





BIOGRAPHICAL

ROBERT A. METCALF

Robert A. Metcalf was born in Lincoln, Nebraska. He attended the Lincoln Public Schools, graduating from Lincoln High School in June, 1941.

After graduating from high school, he entered the United States Army in August, 1942. He was assigned to the 806th Tank Destroyer Medical Detachment. While serving in this unit, he saw duty in the South Pacific. In February, 1946, he was honorably discharged.

Upon his return to civilian life, he enrolled in Nebraska Wesleyan in the fall of 1946. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree in June, 1950. The following December, he enrolled in the California College of Mortuary Science. Upon graduation he returned to Lincoln, Nebraska to enter the funeral service, the profession he has followed to date. On August 1, 1961, he founded the Metcalf Funeral Home, of which he is presently President.

On October 7, 1943, Bob married Dorothy I. Martin. They have two children, a son, Ross, who is a Doctor of Chiropractic in Lincoln, and a daughter, Janice, who is married to a practicing attorney here in Lincoln. Bob and Dorothy enjoy their six grandchildren.

MASONRY

On April 7, 1958, Bob received his Entered Apprentice Degree, passed to the degree as a Fellowcraft Mason on May 12, 1958, and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on June 16, 1958. All degrees were received in East Lincoln Lodge No. 210. Bob served his lodge as Worshipful Master in 1969.





W.M. ROBERT A. METCLAF HEADS GRAND LODGE SESSION

The Nebraska Center in Lincoln, Nebraska was the site for the 128th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, A.'.F.'. & A.'.M.'. of Nebraska, held June 13 through June 15. M.'.W.'. Robert A. Metcalf, the 119th Grand Master presided over the three day session, which started Thursday afternoon with a Masters and Wardens Workshop. This was the second year for the workshop and again provided an opportunity for the delegates to review with the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Officers the recommendations of the Grand Master submitted to the Grand Lodge.

Also for the second year was a Vesper Service at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, under the direction of V. W. G. Richard Myers, Grand Chaplain, which this year was held at Faith United Methodist Church. The Grand Masters Banquet for distinguished guests, Past Grand Masters, and Grand Lodge Officers with their ladies was served in the Omaha Room at the Center.

The Annual Communication was opened by the Grand Master after a Lodge of Master Masons had been opened by a team of Worshipful Masters from eleven lodges throughout the state. The presentation of flags was this year performed by the National Sojourners, Chapter No. 19, under the direction of Past Grand Master, Byron C. Jenkins.

A major highlight of the morning was a patriotic and colorful light, sound and slide film presentation of the Statue of Liberty by R.'.W.'. Thomas Eggleston, Grand Secretary of Iowa.

The main business of the Communication was taken up with the receiving of committee reports, the Grand Master's recommendations and the election of officers. Distinguished guests, which included Grand Masters or their representative, from the jurisdictions of Wyoming, Idaho, South Dakota, Alaska, Colorado, Missouri, Kansas and Iowa were introduced and addressed the delegates at various times during the meeting.

After the Jurisprudence Committee report there was considerable discussion from the floor in regard to the Grand Master's recommendations. As to Recommendation I, the committee had decided that since it was necessary for Constitutional Amendments to lay over for a year, and to be approved by a majority of the lodges before being voted on by next year's Grand Lodge, that there was nothing that could be done at this year's Communication, except to accept it for such necessary action since it had been proposed also by five members and the delegates voted to take no action on this Recommendation.

The Committee had recommended approval as to Recommendations: II, By-law change so the Grand Secretary would not be a full-time employee; III, authorize the Nebraska Masonic Foundation to raise funds by way of gifts, grants or bequests and to construct the proposed Nebraska Masonic Center at a site on the southeast corner of 16th and L Streets in Lincoln, and to confirm the option granted by the property owner for 10 years; and IV, approval of the Nebraska Masonic Foundation; which were all approved by the vote of the Grand Lodge delegates. Recommendation V, was withdrawn by the Grand Master as not necessary since the proposal previously submitted that the Grand Lodge approve the use of cipher or key was defeated.

Charles W. Amidon, 281, of Omaha was elected Grand Master, and Wayne G. Luenenborg, 39, of North Platte was elected Deputy Grand Master. Elected to the offices of Grand Senior Warden and Grand Junior Warden were Paul R. Eveland, 119, of Ames and Thomas W. Tye, 46, of Kearney. Paul R. Pierce, PGM, 50, was elected as Grand Secretary.

The 128th Annual Communication became history Saturday morning as Grand Master, Robert A. Metcalf closed the Grand Lodge and turned the gavel over to W.'. Brother Sanford H. Nelson, Worshipful Master of 210, for him to close the Master Masons lodge with the assistance of the other members of the Grand Master's team of Worshipful Masters.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND LODGE, ANCIENT FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA:

My Brethern:

It is my great privilege and pleasure to welcome each of you to this 128th Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Nebraska. The Grand Lodge Officers and I, particularly, want to welcome the delegates and members of the subordinate lodges of this Grand Jurisdiction. This is your Grand Lodge. We want you to feel at home and enter into the deliberations during the Session.

We are most pleased to have visiting dignitaries from other Grand Jurisdictions with us. We have been privileged to visit many of you in your jurisdictions. We will do our best to return the hospitality and many courtesies we received at your Annual Communication.

I am personally most grateful for the privilege of serving as Grand Master for this past year. There are times when a Grand Master has no clear-cut guidelines to govern his actions, and must rely on his own good conscience and sense of fair play to guide him. Later in the Session proper tribute will be paid to our departed brethren by the Committee on Fraternal Dead.

CORNERSTONES

During this past year the Grand Lodge Officers have been privileged to hold cornerstone and dedication ceremonies throughout our state. At each ceremony the attendance was outstanding. I personally believe this is one way our fraternity can receive maximum exposure.

On Saturday, June 30, 1984 the Grand Lodge Officers conducted a dedication ceremony for the remodeled and redecorated lodge room at Florence Lodge No. 281 in Omaha, Nebraska.

On Saturday, September 22, 1984 we conducted a cornerstone and dedication ceremony for Osceola Lodge No. 65.

October 14, 1984 cornerstone ceremonies were conducted by the Grand Lodge Officers for an addition to the David City High School.

On October 28, 1984 a cornerstone was laid for a new Boyd County Rural Water District No. 2 Building in Spencer, Nebraska, ceremonies sponsored by Ornan Lodge No. 261.

A cornerstone will be laid on June 2, 1985 for the City Museum at McCook, Nebraska.

To our Grand Marshal, James L. Eatmon, a big thank you for the outstanding manner in which the arrangements for these ceremonies were handled.

GRAND MASTERS' CONFERENCE

The Grand Masters' Conference of North America convened in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina February 16, 1985, the emphasis being more on solutions than on problems. The main topic of discussion was the decline in membership and the various ways in which grand jurisdictions are

attempting to combat this problem. Several work shops were held. Your delegates benefited greatly from what they heard. Hopefully some of the topics discussed can be researched further and possibly adopted by our Grand Jurisdiction.

ROCK MAUL

M. W. Brother Byron C. Jenkins presented a rock maul at the 124th Annual Communication to be given by each Grand Master to the lodge he deems meets the criteria set down. The qualifications are officer leadership, attendance, ritual, enthusiasm, fellowship, temple appearance and conditions, bulletin or newsletter, secretary reports, and programs other than regular meetings. During this Annual Communication I will make this presentation. The selection will not be easy.

CENTENNIALS

Centennial celebrations were held June 16, 1984 at North Bend Lodge No. 119, North Bend; June 24, 1984 at Minden Lodge No. 127; July 21, 1984 at Stromsburg Lodge No. 126; September 16, 1984 at Wisner Lodge No. 114 and November 10, 1984 Rawalt lodge No. 138, Oxford, Nebraska. A most enjoyable program was presented at each and a delicious meal was served. At the conclusion of each program, the Grand Master made a few appropriate remarks and presented each lodge its centennial certificate.

VISITATIONS

I have attended the Grand Lodges of Wyoming, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Nevada, Colorado and Kansas.

STATUE OF LIBERTY PROJECT

On August 4, 1984 the Grand Lodge of New York held a 100th year celebration of the laying of the cornerstone in the base of the Statute of Liberty. My schedule would not permit Dorothy and me to attend. I appointed our Deputy Grand Master Charles W. Amidon and his lady Jean to be our personal representatives to this gala affair. Charlie and Jean reported it was truly an experience they would not soon forget. This even was held in conjunction with the restoration project of the Statute. The Masons of North America pledged to raise approximately three million dollars in support of this project.

I appointed a Statute of Liberty Committee with M. W. Byron Jenkins chairman to raise money for the Grand Jurisdiction. He and his committee have sold lapel pins and bumper sitckers. At last report approximately \$5,000.00 has been raised. Our goal is \$1.00 per member or approximately, 29,600.00 dollars. Contributions are tax deductible. If you haven't contributed, please do so now. A very impressive film will be shown at Grand Lodge in June entitled "The Lady", courtesy of our good brother from Iowa, Tom Eggleston.

MASONIC HOMES

Our Nebraska Home at Plattsmouth and the Masonic Eastern Star Home for Children in Fremont continue to be managed in a very efficient manner by Brothers Ray Evers and Ben Harvey. A big thank you to these two brethern and their staffs for supervising these homes for the needy children and our senior citizens. If you have not visited our homes, I recommend that you do. I'm sure you will be please to know that you contribute to the operation of these fine homes.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS

During the year I appointed three trial commissions. All have been completed. A member of East Lincoln Lodge No. 210 was found guilty as charged and was expelled from the Lodge and he forfeits all rights and privileges granted to him by the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted

Masons of Nebraska. A member of Fremont Lodge No. 15 was found guilty as charged and expelled from the Lodge and he forfeits all rights and privileges granted to him by the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska. A member of John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290 was found guilty as charged. The Trial Commission unanimously voted as their judgment the expulsion of said Brother from Masonry.

SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS

During the year your Grand Master approved 21 dispensations. Five were granted to elect Officers at a time other than regular period and good cause was shown. Requirement of fees as provided in Section 2-312 was waived for all except nine and the ten dollar fee was collected as provided by said Section. Seven dispensations were granted to Lodges to install Officers at other times than required. Dispensations granted to confer degrees in less than the prescribed period were five. Requests for the dispensations were necessary by reason the candidates were being called in the military service or were already serving and were home on leave. The required fees as provided in Section 2-402 were waived.

GENERAL CONSENTS AND APPROVALS

- Pending the approval of the Grand Master of Missouri, the Grand Master's consent and approval was granted to Fremont Lodge No. 15 to travel to Bridgeton Lodge No. 80, St. John, Missouri, at which time Fremont Lodge No. 15 would confer the Master Mason Degree on its own proficient Fellowcraft in the Bridgeton Lodge, using Nebraska Ritual.
- 2. The Grand Master's consent was granted to Sutherland Lodge No. 299 to have a float in a community celebration parade.
- Permission was granted to Lebanon Lodge No. 323 to have a float in Columbus Days Celebration.
- 4. Permission was granted to Omaha Masters and Wardens Club to solicit all Nebraska Lodges for Christmas Gift fund for the Masonic Home at Plattsmouth and Masonic Eastern Star Home at Fremont.
- 5. Permission granted to Albion Lodge No. 78 to have a float in Boone County Fair, 100th anniversary celebration.
- 6. Permission granted to Omaha Lodge No. 1 to have an "Informational" booth at the Nebraska State Fair.
- 7. The Grand Master granted permission to Arcana Lodge No. 195 to have a float in the Centennial parade in Gordon, Nebraska.
- 8. The Grand Master granted permission to DeMolay to use the Grand Lodge mailing list to promote the "Uncle" program.
- Granted permission to Omaha Masters and Wardens Club to sell bumper stickers.

DECISIONS

- Received letter from Potter Lodge No. 313 requesting dispensation to have an Entered Apprentice Degree conferred on their candidate by Frank Welch Lodge No. 75 because Potter Temple was not ready for use. I ruled that Sec. 2-1205 permits a Nebraska Lodge to do work for another and that no dispensation was required.
- Received a letter from Mitchell Lodge No. 263 requesting permission to permit the Rebekah Lodge of Mitchell, Nebraska to hold its meetings in the Masonic Temple. Covenant Lodge No. 259 I.O.O.F. of Mitchell, Nebraska disbanded, leaving the Rebekah Lodge without a meeting place. I

ruled favorably. Section 2-501, last sentence, states: "It may however be

used by other orders if their principles are not unmasonic."

3. Received a letter of request from College View Lodge No. 320 to apply to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for a \$4,000.00 loan for needed repairs on their Temple. I ruled favorably using Section 2-614 for my decision.

4. Denied request from Grand Island Lodge No. 318 to change dates of their regular meeting. Advised them dates of regular meetings are stated in their

By-Laws and Grand Lodge does not have authority to act.

5. Ordered Gothenburg Lodge No. 249 to suspend all procedures for

consolidation until a thorough investigation can be made.

6. Refused request of Brother Marvin Ropte to make a change in the second paragraph of his resolution he presented at the 126th Annual Communication.

7. Received a letter from Falls City Lodge No. 9 "stating they had a law suit". A copy of the Petition for Declaratory Judgment was also received. Falls City Lodge owns the top half of the building they meet in. The bottom half is owned by the Nemaha Realty Company of Falls City. The Realty Company feel repairs on the building are necessary. The Board of Trustees of Falls City takes the position that all the repairs suggested by the realty company are not necessary. I advised the Lodge the dispute needs to be resolved by the two parties involved. The Grand Lodge has no authority to get involved. Suggested they obtain legal counsel to be properly represented in court.

8. Received a letter from Harvard Lodge No. 44 asking permission to sell 76 feet of ground owned by their lodge for a house to be built. I advised Harvard Lodge No. 44 that Grand Lodge does not have to give permission to

them to sell the 76 feet. The decision is theirs.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Since the time I started through the officers positions of both my lodge and the Grand Lodge, I have had an opportunity to study, interpret, and enforce the provisions of the Grand Lodge Constitution and By-Laws. Upon reading these documents one is first struck with the fact that they are not written in layman's language and when I have sought advice of our members who are lawyers, I have found that they disagree as to the interpretation of the provisions contained in these documents. Also in utilizing the Constitution and By-Laws to solve the numerous problems presented to me as Grand Master, I have found that sometimes these documents are not clear or complete as to the proper procedure to be followed or who should have the responsibility for first addressing the problem. Finally, there is redundant and conflicting provisions contained in the By-Laws which should be deleted or harmonized so that those executing their duties and powers may do so properly.

Because of these concerns and my experience with the Constitution and By-Laws, I requested the line officers of the Grand Lodge to review and propose changes to our current Constitution and By-Laws. In their review they were asked to consider what changes, if any, could be made to streamline, clarify, delete, harmonize and write in understandable language any or all of the provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws. Although there was much input by other Masons, the officers who conducted the review were:

Charles Amidon, No. 281, Omaha, Current Deputy Grand Master Wayne G. Luenenborg, No. 39, North Platte, current Grand Senior Warden Paul R. Eveland, No. 119, Ames, current Grand Junior Warden. Thomas W. Tye, No. 46, Kearney, Current Grand Senior Deacon. John M. McHenry, No. 19, Lincoln, Current Grand Junior Deacon.

The suggested changes were many and the proposed new Constitution and By-Laws will be made available to the Jurisprudence Committee and all other Grand Lodge members on June 13, 1985.

After reading the proposed new Constitution and By-Laws; reviewing the same with the line officers; and being in complete agreement with them, the following recommendations are hereby made:

1. The rewritten Constitution and By-Laws which are signed by five Grand Lodge members be entered upon the minutes of this annual communication and then submitted to the several chartered subordinate lodges for approval.

 At the next succeeding annual communication of the Grand Lodge the rewritten Constitution of the Grand Lodge be adopted as the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska and thereafter the present constitution be of no force and effect.

3. At the next succeeding annual communication of the Grand Lodge the rewritten set of By-Laws be adopted as the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska and thereafter the present set of By-Laws be of no force and effect.

H

Our present By-Laws provide that the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall prescribe the business methods to be followed by the Grand Lodge and shall have general supervision over the Grand Lodge Offices. The Grand Lodge has purchased a computer system as recommended by this committee and the business methods used by the Grand Lodge Office are being transferred to a total computerized system. This committee is also charged with the duty under our By-Laws of doing and supervising those things that are necessary to insure the efficient work of the Grand Lodge business office.

During many of the meetings this past year held by the Grand Lodge Office Committee, the Special Building Committee and the Grand Lodge Officers, a consensus developed that to fully utilize and intergrate the new computer system a change would need to be made to an office manager system. This change would insure the efficient operation of the Grand Lodge Offices. This change also gave us the unique opportunity to more effectively employ the talents and knowledge of the Grand Secretary by changing the primary duties of the Grand Secretary from that of clerical and ministerial to actively promoting masonry among the members of the Blue Lodges and to directly assist their secretaries under the direction of the Grand Master.

The opportunity to coordinate these changes came as a result of the Grand Lodge Office Committees recommendation to move the Grand Lodge Office to Lincoln, which recommendation was unanimously approved by the Grand Lodge line officers and the Grand Master. With the total computerization of the Grand Lodge office and a change to an office management system, we would also be able to make the Grand Secretary's position much like what has been successfully done with the Grand Custodians position. The position would be changed from a full time paid employee of the Grand Lodge to a position of receiving a monthly automobile allowance plus actual expenses.

The following recommendations are hereby made:

 That Section 1-201 By-Laws of the Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1-201. GRAND SECRETARY. The Grand Secretary shall record the transactions of the Grand Lodge; shall personally

attend each communication; shall have charge of all records, supplies, jewels, certificates, documents and seal of the Grand Lodge; shall see to the receipt, deposit and strict accounting of all monies of the Grand Lodge in such accounts as designated by the Grand Trustees; shall pay out such monies on orders regularly issued and signed by the Grand Master; shall see to the drawing of orders, affixing the seal, conducting the correspondence, and preparing and authenticating diplomas as directed by the membership of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master; shall see that all diplomas are executed with the proper date, seal, given names and signatures; shall be exofficio Fraternal Relations: shall see to the keeping of a record of all those rejected, suspended and expelled and shall publish or circulate them only as directed by the membership of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master; shall notify each subordinate lodge of any indebtedness due the Grand Lodge before the 20th day of March of each year and shall close all accounts of subordinate lodges on the 1st day of May of each year; shall give a performance bond guaranteed by an approved surety company in an amount determined by the appropriations committee; provided that the amount is at least the sum of \$200,000,00 and the cost is paid by the Grand Lodge; shall examine and correct the annual reports of the subordinate lodges; shall make recommendations regarding the subordinate lodges; shall submit a tabular abstract of the condition of the craft; and upon the installation of his successor he shall transfer to him all books, records, accounts, supplies, jewels, certificates and documents in his charge.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of the business, affairs, and programs of the Grand Lodge and the promotion of Masonry. The Grand Secretary and any full time employee shall not use the Grand Lodge Office, its facilities and equipment for the use and benefit of any organization, association, club or corporation, except the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and its subordinate lodges.

The Grand Secretary shall receive as compensation for his sevices such amount as determined by the Appropriations committee and approved by the membership of the Grand Lodge."

2. That Section 1-201:01 By-Laws of the Grand Lodge be repealed.

III

At the 127th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska the following Recommendation was approved.

- 1. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska should build a Grand Lodge Office facility containing not only adequate space for a library, museum as well as committee meeting space in Lincoln, Nebraska. That such building be constructed in Lincoln, Nebraska, at a location set forth in the criteria as recommended by the Committee report.
- 2. The Special Committee continue to meet at the pleasure of the Grand Master, together with such others as the Grand Master may appoint to report at the 128th Annual Communication as to the

specific design of the building to be constructed, and actual cost and method of payment.

 The Grand Master, together with the special Committee and the Office Committee proceed to interview and obtain the services of an architect to prepare such drawings and plans as are necessary to implement this recommendation.

In compliance with this Recommendation and the directive contained therein as adopted by the Grand Lodge I appointed to the Special Committee the following brethren:

This committee met at least ten different times in order to meet the tasks assigned to it as set forth in the Recommendation adopted by the 127th Annual Communication. A more detailed and complete report has been made to this Grand Lodge by the committee and your Grand Master as well as your elected Grand Lodge Officers being in complete agreement and harmony with the report of the special Committee the following recommendations are hereby made:

- 1. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska does hereby authorize the Nebraska Masonic Foundation to proceed immediately to raise funds by way of gifts, grants or bequests to said foundation and to construct the proposed Nebraska Masonic Center upon the site located on the southeast corner of Sixteenth and L Streets in Lincoln, Nebraska.
- 2. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska does hereby agree to and is desirous of occuping space in the Nebraska Masonic Center for the purposes of housing the offices of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

IV

As a result of the study completed by the Special Committee to Study the Grand Lodge Offices it was the recommendation of that Committee that the proposed Grand Lodge Offices be housed in a building to be constructed by a foundation created and known as the Nebraska Masonic Foundation which instruments have been filed as required within the State of Nebraska and which Foundation will be a tax exempt entity as prescribed by the Internal Revenue code. The Nebraska Masonic Foundation requires the election of a Board of Directors which Board of Directors shall consist of the elected and acting Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden and Grand Junior Warden as well as three members to be elected by the members of the Foundation at their annual meeting. It is therefore recommended as follows:

That the Nebraska Masonic Foundation as constituted and filed within the State of Nebraska is hereby approved by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

V

For the last several years Amendments have been presented to the Grand Lodge to delete the prohibition of the possession of the cipher or key. After the last regular communication I formed a Cipher Committee with the specific charge of advising the Grand Master as to what recommendations should be implemented in the event the pending Amendment should gain the necessary number of votes for its passage.

I have reviewed the Committee's report and being in agreement with it, I adopt its recommendations. I therefore recommend the adoption of the pending amendment, provided, that the following recommendations are adopted for the use and control of the key or cipher:

- 1. The Grand Lodge Committee on Nebraska Work shall advise the Grand Master as to the corrections needed to be made to the cipher presently published by Allen Publishing Company of New York to conform it to the work authorized in Nebraska; that the only authorized cipher shall be edited and published by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and that the cipher shall be separate from and not replace the Moniter and ceremonies for Nebraska.
- Every Master Mason may purchase the authorized cipher from the Grand Lodge of Nebraska through the Secretary of each subordinate lodge.
- 3. The Grand Lodge shall prepare separate ciphers of the questions and answers for each degree for use by the candidates in preparing for their proficiency examinations in each degree.
- 4. The cipher shall not be used or permitted in any opened lodge.
- 5. In the event a cipher is used in an opened lodge, that lodge shall be subject to a reprimand by the Grand Master. On the second offense during the same masonic year as the occurance of the first offense the Grand Master and such persons as designated by him shall convene a hearing with the Officers of said lodge for the purpose of determining whether the charter of that lodge should be arrested until the next regular communication of the Grand Lodge. On both the first and second offense, notification of the imposition of the penalty against a lodge shall be given to all other subordinate lodges.
- 6. With the availability of an authorized cipher, the installed officers of each subordinate lodge shall demonstrate to the Grand Custodian within ninety (90) days of their installation that they can open and close each degree in a proficient manner. In the event the Grand Custodian cannot certify that a lodge is proficient in opening and closing each degree, then the Grand Master shall arrest its charter; provided, that the Grand Master for good cause shown may extend the time, but not longer than the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

Membership loss remains a serious problem in our Grand Jurisdiction. We are not alone. Many jurisdictions attending the Grand Masters' Conference report they are experiencing it also. A program of guest nights or friendship nights is helping to alleviate our problem. If only more lodges would sponsor such a meeting, I'm sure they would be pleased with their results.

As I traveled across our state, I am pleased to report that for the most part our temples are in good state of repair. I found them to be clean and orderly. Cleanliness is very important.

I am encouraged with the number of young Worshipful Masters and their officers. Their dedication and enthusiasm for the fraternity is heart warming. It is with firm conviction I report to you the state of our craft is good.

APPRECIATION

It is impossible for me to adequately thank all who helped me this past year. I'm sure the word "no" does not exist in the vocabulary of our good brethren, for when I asked for assistance everyone responded "yes".

I want to thank the membership for electing me to the high office of Grand Master. My term of office has been most rewarding.

A special thank you to M.W.B. "Duke" Lichty and his lovely wife Margaret for appointing me as their Grand Junior Deacon. I sincerely hope that my year has in some degree measured up to your expectations.

To my family. This year would not have been so smooth without your loyal support. Dorothy has been a real soldier. She never refused any assignment, no matter how large or small. Thank you seems so very inadequate, but it must do for now.

I owe a great debt of gratitude to my own Blue Lodge, East Lincoln No. 210. Starting with my reception the day after my installation and throughout this masonic year, no Grand Master could have received more assistance. Thank you all for everything you have done.

Words are inadequate to express my appreciation to all the Grand Lodge Officers and their wives for the loyal support afforded Dorothy and me this past year. Their dedication and willingness to work whenever and wherever needed will always be remembered. Thank you all for making my year as Grand Master a pleasant one.

REPORT OF GRAND TRUSTEES FOR THE GRAND LODGE AND THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 1985

The Grand Trustees are charged with the management of the funds of the Grand Lodge and the Nebraska Masonic Home. The annual audit reports of these funds by DeLoitte, Haskins & Sells cover the year's activity in detail. Copies are on file with the Grand Secretary. Salient, selected figures from these reports are shown below:

Some comments seem to be in order:

Grand Lodge:

While total revenues were virtually unchanged, expenses were up 36.7%, resulting in a deficit of \$22,739. The increases for ex-

penses for computer, Grand Lodge office committee, annual meeting, and jewel and apron for retiring Grand Master were items showing significant increases. Salary for Grand Custodian was the most significant decrease of expense.

Nebraska Masonic Home:

Home Operating Expenses were up 14.2%.

Home Revenues before transfers from the Endowment Fund were up 35.6%.

Home Deficit was down 19.6%, but was still \$357,474, and was again covered by transfers from the Endowment Fund.

Endowment Fund Investment Income was up 6% and Endowment Fund Equity was up 8.2%.

Restricted Funds:

The Emick Scholarship Fund, discussed more fully in previous years, provided four \$1,000.00 scholarships this year.

In fiscal 1985, the Stephen C. Houghton Trust gave the Grand Lodge \$15,000.00 for the purpose of funding the care, maintenance and education of orphan children. Income received from the investment of these funds is being accumulated pending distribution.

FINAL REPORT OF THE APPROPRIATIOINS COMMITTEE

The Preliminary Report of the Appropriations Committee was received yesterday. We have called your attention to the fact that the right-hand column of the Preliminary Report represents the proposed appropriation for the fiscal 1985-86 year, giving the action of the Grand Lodge to change the duties of the Secretary.

At the bottom of our report, you will see a number of footnotes which reference back to the various line items within the listing of appropriations. These are provided for your information and to explain some of the changes in the list of appropriations from the prior year.

The Grand Lodge has just finished the year of 1984-1985 in which we approved appropriations which exceeded our income. We are pleased to report that we ended the year with a deficit of \$21,651.40 before audit, which amount is less of a deficit than we projected. Expenditures came in at 8.7% under the amounts appropriated. You will recall that we purchased a computer for the Grand Lodge office last year.

The committee wishes to thank those committee chairmen who took the time to respond in writing to our request for appropriation amounts for this year. We especially want to thank the committee chairmen who took the time to make their requests in person at our meeting in May. And, in particular, we want to thank the officers of the Grand Lodge who contributed their time and effort on various occasions subsequent to the May meeting to bring about an appropriations budget which reflects the needs of the Grand Lodge as it operates today.

Several brothers have offered commentary to the committee following yesterday's reception of the report. No objections were received.

Brother John F. Futcher, one of our trustees and a former trustee of the Grand Lodge, entered his eternal home since my last report. M.'W.'. Brother John was a tireless worker for Grand Lodge and was certainly a valued member of our Board. W.'.Brother Donald Andrews, who is with the Northwestern Bell Telephone Company in the data processing department, was appointed to replace M.'.W.'. Brother John. W.'. Brother Don is a member of the Grand Lodge Office Committee.

While I appear here in my capacity as President of the Nebraska Masonic Home, I am making this report on behalf of all of our 15 trustees who are, with the year they came on the Board, the following:

Our Board meetings are held once a month, and special meetings are subject to the call of the President. Additionally, each Trustee serves on two or more committees. They receive no expenses or remuneration of any nature. The expense they incur for mileage, postage, phone calls, and so forth, come out of their own pocket. Very few of you realize the hours they are required to spend to carry out their duties as Trustees. They are a talented and dedicated group and deserve your commendation for their uncompensated devotion to their task. I am very grateful to them.

Fortunately we are living in an era, and in an area, where people are living longer to enjoy the good life provided in Nebraska. This is a wonderful situation to be in. Unfortunately, however, as some of us grow older, our infirmities are such we need care and shelter. This, the Masons of Nebraska have provided through the Nebraska Masonic

Home since 1903. Freemasonry—the oldest fraternal organization in the world—is an organization dedicated to brotherly love, relief, and truth. The Nebraska Masonic Home is the main charity of Nebraska Masons. It is Masonry in action. How familiar are you with your Masonic Home? Have you ever visited it? If not, you should. This lovely home over the years has become one of the finest in the country, and we are justly proud of it. We urge you to visit your Masonic Home. Visit with the residents. I am sure when you do, you will sense the pride they exude in our Home.

Unfortunately, our Home cannot be operated on pride alone. Labor, employee benefits, materials, medicines, medical care, food, utilities, and other expenses mean a budget for the current year of \$1,352,600. I said the Masonic Home is our main charity. Every Nebraska Mason contributes \$2.00 through his dues to the support of the Home. With less than 29,000 members of the fraternity in Nebraska, this entire contribution totals less than \$58,000, which is only slightly more than 4% of our annual budget. No other Grand Lodge funds are used in the operation of the Home. This means your Trustees are required to raise approximately \$1,300,000.00 from sources other than the Grand Lodge. Our endowment fund and the generosity of interested individuals through donations and wills and bequests have permitted us to operate at our present level. The donations to the Home, of more than \$100 from this latter sources, between May 1, 1984, and April 30, 1985, totaled \$366,058.55. Our Seal Fund revenue for the same period totaled \$45,257.34, which is a substantial increase over last year. Please keep these contributions growing.

We are once again indebted to W.. Brother Adolph Schlaman of Asher Lodge #33 for his efforts in promoting the annual Robert Boon memorial food truck in central Nebraska. It arrived November 17, 1984. It was larger this year than last year. It had a total of 535 cases weighing 21,305 lbs. and a value of \$10,308.45. It represents contributions from 57 Lodges in central Nebraska, as well as Duehl Chapter #11 Royal Arch Masons, Mt. Lebanon Commandery #6, and Andrew Chapter #41 OES, as well as the following:

We are also very grateful to the Neal H. Powell Family for the donation of a prime beef to the Home. W.. Brother Neal is the Secretary of Platte Valley Lodge #32.

These food contributions are very important because they help with our food budget. On a negative note, I regret to report we have not yet been successful in restoring the contributions we formerly received from northwestern Nebraska. This was centered in the Scottsbluff area. It is a problem of leadership. Those who were active in the

project have passed on, and no one else has seen fit to take on the task. We are still hopeful we can find someone who can help revive this project. Possibily there is someone here who may be interested in activating his Masonic Obligation.

For several years, we have had problems with some lodges on funerals. During the year, we revised our position and now pay for the funeral service rather than making it the obligation of the Lodge who submitted the application for the deceased. We have a contract with Boyd E. Braman of Omaha, Nebraska, who is doing a very fine job in providing this service. We have contracted with him for the specific items we provide in the traditional funeral service. If anyone wants to vary these services, they may do so by making arrangements with Mr. Braman. Before making these arrangements, we contacted the Grand Master, who is in that business and visited with him about what we should expect to pay for funeral services. We believe this present arrangement will solve the little problems we have had and will promote better public relations for the Home.

As of December 31, 1983, we had 90 guests in the Home. That total increased to 100 as of December 31, 1984, and there are several on a waiting list. Of these 100, 73 receive some type of infirmary care. The demands of our infirmary facilities are expanding to the point where additional facilities have become a necessity. To meet this need, we are considering the addition of a new wing to the Home which will house a 150-unit infirmary. Our present thought is the necessary funds, which will be in the neighborhood of \$2,500,000,00, must be raised without depleting our endowment fund, the income from which is necessary for our present operation. We do not, in any way, want to encroach upon the drive to raise the necessary funds for the Grand Lodge office building. We do, however, want you to have in mind contributions by way of donations, wills, and bequests to permit us to amortize this necessary addition to our Home over a 5-to 7-year period. I am not appealing for funds today, but I want you to be aware of our immediate need and to keep us in mind in your immediate and future charitable contributions.

I commend our Superintendent W.. Brother Raymond F. Evers; his assistant, Brother Harold Flockhart; and the entire staff at the home for the job they are doing. Incidentially, if any of your lodges are interested in a program on the Home, W.. Brother Raymond will be happy to talk about and to show slides of the Home. He is always available to bring a program on the Home to any interested Lodge or Chapter.

I am also grateful to R.`.W.`. Brother Ralph W. Gerry and his staff for the help they have given me during the past year. R.`.W.`. Brother Ralph is ever willing to be helpful.

In conclusion, Brethren, I remind you that the Nebraska Masonic Home is your home. We, as its trustees, act only as your representa-

tives. To continue this great philanthropy, we need the cooperation and the support of every Nebraska Mason. I urge you to visit and to support your Home. You will find it to be a very satisfying experience.

MASONIC EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT – BOARD OF TRUSTEES

For the first time in many years, a new person is being called upon to make the annual President's Report. After the retirement of Joe Lindquist, who had served as President of the Board for 11 years, I was elected to serve as President this past year. It was like being asked to follow a legend. The reminder of his great leadership abilities served to keep one very humble.

In retrospect, the year has passed very quickly. Benjiman Harvey is a very capable Superintendent. His administration of the Home and public relations work on our behalf make any board look good and reduce our work load. He is assisted by some very capable staff members. One of our "premier" housemothers, Wanda Liehs, moved to Colorado this year and it has taken some time to return that house to a smooth operation. At this time I believe that our whole staff, from top to bottom, is the strongest in my experience with the Home. We intend to keep it that way and build from there. Beautiful buildings and grounds make for an attractive setting of which we are all proud, but a children's home is actually the people who work with the children. Our main thrust is now toward having people who can do that job, training them and doing those things necessary to keep them happy and well satisfied. We want people who will consider this more of a calling than a job. Some of our goals have not yet been reached, but we are moving in a sure way toward their attainment.

The Board was organized so that no member served on more than one standing committee. We instituted a special long-range planning committee, whose charge was to develop goals and objectives and define our mission to guide our operations for the rest of this century. They were to objectively question all of our present operational modes to see if we were, indeed, filling a need and if changes might be required to better fulfill the needs of the very children we want to help. The work of this committee is not finished. I hope that it never shall be. We need to be constantly reviewing where we are and where we need to be to best serve our children. Also, we must make sure that our endeavors are for the good of the children, for the good of our Grand Bodies, and a service to humanity. As of this date, the committee

believes that there are more children who are in need of help than ever before. The real problem is in developing strategies that will channel them into our Home. We may need some changes, or some different programs, to fit with the reality of the world as it exists today. The study is continuing.

During the year the Board visited the Grace Children's Home at Henderson and the Omaha Home for Boys in an attempt to learn from their operations, and to help in assessing our own operations in comparison with other homes having a comparable mission. We learned much from our visitations and came home with a blend of envy and satisfaction. On balance, we were very proud of what we have all accomplished over the years, and know that we have a very solid base for the future. The visits proved to be a catalyst for some very deep self-examination and the basis for some improvements we plan to make in the coming year.

Our Home has that unique something that is our greatest potential strength. We are supported by two organizations that have members in every community in Nebraska. An anonymous gift last year from one of our members made possible the purchase of a complete Tandy 2000 computer system, which is being used now in the office in word processing and will be doing the financial records next year. The Worthy Grand Matron's project was for a beautiful book case for our new library and tables and chairs for the auditorium. Other members have given monetary gifts, calves, memorials, clothing, food, and gifts of time and love. If all of our members help us both financially or with their efforts in the search for children from "crippled" families that need our help, then there is no limit to what we can do in helping these children become better citizens in the world tomorrow.

This past year has been most rewarding to me personally, as I have observed the Board rally together to compensate for the retirement from the Board of Past President, Joe Lindquist, and Past Treasurer, Don Swanson. These two men gave generously of a talent that would be hard to buy with money. It was only by a real effort on the part of the Board members that we were able to fill the void left by their departure. The year ended on a note of sadness in the death of Elmer Sells of Tekamah, a long time member of the Board. Elmer will be remembered as a loyal member on whom you could always count to support all of the Home activities.

As we proceed into the last part of this century, the successful operation of our Home is going to require more funds, more interest, and dedication from all of us. It is going to take conscious effort on the part of all our Lodges and Chapters to continue this great and good work.

REPORT ON THE CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

Your Committee on Codification of the Law reports as follows as a result of your action at this Grand Lodge session:

That Section 1-201 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1-201-GRAND SECRETARY-The Grand Secretary shall record the transactions of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend each communication; shall have charge of all records, supplies, jewels, certificates, documents, seal of the Grand Lodge; shall see to the receipt, deposit, and strict accounting of all monies of the Grand Lodge in such accounts as designated by the Grand Trustees; shall pay out such monies on orders regularly issued and signed by the Grand Master; shall see to the drawing of orders, affixing the seal, conducting the correspondence, and preparing and authenticating diplomas as directed by the membership of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master; shall see that all diplomas are executed with the proper date, seal, given names, and signatures; shall be ex-officio Member of the Committee on Fraternal Relations; shall see to the keeping of a record of all those rejected, suspended, and expelled and shall publish or circulate them only as directed by the membership of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master; shall notify each subordinate lodge of any indebtedness due the Grand Lodge before the 20th day of March of each year and shall close all accounts of subordinate lodges on the 1st day of May of each year; shall give a performance bond guaranteed by an approved surety company in an amount of at least the sum of \$200,000.00, with the cost of such bond to be paid by the Grand Lodge; shall examine and correct the annual reports of the subordinate lodges; shall make recommendations regarding the subordinate lodges; shall submit a tabular abstract of the condition of the craft; and upon the installation of his successor he shall transfer to him all books, records, accounts. supplies, jewels, certificates, and documents in his charge.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may equire for the efficient and prompt completion of the business, affairs, and programs of the Grand Lodge and the promotion of Masonry. The Grand Secretary and any full time employee shall not use the Grand Lodge Office, its facilities and equipment, for the use and benefit of any organization, association, club, or corporation, except the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and its subordinate lodges.

The Grand Secretary shall receive as compensation for his services such amount as determined by the Appropriations Committee and approved by the membership of the Grand Lodge.

That the original Section 1-201 and Section 1-201.01 be repealed, and that Sec. 1-201.02 be re-numbered as Sec. 1-201.01.

That Section 1-401, paragraph (c) only, of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

(c) The Board of Grand Trustees shall select its chairman and secretary from its membership.

And that the original paragraph (c) of said Section 1-401 be repealed.

This report is respectfully submitted, and I move the adoption of the report as a whole.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

M.W. Louis V. Sylvester reported verbally that there was no work for the committee so there was nothing to report.

REPORT ON GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

M.'.W.'. BEVIN B. BUMP

This committee and their terms, appointed by the Grand Master, M.W. Robert A. Metcalf, consisted of the following Master Masons: M.W. Bevin B. Bump, 158 (1989), Chairman; W. James L. Eatmon, 294 (1988); W. Donald Lee Andrews, 15 (1987); M.W. Jack Hendrix, 174 (1986); and M.W. Thomas J. Aron, 37 (1985).

The committee was charged by the Grand Master to observe and review the workings of the Grand Lodge Offices and to proceed with whatever was necessary to improve the efficiency of the offices for the benefit of Nebraska Freemasonry. The Committee met six times and with the Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, the Special Building Committee and the Appropriations Committee, in Lincoln, North Platte, Omaha, and by telephone.

The computers purchased in October, 1983, were finally put into

operation after the 1984 Grand Lodge Communication, and the membership list from the records in the Grand Lodge Offices were placed in its data memory. Upon completion of this, the balance of the year was spent in adding the deceased members from the office records to the computer memory. The word processing functions and the accounting capabilities of the computer were not used during the year, and additional help was hired to program what data was placed in the computer.

In January of this year, the committee became aware of the availability of rental space in the new Bar Center Building being constructed at 635 S. 14th Street in Lincoln, Nebraska, in the very area that the Special Building Committee recommended, and the Grand Lodge adopted at the 1984 Communication. Meeting with the Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers and the Building Committee, it was decided to see what kind of lease could be negotiated. After being offered space on the first floor or the third floor, the committee agreed, after meetings, plan review, and on-site inspections, to lease a 1532 square foot area on the third floor for a three-year term, with option to renew the lease for two one-year terms.

Grand Junior Deacon, John McHenry and Brother Art Sharp, both of Lincoln, were added to the committee as ex-official members to assist in moving the Grand Lodge Offices since the space was to be available June 1, 1985. A special thanks from the Committee goes to John and Art for the many hours spent assisting this Committee in the move, setting up the offices and interviewing and working with new staff and the Omaha staff. Art Sharp took a leave of absence from his job to supervise the move and worked at times under the handicap of not receiving the help promised and of not getting the cooperation from some whom he should have. He has provided an outstanding service to the Fraternity.

After many weeks of preparation and packing, the van was loaded May, 31, and the Omaha office closed, and the move was made to the Lincoln offices. It was a very busy year for the Committee, but next year will be even busier. There are office procedure manuals, bookkeeping procedure manuals, and personnel policy manuals to write and periodic review of the office staff.

The committee plans that the new offices will be staffed with two employees, both capable of operating the computer, using the word processing, bookkeeping, accounting, and reporting functions as well as operating the Grand Lodge Offices, under the direction of the Grand Master and the Office Committee.

REPORT OF TEMPLE BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

This past year has not been a busy one for the Temple Building Advisory Committee. We have had correspondence with several lodges about building new temples or about buying existing buildings to remodel but there has been very little actually done. Some of these may become active projects in the future.

The Chairman met with the Master of Aurora Lodge #68, AF & AM in Aurora and with the building committee, to discuss their need for a new temple. This project is still being considered.

The new temple for Frank Welch Lodge #75, AF & AM in Sidney is under construction and should be nearing completion. The cornerstone was laid May 18, 1984, and the building was enclosed before winter.

At the request of the Grand Master, this committee approved the building in Winside to which Fraternity Lodge #235, AF & AM in Winside wanted to move their Charter. That move was approved by the Grand Master.

This Committee approved a loan of \$4,000.00 from the Board of Grand Trustees to College View Lodge #320 in Lincoln for repair work on their temple.

Most Lodges in trouble have most if not all of these problems, or more. This brings them to their knees, before the Committee is asked to help at a time when they are almost beyond help.

Your committee now moves that this Grand Lodge recognize The Grande Loge Du Gabon, Africa, and that the Grand Secretary so notify them of our action.

HAITIAN FEDERATION OF MASONS U.S.A.

The Haitian Federation of Masons U.S.A., and John R. Bullock as its Grand Comander, is totally irregular and non-masonic and has no connection with the Grand Orient of Haiti.

ITALY

The Grand Orient of Italy continues in turmoil resulting from the Lodge P-2 Scandal.

From this has resulted two new groups, styled: Grand Loggia Generale D'Italia and Gran Loggia D 1 Calabria, both of which are not entitled to recognition, and only The Grand Orient of Italy, remains recognized.

Membership is not something that can be delegated to any committee. Each member should appoint himself as a committee of one to be on the lookout for qualified prospects and then offer those prospects information about the Fraternity at every opportunity. You can't ask a man to join, but you also can't expect a man to ask when he doesn't have the slightest idea what we offer or, worse yet, that we even exist. Think about it.

We also wish to acknowledge the efforts of several Lodges which conducted "Friendship Dinners" without financial support from our Committee, each recognizing the importance of the program and the advantages of "doing their own thing" for the betterment of their own Lodge.

Your Committee's aim is to help only where and when needed. Each Lodge should be prepared to conduct its own program because it knows the territory much better than any so-called expert brought in from some distance away.

One closing thought ... Did you ever notice that if a Lodge is conferring three or four degrees **each** month, it doesn't have time to worry about a bunch of small problems, in fact, they don't seem to have any problems! Think about it.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

W.: ERV SEIMONEIT

The Public Relations Committee this past year has been in the process of reorganizing and, it appears that in a matter of time, will be working to its fullest capabilities. We are happy to report that during our first year under our new plan, we have covered at least 20 functions of our Grand Lodge Officers, 15 of which were news written, pictures submitted and published in the "Nebraska Freemason." Also, numerous news releases were submitted to local newspapers and television stations within the areas of our Grand Lodge Officers appearance.

Because this report is being written a month prior to the Annual Communication, a 100th Anniversary celebration and a cornerstone laying ceremony, both in McCook, will be covered and submitted to the news media and the "Freemason."

With 226 Blue Lodges across Nebraska and only five members assigned to the committee to cover the State, many miles had to be driven in order to attend the functions. This year, the State was divided into five sections. Each section was the responsibility of the Committee member living within that section.

Each Committee member was furnished a map of his specific area, a listing of all the Lodges by name, number, and the number of members. They also were furnished the names and addresses of all the newspapers in their area in order to inform the printed media of our Grand Lodge's upcoming events and file the stories following the occasion.

Les Mann of Chadron was assigned the northwestern section of the State which consisted of 19 counties, 27 Lodges, and represented 2,907 Lodge members. One must realize there are only 19 counties in Brother Mann's area; however, those 19 counties, area-wise, encompassed approximately 23,000 square miles.

Don Bottorf of Sutton was assigned the east central section of the State consisting of 22 counties, 58 Lodges, 4,426 Lodge members and 13,000 square miles. His north/south area covered all the counties from the South Dakota to the Kansas state lines, and from just east of Hastings to Crete on the east/west width.

Alex Swaitek of Lincoln was assigned to the southeastern section of the state including 9 counties, 40 Lodges, 6,686 members and approximately 5,000 square miles. He covered everything south of the Platte River to the Kansas border, and from the Iowa border to approximately Pleasant Dale.

Don Madsen of Omaha was assigned the northeast section which included 10 counties, 43 Lodges, 10,358 members and some 4,000 square miles, all the counties north of the Platte River to the South Dakota line and from the Iowa state line to approximately Wisner.

Erv Siemoneit of Heartwell was assigned the central section of the state, 33 counties, 62 Lodges, 5,686 members and approximately 30,000 square miles, from Hastings to Grant to the west, and his north/south borders were from the South Dakota to the Kansas state lines.

On November 15, 1984, Brother Bottorf sent out numerous letters to the Secretaries of various Lodges and to the "Nebraska Freemason" (published in the Oct.-Nov.-Dec. edition), asking them to contact the committee whenever a Grand Lodge Officer makes an appearance at their Lodge functions. The response was very poor. Therefore, our coverage of all the Grand Lodge functions was not reported or publicized to our expectations.

We hope that during this annual Grand Lodge Communication, it be emphasized how important it is to inform this Committee of their upcoming events. We also hope that when the Lodge Secretaries meet just prior to this session in order to form a Secretaries Association, the subject of Public Relations will be discussed by them and communications be set up between them and our Committee.

And finally, we ask all the Grand Lodge Officers to furnish us with their itineraries well in advance in order that we can plan a more publicized next year.

Most Worshipful Sir, it has not only been an honor to serve as the Chairman of this committee, but also a fraternal experience to make numerous acquaintances with my Masonic Brothers throughout the state.

REPORT OF THE 1984 ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

The 1985 Annual Meeting of the Masonic Service Association was held on February 18, 1985, at Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. M.W. Robert A. Metcalf, our Grand Master, and our Grand Secretary R.W. Ralph W. Gerry were in attendance. I was also present in my capacity of Chairman Ermeritus, and as a member of its Investment Committee. It always amazes me that so many of our members are uninformed as to the activities and function of this great Masonic Organization, of which Nebraska has been an active member for many years.

There are two main departments of the M.S.A. The first division is that devoted to Masonic education in charge of our capable R.W. Brother Stewart J. L. Pollard, Executive Secretary-Treasurer, of the M.S.A.

Probably the most popular publication of the M.S.A. is the monthly *Short Talk Bulletin* which comprises outstanding messages on Freemasonry. I note that there are only 33 subscribers in Nebraska, which is disappointing. The cost is \$2.50 for an annual subscription and if any of you would like to have this popular Bulletin, any of our Grand Lodge Officers and myself would be pleased to process a subscription for you. In April, 1985, I was favored in having an article written by me published. It is entitled "The Scope of Freemasonry."

Each of our Lodges receives a copy of this monthly Bulletin by reason of our membership. This past year, the Grand Lodge of Alabama renewed its membership in the M.S.A. The only Grand Lodges who are not members are Arkansas, California, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Texas, and West Virginia.

New informational digests were published last year, including an update on Masonic Homes, Hospitals, and Charity Foundations of Masonry in the United States, and a new digest on Masonic Trials. A new publication index listing M.S.A. publications, films and materials was given wide distribution. Our new film, "When the Band Stops Playing," has proven to be very popular. Our Grand Lodge has one copy of this. Rental can be secured through the M.S.A. The *Emessay Notes* publication continues to be well accepted and serves as a source of information on recent events of interest to Masons.

The second division or department of the M.S.A. is its outstanding Hospital Visitation Program, which comprises the united benevolent project of the Grand Lodges of the United States, which is directed by the M.S.A. to minister and serve the hospitalized veterans of our nation's wars. There are 175 Veterans Hospitals and Medical Centers operated by the Veterans Administration. The M.S.A. has approximately 185 field agents and thousands of volunteers enlisted from all

Masonic bodies, ladies' organizations, and youth groups who constitute the personnel of this most impressive Masonic benevolence under the leadership of M.W. Thomas R. Dougherty, Past Grand Master of N.J., who is the Director of Hospital Visitation of the M.S.A.

There are three Veteran's Medical Centers in Nebraska. Brother Robert Adamsheck has been the Field Agent for the Lincoln Center, assisted by Brothers Stephen Taylor and Clarence Williams. Brother Robert May is our Field Agent for the Omaha Medical Center. We do not have any Field Agent for the Grand Island Medical Center. Each of these brethren are daily servicing the needs of not only the Masonic veterans, but others as well. They truly exemplify the golden tenets of our Fraternity of Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth.

On Tuesday, May 7, 1985, our Grand Master Robert A. Metcalf, Past Grand Masters Rickette, Lichty, and Ronin, Grand Junior Deacon John McHenry, and our Grand Tyler Nelson Rittenberg visited the Lincoln Veterans Hospital. Our Field Agent, Brother Bob Adamschek, planned a comprehensive tour of this recently improved facility which we thoroughly enjoyed. It was most evident that the work of our Field Agents is deeply appreciated by the personnel of the Veterans Medical Center.

In the afternoon, our Grand Master visited the Omaha Veterans Hospital accompanied by our Grand Secretary Ralph Gerry and our Field Agent Bob May, who was presented with his five-year certificate of M.S.A. service. Photographs of both tours have been sent to our Director of M.S.A. Hospital Visitation of the M.S.A. together with a most favorable report.

If you know of any Brother who is at either the Omaha or Lincoln Medical Center, or who plans on being there, please advise our Masonic Field Agent so that he will be certain to assist this Brother during his stay there. We need to have a Field Agent for the Grand Island Medical Center and this is under consideration.

These various services of the M.S.A. are growing more and more extensive and we are justified in being proud to sponsor them.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH COMMITTEE

The Youth Committee is pleased to report that our Grand Master presented Grand Lodge Scholarships to the outstanding member of each of our Youth Groups during 1984. GRAND ORATOR'S ORATION

Reflections

We have reflected this evening on the service of a great lady to our Grand Lodge. We have reflected on the service of a great man to our Grand Lodge. But I am thinking of different types of reflections. Those of you who were present last year at Grand Lodge may be able to recall—and reflect—that I closed my Oration then with the following quotation which I received from the files of my wife, Carole:

You should live each day to the fullest. Get the most from each hour, each day and each age of your life. Then you can look forward with confidence, and back without regrets. Be youself, but be your best self. Dare to be different. Follow your own star—and don't be afraid to be happy. Enjoy what is beautiful. Love with all your heart and soul. Believe that those you love, love you. Forget what you have done for your friends and remember what they have done for you. Disregard what the world owes you. Concentrate on what you owe the world. When you are faced with a decision, make that decision as wisely as possible and forget it. The moment of absolute certainty never arrives. Above all, remember that God helps those who help themselves. Act as if everything depended on you—and pray as if everything depended upon God.

There is a lot to reflect upon in that quotation.

There is an ancient Oriental legend that tells of the man who found the first mirror. He picked it up, dusted it off and looked at it in amazement. He did not know what it was. As he looked at it, it seemed to him that he saw before him the face of his Father, a very wise man. The finder kept his prize through the years and would worship it in a very secret place known only to him. As the years went by, the man realized that the image looked more and more like his Father, and he would spend more and more time reflecting on what his Father had meant to him. Now it seems that the finder of the mirror had a very jealous wife, and she became increasingly jealous of the time he spent away from her. One day she followed him to his secret place and hid until he had departed. Then, after he had left, she went in to see what it was that held his attention. She looked into the mirror and said, "Just as I though—another woman! But how could he be interested in one who looks so ugly?"

The way I look at something and the way you look at something is different. It reflects back to us in a different way.

Abraham Lincoln used to use the parable of the wolf that attacked a flock of sheep. But before the wolf could do any evil, he was driven off by the shepherd. After that the sheep looked at the shepherd as their saviour—as the one who had saved their lives and kept them safe. The wolf, on the other hand, looked upon the shepherd as a despoiler and depriver of his rights. The one function performed by the shepherd was viewed in entirely different manners by the sheep and the wolf.

Brethren, we have done a lot of things at this Grand Lodge Communication, and there is still more to do. Some of the members have been satisfied and happy with decisions that have been made. Some of the members have not. However, in our wisdom I feel that the will of the 'group' has been that which has prevailed, and that we can all reflect upon this and accept the fact that although what has taken place might not be particularly satisfying to us as an individual—it has been for the will of the majority. What might be momentarily painful to some is viewed in a different way by others.

You may recall from the years ago the verse that goes: "Monday's child is fair of face,/Tuesday's child is full of grace,/Wednesday's child is loving and giving,/Thursday's child works hard for a living,/Friday's child is full of woe,/Saturday's child has far to go,/But the child that is born on the Sabbath Day/Is brave and bonnie and good and gay."

I look upon Masonry in Nebraska today as a 'Saturdays's child.' "Saturday's child has far to go." Masonry in Nebraska has come a long way in the 130 years since that first Lodge—#184 under the Grand Lodge of Illinois was chartered in Bellevue, Nebraska—but masonry in Nebraska today is like the hyphen between yesterday and tomorrow. We have a long way to go. With confidence in the abilities of all, we are going to go forward into tomorrow because we can reflect on what has happened in the past. We can be guided by the wisdom and the courage of those who have come before us, and we can look forward to tomorrow—a long way to go.

Not everyone will agree that the path we are following is perhaps the right path. I am reminded though of a little poem I heard one time—

My granddad, viewing earth's worn cogs, Said things were going to the dogs;

His granddad in his house of logs, Said things were going to the dogs; His granddad in the Fleming bogs, Said things were going to the dogs; His granddad in his old skin togs, Said things were going to the dogs; There's just one thing I have to state— The dogs have had a good long wait.

The past is gone! The present is here! The future is yet to come!

We should live each day to its fullest. Let me share with you this "Salutation of the Dawn" which was first written in Sanskrit, but speaks as if it were meant for us today—

Look to this Day!
For it is Life, the very Life of Life.
In its brief course lie the truths and realities of your Existence:
The Bliss of Growth,
The Glory of Action,
The Splendor of Beauty.
For Yesterday is but a dream,
And Tomorrow is only a vision;
But today well-lived makes every yesterday a dream of happiness,
And every tomorrow a vision of hope.
Look well, therefore, to this Day!
Such is the Salutation of the Dawn.

Such, my Brethren, should be our Salutation to a Saturday's Child.

THE JORDON MEDAL

A bronze Jordon Medal which perpetuates the memory of M. W. Robert Carrell Jordon, our first Grand Master, is provided each lodge in the state by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. It is intended that the medal shall successively be presented to and worn by the oldest member of the lodge who lives in the state and holds the most number of concurrent years of membership.

The One Hundred Twenty Eighth Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge was held in Lincoln, Nebraska, June 13-14-15, 1985. At the Grand Lodge Banquet on Friday evening June 14, the Bronze Jordon Medal for Nebraska Lodge No. 1 was presented to M. W. Benjamin F. Eyre by M. W. Herbert A. Ronin, Past Grand Master. Brother Ben is 97 years old and has been a member of No. 1 for 68 years. He received his M. M. degree March 27, 1917, Past Master of Nebraska No. 1, 1924-1925. He was appointed in Grand Lodge line in 1939 by William J. Breckenridge, Grand Master, elected and installed Grand Master serving that office 1946-1947.

He also holds the oldest active Certificate of Proficiency in the State dated January 17, 1924, signed by Robert E. French, Grand Custodian and Charles A. Chappell, Grand Master. He has been in attendance at Grand Lodge for 60 years.

REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

M.'.W.'. BEVIN B. BUMP

Good Afternoon. Your Jurisprudence Committee met yesterday afternoon with 16 Past Grand Masters present, and I am pleased to report that the meeting closed in peace and harmony. If you will turn to page 8 of the Grand Master's Address, you have there his decisions and his recommendations, which we will now cover.

DECISIONS

1. Received letter from Potter Lodge #313 requesting dispensation to have an Entered Apprentice Degree conferred on their candidate by Frank Welch Lodge #75 because Potter Temple was not ready for use. I ruled that Sec. 2-1205 permits a Nebraska Lodge to do work for another and that no dispensation was required.

Approved

2. Received a letter from Mitchell Lodge #263 requesting permission to permit the Rebekah Lodge of Mitchell, Nebraska to hold its meetings in the Masonic Temple. Covenant Lodge #259 I.O.O.F. of Mitchell, Nebraska disbanded, leaving the Rebekah Lodge without a meeting place. I ruled favorably. Section 2-501, last sentence, states: It may however be used by other orders if their principles are not unmasonic.

Approved

- 3. Received a letter of request from College View Lodge #320 to apply to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for a \$4000 loan for needed repairs on their Temple. I ruled favorably using Section 2-614 for my decision.
 - Approved with the addition of the following words added at the end of the decision, "and also follow procedure set out in Section 1-402 (a)."
- 4. Denied request from Grand Island Lodge #318 to change dates of their regular meeting. Advised them dates of regular meetings are stated in their Bylaws and Grand Lodge does not have authority to act.

Approved

5. Ordered Gothenburg Lodge #249 to suspend all procedures for consolidation until a thorough investigation can be made.

Approved

6. Refused request of Brother Marvin Ropte to make a change in the second paragraph of his resolution he presented at the 126th Annual Communication.

Approved

7. Received a letter from Falls City Lodge No. 9 "stating they had a law suit." A copy of the Petition for Declaratory Judgment was also received. Falls City Lodge owns the top half of the building they meet in. The bottom half is owned by the Nemaha Reality Company of Falls City. The Realty Company feels repairs on the building are necessary. The Board of Trustees of Falls City takes the position that all the repairs suggested by the Realty Company are not necessary. I advised the Lodge the dispute needs to be resolved by the two parties involved. The Grand Lodge has no authority to get involved. Suggested they obtain legal counsel to be properly represented in court.

Approved

8. Received a letter from Harvard Lodge No. 44 asking permission to sell 76 feet of ground owned by their lodge for a house to be built. I advised Harvard Lodge No. 44 that Grand Lodge does not have to give permission to them to sell the 76 feet. The decision is theirs.

Approved

At this time as Chairman of the Committee I will move for the approval and adoption of the Committee's report in regard to the decisions.

- R.'.W.'. Charles W. Amidon, Deputy Grand Master: It has been regularly moved and seconded that the recommendations of the Jurisprudence Committee be approved. All those in favor of this recommendation, vote by the usual sign of a Mason voting by right hand. Down hand. Opposed, same sign. Motion carried.
- M. . W. . Bevin B. Bump, Past Grand Master, Chairman: We will now take up the Recommendatons.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation No. I.

- 1) The rewritten Constitution and Bylaws are signed by five Grand Lodge members be entered upon the minutes of this annual communication and then submitted to the several chartered subordinate lodges for approval.
- 2) At the next succeeding annual communication of the Grand Lodge the rewritten Constitution of the Grand Lodge be adopted as

the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska and thereafter the present Constitution be of no force and effect.

- 3) At the next succeeding annual communication of the Grand Lodge the rewritten set of Bylaws be adopted as the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska and thereafter the present set of Bylaws be of no force and effect.
- M. W. BUMP: As to Recommendation No. I, the committee had decided that since it was necessary for Constitutional Amendments to lay over for a year, and to be approved by a majority of the lodges before being voted on by next year's Communication, except to accept it for such necessary action since it had been proposed also by five members.
- R.'.W.'. AMIDON: If that is understood, all of those in favor of what the Jurisprudence Committee wants to do with it, vote the usual sign of a Mason. Down hands. Those opposed same sign. We accept your decision not to do anything.

Recommendation No. II

1) That Section 1-201 Bylaws of the Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Sec.1-201. GRAND SECRETARY. The Grand Secretary shall record the transactions of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend each communication; shall have charge of all records, supplies, jewels, certificates, documents and seal of the Grand Lodge; shall see to the receipt, deposit and strict accounting of all monies of the Grand Lodge in such amounts as designated by the Grand Trustees; shall pay out such monies on orders regularly issued and signed by the Grand Master; shall see to the drawing of orders, affixing the seal, conducting the correspondence, and preparing and authenticating diplomas as directed by the membership of the Grand Lodge of the Grand Master; shall see that all diplomas are executed with the proper date, seal, given names and signatures; shall be ex officio Fraternal Relations; shall see to the keeping of a record of all those rejected, suspended and expelled and shall publish or circulate them only as directed by the membership of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master; shall notify each subordinate lodge of any indebtedness due the Grand Lodge before the 20th day of March of each year and shall close all accounts of subordinate lodges on the 1st day of May of each year; shall give a performance bond guaranteed by an approved surety company in an amount determined by the Appropriations Committee; provided, that the amount is at least the sum of \$200,000.00 and the cost is paid by the Grand Lodge; shall examine and correct the annual reports of the subordinate lodges; shall submit a tabular abstract of the condition of the craft; and upon the installation of his successor he shall transfer to him all books, records, accounts, supplies, jewels, certificates and documents in his charge.

"The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of the business, affairs, and programs of the Grand Lodge and the promotion of Masonry. The Grand Secretary and any full-time employee shall not use the Grand Lodge Office, its facilities and equipment for the use and benefit of any organization, association, club or corporation, except the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and its subordinate lodges.

"The Grand Secretary shall receive as compensation for his services such amount as determined by the Appropriations Committee and approved by the membership of the Grand Lodge."

- 2) That Section 1-201:01 Bylaws of the Grand Lodge be repealed.
- M. W. BUMP: Recommendation No. II. The Jurisprudence Committee recommends approval of the Bylaw change that the Secretary would not be a full-time employee of the Grand Lodge, and also recommended that along with this Bylaw change that Sec. 1-401C which deals with the Secretary as Secretary of the Board of Trustees be changed so that the Grand Secretary would not be secretary of the Board of Trustees at their meetings and also where the Secretary was listed as "ex officio fraternal relations," we assume that means ex officio member of fraternal relations committee, that this language remain. I move for the adoption of the approval of the Grand Master's recommendation No. II with those amendments.
- R.'.W.'. AMIDON: Is there a second? Is there any discussion? Call for the question. All those in favor vote by the usual sign of a Mason voting. Down hands. Opposed—same sign. Motion carried by majority.

Recommendation No. III

- 1. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska does hereby authorize the Nebraska Masonic Foundation to proceed immediately to raise funds by way of gifts, grants or bequests to said foundation and to construct the proposed Nebraska Masonic Center upon the site located on the southeast corner of Sixteenth and L Streets in Lincoln, Nebraska.
- 2. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska does hereby agree to and is desirous of occupying space in the Nebraska Masonic Center for the purposes of housing the offices of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.
- M. W. BUMP: Recommendation No. III. The Jurisprudence Committee recommends approval of the Grand Master's Recommendation No. III, which would authorize the Nebraska Masonic Foundation to raise funds by way of gifts, grants or bequests and to construct the proposed Nebraska Masonic Center at a site on the southeast corner of 16th and L Streets in Lincoln, and to confirm the option granted by the property owned for 10 years, by adding the following item to the Recommendation: "3. Confirm the option granted by the property owned to purchase the site at 16th and L

Street." I move adoption of this Recommendation. Second from the floor.

Considerable discussion then followed between the floor and the Chair regarding the adoption by the Grand Lodge of the Grand Master's Recommendations at last year's Annual Communication at Kearney, and this Recommendation.

R.'.W.'. AMIDON: We have a call for the question. All those in favor of the motion to approve the Grand Master's Recommendation No. III as approved by the Jurisprudence Committee, vote by the usual sign of a Mason. Down hands. Opposed. The ayes have it.

Recommendation No. IV

That the Nebraska Masonic Foundation as constituted and filed within the State of Nebraska is hereby approved by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

- M.'.W.'. BUMP: The Jurisprudence Committee recommends that Recommendation No. IV of the Grand Master be approved, and I move for its adoption. Second from the floor.
- R.'.W.'. AMIDON: It has been moved and seconded that Recommendation No. IV recommended by the Grand Master be approved. All those in favor vote by the usual sign of a Mason when voting. Down hands. Opposed, same sign. The ayes have it.

Recommendation No. V

Regulations for the use and control of a key or cipher in the event a Resolution is adopted by the Grand Lodge permitting the use of a key or cipher for ritualistic work, by an amendment to Section 3-102 G. (See full Recommendation in Grand Master's Address)

- M. W. BUMP: It was the understanding of the Jurisprudence Committee that if the Resolution to approve the use of a key or cipher was approved by this Grand Lodge there would be a need for some regulations as to its use and control, and the committee was ready to approve the Grand Master's recommendation for that use and control for the first 5 of those recommendations, however, since that Resolution was defeated and it did not pass, it is not necessary for the Jurisprudence Committee to make any approval or disapproval as to Recommendation No. V.
- R.'.W.'. AMIDON: May I ask our W.'. Brother our parliamentarian, if it's proper for the W.'. Grand Master to withdraw his recommendation at this time.
 - M.'.W.'. BUMP: I don't think he needs to.
- M. W. METCALF: As Grand Master, I withdraw Recommendation No. V.
- R.:.W.: AMIDON: Therefore, we will not be voting on Recommendation No. V.

M.'.W.'. BUMP: With that the Jurisprudence Committee closes this report with a thank you to all of the committees that worked very hard last year to get these things ready for the Grand Master, and gives its vote of thanks to the Grand Master for the work that he has done, and it is like I told you yesterday, we closed in peace and harmony, and today we close in peace and harmony, and I thank you, brethern, for listening to this committee report.

THE GRAND LODGE, A.F. & A.M. OF NEBRASKA 128th ANNUAL COMMUNICATION REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL DEAD

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, visiting Grand Lodge Officers from other Grand Lodge Jurisdictions, Brethren all.

Last year, in Kearney at the 127th Grand Lodge session, I touched upon how we visit various cemeteries and celebrate Memorial Day.

This year just a few short weeks ago, another Memorial Day came and went. I too traveled back to my home town, where I attended the services at the cemetery, but this year I did something different. I sat back and watched the people. I couldn't help wondering how in their own way these people were going to remember their loved ones.

I started to wander through the grave markers, and I listened to some of the different conversations, as the people stood by their family graves. A number of conversations were about how pretty the flowers were, and who put them on the graves, but the thing that I didn't hear was the name of the loved one who was buried in the grave, or what this loved one meant to them in life. Was this their way of remembering their loved one, by who left the pretty flowers?

As I watched these people, they would walk around the grave site, being very careful not to step on the grave itself, but when they left the grave site, again being very careful not to step on the grave, they would walk right over the grave of someone else's loved one; is this remembering?

Do not get me wrong; all who I watched that day didn't act this way. I saw a little elderly lady on her knees praying by a grave. I watched this very beautiful site for sometime, until what appeared to be her grown children approaching. They helped the elderly lady to her feet and led her to a waiting car, where she got in and they left the cemetery. After they left I went to the grave where the lady had been praying. I looked down at the grave stone, and I saw the name of her husband who had passed away a few years before. Her name was also engraved on the stone along with her date of birth. I turned and walked away, and I couldn't help wondering what the elderly lady had said in her prayer; but she remembered.

I also saw a younger lady sitting in a car. She appeared to be just scan-

ning the cemetery for something or someone. The tears were rolling down her face. Was it a loved one, or a friend; but she was remembering.

I finally made it to the grave of my grandfather, where I found someone had placed some pretty flowers on his grave; so I knew my grandfather had been remembered. I stood there looking down at the grave remembering how he was in life. I loved my grandfather then as I love my father now, I remember how much I missed him when he passed away. He wasn't a mason but he had all the qualifications to be a good mason. I just wanted to remember him

My Brethren; this is what it is all about: Remembering. Therefore, we must remember and celebrate this Memorial Service for our departed Brothers here at the 128th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska

But what is a Memorial? Webster defines Memorial as "anything to help people to remember some person or event."

Let us take a look at this definition and examine it to see if we can apply it to us as masons or to our fraternity.

- 1st The word ANYTHING, would refer to the Memorial service we are conducting here today.
- 2nd The word PEOPLE, would refer to us as masons.
- 3rd The word REMEMBER, would refer to our memorializing our departed brothers.
- 4th The word PERSON, would refer to our departed brothers.
- 5th The word EVENT, would refer to the passing of our departed brother.

So you see this definition does fall into the realm of our Memorial Service. We can take this definition a little further. Masons do not think a Memorial Service as a time to mourn, but a time to remember.

Brethren let us pray, Brother Grand Chaplin.

There were reported to the Office of the Grand Secretary, the reported deaths of 25 Grand Masters, four Grand Lodge Officers from other Grand Jurisdictions. Of those reported deaths, 12 Grand Masters, one Grand Lodge Officer, was outside of the boundries of the United States. The total number of deaths of Masons in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for the year of 1984-85, ending June 5, 1985, was 900 Brethren, including one Past Grand Master.

He entered private practice of Law in 1932 and joined the Law Department of the Federal Land Bank. In 1934 he joined the Woodmen of the World Life Insurance Society Law Department.

Nebraska Masonry was indeed fortunate to have had as its Grand Master M. W. John F. Futcher. His untiring efforts in behalf of the craft in all aspects, not only in Nebraska, but Nationally, shows his profound love for the institution. It also demonstrates that Masons, by deeds and actions, must set a worthy example to the citizenry everywhere.

M. W. Brother Futcher demonstrated his leadership qualities and Nebraska Masonry is truly thankful for his outstanding contribution.

wanderings and occupations and think of the Worshipful and Honorable Brethren whose years have gone by, and whose working tools have dropped from their hands, and their trestle board of life shows no designs; and are now clothed with the Celestrial Garments of Ever Lasting Life; and have given a final account of their labors to the Supreme Architect of the Universe; and have been paid their Masonic Wages.

We thus come to the end of another Memorial Service. We will all some-day receive our Masonic Wages for our labors, but we must remember, "Masonic labor is purely a labor of love. He who seeks to draw Masonic Wages in Gold and Silver will be disappointed. The wages of a mason are earned and paid with their dealings with one another. Sympathy begets sympathy; kindness begets kindness; helpfulness begets helpfulness; and these are the wages of a mason. Therefore, we as masons must earn our Masonic Wages in the spirit of Brotherhood, Love, and Fellowship to our Fraternity.

EMICK SCHOLARSHIPS REPORT

The Emick Masonic Youth Scholarships, financed by the generous contributions from Glenn O. and the late Evelyn F. Emick, were awarded for the first time for the 1983-1984 college year.

Brother Glenn O. Emick is a 68 year member of Samaritan Lodge No. 158 at Chadron, having been raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on February 12, 1916. He was presented his 50-year pin February 12, 1966 from the Grand Lodge and is also a 50-year member of all three York Rite bodies located at Chadron.

Prior to coming to Chadron he received a country school education and spent several years working on his father's farm in Ohio.

In 1914 he decided to go back to school and made an arrangement with the President of the three year old college at Chadron to take courses in the Training School and to work at the college for his board and room. He was 23 at the time.

Glenn had completed prep school and was in college when he took time out to serve in the Army during World War I. Following the war he finished college, graduating with the class of 1920 from what is now Chadron State College.

From Chadron he went to Wyoming for a year where he earned a degree in political science. After teaching school, he entered the University of Michigan and graduated in 1924 with a Masters Degree in Education. He returned to Chadron as an instructor for one year,

and then went to the Chicago area where he taught school and attended the University of Chicago part time. He graduated from the University of Chicago with a Doctors Degree in Education in 1935.

After finishing at Indiana he was an educational advisor in the Civilian Conservation Corps program until 1942 when he entered the Air Force during World War II. Retiring from the Air Force with the rank of Colonel, he re-entered government service as a civilian Dean of the Air Force University at Wright Field.

While stationed at Mobile, Ala., Glenn had met Evelyn Bennett who was a foreign language instructor for the Air Force, and they were married in New Orleans in 1942. Evelyn passed away in 1969.

Chadron State College awarded Dr. Emick its "Distinguished Service Award" in 1969. Other awards he has received include 50 year membership certificate from Phi Delta Kappa, Air Force "Certificate of Meritorious Service," Air Force Commendation Medal, and the Air Force "Decoration for Exceptional Service.

When Brother Emick originally set up the scholarship fund with the Grand Lodge, he had thought that it could provide scholarships for former residents of the Masonic Eastern Star Home who would be, or were attending, one of the four State Colleges and studying biology, pre-medicine, science, medical research, or teaching.

When it was discovered that more scholarships could be given if more students were permitted to apply, the scholarship was broadened to include students who had been, or were, members of DeMolay, Job's Daughters or Rainbow.

The following persons were each granted a \$1,000 Emick Masonic Youth Scholarship for the 1984-1985 term.

Andrews Giles Meade, a senior at Chadron State College, is from Alliance, Neb. His major areas of study are chemistry, physics and mathematics. While associated with the Alliance Chapter of DeMolay, he was a member in Initiatory Degree teams which won the Nebraska State DeMolay Ritual Competition six times. He won individual honors as the winner of the Nebraska DeMolay Flower Talk competition. He was also active in the Ak-Sar-Ben Priory of the Order of Knighthood.

Pamela J. Watts, a junior at Kearney State College, is from Ansley, Neb. She has held all major offices in Bethel No. 23 at Ansley, including Honored Queen. Twice she has participated in the Miss Nebraska Job's Daughter pageant. She served as Grand Bethel Guide at Grand Bethel in North Platte in 1982. She also participated in Grand Bethel in Columbus (1980), Norfolk (1981), Omaha (1983), and Grand Island (1984). She was a recipient of the Mick Memorial Scholarship in 1982 and 1984.

Brett Huston, a sophomore at Peru State College, is from Omaha,

Neb., where he was an active membr of the Imperial Chapter, Order of DeMolay. He held the offices of Second Presentor, Scribe-Treasurer, Senior Councilor at the age of 15. He completed the Leadership correspondence course and is a Representative DeMolay. He has recently become a Chevalier. He is a past Rainbow Beau of Benson Diana Assembly No. 2 in Omaha. In 1980 he won the Nebraska State Competition in the Ceremony of Lights.

Deann Clyde, a senior at Wayne State College, is from O'Neill, Neb., where she was active in Assembly No. 31 Order of Rainbow Girls. She has served the assembly twice as Worthy Advisor. She is a member of the Grand Cross of Color and participated for two years in the initiation ceremony at Grand Assembly. She served as Grand Representative to Virginia and Massachusetts and as Grand Immortality in 1982–83. She received her Majority at Grand Assembly in 1983, and she was a recipient of the Grand Lodge Scholarship in 1981.

BRIEF HISTORY OF MASONIC RESEARCH GROUPS IN NEBRASKA

LYNN ALEXANDER

On December 30, 1980, four Master Masons met at the Home of Brother J. Eugene P. Jorgenson in Lincoln, Nebraska for the purpose of discussing the state of Masonic research in Nebraska. The brothers at that meeting were Worshipful Brother William G. Hurst, Brother Lynn Alexander, Brother J. Eugene P. Jorgensen, and Worshipful Brother Maynard Tatelman. All the brothers at that meeting were concerned that there was no Masonic Research organization in Nebraska. The history of Masonry in the jurisdiction parallels the settlement of the territory, and is intimately intertwined with the history of the State of Nebraska. The Brothers knew that all the lodges in Nebraska had rich heritage and it was largely unrecorded. Artifacts of Masonic history were stored in closets and attics around the state. No program existed for the preservation and collection of that history. Noting that most Masonic jurisdictions around the world had organizations dedicated to Masonic research and history, the brothers at that meeting resolved to form the first Nebraska Masonic research organization.

The brethren immediately began to work on the project. At the second meeting on February 17, 1981, Articles of Association were adopted. The organization would be called The Nebraska Society for Masonic Research. Its first objective would be to collect the history of Freemasonry in Nebraska. The collection would include artifacts and documents as well as books and scholarly papers on Freemasonry in general. All of this work would be shared with Freemasons in the hope that it would increase the love and appreciation of Freemasonry. The Society then made a formal request of the Grand Master that the organization be allowed to use the word "Ma-

sonic" in its title. Not only did the Grand Master approve, but he invited the Society to make a report at the next Annual Communication, and authorized the Society to solicit membership within the jurisdiction.

The Society grew steadily in membership and attracted the attention of Masons in other jurisdictions. Within a short time, membership included Masons from six other jurisdictions in the United States, and four Masons from foreign countries. One of the first activities of the Society was to assist lodges in performing Table Lodges. This activity generated considerable interest, and the Society was soon invited to participate in Table Lodges around the State. The Society received recognition from the Internal Revenue Service as a non-profit educational and historical Society. Thereafter many Masons and families of Masons began to donate artifacts of a Masonic character. The Society collection soon grew to several hundred items.

As the Society grew, it became apparrnt to the members that there was a need for a formal Masonic Research Lodge in Nebraska. Such a Lodge would be recognized world-wide. The problem however, was that the Grand Lodge Bylaws did not appear to accomodate a special purpose lodge which is what a Lodge of Research would be. The members of the Society researched the matter and corresponded with Research Lodges in other jurisdictions to inquire how they were organized under the Law. After considerable work on the problem, the Society made a proposal for amendment to the Grand Bylaws to the Grand Master. Ultimately the Grand Lodge adopted the amendment, and the lawful number of Master Masons then petitioned the Grand Master for a Dispensation to form the first Lodge of Research in Nebraska.

On July 23, 1984, Grand Master Robert Metcalf delivered a Dispensation for Roscoe Pound Lodge of Research U.D. to B. Lynn Alexander, Secretary of the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research, and of Roscoe Pound Lodge of Research U.D. The dream of establishing Masonic Research in Nebraska was realized. On June 14, 1985, Grand Master Metcalf signed the Charter for Roscoe Pound Lodge of Research No. 329.

Today the two organizations work hand-in-hand to promote Masonic Research, and preserve the history of Freemasonry in Nebraska. The Nebraska Society for Masonic Research continues to be a tax deductible organization and as such is unique among Masonic research organizations in America. The Society and the Lodge work closely with the Grand Lodge in restoring, preserving, and cateloging in the Grand Lodge Archives. This project was especially important during the recent past, when the Grand Lodge moved to Lincoln. When it was time for the move, the Society and the Lodge were able to assist the Grand Lodge in storing and moving the hundreds of historical documents, books, and archives. Membership in either or both of the organizations is open to all Master Masons, a newsletter is published for all members which includes information extracted from other Masonic Publications around the world. The Lodge corresponds with Masonic research organizations in nearly every state, as well as England, Japan, Italy, Denmark, and Germany. Portions of the collection of artifacts is on

display at East Lincoln Lodge 210 in Lincoln. The Society also assembles a traveling display which is shown at various special events around the state during the year. Interested Masons are invited to contact the Secretary, Lynn Alexander at 3701 "0" Street, Suite B-2, Lincoln, NE 68510.

THE ROLL OF DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren, these together with Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

French did hold special meetings to examine and instruct brethren who were willing to become "assistants" in the work. Thirteen brethren were nominated and approved for appointment as assistants. After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians." In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians." The following brethren appeared in the records as "assistant custodians" or at times as "Deputy Custodians".

Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A. '.L.'.) "In the year of Light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A. L.) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. Dep.:) "In the year of the Deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A.'.O.'.) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A. Beo.) "In the year of the Blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. `.M. `.) "In the year of the World."

RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons — Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1985 and 4,000 - 5985.

Royal Arch Masons — Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1985 and 530 — 2515

Royal and Select Masters — Add 1,000 year to current year, thus: 1985 and 1,000-2985.

Knights Templar — From the Christian era take 1,118; thus: 1,118 from 1985 - 867.

Order of High Priesthood - To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1985 - 3898.

Scottish Rite - Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1985 and 3,760 - 5745.
