



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

#### ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND LODGE, ANCIENT, FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA

Brethren:

I wish to welcome each and every one of you to this 130th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. It is with a great deal of honor and humility, as well as pleasure, that I am privileged to bring you this message as your Grand Master. I wish that all of you could experience being Grand Master, if just for a short time; and you would realize that it could not, and would not, happen without the support and assistance of each and every Mason in the State of Nebraska

I bring you this message as your Grand Master and urge each of you to consider carefully the contents of this report, as well as the legislation and other official acts of this Grand Lodge. You are delegates of a democratic system which directs the activities and acts of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. I am very grateful and appreciative of the manner in which the business of running the homes at Plattsmouth and Fremont has been conducted. My sincere thanks to the Trustees, Ben Harvey, Ray Evers and the Employees.

#### SPECIAL DISPENSATION

- 1. Granted Blue Valley Lodge #64, Wilbur, permission to confer Master Mason's degree out of time.
- Granted Bennett Lodge permission to install officers on December 30, 1987. Father of Master was here from Arizona.
- 3. Granted Fremont Lodge permission to confer Master Mason's degree with Nebraska work on candidate in Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.
- 4. Granted Tekamah Lodge permission to confer Master's degree with Nebraska work in Clovis, New Mexico.

- 8. Granted special permission to Alliance Lodge #183 to participate in the City Parade the 3rd weekend of July.

#### GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

#### 1. Liability Insurance

With the fact that many lodges and temple craft organizations carry separate liability insurance in addition to that required by the Grand Lodge and with the ever-rising cost of liability insurance premiums, it is only reasonable to offer the Subordinate Lodges the opportunity to elect to carry their own insurance, be covered by the Grand Lodge policy, or have both.

I therefore recommend the following bylaw amendment:

Section 1-201.02 to be amended to read as follows:

The Grand Lodge shall purchase a policy or policies of comprehensive public liability and property damage insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 public liability and \$250,000 property damage liability, such insurance to cover those subordinate lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction which elect to be covered by this policy, and provide proof of their own insurance policies showing the Grand Lodge as a named insured. Any Lodge electing to be covered by the Grand Lodge policy, and any Lodge not providing proof of separate insurance, shall be covered by the Grand Lodge policy, and shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge, its share of such cost in proportion to its membership upon presentation to the subordinate lodge of a statement of such cost.

#### 2. Fiscal Year; Annual Communication; Installation

At present, even though the Grand Master's term is coordinated with those of the newly installed officers of the subordinate lodges, the June Annual Communication preempts a major portion of the time and effort of the Grand Master in April, May and June. This hampers efforts of the Grand Master to carry forth his program and presents fiscal problems, inasmuch as the current fiscal year of Grand Lodge runs from May 1st to April 30th. A calendar year would bring the finances more in line with the actual term of the Grand Master and would also coordinate with the proposal as to the Annual Communication. Preparation would then be possible as to a calendar year budget rather than the current split year; a Grand Master would be able to prepare for his Annual Communication at the end of his term; and, at the end of the term of office of the masters of the subordinate lodges who work throughout the year with him. It should be further noted that the Internal Revenue Service is in the process of requiring all trusts and charitable non-taxable entities to report on a calendar year basis. Inasmuch as we will be required to so comply to make our reporting, our fiscal year should be changed to a calendar year for all purposes.

For those and other reasons, it is the recommendation of your Grand Master that:

- a. The current fiscal year of Grand Lodge be changed to a calendar year beginning January 1, 1988.
- b. That section 1-101 be amended to read as follows:

Section 1-101 —ANNUAL COMMUNICATIONS.

The stated Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge shall be held at

such place as shall be designated by the Grand Master with the approval of the Grand Lodge, beginning on the first Friday of February, and at such hour as the Grand Master may designate. A Master Masons Lodge shall first be opened. If representatives of the constitutional number of seven Subordinate Lodges be found present, the Grand Lodge shall be declared open for the transaction of business, and the Grand Master shall announce all necessary appointments, and fill vacancies in the standing committees.

c. That there be added to the bylaws of Grand Lodge a new section dealing with installation and requiring that installation be held on or before fourteen days following the close of the Annual Communication at a time and place selected by the newly elected Grand Master. I therefore recommend the insertion of the following:

#### Section 1-101.01 — INSTALLATION

Installation of Grand Lodge Officers shall take place on or before fourteen (14) days following the close of the Annual Communication at such location, time and date as the Grand Master elect shall select which shall be announced prior to the close of such Annual Communication.

#### 3. Assistant Grand Secretary

With the day-to-day administration of the Grand Lodge being performed by an office manager, and the need to communicate with the other Grand Jurisdictions, it is necessary to give a title to the office manager.

I therefore recommend that the following section be added to the bylaws:

Section 1-201.03. The office manager shall have the title of Assistant Grand Secretary and shall be entitled to use said title in all correspondence and other matters pertinent to the execution of his duties as office manager.

#### 4. Abolish Committee on Reinstatements

It is the desire of the Grand Master to abolish the Committee on Applications for Reinstatement and leave the sole discretion on reinstatement to the subordinate lodge and the Grand Master without the necessity of circulating said matters to a committee of three who merely make recommendation to the Grand Master, causing delay in authorization of reinstatement, which should be the primary responsibility of the subordinate lodge. It is therefore recommended that Section 1-312 be abolished, and that Section 3-911 be amended by striking the last sentence thereof which language is as follows:

"To assist the Grand Master in arriving at such understanding, he shall appoint a standing committee of three, advisory to the Grand Master; to which the application and all matters pertaining thereto shall be referred, and such committee shall secure such other information as in its discretion may be deemed advisable, and report to the Grand Master its recommendation."

#### 5. Per Diem of Grand Custodians

Because of the cost of travel and to retain qualified Deputy Grand Custodians, I would recommend an increase in the sum received by the Deputies for conducting schools of instruction.

I recommend that Section 1-202 of the bylaws be amended to:

Delete..."the sum of Five Dollars per day..."

Add ... "the sum of Fifteen Dollars per day..."

## 6. Merging of the Committee on Finance and the Committee on Appropriations

Like every Grand Master who has gone before me, I have been concerned with proper accountability of the funds of Grand Lodge. In that regard, I specifically appointed Most Worshipful Brother Donald Swanson, PGM, to do an independent audit of all funds received and disbursed by the Grand Lodge Office since moving of the office to Lincoln and establishment of our present automated accounting system. His report, presented in writing and orally to all of the Grand Lodge Line Officers, Finance Committee and Appropriations Committee, has assured us that every dollar received has been accounted for and recorded. Disbursement of funds has also been accounted for and recorded in a manner which leaves proper accounting trails.

Since the accounting system is now automated, has been tested, and can be tracked on a daily basis if necessary, certain modernizations of our present cumbersome methods of budgeting and accountability are appropriate. Our present methods, established in the law years ago to serve the now antiquated methods which were then in operation, are outdated.

In that regard, I recommend that Sections 1-318 and 1-326 of the bylaws be rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

#### Section 1-381 — BUDGET AND FINANCE

The Committee on Budget and Finance shall consist of five members, each to serve for a period of five years, and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, and Grand Secretary may not be appointed to or serve as a member of this committee. In case of a vacancy on the committee, the Grand Master shall immediately appoint a member to fill such unexpired term. It shall be the duty of this committee to: (1) Fix the amounts to be budgeted to carry on the functions of the Grand Lodge; (2) Present this annual budget to the Grand Lodge for approval; (3) Monitor expenditures made to insure they are properly vouchered and within budgetary limits; and (4) Report to the Grand Lodge any expenditures which may have been made which do not properly fall within previously approved or adjusted budgetary limitations.

In the exercise of its duties, this committee has authority to modify

specific line item budgetary limitations previously approved by the Grand Lodge, PROVIDED the overall expenditure budget limitations are not exceeded. In cases of emergency or unforeseen requirements the committee may increase the overall expenditure budget limitations between sessions of the Grand Lodge to the extent of such necessity or requirement, provided, however, that such action must be approved in writing by a majority of the four ranking officers of the Grand Lodge. The committee shall have authority to employ a certified public accountant at the expense of the Grand Lodge, if, in the judgement of the committee and the Grand Master, it shall be deemed necessary.

In setting the annual budget for Grand Lodge, this committee should be furnished a request in writing from the individual or committee requesting consideration for funds. The committee may hold open hearings on such requests at which time any member of the Grand Lodge may appear and be heard.

#### **ROCK MAUL**

It is my intention to continue the tradition established by M :: W :: Byron Jenkins to award the Rock Maul to the lodge most deserving.

#### STATE OF THE CRAFT

It is the same old song so far as membership is concerned. It appears that we will experience a substantial loss through deaths and suspensions for non-payment of dues. This is the main concern no matter where you go across this United States. Although there seems to be a revived effort to attract members throughout the state, it is a problem that will not disappear overnight. We are competing for a part of the valuable time of the non-active Mason and the prospective candidate. Local lodge activities must be attractive enough to warrant at least part of that valuable time. We have had consolidations — some of which were practical and wouldn't effect the craft that much — some that were very disappointing. Masonry will grow or depreciate according to the efforts of you and me.

#### APPRECIATION

The year is only half over but there are so many that I am indebted to for their support and assistance. To M : W : B :Paul Pierce for heading an excellent Educational and Leadership program. To Shelley Fey for a tremendous job of running the office until April 20th with lack of personnel. To the Past Grand Masters for their advice and assistance when asked. To the Committees for their untiring efforts. To the Grand Lodge Officers for their support; and above all, to my wife Delphine for her understanding, patience and encouragement.

The Grand Master made the following additional remarks:

We are, to an extent, in a transition period, where we are attempting to do some things to modernize our methods, which; I feel should have been done quite some time ago. It is very necessary that we keep up with the times. I feel it is necessary that we expose Masonry to the public as much as possible, and advertise whenever we can, by wearing the pin, the belt buckle, whatever. We should talk Masonry on the streets. We are competing for time of the younger people. We are in competition with athletics, with television, with church activities, with dramatics in high school, as well. We certainly have to make our meetings at the lodges attractive enough so that we may warrant some of that time. I am not asking for every bit of it. No possible way. I would never let a father have his boy play without him watching him. Yet, with a careful planning of our schedule, we might be able to get some to come to the lodge, simply because we have a program there tonight that they would like to see.

We need to get Masonry on the signboards. In Florida, call it solicitation, whatever you like, but the billboards on the highways going into Florida tell us to join a Masonic Fraternity. There is a drug and alcohol abuse program going on in Philadelphia, and in the east. For the first time in history, we had a float, sponsored by the Masons, in California, in the Rose Bowl Parade. A beautiful thing. We will soon have the Nebraskaland days, which will probably start on Sunday. It is a large parade that will probably be witnessed by some 80,000 people. We are looking forward to getting some exposure by putting a float in the parade and having some of the Masonic dignitaries in the procession. We laid a cornerstone in North Platte last Saturday, and we are very proud of a new building that we have there.

I suggest that, at any chance you get, you promote Masonry; not necessarily, among the brethren. We need to get the word out to the public. That is one of the reasons that we had the informal opening this morning. Our greatest ally, as far as Masonry advertising and solicitation of members, is our wives, our sweethearts and our sisters.

#### GRAND CUSTODIAN'S REPORT

By Jerry L. Rittenburg, Grand Custodian

To the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

The Annual Report of the Grand Custodian is hereby respectfully and fraternally submitted.

This year, 109 lodges were again certified. This is the same number as were certified the previous year; however, since the total number of lodges has declined, this is an increase in the percentage of certified lodges.

Individuals certified in one or more degrees number 449. During the past year, with the approval of the Committee on Work and the Grand Master, the rules for individual proficiency have been changed. Under the new rules, an individual may be examined and issued a certificate of proficiency in any one degree. This certificate may be renewed annually by submitting to reexamination in the degree for which it was issued. The brethren must also demonstrate proficiency in all floor movements. This is an addition to our previous rules which applied only to the wording of the ritual.

It was my opinion that this change in the rules would allow many of our brethren to become certified who might have been overwhelmed by the necessity of learning and reciting the entire ritual at one time.

There are more new certified men this year, who have certified in at least one or two degrees, than we have had in the past few years. We had to do something, because our ritualists are fewer and fewer; and, if you look around at the age of our certified men, it is obviously going to continue this way if we don't do something to turn it around. This is one small step that we took this year; and, I have other ideas that I would like to discuss with the Grand Master, in the future, to do some other things, and make some changes that may help. ## PAST GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT

The time period of this report is from May 1, 1986 to August 1, 1986, while serving as Grand Secretary.

At a meeting of Grand Lodge Officers in February of 1986, after serving as Grand Secretary Pro Tem, beginning June 15, 1985 until October 12, 1985; then, having been elected Grand Secretary at the Grand Lodge Communication on June 14, 1985, and serving as Grand Secretary from October 12, 1985, I advised the officers that I would not be available for reelection or appointment at the 1986 Grand Lodge Communication.

My active and full-time service ended August 1, 1986, after making a request of the Grand Master, Charles W. Amidon, to be relieved of the office of Grand Secretary. R:W: Edward M. Cummings, who was elected Grand Secretary at the June 13, 1986 Grand Lodge Communication, was appointed Grand Secretary, pro tem, to serve until December 6, 1986, when he was regularly installed as the Grand Lodge Secretary.

The Secretary's Guide Book, a three ring loose-leaf notebook, made available to the Nebraska Blue Lodge Secretaries in November of 1985, has been especially helpful to new Secretaries. It should be continually edited and improved from suggestions coming from the field to the Grand Secretary. Additional copies of the Guide Book are available from the Grand Secretary.

It is my recommendation that the Grand Lodge continue the courtesy "Secretaries Breakfast" on Friday morning, before Grand Lodge opening. Although the time is limited, brief selected topics by Secretaries, and the presentation of visual aids and papers, make the discussion both instructive and interesting.

Further meetings for Secretaries in smaller area groups throughout the state would be beneficial. A long-range planning committee, composed of representative Secretaries, to develop a suggested, standardized method of record keeping and suggestions for improved forms and communication to the Grand Secretary, would be most helpful for efficiency and good record keeping.

The toll free number of 1-800-558-8029 to the Grand Secretary's office, usable anywhere within the state of Nebraska, is especially good for direct communication, reduction of time involved in correspondence and in paper and postal costs.

After having had the experience of serving as both a Grand Master and a Grand Secretary, I would make two suggestions to improve efficiency and reduce the cost of the Grand Lodge office.

- 1. The election of a full-time, salaried resident and knowledgeable Mason as Grand Secretary to be in charge of the office.
- 2. Discontinue the courtesy of doing the accounting for the Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth. Recording of the

receipts, the payment of the many bills and financial transactions, the use of computers and equipment, as well as clerical and secretarial help by the Grand Lodge office for the Home, occupies the majority of the time of the Grand Lodge employees. One Grand Secretary and one full-time secretary to the Grand Secretary with the efficient use of the 800 telephone number, automatic and electronic typewriters and computers, all now available in the office, could well handle the work of the Grand Lodge Secretary and office.

I enjoyed working with the Secretaries of our Nebraska Lodges and with the Grand Secretaries of other Jurisdictions.

## NEBRASKA'S MASONIC HOME

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren:

This is my fourth appearance before you to render an annual accounting of the stewardship of the trustees of your Masonic Home at Plattsmouth, Nebraska. I do so, saddened by the fact that one of our faithful trustees, Worshipful Brother William A. Pettingill has entered his eternal home since my last report. Also, Most Worshipful Brother Byron Jenkins, for reasons of health, and Worshipful Brother James N. DeMoss because of his Grand Lodge commitments, have retired from the Board. They have all been tireless workers with a keen interest in the affairs of the Home. They will be sorely missed. They have been replaced by Worshipful Brother Gary W. Radil, an attorney from Omaha, Nebraska; Right Worshipful Brother Thomas Tye of Kearney, Nebraska, our Grand Senior Warden; and Brother William Lantis of Kearney, Nebraska, who is in the nursing home business. With these replacements, I assure you your Home will receive the same careful attention it received in the past because they join the most dedicated group of individuals with whom I have ever had the pleasure of working.

During the past year we have had the pleasure of having either Right Worshipful Brothers Paul R. Eveland or Thomas W. Tye attend our meetings as representatives of the Grand Master. They have been exceedingly helpful to us and we sincerely appreciate their advice and help.

Once again, Brother Adolph Schlaman promoted the Robert Boone Memorial Food Truck project from central Nebraska. it arrived on the Saturday before Thanksgiving. It was accompanied by Brother and Mrs. Schlaman, Brother Otto and Mrs. Niess, Brother Bayard Payne, Jr., and Mrs. Payne and Brother Edward Rohde. It brought 485 cases of canned goods and other non-perishable merchandise with a total weight of 20,000 pounds with a wholesale value of \$10,059.10. We are extremely grateful to Brother Schlaman and the Brethren and the organizations who made this contribution possible.

Our budget for 1987/1988 will be \$1,519,721.00. Every Nebraska Mason contributes \$2.00, through his dues, to the support of the Home. With approximately 27,000 Nebraska Masons, this produces \$54,000.00 - or less than 4% of our budget. No other Grand Lodge funds are used in the operation of the Home. This means your trustees are required to raise 96% of our budget from other sources. It is only because of the past generosity of those Masons who have contributed to our Endowment Fund over the years, that we are able to keep our Home operation at its present level. For that reason, I urge you to remember your Masonic Home Endowment Fund when you draw your wills. In this way, you can continue to support the work of Masonry long after you have entered the portals of the hereafter.

I take this occasion to express the appreciation of the trustees to all the Lodges, Chapters, Councils, Commandries, Masters and Wardens, Eastern Star Chapters, as well as the Omaha Scottish Rite, and other groups who have

helped to make the year a pleasant and joyous one for the Home residents. I suggest you urge your friends to visit the Home if they have not done so. When they see the wonderful job being done by our Superintendent, Raymond Evers, and his work force, I am sure they will be interested in helping with this outstanding program.

Speaking of our Superintendent, Worshipful Brother Raymond F. Evers, I remind you, he will be happy to bring a program on the Home to any interested Lodge or Chapter. He will show slides and sketch the progress made in the Home the past year. He will be present throughout this session. Visit with him if you desire a program.

In all my previous reports, I have mentioned the fact that the modernization of our infirmary facilities was becoming a number one priority. Unfortunately, necessary improvements can only be delayed so long. On January 23, 1987, I wrote our entire membership, soliciting support for the addition of a new wing to house a 100-bed infirmary. I said then, we had reached the place where we had to face the fact we could not postpone the inevitable any longer. The studies and the surveys we had made convinced us this addition could be built and furnished at a cost, not to exceed \$2,5000,000.00 While we realized the magnitude of the undertaking, we reached the conclusion we had no alternative but to move ahead.

In my letter, I mentioned the fact that Brother James O. Dishon, now living in Tucson, Arizona, whose name, unfortunately, I misspelled, had sent me a check in 1985 for \$1,000.00 with which to start a Building Fund. This we did. With some fortunate bequests which we were able to transfer to this fund, we have now reached 20% of our goal. This is the good news.

Now, for the BAD news: unfortunately, the response to my letter to our membership has been worse than terrible. From our 27,000 Nebraska Masons, we have only received donations or pledges from 512, or less than 2 percent, for a total donation of \$39,680.00. When we consider that of this \$39,680.00, fourteen of us pledged \$18,000.00, we have the other 498 Masons pledging \$21,680.00, or an approximate average of \$43.53 per member. There is no way we can reach our goal with this type of response. I remind you this is your Masonic Home. As trustees, we are only your agents. The job cannot be done without your help.

I still have faith in Nebraska Masons. It is possible, I did not sufficiently transmit the urgency of our situation. I fully believe, if the Masons understand that urgency, we can get the job done without the expense of hiring high-powered fund raisers. As you know, if we have to do that, a portion of the money raised will go to them. With your help, we can avoid this expense. If we can do the job ourselves, every cent collected goes to the Home. As I have told you before, your Home trustees receive no remuneration of any kind, not even for expenses. If you will do your part to fund this project, and then talk it up with your Brethren, I am sure we will have no problem.

Many of you may have misplaced the pledge cards sent to you with my previous letter. Our Superintendent, Raymond Evers, is at a table outside the door with a supply of these cards. Why not stop and sign one to leave with him. Your pledge may be paid over a period of three years. Also, as your

Masonic Home is a 501(c)(3) corporation, any donation you make will be tax deductible if you itemize your deductions. Further, if you have a substantial capital gain in a stock or a piece of other property, you can donate it to the Home at its present value and take a deduction for that value and avoid the payment of any capital gains tax on it.

I have been purposefully blunt because I am trying to show you how much we need your help. I close with the thought that helping, aiding and assisting those who need your help has always been at the heart of Masonic philosophy. I sincerely trust each of you will do your part to the best of you ability to live up to that philosophy.

## PRELIMINARY REPORT, APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Officers, Lodge Officers and Brethren:

The Appropriations Committee submits this preliminary report for your consideration for the year 1987-88.

At the bottom of the report are some footnotes which reference various line items within the listing of the appropriations. These are provided to explain some of the charges.

As shown in the Finance Committee's report for the year 1986-87, the expenditures were \$272,218.00 which were \$62,142.00 below budget approved by Grand Lodge last year, which was \$334,360.00.

The suggested appropriation for the 1987-88 year is \$340,650.00, which is in excess of the anticipated income of \$336,000.00 and is \$6,290.00 more than was appropriated for the 1986-87 year.

However, Grand Lodge operating supplies' account will be recoverable by the sale of the Ciphers. Taking this into account, actual overall budget will be less than 1986-87 by approximately \$8,800.00

The Committee wishes to report that only one committee submitted a budget request. This make planning for expenditures extremely difficult to assemble an accurate listing. However, in the judgment of this committee, it is felt all areas are covered adequately.

We wish to thank the Grand Lodge officers who contributed time and effort to assist on various occasions.

The 1986/87 Budget paid for the 1985/86 year. We are now submitting an amount to cover 1986/87 and 1987/88. Next years budget will show \$2,500.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE

W : B : James N. DeMoss, Grand Senior Deacon, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the report of the Finance Committee as printed. M : W : Donald R. Swanson, Past Grand Master, and member of the Finance Committee, moved that the report of the Finance Committee be amended to include a six-page audit report prepared by M : W : B : Swanson; W : B : DeMoss seconded the motion, and, on vote, the amendment was adopted.

The Committee report, as amended, is:

The Grand Lodge Finance Committee met at the Grand Lodge Offices at 1:30 p.m. on Monday, May 11, 1987, to perform those duties outlined in Section 1-318 of the bylaws.

A thorough review of the financial statements revealed that several line item expense accounts showed an expenditure greater than that set by the Appropriations Committee at the last Annual Communication. These items were determined to be proper expenditures for necessary expense items with nothing improper being involved. These line item exceptions will be referred to the Appropriations Committee for action to adjust as allowed in our law. It is the opinion of the Finance Committee that excessive detail on appropriation listings result in unnecessary over, and/or, under budgeting of many line items. Accordingly, it is recommended that the appropriation approvals in future years be consolidated wherever possible.

Certain instances were noted wherein income would be recorded as a direct credit back to related expense items. This practice has a tendency to distort both the income and expense figures. Action has already been taken in many cases to add income line items to obviate this problem in the future. This matter will be referred to the Grand Lodge Office Committee for action as they deem appropriate.

This committee wishes to recognize and express its sincere thanks and appreciation to SHELLEY FEY of the Grand Lodge Office Staff for her diligence and devotion, under trying circumstances, to the maintenance of accurate accounting records for Grand Lodge.

## GRAND LODGE OF NEBRASKA 1985 - 1986 FISCAL YEAR

Memorandum: General Fund Internal Audit

At the direction of Most Worshipful Wayne G. Luenenborg, an internal audit was conducted of the receipts and disbursements of the General Fund of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1985 and ending April 30, 1986. In the course of the audit, all source documents, such as invoices, checks, deposit slips, bank statements, and such other documents as were available, were examined. The review was made on a cash method of accounting which followed the practice of prior years of charging all expenditures to expense in the year paid and showing all receipts when received rather than when earned. For the purposes of this report, out-of-period reimbursements are shown as receipts and not credited to current expenses.

Receipts for the fiscal year totaled \$319,170.00 and disbursements were made in the amount of \$286,765.00. However, for a true picture of the financial condition, it is necessary to adjust receipts and disbursements to include transactions which did not occur until the subsequent fiscal year.

It should be noted under Salaries, account number 5410, Grand Custodian, that there was no appropriations for the \$6,000.00 expenditure. Item # 5350, Grand Custodian Auto Allowance at \$6,000.00 was appropriated for this purpose; but, upon advice of Deloitte, Haskins and Sells, the Auditors, the payments to the Grand Custodian were recorded as salary. Also, under Contributions, #5730 Masonic Service Association, Hospital, a payment of \$2,500.00 was made for the prior fiscal year for which an appropriation had been made but not paid. The payment due for this fiscal year will be appropriated and paid in the next fiscal year. It is noted that \$2,500.00 received in June 1986 for the benefit of the Nebraska Masonic Home was deposited to the Grand Lodge General Fund, and such amount will be transferred to the Home in the 1987-88 fiscal year.

### MASONIC EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

It is with pleasure that I bring you greetings from the children at the home, and from the board of trustees, for whose untiring efforts and devotion I am greatly appreciative.

For those of you who have taken the opportunity to attend the achievement day program at the home; or the 4-H chili feed; or saw the program given in Lincoln at Grand Chapter; or have seen the children in their everyday activities; the feeling of pride and achievement should be equally with you as it is with your board members. Many people have taken the time to express their notice of the change in the attitude and appearance of all the children in recent years, and this year,in particular. You would have to believe, as we do, that it is nothing more than a reflection of the caliber of care and direction that they are receiving from Superintendent Ben Harvey and his very capable staff. It would surely appear that the goals laid out by previous boards, and carried out by Ben and the staff, are vividly beginning to show.

When Ben joined the staff in 1980, the census of the home was 13. It was previously recognized that a director of child care services was needed, and that was accomplished. That made it possible to put into action many of the things deemed necessary by the board; and through the suggestion of the long range planning committee, the results are a more than double census today of 27. The end product: more and better-cared-for children.

You will notice the rather large increase in the budget for the coming year. This is due in part to additions to the staff because of the scheduled opening of the newly remodeled senior girls cottage. The expanded office area of the administration building, badly needed salary adjustments, and sharply higher insurance costs. We will be forever indebted to those foresighted individuals who saw fit to remember our home in their respective wills. It is because of these wonderful gifts that we can go forward with our plans. Seventy three percent of this year's proposed budget is funded by the income from this, and other forms of gifting. Our two grand bodies have been more than helpful with their gifts, and we are equally grateful. They are always there when we need them.

Friday, June 12, 1987

The Deputy Grand Master called the Grand Lodge from refreshment to labor at 1:30 p.m. June 12, 1987

R:W: Charles I. Gregg, Senior Grand Warden of Alaska, asked to be recognized and made the following presentation:

Most Worshipful Grand Master, distinguished guests, brethren all. I bring greetings from the Most Worshipful Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Alaska. I lived in Nebraska, and this makes me feel like I am home.

At the time that we formed our Grand Lodge in Alaska, in 1981, we had quite a little process to go through. It was the first Grand Lodge that had been formed in 93 years in the United States, so we didn't have a real good set of guide lines; because, when the last one was formed, they didn't have telephones or a whole lot of anything. They did have a Pony Express to get the word around.

We had to start out from scratch; and in the process of doing this, we ran across a few problems. One of our problems was that our Mother Jurisdiction, the Grand Lodge of Washington, had for the Grand Master, a Certified Public Accountant. Now I am not picking on CPA's, but they go by the book. Then as head of our Jurisprudence Committee for the Grand Lodge of Washington was a very distinguished lawyer in the Seattle area. So now, you have a problem compounded by another problem. I am not sure, but I think I am in trouble. When our Grand Lodge was formed, I took the minutes of the very first meeting, when we formed the Alaska Masonic Research Association on June 16, 1976, in Seattle. From that point, we went forward.

When it came time to actually get down to the nitty gritty and do it, our committee on fraternal correspondence wrote to every Grand Master in the United States, and invited them to come to Alaska; because on the 7th day of

February of 1981, we were going to do it one way or another.

I am sure you have probably heard a little bit about it; because, every year, the people come from the Grand Lodge of Alaska and report we have almost canonized our Most Worshipful Brother Byron Jenkins. Brother Byron Jenkins has done more for the Grand Lodge of Alaska than you can possibly imagine.

When we wrote to everyone and asked them to please come, we had expected that our Mother Jurisdiction would grant us immediate interim recognition. The code says you will do this. The code book says you will do that. The code book says you will do something else, but the Grand Master has the ultimate authority and he receives his licks at the end of his session. The Grand Master of our Mother Jurisdiction said I am not going to receive my licks, because I am not going to do anything.

Most Worshipful Brother Jim Williams, who was our first Grand Master, called Brother Jenkins and told him that I have got some really sad news. He says we want you to come, and we already received your word that you will come to Alaska; but we are not going to have the recognition that we thought possible. So, it might be a pretty bleak day when you get to Alaska.

Well, Brothers, I want to tell you why this man is so great in our eyes. When he came to Alaska, just a few minutes before his arrival on the floor, we had gotten word that we had no recognition for sure. When M:W:B:. Byron Jenkins got up, he read a letter that granted immediate recognition to the Grand Lodge of Alaska from Nebraska.

That is why we feel so good about this brother.

Looking back on how much the Grand Lodge of Nebraska means to us, M : W : B : Williams has come up with something that we think you might like. He has come up with what looks to be like a gold pan, and it is really a gold pan.

Now, in Alaska, you know, they swirl water around in it, but you won't want to do that to this one. On the surface of this, it says: "To our Esteemed friends and brothers of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska with our thanks for your continued efforts to spread and nurture Masonic excellence, on our 6th anniversary from the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Alaska, 6 February, 1987."

On the back of this it reads, "Sponsored by Most Worshipful Brother James A. Williams, Chartering Grand Master F & AM Alaska, in honor of M : W : B : Byron C. Jenkins and the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska whose efforts made our chartering possible."

On the bottom, under the pan, is another little plate, "The Gold Pan Trophy awarded annually to the Nebraska Lodge showing the greatest improvement or most significant contributions to Masonry in Nebraska"; and, from the number of plates around the edge, that this is a traveling trophy.

of Masons of Nebraska, accepted the trophy on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

M : W :Paul R. Pierce, Past Grand Master, Chairman of the Masonic Education Committee, introduced B :John W. Sissler, Chairman of the Masonic Education Committee of the Grand Lodge of Missouri, who made the following remarks:

Brethren, M:W: Sir, and M:W: Brethren: The thing that makes this fraternity of ours so very meaningful, Brethren All, from wherever we might be. Six and a half years ago, I came to Kearney, Nebraska, and I never thought I would ever come again: Then, less than seven years, I am back. This time the hotel didn't burn down before I came. I have grown; and, on behalf of all of us in Missouri, M:W: Sir, I would like to thank you for the invitation.

Your Grand Master was awfully gracious to ask me to tell you a little bit about what we believe, sincerely, to be one of the finest things that has happened in the State of Missouri in the last several years.

Since 1975, we have developed what we consider an excellent, three pronged program, and I will proceed to tell you a little bit about each of those three points.

If you were to ask me to devise a six word idea of what our program would be, it would be to disseminate, communicate, create, for the verbs. Pride, enthusiasm, and commitment for the nouns. If you were to ask me to refine that too, it would be to create commitment. And that is exactly what we think we have done.

The interesting thing about it is the directness, the simplicity, if you will, of our approach.

The first of those areas is the Grand Lodge Achievement Award, which I brought along, and I will leave it with Paul. It was started in 1975. We have an honor lodge program. There are about 10 requirements. We give the lodge who achieves that, a certificate; and,then the Master has a certificate that he keeps himself. This is the Medallion which would also go to the Master. This was added in 1978.

In 1984, the second part of our program was developed. That is the lodge education officer program. Chartered officially now in our constitution, the Grand Master of Missouri, through the Worshipful Masters, appoints a lodge education officer. The name is sent in to our Grand Lodge office. That man may be a Past Master; he may be an officer; he may be none of the above. It is not a requirement. He must have interest, the enthusiasm, the commitment to help his Worshipful Master provide programs for his lodge. He is encouraged to appoint brothers to assist him to create that enthusiasm.

In 1981-82, the then Grand Master of Masonry in Missouri had done a survey, the year he was Deputy Grand Master in Missouri, from the reports that are sent in to the Grand Lodge, to the Grand Master and to the Deputy by

the District Deputy Grand Masters in Missouri. Those are appointed by our Grand Master to serve as his direct representative in that geographical area. One of the questions that is on there is attendance. How many attend lodge, on an average, in addition to the officers. A very interesting statistic came about. It was interesting in one way, sad in another. Exclusive of the officers who attended the Masonic Lodge in 1980-81, there were a whopping 3%, on the average, sideline members who attended those lodges. If you added the officers in it would be 15%. Now that is not a very comforting number. So we determined, then, what the problem is. We have what I call: "we met, we et and we left" meetings. In between, they read the minutes, and that is basically about it.

One of the charges of the lodge education officers, his primary charge, is to assist his W. Master in the creation of programs at his lodge. The W. Master is the administrative leader of that lodge, but that man is there to help create, to disseminate some enthusiasm and commitment by having some programs that may or may not be Masonic in nature.

If you would flip through a little bit of this Lodge Officer Manual that your committee has developed, they allude to the idea that there is more than one kind of program. Because there is more than one kind of man who is a Mason. There are people who are interested in sports; there are people who are interested in the ritual; there are people who are interested in Masonic education, per se.

But the beauty of this organization is the fact that we do have that diversity of many who choose to become a Mason.

In 1985, added to the bylaws of the Grand Lodge was the requirement that a lodge have a lodge education officer.

This year, we added what we would call our third part of our program. And that is a commitment on the part of our Grand Lodge, for four years, to develop a leadership training program. One of the things that I will leave with you is the first installment of that program. We use a video recorder. The beauty of this whole thing is that you can put it on. If a fellow has a television and VCR, we send him the tape. All you do is put that in and you can start. It can be in someone's home; it can be in the lodge hall. It is at the point now, where we are encouraging our district deputy grand masters to call more than one lodge together. Now all this requires a committee to have some goals on its own. This year, the committee on Masonic education in Missouri, by Grand Lodge Law, is composed of six members, appointed to come up every year for three year terms. They can be reappointed, or not. On that committee, sitting ex officio, but not required to conduct necessary business in terms of quorum, are the Grand Master, the Deputy Grand Master, and the two Grand Wardens.

Our committee's goals this year were three. We are developing a lodge officer manual, which will be for sale at this Grand Lodge session in St. Louis.

The second goal is to market our achievement award. We want to engender, in a little bit better way than we are doing now, the desire on the part of the Senior Warden, the Junior Warden, the Senior Deacon and so forth, of Gardenville Lodge or any other, the desire that "I want to be an Achievement Award winner."

I am the executive vice president of the Plumbing, Heating and Cooling Contractors Association in Missouri. Our professional organization is called the American Society of Association Executives. They have a program for certified association executives, and that is what brought to our minds the whole idea of marketing. They create in you this desire to be a certified association executive.

Why can't it work for us? Well it can. If we develop the marketing tools to get it done. And that is what the second goal this year is.

The third is to develop this four year program in leadership training.

Year one, which we just finished, has been the use of committees in what we call action teams.

Year two, the year that we are in the process of starting, includes goal setting, motivation and time management. Who better, brethren, need to have some help in time management, than all of us? How do I get the most out of my people? How can the man who is going to be Master be motivated and want to do his job? Can we do it better if we learn to set some goals out ahead? That is year two.

Year three covers piloting for progress, worship styles, and the next man. How many of us have sat in organizations, whether it be this or any other, and wondered, who is the man who is behind me? Is he going to be ready? Does he have any idea what he is supposed to do? Does he understand the problems I have? Well, maybe he doesn't, because we don't communicate with him. The fourth year is communication in the lodge and in the community. Those are things that we have now.

Is it going to work for four years? We have the advanced commitment from the next four men in line in our Grand Lodge that they are going to help us. Now, who are we gearing this thing to? We can't do it for everybody at once. We are working on the two wardens. In our achievement award, one of the requirements is that either the Senior or the Junior Warden has to attend the leadership training seminar.

Secondly, we are going to go down the line

How does it work? The program is two hours in length and it works well. We have asked our District Deputy Grand Masters, the Grand Master's official representatives, to be the spear carriers, the motivators of that program in their districts. The District Deputy has this tape; he has all the books. It is up to him and the members of his lodges to get together to work it out.

Who developed it? Well it was a bunch of your people from the DeMolay headquarters in Kansas City who came together with one of our

committee members to create this excellent program.

What has happened? We have the commitment from the leadership; but, more importantly, we have commitment from the lodges. We have 510 lodges in Missouri, around 80,000 members. Out of those 510, we had 287 send one or the other of those two wardens to that first seminar.

We marketed it as a workshop, because that is what our program started out to be. We changed in September, started the thing in January, and we still had over 50% of those lodges send one of those men to that program. That is the kind of statistic that is neat to know. We are trying very hard to make this thing work.

It reminds me, if you talk about the commitment of the fellow who was a mountain climber. He was a good mountain climber. In fact, he thought he was very good.

He had all the equipment, he had the boots, and he had those things that you stick in the rocks to go up. You can see I am not a mountain climber. No peak was too good, no peak was too steep, no challenge too great for this climber.

One day he proceeded to climb this mountain, that he had never climbed before. On with the boots, and on with the sticks, and he started to go up the mountain. One arm and leg over the other, he was practically to the top, to success, and his foot slips. He starts careening down into what he thinks is his way to oblivion. He is flailing around with his arms, trying to grab hold of something; and by golly, he grabs hold of something; it is a good sized tree, coming out of the mountain. His other arm grabs hold of it, and there he hangs, in the middle of the air, on this tree, scared to death. Naturally.

He starts to scream, "Is there anybody up there?" "Is there anybody up there?" "Help! "Is there anybody up there?"

All of a sudden, out of this clear, beautiful, blue sky, comes this deep resonant voice. It says: "John." He looks up and doesn't see anybody. "John." Well he answers this time, "Yes."

"John, it is me." He said, "John, do you believe?" He thinks to himself, why not, what chance do I have. "Sure," he says, "I believe."

He said, "John." "Yes?" "Are you committed?" "Yes, I am committed," with all the courage he can muster, as he is holding on to this tree, starting to pull away from this rock.

Now he says, "John, will you do whatever I tell you to do when I tell you to do it?" "Yes, oh yes, I will."

"All right," he says, in this deep resonant voice, "let go of the tree." John holds on a second longer and says "Is there anybody else up there?"

Brethren, in so far as Masonic education, in so far as our challenge, there is nobody else up there. We are it!

And if we maintain the commitment that we are trying to do together, absolutely together, we can make it.

## Comments:

## **Grand Lodge:**

1987 revenues, exclusive of net realized capital gains or losses, were up \$23,468.00 (7.4%) over 1986. Of this increase, \$10,292.00 came from increased Liability Insurance Premiums received. This apparent increase of revenue may be misleading, since it was really a lagged receipt caused by a very significant increase in insurance premiums paid in fiscal 1986. \$7,101.00

came from increased investment income receipts. Neither of these two 1987 "increases" can be expected to repeat in future years.

In these summary reports in prior years, revenues have been reported excluding net realized capital gains or losses. Generally, these amounts have not been significant. This year, however, the amount was significant and was a net loss; substantially, all of which arose from the sale of preferred stocks. These "losses" have been on the books for many years, since these preferreds have been purchased years ago when interest rates were much lower than they have been in the last two decades, or more. Your trustees decided that the time had come to recognize the impairment of value in these securities by selling them and reinvesting the proceeds in securities more appropriate for this fund.

Expenses this year were up 2.2%.

## **Restricted Funds:**

The Emick Scholarship Fund distributed \$5,000.00 for scholarships this year. Its Fund Equity was \$75,859.00 as of April 30, 1987.

The Stephen C. Houghton Trust made an additional \$28,000.00 payment to this Fund in 1987. These monies are given to the Grand Lodge for the purpose of funding the care, maintenance and education of orphan children. The monies are invested in short-term obligations; and, as of April 30, 1987, the fund totaled \$132,857.00. To date, none of these funds have been disbursed.

## Nebraska Masonic Home:

Home operating expenses were up 5.1% (\$73,337.00) and totaled \$1,503,180.00.

Home revenues before transfers from the Endowment Fund were up \$85,250.00, a 10.5% increase.

Home operating deficit was \$609,067.00, and was again covered by transfers from the Endowment Fund.

Endowment Fund Investment income was down 1.6%, reflecting lower interest rates. The Endowment Fund Equity was up 7.9%.

The Grand Master thereupon called for a vote on the recommendations contained in his printed address previously submitted to the Grand Lodge.

M:W: Charles W. Amidon, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, offered the report of the Jurisprudence Committee on the Grand Master's recommendations.

A discussion of parliamentary procedure followed.

M:W: Harry A. Spencer, Past Grand Master, objected to any member's submitting more than one vote, whether in person or by proxy.

The Deputy Grand Master assumed the East to preside.

Following discussion of parliamentary procedure, the Deputy Grand Master announced the ruling that the chair would not recognize any written proxy. Vote would be by hand or voice as the Deputy Grand Master determined.

- M.:W.: Bevin B. Bump protested the ruling, asserting that there is no limit to the number of proxies one person can hold.
- M:W: Donald R. Swanson recommended that a vote be taken by written ballot, using blank yellow ballot forms.

The Grand Master having appointed a parliamentary committee consisting of M : W : Hugh W. Eisenhart, M : W : Jack H. Hendrix, and M : W : W. Warren D. Lichty, Jr., all Past Grand Masters. The Deputy Grand Master referred the question of the number of proxies one delegate to the Grand Lodge could vote to the committee on parliamentary procedure.

Pending report of the committee on parliamentary procedure, the Grand Lodge proceeded with receiving of committee reports.

### COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

Your Committee On Work begs to make the following report of its activities for the year 1986-1987:

Following the directive of the Grand Lodge relative to the publishing of a code book of our work, the Committee, together with the Grand Custodian and Junior Past Grand Master, spent many days revising and correcting what was known as A King Solomon edition of our Nebraska work and available to interested brethren in certain book stores.

This edition was full of errors, all of which had to be corrected. After proof reading and revision, the Committee submitted to the printing company the corrected revision and entered into a contract with them for exclusive distribution in Nebraska; but, only through Grand Lodge. At this writing, it is hoped that the new code book will be available at this Grand Lodge session for a nominal cost to those desiring a copy.

The Grand Custodian referred to the Committee his recommendation for the appointment of Brother Gordon E. Richards as a Deputy Custodian to replace Brother Kenneth G. Fleming in District 31, who resigned upon his appointment as Grand Marshal of the Grand Lodge. We concurred in this recommendation; and we referred the matter to the Grand Master for his consideration, with the further recommendation that Brother Richards be commissioned.

No other matters were referred to the Committee.

## COMMITTEE ON MASONIC RELIEF

Your Committee on Masonic Relief reports that Mrs. Zelda Mead, widow of H.A. Mead (who died in 1958), is receiving \$25.00 per month assistance, and has done so since the late 50's. Your Committee has done some research in locating Mrs. Mead and determining her present health condition. We found that she has been in Hillhaven Care Center in Omaha since 1982. She has had a leg amputated, plus two other major surgeries, and is confined to a wheelchair. The Grand Lodge records on Masonic Relief can not be located since the move, and no one seems to know how or why she started receiving this assistance. We have, however, been informed that she still is in need of it; and that she gets a small VA pension, Social Security, and Medicaid. Attached to this report are several communications in regard to Mrs. Mead.

During the year we have not received any new requests for assistance. We are very thankful to the Good Lord that the Masons of this State are able to care for themselves and their families. We thank the Grand Master for appointing us on the Committee and we stand ready to serve when requested to do so.

This Committee is charged with the duty to observe and review the workings of the Grand Lodge Offices and to proceed pursuant to Section 1-321 of the bylaws of the Grand Lodge with whatever is necessary to improve the efficiency of the offices for the benefit of Nebraska Freemasonry. The Committee met with the Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, the Finance Committee and the Appropriations committee at various times throughout the year.

The Committee was busy with the transition of Grand Lodge Secretaries, the maintenance of the computer and the review of personnel. The Grand Lodge Office continues to be a pleasant and friendly front door to Nebraska Masonry. The many people who have visited the office have been quite impressed by the image projected and the numerous services that can be provided to the Masons of Nebraska and the public. If you have not visited the office, please take time, when you are in Lincoln, to do so, and become acquainted with the staff.

During the past year, the Office Committee was authorized to investigate the possibility of suing CD Systems of Omaha, Nebraska, through whom the Honeywell Computer, software and programming had been purchased. Those findings and documents are being turned over to Brother J. L. Spray, a Lincoln attorney and present Master of Lincoln Lodge No. 19, for his recommendation as to the filing of a law suit against CD Systems.

Shortly after the beginning of 1987, Computer Wholesalers of Lincoln did some routine maintenance on the present computer system. In that routine maintenance, they failed to turn off the computer system; and they wiped out all of the memory on the computer. Fortunately, we had the majority of information on back-up discs; however, we had to reconstruct the computer programs. This information and documentation is also being referred to Brother J. L. Spray for his recommendation as to the feasibility of recovering the costs incurred from Computer Wholesalers.

The Office Committee, through W : B : Don Andrews, was able to retrieve the membership information that was on the old Honeywell Computer System, and he placed it on the present ITT System. This has greatly aided the office in assisting local Secretary's with requested information.

The Office Committee continued to have watts lines placed in the Grand Secretary's home, in the Grand Lodge office and in the Grand Master's home. The Committee has determined that, in the past, this type of service has been beneficial to those with the watts lines in contacting the membership throughout the state.

Shortly after the first of the year, our Office Manager, Jerry Sharp, resigned. The Committee had worked very closely with Jerry, and was sorry to see that someone with her ability and knowledge was no longer with the Grand Lodge. The committee did meet with the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Officers to find a replacement for Jerry Sharp. In doing so, we had numerous responses from Masons and non-Masons; and through the interview process, reduced the number to six very qualified candidates. We were pleased to have available to us these candidates, and it was a difficult decision to pick one out of the six. We did, however, employ Darrell Christensen as the new Office Manager. Darrell brings to the job his 30 years experience as a manager with IBM; his membership in Lancaster Lodge No. 54, being Past Master of his Lodge; and his extensive work with Job's Daughters throughout

the State. If you have not already had contact with Darrell, you will find that he is a very pleasant and a very knowledgeable individual.

The Committee invites all Masons to not only visit and contact the Grand Lodge Office for the types of services that can be provided to Masons and the public, but also to communicate to the Chairman, or any of its members, their suggestions, advice or questions.

## LODGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

In March of 1986, one member of the Committee, accompanied by the Grand Master, visited Gothenburg Lodge No. 249 in response to its request to consolidate with Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 in North Platte. The Committee received the impression that the local members of the Lodge were of one mind to consolidate.

Following this meeting, the Grand Master wrote a personal letter to each member of the Lodge, asking, specifically, if any member were willing to accept an officer; or, at least, a committee assignment, in an attempt to salvage what could have been a most important link in the chain of lodges spreading across the State. The results of this survey revealed less than fifteen members who indicated an interest in saving the lodge; and, only two of these were willing to accept an office.

The Grand Master, therefore, reluctantly approved consolidation with Platte Valley No. 32.

Another Lodge, Western No. 140, also has been experiencing problems and was considering consolidation. A member of the Lodge Advisory Committee met with the officers in March of 1987, and reported that interest in continuing the Lodge is still apparent; and, the officers are seriously working to salvage a lodge which has been in existence for one hundred and two years.

#### MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

This report on Masonic Education deals only with the time table, beginning with the installation of Grand Lodge officers on December 6, 1986, to the end of the Grand Lodge fiscal year, April 30, 1987.

The personnel of the Education Committee was changed from a committee made up of Grand Lodge Officers to Past Masters of various lodges, with emphasis on "Masonology".

The new "Officers Manual" was printed and distributed. Its purpose

was to enable all to learn more about Masonry; then, inspire us to use that knowledge for the good of ourselves, our lodge brothers, and the community in which we live.

The Manual was issued in a three-ring, loose-leaf notebook. It was indexed for Education, Officers' Duties, Committees, Programs, Degree Work, Special Events, Charities and Miscellaneous. The Manual was the result of contributions from many Masonic members, material from other Masonic jurisdictions, and careful editing to develop a planning program for Nebraska Masonic leadership.

Distribution of the Manuals began immediately after the December 6, 1986 installation of Grand Lodge Officers. One copy was given, without charge, to each Worshipful Master of a Nebraska Lodge, with extra copies available at \$5.00 each. Copies may be ordered from the office of the Grand Secretary.

Besides the Grand Lodge Education Committee, others helped to make up Educational Representatives, who assisted in contributing to the Manual; and also helped to organize area meetings within the State. These Brothers and their lodge numbers were: Keith E. Winheim, #1; Richard S. Goble and Arnold F. Mains, #15; John Weidner, #33; T. Leo Stines, #36; Steve Pitman, #50; Ben Fussell, #79; Don R. Monnette, #105; Dean Hunter, #128; Frank Balderson, #183; Roy G. Hart, #228; Robert L. Little, #240; Randy Eatmon, #294; Don D. Bartelt #318; and Alex S. Swiatek, #314;

Area meetings were held in Omaha, Lincoln, Oakland, Humboldt, Auburn, Fremont, Geneva, Grand Island, Lexington, McCook and Bridgeport. Attendance at the meetings was good, and discussion was stimulating and healthy. Approximately, as many Manuals were purchased as were given to the Masters. Additional educational material was displayed. Monitors, Masonic Service Association booklets and Nebraska literature were distributed. Several Manuals were delivered to individual lodges, where travel permitted, while the balance was mailed to the Masters of the lodges.

In arranging times for area meetings, it was found that most regular meetings were held in the first two weeks of the month, with school athletic events on the weekends. Two very well attended Sunday afternoon meetings were held at Geneva and McCook.

In comparing the Nebraska Education's program with other states, it was found that Nebraska lacks a structure to produce, distribute and assist lodges in working with educational programs. Missouri, for instance, elects, not appoints, an Education Officer in each lodge. Then, they have Deputy Grand Masters, each of whom has area supervision on education; then, an Education Chairman of Grand Lodge status overall.

We have in Nebraska, a structure in our ritual work, consisting of a Grand Custodian and 37 Deputy Grand Custodians; each with from 5 to 7 lodges under his supervision.

Nebraska is a big State. There is interest in receiving Masonic education in Nebraska. We should, perhaps, consider a long-range planning committee to develop a state-wide system of organized dispensation of materials and help to our individual lodges under a deputy system. Most states have organized area Masons; one set in charge of ritual, and the other in charge of Masonic Education.

A regular, quarterly publication of the Nebraska Freemason could be an excellent source of Masonic information and education. The Nebraska Masons should be kept informed of Masonic programs, activities and the doings of the Grand Lodge officers. Such a publication would help instill pride in belonging to Nebraska Masonry.

The eventual publication of a cypher and the printed material, to aid the Entered Apprentice, the Fellow Craft and the Master Mason to prove up in his work, will also assist in the coaching of the candidates. The new plan of the Grand Custodian of certifying degree by degree, and awarding of certificates for each degree, is expected to improve the quality and pride in ritualistic work. The aim is for certified Masons in every lodge in Nebraska.

The Grand Lodge Education Committee welcomes the receipt of educational materials from interested Masons, who will share successful ventures and programs, as well as your comments and criticisms.

M∴W∴B∴ Pierce delivered a supplemental verbal report that follows:

M∴W∴ Grand Master, Brethren: When we started this work, we could not put it into effect until December 6th. There were not enough men on the committee to try to disseminate some of the information. Now, we are limited to a number of six on our committee; so,I ask if we could not have an additional group of people, and call them "Educational Representatives".

I was given permission, and I have 16 "Educational Representatives".

I have used part of them to help us put together the "Officer's Manual", which appears to be well received. We have sold as many as we have given away, one to each lodge. These 16 people have helped me put it together, and they also helped in arranging for meetings at different places in the State.

You must understand that the Education Committee has no structure such as the Custodians have, with 37 about the state, each with several lodges.

Whether we want to work toward that, or not, remains to be seen; our good Brother from Missouri tells us how they do it there.

In the state of Kansas, there are 63 Deputy Grand Masters, who are in charge of the educational work. They have areas just like we have of our Custodians in Nebraska.

Our Brother from Missouri said that they have the same number in the

Educational as they have in their Custodial work. He says that he thinks that they can cut that down some. They are having larger meetings, and people are traveling farther to these places. The educational work should be directed, as he has told us just an hour or so ago, to the Junior and Senior Wardens. Those men who are preparing to go up.

The book that we put out contains two things. One is the kind of administration we could have to develop leadership within out different officers and the duties they could perform. The second was to try to provide a program.

In some of our states that are quite sophisticated, they will have one man just on the training of men on how to conduct a meeting - how to administrate. They will have another man teaching just education.

We are a long ways from that.

Whether we want to work to that, or not, depends upon the manpower and our budget.

I do appreciate all of you who have attended these area meetings, and who have made some contribution; so, now, I want to say that we are open to suggestions to any kind of work that you would like to present to us on education.

# ROSCOE POUND LODGE FOR RESEARCH and NEBRASKA SOCIETY FOR RESEARCH

I am pleased to report to you and this Grand Lodge, that the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research and Roscoe Pound Lodge of Research No. 329, have amply satisfied their duties and responsibilities as set forth in their Charter from this Grand Lodge.

The Society continues to collect and preserve artifacts and memorabilia of the history of Freemasonry in the grand jurisdiction. The materials on display at this session represent only a small sample of the extent of the collection that has been entrusted to our care by subordinate lodges, appendant bodies, estates, and friends of the fraternity. As an example of the trust reposed in our work, we received word, only a few days ago, that a man who, after many years as a Freemason, chose to withdraw from the fraternity on the grounds of religious scruples. Nevertheless, he preferred that the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research take possession of his Masonic collection, rather than have it pass out of the hands of a Freemason.

As this Grand Lodge knows, the Society is the custodian of a vast amount of historical material formerly stored in the Grand Lodge Archives. With the dedication of Bro. J. Eugene P. Jorgensen, as curator, books are rebound; documents preserved against the deterioration of time; and artifacts are refurbished. Last year, the Grand Lodge approved a grant of funds with which the Society was able to purchase display cases. The display cases were essential for proper display and protection of items. With the support of our subscribing members, we purchased additional chemicals which are necessary for the neutralizing of acid in paper, so that old documents can be preserved. Our members thank the Grand Lodge, and hope that the Society shall continue to merit the approbation of the members.

In the past year, the Society and Roscoe Pound Lodge have also conducted table lodges in hosting lodges whereat we have presented programs of interest. Bro. Jorgensen has also made himself available as a guest speaker at several Masonic functions. Although, we do not devote our fiscal resources to publishing books and papers, I wish to bring to your attention the fact that Bro. Thomas F. Simpson, Jr., prepared a comprehensive reference manual on the legal issues relative to lodges of research and nonprofit Masonic organizations. This manual was acknowledged by the Masonic Service Association as a significant contribution to Masonic research, and its availability through our organization was noted in their future publication. We believe that Bro. Simpson is a foremost authority on legal issues relative to Masonic organizations. One of our members, Bro. Jeffrey Cook of Illinois, also prepared an article that was published in "Knight Templar" magazine. Finally, Bro. Lynn Alexander's report of the proceedings of the 129th communication of this Grand Lodge, in the newsletter of the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research, was quoted in some detail in The Masonic Review of the Southern California Lodge of Research. That research lodge being the largest in this Country.

A development of significance in the last year is our ability to provide research information to subordinate lodges of this jurisdiction. Forwarded to us through the office of the Grand Secretary, requests were made to us for specific information. In one case, a subordinate lodge requested information as to who their past masters were. The lodge was very old; but we were able to provide considerable detailed information, identifying several past masters

dating back to the late 1800's. In another request, a lodge requested information as to which year in their history they were most active. Researching information in our archives, we were able to give the lodge, numbers of initiations, passings, and raisings, as well as total members for nearly every year of their history.

Obviously, our work demands considerable contributions of time, space and hard work. Our thanks are extended to Bro. J. Eugene P. Jorgensen for serving as our treasurer, curator and principal work horse; to the office manager of the Grand Lodge, W. Bro. Darrell Christenson, for his generous cooperation with every request; to the East Lincoln Lodge No. 210, where space is provided for our display and storage; and, also, for storage space provided by the Scottish Rite Temple in Lincoln; and to the Masonic Temple Association in Lincoln, representing lodges 300, 19, and 54; as well as the York Rite and Eastern Star bodies at that temple.

Our research organizations need to grow with new members, but many Masons do not consider themselves to be scholarly or research types. I want to emphasize, however, that any Mason who believes that our work is good for Freemasonry is invited to join. For many reasons, membership in the Society may be tax deductible. The same could be true of any contribution to our work.

Our goals are to collect and preserve Masonic historical information and artifacts; to distribute information to our members; and to make that information available to any person or group, with the intent that this work shall be of benefit to this fraternity. These mission we have accomplished. Therefore, I can report, as I did last year, that Masonic research in Nebraska is alive and well; and the Nebraska Society for Masonic Research continues to be a faithful trustee of the continued support of this Grand Lodge.

### COMMITTEE ON PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

On the question of how many votes a person holding a proxy could cast, the Committee reported that the language of the bylaws with the words "proxies" and "representatives", is ambiguous as to whether one person is entitled to only one vote, whether, as a delegate, or as a proxy; or, if one person can hold proxies for one or more persons, and vote multiple proxies, as well as vote the personal vote as a member of the Grand Lodge. The Committee reported that, since it was apparent that many persons held more than one proxy and were also qualified to vote as members of the Grand Lodge, the amicable decision of the Committee was that all members of the Grand Lodge should be entitled to cast a personal vote; and all persons holding proxies approved by the Credentials Committee should be entitled to vote such proxies. Further, the vote should be by blank, yellow ballots.

The Committee further recommended additional discussion as to the question of whether one person can cast more than one vote, whether as a member of the Grand Lodge, or as proxy, and clarification of the bylaws on that point.

# GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

The Committee met on Thursday, June 11, 1987, and reviewed the following decisions contained in the supplementary report of the 1985-86 Grand Master, as listed on pages 101 and 102 of the 1986 Book of Proceedings:

- In response to an inquiry from East Lincoln Lodge No. 210, I
  ruled that a Brother who had been raised in 1925, but had been
  suspended for a period of seven years since that time, would not
  be eligible for a 60-year pin until he had completed sixty years of
  membership in good standing. Ruled this was an interpretation of
  Law and was approved.
- Gave permission for the Masters and Wardens Club of Omaha to solicit all lodges in the state for financial support to the annual Christmas Celebration for the residents of the Nebraska Masonic Home at Plattsmouth.
- 3. Approved after deleting,..."and it was my interpretation this included the full Questions and Answers."
- 4. Stella Lodge No. 105 was advised that a suspension of a Stella member for Masonic Offenses by the state of Arkansas, imposed while the member was residing in Arkansas, was binding upon Stella Lodge also. Approved
- 5. I granted permission to Highland Lodge No. 194 to hold a "consignment sale" as a means of raising much needed operating funds for the Lodge. Ruled a "permission", no action needed.
- 6. Granted permission to Ashlar lodge No. 33 to solicit subordinate lodges within a one hundred mile radius of Grand Island for the purpose of securing contributions to the Annual Food Truck Project to benefit the Nebraska Masonic Home. Ruled at "permission", no action needed.
- 7. North Bend Lodge No. 119 asked if, under the provisions of Sec. 2-610, it would be permissible to establish a Scholarship Fund to be used for local teachers continuing education. I ruled this would be permissible, but to provide the Grand Lodge with a detailed format before engaging in such a project. Approved.

Taking into account the above deletion, M:W: Charles W. Amidon, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, reported the above were each approved by the Committee.

The Committee also reviewed the dispensations of the 1986-87 Grand Master, and reported as follows:

### DISPENSATIONS

- To Miloma Lodge No. 328, to move its Charter to the West Omaha Masonic Temple for the purpose of installation of officers, due to limited seating capacity of its own lodge room. Approved
- To Platte Valley Lodge No. 32, to move its Charter to the Holiday Inn for purposes of installing Grand Lodge Officers on December 6, 1986. Approved.

Each of the Dispensations granted by the 1986-87 Grand Master was reviewed and approved, as follows:

### SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS

- 1. Granted Blue Valley Lodge #64, Wilbur, permission to confer Master Mason's degree out of time.
- 2. Granted Bennett Lodge permission to install officers on December 30, 1987. Father of Master was here from Arizona.
- Granted Fremont Lodge permission to confer Master Mason's degree with Nebraska work on candidate in Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.
- 4. Granted Tekamah Lodge permission to confer Master's degree with Nebraska work in Clovis, New Mexico.
- 5. Granted permission to Plate Valley Lodge #32 to move their charter to new temple.
- Granted permission to Robert W. Furnas Lodge #265 to confer E.A., F.C. and Masters Degrees on same day. Candidate going into service.
- 7. Granted special dispensation to Fremont Lodge #15 to attend church services as a group.
- 8. Granted special permission to Alliance Lodge #183 to participate in the City Parade the 3rd weekend of July.

The Jurisprudence Committee reviewed the Recommendations of the 1986-87 Grand Master and recommended action on each Recommendation as

follows:

### GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

### 1. Liability Insurance

With the fact that many lodges and temple craft organizations carry separate liability insurance in addition to that required by the Grand Lodge, and with the ever-rising cost of liability insurance premiums, it is only reasonable to offer the subordinate lodges the opportunity to elect to carry their own insurance, be covered by the Grand Lodge policy, or both.

I therefore recommend the following bylaw amendment:

Section 1-201.02 be amended to read as follows:

The Grand Lodge shall purchase a policy or policies of comprehensive public liability and property damage insurance, in the amount of \$1,000,000 public liability and \$250,000 property damage liability, such insurance to cover those subordinate lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction, which elect to be covered by this policy, and provide proof of their own insurance policies, showing the Grand Lodge as a named insured. Any Lodge electing to be covered by the Grand Lodge policy, and any Lodge not providing proof of separate insurance, shall be covered by the Grand Lodge policy; and shall pay, annually, to the Grand Lodge, its share of such cost in proportion to its membership, upon presentation to the subordinate lodge of a statement of such cost.

The Committee was unanimous in its opinion that allowing subordinate lodges the option of whether to be included in the blanket Grand Lodge policy would place the Grand Lodge in a precarious position as to its liability in the event of a suit; as, it would be almost impossible to keep track of which subordinate lodge had its own coverage in effect. For this reason, the Committee voted NOT to approve this recommendation. (When the issue was brought to the floor of the Lodge, much discussion prevailed and the Grand Master withdrew his motion to consider recommendation No. 1.)

## 2. Fiscal Year; Annual Communication; Installation

At present, even though the Grand Master's term is coordinated with those of the newly installed officers of the subordinate lodges, the June Annual Communication preempts a major portion of the time; and effort of the Grand Master in April, May and June. This hampers efforts of the Grand Master to carry forth his program, and presents fiscal problems, inasmuch as the current fiscal year of Grand Lodge runs from May 1st to April 30th. A

calendar year would bring the finances more in line with the actual term of the Grand Master and would also coordinate with the proposal as to the Annual Communication. Preparation would then be possible as to a calendar-year budget rather than the current split year; a Grand Master would be able to prepare for his Annual Communication at the end of his term and at the end of the term of office of the Masters of the subordinate lodges who work throughout the year with him. It should be further noted that the Internal Revenue Service is in the process of requiring all trusts and charitable non-taxable entities to report on a calendar year basis. Inasmuch as we will be required to so comply to make our reporting, our fiscal year should be changed to a calendar year for all purposes.

For these and other reasons, it is the recommendation of your Grand Master that:

- a. The current fiscal year of Grand Lodge be changed to a calendar year, beginning January 1, 1988.
- b. That section 1-101 be amended to read as follows:

Section 1-101 — ANNUAL COMMUNICATIONS.

The stated Annual Communications of the Grand Lodge shall be held at such place as shall be designated by the Grand Master with the approval of the Grand Lodge, beginning on the first Friday of February, and at such hour as the Grand Master may designate. A Master Masons Lodge shall first be opened. If representatives of the constitutional number of seven subordinate lodges be found present, the Grand Lodge shall be declared open for the transaction of business, and the Grand Master shall announce all necessary appointments, and fill vacancies in the standing committees.

c. That there be added to the bylaws of Grand Lodge, a new section dealing with installation; and requiring that installation be held on or before fourteen days following the close of the Annual Communication, at a time and place selected by the newly elected Grand Master.

I therefore recommend the insertion of the following:

Section 1-101.01 — INSTALLATION

Installation of Grand Lodge Officers shall take place on or before fourteen (14) days following the close of the Annual Communication at such location, time and date as the Grand Master elect shall select, which shall be announced prior to the close of such Annual Communication. The Committee reported this Recommendation should <u>NOT</u> be approved.

The Deputy Grand Master submitted Recommendation 2 to a vote by ballot. The ballot resulted in a vote of 326 FOR the Recommendation, and 76 votes AGAINST. The Deputy Grand Master declared Recommendation 2 Adopted.

### 3. Assistant Grand Secretary

With the day-to-day administration of the Grand Lodge being performed by an office manager, and the need to communicate with other Grand Jurisdictions, it is necessary to give a title to the office manager.

I therefore recommend that the following section be added to the bylaws:

Section 1-201.03. The office manager shall have the title of Assistant Grand Secretary and shall be entitled to use said title in all correspondence and other matters pertinent to the execution of his duties as office manager.

The Committee recommended this Recommendation <u>NOT</u> be approved. After brief discussion, a ballot resulted in 151 votes FOR and 245 AGAINST the Recommendation. The Deputy Grand Master declared Recommendation 3 rejected.

### 4. Abolish Committee on Reinstatements

It is the desire of the Grand Master to abolish the Committee on Applications for Reinstatement and leave the sole discretion on reinstatement to the subordinate lodge and the Grand Master, without the necessity of circulating said matters to a committee of three, who merely make recommendation to the Grand Master. This causes delay in authorization of reinstatement which should be the primary responsibility of the subordinate lodge. It is therefore recommended that Section 1-312 be abolished, and that Section 3-911 be amended by striking the last sentence thereof, which language is as follows:

"To assist the Grand Master in arriving at such understanding, he shall appoint a standing committee of three, advisory to the Grand Master, to which the application and all matters pertaining thereto shall be referred. Such committee shall secure such other information as, in its discretion, may be deemed advisable, and report to the Grand Master its recommendation.:

The Committee recommended that this Recommendation be approved. After brief discussion, the ballot resulted in 357 votes

FOR and 24 votes AGAINST the Recommendation. The Deputy Grand Master declared the Recommendation Adopted.

### 5. Per Diem of Grand Custodians

Because of the cost of travel and to retain qualified Deputy Grand Custodians, I would recommend an increase in the sum received by the Deputies for conducting schools of instruction.

I recommend that Section 1-202 of the bylaws be amended to:

Delete "...the sum of Five Dollars per day..."

Add "...the sum of Fifteen Dollars per day..."

The Committee recommended approval of this Recommendation. The ballot resulted in 366 votes FOR and 21 votes AGAINST the Recommendation. The Deputy Grand Master declared the Recommendation Adopted.

# 6. Merging of the Committee on Finance and the Committee on Appropriations

Like every Grand Master who has gone before me, I have been concerned with proper accountability of the funds of Grand Lodge. In that regard, I specifically appointed Most Worshipful Brother Donald Swanson, PGM, to do an independent audit of all funds received and disbursed by the Grand Lodge Office since moving of the office to Lincoln and establishment of our present automated accounting system. His report, presented in writing and orally to all of the Grand Lodge Line Officers, Finance Committee and Appropriations Committee, has assured us that every dollar received has been accounted for and recorded. Disbursement of funds has also been accounted for and recorded in a manner which leaves proper accounting trails.

Since the accounting system is now automated, has been tested, and can be tracked on a daily basis if necessary, certain modernization of our present cumbersome methods of budgeting and accountability are appropriate. Our present methods, established in the law years ago to serve the now antiquated methods which were then in operation, are outdated.

In that regard I recommend that Sections 1-318 and 1-326 of the bylaws be rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

Section 1-318 — BUDGET AND FINANCE

The Committee on Budget and Finance shall consist of five members, each to serve for a period of five years, and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, and Grand Secretary may not be appointed to or serve as a member of this committee. In case of a vacancy on the committee, the Grand Master shall immediately appoint a member to fill such unexpired term. It shall be the duty of this committee to: (1) Fix the amounts to be budgeted to carry on the functions of the Grand Lodge; (2) Present this annual budget to the Grand Lodge for approval; (3) Monitor expenditures made to insure they are properly vouchered and within budgetary limits; and (4) Report to the Grand Lodge any expenditures, which may have been made, which do not properly fall within previously approved or adjusted budgetary limitations.

In the exercise of its duties, this committee has authority to modify specific line item budgetary limitations previously approved by the Grand lodge, PROVIDED the overall expenditure budget limitations are not exceeded. In cases of emergency or unforeseen requirements, the committee may increase the overall expenditure budget limitations between sessions of the Grand Lodge to the extent of such necessity or requirements, provided, however, that such action must be approved in writing by a majority of the four ranking officers of the Grand Lodge. The committee shall have authority to employ a certified public accountant at the expense of the Grand Lodge, if, in the judgement of the committee and the Grand Master, it shall be deemed necessary.

In setting the annual budget for Grand Lodge, this committee should be furnished a request in writing from the individual or committee requesting consideration for funds. The committee may hold open hearings on such requests at which time any member of the Grand Lodge may appear and be heard.

The Committee disapproved this Recommendation. The ballot resulted in 89 votes FOR and 302 votes AGAINST this Recommendation. The Deputy Grand Master declared the Recommendation rejected.

Each of the Constitution and bylaw Resolutions submitted at the 1986 Grand Lodge Annual Communication was reviewed in detail, and the Jurisprudence Committee made the following recommendation with respect to each.

### 1. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II

Be it resolved that article II be amended to include all Past

Masters as permanent members of the Grand Lodge.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II:

This amendment was mailed to each subordinate lodge on December 6, 1986, with instructions for each Lodge to ballot on whether to allow the question to be brought to the floor of the 1987 Grand Lodge Communication for consideration. Certified results were directed to be returned prior to April 1, 1987. The Grand Master ruled insufficient returns were received by the April 1, 1987, deadline as required by Law; therefore, the Amendment could not be considered. The Jurisprudence Committee approved the Grand Masters ruling and the issue was omitted from voting.

### 2. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III

The Grand Lodge shall hold a regular communication annually in the city of Kearney, Nebraska, unless unavailable; then, such place as designated by the Grand Master, with the approval of the Grand Lodge, provided that it is geographically centrally located.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III

The 1986-87 Grand Master ruled the original resolution contained only two valid signatures of "Members" and therefore was out of form. The Jurisprudence Committee approved the Grand Master's ruling and the item was not submitted for consideration.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 1**

Be it resolved that the Grand Lodge Provide a prepaid life membership program for the voluntary participation of all Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Nebraska.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 1**

The Committee recommended that this Resolution NOT be approved, and that the Grand Master appoint a committee to study the issue and bring back a full report at the next Annual Communication. (A floor vote resulted in 118 FOR and 271 AGAINST the Resolution.)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 2**

Be it resolved that no one shall serve on more than one standing committee at one and the same time in that this Grand Lodge.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 2.**

The Committee recommended that this Resolution NOT be approved. (A floor vote resulted in 251 FOR and 133 AGAINST, which did not meet the 2/3 majority requirement.)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 3**

Be it resolved that no new Grand Custodian or Deputy Grand Custodian be appointed until approved by the Committee on Work.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 3**

The Committee recommended this Resolution NOT be approved. (A floor vote resulted in 106 FOR and 103 AGAINST, which did not meet the 2/3 majority requirement.)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 4**

Be it resolved that the Nebraska Freemason be returned to the control of the Grand Lodge as a responsibility of the Grand Secretary.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 4**

The Committee recommended this Resolution NOT be approved. (A floor vote resulted in 88 FOR and 127 AGAINST.)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 5**

Be it resolved that the Grand Secretary shall be in charge and responsible for all operations of the Grand Lodge Office including hiring of all employees.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 5**

The Committee reported the duties of the Grand Secretary are clearly defined in the present bylaws and, therefore, recommended that this Resolution NOT be approved. ( A floor vote resulted in 74 FOR and 142 AGAINST.)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 6**

Be it resolved that the Grand Secretary and the Grand Custodian be restored as full time salaried employees of this Grand Lodge.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 6**

The Committee recommended that this Resolution NOT be

approved. ( A floor vote resulted in 70 FOR and 136 AGAINST.)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 7**

Be it resolved that installation of Grand Lodge Officers shall always be immediately following the Grand Lodge Annual communication in June of each year.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 7**

(Supercede by passage of Grand Master's Recommendation No. 2 and removed from balloting.)

### YOUTH COMMITTEE

In 1986, this Grand Lodge awarded scholarships to: Miss Kathy Kempf of Job's Daughters, Miss Carolyn Sirk of Rainbow and Dan Sidner of DeMolay. Each of these young people was an outstanding representative of his or her organization. In addition, funds were contributed to each of these organizations to further either scholastic or training ends. The amounts thus contributed have been spread much farther than one might expect, as they are well cared for by those responsible.

The story of our youth groups continues to be somewhat discouraging. As one attends their annual meetings, the attendance is declining; but more alarming, the adult attendance and participation is declining much more drastically. We have that handful of good and faithful servants trying to keep these outstanding organizations alive for a fine group of young people, but they need help. They need our presence, not our presents; our active participation and positive reinforcement; not our words of wisdom from atop the mountain, or from afar off. At the present rate of decline in participation, the time is rapidly approaching when the three groups will be able to hold their annual conventions together in a small closet, and we will have no one to blame but ourselves, if there are any of us left to blame; for, we must remember that our numbers, too, are rapidly declining. The unfortunate thing is that many young people in today's society who are looking for the very things that these organizations offer; and, ultimately, the things Masonry offers. It just takes time, patience and perseverance to obtain them.

The good news is our young people still are enthusiastic. They still hold Masonry in high regard. The challenge is there, brethren. All that remains to be done is to accept it.

### **COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES**

By M.: W.: Frank J. Mattoon, Past Grand Master, Chairman

Your Committee on Grievances, in pursuance of the Order of the Grand Master, reports to this Grand Lodge that the only case submitted to the Committee involves an appeal from the Findings and Order of the Trial Commission entered in the case of Springfield Lodge No. 112, Springfield, Nebraska, Complainant, vs. James A. Morrison, Respondent.

The facts of this case are virtually undisputed. A brief "abstract of memorandum" is hereby made for reference purposes (Section 1-316 G. L. bylaws).

Respondent petitioned John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290 for initiation. Initially, the petition was accepted, but an objection was filed a few days after the initial acceptance. This was duly reported to the Lodge and the petition was rejected. Sometime later (approximately 7 months) Respondent petitioned Springfield Lodge No. 112 for initiation and failed to disclose the action to Mercer Lodge, although Respondent had previously been notified of such action. Further, the petition as presented to Springfield did not contain two signatures of Master Masons of Springfield Lodge.

Charges were filed by Springfield, alleging misconduct of Respondent in (1) failure to disclose the prior rejection; and (2) the petition did not contain the required signatures of recommendation. The third charge was an alleged violation of Section 3-102(a) of the bylaws of the Grand Lodge.

The evidence introduced at the trial supports the findings and actions of the Order of the Trial Commission — that Springfield had no jurisdiction over the candidate; and, further, Springfield should not have conferred the degrees of Masonry, inasmuch as the petition presented to Springfield had only one signature of recommendation. The Trial Commission further concluded that the charges could not be considered or acted upon by the Trial Commission for lack of jurisdiction and the fact that the Respondent "was never a legally constituted Mason\*\*\*".

An appeal was filed by a Masonic Brother acting as counsel for Respondent. Thereafter, Springfield Lodge filed an "amendment/appeal" which was summarily overruled by the Grand Master on March 2, 1987.

Also, extraneous matters outside the record of the proceedings were filed either with the office of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master. The Committee on Grievances considered all of the evidence completely and thoroughly, as well as the opinion, Findings and Order of the Trial Commission and all relevant factors.

Therefore, your Committee on Grievances is of the opinion and recommends:

- 1. That the Findings and Order of the Trial Commission should be approved, and the charges against Respondent be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction of the matter in Springfield Lodge; and for the further reason, as stated in the Findings of the Trial Commission, that Respondent was never a "legally constituted Mason".
- That all extraneous matters filed in said case since the filing of the appeal of Respondent are irrelevant and should not be considered.
- 3. That the March 2, 1983, Ruling of the Grand Master relating to the amendment/appeal filed by Springfield Lodge under date of December 9, 1986, should be approved.

### PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS

1) That Section 2-99 of the bylaws of the Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows: "Advancement: no entered Apprentice Mason or

- Fellowcraft Mason shall receive the next succeeding degree until he shall have been declared proficient in such preceding degree as provided in Section 2-402." Proponent states that the amendment, if adopted, would eliminate the 28-day waiting period.
- 2) That Section 2-901 of the bylaws of the Grand Lodge be repealed. The proponent stated that Section 2-901 is the provision that deals with solicitation.
- 3) Amendment to Article 7 of the Constitution, that the paragraph be amended concerning the Grand Junior Warden to read "Grand Junior Warden be elected from the floor of the Grand Lodge on a separate ballot. The Grand Junior Warden will be recommended to the Brethren by a committee of not more than 15 and not less than nine Past Masters. The committee to be appointed across the State."
- 4) Amendment to Article 2 of the Constitution, Be it Resolved that Article 2 be amended to include all Past Masters as permanent members of the Grand Lodge.
- 5) Be it Resolved that at the 1984-85 Grand Lodge meeting in June of that year, in Lincoln, Nebraska, permission was granted to a committee to use the name of Nebraska Masonic Foundation for the purpose of building a new building in Lincoln, Nebraska. It is requested that the words "Nebraska Masonic" be deleted from its title.
- 6) Be it Resolved that 1-102 of the bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows and that the original of said section be repealed: "Section 1-102, Chartered Subordinate Lodges; How Represented. Each chartered subordinate lodge shall be represented at the Communication of the Grand Lodge by its Master and Wardens by their proxies thereunto appointed. Each subordinate lodge shall have three votes in the Grand Lodge which may be cast by its representatives present, provided that no one representative of a subordinate lodge may have more than one vote, nor hold a proxy for more than one subordinate lodge officer."
- 7) Be it Resolved that Article 2 of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge be amended to delete the words "such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges."
- 8) Be it Resolved that the following be deleted from the Nebraska Work: "The obligation you are about to take contains reference to certain physical penalties which are symbolic in nature and are intended only to impart the historical essence of fidelity."

### **MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**

M:W: Grand Master, Brethren. Your Membership Committee has been working in a somewhat new area to stimulate the individual Nebraska Masons to better communicate with non-Masons. We have been laboring, for a number of years, under an almost archaic thinking that you could not discuss Masonry with a non-Mason. Especially, unless he broached the subject.

We have many, many Masons within this Grand Jurisdiction, and within all Jurisdictions, who are not aware of what they can discuss with a non-Mason, and how to encourage that non-Mason, in one way or another, to ask the ultimate question. Now, in Nebraska, we are very familiar with fellowship dinners and fellowship functions, which are now legal in nearly all Grand Jurisdictions. There are about a dozen who frown on them. Five, I believe, who actually prohibit them.

We have discovered a publication called "100 Questions A Mason Can Answer For A Non-Mason." Not to be confused, this is not the publication that we have in our Grand Lodge, "100 Questions About Masonry," or the "101 Questions About Masonry", or the Masonic Service publication of the same name. This is a separate pamphlet. 100 questions that a Mason can answer for a non-Mason.

It answers such questions as: Can a Catholic join Masonry?; Is Masonry a religion?; What can I expect from Masonry?; What does Masonry want from me? It is the type of publication that can be left, actually, in the hands of a non-Mason. It is plain, good reading. And it is certainly an excellent communication and educational vehicle.

We have a letter, currently prepared, to go to all the Grand Masters of all the Grand Jurisdictions, and all the Grand Secretaries, to find what they have in this area, with the idea that we will publish a booklet of questions that a Mason can answer for a non-Mason. In fact, we have an angel who will finance the publication of this; and, after approval by the Grand Lodge, a possibility of sending it out, one copy to each Mason within the Grand Jurisdiction, as an enclosure with our Nebraska Free Mason, whenever it is published. This would be a vest pocket booklet. Upon approval, it could be stocked at the Grand Lodge level, but that method of distribution would get it in the hands of every Mason in the Jurisdiction and hopefully a significant number of them would read it and use it.

Now this lends itself to a second publication called, possibly, "So You Want Him To Ask." These are tips on the various things that you can do to get a man who, you feel, would make a good Mason to ask you about Masonry. Many of our members are very reluctant, even afraid, to discuss Masonry with non-Masons, but many non-Masons are equally afraid to discuss, to ask about Masonry to a Mason.

They feel that if I am a good enough man to be a Mason, somebody will

ask me. We have many, many potential brethren, potential candidates, who have never asked.

In my particular position with National Sojourners, I have discovered this repeatedly. We have a young man in Papillion Lodge, who last year took seven petitions from professional military men, active duty military men, aboard Offutt Air Force Base, just because he has a way of communicating. These people are proud. They won't ask, and we have the same problem.

If you went down a list in your home town of people you wanted to be a Masons, in many cases they are not going to ask you, unless you can find some way to communicate. So these two: first, "Questions A Mason Can Answer For A Non-Mason"; and secondly, if that is approved, published and distributed, a booklet, "So You Want Him To Ask."

And we are communicating with the other Jurisdictions to find out what they have in this area and use their expertise; and, hopefully, come up with a better product in Nebraska which will help turn the curve on our membership. Thank you, M : W : Sir.

### COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF LAW

That Section 1-101 of the bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows and that the original of said section be repealed:

Section 1-101-ANNUAL COMMUNICATIONS-The stated Annual Communications of the Grand Lodge shall be held at such place as shall be designated by the Grand Master with the approval of the Grand Lodge, beginning on the first Friday of February, and at such hour as the Grand Master may designate. A Master Masons' Lodge shall first be opened. If representatives of the constitutional number of seven subordinate lodges be found present, the Grand Lodge shall be declared open for the transaction of business; and the Grand Master shall announce all necessary appointments, and fill vacancies in the standing committees.

That a new Section shall be enacted and be added to the bylaws of this Grand Lodge to read as follows:

Section 1-101.01-INSTALLATION-Installation of Grand Lodge Officers shall take place on or before fourteen (14) days following the close of the Annual Communication at such location, time and date as the Grand Master elect shall select, which shall be announced prior to

the close of such Annual Communication.

That a new Section shall be enacted and placed in the bylaws of this Grand Lodge as follows:

Section 1-101.02-FISCAL YEAR-That the fiscal year for budgeting, finance and accounting shall be the calendar year, beginning January 1, 1988.

That Section 1-312 of the bylaws of this Grand Lodge relating to Applications for Reinstatement be repealed.

And that Section 1-301 of the bylaws be amended by striking the words "Applications for Reinstatement" in the list of Standing Committees; but, otherwise, said section shall remain unchanged.

That Section 3-911 of the bylaws of this Grand Lodge relating to reinstatement three years after suspension for nonpayment of dues be amended by striking the last sentence thereof, which reads as follows: "To assist the Grand Master in arriving at such understanding, he shall appoint a standing committee of three, advisory to the Grand Master; to which the application and all matters pertaining thereto shall be referred, and such committee shall secure such other information as in its discretion may be deemed advisable, and report to the Grand Master its recommendation." Otherwise, said Section shall remain unchanged.

That Section 1-201 of the bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to provide the sum of \$15.00 per day for Deputy Grand Custodians while conducting Schools of Instruction, rather than the \$5.00 per day now provided in said Section. Otherwise, said Section shall remain unchanged.

### **COMMITTEE ON REINSTATEMENTS**

Your Grand Lodge Committee on Reinstatements has received and acted favorably on twenty-four applications for reinstatement this past Masonic Year.

We have acted on applications from twenty different lodges throughout the State of Nebraska. It is very rewarding to see so many worthy Brethren again becoming active Masons in their respective Blue Lodges. As you know, they are needed.

In receiving the applications, we find that many of them are not complete. This, in many instances, causes undue delay in making a decision on the matter of reinstatement. When submitting Applications for Reinstatement, please see that sufficient information is reported in all sections of the Application.

### **COMMITTEE ON RETURNS**

Your Grand Lodge Committee on Returns dutifully delights in submitting the following report:

The Committee on Returns journeyed from Omaha to the Grand Lodge Office on Thursday, March 26, and examined the annual returns as submitted by the several Masonic Lodges under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

Although it was apparent that "Our cup runneth not over," yet, we rejoiced that our glass was "mostly filled." Of the 208 annual reports your committee examined, 141 were recorded as having understood the importance of observing the deadline date of February 10, and were received on or before that date. All but 19 were properly signed, and displayed the signatures of the Worshipful Masters. 206 returns had been properly signed by the Secretaries. 199 were embellished with the official seals of their respective lodges. 198 supplied the pertinent information requested concerning the holders of the Jordan Bronze Medals. 189 included a statement concerning the financial strength of their lodge, and seventeen were still occupied with the troublesome details of completing and forwarding their returns to the office of the Grand Lodge at the time of our inspections.

As an overall observation, with the few noted exceptions, the secretaries of the various lodges are to be commended on their efforts to provide this needed and highly informative report of the affairs of their lodges. The staff of workers at the offices of the Grand Lodge were very cooperative and accommodating and, we trust that our invasion of their work place did not unduly disrupt their routine.

Special commendation is offered to the following: to Sebert Stover for supplying records of the work of this committee when he was active in it; to R : W : R alph Gerry, who agreed to accompany the committee and to work with them. His knowledge and experience certainly served us extremely well and we are all grateful to him. To W : W as Suggs, who assumed the leadership of the committee, arranging with the Grand Office staff to have the returns available and clearing the date of our effort; arranging our transportation, the time and place of gathering, and really being the "Spark Plug" of the whole effort. To W : E ugene Fishback, for providing the use of Luxury Line and doing the driving, in order that we should have an enjoyable ride to and from Lincoln.

### GRAND ORATOR'S REMARKS

### **EXCELLENCE**

In discussing the principles and tenets of Free Masonry, the Illustrious Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council, Scottish Rite, Henry C. Clausen, described its mission as follows:

To seek that which is of most worth in the world;

To exalt the dignity of every person, the human side of our daily activities, and the maximum service to humanity;

To aid mankind's search in God's universe for identity, for development, and for destiny;

And thereby achieve better men in a better world, happier men in a happier world, and wiser men in a wiser world.

What a wonderful statement of mission. How compelling! How exhaustive a description of what the human life should be about! As I reflected on my remarks for this evening, I asked myself: "Have we found that which is of most worth? Do we, as a matter of course, treat all persons with dignity? Are we developing better men today? Happier men? Wiser men?" I was forced to conclude, and I'm sure you would agree, that we are falling short of our mark.

I asked myself, "What must we, as Masons, do if we wish to bring to fruition that wonderful, all-encompassing statement of mission and purpose?' The answer is simple. We must achieve <u>excellence</u> in all we do; and so, it is to that topic that I wish to address myself in the next few minutes.

A few years ago, John W. Gardner, the former secretary of HEW, wrote a book called <u>Excellence</u>. That book is now a landmark, and I would urge all here to read it. In that book, he said:

"We must recognize that there may be excellence or shoddiness in every line of human endeavor. We must learn to honor excellence in every socially accepted human activity, however humble the activity, and to scorn shoddiness, however exalted the activity. An excellent plumber is infinitely more admirable than an incompetent philosopher. The society that scorns excellence in plumbing, because plumbing is a humble activity, and tolerates shoddiness in philosophy, because it is an exalted activity, will have neither good plumbing nor good philosophy. Neither its pipes nor its theories will hold water."

Today, our Country is engaged in an economic war designed to maintain our economic superiority and maintain our way of life. Increasingly, we hear the term "competitiveness" used to describe the battle. It is clear that our natural resources no longer give us a competitive edge, and that the American worker no longer holds a monopoly on the work ethic.

Whether we win the competition in which we find ourselves will depend on our ability to hone excellence. And whether we, as Masons, fulfill our goals of exalting dignity and achieving happier men, better men, and wiser men, will depend upon our ability to maintain a high degree of excellence within the context of that competition.

What is excellence? Depending on whose dictionary you use, the term is defined in many ways: superiority, preeminence, perfection, worth, value, goodness — the state of possessing good qualities to an eminent degree.

But it is more than a definition. Excellence is a quality which embodies a set of personality traits. Today, I want to share with you four of those traits. I do not pretend that they exhaust the topic, but I can assure you that, if they are followed, excellence will be achieved.

As you might expect, the first attribute is ability. In its most simplistic form, we can define ability in terms of the skills an individual possesses or their competence in doing a certain task. This can be related to a comparison of others doing the same job, or in relationship to the difficulty of the job itself. You, as a Mason, obviously have it, or you wouldn't be here today.

The second attribute is that of effort expended. Andrew Carnegie once said that the average person puts about 25% of his energy and ability in his work. The world takes off its hat to those who put in more than 50% of their capacity, and stands on its head for those few souls who devote 100%.

It is interesting to note that motivation specialists, who have tested thousands of employees in industry, say that the difference between an outstanding employee and one that just gets by is only about 2%-2% more effort, more interest, and more consistency of work. It is that desire to give just a little bit more effort, a little more interest, a little more time, a greater willingness to invest a little bit more of oneself that is one of the single most important determinants of true excellence. Let me assure you that not one of the outstanding classical musicians, the noble prize winners, the CEO's of Fortune 500 companies, or the great athletes of today ever achieved excellence without extra effort. I ask you — are you giving that little bit more of the effort that makes the difference to your work in Masonry?

The third attribute generally found in those who seek excellence is persistence. Many people fail in life because they believe in the adage: "If at first you don't succeed, try something else."

The problem with such an attitude is that success will elude those who follow this path. Most people have dreams of the perfect life; but, too often, these dreams never materialize, because the persistence needed to make them come true is never demonstrated. If you want excellence, you must pay the price.

Hubert Humphrey, in his final struggle with cancer said: "The biggest mistake some people make is giving up. Adversity is an experience, not a final act. Some people look upon any setback as the end. They are always looking for the benediction rather than the invocation..."

But achievers of excellence do not give up. Take, for example, Thomas Edison, whose invention of the incandescent light bulb revolutionized our lives. He had 586 experimental failures before developing the right filament.

Admiral Perry, admired by the world as one who achieved true excellence in the field of exploration, had his share of failures, as well. He is remembered as being the first to reach the North Pole; yet, remember that it took him 23 years and 7 abortive attempts to success.

Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm, a champion of human rights, was born to poverty. Her father was an immigrant from Guyana; her mother an unskilled laborer in a burlap bag factor. She had to conquer not only poverty, but also racial and sexual prejudice, to make her dreams come true for herself and for the good of so many others.

And finally, one of the great men of all time was faced with adversity throughout his life, He failed at business in 1831 and was defeated in his try for the state legislature in 1832. His business failed again in 1833; and, three years later, he suffered a nervous breakdown. He lost his bid for Congress in 1843; and, once elected in 1846, lost again in 1848.

His unsuccessful U.S. Senate bid in 1855 was followed by the loss of the Vice Presidency in 1856. He was once again defeated for the Senate in 1858; but, in 1860, won the Presidency. We know him as Abraham Lincoln, and he did not give up!

These individuals I have just mentioned chased their dreams, and, in doing so, achieved excellence. But their successes were not immediate, and the adversity which preceded it could very nearly have cost them their chance at the gold ring.

On the flip side of the coin, however, are stories of opportunities missed, because persistence was never in the game plan.

One of the most dramatic examples of this is the story of the video cassette recorder — an American invention conceived in the 1960's by Ampex and RCA. Today, the sales of VCR's — 36,000 per day — is a \$5.9 billion business. Yet, not one of these machines is still made in the U.S. The market has been cornered by the South Koreans and the Japanese, whose patience and determination solved the problems first associated with the early machines.

It seems that the early VCR's would only record one hour of programming, while the public demanded a two-hour tape for movies. By the mid-70's, every American manufacturer had pulled out of the business, and judged the venture as a flop. What they didn't count on was that the Japanese would continue to work on the VCR project; and,, within two years, produce what the public wanted. Both Sony and JVC brought out the two hour machine. Following on their heels was Matsushita, who developed the four hour VCR. What could have easily been a U.S. foothold, in an attempt to balance our trade deficit, was lost; because the persistence needed to make the project go, gave way to the immediate need to bolster the profit and loss sheets.

Clearly, the Japanese persistence has paid off in the manufacture of the video cassette recorders, and the American reluctance to pursue the project has taught bitter lessons.

The final attribute found in those who achieve excellence is that of integrity. Just as one cannot be considered truly excellent without ability, effort, and persistence; similarly, you cannot find an individual of excellence without a high level of integrity as well. In any discussion of excellence, this may very well be the most important attribute of all. Sad to say, we suffer as a nation from a lack of moral leadership at all levels.

The <u>Wall Street Journal</u>, <u>USA Today</u>, and other print and television media are filled, unfortunately, with stories of wrongdoing.

- E.F. Hutton check kiting
- Insider trading on Wall Street
- Unfair company takeovers
- Lawyers helping prisoners escape from prison
- Doctors ripping off Medicare
- Athletes and coaches cheating
- A college administrator plagiarizing his dissertaion, and
- Government officials exceeding their power by abusing constitutional rights

And the list goes on.

Are we, as a nation, spending too much time on the technical aspects of doing business, and not enough time on the development of its moral qualities? I think so,. To achieve excellence, we must have people who understand the difference between right and wrong; who practice it — practice it because they have their roots deeply planted in the study of the Bible, comparative religion, ethical philosophy, psychology, and great literature. We must foster people who aspire to excellence with a finely honed conscience. Winston Churchill said it well:

"The only guide to a man is his conscience. The only shield to his memory is the rectitude and sincerity of his actions. It is imprudent to walk through life without this shield, because we are so often mocked by the failure of our hopes. But, with this shield, whatever our destiny may be, we always march in the ranks of honor."

Martin Luther said the same thing differently when he said: "Here I stand." If we are to be truly excellent in our careers, in our personal life, or as Masons, we must have integrity; not, as something to be mastered and put on the shelf, but as an active, living virtue which we display again and again; and, which, through its display, inspires trust and respect in others.

I have mentioned today many individuals that we could point to from which to emulate our own lives of excellence. And, in addition to those famous names, we could add the names of those "silent heroes" that each of us has encountered in our own lives.

Free Masonry is one of the great movements of our time, but I suggest that it has not reached its potential.

Think of the impact that Free Masonry could have if every member put

to work the four principles of excellence which I have outlined. The enormity of the power of 3.5 million Masons, nationwide, speaking for human dignity, justice, morality, and civic responsibility, and living lives which are the very emulation of excellence, is almost beyond comprehension.

Excellence is a highly personal goal. I urge each of us to make that commitment to seek it in ourselves, to apply it to our work in Masonry, and to seek it in others, starting today. Take your God-given ability; utilize it to its full capacity; apply it consistently over a long period of time; leaven it with a full measure of integrity; and Free Masonry will remain the outstanding positive force for good, for which we all hope. More importantly, mankind's moral, spiritual, and intellectual development, which is our ultimate goal, will be fulfilled.
