



BIOGRAPHICAL

M.'.W.'. Charles W. Amidon, the 120th Grand Master of Masons of Nebraska, was born on June 5, 1925 at Omaha, Nebraska, the son of Walter M. and Majorie M. Amidon. He graduated from South High School and attended the old University of Omaha during the closing years of World War II.

On May 21, 1950 he was united in marriage to Barbara Jean McAuley of Omaha. The family consists of their daughters Marcia Lea and her husband, Brother John Stanner of Omaha, Carol Jean and her husband, Brother Geoff Brown of Omaha, Cherie Jo and her husband, Perry Anderson of Phoenix, Arizona and son, Brother Mark Charles Amidon of Omaha and his wife, Janice. They have six grandchildren.

Brother Amidon spent more than twenty-five years in the sheet metal contracting business with Olson Brothers, Inc., and The Waldinger Corp., both of Omaha. In 1971, he left this business rather than move from Omaha to Des Moines, Iowa. Having served on the Board of Directors of The Omaha Home for Boys since 1969, he joined the Home in 1973 as Assistant Executive Director and was appointed Executive Director in January of 1976, a position he currently holds.

He has been active in the First United Methodist Church in Omaha having taught the Bethel Bible Series and serving as President of the Board of Trustees and co-chairman of past annual pledge drives. For many years he was a member of the church choir.

He is currently 1st Vice President of the National Fellowship of Child Care Executives and a Trustee of Bishop Clarkson Hospital. A blood donor since 1951, he has passed the sixteen gallon mark and going strong.

In 1980, he earned his private pilot's license which he uses strictly for pleasure and an occasional trip outstate.

MASONIC HISTORY

Brother Amidon was initiated April 11, 1949, passed May 16, 1949 and raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on June 20, 1949 at Florence Lodge No. 281 A. F. & A. M. in Omaha, Nebraska. He served as Worshipful Master in 1967.

Brother Amidon is also an active member of the Scottish Rite Valley of Omaha where he serves as Class Director and a member of the Cathedral Board. In 1977, he was elected Knight Commander of the Court of Honor and was coroneted 33° Inspector General Honorary in December of 1981. He is a member of Florence Chapter No. 61, Royal Arch Masons; Council No. 1 Cryptic Masons; Mount Calvary Commandery No. 1, K.T.; Owaissa Chapter No. 296 Order of Eastern Star; Tangier Temple A.A.O.N.M.S.; Court No. 19 Royal Order of Jesters. In 1981, he served as Venerable Master Omaha Lodge of Perfection and is a Past President of the Omaha Masters and Wardens Club. A Charter member of the Proficient Past Masters Shrine Club, he also served as Secretary and President. He has held proficiency card No. 1 for the past three years having received his original proficiency card in 1960. During 1983, he was designated a DeMolay Honorary Legion of Honor recipient. A member of National Sojourners Joseph Warren Camp No. 19 where he also holds membership in the "Heroes of '76".

Having served as Chairman of the Grand Lodge Membership Committee, he has been instrumental in organizing and promoting ''Friendship Nights'' throughout the jurisdiction. In conjunction with this Committee, he has chaired the voluntary Masonic Promotion Committee responsible for soliciting and administering contributions from the various Masonic Bodies which support this vital program.

M. '.W.'. Brother Amidon says Masonry has been a guiding light to him for over thirty-six years and it has directed his life pattern in every important decision. As retirement draws near, he plans to devote even more of his time furthering the Fraternity in any way possible.





A workshop for Masters and Wardens and delegates was held Thursday afternoon, beginning at 1:00 P.M. The workshop was conducted by the Grand Lodge officers who made up the Education Committee. The subjects of discussion were the resolutions proposed from the floor the previous year, and the recommendations of the Grand Master to be brought before the delegates on June 13, the first day of the Communication.

At the same time the Jurisprudence Committee met in another area of the Inn to discuss the resolutions and recommendations.

On Thursday evening busses transported the delegates and their ladies to the Cooper Farm campus of the Omaha Home for Boys for a barbecue. At the same time a dinner was being held for the visiting dignitaries, the Past Grand Masters and their ladies.

The Friday morning meeting was opened by officers of the Florence Lodge No. 281, parent lodge of the Grand Master. The Grand Master was received, a quorum was ascertained by the Grand Secretary and the 129th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons was declared opened in due and ancient form.



GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND LODGE, ANCIENT, FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA:

My Brethren:

One hundred and twenty-nine years ago, Most Worshipful Robert Carrel Jordan became the first Grand Master of the Nebraska Grand Lodge and since that time one hundred and twenty Grand Masters have followed in his footsteps. As number one hundred and twenty, it is my distinct honor and pleasure to welcome our Past Grand Masters, Distinguished Guests, Voting Delegates and all Master Masons to this 129th Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, A. T. E. & A. M. of Nebraska.

As most of you know, M. . W. . Robert A. Metcalf and I are the first Grand Masters to serve more than the normal 12 months for many, many years. At the Annual Communication in 1984, the installation date for Grand Lodge officers was moved to the month of December to provide for two important functions: (1), to give the incoming Grand Master the time following his election to prepare for his term of office, and (2), to synchronize the Grand Master's term of office with those of the subordinate lodges throughout the state. Although this has not presented any major problems or surprises it has brought about a few minor changes, particularly the necessity of future Grand Masters having to prepare two annual reports on his activities. Therefore, this report will cover my activities from October 12, 1985 to the present. In June of 1987, I will be submitting a supplemental report covering activities which will occur between now and the end of my term in December.

The life of a Grand Master is filled with all of the emotions from exhilaration to despair; excitement to boredom during those long auto trips across the vast expanse of this state; frustration to the joy of accomplishment; joy in witnessing the accomplishments of friends to sadness when adversity strikes down a brother; disappointment when seemingly well thought out plans meet with objections to the thrill of success when doubtful endeavors reach fruition.

But a Grand Master should not expect to meet with success at every turn. Differences of opinion are what horse races are all about. A Grand Master is not (as some would have you believe) omnipotent. He is merely a brother of the Craft who has been temporarily elevated to a position of great honor by his fellows. Hopefully, the years of experience in attaining that high position have provided him with some sense of responsibility toward the craft and have prepared him in some small way to do the best he can with the knowledge that many, many good brethren are ready and willing to assist in any way possible.

I will always be grateful to M. W. Byron C. Jenkins for that day which seemed so many years ago, when he informed me of his intention to appoint me in line as Grand Junior Deacon. Little did I know of the vast and wonderful world he had opened up for me, nor the tremendous change he had wrought in my Masonic and personal life. Jean and I will never forget the friendship and guidance provided to us both by our dear friends, By and Helen. God bless each of them.

Those of you who have had an opportunity to read Worshipful Ed Cummings' 1986 Evaluation Report on Nebraska Masonry will not be surprised by what I am about to say. Those of you who have not read it should do so as soon as possible.

I'm usually not one to take a negative outlook on most subjects but when it comes to the future of Masonry in this country, I am reminded of the southern highway patrolman's advice, "You're in a heap of trouble, boy." I have been preaching about the decline in membership in my travels throughout the state as far back as 1980 and my fears are doing nothing but multiplying. In that short space of time our total membership has declined from 33,146 to approximately 28,000, and I am correcting that figure this morning to 27,100. A loss of more than 5,000, 6,000 now, or a decrease of 15% to 16% in just those five years.

According to projections, the approximately 224 Lodges in the state, and that has been

reduced since I wrote this, will be reduced to about 60 Lodges located in about 14 locations within the next 15 years. I discussed this with Frank Mattoon, one of the members of the Lodge Advisory Committee and it's getting to be a serious problem throughout the state the consolidation of Lodges.

By the end of the next decade, the year 2000, we will have a total membership of about 9,000 members in the State of Nebraska. By the year 2010 this will be further reduced to only 2,000 members. Within 15 years the Scottish Rite Cathedrals in Alliance and Hastings will close. There is no reason to believe that the York Rite bodies are not facing a similar fate.

Based on what is and has been occurring in my short Masonic lifetime, I have no reason to doubt Brother Ed's projections nor should any of you. No wonder we are in trouble, I don't have enough fingers and toes to count those Lodges which have not raised a Master Mason in the last 10 years. The rate of consolidations is gaining speed with every passing year. From a purely economical standpoint, you can see what this is doing to the finances of each subordinate Lodge as well as the Grand Lodge. The dues to support your Lodge's activities are constantly shrinking in spite of your individual efforts to increase your dues. Each loss of 1,000 members, which is the current rate per year, means a loss of \$5,000 to the Grand Lodge and \$2,000 to the Masonic Home at Plattsmouth which has the effect of reducing the services each of these organizations can provide for Nebraska Masons. We are all reaching the point of diminishing returns. Further dues increases just to stay even are not the answer. Then what must be done? Maybe we should all get up, get on our feet, and get going. The practices of Masonry must change if we are to survive. To sit back and believe that Masonry will somehow survive by following the status quo is no longer good enough. To do so is simply sticking our heads in the sand and hoping that some divine providence will rescue us. This is an easy position for those in the 60's and over age bracket to take. We won't be around long enough to see the effects of our indifference anyway. We can sit back and let the younger members worry about solving the problem. Unfortunately, there are no or very few younger members. The average age of a Mason today in the State of Nebraska is close to 65 years of age. If you don't believe me, go home and check your records and run a survey on your own Lodge's membership.

The Grand Lodge and the three major subordinate bodies, consisting of the York Rite, Scottish Rite and Shrine, have been subsidizing Friendship Dinners for more than eight years. Yet, only about 15% of the Lodges have ever taken advantage of this successful program. Then why? Here are some of the reasons I have come up with:

- (1) They don't work
- (2) We don't have any prospects in our town
- (3) We tried one once and nobody came
- (4) They're too much work
- (5) Dinners of this type are solicitation
- (6) Our Master isn't interested
- (7) Nobody is available in our Lodge to do it
- (8) If we did get some candidates, we don't know how to confer degrees anyway Brethren, there is going to be a change whether you want one or not. We have only two choices:
 - (1) Do nothing and watch ourselves go down the drain
 - (2) Institute some positive changes and reverse this devastating slide to extinction.

I think I know what your choice will be. All right, what can we do for starters? For one thing, we have to get over this archaic notion that Masonry is a taboo subject when in the company of a non-mason. If we believe so strongly in our Fraternity, then why are we so reluctant to talk about it on every available occasion? I would ask for a show of hands of those who have even once in their Masonic lifetime signed a petition for a candidate, but I won't do it and embarrass 90% of those in attendance today. Ways exist to discuss Masonry if each of us will but try.

(1) What's wrong with asking a friend if he has ever considered Masonry and advising him that he must ask to join. He probably never knew that!

(2) What's wrong with telling your friend how much you enjoy your Lodge and the fellowship connected with it.

(3) If you don't want to bring up the subject, what's wrong with your wife doing it for you.

Friendship Dinners do work and 50% of the Lodges represented today can give you ample proof if you need it. Yes, they take a lot of work. But what else is new in getting any worthwhile job done.

With the tremendous demand on everyone's time in this day and age, a way must be found to reduce the necessity of a candidate spending an inordinate amount of time learning redundant ritual which will be forgotten long before the ink is dry on his due's card. Argue with me if you will, but I am willing to bet that not one delegate in 50 sitting here today could pass an examination on the questions and answers without making a dozen or more mistakes. In response to this situation, I will be making a recommendation that the future proficiency examination be shortened to include only the obligations of the three degrees. You will find the requirements for proficiency under Section 2-402 are left up to the Master of the Lodge. Proficiency is not defined in the law book. Nothing is stated concerning what should be included in the examination. An interesting point for your consideration.

At the close of the Supreme Council meeting of the Scottish Rite held in Washington, D.C. last October, the retiring Grand Commander suggested that maybe Masonry in the United States should take a good look at the procedure currently in use in England, which, after all, is our Mother Lodge, from which all of our Lodges have evolved. By its law, a prospective candidate may be outright asked to join with a onetime follow-up if necessary. I am aware that this cannot currently be done in this country but surprisingly, it has been seriously discussed at the Annual Grand Masters' Conference for at least the last two years. Maybe the time is near when the subject will move from discussion to action. I personally believe we may be running out of time. So, Brethren, let's all decide right now to get up, get on our feet, and get going. Thank you.

NECROLOGY

My brethren, again this year a great number of our dear friends and brothers have been called by the Grand Architect to that house not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens. Let us be comforted by the reflection that their memories will not be forgotten.

Later in the Session proper tribute will be paid to our departed brethren by the Committee on Fraternal Dead.

CORNERSTONES

So far this Masonic Year, the Grand Lodge has laid only one cornerstone, but it was of particular interest to the Grand Master. On October 12, 1985, the Grand Lodge officers were installed at the Scottish Rite Cathedral in Omaha, Nebraska and the same evening, they, along with several Past Grand Masters and visiting dignitaries, together with the Board of Trustees of The Omaha Home for Boys, celebrated the Home's 65th Anniversary with a banquet at Peony Park in Omaha. The next day, Sunday, October 13, 1985, we had the privilege of laying the cornerstone of a new cottage for twelve boys. In my capacity as Executive Director of the Home, it was a double pleasure and a day that will long live in my accumulation of great memories associated with the Craft.

CONSOLIDATIONS

Several consolidations have, unfortunately, been applied for since our last communication and those which I approved are as follows:

Ponca Lodge No. 101 with Alpha Lodge No. 316. Curtis Lodge No. 168 with McCook Lodge No. 135. Siloam Lodge No. 147 with Atkinson Lodge No. 164. Clay Centre Lodge No. 139 with Mid West Lodge No. 317.

At least two other consolidations are pending at this time and efforts are being made to discourage this ever increasing dilution of our Masonic Lodge roster. It is apparent that this problem is the direct result of the steadily increasing rate of deaths, suspensions for non-payment of dues and the biggest problem of all — lack of new members. Without an effort to interest younger, more vibrant leadership, we will continue to reap the harvest of our indifference and apathy with disastrous results.

GRAND LODGE AREA EDUCATIONAL MEETINGS

Jobs Daughter installation — Omaha

During the months of February, March and April, approximately 30 area meetings were held throughout the state. Each lodge received a personal invitation to attend these work sessions and with few exceptions, attendance was extremely good. The Grand Lodge officers assigned to these meetings reported they were met with great enthusiasm and appreciation for offering a chance for each lodge to express opinions on topics of mutual interest to all.

PERMISSION TO MOVE CHARTERS

The following lodges were granted permission to move their charters during the year for reasons stated:

Florence 281 for purposes of Grand Lodge Installation Miloma 328 to Papillion 39 for officer installation Beaver City 93 to move the lodge room to the first floor to conserve heating costs during winter months, with the provision that it be properly tiled.

Frank Welch 75 to move to their new temple building.

MEMBERSHIP PIN PRESENTATIONS

MASONIC HOMES

Nowhere does the charitable work of our fraternity shine brighter than through our Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth and the Masonic Eastern Star Home at Fremont. These two fine homes, under the capable leadership of Brothers Ray Evers and W. Ben Harvey are an inspiration to all Masons, and rightly so. Whatever our individual mandatory and voluntary contributions may be, they pale into insignificance compared to the dedication of the staffs of these two fine homes.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS

Since last October, I appointed only one trial commission and as yet, no finding has been returned.

Two other possible complaints are pending.

SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS

Since October, dispensations were granted to four lodges to confer degrees without regard to time for good and sufficient reasons. Fees were waived in all but one instance. Due to the extremely adverse weather conditions last winter, permission was granted to five lodges to hold their annual election of officers at a date other than their regular December business meetings.

GENERAL CONSENTS AND APPROVALS

Pending approval of the Grand Master of South Dakota, consent and approval was granted Fremont Lodge No. 15 to host South Dakota Lodges St. John's No. 1 and St. Andrew's No. 208, both of Yankton, to visit Fremont No. 15 for the purpose of conferring a Master Mason's degree on a South Dakota candidate using South Dakota work.

DECISIONS

1. I received a letter from Capitol Lodge No. 3 pointing out that a brother had inadvertently been elected to the office of Junior Warden and appointed Senior Deacon without ever having been examined as to proficiency in the Master's Degree as required by Section 2-302. It was obvious this oversight was made in all innocence and was immediately corrected by the brother passing a suitably proficient examination upon discovery of the error. For the good of the order, I ruled the record healed, but admonished the officers to be more diligent in observing the by-laws in the future.

- 2. North Star Lodge No. 227 had a problem wherein a brother was refusing to take an examination in the Master's Degree due to a personality clash. I ruled the brother had three choices: (1) Take the examination in No. 227; (2) Have another lodge examine him as a courtesy, but this would require permission of No. 227 before allowable; (3) Have the Grand Master waive the provisions of Section 2-402 for "good cause", a condition which I felt did not exist. To prevent the provisions of Section 2-304 REFUSING EXAMINATION to come into play, I strongly recommended choice No. 1.
- 3. Nebraska No. 1 received a request to prefer charges against a brother for conduct unbecoming a Mason. The 1985 Master refused to accept the charges as did the newly installed 1986 Master. I ruled the Grand Master could not interfere with the workings within a Lodge as long as the by-laws were adhered to under Sections 3-203 and 3-303. The brother who filed the original complaint appealed to me to override the decision of the two Masters. In response to this, I ruled he had already made his appeal and I would not rescind my decision in the case until the present Master chose to file a formal charge.
- 4. A brother residing in Texas inquired about placing his mother in the Nebraska Masonic Home. A question arose in which state his current membership was held. Lacking proof of this, I ruled his mother was not eligible until such time as the brother could provide proof of membership in a Nebraska Lodge.
- 5. Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 requested permission to suspend lodge on the night of December 24, 1985. According to the Secretary's Book, No. 32 is listed as holding regular Meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays. I ruled on the second Tuesday and the meeting held on the fourth Tuesday was considered a Special Communication, I would grant their request although no dispensation would be required from the Grand Master if that was the case.
- 6. In 1985, Gothenburg Lodge No. 249 requested permission to consolidate with Platte View No. 32. Permission was denied by the 1984-1985 Grand Master pending a thorough investigation of the reasons why. The request was again made in 1986 after all necessary procedures as outlined in the by-laws had been complied with. A personal visit to Gothenburg was made by the Grand Master in company with a member of the Lodge Advisory Committee following a 2 to 1 rejection of the request by the Committee. The favorable vote also was reluctantly given. My firm belief being that this Lodge is still capable of being salvaged over the objections of the current officers, I have tabled the issue for further study and recommendation.
- 7. Falls City Lodge No. 9, having been involved in a lawsuit last year, requested permission to purchase a building which could be remodeled into a replacement temple. A visit was made to Nebraska City by the Grand Master, along with a member of the Temple Advisory Committee to inspect the proposed purchase. Suggestions were made to the Lodge on possible renovation, but I advised the Lodge not to proceed until all aspects of the recent lawsuit were put to rest. Following this, any proposed purchase and or renovation would be subject to approval by the Temple Advisory Committee before proceeding.

RECOMMENDATONS

I

Having received input from almost every Lodge during the Area Educational Meetings conducted throughout the state in the spring of 1986, it is my firm belief

that a majority of the Lodges are truly, and rightfully so, now of the opinion that a "Key" or "Cipher" has earned its place in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska as it has in so many jurisdictions throughout the United States without diluting and/or prostituting the ritualistic and proficiency phases of our work. It has been said that use of a "Key" will negate the important work of the Deputy Grand Custodians. In my opinion it will do just the opposite. By use of a "Key", their importance will become more pronounced in verifying the proper wording and allow remotely located lodges the advantage of learning the ritual when a qualified instructor is not available.

It is therefore my recommendation that the following amendment to the Grand Lodge By-Laws be approved: That Section 3-102 (g) be deleted in its entirety.

That the following be added to Section 1-314 — NEBRASKA WORK:

- 1. The Committee shall advise the Grand Master as to the corrections needed to be made to the cipher presently published by Allen Publishing Company of New York so as to conform to the work authorized in the Nebraska Jurisdiction; that the only authorized cipher shall be edited and published by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and that the cipher shall be separate from and not replace the Monitor and ceremonies for Nebraska.
- 2. Every Master Mason may purchase the authorized cipher from the Grand Lodge of Nebraska through the Secretary of each subordinate lodge.
- The Grand Lodge shall prepare separate ciphers of the Questions and Answers for each degree for use by the candidates in preparing for their proficiency examinations in each degree.
- 4. The cipher shall not be used or permitted in any open lodge.
- 5. In the event a cipher is used in an open lodge, that lodge shall be subject to a reprimand by the Grand Master. On the second offense during the same Masonic year as the occurrence of the first offense, the Grand Master or such persons as designated by him, shall convene a hearing with the officers of said lodge for the purpose of determining whether the charter of that lodge should be arrested until the next regular communication of the Grand Lodge. On both the first and second offense, notification of the imposition of the penalty against a lodge shall be given to all subordinate lodges.
- 6. With the availability of an authorized cipher, the installed officers of each subordinate lodge shall demonstrate to the Grand Custodian within ninety (90) days of their installation that they can open and close each degree in a proficient manner. In the event the Grand Custodian cannot certify that a lodge is proficient in opening and closing each degree, then the Grand Master shall arrest its charter; provided, that the Grand Master for good cause shown may extend the time, but not longer than the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

H

With rising cost of liability insurance premiums, it is apparent the present limitations contained within the by-laws are unrealistic. If these limitations are carried out to the letter, the Grand Lodge is faced with two alternatives. (1) ignore the law and continue to purchase insurance at the going rate; (2) Cancel all coverage because it is not available at the maximum allowable rate.

To alleviate this problem, I recommend the following by-laws amendments: Section 1-201.02 — COMPREHENSIVE PUBLIC LIABILITY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE INSURANCE.

DELETE: "The cost of such insurance shall not exceed eleven cents per member per year, and"

Section 2-311 — SURETY BOND

- DELETE: "Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Secretary the sum of 20 cents for each \$100.00 of"
- ADD: "Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the grand Secretary for"
- DELETE: "such payment not to exceed the rate of 20 cents for each \$100.00 or portion thereof of the face amount of such bond"

It is becoming more apparent with the passage of time that entirely too many Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Masons are being lost either through inability of the subordinate lodges to provide proper posting or the reluctance of candidates to spend the required time to learn the present esoteric Questions and Answers in their entirety. A cursory check of the reports submitted by the subordinate lodges will readily bear out this fact. In an attempt to alleviate this ever increasing problem, I recommend the following:

Section 2-402 — PROFICIENCY

- ADD: In the first sentence after the words proficient in, ADD, "the obligation of", so that the first sentence will read,
- "All those hereinafter initiated, passed, and raised, shall become proficient in the obligation of each degree, and shall give proof thereof by examination in open lodge."

If this recommendation is approved, it would in no way effect presentation of the First Section Lectures in each degree as presently contained in the Nebraska Work.

IV

In order to partially combat the negative criticism which is constantly being leveled at the Fraternity by various religious groups through ignorance and/or design, it is my recommendation that the following monitorial admonition be given to the candidate immediately prior to administering each of the three obligations:

"The obligation you are about to take, contains reference to certain physical penalties which are symbolic in nature and are intended only to impart the historical lessons of fidelity."

ROCK MAUL

To continue the tradition establish by M.W. Byron C. Jenkins, it is my intention to award the Rock Maul to that Lodge, which, in my opinion, demonstrated the highest degree of leadership, enthusiasm, fellowship, temple appearance, programs and general attitude toward the Fraternity.

DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS

At the recommendatin of our Grand Custodian, W.: Brother Jerry Rittenburg, I commissioned William Fogle of McCook Lodge #135; Roscoe Malick of Cotner Lodge #297 and R. Winton Wilson of Gavel Lodge #199 as Deputy Grand Custodians. I reappointed Robert Kyes of Lone Tree Lodge #36 and W. Dale Page of Fremont Lodge #15 to come out of retirement and help us out as Deputy Grand Custodians.

GRAND MASTERS' CONFERENCE

The Grand Masters' Conference of North America convened in Alexandria, Virginia, February 15-19, 1986. The main topic of discussion was the ever present problem of declining membership in the Fraternity. Several Jurisdictions have formed well organized committees with instructions to find an acceptable method of alleviating this situation as well as retaining candidates who have never gone any further than the Entered Apprentice Degree. Problems abounded, but realistic solutions are still a matter for each Jurisdiction to analyze individually.

CENTENNIALS

At the Grand Lodge Communication held in June of 1885, the following lodges were created and chartered and were therefore eligible to celebrate their 100th anniversary during the last year:

Scribner Lodge No. 132 at Scribner Solar Lodge No. 134 at Clarks McCook Lodge No. 135 at McCook Long Pine Lodge No. 136 at Long Pine Upright Lodge No. 137 at Burchard Rawalt Lodge No. 138 at Oxford Clay Centre Lodge No. 139 at Clay Center Western Lodge No. 140 at Western Crescent Lodge No. 143 at Primrose

STATE OF THE CRAFT

The state of the Craft is good, fair or indifferent, depending on the enthusiasm or lack of same throughout the state. In my travels I have visited lodges which are in excellent physical condition, yet leadership is sorely lacking and a pallor of gloom pervades every recess. Other lodges may not have spacious and beautiful surroundings, yet excitement is in the air and the spirit of brotherly love exudes from every corner. You can feel it! No one has to point it out.

Why the difference? Basically it boils down to leadership or unfortunately, the lack of leadership. Give me one good, qualified leader and all the problems

encountered by a lodge will pale into insignificance.

Here and there you will find pockets of encouragement. Some lodges have realized their future lies in attracting and elevating good, young candidates and they have the foresight to put them to work immediately instead of relegating them to a position on the sidelines until such time as they "prove" themselves. Such lodges are leading the way in solving one important problem of retaining and training leadership. These lodges will not only survive... they will be in the forefront and maintain the traditions of our most important Fraternity. They will be our salvation.

APPRECIATION

Thanking people is something I like to do but at the same time, when you are indebted to so many friends it becomes an impossible task to remember them all. At the risk of omitting someone special, I would like to mention a few who have made the last six years so memorable.

Of course, nothing would have been possible without the confidence of M.W. Byron Jenkins in appointing me as Grand Junior Deacon during his year. I hope I didn't disappoint him.

To Florence Lodge No. 281, I owe a debt of gratitude for allowing me to serve as its Master in 1967 and then doing me the honor of opening lodge for the Grand Lodge Officers installation and also this session of the Grand Lodge Communication.

And then there were those Past Grand Masters who gave so willingly of their expertise whenever called upon; especially M.W. Herbert A. Ronin who took me under his wing and guided me with his compassionate wisdom.

No Grand Master could operate without the cooperation, support and advice of the Grand Lodge Officers. When each one knows and does his job, it makes serving a pleasure! Thanks to all of you for being such dedicated servants to the Craft.

No master of a Lodge, and especially a Grand Master could possibly have given so much time to the Fraternity without the complete support and backing of an understanding mate. Thirty-seven years ago, I joined the Masonic order. Thirty-six years ago last month, Jean joined me in marriage. During the passing years she has been by my side to give words of advice and encouragement during trying times and has always supported every Masonic endeavor with which I became involved. Thank you, Jean, for allowing me this honor.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

The position of being Grand Secretary to the Lodge Secretaries of Nebraska, and to the Grand Secretaries of other Jurisdictions, has been an interesting challenge, sometimes exhilerating and sometimes very trying. The planning, organizing and developing of the work of the Secretaries has been enjoyable, and the co-operation of the many good Secretaries is sincerely appreciated.

The Pamphlet FREEMASONRY was developed and printed to explain and to help create interest in Masonry. It is a tool. It is being widely used by our Blue Lodges, the York and Scottish Rites, and the Shrine for promotion purposes.

The Secretary's Guide Book made available to all lodge secretaries was a good experience in preparation, with assistance of several lodge secretaries, and has met with good response. The Guide Book was intended to make the duties of the lodge secretary more understandable, to simplify and improve record keeping and reporting, and to assist new secretaries to replace older secretaries who wished to retire. There are still improvements to be made and will be forthcoming as old supplies are used up and new forms developed.

The Roscoe Pound Lodge of Research was chartered on June 14, 1986 at the 1985 Grand Lodge Communication. This lodge does not initiate, pass and raise candidates.

Ponca Lodge No. 101 at Ponca consolidated with Alpha Lodge No. 316 at South Sioux City.

Curtis Lodge No. 168 of Curtis consolidated with McCook Lodge No. 135 of McCook. January 14, 1986.

Clay Centre Lodge No. 139 of Clay Center consolidated with Mid West Lodge No. 317 of Hastings. March 5, 1986.

Pending consolidations include Faith Lodge No. 181 of Crawford with Sioux Lodge No. 277 of Harrison; and Gibbon Lodge No. 189 of Gibbon with Cement Lodge No. 211 of Wood River.

COMMENTS:

Grand Lodge:

Even though revenues were down almost \$23,500.00 for fiscal 1986, expenses were down even more, so that instead of 1985's deficit of \$22,739.00, there was a \$20,555.00 excess of revenues over expenses this year. Revenues were about as expected with investment income down 8% due to lower short-term interest rates and lower average investment. Dues received were down 10% which unfortunately reflects continuing decline of membership. Expensewise, the most noteworthy changes were the decreases in computer expense (unusually high in 1985) and Grand Secretary's salary. Comprehensive liability insurance showed an exceptionally large increase.

Restricted Funds:

The Emick Scholarship Fund again provided four \$1,000.00 scholarships this year.

The Stephen C. Houghton Trust made an additional \$80,000.00 payment to this Fund in 1986. These monies are given the Grand Lodge for the purpose of funding the care, maintenance, and education of orphan children. The monies are invested in short-term obligations and as of April 30, 1986, the fund totaled \$96,528.00. To date, none of these funds have been disbursed.

Nebraska Masonic Home:

Home Operating Expenses were up 8.9% and totaled \$1,429.843.00.

Home Revenues before transfers from the Endowment Fund were down \$146,173.00 largely due to decrease of "Donations upon admittance."

Home Operating Deficit was \$620,980.00 and was again covered by transfers from the Endowment Fund.

Endowment Fund Investment Income was up 14.5% and the Endowment Fund Equity was up 7.7%.

To The Most Worshipful, The Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Brethren:

The responsibilities of this Committee are set forth in Sectin 1-318 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws. Specifically, we are to monitor proper accountability of funds received and disbursed by the Grand Lodge. A copy of this report is not included in the handouts you received at the time of registration because this committee feels that a proper execution of our report could not be effected until completion of the outside audit of the books of Grand Lodge by the accounting firm engaged by the Grand Trustees to perform such audit. That audit has now been completed and a preliminary working copy of their report is in the hands of the Grand Trustees. I refer you to the report of the Grand Trustees for more detailed financial data.

This has been a particularly trying year for the Grand Lodge Office Staff in coping with the move of the office coupled with the myriad of problems encountered in attempting to establish a workable accounting package within the framework of our computer system. It is indeed gratifying to be able to report to you that through the timeless efforts of all involved an accurate and useful system was in place — and in balance — before the close of the Fiscal Year. It is our understanding that our new accounting system has greatly facilitated the completion of the annual audit by our outside auditors.

It is particularly noteworthy that the Grand Lodge Funds have been managed this past year in such a manner that we had an EXCESS of revenues (income) over disbursements (expenses) of some \$20,555! This fact, in contrast to the immediate preceding year wherein we had a deficit of \$22,739.00 should indicate to you that management of your funds has been prudent.

The committee wishes to recognize and express our appreciation to the Grand Lodge Office Staff consisting of Jerry Sharp and Shelley Fey for the exemplary performance of their duties under most trying circumstances.

FINAL REPORT OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

JOHN D. VerMAAS

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, and Brethren:

The Appropriations Committee transmits this Preliminary Report of Appropriations for the 1986-87 year for your consideration. Some explanatory remarks will be made at the time of presentation regarding the reformating of the report to tie it to the account listing adopted by the Grand Lodge at the time it put its accounts on the computer.

Expenditures for 1985-86 fiscal year were \$329,869.00 which were \$14,826.40 below the budget approved by Grand Lodge last year in the amount of \$344,695.40. This is a percentage amount of 4.3 below budget. These figures are prior to audit.

The suggested appropriation of \$334,360.00 for the 1986-87 year is \$4,491.00 more than the amount expended during 1985-86. This is a percentage amount of 1.36.

The committee wishes to thank those committee chairmen who took the time to respond in writing to our request for appropriations for this year. This information is necessary in order to assemble an accurate listing of financial needs for the operation of the Grand Lodge.

At the committee meeting on May 13th at the Grand Lodge office the top three officers of the Grand Lodge met with the members of the Appropriations Committee in order to assemble the budget for the upcoming year. We want to thank them for their investment in time on behalf of the Grand Lodge and to recommend to future appropriation committees that this custom be followed in subsequent years. Amounts being appropriated can more adequately be established to fund programs proposed.

NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME PLATTSMOUTH, NE

M. W. HARRY A. SPENCER

Once again it is my privilege to appear before you to render an accounting of the stewardship of the Trustees of your Masonic Home at Plattsmouth, Nebraska. While I appear here in my capacity as President of the Nebraska Masonic Home, I am making this report on behalf of all of our fifteen trustees. They are a talented and dedicated group and deserve your commendation for their uncompensated devotion to their task. I am very grateful to them. Our attendance at Board meetings has improved to the extent that I consider it as good as we have any right to expect.

One of the major developments during the year was the move June 1, 1985 of the Grand Lodge office from Omaha to Lincoln. I appointed a Committee to study the feasibility of moving our office to Plattsmouth rather than following the Grand Lodge office to Lincoln. They recommended we continue our operation in conjunction with the Grand Lodge office. This was approved by the Board of Trustees so there has been no change in our operations except that our operations have been made more functional and, we hope, more efficient.

The Nebraska Masonic Home constantly monitors the quality and nature of the services provided by the Home to insure that our Home is responsive to the changing needs of Nebraska Masons and their families. In furtherance of this objective, the Board of Trustees made a major decision to accept a recommendation of our Long Range Planning Committee to start planning to upgrade our infirmary. With the consent of the Grand Masters, we contracted with the firm of Peat, Marwick & Mitchell to provide strategic planning assistance to us. This is a study to determine the demand and need for the home services, what services we should be providing, the quality of the services we want, the current condition of the Home facilities and their suitability for current or other possible services. This study should be available for us shortly after this Grand Lodge session.

One of our problems during the year was our Session with the County Board of Equalization at Plattsmouth, Nebraska. The Board reviewed the tax exempt status of our property and continued the tax exemption for the Home and the Home grounds. They denied us tax exemption, however, for the home maintained for the Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent, as well as the lots we have across the street from the Home, to protect its environs. That property was put on the tax rolls and, after personally reviewing the situation, I can tell you that it belongs on the tax rolls.

The major improvement to the Home during the past year was the modernization of our dining room by dropping the ceilings and installing new lights. This modernization was completed in December.

Our budget for the 1986-1987 Masonic year will be \$1,387,700.00. This is approximately \$35,000 more than our last year's budget. Every Nebraska

Mason contributes \$2.00 through his dues to the support of the Home. With approximately 28,500 members of the fraternity, this entire contribution amounts to \$55,000. This is less than four percent of our budget. No other Grand Lodge funds are used in the operation of the Home. This means your Trustees are required to raise approximately \$1,320,000.00 from sources other than the Grand Lodge. Our Endowment Fund and the generosity of interested individuals through donations and Wills and bequests have permitted us to operate at our present level.

The donations to the Home of more than \$100.00 for this latter source during the current Masonic year, amounted to \$224,519.09. Our Seal Fund contributions totaled \$33,812.07. Please keep these contributions coming. They are urgently needed for the support of your Home.

One of the surprises from our Seal Fund letter was a check from Brother James A. Dishorn of Tucson, Arizona, for \$1,000.00 to start a fund for an addition of a wing to the Home for our infirmary. With this \$1,000.00 we established a Building Fund. We placed two contributions we received in December — one from the Ella H. Erway Estate of \$17,500.00, and one from the Mabel E. Nelson Estate of \$25,278.41 in this fund. This gave us a total of \$43,278.41 as of December 31, 1985, in our Building Fund.

There is no question we are going to be required to do something soon to modernize our infirmary facilities. Approximately 65 percent of those now in the Home are considered infirmary guests. So as not to be caught in the lurch, we must be prepared to meet this contingency in the not too distant future.

The Food Truck from central Nebraska arrived November 23, 1985. This year's contribution amounted to 450 cases of canned goods and some frozen vegetables, along with 100-pound sacks of sugar. The shipment weighed in at 20,000 pounds and was valued at \$10,000.00. This food represents contributions from several of our brethren as well as the lodges and Masonic organizations of Central Nebraska. We are indebted to Brother Adolph Schlaman of Ashlar Lodge #33 and his co-chairman, Brother Donald M. Peterson, for their leadership as well as the time and effort they donate to this very helpful project.

Brother Vincent Newquist of Wausau Lodge #251 and the family of Maliah McKnight donated wheelchairs to the Home. These were needed and we appreciate this thoughtfulness.

Brother and Mrs. Elbert Osborn who reside in an apartment at the Home presented us with a check for \$1,185.00 for the purchase of a new carpet cleaner. We are most grateful to them.

Brother Howard Quinn donated the cost of a centrifuge for the Nursing Department, in memory of his mother who was a former resident of the Home. We apprecite his generosity.

All of these various donations are very helpful to the Home. Each of them adds to the welfare and comfort of the residents and necessarily help us with our budget. We urge each of you to keep your Nebraska Masonic Home in the forefront of your charitable contributions. Any contribution you make

to the Home, particularly in the form of bequests in your Will, will continue the work of Masonry long after you have passed to your eternal reward.

We are grateful to all of the Lodges, Chapters, Councils, Commanderies, Masters and Wardens, Eastern Star Chapters, as well as the Omaha Scottish Rite and the Youth & Band Musical Groups, who have helped to make the year a pleasant and joyous one for the Home residents. I suggest you urge your friends to visit the Home if they have not done so. When they see the wonderful job being done by our Superintendent, Ray Evers, and his work force, I am sure they will be interested in helping with this outstanding program.

Speaking of our Superintendent, Worshipful Brother Raymond F. Evers, I remind you he will be happy to bring a program on the Home to any interested Lodge. He will show slides and sketch the progress made in the Home the past year.

During the first part of the Masonic Year, we were honored by the presence of our Deputy Grand Master, Right Worshipful Brother Wayne G. Luenenberg at our meetings. Since our Grand Lodge session, we have had the pleasure of having our Grand Senior Warden Right Worshipful Brother Paul R. Eveland meet with us. We have appreciated their presence and their advice. The presence of an elected Grand Lodge officer at our meetings as a liaison with the Grand Lodge is helpful to us and should be in the best interest of the Grand Lodge.

It has been a real pleasure to serve as President of the Home Board during the past year. I have never worked with a group any more conscientious than your present Trustees. They exemplify Masonic charity at its best. For everyone of them it is a labor of love which requires them to contribute of their substance as well as their time. I only wish our entire membership could really know the work these brethren render in their behalf.

In conclusion, brethren, I remind you the Nebraska Masonic Home is your home. We, as its trustees, only act as your representatives. To continue this great philanthropy, we need the cooperation and support of every Nebraska Mason. I urge you to visit and support your Home. You will find it to be a very satisfying experience.

MASONIC EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT — BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Nebraska is one of six states whose Masonic Charity is directed to the care of children and the only state in which a Children's Home is supported by both the Eastern Star and the Masons.

Charitable work in the area of children, no matter whose children they may be, is a proper outlet for our Masonic philanthropy.

Children in our society have more serious problems than ever before. What generation has ever had the high incidence of broken homes, influence by questionable TV programming, drugs, alcohol, a lowering of accepted moral standards with the resulting problems of abuse and other problems in which youth seem to be the main victims? We must continually be guided by that old adage which says "a good man is lost when a child goes bad." The future welfare of our society is obviously enhanced when we are able to take children from "crippled families" and through love and care point them on the pathway to becoming useful and productive citizens of the future.

The biggest frustration we have found over the years has been our inability, largely because of governmental policy, for our Home to focus on the problems of children and to be able to help. Partly because of the sheer size of the problem, and because of changes in our strategies we feel we are now bringing our resources to bear on the problem, and there are numbers of children that we can get and help.

This year has brought a great deal of satisfaction to our Board. We have tried some new ideas and they are working. The addition of a Child Care Supervisor has made a salutary improvement in our operation. We are doing a better job with each child because we have both the time and expertise to minister to their individual problems. This in turn means we are able to keep some children, that we might not have been able to before, and take some whose problems we previously might have not felt qualified to cope with.

The old saying that our Home could only be as good as the people we had employed to operate it proved to be correct. Last year I stated that we had the best personnel overall since I had been a member of the Board, and the performance this year bears out that observation. The net result is that things are going so well we are full in two houses and pushing our total capacity. In addition, we are doing a better job of meeting the overall needs of all of our children. The really exciting part of all of this is that we are making plans to refurbish and open the Senior Girls' Home that has stood vacant for sixteen years. If we proceed according to plan the house could be in line by one year from now and our Home could be living up to its full potential.

The Board has decided to embark on a new program of a supervised independent living training for certain selected seniors to make their transition from the structured, protected environment of our Home to the reality of the everyday world. If we haven't prepared a child to cope with life, we really haven't completed our mission.

After even this short glimpse into some of the happenings at our Home, I'm sure you can realize why it really is a privilege to serve on the Board, but remember that while not everyone can serve in this way, we can all help by our giving, our prayers, and our enthusiasm for this great and good work.

May I add my personal and special thanks to all of you who have helped in any way, to our Board for their unselfish commitment, and to all of the staff for their efforts that often go beyond what money can buy.

REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

The Committee met on Thursday, June 12, 1986, and reviewed the following decisions and recommendations of the Grand Master:

DECISIONS

- 1. I received a letter from Capitol Lodge No. 3 pointing out that a brother had inadvertently been elected to the office of Junior and Senior Warden without ever having been examined as to proficiency in the Master's Degree as required by Section 2-302. It was obvious this oversight was made in all innocence and was immediately corrected by the brother passing a suitable proficientcy examination upon discovery of the error. For the good of the order, I ruled the record healed, but admonished the officers to be more diligent in observing the bylaws in the future.
- 2. North Star Lodge No. 227 had a problem wherein a brother was refusing to take an examination in the Master's Degree due to a personality clash. I ruled the brother had three choices: (1) Take the examination in No. 227; (2) Have another lodge examine him as a courtesy, but this would require permission of No. 227 before allowable; (3) Have a Grand Master waive the provisions of Section 2-402 for "good cause," a condition which I felt did not exist. To prevent the provisions of Section 2-304 REFUSING EXAMINATION to come into play, I strongly recommended choice No. 1.
- 3. Nebraska No. 1 received a request to prefer charges against a brother for conduct unbecoming a Mason. The 1985 Master refused to accept the charges as did the newly installed 1986 Master. I ruled the Grand Master could not interfere with the workings within a Lodge as long as the bylaws were adhered to under Sections 3-203 and 3-303. The brother who filed the original complaint appealed to me to override the decision of the two Masters. In response to this, I ruled he had already made his appeal and I would not rescind my decision in the case until the present Master chose to file a formal charge.
- 4. A brother residing in Texas inquired about placing his mother in the Nebraska Masonic Home. A question arose in which state his current membership was held. Lacking proof of this, I ruled his mother was not eligible until such time as the brother could provide proof of membership in a Nebraska Lodge.
- Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 requested permission to suspend lodge on the night of December 24, 1985. According to the Secretary's Book, No. 32 is listed as holding regular Meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays. I ruled on the second Tuesday and the meeting held

- on the fourth Tuesday was considered a Special Communication, I would grant their request although no dispensation would be required from the Grand Master if that was the case.
- 6. In 1985, Gothenburg Lodge No. 249 requested permission to consolidate with Platte Valley No. 32. Permission was denied by the 1984-1985 Grand Master pending a thorough investigation of the reasons why. The request was again made in 1986 after all necessary procedures as outlined in the bylaws had been complied with. A personal visit to Gothenburg was made by the Grand Master in company with a member of the Lodge Advisory Committee following a 2 to 1 rejection of the request by the Committee. The favorable vote also was reluctantly given. My firm belief being that this Lodge is still capable of being salvaged over the objections of the current officers, I have tabled the issue for further study and recommendation.
- 7. Falls City Lodge No. 9, having been involved in a lawsuit last year, requested permission to purchase a building which could be remodeled into a replacement temple. A visit was made to Nebraska City by the Grand Master, along with a member of the Temple Advisory Committee to inspect the proposed purchase. Suggestions were made to the Lodge on possible renovation, but I advised the Lodge not to proceed until all aspects of the recent lawsuit were put to rest. Following this, any proposed purchase and/or renovation would be subject to approval by the Temple Advisory Committee before proceeding.
- M. '.W.'. Robert A. Metcalf, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee reported the above decisions were each approved by the Committee.

RECOMMENDATIONS

T

Having received input from almost every Lodge during the Area Educational Meetings conducted throughout the state in the spring of 1986, it is my firm belief that a majority of the Lodges are truly, and rightfully so, now of the opinion that a "Key" or "cipher" has earned its place in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska as it has in so many jurisdictions throughout the United States without diluting and/or prostituting the ritualistic and proficiency phases of our work. It has been said that use of a "Key" will negate the important work of the Deputy Grand Custodians. In my opinion it will do just the opposite. By use of a "Key", their importance will become more pronounced in verifying the proper wording and allow remotely located lodges the advantage of learning the ritual when a qualified instructor is not available.

It is therefore my recommendation that the following amendment to the Grand Lodge Bylaws be approved: That Section 3-102 (g) be deleted in its entirety. That the following be added to Section 1-314 — NEBRASKA WORK:

- 1. The Committee shall advise the Grand Master as to the corrections needed to be made to the cipher presently published by Allen Publishing Company of New York so as to conform to the work authorized in the Nebraska jusisdiction; that the only authorized cipher shall be edited and published by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and that the cipher shall be separate from and not replace the Monitor and Ceremonies for Nebraska.
- Every Master Mason may purchase the authorized cipher from the Grand Lodge of Nebraska through the Secretary of each subordinate lodge.
- 3. The Grand Lodge shall prepare separate ciphers of the Questions and Answers for each degree for use by the candidates in preparing for their proficiency examinations in each degree.
- 4. The cipher shall not be used or permitted in any open lodge.
- 5. In the event a cipher is used in an open lodge, that lodge shall be subject to a reprimand by the Grand Master. On the second offense during the same Masonic year as the occurrence of the first offense, the Grand Master or such persons as designated by him, shall convene a hearing with the officers of said lodge for the purpose of determining whether the charter of that lodge should be arrested until the next regular communication of the Grand Lodge. On both the first and second offense, notification of the imposition of the penalty against a lodge shall be given to all subordinate lodges.
- 6. With the availability of an authorized cipher, the installed officers of each subordinate lodge shall demonstrate to the Grand Custodian within ninety (90) days of their installation that they can open and close each degree in a proficient manner. In the event the Grand Custodian cannot certify that a lodge is proficient in opening and closing each degree, then the Grand Master shall arrest its charter; provided, that the Grand Master for good cause shown may extend the time, but not longer than the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

This Recommendation was not recommended by the Jurisprudence Committee, but after lengthy floor discussion it was balloted on by the delegates resulting in a vote of 308 for and 129 against and therefore was approved.

II

With rising cost of liability insurance premiums, it is apparent the present limitations contained within the bylaws are unrealistic. If these limitations are carried out to the letter, the Grand Lodge is faced with two alternatives. (1) Ignore the law and continue to purchase insurance at the going rate; (2) Cancel all coverage because it is not available at the maximum allowable rate. To alleviate this problem, I recommend the following bylaws amendments:

Section 2-201.02 — COMPREHENSIVE PUBLIC LIABILITY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE INSURANCE.

DELETE: "The cost of such insurance shall not exceed eleven cents per member per year, and"

Section 2-311 — SURETY BOND

DELETE: "Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Secretary the sum of 20 cents for each

\$100.00 of"

ADD: "Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the

Grand Secretary for"

DELETE: "such payment not to exceed the rate of 20 cents for

each \$100.00 or portion thereof of the face amount

of such bond"

This recommendation was approved by the Committee and balloting by the delegates resulted in 294 votes in favor and 134 votes against and therefore was approved.

Ш

It is becoming more apparent with the passage of time that entirely too many Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Masons are being lost either through inability of the subordinate lodges to provide proper posting or the reluctance of candidates to spend the required time to learn the present esoteric Questions and Answers in their entirety. A cursory check of the reports submitted by the subordinate lodges will readily bear out this fact. In an attempt to alleviate this ever-increasing problem, I recommend the following:

Section 2-402 — PROFICIENCY

ADD: In the first sentence after the words "proficient in,"

ADD: "the obligation of," so that the first sentence will

read,

"All those hereinafter initiated, passed, and raised, shall become proficient in the obligation of each degree, and shall give proof thereof by examination in open lodge."

If this recommendation is approved, it would in no way affect presentation of the First Section Lectures in each degree as presently contained in the Nebraska Work.

This recommendation was not approved by the Committee and a subsequent ballot by the delegates resulted in the following vote: 203 in favor, 244 opposed and therefore this recommendation failed.

IV

In order to partially combat the negative criticism which is constantly being leveled at the Fraternity by various religious groups through ignorance and/or design, it is my recommendation that the following monitorial admonition be given to the candidate immediately prior to administering each of the three obligations:

"The obligation you are about to take, contains reference to certain physical penalties which are symbolic in nature and are intended only to impart the historical lessons of fidelity."

The Committee did not approve the Recommendation as written and suggested it be made a part of the Preparatory Address. After it was pointed out that the Preparatory Address is only delivered prior to the Entered Apprentice Degree the requirements of this recommendation should therefore be inserted prior to each degree. The question was put to a vote by the Delegates which resulted in 294 affirmative votes and 134 negative votes. The Recommendation was therefore approved.

REPORT ON THE CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

BERNARD P. PIPHER

M. '.W.'. Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, Past Grand Masters and Brethren All:

Your Committee on Codification of the Law reports as follows, as a result of your action at this Grand Communication:

That Section 3-102 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended by deleting subsection (g) relating to the possession or use of keys, ciphers or printed matter relating to the ritualistic work.

That otherwise said Section 3-102 remain in force and effect, except to re-letter subsections (h) and (i) to be designated as subsections (g) and (h) respectively.

That Section 1-314 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1-314 — NEBRASKA WORK

(a) The Committee on Nebraska Work shall consist of three Past Grand Masters, each member to serve for a period of three years and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. The committee shall be advisory to the Grand Custodian and to the Grand Master on the esoteric and monitorial work and on all matters relating to the conferring of the degrees, and shall study and determine all matters relating to the esoteric and monitorial work, and its rulings shall be final, subject only to the appeal to, and determination by, the Grand Lodge.

- (b) The committee shall advise the Grand Master as to the corrections needed to be made to the cipher presently published by Allen Publishing Company of New York, so as to conform to the work authorized in the Nebraska jurisdiction; that the only authorized cipher shall be edited and published by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, and that the cipher shall be separate from and not replace the Monitor and ceremonies for Nebraska.
- (c) Every Master Mason may purchase the authorized cipher from the Grand Lodge of Nebraska through the secretary of each subordinate lodge.
- (d) The Grand Lodge shall prepare separate ciphers of the Questions and Answers for each degree for use by the candidates in preparing for their proficiency examinations in each degree.
 - (e) The cipher shall not be used or permitted in any open lodge.
- (f) In the event a cipher is used in an open lodge, that lodge shall be subject to a reprimand by the Grand Master. On the second offense during the same Masonic year as the occurrence of the first offense, the Grand Master or such persons as designated by him, shall convene a hearing with the officers of said lodge for the purpose of determining whether the charter of that lodge should be arrested until the next regular communication of the Grand Lodge. On both the first and second offense, notification of the imposition of the penalty against a lodge shall be given to all subordinate lodges.
- (g) With the availability of an authorized cipher, the installed officers of each subordinate lodge shall demonstrate to the Grand Custodian, within ninety (90) days of their installation, that they can open and close each degree in a proficient manner. In the event the Grand Custodian cannot certify that a lodge is proficient in opening and closing each degree, then the Grand Master shall arrest its charter; provided, that the Grand Master, for good cause shown, may extend the time, but not longer than to the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

That the original Section 1-314 be repealed.

That Section 1-201.01 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1-201.01 — COMPREHENSIVE PUBLIC LIABILITY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE INSURANCE — The Grand Lodge shall purchase a policy or policies of Comprehensive Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 public liability and \$250,000.00 property damage liability; such insurance to cover all subordinate lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction. Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge its share of the cost of such insurance in proportion to its membership upon presentation to the subordinate lodge of a statement for such lodge by the Grand Secretary.

The the original Section 1-201.01 be repealed.

That Section 2-311 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-311 — **SURETY BOND** — Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Secretary for bond protection to the lodge against misappropriation of lodge funds by its Secretary and its Treasurer. It shall be the duty of each subordinate lodge annually to report to the Grand Secretary the amount of protection necessary adequately to protect its funds against misappropriation by each of its said two officers, which report shall fix the maximum amount of protection to which the lodge shall be entitled for that year.

All payments hereunder by subordinate lodges shall be paid annually to the Grand Secretary, who shall keep a record thereof. The Grand Secretary shall procure a surety bond from a company legally issuing such bond sufficient in amount to protect all of the subordinate lodges against misappropriation of its funds by its Secretary and by its Treasurer, and pay the amount thereof out of the money received for this purpose from such lodges. Said bond so furnished is to be conditioned for the full protection of the Grand Lodge and the several subordiante lodges.

That the original Section 2-311 be repealed.

This report is respectfully submitted, and I move the adoption of the report as a whole.

REPORT OF GRAND SECRETARY OF RESOLUTIONS PRESENTED FOR THE 1987 GRAND LODGE COMMUNICATION

Summary of the Resolutions presented by not less than 5 Master Masons at the 1986 Grand Lodge Communication and to be considered at the 1987 Grand Lodge Communication June 12 and 13, 1987.

1. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II

Be it resolved: that article II be amended to include all Past Masters as permanent members of the Grand Lodge.

2. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III

The Grand Lodge shall hold a regular communication annually in the city of Kearney, Nebraska, unless unavailable, then such place as designated by the Grand Master, with the approval of the Grand Lodge, provided that it is geographically centrally located.

- 3. Be it resolved that the Grand Lodge Provide a prepaid life membership program for the voluntary participation of all Ancient Free and Accepted Masons in the State of Nebraska.
- 4. Be it resolved that no one shall serve on more than one Standing Committee at one and the same time in this Grand Lodge.
- 5. Be it resolved that no new Grand Custodian or Deputy Grand Custodian be appointed until approved by the Committee on Work.
- 6. Be it resolved that the Nebraska Freemason be returned to the control of the Grand Lodge as a responsibility of the Grand Secretary.
- Be it resolved that the Emick Scholarship fund be returned to control of the Grand Lodge and be administered by the Grand Lodge Youth Committee.
- 8. Be it resolved that the Grand Secretary shall be in charge and responsible for all operations of the Grand Lodge Office including hiring of all employees.
- 9. Be it resolved that the Grand Secretary and the Grand Custodian be restored as full time salaried employees of this Grand Lodge.
- 10. Be it resolved that installation of Grand Lodge Officers shall always be immediately following the Grand Lodge Annual Communication in June of each year.

11. SEC. 1-102, CHARTERED SUBORDINATE LODGES:

How represented—each chartered subordinate Lodge shall be represented at the Communications of the Grand Lodge by its Master, Wardens, their proxies and Past Masters.

Each subordinate Lodge shall have votes at Grand Lodge according to Masters, Wardens, or proxies and Past Masters present, and any Past Master may represent the Lodge if its Master or Warden or their proxies are absent.

REPORT OF GRAND LODGE OFFICES COMMITTEE

M. . W. . BEVIN B. BUMP

This Committee and their terms, appointed by the Grand Master, consisted of the following Master Masons: M.'.W.'.Bevin B. Bump, 158 (1989), Chairman; W.'. John M. McHenry, 19 (1990); W.'. James L. Eatmon, 294 (1988); W.'. Donald Lee Andrews, 15 (1987); M.'.W.'. Jack Hendrix, 174 (1986).

This Committee was charged by the Grand Master to observe and review the workings of the Grand Lodge Offices (the Grand Secretary's Office and the Grand Custodian's Office), and to proceed pursuant to Section 1-321 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge with whatever was necessary to improve the efficiency of the offices for the benefit of Nebraska Freemasonry. The Committee met several times and with the Grand Master, Grand Lodge officers, the Special Building Committee and the Appropriations Committee in Lincoln, Kearney, Kimball and by telephone.

The Grand Lodge Offices have just been moved, prior to the 1985 Grand Lodge session, from Omaha to Lincoln. The Grand Custodian's Office is located in his home at 855 S. 36th St., Lincoln, 68502, and is maintained by Jerry Rittenburg, Grand Custodian, and his wife Mary Alice. The Grand Secretary's Office is quartered on the third floor of the new Nebraska State Bar Center across the street from the State Capitol. The Committee was busy with organizing, setting up and furnishing the new Grand Secretary's office with the office staff. Two persons were employed and hired to conduct the business of the Grand Secretary's Office, with Jerry Sharp as Office Manager and Leslie Todd as secretary. According to the policy of the Offices Committee they were both hired on a 6-month trial basis and advised that their performance and production would be reviewed every 6 months, at which time they would be eligible for a raise or be replaced. That same policy continues during the employment of any person in the Grand Lodge offices.

At the end of the first 6-month period it was found necessary to replace Leslie Todd with Shelley Fey. The staff of the Grand Secretary's Office is now well versed in the computer and is becoming acquainted with Masonic terminology and our Bylaws.

The Grand Secretary's Office is new, pleasant and friendly and will make a good front door to Nebraska masonry for Masons and the public. If you have not visited the office, you should do so and become acquainted with the staff and find out what services can be provided to your lodge and the Masons of Nebraska.

The first year of operation of the new Grand Secretary's Office was a busy one. By September the staff and the Committee had become frustrated with the workings of the computer system and CD Systems of Omaha, Nebraska, through whom the Honeywell computer, software and the pro-

gramming had been purchased, when it was discovered that CD Systems had not been authorized by Honeywell to sell us the particular software contained within the system. A complete history of the staff's and Committee's dealings with CD Systems has been documented and is available to any Mason who is interested in reviewing the same. At that time, Grand Master Charles W. Amidon appointed a special computer committee consisting of John McHenry, Art Sharp and Joe Babcock, an independent computer programmer, to investigate the problems and report their findings and recommendations to the Offices Committee. After the committee's report, it was determined by the Offices Committee that it was necessary to retain an independent computer consulting expert.

Two experts, Ned Kalbfleish and Marc Minkin, were brought in to evaluate the system that the Grand Lodge had purchased from CD Systems together with the programming software documentation that had been sold to the Grand Lodge, and to meet with the Honeywell representatives to further determine why the Honeywell system was not giving the performance that the Grand Lodge had originally requested and contracted for. After this investigation, it was determined by the reports and recommendations of the experts that it would be less expensive to add the ITT system in the Grand Secretary's Office. A report and the documentation of the step-by-step process of analyzing the Honeywell system and finally ending up with the ITT system is also available for review by any interested Mason. As a part of the computer accounting package it was determined that there was a need for restructuring the chart of accounts for both the Nebraka Masonic Home and the Grand Lodge. With the assistance of the consultants and Bill Strain, who is an accountant with Fry, White and Guszak of Lincoln, a new chart of accounts was developed for both. These charts dovetail very well with the Lotus and Wordstar accounting packages that are now in place and in service in the computer system in the Grand Secretary's Office. Complete financial documents can now be produced for both the Home and the Grand Lodge.

Under the Honeywell system as programmed in the Grand Secretary's Office in Omaha between June, 1984 and May, 1985, the only information that was in the data base as far as the membership was the name, address, Lodge number, birth date and when the member was initiated, passed and raised, suspensions, reinstatements, and the only way this information could be obtained for review was by knowing the lodge number that the member belonged to and his middle initial. Also, there was no search capacity. Under the new system, we will not only have the above information, but also will be able to program the member's status, whether he is a 50-, 60- or 70-year member, the number of lodges he may belong to, his proficiency, whether he has been an officer in his lodge, a Past Grand Master, Deputy Custodian, Jordan Medal holder, Grand Lodge officer, committee member, his occupation and any additional remarks that we wish to program for that certain individual, and the information can be accessed by a number of ways.

The computer can also do numerous functions relative to accounting and information production for the Lodges. As a part of the Offices Committee's

focus on computer services, the Committee will be recommending to the Grand Master that starting this next year, Worshipful Masters and Secretaries be brought to the Grand Secretary's Office to be advised of the capabilities of the computer and to inquire of them what types of information, documents and other assistance the Grand Secretary might provide to them.

A WATTS line was placed in the Grand Secretary's Office, which has become quite useful in the telephone communication to and from the office, and has proved to be less expensive than the long distance expenses in the past. A WATTS line was also placed in the Grand Secretary's home in an attempt to provide greater access to the Grand Secretary by the Lodges. The Committee has determined that this type of service should be provided to the Worshipful Masters and the Deputy Grand Custodians by placing a WATTS line in the Grand Master's home or office, and also one in the Grand Custodian's Office/home.

The Committee invites all Masons to not only visit and contact the Grand Secretary's Office for the types of services that can be provided to Nebraska Masons and the public, but to also communicate to the Chairman, or any member of the Committee any suggestions, advice or questions that they might have in regard to the operation of the Grand Lodge offices.

The Committee has always believed that open communication is vital to the promotion and growth of Freemasonry in Nebraska.

REPORT OF THE TEMPLE BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Falls City Lodge No. 9 has been contemplating purchasing a wood framed, metal covered building which they propose to remodel into a new lodge building. The Chairman of the Committee and the Grand Master visited the site last fall and made recommendations to the Lodge that perhaps it should consider a new building on the site as the best long range investment.

Falls City Lodge was unfortunately involved in a law suit regarding its present Lodge location and it has been suggested to the lodge that this suit should be resolved before considering any additional expenditures. Future plans are still pending.

Bartley Lodge No. 228 is also interested in remodeling a building into a temple and has submitted preliminary plans. These are currently being reviewed by the Temple Building Advisory Committee which will continue to work with the lodge.

THE REPORT OF THE TEMPLE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

M. W. BROTHER FRANK MATTOON

Worshipful Master and Brethren:

We have the pleasure this year of working together on various problems involving the Lodge Advisory Committee. One of the most potent problems facing the Committee is the growing tendency of lodge consolidations. The Committee has approved some lodge consolidations and delayed action in other cases, but that isn't what I'm talking about now.

I'm talking about possible cures for this growing situation. It can be addressed better and more efficiently and effectively if the problems in the local lodges can be discernable at the early incubation stage and to accomplish this, I would submit a recommendation to either the present Grand Master or the incoming Grand Master, that we have more members on the Committee spaced throughout the state so that we would have ready access to the lodges and then working through the Deputy Grand Custodians we could cover more area with less travel over shorter distances.

Secondly, I would like to see the program we borrowed from the South Dakota Jurisdiction about ten years ago given another trial. This involved visitation to approximately one fourth of the lodges each year on a rotating basis so that at the end of four years, almost every lodge in the state would receive a visit from the Grand Lodge Officers. Many of lodges have never seen a Grand Lodge Officer.

During these scheduled visits, special functions such as Friendship Dinners and other interesting programs were held where before, nothing of interest has been held in some lodges for years. This display of sincere attention was good for the lodges and helped generate interest in instances where apathy was gaining a foothold. I again recommend reviving this program as soon as possible. I think it can work again and might attack the growing problem of declining membership and the all-too-easy route of consolidation.

One thing more about consolidations. We have not given any study to the effect of such action on the lodge that goes out of existence and what happens to the membership. Where do they go? They may or may not continue paying dues to maintain future eligibility for the Plattsmouth Home or they may become dormant dues paying members and eventually become suspended for non-payment of dues. Unfortunately, we have no statistics with which to evaluate the consequences.

With that, I just wanted to offer these suggestions to the Grand Lodge in hopes that we can take some positive steps and not talk about Masonry being dead in Nebraska.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

PAUL R. PIERCE, CHAIRMAN

At the 1986 Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries Conference a paper was presented concerning the removal of the ancient physical penalties from our Masonic obligations. The penalties have been removed from the obligation in Austrailia, Scotland, and several jurisdictions in the United States, while still embodying the penalties in the Work, with as little disruption to the current ritual as possible.

A program called "COMELY," which was presented by the Grand Secretary of Manitoba, has been adopted by more than 60 lodges in North America. COMELY is a plan to Call On Masons of Each Lodge Yearly in an organized manner. It works well with pairs doing the calling. It is said to be as effective and appreciated as calling on a sick Brother in the hospital or home, or sending a get well card. It lets the Brethren know the lodge cares.

There are foreign jurisdictions who seek world wide Masonic recognition:

The Grande Loge Reguliere De Belgique, Rue Royale, 265, 1030 Brussels is small in membership, is careful in selection of membership, is small but growing, and is nearly 100 percent recognized.

Brazil has several small State Grand Lodges, some in remote areas, accessible only by air. Their language is a barrier, but the Grand Lodges of the Conference are trying to work out eligibility for recognition.

Chili is recognized by all jurisdictions and are trying to establish communication with the Inter American Confederation.

The Grand Lodge of Cuba is recognized and is showing a small growth in membership.

The Grand Lodge of Gabon now has seven constituent lodges and is recognized by several Grand Lodges in Europe, Canada and the United States.

The Haitian Federation of Masons, USA, headed by John R. Bullock of Seattle, Washington, is considered irregular and non-Masonic.

The Inter American Masonic Confederation meets tri-annually in various cities in Central and South America. It is looked upon favorably as securing regularity and international unity.

A Masonic speaker from Europe at the Conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries informed us that the lodges of Italy with jurisdictional control in the United States and Germany, made up mostly of Americans, were most effective in Italy, although the Grand Orient of Italy located at Palazzo Giustiniana of Rome is accepted as regular and entitled to world recognition.

The only recognized lodges in Lebanon are under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Scotland and the Grand Lodge of New York.

The Grand Lodge of Spain consecrated by the Grand Loge Nationale Francaise in November 1982, has now been recognized by 46 Grand Lodges in the Conference. It now has 22 constituent lodges.

The Grand Lodge of Chili acknowledged with a very nice letter the help received by them from the Grand Lodge of Nebraska of \$1,000 to their Disaster Relief Fund after the earthquakes that troubled that country.

The Grand Representatives of Nebraska near other Grand Jurisdictions are urged to communicate with their counterparts and if possible visit the jurisdictions they represent.

Unfortunately, the actual success — or lack thereof — of these ventures cannot be statistically substantiated because of the lack of follow-up information available to this committee. It is known that these dinners work! It is the degree of their success that is unknown.

Nebraska is not the only jurisdiction with membership loss problems. It is a concern of national magnitude.

Indications from some sister jurisdictions are that perhaps the time is appropriate for a serious consideration of modification of our long established ban on direct solicitation. There are today jurisdictions which permit 'asking' an individual to join. This permissive action on the part of those jurisdictions has had no apparent deleterious effect on the quality of membership.

Let's be realistic, brethren. We may be our own worst enemy when it comes to membership growth. When was the last time YOU discussed Masonry with a non-member? When was the last time YOU signed a petition for a candidate for Blue Lodge? When was the last time YOU did anything to further the causes of Masonry? When was the last time YOU said words to the effect — "Gee our membership is sure going downhill" — and then did nothing to put on the brakes?

No committee can solve our problem. Only individual Masons can solve our problem!

GEORGE WASHINGTON NATIONAL MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Sir, Distinguished Brethren:

The report of the George Washington National Memorial Committee is a little bit different than other committee reports. Its main purpose is to remind you that there is the George Washington Masonic National Memorial.

The Grand Master asked me to keep this very short and therefore we will do so. However, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, we would certainly ask that when you are preparing your agenda next year, we might have about 15 minutes to show the slide and sound presentation on the Memorial. It has been several years since that has been done, and I think the delegates like to see that.

The Memorial is situated on Shooter's Hill in Alexandria, Virginia, and it belongs to all of us. Every Mason in the United States of America, because we have all contributed to it. Some a dollar at the time of their raising; and now, those who have just come in, five dollars.

I just saw a figure recently that now more than four-fifths of the Grand Jurisdictions of this country have raised that figure; that one-time, lifetime figure from one dollar to five dollars; which brings back to the Memorial, without considering inflation, about the same number of dollars as they were getting from the Grand Lodges 30 years ago when we were doing a better job, thoughout our lodges, of making new Masons. I think the rest of the Grand Jurisdictions will soon follow, but I think the Masons of Nebraska can take great pride in the fact that they were one of the first groups to make this raise.

I mentioned that it is in Alexandria and it's on Shooter's Hill, probably the highest and most sightly location in the Washington area. When they were talking about building the national capitol, it was suggested that was the favorite site for the capitol, Shooter's Hill in Alexandria. George Washington opposed that, and it wasn't built there, the national capitol, for the sole reason of George Washington's objections. You know why he objected? He said, "I own too much property in Alexandria, and if they situate the national capitol there it will increase the value of my property more than it should and I don't want to get rich off of my government."

These are the principles that George Washington believed in. He also said that he believed that a just application to the principles of free masonry was promotive both of private virtue and the public welfare. If masonry has anything close to a modern patron saint, it's George Washington, and I hope that we will all always remember his words and stay close to masonic virtues.

GRAND ORATOR'S ORATION ARTHUR R. SHARP Stand Erect

I would like to visit with you for just a few minutes this evening about one very important admonition, which most of you will realize as a common thread which runs through all three Masonic degrees. It is only a two word phrase, however it's full meaning is so vast that it would literally take volumes to adequately explain.

That two word phrase is "stand erect."

When a new candidate first hears those two words, the interpretation becomes very literal. He immediately squares his shoulders and straightens his back. These actions are very fitting and altogether proper, and the Ceremony of Initiation proceeds. The true meaning here is easy to pass off as a direction to alter your present physical stature, and as my mother used to tell me, "Stand up straight Art."

As I see it, there are five basic components to "standing erect" Masonically. The first of these components is **The Personal Ability to Deal Constructively with Reality.** Whether we like it or not this old world we live in has more than a small measure of selfishness, suspicion, dishonesty, hostility, violence, and lack of understanding. That is reality. Another reality, however, is that there is also a great deal of love, trust, caring, giving, honesty, morality, and concern for our fellow man.

As Masonic families I believe that it is essential that we live our lives on the positive side in the sunlight, however in order to be realistic we need to recognize that in order to combat the negative forces which intrude on all of our lives from time to time, we need desperately to face them and deal with them in a realistic manner. Ignoring or merely turning away from problems will not allow us to make any progress toward eliminating the selfishness, suspicion, dishonesty, and hostility which, we all agree, have **no** place in Masonry.

To deal constructively with reality requires a strong personal philosophy of life, a set of strong moral values, a way of living, if you will, that will fortify us against the "buzzsaws of life" that we all encounter from time to time. Tell yourself that you can handle whatever comes your way, in a mature fashion, and do everything you can to become part of the solution and not part of the problem.

The second important component is **The Capacity to Change.** The only certain thing in life is constant change. The world is changing all around us. Whether we know it or not, whether we like it or not, we are also changing. Many of the people we know become so set in their own ways, so self satisfied, so complacent, that a change of any sort totally disrupts their whole

world, and leaves them in a state of personal disarray and confusion. These people are truly to be pitied, for they will never know the joy or feel the satisfaction of implementing a new idea, or watching a different concept change and grow into something useful and wonderful.

A little over a decade ago Nebraska Masonry could boast of approximately 50,000 members. When you receive your Proceedings from this year's Grand Lodge session, it will show the Nebraska membership as only 27,136. Gentlemen, this is a matter of great concern to me, and also to all of your Grand Lodge officers, who have literally put in thousands of hours, in addition to their regular professions, to try and halt this exodus away from Masonry. None of the rest of the world is the same as it was ten, twenty or fifty years ago. Constructive change is no longer a luxury that we cannot afford, it is now a matter of survival. Any other course and our beloved fraternity will die of stagnation.

The third attribute is **The Ability to Find More Satisfaction in Giving Than in Receiving.** As infants we all started out on the receiving end of, not only the necessities of life, but also all of the fun little things that give life its many joys. As we grow up, however, and if we mature normally, things gradually change and we come to realize that true happiness comes not from getting but rather from giving. Giving with no thought whatsoever of receiving any benefits in return.

True giving manifests itself in many ways. Community activities of all kinds, volunteer work, Masonic activities of all kinds, or perhaps just in being more trusting, understanding and tolerant of other people and their point of view.

Another very essential ingredient in the recipe for being able to stand erect is **The Ability to Relate to Other People.** Unfortunately we all know people who relate only to others' negative characteristics, and consequently exhibit only negative characteristics about themselves. This personal negativism will gradually lead to a suffocation of all the joys and richness of life. These people seem to possess a talent for finding weaknesses in others instead of looking for their strengths, for cutting others down instead of building them up. For hurting rather than healing.

These people justify their constant fault finding as just constructive criticism. They look at their caustic sarcasm as mere kidding around. Their verbal assaults as evidence of a realistic relationship, and their biased putdowns as an honest appraisal of others. These are the people who invite not only other people who must be around them, but also Masonry, to wither and die, instead of inviting them to grow and flourish in the light of human kindness and caring for our fellow man. And after all, isn't this what Masonry is all about?

Lastly, the most important measurement of a man's ability to stand erect Masonically is **His Ability to Love.** This is the one thing, without which, you can have no Masonry. Love has been described in a number of ways. "Affection based on admiration." "A warm attachment." "A score of zero

in tennis" and the one which more nearly fits our Masonic definition "a brotherly concern for others."

Unfortunately many people do not know were to look for or how to find that brotherly love which is so vital to all of us. They have learned throughout their lives to look outwardly from themselves for virtually everything they need in life. They go to schools for knowledge and education, they go to church for religion, they go to a doctor to get well or to an attorney to solve legal problems, they go to a faucet for water, and to a grocery store for food. They go to someone else for nearly everything they need in this world, so would it not follow that they would also look to someone else for love?

Maybe, just maybe, they are looking for love in the wrong place. And maybe they don't even know how to recognize it if they do find it. You see, love is not an object to be sought or found. Brotherly love is a state of being, a state of mind which is all encompassing of all the previously mentioned components. It does not come from the outside in, but rather radiates from the inside out. It must start with ourselves. The only way to receive more love is to give more love, to be more lovable, and demonstrate those characteristics of brotherly love toward others.

When these five tenents are made a part of our daily living and we can truly deal constructively with reality, have the capacity to accept change, give to others with no thought of getting anything in return, relate effectively to others, and have the ability to love, then and only then can we look at ourselves as being emotionally mature, as standing erect in the sight of "God" and our fellow man.

The true meaning of this small two-word phrase implores each and every one of us to "stand erect" morally, patriotically, professionally, religiously, Masonically, and most important of all, personally. If we are able to do these things then our own lives will surely be in harmony and our Masonic fraternity will grow and flourish, not wither and die.

THE BRONZE JORDAN MEDAL

A Bronze Jordan Medal which perpetuates the memory of M.'.W.'. Robert Carrell Jordan, our first Grand Master, is provided each lodge in the state by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. It is intended that the medal shall successively be presented to and worn by the oldest member of the lodge who lives in the state and holds the most number of concurrent years of membership.

The Bronze Jordan Medal holder at the present time is Brother John A. Elwell of Frank Welch Lodge #75 in Sidney, Nebraska. Brother Elwell was born December 31, 1887 at Springfield, Nebraska, raised in Kimball Lodge #294, demitted to Frank Welch Lodge #75 at Sidney on March 6, 1945, received his 50-year pin in 1960, 60-year pin in 1970 and his 70-year pin in 1983. The gold Jordan Medal was presented to Brother Elwell at the time of the dedication of the new Temple of Frank Welch Lodge on December 3, 1985 by the present Grand Master, Charles W. Amidon. Brother Elwell is alert and in good health at the age of 98. He has carried the light of Masonry well and labored long for the Craft. Most Worshipful Grand Master, I submit this report for adoption.

My Brethren I greet you well;

The past Masonic Year, has been a year of much tragedy in the world which has brought death and destruction to all parts of the world.

You can read about bombings, by people who think they are right, and want to change and rule the world, and their thinking sometimes causes the death of many people. You can also read in any newspaper, about rapings, muggings, killings, and other acts of crime, that man is committing against his fellow man.

There is a great tragedy in all of this, and that is, had these people who want to commit these violent acts against their fellow man, had they the opportunity to experience the teachings of masonry, as you and I have had, they might feel compassion instead of hatred for their fellow man. So what has masonry really taught us about life and immortality?

We as Masons know what we are to do about life right now, because of the teachings of Masonry, but what about immortality? Instead of making an argument, it presents a picture — the oldest, if not the greatest drama in the world — the better to make men feel what no words can ever tell. And there Masonry rests the case, assured that since there is that in man which makes him hold to the moral ideal against the brute forces of the world; that which prompts him to pay the last full measure of devotion for the sanctity of his soul; the God who made him in His own image will not let him sleep in the dust! Higher vision it is not given us to see in the dim country of the world; deeper truth we do not need to know.

There were reported to the Office of the Grand Secretary, of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, the deaths of 889 Masons for the year 1985-86, as of May 15, 1986. Of these deaths one was a recent Grand Master, that being Most Worshipful Brother Harold C. Wurdeman.

The reading of the Masonic Roll for Most Worshipful Brother Harold C. Wurdeman, which was so gracefully prepared by Most Worshipful Past Grand Master T. Leo Stines, is as follows:

- M. W. Brother Harold C. Wurdeman, the 116th Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, passed away Friday, June 21st, 1985 at Lincoln General Hospital, where he had been a patient for about four weeks.
- M. W. Brother Harold was born May 8th, 1911 at Columbus, Nebraska, the son of Charles and Elise Wurdeman. He received a degree in civil engineering from Iowa State University and married Irene Miller in 1936 in Columbus.
- M. `.W.`. Brother Wurdeman was a lifetime resident of Columbus. He was a professional engineer in Nebraska, Kansas and South Dakota and a registered land surveyor in Nebraska. He was a partner in the firm of Reed, Veach, Wurdeman and Associates of Columbus. He continued to do some work for this architectural firm following his retirement in 1976.
- M. W. Brother Wurdeman was a member of the Federated Church in Columbus for more than fifty years. He served one or more terms on the various boards of his church.

He was a member of the Columbus Chamber of Commerce where he served one term on the Board of Directors; a member of Columbus Rotary Club and was a member of Elks Lodge #1195 in Columbus.

- M. `.W.` Brother Harold became a Master Mason in Lebanon Lodge #323 on September 23, 1964. He received his original Certificate of Proficiency in 1966 and continued this certification until his death. He served as Master of his lodge in 1968. He was a member of Orient Chapter #18, Royal Arch Masons; Gebal Council #12, Royal and Select Masters and Gethsemane Commandery #21, Knights Templar. He was a member of Shiloh Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine. He was also a member of the Lincoln Consistory of the Scottish Rite. That body designated him a Knight Commander of the Court of Honour in 1979. He belonged to Sesostris Temple of the Shrine and Harmony Chapter #13, O.E.S. He served as their Worthy Patron in 1977 and 1978. He was awarded the DeMolay Honorary Legion of Honor in 1980.
- M. `.W.`. Brother Wurdeman served as Grand Marshal of the Grand Lodge for five years having been appointed by M. `.W.`. Brother Russell L. Fickes in

1971. He was appointed Grand Junior Deacon in 1976 by M. W. Brother T. Leo Stines. He thereafter held all the offices in the advancing line and was installed Grand Master June 13th, 1981. At the time of his death M. W. Brother Harold was serving the Grand Lodge as Chairman of the Temple Building Advisory Committee.

The Grand Lodge and the Masons of Nebraska mourn the loss of this dedicated member of their fraternity.

We thus come to the end of another report of the Fraternal Dead, but we as Masons must keep the light of Masonry lit, and carry on the teachings of this great fraternity, as the 889 brethren carried the lite of Masonry this past Masonic year.

Before I leave, the Grand Secretary gave me this following information: The Gold Jordon Medal Holder at the present time is Brother John A. Elwell, of Frank Welch Lodge #75 of Sidney, Nebraska.

Brother Elwell was born December 31, 1887, at Springfield, Nebraska; raised in Kimball Lodge #294; demitted to Frank Welch Lodge #75 at Sidney, on March 6, 1945; received his 50-year pin in 1960; his 60-year pin in 1970; his 70-year pin in 1983.

The Gold Jordon Medal was presented to Brother Elwell at the time of the Dedication of the new Temple of Frank Welch Lodge on December 3, 1985, by Grand Master Charles W. Amidon.

Brother Elwell is alert and in good health at the age of 98. He has carried the lite of Masonry well, and labored long for the craft.

The committee submits this report to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for adoption.

REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA SOCIETY FOR MASONIC RESEARCH 129TH ANNUAL COMMUNICATION

June 14, 1986

In the last year, the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research has continued its efforts to find and preserve the historical record of Freemasonry in Nebraska. In this regard, our collection of artifacts and memorabilia continues to grow. A large portion of this collection is now on display at East Lincoln Lodge 210. The Society received during the past year, from Lodges and individuals, several donations of items of historical interest. Two donations of particular interest are the collection of artifacts contributed by W. Bro. Tom Tye, and another from the Tyler Family Estate, including a remarkable Masonic scrapbook containing among other things, scores of photographs of Masonic activities dating back to 1917.

The Society is also now the temporary custodian of the Grand Lodge Archives with Bro. Gene Jorgensen acting as curator. The Society is providing Bro. Jorgensen with the financial support necessary to preserve documents, bind books, and remount photographs. One process in this regard involves nuetralizing the acid content of old newspapers to forestall ordinary deterioration of the paper. The chemicals required in this process are expensive and consume a significant portion of our fiscal resources. The Archives are now presently stored at the Scottish Rite Temple, the York Rite Masonic Temple, East Lincoln Lodge 210, and Gene Jorgensen's basement, all in Lincoln.

The programs of the Society include our continuing efforts to promote Table Lodges. Our members have assisted with the presentation of approximately 8 Table Lodges in the past year. We also have speakers available, and on one occassion, Bro. Jorgensen presented a program in South Dakota to nearly 200 Masons from four states.

The Society is in regular correspondence with about 8 other Masonic Research Lodges in the world including Quatour Coronati Lodge 2076 of London. It was from the latter Lodge that we were able to obtain a complete copy of the position of the Methodist Church of Great Britain, Ireland, and Wales regarding Freemasonry. This matter was presented at our meeting in Hastings, and generated a great amount of healthy controversy. Another important meeting this year was our program in Lincoln presented by the architect for the Masonic Center. We were pleased to have the Grand Master with us at that meeting, and though our numbers were few, the program was well received and enjoyed by all. During the year we were the first research organization to report on the irregular solicitation for money from the clandestine Grand Orient of Lebanon.

By choice, the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research is unique among research organizations. We are recognized as a tax exempt educational organization. Our emphasis is not on publishing academic papers, but on communication. We are dedicated to preservation of historical data and artifacts. We believe that in these ways, we can best be of service to the order.

We are grateful for the efforts of Bro. Jorgensen who devotes a substantial part of his time to this organization. We also want to express our thanks to the Grand Secretary who has been most generous with his time, and patient with our efforts.

Masonic research in Nebraska is alive and well, and the Society hopes that it shall, by its faithful work, continue to merit the approbation of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

REPORT OF NEBRASKA MASONIC FOUNDATION

M.:.W.:. ROBERT A. METCALF, PRESIDENT

At the June 1985 session of the Grand Lodge the membership of the Grand Lodge authorized the Nebraska Masonic Foundation to raise funds by way of gifts, grants or bequests to construct the proposed Nebraska Masonic Center upon the site located on the southeast corner of 16th and "L" Streets, Lincoln, Nebraska. The membership also approved occupying a space in the Nebraska Masonic Center for purposes of housing the offices of the Grand Lodge and the Nebraska Masonic Foundation was recognized and approved by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

The Foundations's articles of incorporation were filed on June 12, 1985. The Foundation then submitted an application for recognition of exemption under Section 501 (C) (3) in early July 1985. By the middle of October 1985 we had received oral notice from Internal Revenue Service that our advanced ruling had been approved and subsequently on November 8, 1985, the written approval was issued. The effective date of the exemption began June 12, 1985, the date of incorporation. The ruling designates that Grantors and donors may rely on the determination that we are not a private foundation and thus exempt under Section 501 (C) (3).

Since the issuance of the written exemption letter we have received four contributions. The first was from Pratt Hines Foundation in the amount of \$25,000.00; the second from the Alliance Chapter Order of DeMolay in the amount of \$200.00; the third from the Grand Sovereign Inspector General Herbert A. Ronin in the amount of \$1,000.00 and an anonymous donation of \$1,000.00. The DeMolay indicated that they would greatly desire to have the installation of their state officers held at the Nebraska Masonic Center. It is certainly gratifying to have the four contributions prior to the time of any formal fund raising and it is indeed a thrill to have the donation from the Alliance DeMolay.

We have now employed a fund raiser by the name of Robert Cosgriff. Over the next several months they will be conducting a statewide survey. Once the results of that survey have been presented to the Foundation we will begin organizing the formal structure of the solicitation committee and begin the fund drive.

ROCK MAUL PRESENTATION To: SPRINGFIELD LODGE No. 112

During the year of my Masonic Father, M. W. Byron C. Jenkins, a tradition was started which continues to have a positive effect upon the subordinate lodges throughout the state.

It was M. `.W.`. Byron's desire to recognize Masonic excellence and reward that lodge, which in his opinion, exemplified the true spirit of Masonry in its Officer leadership; attendance; enthusiasm; fellowship; Temple appearance and condition; bulletin or newsletter; Secretary reports and programs, other than regular meetings and ritual meetings carried out through the year.

In keeping with the desire of $M.^{\cdot}.W.^{\cdot}$. Jenkins and using the guidelines he established, I have made a selection again this year which, in itself, was a difficult task. To select only one among many choices, in no way diminishes the respect and admiration I hold for all those progressive lodges throughout Nebraska which have worked so hard to preserve the basic tenets of the Fraternity and are continuing to do so with increasing fervor.

The Lodge I have selected this year established a record which should be an inspiration to every other Lodge in the state, particularly those which may be having problems of apathy, indifference or general lack of direction.

To begin with, no lodge has a remote chance of success without good leadership. With excellent leadership this is what one Lodge was able to accomplish:

In August of 1985, the Lodge was in desperate straits with no committees functioning and no on-going programs. Membership was declining rapidly. The Temple was in disrepair with plaster falling down, leaking plumbing, broken doors and generally in need of a good cleaning and painting job.

At that same time, a change in leadership was forced upon this Lodge through no fault of its own, and the Senior Warden was obliged to step in as acting Master.

Here's what was accomplished since August of 1985 and today, a period of ten months:

A renovation plan was developed with clearly defined goals, objectives and activities.

First, the long delayed presentation of the Bronze Jordan Medal was held during a well organized dinner, the first in a long time.

A formal written agenda was written and presented to each member attending the business meetings so that all knew what was to be discussed.

New embroidered aprons were acquired for all officers.

A newsletter was resurrected and is now mailed to all members on a regular basis.

The antiquated Bylaws were reviewed and updated and were approved in March of this year.

As part of regular meetings, formal educational presentations are being made to educate the membership on Masonic concerns and interest.

A library to support educational activities has been assembled along with appropriate cases for display.

A fund raising project was undertaken to raise \$12,000 toward refurbishing the Temple. Early this spring, more than \$4,000 of this goal has been accomplished.

The membership rallied together and completely replaced the dining room, stairwell and anteroom drywall ceilings. Along with this, the entire building was cleaned and painted throughout.

The installation of officers in January of this year was opened to the public for the first time in years and was held in conjunction with the Eastern Star Chapter which meets in the same Temple, following which, a sit-down dinner was held.

The Lodge has not been able to meet the requirements for proficiency in many years. Therefore, Schools of Instruction are being held monthly under tutoring by a Deputy Custodian and there is every indication that proficiency will be obtained this year.

A Finance Committee has been appointed and is actively reviewing the present and future financial position of the Lodge.

A Masonic Handbook has been published, not only for the members of their own Lodge, but has been distributed to every subordinate Lodge in the State.

Decreasing membership was not overlooked either. Programs of interest to new members were instituted and this spring 4 petitions were read with 2 more in the hopper. This means the Lodge will now be required to get busy brushing up or even learning the ritual in order to handle their "new" problem of candidates. With their initial success, Friendship Dinners are now a permanent and regular part of future activity planning.

A Masonic sign has been added to the other organizational identification signs which greet travelers going through town.

A Spaghetti Dinner fund raiser is in the works to generate extra funds to contribute to a town pavilion and sidewalk project.

To quote from a recent publication of this Lodge, I read as follows:

"At present, we are exploring ideas relative to leasing a portion of our facilities during regular business hours to the State Department of the Aging for use a Community Senior Citizen Center. This will be another way to serve the community as well as to help defray our expenses.

"We are also planning family outings and picnics this summer.

"In the past ten months, under new leadership, our Lodge has entered into 21 new programs which have helped us to become active again. But more important, we have demonstrated that a small failing Lodge can, in a short time, with proper leadership and cooperation, become active and grow."

With these outstanding credentials, it is my honor and extreme pleasure to make this year's presentation of Most Worshipful Brother Byron C. Jenkin's Rock Maul to Springfield Lodge No. 112 A. T. F. & A. M. T.

Would Worshipful Master, Brother Edward M. Cummings please come forward to take possession of the Rock Maul Award?

Receiving the award for Springfield Lodge is Worshipful Master, Edward M. Cummings; Senior Warden, Joseph Beister; and Junior Warden, Jerry Carter.

DECISIONS

Grand Lodge Officers Installation - North Platte

1. In response to an inquiry from East Lincoln Lodge No. 210, I ruled that a Brother who had been raised in 1925, but had been suspended for a period of seven years since that time, would not be eligible for a 60-

- year-pin until he had completed sixty years of membership in good standing.
- 2. Gave permission for the Masters and Wardens Club of Omaha to solicit all lodges in the state for financial support to the annual Christmas Celebration for the residents of the Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth.
- 3. In response to a question from Pawnee Lodge No. 23 regarding, "What constitutes proficiency in each of the three degrees," I responded that Section 2-204 was still in effect, and it was my interpretation this included the full Questions and Answers in each degree.
- 4. Stella Lodge No. 105 was advised that a suspension of a Stella member for Masonic Offenses by the state of Arkansas, imposed while the member was residing in Arkansas, was binding upon Stella Lodge also.
- 5. I granted permission to Highland Lodge No. 194 to hold a "consignment sale" as a means of raising much needed operating funds for the Lodge.
- 6. Granted permission to Ashlar Lodge No. 33 to solicit subordinate lodges within a one hundred mile radius of Grand Island for the purpose of securing contributions to the Annual Food Truck Project to benefit the Nebraska Masonic Home.
- 7. North Bend Lodge No. 119 asked if under the provisions of Sec. 2-610 it would be permissible to establish a Scholarship Fund to be used for local teachers' continuing education. I ruled this would be permissible, but to provide the Grand Lodge with a detailed format before engaging in such a project.

DISPENSATIONS

- 1. To Miloma Lodge No. 328, to move its Charter to the West Omaha Masonic Temple for the purposes of installation of Officers, due to limited seating capacity of its own lodge room.
- 2. To Platte Valley Lodge No. 32, to move its Charter to the Holiday Inn for purposes of installing Grand Lodge Officers on December 6, 1986.

THE ROLL OF DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS AND DATE OF APPOINTMENT

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian," was made in 1869.

In 1870 the "Committee on Work" recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren, these together with Grand Lecturer to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have at any time served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was or is a member.

Note: From 1880 until 1910, there were no recorded appointments of brethren to serve as assistants to the Grand Custodian. In 1910 Brother Robert E. French did hold special meetings to examine and instruct brethren who were willing to become "assistants" in the work. Thirteen brethren were nominated and approved for appointment as assistants. After 1917 these brethren were generally referred to as "assistant custodians." In 1925 the designation was "Deputy Custodians." The following brethren appeared in the records as "assistant custodians" or at times as "Deputy Custodians".

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence their era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A. L.) "In the year of Light."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, Anno Inventionis (A. L.) "In the year of the Discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the Temple of Solomon was completed, Anno Depositions (A. Dep.) "In the year of the Deposit."

Knight Templar commence their era with the organization of the order, Anno Ordinis, (A. O.) "In the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchizedek, Anno Beneficio, (A.:.Beo.:.) "In the year of the Blessing."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used. Anno Mundi, (A. M.) "In the year of the World."



RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

Ancient Craft Masons — Add 4,000 years to the current year, thus: 1985 and 4,000-5985.

Royal Arch Masons — Add 530 to the current year, thus: 1985 and 530 - 2515.

Royal and Select Masters — Add 1,000 year to current year, thus: 1985 and 1,000 - 2985.

Knights Templar — From the Christian era take 1,118; thus: 1,118 from 1985 - 867.

Order of High Priesthood — To the Christian era add 1913, the year of the blessing, thus 1985 - 3898.

Scottish Rite — Add 3,760 to the current year; thus 1985 and 3,760-5745
