





#### BIOGRAPHICAL

#### PAUL R. PIERCE

M. W. Paul R. Pierce, the 117th Grand Master of Masons of Nebraska, was born on March 17, 1913 at Ord, Nebraska, the third of four sons of Albert W. and Ivy M. Pierce. He graduated from the Ord High School and the University of Nebraska with a degree from the College of Agriculture.

On May 1, 1937 he was united in marriage to Helen M. Uridel of Clearwater, Nebraska. The family consists of their daughter Kathryn Kay, son-in-law Gail Muhs, and two granddaughters. Brother Pierce taught Vocational Agriculture in Laurel, Neligh and Hastings and was a member of the PhiDelta Kappa, professional teachers fraternity.

After leaving teaching he formed the Pierce Agricultural Service, specializing in the development and management of irrigated farms in south central Nebraska. He is an Accredited Farm Manager with the American Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers, served as Chairman of the Ethics Committee of the American Society, and received the Distinguished Service Award of the Society for Dedicated Service to Agriculture.

He is a 45 year member of Rotary International, having served as Secretary and President of the Hastings Rotary Club, and is a Paul Harris Fellow.

He has been active in the Methodist Church, taught the adult Sunday School Class for 16 years prior to becoming Grand Master, and has served the Nebraska Conference of the Methodist Church as President of the Board of Trustees.

#### MASONRY

Brother Pierce was initiated March 10, 1949, passed April 15, 1949 and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on May 19, 1949 in Hastings Lodge No.  $50 \text{ A.} \cdot \text{F.} \cdot \text{\& A.} \cdot \text{M.} \cdot \text{in Hastings}$ , Nebraska. He served as Worshipful Master in 1954.

Brother Pierce is a Knight of the York Cross of Honour, a 33rd Degree member of the Scottish Rite, a member of Acacia Chapter of the Eastern Star No. 39 in Hastings, is serving as Chaplain of Tehama Temple of the Shrine and on the ritualistic degree team. He is a member of the Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests, the Royal Order of Scotland, designated the Criptic Mason of the Year in 1977 by the General Grand Council, Royal and Select Masters International, has served Job's Daughters as Associate Guardian, is an Honorary Member Legion of Honor of DeMolay and represents the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in the Grand Lodge of Michigan. He is a member of the National Sojourners and Red Cross of Constantine, Cour de lion Chapter. Prior to being appointed to Grand Junior Deacon by M. W. Brother A. B. Saum in 1977 he served as Grand Orator under M. W. John A. Bottorf in 1967-68. Brother Pierce and his wife Helen like to travel. They have a motor home and have journeyed to the Yukon and Alaska, into Mexico through the Sierra Madre mountains to Mazatlan and throughout the western half of the United States.

M.'.W.'. Brother Pierce says he is just started in Masonry. The year as Grand Master has opened new horizons of what can be done in Masonry.


During his year as Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Paul has demonstrated those abilities which were expected of him as he approached that exalted station.

He has been active in all branches of Masonry in the City of Hastings and his many years of devoted service to his church has given him the proper reverential perspective for the Craft.


For those of us who know him well, we expect his light to shine brightly for many years to come.

#### M.'.W.'. BENJAMIN F. EYRE, PAST GRAND MASTER

I have here a tear sheet out of a newspaper. This particular paper is 51 years old plus. The date on this paper is June 5, 1932, 75th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge. This particular notice is to mark the site of Masonry's founding in Nebraska in the town of Bellevue.

The officers that presided at this dedication are: W.<sup>•</sup>. Brother Harold H. Thom, Nebraska Lodge No. 1; M.<sup>•</sup>.W.<sup>•</sup>. John R. Tapster, Grand Master; Albert Jefferis, former Grand Orator of the Grand Lodge and William Heller, the donor of the stone. Assisting these brethren on June 7 was the Grand Master of Illinois; the Deputy Grand Master of Illinois; Representatives of the Grand Lodge of Iowa and the Master of Bluffs City Lodge No. 71.

It is a beautiful stone located in the Park at Bellevue facing the sun, moon and stars. This monument, solid granite in the form of an altar and, of course, the altar always carried the light of Freemasonry, The Holy Bible. It also carries the square and compass and Chapter XII of Ecclesiastes.

I just want to tell you that Nebraska Lodge No. 1 received their original papers of dispensation from the Grand Lodge of Illinois in 1855. At that time Bellevue was a rugged town. It was a fur trading establishment for John Jacob Paster Fire Company. In the loft of the trading post, on the second floor this lodge established their first lodge room. Such a primitive lodge room as it was, boxes, trunks covered with furs, blankets over the windows so the Indians could not see. The first petitioner Isaiah Bennett was investigated and was found of good character but he had gone to the celestial lodge above.

Peter Sarpy received the degree of an Entered Apprentice in Bluffs City Lodge as a courtesy. They crossed the Missouri River on January 5, 1856.

No. 1 was the first lodge chartered in the Grand Lodge and for reason of economic conditions in 1888 the charter was removed to Omaha, when we had our 75th Anniversary of the lodge with Ira C. Freet, Grand Master. We had a fine meeting, plenty to eat, lots of oratory but it left a void.

A committee was appointed and as the result of the work of the committee over a period of time, the stone was dedicated. If you want to see the entire program of the meeting, those of you who have access to the Grand Lodge Proceedings of 1932 will find twelve pages of history covering this monument.

On the monument is inscribed "Dedicated in honor of the Founders of Masonry in Nebraska and loving memory of those who carried on."

It belongs to the Grand Lodge and for that reason, M.:W.: Sir, as surviving member of that Committee, I am happy to present to the Grand Lodge this particular picture, story and memorandum which I trust will some day hang in the Library of The Grand Lodge office. Thank you very much.

#### **GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS**

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

I welcome all the delegates and guests to this 126th Annual Communication of our Grand Lodge.

I do want to express my appreciation to you in Nebraska for delegating me the honor and the responsibility of serving as your Grand Master. It has been a busy year. I hope my actions will meet with your approval.

My thanks go to Rob Morris Lodge No. 46 of Kearney for setting up this lodge, to Hastings Lodge No. 50 for opening and receiving the Grand Lodge Officers. A thank you to the good people of Kearney for welcoming us, and for all of you for coming to participate in this, our 126th Grand Lodge Communication. I want to again remind you that the Grand Lodge is made up of 230 Worshipful Masters, and 230 Senior Wardens, 230 Junior Wardens, the Past Grand Masters who become Life Members of the Grand Lodge, and the thirteen appointed and elected Officers of the Grand Lodge. This is your Grand Lodge.

This will conclude my talk to you. I will not read the preliminary report that you already have in your hands.

I ask you to visit with one another, make our out-of-town and distinguished guests welcome, and enjoy the fellowship, the good food and conversation while at this Grand Lodge Communication. Thank you.

#### JUNE, 1983

#### VISITATIONS

As your Grand Master I tried to represent Blue Lodge Masonry wherever I was invited, except for conflict of schedules, weather, and as health would permit. I had neurosurgery on my back this past winter to relieve pressure on nerves to my back, hips and legs, and for a period of time had to decline invitations. I did have representation at scheduled events. M.:.W.:. Byron C. Jenkins substituted for me at the installation of officers at Fremont Lodge No. 15, and M.:.W.:. T. Leo Stines for Hastings Lodge No. 50 and Midwest Lodge No. 317 at Hastings.

l attended two outstate Grand Lodge Communications, at Sioux City, Iowa and at Topeka, Kansas. The Iowa Grand Master, M..W.. Norval P. Marks, and I were raised in the same farming community and graduated from the same Ord high school. Nebraska was represented by M..W.. Byron C. Jenkins at the Alaska Grand Lodge Communication. He is recognized as a kind of Godfather there because of his early activity as Grand Master in recognizing their new Grand Lodge during his year as Grand Master. M..W.. Past Grand Master Warren D. Lichty, Jr. and Deputy Grand Master Bevin B. Bump represented the Nebraska Grand Lodge at Minnesota, and Bevin B. Bump represented the Nebraska Grand Lodge at Wyoming, Colorado and South Dakota.

My own lodge, Hastings Lodge No. 50, and our sister Lodge Midwest Lodge No. 317, and Acacia Chapter No. 39 of the Eastern Star, all of Hastings, hosted all the Grand Lodge officers and their ladies at a reception in the Hastings Temple on the Sunday afternoon following installation of Grand Lodge Officers. It was very beautiful, gracious, well attended, and very much appreciated.

I represented the Grand Lodge when Geneva Lodge No. 79 recognized and honored their Secretary Ben Fussell after a delicious buffalo stew dinner. W.. Brother Ben is also a Deputy Grand Custodian, doing education work within his area.

I was invited to meet with, was received by, and spoke to more than thirty Blue Lodges. I took part in the ten Educational meetings. On several occasions I had the pleasure to present 50 and 60 year pins, noteably at Brownville, the Old Folks Home at Auburn, Superior, Fremont and Alliance Lodges, and on one special occasion at Franklin, a 70 year pin. I was speaker at several Friendship Nights, as well as one area Friendship Night at Fairmont.

I represented the Grand Lodge at the Grand sessions of the DeMolay and the Job's Daughters. I had a conflict with the Rainbow for Girls, and asked the Chairman of our Youth Committee, Bill Hurst, to represent the Grand Lodge and present the scholarship to a Rainbow for Girls winner.

It is important that we as a Grand Lodge, work closely with the Eastern Star. I have had good relations, cooperation and exchange of ideas from both the Worthy Grand Matron Betty Mabon and Worthy Grand Patron Bernie Paden. I represented the Grand Lodge at the Grand Chapter session of the Eastern Star, and was received as a special guest at Acacia Chapter No. 39 at Hastings.

I represented the Grand Lodge in attendance at the reception for the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron, Betty Mabon and Bernie Paden at Phillips.

The Grand Master and the Grand Secretary were special guests at Trinity Eastern Star Chapter 299 at Omaha, recognizing the Master Masons.

I attended the three day session of the Grand York Rite bodies at Columbus, was received as Grand Master and spoke at each of the meetings of the Chapter, Council and the Commandery. I attended the Knights of the York Cross of Honor meeting in Alliance and took the Blue Lodge part in the initiation of new KYCH members. I was the initiate of the Red Cross of Constantine Coeur De Lion Conclave at Columbus.

I was invited to the presentation of the third degree of Masonry by the Scottish Rite in Omaha in colonial costume, was their guest at their Scottish Rite Banquet. I represented the Grand Lodge at the Lincoln Scottish Rite in their presentation of the play "The Traitor", and spoke at the Scottish Rite Educational meeting. I participated in two Scottish Rite Reunions in Hastings.

Tehama Temple of the Shrine gave me the Grand Masters Fez, presented a 100 Million Dollar Certificate to the Shrine, in the name of the G.M. was given a \$750 check to be used for Friendship Nights, and honored the Grand Master as Marshal of their ceremonial parade. Tangier gave special recognition as Grand Master of Masons of Nebraska at their Potentate's Ball. Sesostris at Lincoln hosted me and my wife at the Shrine Bowl game in Lincoln. I attended Na-Ja Temple Ceremonial in Spearfish, South Dakota where western Nebraska novices were initiated into the Shrine in a Tehama-Na-Ja double ceremonial. I camped with the Moble Nobles.

Sesostris Temple at Lincoln recognized the Grand Master and his Lady at their annual Potentate's Banquet and Ball.

I was a guest and spoke to a joint meeting of the Tehama Temple of the Shrine and the Knights of Columbus at a steak-fry in Grand Island. The Grand Island Knights are great supporters of the Shrine Bowl.

As Grand Master I was received and spoke at installations of the Daughters of the Nile at Lincoln and at Hastings.

I met with the Board of The Nebraska Masonic Home in Plattsmouth and was guest and visitor at the Home on more than one occasion. I met with the Trustees of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont, as well as attending the Children's Achievement Day activities.

I was represented at a Council Bluffs, Iowa meeting honoring the Iowa Grand Master, by Past Grand Masters Harold C. Wurdeman and Byron C. Jenkins, and R.W. Grand Secretary Ralph W. Gerry. On April 19 I presented 60 year pins at Fremont Lodge, and later in the evening assisted in the raising of two of Paul R. Eveland's sons at North Bend Lodge.

I believe it is important that officers of the Grand Lodge, appointed and elected, meet and mix with both individual Masons and Lodges of Nebraska. We have a big state. There is a limit to how much we can do. I believe that it is important that we meet with other Masonic bodies. They need us, and we need them. We are a big Brotherhood and Sisterhood. I believe we do have a good relationship and we want to encourage and keep it that way. I want to thank all who have received my wife and me on these many good fellowship visits. They will be jewels of remembrance for us. We hope we have given something back to you.

#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE

#### GRAND MASTERS CONFERENCE

The Grand Masters Conference, this year, was held in Dallas, Texas. The Conference is always held at the time of George Washington's birthday. Fifty delegations were represented. They include each state, including Hawaii, which is joined with California, plus the District of Columbia. Nebraska was represented by Deputy Grand Master Bevin B. Bump, Past Grand Master Herbert A. Ronin, and Right Worshipful Ralph W. Gerry, Grand Secretary. The delegation attended the meeting of the George Washington National Masonic Memorial Association, were guests of the Scottish Rite for a lunch, and attended the Grand Masters' Banquet. The meeting offers an opportunity for an exchange of ideas among the several states. Bevin B. Bump, Deputy Grand Master, was guest speaker at the Grand Secretaries Banquet.

#### CORNERSTONES AND DEDICATION CEREMONIES

On September 26th, 1982, the Grand Lodge was privileged to lay a cornerstone for the Centura Public School located 5 miles north of Cairo, Nebraska. The school serves Cairo, Boelus and Dannebrog. Ten years ago the Grand Lodge laid the cornerstone for the first part of the construction for the new high school. This time a very large facility was constructed for use of the junior high school and grade school. The cornerstone laying ceremony took place on the gymnasium stage before a crowd estimated by Brother Dean Drummond, Superintendent of the school, to be over 900 in number. The high school band took part in the ceremony. The cornerstone laying ceremony was on a Sunday afternoon, and was a part of the open house and, also, dedication of the new school addition.

On October 23, 1982, the Grand Lodge laid a cornerstone for a new Temple of Ornan Lodge No. 261 at Spencer, Nebraska. This was followed by the dedication of the Temple. The beautiful new Temple was packed with Masons, members of the Eastern Star and guests. The building and financing of the new Temple was made possible by a gift from W.B. Carl Schmidt, holder of the Bronze Jordan Medal of Ornan Lodge, and his sister, Past Matron of the Eastern Star, Josie Anderson.

On October 24, 1982, the Grand Lodge laid a cornerstone for a new residence building, home for the assistant superintendent of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont.

Again, on April 24, 1983, the Grand Lodge laid a cornerstone for the new Executive Office building on the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children grounds at Fremont. The building will house the executive offices for the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star, and the Grand York Rite bodies, Chapter, Council and Commandery. The symbolic ceremony of laying the cornerstone took place in the auditorium with the seats all filled and a standup crowd. This was a big event for both the Eastern Star and the York Rite. An open house for the new building, with total occupancy, will be held July 17, 1983 from 2:00 until 4:00. Both the Eastern Star and the York Rite Grand Secretary and Recorder attest to the highly increased office traffic, even in their temporary quarters, at the new location.

Each cornerstone laying ceremony involves considerable planning. Our thanks go to all these good people. Our Grand Marshal William Keller does a

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splendid job of organization. Our very capable Grand Orator James N. DeMoss says the right things in the right amount of time. Our thanks go to W.B. Henry Greenwalt of Lincoln Lodge No. 210 for making a very beautiful set of working tools, the square, level and plumb to be used at cornerstone ceremonies and a case to carry and preserve them.

The ceremony of cornerstone laying by the Grand Lodge is a very meaningful public event. We should look forward, yes, months and years ahead, in cornerstone laying for public buildings, churches and educational institutions.

#### **CENTENNIALS AND ANNIVERSARIES**

There were two lodges that reached their 100th year in 1982. Cedar River Lodge No. 89 at Fullerton held their 100th Anniversary on June 19, 1982. Vernon B. Keehn served as Worshipful Master and Wayne H. Nichols as Secretary. There were twelve Past Masters present among the 100 who banqueted at the Methodist Church.

Grand Lodge officers and wives in attendance were Grand Master Paul R. Pierce, Past Grand Masters T. Leo Stines and Harold C. Wurdeman, W. Grand Custodian Mannie O. Hansen, Grand Junior Deacon Paul R. Eveland and Grand Tyler Marvin M. Fink. The address and presentation of the Centennial Certificate was given by the Grand Master.

Ionic Lodge No. 87 of Niobrara held their 100th Anniversary October 2nd to a large open house at their new temple, and to a very large group of Masons, their wives and friends at their banquet. Thomas E. Colwell, Worshipful Master was Master of Ceremonies. Robert L. Olsen was Secretary. As Grand Master I introduced the several Grand Lodge Officers and their wives who were present, and presented the Worshipful Master with the Centennial Certificate.

The address of the evening was given by our Grand Orator James N. DeMoss, followed by an enjoyable concert provided by the Yankton Double Eagle Chorus.

#### GRAND LODGE AREA EDUCATIONAL MEETINGS

The Grand Lodge Education Committee was made up of Grand Lodge Officers, with  $M.\cdot.W.\cdot.T.$  Leo Stines as Chairman. This afforded an opportunity for the Officers and Brethren to meet together and discuss, present and receive ways of improving our Masonic work.

Ten Educational meetings were conducted this past year to reach all the lodges east of Nebraska Highway No. 14. A year ago we had all of our meetings west of Highway 14.

There were good turnouts for the Education meetings. The theme was "Masonic Education." We found that the brethren were hungry for information about Masonry. We distributed printed material and booklets, and encouraged questions, comments and constructive criticisms.

Credit for arranging the schedules for the meetings and for acting as Master of Ceremonies goes to M.V.W.T. Leo Stines. A thank you goes to the host lodges and their ladies for their hospitality. Host Lodges were Neligh, South Sioux City, West Point, Stromsburg, and Hebron in the fall months, and Fremont, Papillion, Weeping Water, Crete and Humbolt in the spring of the year.

The Education meetings get down to basic Masonic principles. There was good discussion and exchange of ideas. It gives an opportunity for the officers of the lodges and officers of the Grand Lodge to meet and mix. I encourage the continuance of the Education meetings. There are two main problems that exist with our Educational meetings. The first is that we cannot cover the whole state with one Committee. The second is that the lodges that need help the most are the ones most often absent from these meetings.

#### MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

The Masonic Service Association of 8120 Fenton Street, Silver Spring, Maryland 20910, continues to be a great source of help to both the Grand Lodge and the subordinate bodies of Masonry. Stewart M. L. Pollard, the Executive Secretary, will be our guest at this Grand Lodge Communicaton. A display and sale of many booklets printed by the Association will be available to the Masons. The state of Nebraska is an active and contributing member of the Masonic Service Association.

The Masonic Service Association is especially active in the visitation of Brethren in Veteran's Hospitals. On Valentine's Day this year Grand Lodge representatives, headed by Right Worshipful Robert Metcalf, Grand Senior Warden, and Brother Bob Adamsheck, Field Agent, visited the Veteran's Hospital in Lincoln. The Field Agents contribute generously of their time and are very much appreciated by the Brother patients.

The Masonic Service Association sends the Short Talk Bulletin to every lodge secretary. The secretary should make it available to the members. The Bulletin is very informative. It is published monthly and may be subscribed to for \$2.50 a year from the Association office. Some lodges are giving a one year subscription of Short Talk to each newly raised Master Mason.

I encourage every lodge to build a library of material from the Masonic Service Association and make the literature available to the membership of the lodge.

#### DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIAN APPOINTMENTS

After many years of service, I commissioned W.: Paul D. Fleming, 93, Commission No. 98, a Deputy Grand Custodian Emeritus. W.: Fleming was commissioned July 7, 1949 and served for more than 33 years. The occasion took place at the Deputy Grand Custodian banquet in Grand Island, September 10, 1982.

#### **GENERAL PERMISSIONS**

Permission was given Springfield Lodge No. 112 to enter a float in a local parade.

Permission was given Cement Lodge No. 211 at Wood River to join with the Eastern Star and enter a float in the town Centennial.

Permission was given Silver Cord Lodge No. 224 at Ainsworth to join with Long Pine Lodge No. 136 and enter a float in Ainsworth's Centennial parade.

Counsel was requested by Utica Lodge No. 96 of Utica regarding acceptance of the Presbyterian church at a cost of \$1.00, and to remodel it into a ground floor lodge. The Chairman of the Temple Advisory Committee, Past Grand Master Harold C. Wurdeman and I met with the Utica Brethren, inspected the facility, and recommended acceptance and remodeling to make it into a very nice Masonic Temple. Utica Lodge hopes to have remodeling completed to celebrate their 100th year in 1983.

Permission granted Ashlar Lodge No. 33 to continue to sponsor the Robert W. Boone Memorial Food Truck to the home at Plattsmouth.

Permission granted to the Omaha Area Master and Wardens Club solicitation as an annual project to raise money to buy gifts for residents at the Plattsmouth Home and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home at Fremont.

Permission granted Florence Lodge No. 281 to have a Christmas party and inviting Non-masons and children of Non-masons.

Permission granted the Scottish Rite of Lincoln to communicate with the subordinated lodges of Nebraska promoting sale of dinner and play tickets to the play "The Traitor", a story of Benedict Arnold. The play was put on by the Scottish Rite of Denver.

Permission granted Nebraska Lodge No. 1 A.  $\cdot$  F.  $\cdot$  & A.  $\cdot$  M.  $\cdot$  to welcome and receive the traveling degree team from Buechel Lodge No. 896 F.  $\cdot$  & A.:.M. from Louisville, Kentucky, using a Kentucky candidate with the Kentucky Master Mason's degree ritual. Permission granted Executive Officer Walter Miller the use of the Grand Lodge mailing list to solicit "DeMolay Uncle" requests to help finance and promote DeMolay in Nebraska.

Permission granted Northern Light Lodge No. 41 at Stanton to hold an outdoor meeting with the Degree Team from Mizpah Lodge No. 302 of Omaha conferring the second section of the Master Masons Degree.

Permission granted the Square and Compass Club of Bellevue to install and man a booth in the EXPO' 83 event, offering pamphlets and information about the Masonic fraternity.

#### **PERMISSIONS TO MOVE CHARTERS**

Most of the permissions to move charters were granted to lodges who wanted to meet "on a high hill or in a low vale", in an outdoor scene. This is encouraged because it is a special type of meeting and one that will be long remembered.

Other permissions were granted because of emergencies. Wisner Lodge No. 114 had their lodge interior gutted by fire. Nelson Lodge No. 77 had a lodge building wall collapse, had to abandon the building, complete degree work in Superior Lodge before becoming established temporarily in a church.

One of the nicest requests to move a charter comes annually from the Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 at Plattsmouth, to move their charter to the Masonic Home. Here the lodge meeting is held where our Masonic Brothers who reside in the Home, can walk, be wheeled, or carried into the lodge room, to again sit in lodge with the Brethren. Thoughtfulness is a part of Brotherhood.

#### DISPENSATIONS

Several dispensations were approved. For the most part bad weather at the time of the January scheduled installations postponed some, lack of enough officers to fill the chairs, or an unexpected move of an appointed or elected officer, necessitating a new election, or the waiver of a time element for a candidate moving out of the jurisdiction, especially for a military man.

The Grand Lodge of Kentucky was granted a special dispensation to present their Master Mason's degree work before Nebraska Lodge No. 1 in Omaha, but using a Kentucky, not a Nebraska candidate.

#### **CONSOLIDATIONS**

During the 1982-83 Masonic year I visited with representatives of Oak Leaf Lodge No. 312 of Lynch, chartered June 7, 1922, with a declining membership of 22, and with Ornan Lodge No. 261 of Spencer, with a membership of 47. The two lodges are just 14 miles apart. Spencer has a new lodge building completed in 1982. The Eastern Star of Lynch had already joined with the Eastern Star of Spencer. It appeared that a consolidation of the Oak Leaf Lodge No. 312 with Ornan Lodge No. 261 would be in the best interest of both lodges, and a consolidation was completed in 1983.

#### **BY-LAW AMENDMENTS**

During the year I approved 104 amendments for subordinate lodges. Most of the amendments were for changes in dues, mostly because of the Grand Lodge change from \$5.00 to \$7.00, but many to increase local lodge dues to meet increased operating expenses.

Many requested the local lodge dues for a specific amount, plus the Grand Lodge dues. If at some future date there should be another change in Grand Lodge dues it would then not be necessary to change the By-Laws of the subordinate lodge. It should be remembered that \$2.00 of the Grand Lodge dues goes to support The Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth.

#### REINSTATEMENTS

I have approved 49 applications for reinstatements this past year, none were rejected. A committee of the subordinate lodge, then the Grand Lodge Committee on Applications for Reinstatement review each application before coming to the Grand Master for his signature and seal. The new reinstatement form is two pages instead of four, and does not include a financial statement of the applicant. The subordinate lodge usually knows the applicant well, and should be in a position to judge whether or not he is a suitable applicant for reinstatement.

After a man has petitioned the lodge and been initiated as a Brother Mason, I see nothing wrong with actively soliciting the reinstatement of a Brother not in good standing. Situations may change, and I have seen instances of reinstatements among Brethren who have retired or whose obligations for their time or money have lessened. They may become good candidates for reinstatement.

#### TRIAL COMMISSIONS

Three trial commissions were appointed this year.

Scottsbluff Lodge No. 201 brought charges against a Master Mason, member of a lodge in Louisiana but residing in Scottsbluff. He was tried and given an indefinite suspension.

Fremont Lodge No. 15 brought charges against an Entered Apprentice Mason. He was tried and expelled.

Florence Lodge No. 281 of Omaha brought charges against a Brother for Unmasonic conduct. He was tried and expelled.

We are grateful to the Junior Wardens of these lodges and to the Brethren who helped set up and sat on the Trial Commissions.

We should remember to "whisper good counsel in the ear of a Brother" and possibly prevent the necessity of Trial Commissions.

#### NECROLOGY

During the past year one of our Past Grand Masters and 856 of our Brethren passed to that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveler returns.

M.:.W.:.Brother Edward Knight of Alliance was born December 4, 1911 and died March 3, 1983. He served as Grand Master in 1952, the youngest man to serve as Grand Master in Nebraska. Alliance Lodge No. 183 conducted graveside Masonic services. The Grand Lodge was represented by Grand Master Paul R. Pierce, and Past Grand Masters Frank J. Mattoon and T. Leo Stines.

#### STATE OF THE CRAFT

I could repeat last year's statements that we are continuing to see a positive

improvement in the State of the Craft; that more younger men are being brought into Masonry and filling the chairs, and that more lodges are building more new Temples with "ground floor - walk-in" facilities. The new Temples are planned for more social life in their kitchen and dining room, more efficiency in heating, cooling and lighting, and in general a nicer place to meet.

I appointed Past Grand Master Byron C. Jenkins Chairman of the Lodge Advisory Committee, and asked him to survey our lodges that were not in attendance at the Grand Lodge Communication, and may be in trouble from lack of leadership, enthusiasm, finances, lodge facilities and membership. A report on this will be found elsewhere.

I appointed a Special Committee headed by our Grand Junior Deacon Paul R. Eveland to investigate the cause and possible solutions of the reason for twenty per cent of our Entered Apprentices not advancing. He will make a report elsewhere.

Our Education Committee has had a new booklet printed entitled "Welcome to a Mason's Lady." A copy has been sent to every Secretary with a recommendation that each lodge order copies for their Entered Apprentice Masons, and elsewhere where it may benefit the Mason, his lady, or the lodge.

I asked Past Grand Master Herbert A. Ronin and our Grand Chaplain to write a presentation for a 60 year membership pin. They have done this. We will try it for a few years; then it should be put in printed booklet form like the 50 Year Presentation. Copies of this presentation are available through the Grand Lodge office.

I appointed Donald L. Andrews of Fremont Lodge No. 15, Fremont, a member of the Grand Lodge Office Committee. Brother Andrews is in charge of computer data for the Northwestern Bell Company, and our hope is that his expertise will be helpful in bringing our Grand Lodge Records on a continuing and up to date computer processing program.

I asked Past Grand Master and Past Grand Secretary Norris W. Lallman to bring the history of cornerstone laying up to date, and add it to the History of Cornerstone Layings prepared by our former Grand Historian George W. Rosenlof. The previous history was from 1857 to 1963. M. W. Brother Lallman has completed this work. We hope, over a period of years, to collect photographs of all the Temples and a picture of each of the cornerstones.

All vouchers for expenditures by the Grand Lodge office have been sent to me for approval and signature. Although this has entailed mailing instead of being signed by an appointed Brother in the Grand Lodge office, the office accountant tells me that the quick return of signed vouchers has caused no problem.

After Wisner Lodge No. 114 suffered a fire loss of the interior of their lodge I directed the Grand Secretary to call or correspond with all lodges in the state that had other lodges consolidate with them to find furniture, working tools and jewels. The response was tremendous. My compliments to all of you.

Our Grand Custodian Mannie O. Hansen has had to send me additional Certificates for Lodge Proficiency. This is encouraging. I'm happy to sign them as Grand Master and affix the Grand Master's Seal.

The Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont continue to serve the purposes for which they were intended. The daily maintenance, continuous improvement and plans for the future occupy the minds of devoted and dedicated Masons and members of the Eastern Star who sit on the two Boards. We have a right to be proud of these two Homes, and are grateful to the good people who assist in the ongoing needs of the elderly and the young.

We should all understand that in Freemasonry we are free men and have the right to choose. Our labors within the lodge are almost 100 per cent voluntary. It is good that we see the value in Masonry in building "... that Temple not made with hands", and the effect and influence of Masonry on others as well.

I am enthused about Masonry in Nebraska. I believe we are in a period of upswing. Continued growth will come about by enthusiastic leadership, education and unselfish use of our time, our talents and our money. Masonry and you can make a better world in which to live.

In several instances regarding 50 and 60 year pins, we find discrepancies in records. Some Brethren have been carried on the lodge rolls although they had not paid their dues for several years. Then the suspension record goes to the Grand Secretary, who suspends the member effective the year end of receipt of the record. Some secretaries wrongfully reinstate by collecting several years of back dues and consider the member in good standing for that period of time. The automatic suspension rule will help in the future.

Our most effective way of putting our Masonic image before the public and receiving petitions, is by the use of Friendship Dinners. The number of younger men, coming into Masonry because of these dinners, is amazing. The financing of these dinners has been by the lodges themselves, plus gratuities from the Shrine, the Scottish Rite and the York Rite. Right Worshipful Brother Charles W. Amidon is in charge of this work and deserves credit for seeing that it continues to function.

We are losing a good many of our older Brethren because of death. This cannot be helped. We still have too many suspensions. These occur more frequently in our larger urban lodges where the Brethren are not well known to each other. The local lodge membership committee should work with the secretary in keeping membership up and suspensions down.

Our Grand Custodian is working hard with his Deputy Grand Custodians, and reports to me on the activity and the proficiency of the lodges under each Deputy Grand Custodian. May I suggest to the lodges that you invite help from them more often. Sometimes the Custodians may not want to project themselves onto a lodge without invitation.

#### DECISIONS

No. 1: A secretary of a lodge raises a question about the eligibility for a Bronze Jordan Medal. In this instance, the oldest member in point of Masonic membership, had demitted from his original lodge for a period of time, then still keeping his membership in the lodge to which he had demitted, had reaffiliated with his original lodge. He is the oldest Mason in terms of years but not in the most years in his original lodge. The member claims right to the Bronze Jordan Medal in his original lodge.

In the historical book, "Masonry in Nebraska, 1857 - 1957, page 62, there is a record of a resolution adopted recommending the Bronze Jordan Medal"... be used as a decoration of the Master Mason who was a member of the lodge who has been longest a Mason . . . " In the form for Presentation of the Bronze Jordan medal, same source, page 63, "... the records show that you are the oldest Master Mason in point of service, in membership in \_\_\_\_\_\_

Lodge No. \_\_\_\_\_\_". I believe the resolution takes precedence over the presentation form. Also, there is no resolution showing the recipient must have the most number of years in the lodge awarding the Medal. I believe the original lodge should be defined as the lodge in which the Brother was raised, and the lodge he demitted to as the parent lodge, even though he reaffiliated with the original lodge. In this instance, under the existing resolution of June 1914, my decision is that the Brother is eligible for the Bronze Jordan Medal from his original lodge, because he is the oldest Mason in years of service holding membership in Masonry. I am making recommendations elsewhere clarifying eligibility for the Bronze Jordan Medal. It will be to the effect that after June 10, 1983, the Mason entitled to the Bronze Jordan Medal shall be the oldest Mason in terms of years of membership within the parent lodge which awards the Medal with credit given, but not concurrent, for membership years in other Nebraska lodges.

No. 2: A Brother belonging to a Nebraska Lodge now residing in another state believed he was entitled to a 50 year pin. The lodge records showed a period of years of suspension, although the Grand Lodge records showed no suspension or reinstatement. A lodge receipt, however, showed payment for one year's past dues, the current dues, and payment for assessment. The Grand Secretary informs me that reinstatement applications because of the move of the Grand Lodge offices from the fourth to the second floor appear to be missing. After considerable and persistent correspondence my decision was that the parent lodge records were adequate to determine that the Brother had not had a consistent record of membership and was not entitled to the 50 year pin.

No. 3: A decision was requested about a funeral for a Brother Master Mason. The question was could the Brother have a Blue Lodge Masonic Funeral service followed by another service by the Scottish Rite in another place at the time of internment? After consulting with the Sovereign Grand Inspector General of the Scottish Rite I advised the inquirer that there would be no Memorial service by the Scottish Rite to follow the Blue Lodge Masonic Service. The Blue Lodge Service is complete and there should be no extension of it by the Rose Croix Service.

No. 4: A lodge asked permission to create an Endowment Fund Board of Trustees for the purpose of building and maintaining their lodge property. Their plans appeared to be well planned and legally drawn. The decision was to give them permission to proceed as long as their plans and usages did not conflict with Chapters VI on Finance and Chapter VII on Property of the Grand Lodge.

No. 5: A lodge asked help in making a decision to accept a church building for \$1.00 to be converted into a ground floor lodge. Chairman of the Temple Building Committee M.:.W.:. Brother Harold C. Wurdeman inspected the church building. We found that it had had a new basement just 15 years before, new electrical wiring at the time, and new zoned furnaces. Recommendations were suggested for the remodeling and permission given to accept the offer

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to buy the building for \$1.00.

No. 6: Due to a misunderstanding a request was made for an opinion and a ruling on receiving petitions for membership of three applicants who were connected with work at Offutt Air Force Base. In my opinion the Grand Master's authority to grant dispensations to confer the degrees upon candidates without reference to time applies to period of time between degrees, and not to the residential requirement of one year of residence within the state of Nebraska.

No. 7: A non-resident Brother of a Nebraska lodge requested an "Absolute Demit" but wanted to remain a member of Low Twelve. I explained that membership may be terminated in four ways, namely by suspension, expulsion, demission or death. I explained that suspension by non-payment of dues would leave a man a Mason but not in good standing, and usually negates any or all Masonic connections. Request denied.

No. 8: A small lodge in a small town inherited a sizable bequest. They considered giving the money to the community for a civic building, then consolidating with a neighboring lodge. I asked a Past Grand Master to explain to them that such a gift was illegal according to our Grand Lodge law, and that if they consolidated, the assets of their lodge would go to the lodge with whom they consolidated. We are glad now to have a request for a feasibility study for a new temple, and have suggested a conference with our Temple Building Committee Chairman, which they have done.

No. 9: A resolution was submitted by five Master Masons from Fremont to move the office of the Grand Lodge from Omaha to Fremont. Since there is nothing in the Grand Lodge Constitution and By-Laws to the effect that the office must be in Omaha, I ruled that there was no need to offer a resolution to move it, and that it could be put before the Grand Lodge for their decision by Recommendation of the Grand Master, or the Grand Lodge Office Committee.

No. 10: A Nebraska County Centennial committee requested a Nebraska lodge to provide a flag representative of Blue Lodge Masonry for outdoor display. My reply was that although other Masonic Bodies might have banners suitable for display, the Blue Lodge has only one, the flag of the United States of America.

No. 11: A petition was received by a Nebraska lodge by a "delinquent" member of the Nebraska lodge who now resides in a neighboring state. The petition to reinstate was acted upon by the investigating committee, voted upon in a regular meeting, by secret ballot, and failed to acquire a 2/3 affirmative vote. The question from the Nebraska lodge was how long must the petitioner wait before resubmitting his reinstatement petition. I suggested the lodge use the same period of time as needed when a new petition is rejected, which is 6 months. See Sec. 2-908 under PETITIONS AND PETITIONERS, page 50.

No. 12. Upon request of Fairmont Lodge No. 48 to advance an Entered Apprentice Mason from Composite Lodge No. 81, who received his degree many years ago. My interpretation is that after three years the Composite Lodge No. 81 no longer has jurisdiction.

#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

#### **RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:**

Jordan Medals are referred to under CHAPTER VI FINANCE Sec. 2-616 and under CHAPTER VII PROPERTY Sec. 2-709 OWNERSHIP OF JEWELS. I recommend a clear cut statement of eligibility and entitlement for both the Gold and the Bronze Jordan Medals under a new heading. I suggest that a new chapter be added to our by-laws as follows:

#### CHAPTER XI

#### MASONIC BADGES AND AWARDS

Sec. 3-1101 — DISTINQUISHED SERVICE BADGES — All Master Masons in good standing who have been such for periods of fifty, sixty and seventy years, respectively, and who are members of subordinate lodges in this jurisdiction, shall be entitled upon application, to receive from the Grand Lodge a suitable badge or button, which badge or button shall be selected and provided by the Grand Secretary and paid for out of the Grand Lodge funds. Subordinate Lodges are encouraged and authorized to present a suitable badge or button to Master Masons who are members in good standing of the Subordinate Lodge, for a period of twenty-five years, at the expense of the Subordinate Lodge presenting the same.

Sec. 3-1102 — THE GOLD JORDAN MEDAL — The Mason entitled to the Gold Jordan Medal shall be a Master Mason in good standing residing in Nebraska, with the longest period of membership in Nebraska lodges.

Sec. 3-1103 — THE BRONZE JORDAN MEDAL — The Mason entitled to the Bronze Jordan Medal shall be a Master Mason in good standing, residing in Nebraska, and his present parent lodge may be the only lodge authorized to award the Medal, but the previous period of service in any other Nebraska lodge or lodges shall be considered, although not concurrently, in determining his eligibility.

Sec. 3-1104 — OWNERSHIP OF THE JORDAN MEDALS AND GRAND-MASTER JEWELS — The Gold Jordan Medal and the Bronze Jordan Medals shall be and remain the property of the Grand Lodge, and if left with the recipients the Gold Jordan Medal shall be returned to the Grand Lodge, and the Bronze Jordan Medal returned to the lodge awarding the Medal upon the death of the recipient, or of his moving from the state. Effective 1981, the Past Grand Master's Jewels shall be and remain the property of the Grand Lodge, and be returned to the Grand Lodge upon the death of the wearer. The name of each wearer shall be perpetuated on the Past Grand Master's Jewel.

Referring to Sec. 3-1101 — DISTINGUISHED SERVICE BADGES, Page 44: As Grand Master I have directed the Grand Secretary to honor requests from lodges asking for 70 year badges. There were several this past year. I presented one myself in a special ceremony in the Franklin Lodge followed by a dinner at the hotel in Franklin.

Referring to Sections 3-1101; 3-1102; 3-1103 and 3-1104 as suggested in the foregoing Recommendations under CHAPTER XI, MASONIC BADGES AND AWARDS: I believe these sections allow deletion of all other references to JORDAN MEDALS, see FINANCE Sec. 2-616 on page 44; Sec. 2-709 OWNERSHIP OF JEWELS, under PROPERTY on page 45; and under

CHAPTER VI - FINANCE - Sec. 2-615 - DISTINGUISHED SERVICE BADGES on page 44, referring to 50, 60 and 25 year buttons or badges.

#### **RECOMMENDATION NO. 2**

#### SUBJECT: SPECIAL PURPOSE LODGES

The Nebraska Society for Masonic Research, at my request, has drafted a new Code Section that would permit the charter of special-purpose Lodges such as research and funerals. The provision contemplates that charters would be granted to special-purpose Lodges under the control of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

The following RECOMMENDED CONSTITUTIONAL SECTION FOR SPECIAL-PURPOSE LODGES "ARTICLES XII - FORMATION OF SUBORDINATE LODGES, I believe has been carefully worked out, and I recommend it be made a part, designated as Sec. 5.

Notwithstanding any other provision or provisions of the Constitutions, Laws, and Edicts of this Grand Lodge, the Grand Master, in his discretion, is hereby authorized to grant dispensations to special-purpose Lodges to perform certain customary special-purpose functions related to Masonry and for the benefit of the Craft, upon such terms and conditions as may be detailed in any such dispensation. Such special-purpose Lodge may, thereafter, present to the Grand Lodge their petition for a charter as such special-purpose Lodge, requesting a name, and the enumeration of its customary special-purpose functions, and also, the enumeration of the provisions of the Constitution, Laws, and Edicts of this Grand Lodge, if any, which customarily would not apply to such special-purpose Lodge. If the Grand Lodge, in its discretion, approves such petition, a charter shall be issued which shall specifically enumerate all of the rights and duties of such Lodge, and which shall also specifically enumerate such customarily inapplicable provisions of the Constitution, Laws, and Edicts of this Grand Lodge, vis. said Lodge. As used in this provision, any reference to 'custom' denotes only a reference to the customs and usages of Regular Ancient Craft Masonry which have heretofore developed under the Constitution, Laws, and Edicts thereof, whether or not the same shall be codified or uncodified, and not otherwise."

#### **RECOMMENDATION NO. 3**

An 18 page mimeographed paper, size 5% x 8%, to fit in a three hole notebook the size of our Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Lodge, entitled

DIAGRAMS OF FLOOR WORK for the DEDICATION OF MASONIC TEMPLES GRAND LODGE, AF & AM OF NEBRASKA

has been carefully worked out by Past Grand Master Harold C. Wurdeman, who also was Grand Marshal for several years. The diagrams showing the legend of the officers, the furniture of the lodge, the sequence of timing and paths taken by the officers and has been carefully diagrammed. There are explanations of steps taken, directions, and specific instructions for each officer. The work has been carefully examined by past Grand Marshals, Past Grand Masters, and used in the Dedication of a Masonic Temple this year. As Grand Master I approved the work on October 8, 1982 and directed its distribution to the Grand Lodge Officers:

#### **MY RECOMMENDATION:**

I recommend the adoption of the DIAGRAMS OF FLOOR WORK for the DEDICATION OF MASONIC TEMPLES as prepared by Most Worshipful Brother Harold C. Wurdeman and that it be used as a part of the Monitor & Ceremonies of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

#### **RECOMMENDATION NO. 4**

The Trustees of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont have received a substantial bequest to the Home, the money to be used for the construction of buildings. The Grand York Rite bodies and the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star were looking for different office facilities because of the traffic problems in downtown Omaha, the difficulty in parking near the offices in the old Masonic Temple building, the high rent, and because of the unfortunate beating of the Grand Recorder of the York Rite after leaving his office. These reasons are not to degrade Omaha because such conditions could exist in many large cities.

The Trustees of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children offered temporary office space to the two bodies while it constructed a new executive office building for the York Rite and the Eastern Star. The temporary office space was accepted and both bodies have stated that their office traffic has increased many times since the move from downtown Omaha. A new office building, with the basic contract of \$184,000 is nearly complete, and will be occupied soon by the Grand York Rite and the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star with open house scheduled for July 17, 1983. The rental terms are \$300 plus utilities for each unit. The York Rite and the Eastern Star are elated with the facilities, the location and the rental terms.

A similar offer has been extended to me as Grand Master, to build an executive office building for the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. The cost of the building, up to \$200,000 to be paid for by the Home.

The location of the building on the Fremont campus, the dimensions of the proposed building, the interior and exterior design to be subject to negotiation between the Home and the Lodge. The proposed rental is to be \$600 a month plus utilities. The proposed lease is for a minimum of 10 years with renewable options to be agreed upon by the two parties. Title to the real estate and all improvements and fixtures attached thereto shall remain in The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children.

Should an affirmative decision be forthcoming to the invitation, if desired, temporary office space will be made available for Grand Lodge occupancy during the period of construction of the new office building. The offer to the Grand Lodge is an offer to negotiate, and not an offer in a contractual sense. Finalizing will require considerable negotiation between the two parties; however, and I quote, "I assure you that the Home will, to the best of its abilities, abide by the basic proposal set forth herein." The building now occupied by the Grand Lodge office presently, has been sold and the Masonic Temple sign removed. The Grand Lodge had no ownership rights in the building. The present rent, on a month to month basis, is \$1,375 plus electricity of \$100 plus a month. Consideration of another downtown Omaha location at less rent would only continue the traffic and parking problem.

Completion of a new office building for the Grand Lodge could take 18 to 24 months. In the meantime the Grand Lodge Office Committee could put into effect its already contemplated condensing of the many office records in computer form to take up less filing and floor space, and to duplicate the records for safe keeping.

The Chairman of our Temple Advisory Committee, Past Grand Master Harold C. Wurdeman, an architect by profession, has investigated the present space used for the Grand Lodge office, considered the amount of money available through the Home to build a new office facility, and has concluded that a very adequate office facility could be built for the Grand Lodge within the \$200,000 figure.

#### **MY RECOMMENDATION:**

I recommend the Grand Lodge A..F.. & A..M.. of Nebraska at its 126th Annual Communication, vote on whether or not to accept the offer of The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children to build a new Executive Office building on the Fremont campus, at the expense of the Home estimated to be \$200,000, with a ten year lease and rental terms of \$600 a month plus utilities, and if the vote is in favor, that the Grand Lodge start immediate negotiations with the Home to bring the new office facilities to fruition.

#### APPRECIATION

The word "Thank You" is just not big enough to say how much I have appreciated the help, the good fellowship, the working together for the good of Masonry in Nebraska.

When I was down on my back with neurosurgery the cards, the letters, flowers and other means of good wishes came in by the hundreds. The most effective card was perhaps "You Can Make It." To my good wife Helen, the Past Grand Masters, the Grand Officers, the office help, the Grand and Deputy Grand Custodians, the Committee members, the Worshipful Masters, Secretaries, and all the Brethren, I do again say Thank You.

To the Grand Lodge who gave me, by your vote, the opportunity to serve as Grand Master, it will probably be the best year of my life because it meant working with you. I hope I have merited your approval.

#### THE NEBRASKA SOCIETY FOR MASONIC RESEARCH

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

During the past year, membership in the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research has grown to about 50 Brothers, including members in Italy, Germany, New Zealand, Maine, Montana, and Georgia. Our most significant growth has been in our library and collection. The library now contains over 400 bound books; the New Age, Royal Arch Mason, Knights Templar, and Philalathes magazines; and nearly all of the Short Talk Bulletins. We have over 500 2x2 slides and about 150 4x4 slides on Masonry. We have started collections of the papers of Charles F. Adams, Judge Carter, William Bowen, "Uncle Bob" French, and Roscoe Pound.

Our collection includes over 200 items, including nearly a complete Lodge room of furniture, hats, aprons, uniforms, jewels, gavels, swords, patents, pictures, pennies, china, glassware, and ceramics. We have brethren helping us translate articles written in German, Danish, French, and Portuguese. Through the help of the Nebraska State Historical Society, we are now working toward preserving and mounting delicate papers and documents, restoring leather, and binding old books.

Most encouraging has been the support of Lodges and Masonic organizations. We have received contributions from Geneva Lodge, and the Hiram Club of Lincoln, as well as from York Rite bodies, Eastern Star, DeMolay, and the Scottish Rite. Several individuals have been generous as well.

We now have regular correspondence and exchange of publications with the Maine Lodge of Research, Southern California Lodge of Research, Quatuor Coronati Lodge of Research, and the Grand Lodge of Denmark.

We wish to extend our sincere thanks to the Most Worshipful The Grand Master, who during his term has been of great help and encouragement. We also sincerely thank the Grand Secretary for his assistance in forwarding correspondence, answering inquiries, and supporting our activities in ways too numerous to mention.

We believe that our Society and its library belongs to all the Masons of Nebraska. As our collection grows, we find that we have a greater responsibility for preserving the history of Masonry in Nebraska. With the greater responsibility, we acquire a greater financial burden. We will meet this responsibility through the continued support of our members, and Masons who continue to show their support through their tax deductible contributions.

The Society looks forward to the coming year and hopes that it will continue to be of benefit to the Craft.

#### **REPORT OF**

### COMMITTEE ON LODGE ADVISORY

Most Worshipful Grand Master Paul R. Pierce charged the Committee to determine which Lodges are in need of help and try to assist such Lodges.

A questionnaire was prepared and sent to 44 Lodges that did not appear at the 1982 Grand Lodge session. The questionnaire was designed to determine what the condition of the Lodges were. 32 Lodges did respond to the questionnaire. That leaves 12 Lodges that could be in deep trouble, but we have no data on them.

Of the 32 Lodges that did answer 10 seem to be in good shape and that brings us down to at least 22 that are in trouble. Of that 22 it would appear that 10 have caretaker governments and are just waiting for the Lodge to die and give it a decent burial. Even more troubling is they seem to reject any help.

Of the 22 Lodges 21 do not carry out the Guest Night Program. 21 have no programs other than reading the minutes and paying the bills. 16 of these Lodges are not proficient. 10 had no degree work in 1982. 12 had one or at the most two degrees in 1982.

Of the 22 Lodges 8 had no members under the age of thirty, 7 were not able to hold all regular meetings because of the lack of a quorum. 5 others seem to be holding their meetings even though they don't have a quorum.

These Lodges range from 150 members down to 24 members. The average age is 60, 17 own their temple, 16 report their financial condition as very good, 16 as fair to good, 3 as very poor.

#### DECISIONS

No. 1: A secretary of a lodge raises a question about the eligibility for a Bronze Jordan Medal. In this instance, the oldest member in point of Masonic membership, had demitted from his original lodge for a period of time, then still keeping his membership in the lodge to which he had demitted, had reaffiliated with his original lodge. He is the oldest Mason in terms of years but not in the most years in his original lodge. The member claims right to the Bronze Jordan Medal in his original lodge.

In the historical book, "Masonry in Nebraska, 1857 - 1957, page 62, there is a record of a resolution adopted recommending the Bronze Jordan Medal"... be used as a decoration of the Master Mason who was a member of the lodge who has been longest a Mason..." In the form for Presentation of the Bronze Jordan medal, same source, page 63, "... the records show that you are the oldest Master Mason in point of service, in membership in \_\_\_\_\_\_

Lodge No. \_\_\_\_\_\_.". I believe the resolution takes precedence over the presentation form. Also, there is no resolution showing the recipient must have the most number of years in the lodge awarding the Medal. I believe the original lodge should be defined as the lodge in which the Brother was raised, and the lodge he demitted to as the parent lodge, even though he reaffiliated with the original lodge. In this instance, under the existing resolution of June 1914, my decision is that the Brother is eligible for the Bronze Jordan Medal from his original lodge, because he is the oldest Mason in years of service holding membership in Masonry. I am making recommendations elsewhere clarifying eligibility for the Bronze Jordan Medal. It will be to the effect that after June 10, 1983, the Mason entitled to the Bronze Jordan Medal shall be the

oldest Mason in terms of years of membership within the parent lodge which awards the Medal with credit given, but not concurrent, for membership years in other Nebraska lodges. Approved.

No. 2: A Brother belonging to a Nebraska Lodge now residing in another state believed he was entitled to a 50 year pin. The lodge records showed a period of years of suspension, although the Grand Lodge records showed no suspension or reinstatement. A lodge receipt, however, showed payment for one year's past dues, the current dues, and payment for assessment. The Grand Secretary informs me that reinstatement applications because of the move of the Grand Lodge offices from the fourth to the second floor appear to be missing. After considerable and persistent correspondence my decision was that the parent lodge records were adequate to determine that the Brother had not had a consistent record of membership and was not entitled to the 50 year pin. Approved.

No. 3: A decision was requested about a funeral for a Brother Master Mason. The question was could the Brother have a Blue Lodge Masonic Funeral service followed by another service by the Scottish Rite in another place at the time of internment? After consulting with the Sovereign Grand Inspector General of the Scottish Rite I advised the inquirer that there would be no Memorial service by the Scottish Rite to follow the Blue Lodge Masonic Service. The Blue Lodge Service is complete and there should be no extension of it by the Rose Croix Service. Approved.

No. 4: A lodge asked permission to create an Endowment Fund Board of Trustees for the purpose of building and maintaining their lodge property. Their plans appeared to be well planned and legally drawn. The decision was to give them permission to proceed as long as their plans and usages did not conflict with Chapters VI on Finance and Chapter VII on Property of the Grand Lodge. Approved.

No. 5: A lodge asked help in making a decision to accept a church building for \$1.00 to be converted into a ground floor lodge. Chairman of the Temple Building Committee M.:.W.:. Brother Harold C. Wurdeman inspected the church building. We found that it had had a new basement just 15 years before, new electrical wiring at the time, and new zoned furnaces. Recommendations were suggested for the remodeling and permission given to accept the offer to buy the building for \$1.00. Approved.

No. 6: Due to a misunderstanding a request was made for an opinion and a ruling on receiving petitions for membership of three applicants who were connected with work at Offutt Air Force Base. In my opinion the Grand Master's authority to grant dispensations to confer the degrees upon candidates without reference to time applies to period of time between degrees, and not to the residential requirement of one year of residence within the state of Nebraska. Approved.

No. 7: A non-resident Brother of a Nebraska lodge requested an "Absolute Demit" but wanted to remain a member of Low Twelve. I explained that membership may be terminated in four ways, namely by suspension, expulsion, demission or death. I explained that suspension by non-payment of dues would leave a man a Mason but not in good standing, and usually negates any or all Masonic connections. Request denied. Approved subject to the removal of the word "usually" and the observation that there is no "Absolute Demit" in Nebraska Masonry.

No. 8: A small lodge in a small town inherited a sizable bequest. They considered giving the money to the community for a civic building, then consolidating with a neighboring lodge. I asked a Past Grand Master to explain to them that such a gift was illegal according to our Grand Lodge law, and that if they consolidated, the assets of their lodge would go to the lodge with whom they consolidated. We are glad now to have a request for a feasibility study for a new temple, and have suggested a conference with our Temple Building Committee Chairman, which they have done. Approved.

No. 9: A resolution was submitted by five Master Masons from Fremont to move the office of the Grand Lodge from Omaha to Fremont. Since there is nothing in the Grand Lodge Constitution and By-Laws to the effect that the office must be in Omaha, I ruled that there was no need to offer a resolution to move it, and that it could be put before the Grand Lodge for their decision by Recommendation of the Grand Master, or the Grand Lodge Office Committee.

Approved. This is just simply removing this particular request of the Lodge at Fremont. This will all come again under Recommendations.

No. 10: A Nebraska County Centennial committee requested a Nebraska lodge to provide a flag representative of Blue Lodge Masonry for outdoor display. My reply was that although other Masonic Bodies might have banners suitable for display, the Blue Lodge has only one, the flag of the United States of America. Approved.

No. 11: A petition was received by a Nebraska lodge by a "delinquent" member of the Nebraska lodge who now resides in a neighboring state. The petition to reinstate was acted upon by the investigating committee, voted upon in a regular meeting, by secret ballot, and failed to acquire a 2/3 affirmative vote. The question from the Nebraska lodge was how long must the petitioner wait before resubmitting his reinstatement petition. I suggested the lodge use the same period of time as needed when a new petition is rejected, which is 6 months. See Sec. 2-908 under PETITIONS AND PETITIONERS, page 50. Disapproved.

No. 12. Upon request of Fairmont Lodge No. 48 to advance an Entered Apprentice Mason from Composite Lodge No. 81, who received his degree many years ago. My interpretation is that after three years the Composite Lodge No. 81 no longer has jurisdiction. Disapproved.

I now move the approval of the entire section on decisions. Carried.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation No. 1 – about distinguished services badges, the Jurisprudence Committee feels that the Committee on Codification of the law should examine this whole situation and make a report at the next Annual Communication. There are several possibilities of accomplishing this either by modifying existing sections or what he suggested make a new section. I move that the recommendation of the Committee be accepted. Carried.

Recommendation No. 2 — Calls for a constitutional amendment. Therefore, we cannot take any action on it. The Constitution can only be amended as prescribed in the code book. If some five members want to put in a resolution to modify the constitution, that would have to be the procedure.

Recommendation No. 3 — Approved subject to deleting the words "monitor and" on page 16. The reason for that is, we didn't want to feel that it was obligating anybody to print this in the monitor. I move the approval of the recommendation. Carried.

Recommendation No. 4 — The Committee recommends that recommendation No. 4 not be approved. And that the incoming Grand Master appoint a committee to consider all aspects of moving the Grand Lodge office from its present location and report its finding at the 127th Annual Communication. I move the approval of the Committee's recommendation.

R. W. BEVIN B. BUMP. DEPUTY GRAND MASTER.

There has been a call for the question, do I hear a second? All those in favor of calling the question signify by the usual sign of Masons when voting. Down hands opposed same sign. Carried.

The question: My understanding is that the Grand Master has made the recommendation which the Jurisprudence Committee has rejected. Together with the recommendation that a Committee be appointed by the incoming Grand Master to make study and report at the next Grand Lodge Session. At this time, we will then vote on the question. Is there a request for a written ballot (none). All those in favor of the motion which would disapprove the recommendation of the Grand Master signify by raising hands, down hands, opposed same sign. Carried. Thank you for the peace and harmony that prevails at this Grand Lodge.

M.·.W.·. HAROLD C. WURDEMAN, PAST GRAND MASTER, CHAIR-MAN OF THE JURISPURDENCE COMMITTEE.

I move adoption of entire report. Carried.

The Jurisprudence Committee has one more recommendation: We feel that the decisions of the Grand Master over the years, should be recorded. The Jurisprudence Committee recommends that the Committee on Codification of the Law review all decision of the Grand Masters since 1977 with copies being made available to Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens and all members of the Jurisprudence Committee.

#### **GRAND LODGE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**

In our report at the 125th Communication held in June of 1982, we gave indication of a slow but steady increase in new Entered Apprentices over the past three years. We were encouraged by this apparent reversal of a declining trend and felt confident 1982 would be a banner year for newly initiated brothers and then the results were tabulated by the Grand Secretary. Instead of the expected INCREASE, we were shocked to learn 41 FEWER Entered Apprentices were placed on the books at the end of 1982 compared to 1981. Our overall membership DECLINED by 780 between 1981 and 1982. A 2.5% drop! As gloomy as the future may seem, several Lodges have shown an increase in membership simply by making aggressive efforts to do something about it.

We are referring to those lodges which have held "Friendship Dinners" in the past year and have refused to stand idly by and watch their membership decline and their efforts have paid off.

Between June of 1982 and June of 1983, 28 lodges hosted dinners to which 479 guests were invited and almost without exception, each of these lodges received petitions . . . some as many as six for one night's effort.

We can almost guarantee that if the other 202 lodges in the state would join in promoting "Friendship Dinners", our report for 1984 will show the greatest increase in membership since the 1950's.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK** M.:.W.:. Louis V. Sylvester, 281, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful, The Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

As has been the case in the past few years, your Committee on Nebraska Work is again pleased to advise that no matters of controversial nature have been submitted to us for action or a decision. The Esoteric and Standard Floor Work has and is being followed by our Lodges and the Grand Custodian informs us that the degree work remains at a high point of proficiency. There is, of course, an exception here and there, due to the lack of interest on the part of some brethren and not to the lack of instruction from the Deputy Custodians. The Deputies are doing yeoman work and the Grand Lodge continues to owe them a deep debt of thanks for their devotion and dedication.

The Annual Report of the Grand Custodian has been submitted to the Committee. It reflects the continued dedication of the Grand Custodian and his Deputies and the scope of their work in covering as much as 90 percent of the State through Central Schools.

The Grand Custodian was examined as to his proficiency in the Esoteric and Standard Floor Work and found to be most proficient in both. The Chairman of the Committee was present at the Annual Deputies School in Grand Island and here also witnessed exceptional work in the conferring of the three degrees.

All vouchers for expense of the Grand Custodian and the Deputies were submitted to the Grand Master for approval, at his request.

Upon the recommendation of the Grand Custodian your Committee was pleased to approve and recommend to the Grand Master that the following brethren be commissioned Deputies: Augustus W. Clark, District No. 22; Justin F. Fauss, District No. 15 and Vincent W. Rosenberger, District No. 28. We further joined in the recommendation that Paul D. Fleming of District No. 23, who had submitted his resignation as a Deputy after 33 years of dedicated service, be commissioned Deputy Custodian Emeritus. We welcome our new Deputies and extend our sincere thanks as well as those of the Grand Lodge to Brother Fleming for his long period of service.

Your Committee has examined the budget request of the Grand Custodian and recommend approval of his request for \$900 for his travel expense for Grand Lodge functions. This is the same amount appropriated a year ago. This past year inflation finally caught up with the travel expense, including the annual meeting, of the Grand Custodians and the Deputies and it was necessary to ask for an additional appropriation of \$2,000 which was granted. In view of this the Committee approves the recommendation for an appropriation of \$12,000 to cover this budgeted item.

Because the resolution currently before the Grand Lodge with reference to permitting so called keys or ponies, if adopted, would directly effect the operation of the Grand Custodian's Department, your Committee reiterates their previous stand of opposing any effort to change the promulgation of the work of the three degrees of Masonry.

\*During 1982 the Grand Lodge received from Glenn O. Emick, a gift of \$58,194.00 which funds were restricted by the donor for the purpose of funding certain scholarships for members and former members of the Masonic Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont, Nebraska. During Fiscal 1983, these restricted funds earned net \$5,989.00. The total in this fund as of April 30, 1983, was \$69,810.00. # "EARTHQUAKES"

#### W.:. James N. DeMoss, Grand Orator

I want to share with you a few moments this evening on a subject we shall refer to as "Earthquakes." Naturally, when this subject is first mentioned, your first thoughts will go to some period in recent time when the ground has shaken with terrible and devastating results.

There is a biblical foundation for my subject which is found in the 27th Verse of the 12th Chapter of the Gospel of Matthew wherein we read these words: ". . . the removal of those things that can be shaken that those things which cannot be shaken may remain." When these words were written they were written in 'Earthquake' times. Earthquakes were more common then than they are now. However, it was not only the ground that was shaking — Governments were falling. Long held beliefs of the people were changing drastically. In fact, it perhaps appeared to the people of that time that the whole world was shaking and about to collapse around them and come to an end.

If we stop and think about it — it isn't really that much different today, is it? We have had some terrible natural earthquakes within the memory of everyone here tonight. We also have seen governments tumble - long held beliefs change - philosophies which once were held up to us have been seen to fold up within themselves. Things that in the past were believed to be established on rock hard foundations have been seen to crumble and disappear. This process in itself should not be alarming. As we each grow older

each day our conceptions of the things around us change. This is living. Enchantments we held in our youth have, with advancing age, disappeared. Beliefs we once held have changed as we grow in knowledge. We no longer accept as factual many of those things which we as children held so dear. The Apostle Paul perhaps put it best when he said, "When I was a child, I thought as a child, I spoke as a child, and I acted as a child. Now that I have become a man, I have put away childish things."

However, we should not believe that the enchantments we held when we were younger were any less real than those we hold today. When a farmer goes forth and plants a seed, and the seed grows the stalk, and the stalk bears the fruit, the fruit cannot believe that the seed was fictional and did not exist. Without the seed there would have been no fruit.

We are observing in the world many governmental actions by our own government and others which may be perplexing to us. We have sometimes too great a tendency to push them aside as being beyond our power to influence, or being so far away geographically that they will have no influence on us. We need to pay attention to what is going on in the world around us. What happens half the earth away can indeed have a direct influence upon us.

There is afoot today, and has been for some 135 years, a very definite movement by some to inflict upon the will of others, through domination, a way of life which will stifle and inhibit growth and result in a loss of such proportions that any earthquake will disappear in insignificance by comparison.

The problems of the world are getting closer and closer to us here in the United States. Look at what has happened in recent months - Grenada has fallen. Nicaragua has fallen. El Salvador is the current target - and then there will be others. Honduras - Guatemala - Costa Rica - Panama - and even eventually Mexico.

There are two ways to look at the problems that face Central America today. One way is that what is happening is a genuine revolution because the Governments of those countries are indeed oppressive in their policies and the way they treat their citizens. The other way is that what is happening in Central America is a planned take-over by another governmental philosophy with a distinct view toward world domination. I am not here tonight to argue one way or the other. Each argument has its own merits. The question is - what are we going to do about it - one way or the other - here in America today? - The answer - Not much! Oh, we'll send a little money as aid, we'll 'tut-tut' the leaders of the other countries for their oppressive policies, but that'll be about it.

One day, however, we are going to wake up and find ourselves surrounded by this other political group! Then - Then we are going to wonder what kind of an earthquake has caused us to be in a situation such as that. How did it all happen so quickly? Then it is going to be a little late for us to take much action. When we do take action, all of our attention is going to be centered right here at home while the rest of the world is open to plunder and left to shift for themselves. I speak of these things just to illustrate that there is today in World Government earthquakes of which we need to be aware.

As we look at the philosophies that we hold as Master Masons, we also find that we are from time to time called upon to make decisions which are not popular with everyone. Have we ever been known to change something just because "that's the way it has always been done in the past?" Sometimes change is good and sometimes change is not good. It behooves each and every one of us as we work in Masonry to be extremely careful of the product of our working tools.

In 1901 a 21 year old man was raised in Lancaster Lodge No. 54 in Lincoln, Nebraska. Four years later this man was elected Master of his Lodge, and in 1907 he held the office that I now hold - Grand Orator of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. This man was a prolific writer and scholar. His Masonic writings are many and numerous and I recommend them to anyone who seeks further light. I refer to none other than Roscoe Pound.

In his "Lecture on the Philosophy of Freemasonry,", pages 87-88, you will find this - and I quote:

"Every world-organization hitherto has been wrecked ultimately upon its own dogmatism. It has taken the dogmas, the interpretations, the philosophy of its youth for a fixed order of nature. It has assumed that universality consisted in forcing these dogmas, these interpretations, this philosophy upon all times to come. While it has rested serene in the ruts made by its own prosperity, the world has marched by it unseen. We have a glorious body of tradition handed down to us from the past, which we owe it to transmit unimpaired to the future. But let us understand what in it is fundamental and eternal, and what is mere interpretation to make it of service to the past. Let us while we have it use it well to make it of service to the present. Yet let us fasten upon it nothing hard and fast that serves well enough to make it useful today, but may make it useless tomorrow. As the apprentice stands in the corner of the lodge, the working tools are put in his hands and he is taught their uses. But they are not his. They are the tools of the lodge. He is to use them that the Worshipful Master may have pleasure and the Craft profit. The Grand Master of the Universe has entrusted to us the principles of Masonry as working tools. They, too, are not ours, they belong to the lodge of the world. We are to use them that He may have pleasure and the Craft of humanity that labors in this wide lodge of the world may profit thereby."

Let us look well to the charge that is ours!

# GREETINGS

Presented Commission in Nebraska Navy by Grand Master Paul R. Pierce. STEWART M. L. POLLARD, Executive Secretary, Masonic Service Association:

 $M.\cdot.W.:$  Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, my brethren all. For a man that spent 29 years as a dough boy in the infantry, the water is getting mighty deep. I do thank you,  $M.\cdot.W.\cdot$ . Sir, for this presentation. A number of years ago,  $M.\cdot.W.\cdot$ . Brother Sylvester was instrumental in having my Father awarded a similar certificate. I always admired it hanging on his wall, because he, too, was an infantryman. Your Grand Master has asked me to speak a little bit today about the activities of the Masonic Service Association of the United States. It is your Association and you should know something about it. Hopefully, I can brush it with a wide brush in describing it, and if any of you have any questions later, I will be happy to be at your disposal.

Masonic Service Association of the United States came into being as the result of World War I. At the time, there were many American Service Men serving in France and England, many of them were brethren, and the Masonic Fraternity wanted to be of aid and assistance to them by having Service Centers similar to those that were conducted by the Knights of Columbus, Salvation Army and the Red Cross. But the War Department and the State Department gave a flat and emphatic "no". Why? Because they refused to deal with 49 different Grand Lodges. They said, if you can give us a spokesman for everyone, then we will consider it. Well, a number of Grand Masters got together and tried to come up with some solution to their problem, because they did want to be of service to their brethren that were serving in the trenches. After a number of meetings, extensive correspondence, many arguments, many cups of coffee, they finally came up with the idea of the Masonic Service Association. It was not generally accepted across the country because so many Grand Lodges were afraid that it was going to be a super body that might form into a supreme Grand Lodge or a General Grand Lodge. So it was very carefully stated in the organization's charter, that it will never be an advocate or be a party to a General Grand Lodge. That way our member Grand Lodges felt free to join the Association. Unfortunately, the Association was finally agreed upon and established on Armistice Day, too late to be of service during World War 1. They agreed that there were other areas in which the Association could be of help. In exchanging information, exchanging ideas, in promoting a better communication between the Grand Lodges. To serve as a central spot for communication and coordination. To serve as a coordinating effort for Relief.

So, consequently, the Association did start on a very shakey basis; many of the Grand Lodges that had initially joined it withdrew for a variety of reasons. They started in January of 1923 to publish a Short Talk Bulletin. It is a little short bulletin, 8, 12, or 16 pages. Published monthly and we have continued to publish it right up until this day. All back issues of the Short Talk Bulletins are maintained in print and the collection of them forms a veritable Masonic Encyclopedia.

Of course, Short Talk Bulletins could only deal with one special part of one subject, so consequently some of the subjects had to be expanded; so various subjects were expanded into digests. Small booklets on a particular Masonic subject that would be of general interest to the Craft.

Of course, when we talk about Masonic Education, there are many things that fall under the umbrella of Masonic Education. Some people when they hear about Masonic Education immediately think of the ritual. Crossing the t's and dotting the i's and getting everything letter perfect. Too frequently, especially in the last forty years, we have had the tendency to place all of the emphases upon the ritual. We have a candidate and while he is going through the three degrees, he is the most important person in the lodge room.

As soon as he is raised, we push him off in the corner and have a tendency to forget him because we can't be bothered with him; we have another class of candidates coming in. What does he know about Masonry? In fact, what do any of us really know about Freemasonry? What do we know about translating the meaning of the ritual into its application in our daily life? This Masonic ritual has a great deal of meaning to each one of us as we interpret in our own way. And each of us has a different interpretation of the ritual, and we have a different interpretation of how we will apply them in our daily lives.

Today, in the United States, coming from the Washington, D.C. area, we are constantly reminded of this. There is a National Unemployment rate of 10.2%. This is a National catastrophy. Brethren, in Freemasonry we have an unemployment rate of just about 96%. Think about it. There are so

many of our members are not Masons. We have so many of them that are not working in the quarries of Masonry. We as leaders of the Craft, whether it be at lodge level or Grand Lodge level, need to initiate some motivation, to get these members more involved at Lodge level.

I have known Judge Ronin for a number of years. He has been bringing you reports of the activities of the Field Agents here in Nebraska. I think it is the largest benevolent program on a National wide basis, that is supported primarily by the Grand Lodges. It was started as a result of World War II and it now operates in 132 of the 172 Veterans Administrations Hospitals, State Veterans Homes and Military hospitals throughout the country. It is wholly supported by voluntary contributions of Grand Lodges, Lodges and individual Masons. It is just about a million dollar a year operation as far as actual expenditures are concerned. But it does at least ten million dollars worth of good. There are so many tangible things it does in providing services to the patients in these hospitals in the name of the Freemason.

One of the most touching stories I have heard happened in Louisiana just a few weeks ago. Where one of our Field Agents was visiting the patients in the hospital and went into one room where the man had been in a coma for about three weeks and had not responded to any of the treatment. The man's family was there and saw the Square and Compass on the sleeve of the Field Agent, and the wife told "how much Masonry had meant to her husband." The Field Agent was standing by the bed and talking to her. when he reached down and involuntarily took the man's hand in the strong grip of a Master Mason. A flicker came across the man's face, then a smile and his eves opened for the first time in three weeks. It was human response to something that meant so much to him that he was able to overcome his physical affliction. Since that time the man has recovered and is expected to be released from the hospital within a few days. It is a touching story, but it is a true story and one that has meaning to us because we had a part in saving this man's life. But there are hundreds of similar stories, of the great work that our Field Agents are doing throughout the country. I am sure many of you are aware of the great work that Bob Adamsheck does. He even took time out to visit your Grand Master while he was in the hospital.

Masonic Service Association is your Association, your Grand Lodge has been a member of the Association for a number of years. Your Grand Lodge is active in contributing to the Association, and we in turn desire to be of even greater service to the lodges and the Craft in the Great State of Nebraska. We have to keep our working tools shiny and useful. We have to keep them ready. We start by using the working tool of the brain.

We must have a receptive mind and instructive tongue because we know that all Masons have faithful breasts and we want to be sure that they are put to work for the good of our Fraternity. And in so doing, for the good of the community and mankind. Thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master, for this great opportunity to speak to your Grand Lodge.

#### **REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME**

#### My Brethren:

Violence!

Mother Nature is on a rampage as this report is written. The deep South is flooded out. The rivers in the area are out of their banks and water is everywhere. California and the eastern United States have both had their share of storms while in Hawaii there is volcanic eruption in massive proportion. The toll of dead this year is about as before. Always someone suffers. In our area we just can't get a plow into the ground.

We are getting an increasing number of people who want to come to The Home. Available space is filling up rapidly. While we still have space left, we should be considering what we are going to do.

We have talked to you about a wing. Funds are the problem. If any reader of this report would like to help with a wing to the present structure or a part of a wing, we would be most grateful. The need is certainly here. The wing should be named for the donor in such an instance. Call us. We would like to hear from you.

At our Home tranquillity reigns as usual. Our job is to heal those who have been buffeted about and we do a good job of it.

The eighty-one people there are happy and at peace with the world. We now have one lady resident who is 100 years old and she gets along nicely thank you, without help from anyone. She doesn't look her age. Doesn't act it either.

A short look over our shoulder recalls Christmas. Prior to that, the Robert W. Boon Memorial Fund Food Truck from central Nebraska came loaded as usual with all sorts of goodies. 500 cases of food with a value of over \$11,000.00. We filled an empty store room with case after case of useful food. What a group the Lodges in Central Nebraska are under the leadership of Brother Adolph Schlaman and his helpers. We are deeply grateful.

The Western Nebraska Lodges now send individual checks instead of the semi they used to send. They remember us as well and we thank them also.

Now back to Christmas. It all starts off with oyster stew with ample seconds and sandwiches. Then the residents entertain the guests with Christmas carols and music. We all join in and the spirit of Christmas catches all of us who are there.

Then a big fat Santa Claus distributes presents to all. Each resident is remembered by the Masters and Wardens Club. All over Nebraska this group contribute to this event. The Omaha group buys presents and individually wraps them. We owe a grat debt of gratitude to this group who really make Christmas.

The Trustees, as before, remembered all our tenants who pay to live at our Home with fruit baskets and poinsettias. No one is overlooked.

I've told you we have eighty-one residents. Counting the pay basis, we would have overall ninety-eight residents. Average age is 86 years young. We admitted during the year a total of 31 and we suffered 11 deaths during the year.

The Endowment Fund continues to grow -22 endowments totaled \$107,504.00. This Fund is our life blood. We have always used only the interest in operating The Home. Thus the Fund can continue to grow. We are grateful for being remembered.

The Seal Fund continues to come in and in generous amounts. It is a great help in our budget. We hope it will always prove popular. We say thanks to every contributor.

Raymond has some interesting facts in our annual report that I would like to pass along to you.

Under nursing. The same loving care we feel we are famous for is given all our residents. There are still no bed sores on patients. Some have them when

they come in but our nurses heal them promptly.

Members in bed all day are changed and turned every two hours around the clock. Soiled laundry is sent down the chute to the disposal machine so that we have no odors ever.

Most all residents that can possibly be up are dressed daily with help. This does a lot to the matter of dignity.

The housekeeping is its usual excellent care.

The Home serves social coffee, fruit juices, etc. three mornings a week. It's a social hour; bingo, record playing and a general good time is had by those who wish to join in. There is a bridge club going regularly.

Under food services - we serve 39 people on trays who are not ambulatory. The balance go to the dining room.

We are in process of building a new kitchen. It's badly needed and while under construction we will feed everybody catered food. We are in process now of talking to food people who do this as a business. The same good hot and cold food will continue to be served.

This year we installed an automatic sprinkler system in our lawn. We should have a big improvement with this watering system which we have long needed.

On December 4th we held dedication ceremonies and unveiled a bust of Glenn W. McInnich who remembered The Home so generously in his will. The bust is in the lobby. A big gathering, including many Past Grand Masters, attended.

John W. Garrod of Omaha donated cassette tapes of the New Testament for our residents. We are grateful.

The Shrine Chanters came during Christmas week to entertain all. They are truly great.

We also had some fine Christmas music from the students and Director of Plattsmouth Middle School. We appreciate this.

Brother Wilbur C. Summers, Master of Beatrice Lodge No. 26, gave The Home a deluxe model snow blower. Brother Wilbur, we are most grateful. This we can really use.

The Mobile Nobles held their annual Valentine party in the dining room. This great organization inside Tangier Temple of the Shrine has adopted our Home from their very beginning. They come to our Home and bring love and entertainment. These are the men who have supplied us with Sunshine Buggies in the past. They are a fine group of gentlemen. Accordian music, singing and fruit packages for our residents were on the schedule this year. We love you, Nobles.

There is a card party going and they meet regularly. I call it a "HUMMER". So much fun and every game known is being played.

The York Rite Masonic Group came, toured The Home and were our guests at noon. This group makes an annual tour of The Home and reports to the York Rite Bodies of their inspection. Good friends, we love to always have you come.

The geese were migrating back north. A big group of our people made two trips in the Sunshine Buggy to Forney's Lake in Iowa to watch the huge collection of geese in this migration. All enjoyed the trip.

We had a mock tornado drill in March. It went off well and all our people joined in.

Our Superintendent, Raymond F. Evers, never misses a board meeting.

Each month he reports of The Home to the Trustees and recommends any changes he thinks would better the lives of our residents. He's a jewel.

Our Secretary, W. Brother Ralph W. Gerry, works around the clock in our behalf.

We owe so much to so many. Our thanks go out to all the Lodges, Chapters, Councils, Commanderies, Masters and Wardens, Order of the Eastern Star Chapters, Scottish Rite and the Youth Groups, to name a few. We thank you all.

We owe special thanks to Mrs. Betty Mahon, Worthy Grand Matron, and to Brother Bernard Paden, Worthy Grand Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star.

We thank our Grand Master, M. W. Brother Paul R. Pierce, who has been most helpful all year.

Finally to my Brother Trustees — the fine gentlemen who compose our Board with whom I'm privileged to serve. There are stars in the crowns of each of them. Without them this report could not be made. All here is of their doing. I salute them.

#### M. W. HARRY A. SPENCER, PAST GRAND MASTER

Most Worshipful Edward M. Knight, the 87th Grand Master of Masons of Nebraska, was born December 4, 1911, at Alliance, Nebraska. He was the first of two children born to Florence McKean and Reuben E. Knight. He received his education in the Alliance Public Schools and the University of Nebraska where he was graduated in June, 1932, with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering. He is registered Engineer E-132, State of Nebraska.

M.::W.:. Brother Knight was married to Ruth McDuffee of Norfolk, Nebraska on July 16, 1939. (Mrs. Knight served as Grand Chaplain of O.E.S. of Nebraska during the period Brother Knight was Grand Master.) They have two sons, Robert Edward and Frank Millard. The Knight family are members of the Presbyterian Church.

Since graduation he had been associated with the Alliance National Bank and was President of the Bank. He had taken part in many banking and civic activities. He was past President of Group 6, Nebraska Bankers Association. For the past seven years he had been treasurer of the First Presbyterian Church of Alliance. He was president of the Alliance Rotary Club in 1950.

#### **REPORTS OF COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES**

M<sup>·</sup>: W.·. FRANK J. MATTOON, Past Grand Master and Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

The Committee on Grievances met at the direction of the Grand Master. The cases presented involved in the actions of the trial commission described in the Section on "Trial Commissions" (page 9 of proceedings), and submit this report.

The committee recommends as follows:

- 1. The action of the Trial Commission in the case of the charges of Scottsbluff Lodge No. 201 and the penalty of indefinite suspension be deferred pending the expiration of the time for appeal from the decision of the Trial Commission.
- 2. That the action of the Trial Commission in the case of the charges of Florence Lodge No. 281 and the penalty of expulsion be deferred pending the expiration of the time for appeal from the action of the trial commission.
- 3. That the action of the case of the charges of Fremont Lodge No. 15 and the action of the Trial Commission recommending expulsion be approved.

(Note: W... David E. Menck disqualified himself from participation in this instance.)

#### **REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE**

M. .. W. .. MERLE M. HALE, CHAIRMAN, gave the report which was adopted.

The Grand Lodge Office Committee met on May 17, 1983 in the Grand Lodge Conference Room. A proposed budget for items for which this committee is responsible was prepared and has been submitted to the Appropriations Committee.

Changes were made in the amount requested for several of the items. The Secretary's Desk Book was increased to \$1,800 to reflect the cost of two years because the 1982-1983 payment was not made; an initial appropriation of \$750 was included for the Membership Committee to fund the Grand Lodge portion of Guest Night programs; salary costs were increased

\$8,800 to provide for salary raises for the Grand Secretary, Grand Custodian and the clerical staff; office expense was increased \$4,000 to cover replacement of typewriters; the Grand Master's Jewel cost for 1982-1983 has not been paid and the expected cost was included in the 1983-1984 appropriation; and the Grand Lodge supplies account was increased \$2,000. The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children assessment was continued at \$2,500 even though a payment was not required for the past two years.

As required in Section 1-105 of the By-Laws, we recommend that the amount per mile to be paid for each mile traveled to Grand Lodge be set at the same amount as last year, i.e., 20e.

The Grand Lodge Office Committee recommends that the proposal to move the office to another location be deferred for one year and that a committee be appointed to investigate the several alternatives and to report to the Grand Lodge Communication in 1984.

We commend the Grand Secretary for his dedication to the duties of his office and we express our appreciation to the Grand Lodge office staff for their efficient operation of that office with its many important activities.

#### **REPORT OF TEMPLE ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

M. ·. W. ·. HAROLD C. WURDEMAN, Past Grand Master, Chairman, gave the report which was adopted.

M. . W. . Grand Master, during this past year, the Grand Lodge has laid the corner stone and dedicated a new Masonic Temple for Ornan Lodge No. 261, Spencer. At the present time Osceola Lodge No. 65 at Osceola, Utica Lodge No. 96, Utica; Bassett Lodge No. 254, Bassett, have purchased buildings that are now in the process of remodeling. I understand they all three have moved into their new temples, but they haven't been dedicated yet. Nelson Lodge No. 277, Nelson, Friendship Lodge No. 239, Chapman and Oshkosh Lodge No. 286, Oshkosh are considering building new temples and contacted this Committee for information. Falls City Lodge No. 9, Falls City, St. Johns Lodge No. 25, Omaha, are actively looking for a building to buy and remodel for use as a Masonic Temple.

#### M. .W. . PAUL R. PIERCE, GRAND MASTER

Did you report on Utica, Brother Wurdeman? The Presbyterians over there decided to consolidate with another group and offered their Presbyterian Church to the Utica Lodge for \$1.00. It is being renovated to meet the specifications. It will be a very nice place for them. Well, the Presbyterians are all Masons.

#### **REPORT OF THE 1983 ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION**

The 64th Annual Meeting of the Masonic Service Association was held on February 21, 1983 at Dallas, Texas. I personally participated in all the meetings of its Executive Commission in my capacity of Chairman Emeritus and as a member of the Investment Committee. Deputy Grand Master Bevin B. Bump and R. $\cdot$ .W. $\cdot$ . Ralph W. Gerry, Grand Secretary, were also in attendance for this meeting. The Grand Lodge of Oregon became a member of the MSA duing 1982. The Grand Lodge of California withdrew its membership. The Masonic Service Association is now composed of 45 Grand Lodges with two Associate Members in addition. The American-Canadian Grand Lodge of the United Grand Lodge of Germany became an Associate member in 1982. We are hopeful that California will reconsider and there are at least two other Grand Lodges that are giving consideration to joining the Association.

No request for either Foreign or U. S. jurisdiction relief was requested in 1982. Our Association did make inquiries in areas where disasters occurred. Our Association is always alert to coordinate efforts to assist Freemasons in distress.

During 1982 much needed additional office space for the MSA was acquired in the Archer Building. This allows for more efficient office arrangement.

Twelve monthly issues of the Short Talk Bulletin were again distributed in 1982, making over 700 different bulletins having been issued. A new publication Index listing all MSA publications, films and materials has been printed and has been distributed by the thousands to workshops, lodges and other Masonic groups.

Three new interesting digests were issued in 1982. They are

- 1 "The Challenge of the Hat & Gavel" (a guide for Worshipful Masters)
- 2 "Trestleboard Tidbits" by Alphonse Cerza
- 3 "Washington's Home and Fraternal Life"
- also, the updated Chart on Foreign Recognitions.

Grand Master Paul R. Pierce extended a special invitation to the distinguished Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association, Brother Stewart M. L. Pollar<sup>4</sup> to be present at this Grand Lodge Session and to bring various materials published by the MSA including an indexed published list. I am delighted that he is here and will address our Grand Lodge with reference to the various services of the MSA.

The MSA Hospital Visitation Program is a separate branch and is supervised by our Chief Field Agent M. W. Thomas R. Dougherty, P.G.M. of New Jersey. We now have representation by trained certified M.S.A. Field Agents in 126 of the 172 V.A. Medical Centers in the U. S. In addition, we have M.S.A. representatives in 5 State Veteran Homes including the one in Hot Springs, South Dakota. We have M.S.A. representatives in our Omaha and Lincoln V.A. Centers. Brother Robert Adamsheck is Field Agent at Lincoln and Brother Robert May is our Field Agent in Omaha. We do not have an Agent in the Grand Island V.A. Center. Each of our Field Agents have volunteer assistants. These brethren are daily servicing the needs of our Brethren and others as well in these facilities. They exemplify the Golden Tenets of our Fraternity of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

The various services of the M.S.A. are extensive and are being used more and more. I am pleased that our Grand Lodge has always been suppor-

tive of its programs. When our Grand Master Paul Pierce attended the Conference of Grand Masters, when he was Deputy Grand Master, he told me that he derived more inspiration and satisfaction from the Annual Meeting of the M.S.A. any other meeting at the Conference. I continued to enjoy my service as Chairman Emeritus of this splendid organization which in fact and in truth is our **Masonic Service Association**!

All the while they are donating time and learning more about the responsibilities of citizenship. They are also found serving dinners in many of our lodges, performing the various ceremonies of their organizations for us when we ask and even cleaning up around the temple once in a while.

I believe it was Milton who said, "They also serve who only stand and wait." Our young people, being young, don't want to wait, but they do want to serve. All we need to do is ask. We, too, can serve. We can serve them by giving them some well deserved recognition. Attend their installations, their meetings and their money raising affairs. #### **COMMITTEE ON RELIEF**

W... Paul L. Toombs, Chairman, presented the report which was accepted. Your Committee on Relief is happy to report on our last year's experiences and expenditures. No two years are routine and, much to the unhappiness of the Budget Committee, we cannot tell in advance how much we may need for appropriations. We have no Committee expense as such; all our expenditures go for things for which we were appointed.

The Sukavoty case was reported last year and just yesterday we received word that the family were again at Mayo's Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, but our information is so indefinite all we can say is that we may be needed again and shortly.

Our member Mel Hatfield did such a wonderful job over many months to get the affairs straightened out, and with great difficulties, in the Kroger matter.

He is the kind of Mason who wanted to do something for them. This is not the first time he has been of invaluable help and he has also done work on the Sukavoty case.

We referred two cases to Covert No. 11 and got no report on either one and no expenditure so assume they were not justified. We have had a call from a Louisiana relative that his brother living in Washington, Nebraska, and a member of the lodge at Kennard, needed help but on investigation by the lodge were told nothing is needed at this time. We had one case where a floater wanted money to get to North Dakota but after a telephone call to Grand Lodge of Louisiana were told he was suspended and had been the cause of the Grand Lodge of Louisiana losing quite a bit of money. We did not advance anything.

One advantage of having the Chairman close to the Grand Lodge offices, is that we can easily compare notes by phone and get action, if any is needed. The original alert may come from just about anywhere and when we are "alerted" we then attempt to get in touch with the home lodge of the

individual. In that way we can determine if they know of the circumstances, what they may be doing on their own and whether there is any need for the Grand Lodge to go further into the matter.

You can see from our previous remarks that things are not always as represented originally and if the final decision is that the Grand Lodge Relief Fund should help out, we do our bit in the name of the local lodge. Sometimes a great deal of work and investigation is done and we end up paying nothing. At any rate, we go into each case thoroughly before we close it up. Some individual lodges do a grand job with their own "Relief or Welfare Fund". Others do not even have such a fund. We strongly recommend that each lodge have some funds that can go for other than burial needs.

We shall be glad to visit with any of the brethren individually after the meeting is closed or recessed. We have a fine committee and try to do things as you would do if you were in our shoes.

We thank the Grand Master for his appointments to our committee.

#### **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHARTERS AND DISPENSATIONS**

W. . Ben D. Fussell, 79, Chairman, presented the report which was adopted.

The Committee on Charters and Dispensations reports that they have met with representatives of Ponca Lodge No. 101, Parian Lodge No. 207 and Camp Clarke Lodge No. 285 and have reviewed the reasons for their non-representation at Grand Lodge Sessions in 1981 & 1982 and find them valid.

The Committee recommends approval of their reports and that further action not be taken.

#### **RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION** OF THE GRAND LODGE, A.:.F.: & A.:.M.:. OF NEBRASKA

The undersigned five (5) members of The Grand Lodge, A. $\cdot$ .F. $\cdot$ . & A. $\cdot$ .M. $\cdot$ ., of Nebraska (as defined in Article II of the current Constitution thereof), pursuant to Article XIII of such Constitution, do hereby and hereon present the following resolution proposing the amendment of such Constitution, to wit:

Resolved, that Article XII of the current Constitution of said Grand Lodge be amended by adding a new Section 5 thereto, as shown on Exhibit A hereto attached and, verbatim, made an integral part of this resolution, with the same force and effect as if the provisions of said Exhibit A were set out in full hereat.

Further resolved, that except as so amended, said current Constitution be, in all respects and particulars, ratified, approved, and confirmed.

# "ARTICLE XII – FORMATION OF SUBORDINATE LODGES" EXHIBIT A

Section 5. Notwithstanding any other provision or provisions of the Constitutions, Laws, and Edicts of this Grand Lodge, the Grand Master, in his discretion, is hereby authorized to grant dispensations to special-purpose Lodges to perform certain customary special-purpose functions related to Masonry and for the benefit of the Craft, upon such terms and conditions as may be detailed in any such dispensation. Such special-purpose Lodge may, thereafter, present to the Grand Lodge their petition for a charter as such special-purpose Lodge, requesting a name, and the enumeration of its customary special-purpose functions, and also, the enumeration of the provisions of the Constitutions, Laws, and Edicts of this Grand Lodge, if any, which customarily would not apply to such special-purpose Lodge. If the Grand Lodge, in its discretion, approves such petition, a charter shall be issued which shall specifically enumerate all of the rights and duties of such Lodge, and which shall also specifically enumerate such customarily inapplicable provisions of the Constitutions, Laws, and Edicts of this Grand Lodge, vis. said Lodge. As used in this provision, any reference to 'custom' denotes only a reference to the customs and usages of Regular Ancient Craft Masonry which have heretofore developed under the Constitutions, Laws, and Edicts thereof, whether or not the same shall be codified or uncodified, and not otherwise.

#### M. .. W. .. PAUL R. PIERCE

I am urging that we participate in our Society of Masonic Research of Nebraska. They planned on having a charter member list of 230. They have not reached that yet. Their dues are \$8.00. Brother Gene Jorgensen has that Masonic display. They are tyring to find a home for it now and they have prospects of getting an old library in Lincoln as a museum home for Masonic Memorabilia. I think there are some things that ought to be in the Grand Lodge Library rather than give them to the Masonic Research. But these are an aggressive group and they are getting a lot of things. I am encouraging them. I think they signed up a number of new members here. They send out periodically information about what has happened in Nebraska or Research.

### THE ROLL OF DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren, these together with the Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians". In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians". Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A.L.) "In the year of light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A. L:.) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. . Dep. .) "In the year of the deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A. O. ) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A. Beo. ) "In the year of the blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. M. ) "In the year of the world."

## RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons – Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1982 and 4,000 - 5982.

Royal Arch Masons – Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1982 and 530-2509.

Royal and Select Masters – Add 1,000 years to current year, thus: 1975 and 1,000 - 2982.

Knights Templar — From the Christian era take 1,118; thus: 1,118 from 1982 - 860.

Order of High Priesthood — To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1982 - 3891.

Scottish Rite – Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1982 and 3,760 – 5939.
