kind of support.

Recently, I was attending a banquet and the Speaker was talking about how each one of the people in the audience was Masonry. Each one of us here is Masonry. And as DeMolays, we are the Foundation of the very building ground and the garden of Masonry, each one of you here is or should be DeMolay. I don't need to remind you that Masonry is the foundation of DeMolay. You have all heard it more times than you can remember. I don't need to mention the fact that 50% of DeMolay eventually become Master Masons.

DeMolay offers Masonry much more than just that. DeMolay spreads the Masonic word and teachings, often indirectly and helps to create new Masons. I was a young man in Masonry when I was 15 years old. At the age of 15 I was installed as Master Councilor of my chapter in Fremont. I happened to have a cousin who was 20 years old at the time, lived in a community of strong Lutherans, belonged to a church that didn't believe in Masonry and really didn't want their parishioners to be in Masonry. It was the first exposure he had had in DeMolay and Masonry, and he was so impressed with what he saw, that he went out and petitioned his local lodge and became a Master Mason. I think a lot of you have probably seen the movie starring Henry Fonda, called "On Golden Pond." One of the scenes in the movie was the fact that Henry Fonda, as an old grandfather, was taking care of a small boy during the summer. Henry Fonda and the young lad were both very depressed, because they just knew that they were not going to get along. But as the movie progressed, a great bond and a great love developed between this old man and the boy. DeMolays are doing good things and have a lot to offer. It has something to offer you in Masonry, just as the boy had to offer Henry.

A ballad written several years ago had a lot of meaning to me. It was called "Chap in the Cradle." It started out Harry Chapin was the father of a young boy who was born, walked while Harry was away, talked before Harry knew it. He always said, "I just want to be like you, Dad. I am going to be just like you." The father would leave home, the boy would ask him, "when are you coming back?" "I don't know when, but we will get together then, Son." "You know we will have a good time." So the boy grows and becomes ten years old. On his birthday his father gets him a ball, and the boy asks if he would show him how to throw and play. His dad said, "I have too much to do." The son says, "you know I am going to be like you, Dad." So the boy grows and comes home from college one day. His father says, "do you have time to sit for a while and talk?" The son smiles and shakes his head and says, "No, I really don't have time, can I have the car keys? I will see you later."

Later on the father retires and the son moves away and has his own family. The father calls him up one day and says, "I would like to see you." REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

M. W. Louis V. Sylvester, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful, The Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Your Committee on Work is pleased to make the following report relating to the esoteric and standard floor work of this Grand Lodge. Because our work has reached a high level of proficiency during the last years, we are pleased to advise that no problems of a controversial nature have presented themselves during this year, and the Committee was not called on for any decisions or clarifications. In our opinion this continues to reflect the deep dedication and devotion of our Grand Custodian and the Deputies and this Grand Lodge continues to owe a deep debt of gratitude to each.

With the appointment of Worshipful Brother Mannie O. Hansen by the Grand Master a year ago as Grand Custodian, succeeding Worshipful Brother Ralph W. Gerry, the transition was carried out very smoothly and no interruptions in the ongoing program of the Grand Custodian's office were encountered.

The Committee was also present to witness the School of Instruction and examination of the Deputy Custodians in Annual session in Grand Island. We are tremendously pleased at the high level of proficiency which our Deputies continue to reflect and the devotion they give as they work with the lodges in their respective districts.

It is with extreme sadness that the Committee, together with the Grand Custodian's office, noted the passing of Most Worshipful Brother Edward F. Carter. For many years Brother Ed. served as Chairman of the Committee on Work and it was largely due to his efforts that the present method of operation of the Grand Custodians office was established. He was chairman of the Committee established by Grand Lodge for the purpose of revision of the monitor a number of years ago, and was most influential in the adoption by the Grand Lodge of the standard plan of esoteric and floor work which we follow today.

As we pause in reflection and tribute to these our departed Brethren, we do so with a deep sense of loss, but with even more abiding gratitude to the Supreme Architect of the Universe who in His glorious providence enabled us to enter into the labors of Masonry with these our Brothers.

There were reported to the office of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, the record of death of 34 Past Grand Masters and 1 Grand Lodge Officer from 25 Grand Jurisdictions, 3 of these Jurisdictions being outside of the bounds of the U.S.A. The total number of deaths of Masons in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for the year 1981-82 as of May 7, 1982, was 914.

At this time we offer memorial tribute to these our Brethren who have passed beyond the vale of this earthly life. Let us now at this time hear the roll of $M^{,,}W^{,,}$ Edward F. Carter, PGM which was prepared and read by $M^{,,}W^{,,}$ Herbert A. Ronin, PGM at the Masonic funeral service. Following the reading, let us bow in silent prayer concluded by an address to the Throne of Grace by our Grand Chaplain.

(Reading of the Masonic Roll of M. W. Edward F. Carter, PGM)

Most Worshipful Brother Edward F. Carter was born in Middlebranch, Holt County, Nebraska on March 11, 1897. He graduated from the College at Law at the University of Nebraska in 1919, where he attained the Order of the Coir. He practiced law at Gering, Nebraska until 1927 when he was appointed District Judge. He was elected to the State Supreme Court in 1934 at the age of 37, the youngest man ever elected to our high court, which office he served with distinction from 1935 to 1971.

M. W. Brother Carter departed this mortal life on December 21, 1982 at his home in Lincoln, Nebraska. He left surviving him his wife, Vera; sons Lyle and Robert of Richland, Washington, Edward F. Carter, Jr. of Lincoln; daughters, Mrs. Dolores Graham of Omaha, Mrs. Barbara Jean Jenkins of Alamo, California; brothers A.B. Carter, Apache Junction, Arizona, Russell A. Carter, Seattle, Washington; sister Margaret Delaney of Lincoln, 13 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

M. W. Brother Carter took all three degrees in symbolic Masonry at Scottsbluff Lodge No. 201 at Gering, Nebraska. He was initiated an Entered Apprentice Mason on September 7, 1928; passed to the Fellowcraft Degree on January 18, 1929 and raised on February 22, 1929. He served as Worshipful Master of his Lodge in 1933-1934. In 1941 he was elected and served as the 77th Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska. He received his 50 year badge of Masonry two years ago at which time he was our oldest living Past Grand Master in tenure of service. He was a 33rd degree Scottish Rite Mason and was Chairman of its Educational Committee for many years. In this work he personally wrote numerous Masonic articles which received national publication and attention. He belonged to the York Rite Bodies of Masonry and the Knights of Pythias. He was the founder of Cornhusker Boys State which he served as President for many years. He was a distinguished judge of the Nurenburg trials in Germany after World War II.

One of Judge Carter's major contributions to our Grand Lodge was his splendid service for so many years as chairman of the Grand Lodge Committee on Work. In 1961 our Grand Lodge was still using its 1909 monitor. Judge Carter decided to revise our old monitor through his Committee on Work. Numerous changes were made where modern conditions justified it and the Thomas Smith Webb work was adhered to. The main exception was the funeral service which was shortened and the rather harsh tones and depressing thoughts from the old service were eliminated. Our present monitor and ceremonies were approved at our 1962 Grand Lodge session when I served as Grand Master. I had many informative sessions during this year with Judge Carter. We were indeed greatly indebted to him for his painstaking and devoted work on this tremendous task in improving our Monitor and Ceremonies.

He maintained an intense devotion to the exalted ideals of Masonry, and his contributions to our Grand Lodge were substantial. The results of his good counsel and acts of great leadership will continue to be available for our guidance and instruction for many years to come.

We will miss his companionship, his keen mind and measured judgment, his ardent love for his family, his church, his massive record of Masonic, judicial, youth and community service. He was a man of complete integrity, of great personal industry, a brilliant mind, and a true friend.

The poet expresses our appreciation of the life and work of Judge Carter in these words:

"Fading away like stars in the morning, Losing their light in the glorious sun! So do we pass from this life and its toiling Only remembered for what we have done!"

Judge Carter will be deeply missed and will be remembered by all who knew him!

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES

M. W. Frank J. Mattoon, Past Grand Master and Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

The petition for restoration of Brother Sam Houck, Jr., of Ashlar Lodge No. 33, Grand Island, Nebraska, who had been expelled on May 24, 1960, for engaging in the wholesale beer business, was presented to the Committee on Grievances. The petition was in proper form and the Committee recommends that said petition be granted and the brother be restored; the grounds for said expulsion having been removed as constituting unmasonic conduct under the By Laws of the Grand Lodge.

The Committee also considered the petition of Brother James Ray Francke, Sr., of Lancaster Lodge No. 54, who was expelled on May 25, 1965, for unmasonic conduct for owning or working in an establishment which sold intoxicating beverages. He is now engaged in a different occupation. Said petition was presented in proper form and, in like manner, the Committee recommends that Brother James Ray Francke, Sr., be restored.

REPORT OF GRAND TRUSTEES

M. W. Grand Master, members of the Grand Lodge and brother Masons: This is the report for the Grand Trustees for the Grand Lodge and The Nebraska Masonic Home for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1982.

The Grand Trustees are charged with the management of the funds of the Grand Lodge and The Nebraska Masonic Home. The annual audit reports of these funds by Deloitte Haskins & Sells cover the year's activity in detail. Copies are on file with the Grand Secretary. Salient, selected figures from these reports are shown below:

*During 1982 the Grand Lodge received from Glenn O. Emick, a gift of \$58,194.00 which funds were restricted by the donor for the purpose of funding certain scholarships for members and former members of the Masonic Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont, Nebraska. Interest earned by these funds (\$5,627.00 in fiscal 1982) is being accumulated in the restricted fund until disposition.

Last year we pointed out the continuing impact of inflation upon expenses of both the Grand Lodge and The Nebraska Masonic Home, a problem which certainly continued in this year. This year we would like to draw your attention to the way in which this problem is affecting the financial operation of the Grand Lodge.

In the five years, 1978-1982, dues have declined 6.7% while General Expenses have risen 21.9%. The result is that Excess Revenues over Expenses had by 1981 declined from \$45,930.00 to \$13,305.00, a decline of 71%. Nineteen Eighty-Two's excess of Revenues over Expenses of \$40,929.00 seems to be a break in this trend.

Actually, this is a doubtful conclusion. Without just three items, discussed below, the "Excess" in 1982 would have been only \$355.00 or practically speaking zero.

The three items were: First, in 1982 The Nebraska Masonic Home paid, for the first time, \$5,000.00 to the Grand Lodge for work done at the Grand Lodge office. Second, Investment Income was up \$20,574.00. This was primarily due to a timing catch-up of cash receipts, which is technical but non-recurring, and high rates of interest on short term investments, which high rates cannot be counted on to continue. Third, The Masonic Eastern Star Home in Fremont did not take the \$15,000.00 budgeted for it this year, but certainly may do so in future years.

As Grand Trustees, we do not have the responsibility or power to raise dues. We do, however, have a duty to communicate our concerns about developing problems to the Grand Lodge so that it will be able to take timely action.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RETURNS

Your Committee on Returns respectfully submits the following report:

The Committee has examined the Monthly Reports and Annual Returns of the subordinate Lodges for year 1981 and find that in general, these reports are satisfactorily prepared by the Lodge Secretaries.

The Committee finds a number of incomplete Returns account omission errors, lateness of filing Monthly Reports and Annual Returns.

It is imperative that these reports reach the Grand Secretary's Office within the prescribed time limit and be complete in every detail as provided for on the forms.

With these few exceptions, the committee wishes to commend the Lodge Secretaries for their diligence in compiling their Monthly and Annual Reports to the Grand Secretary's Office.

The Committee wishes to highly commend the Grand Secretary and his efficient office staff for the excellent manner in which these records were maintained and the courteous cooperation extended the committee while checking these returns.

ELECTION OF GRAND LODGE OFFICERS AND VOTING ON RESOLUTIONS

The hour has arrived for the election of Grand Officers and voting on the Resolution that was proposed last year.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved that section 3-102, subsection G, "The possession or use of all keys, ciphers, or printed matter relating to the ritualistic work of ancient craft masonry," be deleted from the by-laws.

Be it further resolved that an additonal section be added to the by-laws in the proper place to read: "The Grand Lodge will provide key or cipher of the ritualistic work of Ancient Craft Masonry to any subordinate Lodge who so desires such key or cipher. The key or cipher will not be used in the lodge room." This resolution was again defeated.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION

M. W. Warren D. Lichty, Jr., Past Grand Master, presented the report which was adopted.

Shooters Hill in Alexandria, Virginia, was considered by many to be the best site on which to build the National Capitol. This idea was vetoed by George Washington. Why? Because he owned a great deal of land in and around Alexandria, which would be greatly enhanced in value by location of the Capitol there. Washington did not believe it proper for him to be so enriched by governmental action. So the capitol was built across the Potomac. And more than a century and a quarter later, The George Washington Masonic National Memorial was built on Shooters Hill.

This beautiful building is our only National Masonic building. We have all contributed to it and we all can take pride in it. Approximately half of the Grand Jurisdictions have now raised the one-time contribution from newly raised Masons to five dollars, and we should be proud of the fact that we in Nebraska are among them. This has allowed some much needed repairs to be done, but there is more to do, and always a need for money. I can assure you, though, that the officers and directors of the association are giving good stewardship, and that all funds are carefully shepherded. There is no waste.

I should also tell you that tax-free contributions in any amount are most welcome. And if you wish to become a Sustaining Member at \$100.00, or a Life Member at \$250.00, your generosity will be most gratefully appreciated. For those who are interested, make your checks payable to the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association and mail it to Ralph W. Gerry, our Grand Secretary. He will see that your check finds its way to the Association.

W. DONALD R. WHITE, CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON REINSTATEMENTS

M. W. Grand Master, Grand Lodge officers and brethren all: In the past year, your Committee on Reinstatements has received 32 applications for reinstatement. Of these 31 were acted upon favorably. The remaining petition was returned to the Grand Secretary because he should have made application for restoration and not reinstatement.

Your committee wishes to thank you for the honor of serving the Grand Lodge of Nebraska this past year.

My sincere thanks and appreciation to W. Brother Amos Campbell and W. Brother Kenneth P. Lott for their help and support on this Committee.

M. W. Sir, I move the adoption of this report.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

M. W. Merle M. Hale, Past Grand Master presented the report which was accepted.

The Grand Lodge Office Committee met on April 20, 1982 in the Grand Secretary's office. The proposed budget for items for which this committee is responsible was prepared and has been submitted to the Appropriations Committee.

Changes were made in the amount requested for several of the items with the most significant being an increase from \$1,000 to \$5,000 for the Grand Lodge dinner to reflect the gross cost of the meal instead of the net cost and it is hereby recommended that the Finance Committee include in their receipts budget the amount derived through the sale of dinner tickets; an increase from \$2,500 to \$3,500 for the Grand Secretary's travel allowance; increased salaries for the Grand Custodian and clerical staff which will increase the salary costs by \$2,400; an increase of \$3,500 in the Grand Lodge Supplies account to reflect higher prices, particularly of aprons; an increase of \$800 in Masonic Service Association Dues because of the increase in that organization's dues; an increase of \$1,900 in the George Washington National Memorial contribution due to the increase in the Master Mason degree fee from one dollar to five dollars as approved at last year's Annual Communication; and a reduction of \$12,500 in the amount requested by the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont. The Fremont Home informed the Grand Lodge and the Grand Chapter that the \$15,000 budgeted by each body for the 1981-1982 masonic year was not required and that only a minimum amount need be budgeted for the 1982-1983 masonic year.

As required in Section 1-105 of the By-Laws, we recommend that the amount per mile be paid for each mile traveled to Grand Lodge be set at the same amount as last year, i.e., 20[¢].

We commend the new Grand Secretary for his dedication to the duties of his office and to his concern for the records and archives of the Grand Lodge. Again, we express our appreciation to the Grand Lodge office-staff for their efficient operation of that office with its many important activities.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH COMMITTEE

M. W. Grand Master:

Perhaps the most pleasant thing your Youth Committee can report this year is that the Grand Lodge Scholarship winner for DeMolay last year was chosen as the 1982 International DeMolay of the Year. Ralph Castner of Wm. R. Simpson Chapter of Columbus received this award at the International Supreme Council Session held in Reno, Nevada, just this past March. This recognition speaks well for the caliber of the youth with whom we in this Grand Jurisdiction are privileged to work. It speaks well also of that dedicated group of Master Masons in Columbus who have served long and faithfully as advisors to that Chapter.

It would not be completely fair, however, to stop with the organization for boys. While the Rainbow and Job's do not have similar recognition, based upon similar requirements, there are young ladies in this state, and other DeMolays, whose merits and achievements are worthy of recognition and mention. Unfortunately, no one passes the information along, or the local adults take them for granted. The fortunate thing is, these young people are taking it in stride, growing up in many cases, helping as advisors, Bethel Guardian Council members and members of Assembly Advisory boards. They continue to contribute. They become master masons and members of Eastern Star. There are several of our comparatively recent Senior DeMolays who are officers in various lodges across the state. They will bring vigor and the ability to plan along with a great respect for the fraternity. The young ladies who are joining Eastern Star are taking an active part and many times we hear of a young woman telling her father, brother, or someone special that he must become a mason.

All this is happening because a small handful of our brethren are taking their time, their talents and whatever else they possess, that can be given freely to these young people. They give it freely because they believe in the youth themselves and because they believe the principles of masonry are to be lived, not mouthed. They are the master masons who believe in the future because they work with it. They are the ones who really listened to the third section of the entered apprentice lecture when "charity" was explained to them. Unfortunately, they are so few.

M.'.W.'. Sir, it has been a pleasure to serve again on what has to be one of the most enjoyable committees in this Grand Lodge.

While we went over the budget this year, for the first time in many years, we take care of these matters promptly when they present themselves.

Your committee thanks you for the pleasure of serving during this past year.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

M.'.W.'. Herbert A. Ronin, Past Grand Master, presented the report which was accepted.

The 63rd Annual Meeting of the M.S.A. was held on February 22, 1982 at Washington, D.C. I personally participated in all the meetings of its Executive Commission in my capacity as Chairman Emeritus, and as a member of its Investment Committee. Our Grand Master, M. W. Harold C. Wurdeman was Chairman of the Finance Committee and made its report at this annual meeting. The report was approved which included a slight adjustment in the schedule of annual dues of the Member Jurisdictions.

We were delighted that the Grand Lodges of Alaska and California became members of the M.S.A. this past year which increased the membership to 45 Grand Jurisdictions. It is hopeful that the remaining few jurisdictions will join before long for the good of Masonry.

The Short Talk Bulletin issued monthly continues to be very popular to its subscribers. Officers and each Lodge of each member Grand Jurisdiction receive this Bulletin containing inspiring masonic articles. In addition there are individual subscribers for the Bulletin which costs only \$2.50 for an annual subscription effective July 1, 1982. In January, 1980 there were 880 individual subscribers, now there are over 5,000. The Bulletin will now be mailed at third rate postage which will save \$1,000 per month. There are about 50 individual subscribers in Nebraska. We would like to see this doubled this year. Your subscription can be sent directly to the M.S.A. Office, or to our Grand Secretary or myself.

The Emissary Notes Bulletin contains many Masonic items of interest including current events on Masonry. This is prepared by our M.S.A. Executive Secretary Stewart M. L. Pollard. This Bulletin has become very popular.

Our M.S.A. Headquarters is busier than ever in filling requests for publications, researching information, and communicating with the Craft, and reprinting many of our former Short Talk Bulletins and Digests as stock is reduced. There has been a renewed interest in Masonry as evidenced by these requests.

Our Nebraska Hospital Visitation Program of the M.S.A. is one of the great charitable activities of our Grand Lodge. This is primarily because of the splendid service of Brother Robert Adamsheck, Field Agent of our Lincoln V.A. Medical Center, who is assisted by two full time Deputies, Brothers Stephen Taylor and Max Hinkson. The M.S.A. Field Agent for the Omaha V.A. Medical Center is Brother Robert May. His record of service is also outstanding. We would like to see a greater awareness of the Hospital Visitation Program. These agents are willing to speak at any public or Masonic meeting at any time.

On March 21, 1982, our Grand Master Harold C. Wurdeman, M∴W∴ Warren D. Lichty, Jr., P.G.M., our Grand Historian Jack Youngs and myself visited the Lincoln V.A. Medical Center with Field Agent Brother Adamsheck. We were all impressed with the work that our volunteers are doing and the gratitude of our brethren who are patients in the Medical Center. Brother Jack Youngs took a number of pictures during our visit which were sent to the M.S.A. Director of Hospital Visitation Thomas R. Dougherty, P.G.M. who has advised me that a writeup of our Grand Master's visit will be in the July issue of our Hospital Visitor which is a six page edition which is published every three months.

I am pleased to have served as Liaison Coordinator for our Grand Lodge with the Masonic Service Association of which I am Chairman Emeritus. It is good to witness the continuing and varying areas of service to Freemasonry that the M.S.A. is performing. I welcome receiving at any time any questions that our membership might have in regard to any facet of Masonry. I am certain that our M.S.A. headquarters staff can come up with a responsive answer to most questions.

REPORT OF FIELD AGENTS

Bob Adamsheck, Field Agent, Lincoln

The following is my 1982 report of hospital visitations at the Lincoln Veterans Administration Medical Center, Lincoln, Nebraska.

We presently have five (5) scheduled volunteers serving this medical center. The volunteers work in various duties in addition to the duties we carry on in the Masonic tradition, calling on our Brothers and helping wherever we are able to be of assistance to our Brother and his family.

The areas we work in are Building Management, Pharmacy, Nursing and Voluntary Service.

The past year we had the honor of visits from our Grand Master and Grand Historian in addition, past Grand Masters Herbert Ronin and Duke Lichty. We were able to tour the hospital and call on several Brothers who were patients at the time. REPORT OF THE MASONIC-EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

W. Ben Harvey, Administrator, gave the report in the absence of the President. The report was adopted.

Each succeeding year that I have served as a Trustee of the Children's Home has been an increasingly satisfying experience for me. The past year has been the most rewarding of all. It has been a year of fulfillment, achievement and progress. The success of the last year has resulted from the combined efforts of a great many people, some of whom are directly concerned with the operation of the Home, and many others who help from afar.

Our Administrator, Mr. Ben Harvey, is in a large degree responsible for our

success. He has carefully and skillfully coordinated the efforts of his staff, provided a needed sense of leadership and faithfully discharged his duties in every respect. The Trustees are both pleased and proud to have Mr. Harvey and his capable wife, Chalice, as members of our team.

I am pleased to inform you that there has been an increase in the census at the Home. At the time this Report is being written, there are 25 children in residence. At the same time last year, we were caring for 20 children. The increase has not been dramatic; however, it is gratifying to realize that our resources are bing more fully utilized.

The offices of the Grand Secretaries of the Order of the Eastern Star, State of Nebraska, and the Grand York Rite of Nebraska, are now located on the Home grounds. Temporary office space has been made available in the Administration Building until such time that a suitable building can be constructed which will serve as a permanent headquarters.

I am deeply grateful to Gretchen Treadway, Jane Gilbert, Agnes Bowman and Al Aden, who are members of our Publicity and Ambassadors Committee. These individuals have worked tirelessly over a long period of time to enhance the image of our Home and engender good will on its behalf.

On April 24, 1982, a corner-stone was laid in our new Arts-Crafts-Maintenance Building. Most Worshipful Brother Harold C.Wurdeman, Grand Master, A. F. &A. M. of Nebraska presided at the proceedings. A message of appreciation is extended to our Grand Master and to all Grand Lodge Officers and other Masons who assisted in the proceedings. Most Worshipful Brother Harold has been an ardent and active supporter of the Home, and his attendance at many of our Board Meetings and other events was most welcome.

I have repeatedly stated that our obligation to the children at the Home embraces much more than mere custodial care. We have a duty to assist and encourage the children to develop all of their God-given resources. The Arts-Crafts facility will provide them with an opportunity to learn and develop skills in the manual arts, while at the same time, furnishing them with a constructive recreational activity.

We have a new 15-passenger Ford Van at the Home, and I assure you that it is one of our most frequently used assets. The Van represents the project of Past Grand Matron, Barbara Aten, and Past Grand Patron, Raymond Evers, during their respective terms of Office in the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, State of Nebraska. We are truly grateful to the membership of the Eastern Star who provided the financial support to make purchase of the Van possible.

Very shortly, construction of a new residence for the Assistant Administrator will be underway. The expense of maintaining the existing Assistant Administrator's home has become prohibitive. The new residence will be considerably smaller in size and many energy savings and maintenance-free features will be incorporated, all of which will result in dollar savings over a period of time. JUNE, 1982)

All of the Trustees have expended their talents and efforts on behalf of the Home during the past year; thus, I take great risk in singling out one individual for praise. I am confident, however, that my fellow-Trustees recognize the great and meritorious effort that has been put forth by Leona Paden, not only during the past year, but for a great many years last past. During the past year, Leona has not only assumed the customary duties assigned to the Chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, but she also undertook the enormous responsibility of coordinating all matters relating to the construction of the Arts-Crafts-Maintenance Building from the conceptual stage to its ultimate construction. It was a difficult, and at times, thankless job, but it was a job that was well done and all of us who worked with her on this project are grateful to her and to her husband, Brother Bernard Paden, who made himself available when needed.

Credit must be given to our Finance Committee Chairman, Brother Donald Swanson, and his committee members, Betty Mears and Brother Ed Lorenzen. Our financial position has continued to show improvement, largely due to their diligence in attending to the financial affairs of the corporation.

To the remaining Trustees who have not been previously mentioned herein, Marjorie Anderson and Brothers Paul Eveland, Elmer Sells and Fred Moshier, I compliment you on your many contributions to the continued success of the Home. You, and each of you, have labored assiduously for the betterment of the worthwhile project in which we are involved.

It should be of particular interest to you that the new Arts-Crafts-Maintenance Building, and other building projects contemplated at the present time have not been financed from the Home's General Fund. On the contrary, the new building projects have been funded almost in toto by monies received from a most beneficent and thoughtful individual who must have had great love for children and enormous confidence in the operation of our Children's Home. I have reference to the late George E. Hampton, who saw fit to devise and bequeath the bulk of his estate to the Children's Home to be placed in a Building Fund in memory of his deceased wife, Fern Hampton. Mr. Hampton's specific instruction that the monies be used for building purposes is being honored in all respects. To do otherwise would be reprehensible. May we all remember this kind and thoughtful man.

May the forthcoming year be as successful as the last for our beloved Home, and to each and all of you, I thank you for your continued support.

The President of the Board, Joseph Lindquist was to give this report today. He was called away on unexpected business. I have the report I am going to make on a 3x5 card, I will give my report and then turn his report in for the record.

You know ever since I have been at the Children's Home in Fremont, which has not been two years yet, I have wondered what Brother Ray down at the Masonic Home at Plattsmouth and I had in common. He working with Senior Citizens and I working with Children.

I think I know the difference now since we heard Bill Patterson earlier this afternoon. Those 16 and 17 year old teenagers know where their rooms are. That increases the difficulty of my job. I am very pleased to have the opportunity to talk to you this afternoon about The Children's Home. I am very proud, happy to be in the position that I am right now. It is a job that I believe in very much, and I do have some figures and facts that I want to share with you. We have increased the census of the Home over the last few months. As of May 31, we were at 25 children. That is the most children that we have had in the Home for a number of years. The State of Nebraska Department of Welfare licenses us for 31. I believe in this next year we will be reaching that number or very close to it. The Grand York Rite Office, the Grand Chapter, O.E.S. office has moved from Omaha. They are occupying temporary office space on the grounds of the Home now, and they will be occupying that space until we can supply them with more permanent quarters, which will be in the near future.

On the 24th of April, we laid a corner stone in our new Arts and Crafts building, the Grand Lodge did a very good job, I guess I should thank you for that. We are providing for Children in Fremont, we want to provide them with more than custodial care. We want to be meaningful forces in their lives, and I believe we are. The Arts & Crafts building will give us an opportunity in a crafts program to let them grow and expand in their lives. We keep the children busy in activities; we have seven of our boys in DeMolay, we have four girls in Jobs, we have them active in various school activities and in various church organizations in Fremont. I guess, if we keep them busy, then they won't think about where their rooms are.

We are building a new Assistant Administrator's home. We are doing that because after some reflection and after looking at the structure that he and his family live in now, and looking at the utility bills (they are very costly), we have decided to build a new and more efficient living quarters for him. Much of the credit as to what goes on at the Home goes to the Board of Trustees.

I think many of you know who the Board of Trustees are, have some friends among them. If you would, the next time you see them, give them a well-deserved pat on the back because they certainly deserve it. I believe they are saving at least one paid position at the Home through their voluntary work. The Arts and Crafts Building and the other building projects that I have

referred to, are not coming from the general fund. They are coming from a fund that we call "Afton Fund," or estate which was set up by some people several years ago which is ear-marked for capitol improvement. I would also say at this time, that I am available at any time to go out in the state, to any lodge or any Eastern Star Chapter, or for that matter any organization that wants to learn more about our Children's Home. We could put on a program and answer many, many questions that we don't have time to cover today. We have had in the last year, great success at the Home. We are looking forward to more success in the coming years and on behalf of the Children, the Staff and the Board of Trustees, I would like to thank you all for your continued support.

MEMBERSHIP

W.: CHARLES W. AMIDON, CHAIRMAN

During the spring of 1982, Area Educational Meetings were held in five cities to which were invited 48 lodges throughout the Western part of the state. Unfortunately, 100% attendance was achieved at only one meeting. Several important items were presented at these sessions including a history of the Masonic Craft over the past 125 years. It may interest you to know that between 1880 and 1890, 79 lodges were chartered which means the Grand Masters for the next few years will be kept running attending 100th Anniversary celebrations throughout the state. It may also be of interest to note that only five lodges have been chartered since 1930, a period covering fifty years!

Our membership in 1860 was approximately 1,000. For the next 70 years we experienced a very steady growth until reaching 42,000 by 1930. Due primarily to the depression, we lost 10,000 members between 1930 and 1940. During and following World War II, we had a tremendous influx of new members peaking at more than 46,000 by 1960. The '60s and early '70s brought athe Vietnam Era when it was not popular with young men to join anything that smacked of the "Establishment" and consequently, we have been on a steep downhill slide ever since, arriving at our present enrollment of slightly more than 31,000 or the same point we were at in 1920 ... sixty years ago! To stimulate an interest in increased membership, your Committee has been pushing all lodges to accept or at least give a try at promoting a "Friendship Dinner" for the non-masons in their area. Those lodges which accepted the challenge have reported results far beyond expectations, and proved three things: They were concerned about declining membership; they were willing to put forth an effort to do something about it; and they got results!

For comparison:

The 48 lodges we visited this spring have a total membership of 1,450. In the year ending 1980, these 48 lodges raised only 77 Master Masons, an average of 1.6 Masters per lodge. To make matters worse, 21 of these same lodges had no raisings in 1980 and some haven't raised a Master in more than ten years! Brethren, if you don't think we're in trouble, you haven't been listening.

Now for the good news:

Six Lodges, picked at random to represent all areas of the state, held "Friendship Dinners." They invited a total of 110 guests, half of whom were men, or 55 non-masons. Of these 55 men, 27 are now members of the Masonic Craft. A production rate of 49%. Do "Friendship Dinners" work? You be the judge.

Comments:

Wallace Lodge No. 279 (Total membership 31) Letter dated December 8, 1981:

"Everyone seemed to enjoy themselves and we ended up with a total of 4 new candidates, or I should say we have 4 petitions on the Secretary's desk at present, also two more who asked for petitions, who look like they may be presented later in the spring. I believe this indicates there are those who are interested in Masonry, if they have the opportunity to express themselves to the members of a Masonic body who show they are interested in them. The lodge stands to increase its membership 10 to 15%... two more could send us as high as 20%."

Midwest Lodge No. 317 (Total membership 545) Letter dated October 31, 1981:

"There were ... 35 guests of which 27 were ladies ... have had the privilege of obtaining three petitions for initiation thus far and we are expecting more soon ... we are pleased with the results ... hope you feel the same."

Robert W. Furnas Lodge No. 265 (Total membership 350) Letter dated October 6, 1981:

"There were ten prospective masons as guests and at our first regular communication since our dinner, we received three petitions for the degrees . . . We deemed this information to be of importance to Masonry in our Lodge and wanted you to know that efforts are being made in this part of Nebraska. We trust other lodges are experiencing such activity. Please share this information in any way that will help."

These are but a few examples of what individual lodges have accomplished. The most encouraging news comes directly from the Grand Lodge record book. During 1978, 566 Entered Apprentices were recorded. In 1979, 572, an increase of only six candidates. In 1980, when the initial "push" for Guest Nights got off athe ground, we recorded 588 E.A.s or an increase of 16. When the books were closed for 1981, the number of candidates increased to 622, a jump of 34 over the previous year! Brethren, we are on our way and with the cooperation of all lodges in the state, we can not only stop the membership decline, but in the next two or three years be able to show a substantial net gain . . . and wouldn't that be something!

It is not the purpose of this Committee to tell any Lodge how to run its

business. We are to act only as your servants. We do, however, know that "Friendship Dinners" work! If we can be of any assistance to a Lodge that truly wants to increase its membership, we have one answer for you. At least give "Friendship Dinners" a try this year.

MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

M. W. T. Leo Stines, Past Grand Master presented the report which was accepted.

It was the desire of M. W. Brother Harold C. Wurdeman that we continue the plan and format established by M. W. Brother Byron C. Jenkins in the previous Grand Lodge year. Accordingly, Area Masonic Education meetings were held for the lodges west of Highway #14 last fall and this spring. We still feel that if each lodge in the state is given an opportunity to attend such a meeting at least once every two years it will be adequate.

The meetings were held at the following lodges:

Hastings Lodge No. 50 on Friday, Oct. 16th; Jachin Lodge No. 146 at Holdrege on Saturday, Oct. 17th; Porter Lodge No. 106 at Loup City on Thursday, Oct. 22nd; Bassett Lodge No. 254 on Friday, Oct. 23rd; Seneca Lodge No. 284 at Thedford on Saturday, Oct. 24th; Franklin Lodge No. 264 on Friday, March 26th; McCook Lodge No. 135 on Saturday, March 27th; Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 at North Platte on Thursday, April 1st; Camp Clarke Lodge No. 285 at Bridgeport on Friday, April 2nd; Samaritan Lodge No. 158 at Chadron on Saturday, April 3rd.

We were especially pleased with the meeting held at Camp Clarke Lodge No. 285 at Bridgeport. We had 100% representation at this meeting. This is the first and only time this has happened.

The Committee was very pleased with the attendance and the audience participation at each of these meetings and we wish to express our sincere appreciation to the lodges who agreed to host these area meetings.

THE REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

W.: Gladwyn A. Youngs, Chairman presented the report which was accepted.

M. W. Sir, brethren. Your Public Relations Committee, I think fits into what W. Brother Charles was just talking about, the concern for membership. Historically, of course, Public Relations were sort of frowned upon in Masonic Circles. They simply did not exist. As we view them, it is two-fold, we have Masonic publications, the Masonic News that comes from Lincoln, the Nebraska Freemason which is the official publication, and there may be some other publications in the state of which I am not aware. Of course, these publications go into the hands of as many non-masons as they do Masons, so they do serve a public relations roll. But we also feel that it is proper not to

hide and we think it is proper to communicate to the media events of importance no matter where they occur within the Grand Jurisdiction.

Each lodge receives a copy of the Annual proceedings. The members of the Public Relations Committee are listed as are all Committees in each one of these annual lists. It is requested that you contact the member of that Committee who is the closest to you with any newsworthy information that you want to give to the public media, or that you wish to get into consideration for publication in the Masonic Magazines themselves. The Nebraska Freemason comes from the Grand Secretary's Office. It isn't actually his duty, but Brother Mortensen has been working on it. He is ill right now, but somebody up there will put it out. W. Brother Ralph put out the last issue himself and, simply a suggestion, if you do not have access to the Proceedings, you can certainly send any newsworthy information directly to the Grand Secretary's office, and he will see that it gets into the proper hands and that it will be considered for use.

Apart from that, we are simply trying to implement this, M. W. Sir, and trust that all you brethren from out in the state, will take advantage of it and send your items of news and information to one of these channels so it can be considered for publication either within the Fraternity or to the public at large. No matter where you are sending them, the printers always prefer to have any pictures which you submit sent in black and white rather than in color. A glossy finish as opposed to the matte finish is better for duplication purposes. If you do not have a black and white picture, occasionally colored pictures can be used, depending on the quality of the pictures. The important thing is to get thinking about it and think ahead. You know what events are coming up and do something about it. Send the pictures, the articles or if you have any questions, again, contact either the Grand Secretary's office or a member of the Committee, and he will be happy to try to assist you in that regard.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS

M. W. WARREN D. LICHTY, JR. PAST GRAND MASTER

WHEREAS, a substantial number of our brethren of long-standing membership have never "proved up" in the Masters Degree, and in many cases it was neither the fault of themselves or their Lodge, but rather, was caused by outside circumstances such as moving, changing jobs, etc, and

WHEREAS, these brethren, although paying their dues to support their Lodge, are not really "full-fledged Masons" in their eyes or in the eyes of some of the rest of the Craft, and

WHEREAS, the more time that has passed, the less likely it is that such a brother will ever prove up, especially when he has since moved to another town, and

WHEREAS, we, as Masons, should be charitable to our Brothers,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that a time shall be set beyond

which such Brethren shall no longer be under disability, and that period shall be seven years, a time long enough so as not to encourage malingering by new Masons but short enough to prevent such Brethren from being entirely lost to the Craft, therefore,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that section 2-403 of the code be amended by adding, at the end thereof: "and provided further that seven years after a Brother shall have been raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason, the provisions of this Section shall cease to apply to such Brother."

I ask that this resolution, according to the code, be voted on at the 126th Annual Communication.

AMENDMENT TO BY-LAWS

Be it resolved that Section 3-102 "G", "The possession or use of all keys, ciphers or printed matter relating to the ritualistic work of Ancient Craft Masonry," be deleted from the By-laws.

Be it further resolved that an additional section be added to the By-laws in the proper place to read: "The Grand Lodge will provide key or cipher of the ritualistic work of Ancient Craft Masonry to any subordinate Lodge who so desires such key or cipher. The key or cipher will not be used in the lodge room.

ORATION "COMMUNICATION"

W.: JAMES N. DEMOSS, GRAND ORATOR

If I were to put a single word subject matter on the thoughts which I wish to share with you tonight, that word would be "Communication."

Communication can, and does, take many varied forms. Normally, when we think of communication, we first think of spoken words between two people, or between one person and a group of people. The passing of thoughts back and forth with the spoken word. Communication is also in the form of written words, and today is often conceived as television or radio waves giving us instant news from around the world.

If communication between people is not correct then something is missing or can go astray. You know, men, you can turn to your bride or to the beautiful woman sitting next to you, and you can tell her 'when you look at her face, time stands still.' There is no question that the object of this endearment will be flattered and think you are very eloquent. However, you can turn to her, if you want to get into trouble, and tell her the same thing with different words. Try telling her that 'she has a face that would stop a clock.' In essence you have communicated the same thought. You have just used different words.

How a communication is received and perceived can also have a profound effect on the outcome of the exchange. You can tell most anyone that there are 30 billion stars in the sky and they will believe it. However, whenever you tell someone that something is just freshly painted they have to touch it to believe you.

Not too many years ago the president of a large corporation sent a memo to the personnel department in which he asked: "I would like to know what procedure we follow in hiring people at our 'X' plant." This memo set of an historic flap. Subordinate managers, unsure what he had in mind and unwilling to ask, instituted a complete review of the company's personnel policies. More than 300 hours of consultations were held at various levels. Scores of reports were written. Every aspect of the subject was explored. Finally, after weeks of work, a one-half inch thick report was delivered to the president. It gave full details of all the aptitude and intelligence tests that were used, all the sources of manpower that were tapped, what percentage of the applicants were able to make the grade, the cost of the hiring program, and all the reasons anyone could think of to explain why this was a fine system. The boss took one look at the report and almost strangled. "All I wanted to know," he said, "was where I should send a neighbor's young son, who was interested in a summer job. It doesn't matter now - he's gone back to college." What the corporation president had communicated had been misinterpreted and misunderstood and those who had received the communication would not question what was meant.

To me, one of the best ways to communicate with a person is to reach out and touch that individual. Using hands to communicate a feeling that you have — a desire that you feel — or just the need to express a feeling of comradeship with that individual. Although communication is generally thought of as the spoken or written word, those individuals deprived of the sense of hearing communicate with their hands instead of speaking, and the blind can read with their hands.

In Masonry, we hold what we call Masonic Communication. You are right now at a banquet in the Holiday Inn in Kearney, Nebraska at the 125th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge. Does this communication mean the same as the communication I have been talking about up to this point? Not necessarily — and then again, yes. Through Masonic Communication we attempt to take an individual that can be likened unto a 'rough ashlar' and, through talking and assisting that individual, we create a 'perfect ashlar.' An individual not yet ready for his place in society is reshaped into a more perfect member of society, and individual able to fit his abilities into the over-all scheme of life. In the process that individual has experienced many forms of communication. There have been communications of word, there have been communications of touch and of feelings.

As each of us go through our daily lives we are frequently faced with situations which seem astounding or overwhelming to us. Perhaps the solution to these problems lies in proper communication of one sort or another. In 1923 a very important meeting was held at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago. Attending this meeting were ten of the world's most successful financiers. By title, those attending were: the President of the largest independent steel company: President of the National City Bank of New York; President of the largest utility company; President of the largest gas company; the greatest wheat speculator; President of the New York Stock Exchange; a member of the President's Cabinet; the greatest 'bear' on Wall Street; the head of the world's greatest monopoly; and the President of the Bank of International Settlements. Now, in any way you want to communicate the idea, whether it be by their titles, by their level of achievements, or whatever, here were ten successful men! Here were ten men that had reached the pinnacle of their individual way of life and the route they had chosen to make their livings. That was in 1923.

Now, let's move ahead from that point for 26 years - the year is now 1949. Let's look at these same ten men. The President of the largest independent steel company - Charles Schwab - died bankrupt and lived on borrowed money for five years before his death; the President of the largest utility company — Samuel Insull — died a fugitive from justice and penniless in a foreign land; the President of the largest gas company - Howard Hopson is now insane; the greatest wheat speculator - Arthur Cotton - died abroad insolvent; the President of the New York Stock Exchangae - Richard Whitney - was recently released from Sing Sing Penitentiary; the member of the President's Cabinet — Albert Fall — was pardoned from prison so he could die at home; the greatest 'bear' on Wall Street — Jesse Livermore — died a suicide; the President of the world's greatest monopoly — Ivor Krueger died a suicide; and the President of the Bank of International Settlements -Leon Fraser - died a suicide. Here were ten men that had needs. Needs they were not able to communicate to those about them, or if they were communicated, their communication was misinterpreted. Here were ten men that needed someone to reach out and help them in some way, and that help was not given, or if it was attempted, it was not successful.

Some years ago during a hike in the woods a troop of Boy Scouts came across an abandoned section of railroad track. Each, in turn, tried walking the rails but eventually lost his balance and fell off. Suddenly two of the boys, after considerable whispering, offered to bet that they could both walk the entire length of the track without falling off. Challenged to make good their boast, the two boys jumped on opposite rails, extended a hand to balance each other, and walked the entire section of track with no difficulty whatever. Here were two boys that had a need to walk the rails. They expressed that need to each other. They reached out and helped and walked together. Their communication was good. Their communication was successful.

When then Edmund, now Sir Edmund, Hilary had reached the summit in his climb of Mount Everest together with his faithful guide Tenzing, they

started back down on a perilous route. At one point Sir Edmund slipped and would surely have fallen to his death had not Tenzing, holding taut the rope that was always tied between them, dug his pick deep into the ice stopping the fall. After they returned to the base of the mountain Sir Edmund told others of what had happened and that Tenzing had saved him from certain death. Other people attempted to heap honors on Tenzing for what he had done — for his courageous act. To all of those attempts at honors Tenzing shrugged and said simply, "Mountain climbers always help each other."

My brethren — as Masons should we do anything less?

THE ROLL OF DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren, these together with the Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

Note: From 1880 until 1910, there were no recorded appointments of brethren to serve as assistants to the Grand Custodian. In 1910 Brother Robert E. French did hold special meetings to examine and instruct brethren who were willing to become "assistants" in the work. Thirteen brethren were nominated and approved for appointment as assistants. After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians". In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians". The following brethren appeared in the records as "assistant custodians" or at times as "Deputy Custodians."

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A. L.) "In the year of light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A, .I, .) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. Dep.) "In the year of the deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A. O.) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A. Beo.) "In the year of the blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. M.) "In the year of the world."

RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons – Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1982 and 4,000 - 5982.

Royal Arch Masons — Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1982 and 530-2509.

Royal and Select Masters – Add 1,000 years to current year, thus: 1975 and 1,000 - 2982.

Knights Templar – From the Christian era take 1,118; thus: 1,118 from 1982 - 860.

Order of High Priesthood - To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1982 - 3891.

Scottish Rite – Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1982 and 3,760 – 5939.
