


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

Masonic History of the 125th Grand Master

James N. DeMoss

Ancient Craft Masonry Initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason on June 9, 1964; passed to the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason on September 15, 1964; and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on October 17, 1964, all in Centennial Lodge No. 326, Omaha, Nebraska. Served as Master of Bellevue Lodge No. 325, Bellevue, Nebraska, in 1986.

Grand Lodge Appointed Grand Chaplain in June, 1980 by M.: W.: Byron C. Jenkins. Appointed Grand Orator in June 1981 by M.: W.: Harold C. Wurdeman, in June 1982 by M: W: Paul R. Pierce, in June 1983 by M: W: Bevin B. Bump, and in June 1984 by M.: W.: Robert A. Metcalf. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in December 1986 by M.: W.: Charles W. Amidon. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in December 1986 by M.: W.: Wayne G. Luenenborg. Elected and installed as Grand Junior Warden under M.: W.: Paul R. Eveland in February 1988. Elected and installed as Grand Senior Warden under M.: W.: Thomas W. Tye in February 1989. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-elect in February 1990 under M.: W.: John M. McHenry. Installed as the 125th Grand Master of Masons on February 10, 1991. In 1976 was appointed and served as a member of the Grand Lodge Youth Committee under M.: W.: T. Leo Stines. Since that time has also served as a member and/or chairman of the following Grand Lodge Committees: Fraternal Dead, Statue of Liberty Centennial, Finance, and Grand Lodge Offices. Was appointed Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Nevada, F. & A. M. near the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in 1980. Commission as Grand Representative of Nevada near Nebraska was resigned in April 1991 in favor of another individual. In January 1991 was commissioned as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Hawaii, F.: & A.: M.:, near the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. In February 1990 at Salt Lake City, Utah, was elected Chairman of the Conference Committee of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America, to serve in that capacity through the close of the Conference to be held in San Diego, California, on February 17-19, 1991.

Capitular Masonry Made a Royal Arch Mason in Florence Chapter No. 61, at Omaha, Nebraska, on February 29, 1980.

Cryptic Masonry Made a Royal and Select Master in Omaha Council No. 1, at Omaha, Nebraska, on March 8, 1980.

Chivalric Masonry Dubbed a Knight Templar in Mt. Calvary Commandery No. 1, at Omaha, Nebraska, on March 15, 1980.

Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite Received the 4th through the 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Omaha, Orient of Nebraska, on April 25-28, 1966. Elected as Class Orator on April 28, 1966. Served as Wise Master, Omaha Chapter of Knights Rose Croix in 1977. Elected a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor on December 7, 1973. Coroneted a 33° Inspector General Honorary on December 9, 1977.





Greetings were also received from Miss Kimberlee Pfister, Grand Worthy Advisor of the Grand Assembly of the Order of Rainbow Girls of Nebraska; Miss Anne Morrow, Grand Bethel Honored Queen of the International Order of Job's Daughters in Nebraska; and from Brother David Smith, State Master Councilor of the Nebraska State Chapter, International Order of DeMolay.

M.: W.: Grand Master DeMoss expressed his gratitude and appreciation for the musical expressions provided during the presentation of guests by Ruby House on the organ. He also directed the attention of the Grand Lodge delegates and guests to the list of Emick, Grand Lodge Youth Committee and Houghton Scholarships printed in the program, indicating Masonic funds well invested in these young scholars.

GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

M.:.W.: Grand Master DeMoss made the following remarks as he presented the 1991 Grand Master's Humanitarian Award recipients:

"The next two individuals that are going to speak to you are very special people. They are the two recipients of our Grand Master's Humanitarian Award within the state of Nebraska this year. Again, if you will look in the program, you will find that we have some stringent criteria that we have established for recognition of these individuals. First of all, we will not award this to more than two individuals in any calendar year. The individual that is entitled to

receive this award, and there are many, ... must be a Master Mason and have been such for at least 30 years. He must have been active in at least three of the five following community activities: he could have held a political office such as mayor, city council member, county board member, NRD member, school board member, some other political office, whatever might be available where he resides; he could have been active in his church, either as an elder, a vestryman, deacon, lay leader, lay reader, whatever his particular denomination permits; he could have been denoted as a civic leader because of his involvement on boards of directors for local hospitals, nursing homes, financial institutions, foundations; he could have been a volunteer for such charitable organizations as the Y, United Way, Scouting, similar organizations to that. He could have been involved in such service organizations as Lions, Sertoma, Kiwanis, Rotary, Optimists, and so forth. But lastly, he must have been active in the Masonic fraternity. In other words, these are the Masons that make the difference within their community. These awards are presented to them in their local community, and the entire community is invited to be present, particularly these organizations with which they have been involved."

The Grand Master then presented W.: Lloyd I. Edwards of Pomegranate Lodge No. 110 and W.: Wayne H. Hardy of Custer Lodge No. 148, recipients of the Grand Master's Humanitarian Award. Brother Hardy closed his remarks with a poem whose central line was repeated throughout each stanza: "I'm glad I touched shoulders with you."

ROCK MAUL AWARD

M : W : C Grand Master DeMoss described the Rock Maul Award as one that is presented to one lodge each year by the Grand Master. The lodge selected should represent the best all around lodge in the jurisdiction of Nebraska. The Rock Maul is a sixteen pound rock maul that has been used in a rock quarry for its intended purpose. It was inscribed and presented to the Grand Lodge in the year of M : W : C Byron C. Jenkins, and has been awarded once a year since then to that lodge determined to have been the recipient by the selection process. The recipient of the Award is unknown until this announcement at Grand Lodge each year. The Grand Master presented the Rock Maul Award for 1991 to Fremont Lodge No. 15.

GOLD PAN AWARD

M∴W∴ Grand Master DeMoss displayed the Gold Pan Award, which is, in fact, a pan that was used to pan for gold. It was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by the Grand Lodge of Alaska. It is a beautiful trophy presented each year to that lodge which has shown, in the determination of the selection committee, the greatest overall improvement, or the most significant contribution to Masonry in Nebraska. The Grand Master presented the Gold Pan Award for 1991 to Frank Welch Lodge No. 75.

THE GRAND ORATION

W:. Virgil Tubach, 54

Most Worshipful Grand Master. Good morning, everyone. It is indeed a pleasure for me to be allowed to address this assembly of fraters so early in the proceedings of this 135th Grand Lodge Session. My purpose this morning will be to tickle your thought processes, so that during the next day and one half you will be thinking about Masonry in the State of Nebraska, rather than Masonry in your own community. For as each subordinate lodge is affected by the economic climate, societal behavior and the shift of population, so also is your Grand Lodge affected. It's the old "ripple effect". And I trust that the stones of deliberation dropped in the pond of thought will not cause ripples to overflow the bank of truth, equality and brotherhood.

I have been told that orations need a beginning, a middle and an end. The beginning will be thoughts on where we were several years ago. The middle will be of things as they seem to be now. And the end will be about seventeen minutes away, and will be as I see them possibly happening. I would like to stress at this time, that I have been most fortunate again this year in never having been told by any member of the Grand Lodge at any time what any of the contents of any of my orations should be, and they no doubt will be as surprised as you on some of my thoughts and comments, but I hope that when I am finished, I will still be allowed the privilege of being called a brother.

The late 1900's and early to mid-1950's was a period of growth in the fraternity. We were at the end of the Second World War. The Korean War had not yet started, and the colonies seemed to still be in a strong upswing that began around 1938. People were busy living their lives, having families, buying houses, joining organizations. Yes, life was indeed good. The Masonic fraternity enjoyed the benefit of young men in their late twenties and early thirties, who felt that they needed to belong to a solid, respected, well established organization. And why not? Fathers, uncles, fathers-in-law, supervisors at work, the president of the company who was their employer, or the chief executive officer of the corporation for which they worked, all were members of the Masonic fraternity. For them, it was a natural thing to do: join the Masonic fraternity; become a respected adult in their community. Commerce was being driven by the need to restock the necessities that the American family perceived it required after years of doing without while sustaining the war effort. Young people returning from fighting in the war were all familiar with new devices, new innovations, new ways to do things, and a knowledge of what was "over the mountain." They had gone from just being a member of their local community to being a member of a generation of world travelers.

Our fraternity did all right. We had our monthly business meetings every month except for maybe the one or two summer months when we went dark. We did Entered Apprentice degrees one week, Fellow Craft degrees another week, and Master Mason degrees the remaining week of the month.

We had our posting teams for each degree, and they met with the brothers several

times a week to teach them the work. As I recall, each posting session lasted about one and one half hours. Something like thirty minutes of repeated recitation, a thirty minute break when the poster would talk, or more likely ramble about his ideas and understanding of what we were then trying to commit to memory, and then a last thirty minute time frame with once again repeated recitation. I remember always trying to get the middle thirty minute session extended. Masonry was a very personal thing with those of us going through the degree together, and our poster.

The lodge had the usual observances and family evenings. There was St. John's Day, Memorial Day to recognize those who had died and were no longer with us — and their widows were especially remembered with introductions and, if needed, were given a ride to the lodge. The summertime picnic with watermelon and ice cream in the park, or if it rained, at the lodge. Past Masters' Day, sometimes in the spring, and sometimes in the fall depending upon the Master's calendar, but always done each year, it was the time when we younger members got to see it done "correctly" by our peers. Usually there was a Bingo night for Halloween with boxes of cookies and crackers, billfolds, clutch purses, small boxes of chocolate...everything under the sun and under \$5 in value as prizes for the winners. The children were the biggest winners in the month of December, with the lodge's Christmas party. We Masons would stay after lodge, and after refreshments on that lodge night just preceding the weekend of the Christmas party, sacking the goodies. Ah, yes, it became a tradition that each sack had to contain one apple, one orange, one coffee cup of hard candy, six old fashioned chocolate drops, and a measuring scoop of salted in-the-shell peanuts. Yes, the Masonic fraternity was a very busy, thriving hive of activity in the forties and early fifties. I'm sure that your lodge also had these like activities that they sponsored for their families and their members.

Now let's skip thirty years ahead, forward to the 1990's, and if you will, let's include today in this time frame. What are the differences we find that have taken place in only thirty years.

Well, the country has completed several military conflicts, some of which the population has agreed with, others which were violently opposed by segments of the population. Let me just rapidly enumerate them: Korea, Viet Nam, Lebanon, Grenada, Panama and Kuwait/Iraq. The young people today seem to be individualists, each doing what pleases himself, unbound by traditions of any type, more interested in the material possessions that can be obtained, than in the quality of life to be lived. They are caught up in the acquiring mode, too enthused in gaining every advantage, every work saver, every luxury item possible for them to grab. Now maybe that isn't all too bad. But it would seem that as the years go by it well may be that they will all truly discover that lasting friendships and a meaningful purpose in life is a requirement for lasting health and happiness.

The last thirty years plus has seen a large economic change and population shift. Nebraska's population is moving out of the rural areas, not into the larger cities, but into the fringes of the metropolitan areas or the suburbs of the larger cities.

Where once in the eastern third of the state we used to find in the rural areas four or more families living on a section of land, today we find just over two families for each three sections of land. I find it hard to believe that the other two thirds of the state is not to be found with a like proportion from their population of thirty years ago.

What has happened to the towns that are the homes for our Masonic lodges? The last thirty plus years has not weathered well for the small towns across the state. These towns that have been able to hold onto industrial firms that need manpower have probably not fared too badly. But towns that have lost their small industries or businesses that require people to staff them in any quantity have suffered, and in most cases, I would say, are now found in a stressed financial position to maintain the town at its present service level for its remaining citizens.

What is our fraternity like today? From being lulled into a false sense of security and comfort that characterized the earlier years, when we worried about the degrees and whether or not we had enough bodies to do the work, we found ourselves completely immersed in the philosophy that portraying the Masonic ritual was the important thing. Our existence, it seems, was to create as many Masons as we could. Being interested in increasing the number of members is not a bad goal, but we must educate them as they are created. Masonic illiteracy of purpose and knowledge has no place in a fraternity that says its fraternal ancestors had an education the equal of any bishop or member of royalty which allowed them to raise the over 1000 gothic cathedral structures in Europe.

Today, our fraternal membership is on the rise. Realizing that it is easier to retain a member of an organization if the member understands the organization's background, ideals and goals, our Grand Lodge implemented the revised proficiency for the use of all lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction. Although we are Masons, we are still human beings, and true to social behavior studies, this change to a modified proficiency has slowly been accepted.

We now exist in unity with the Prince Hall Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons in and for the jurisdiction of Nebraska. Although our Prince Hall brothers are few in numbers, do not be mistaken in underestimating their dedication and commitment to the Masonic ideals upon which the fraternity is founded world-wide. If ever you want to know a very serious and dedicated Mason, introduce yourself to a Prince Hall Mason.

Some of our sister jurisdictions seem to be having a small amount of trouble with Prince Hall recognition due to the fact that jurisdictional boundaries do not always coincide between Grand Lodges. Others are now just testing the water, waiting for the right time to grant recognition. Pressure to make changes more times than not creates a reverse motion that stops all advancement. Again I am reminded of that saying, "Patience and perseverance accomplish all things."

Now, if you will, transport yourself forward in time to the year 2025. Looking about the room, I would say that not too many of us here this morning will be attending the Grand Lodge Session that year. What will our fraternity be like

then? Will you allow me to prophesy for just a few minutes?

Statewide membership has shown a continual increase each year since the early 1990's. The increase for the year just completed, 2024, is one half of one percent. The Masonic lodges across the state have been quite active this past year, in targeting highly prominent and successful leaders in their communities for membership. The Grand Historian, in his address to the Grand Lodge delegates, on research he did in old reports found in the Grand Lodge library archives, shows that one has to go all the way back to the early 1900's to find such a large number of "shakers and movers" in all phases of community life as members of the fratemity.

The movement of population from the rural areas to the more metro areas of the state continues. That shift, the latest report from the State of Nebraska's Economic Development department shows, is fueled by the lack of jobs in small towns and cities. Cottage industries and "mom and pop" businesses are the rule as one travels across the state.

Nebraska Masonic Lodges have grown in size, but diminished in number. Lodges are now primarily located in or around some seventeen cities. Large initiatory classes, once each quarter, seem to be the normal mode of operation. Small towns that once boasted a Masonic lodge now have a Masonic club that meets monthly and keeps the fraternal tie alive.

Almost every charity across the state has Masons prominently active in their ranks. The Tri-Cities area of Grand Island, Hastings and Kearney has put together a step-by-step plan for all Nebraska cities to use in keeping their local food banks stocked. This plan was the result of almost 100+ years of planning the semi-truck food pickup each fall for the Nebraska Masonic Home in Plattsmouth. The Nebraska Masonic Home Board has just announced that the final building in its "Pearls of Sanctuary" program begun in 1998 has just been completed. This was a highly controversial program to build retirement enclaves across the state for our Masonic brothers and their widows, who in their late years, did not want the responsibility of caring for their own homes, but could care for themselves, and like to have a health nurse check up on them every couple of weeks. This program was the direct result of the continuing upward spiral of health care costs, when a mail survey by the Grand Lodge showed that nearly 82% of our members were no longer covered under a health insurance plan.

Well, my friends, this is one scenario from one person. Each of you here this morning should have your own vision of the future. Our work before us is to take all of our individual dreams and wants for the future, mix them together, and form a mode of action that will be acceptable to all. No one wins. No one loses. The time to worry about what to do for 1992 has long ago passed. 1993 is just out of your reach, and if you don't hurry, 1994 will soon be a memory. In this day and one-half before you, your deliberations and decisions should be geared to sustaining, maintaining and creating the Masonic fraternity that you want in the future. It will not be done without pain. It will not be done without sacrifice. And it will not be done without compromise. But it must be done.

May Almighty God, that glorious Architect of the Universe, send a portion of His wisdom, vision and understanding to each of you, that through combined efforts, this, our beloved fraternity, may continue to progress for the benefit of future mankind.

Thank you for your kind attention.

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With words of greetings to special guests not previously introduced, the Grand Master closed the informal public opening ceremony and excused all who were not Master Masons.

First Day — Opening Session Friday, February 7, 1992

M.W. Grand Master James N. DeMoss requested that the W. Grand Marshal proclaim the 135th Annual Communication opened in ample form. He proceeded to make the special appointment of W. Brother Will Medow to the office of Grand Senior Steward pro-tem.

The report of the Committee on Business and Rules was made by the R:W:Grand Secretary, who then moved for its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

R:.W:. Don E. Rasmussen, 82 & 135

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge.

The Committee further recommends:

1. The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the

Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.

- 2. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.
- 3. Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.
- 4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may then speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.
- 5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.
- 6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits.
- 7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decisions and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the Committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak first and the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee then permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak, after which a vote will be taken.
- 8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret written ballot or other method at his discretion.
- 9. Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The report was accepted by vote of the delegates assembled.

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R.:.W.: Grand Secretary Don Rasmussen requested the approval of the Proceedings of the 1991 Grand Lodge Communication. A second from the floor and

a favorable vote allowed its acceptance.

M.:W: James N. DeMoss announced the appointment of M.:W: Thomas W. Tye as Parliamentarian for this 135th Annual Communication.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

M.:W: James DeMoss then appointed the Deputy Grand Custodians as Tellers for this session with W: Gene Sibley as Chairman, and directed that delegates cast their ballots for the election of the offices of Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden and Grand Secretary. All ballots were then collected by the Tellers.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

M∴W∴ Brother, Grand Master DeMoss, and brethren. On behalf of your Appropriations Committee, and as chairman of the Appropriations Committee, it is my duty to report the budget for the ensuing year. We are going to submit two budgets, they are printed and in your packets. The first is the balanced budget which is on the yellow pages, 19, 20 and 21. The balanced budget is required by the law of the Grand Lodge. The second is a more realistic budget, which is catering to the needs of the Grand Lodge until such time as the additional dues can be reported in January of 1993. The realistic budget is on pages 22, 23 and 24 as printed in your packet. And so at this time I would just like to move that they be reported as printed.

MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, distinguished members of this Grand Lodge and my brethren. I want to thank you, Most Worshipful Sir, for the kind and friendly hospitality that I have received since I've been here. It's been just great. It's a pleasure to be with you, and I thank you so much for all you've done for me. Someone asked me if I would tell about the redcap that I ran into the other day when I was at the airport. I was in the Newark airport a couple of days ago when I was bringing my bags in, and there was another fellow there that had all kinds of luggage, and the skycap was trying to help him and do the best he could. He was trying to please this fellow, but no matter what he did, he couldn't help this man in any way, he just insulted him and called him all kinds of things. Finally he got all the luggage on the rack,

and I thought he did a good job, and the customer said to him, "Look, I just can't be near you, go away. That's it." And the fellow walked away, and I walked over to him and I said, "Gee, you know, you deserve a lot of credit. You've got patience, you smiled at that man, you did everything you could to please him, and he just insulted you and wouldn't give you a tip." I think that's what he didn't want to do. And the skycap said, "Oh, that's O.K. You know, things like that happen to us every day. We run into different types of people. That young man is on his way to Miami, Florida, and his luggage is going to Portland, Oregon."

I've had some kind of an infection since the 2nd of January, and I'm under some medication now, and we have a doctor in my home town who makes house calls, he's been a very good friend of ours. Last week when I was home convalescing, he came into my house and he examined me, and he walked out into the dining room, and I could hear what he was saying, he talked to my wife, and he said, "You know, Norma, I don't like the looks of your husband." And she said, "Neither do I, Doc, but he's awful nice to the kids."

I'm the National Representative of the Masonic Service Association to the Veteran's Affairs Committee, representing all of you fellows at that committee. I appreciate the Grand Master giving me a chance to talk about MSA because there are 2.5 million Masons in the United States, and unfortunately less than 1% even know that we even have a Masonic Service Association, and that kind of hurts me when I go around and talk to people and I ask them what the Masonic Service Association is to them, and they say, "Gee, I never heard of it."

Brethren, the Masonic Service Association was organized in 1918, during World War I. The Grand Masters in North America got together in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and what they wanted to do was organize a national committee that would represent Masonry without any authority, because they had gone to the government and asked them if they could take part in the camps around the country and overseas just like the Red Cross and the USO and so forth, and the government said, "We can't possibly deal with 50 different organizations. If you come up with one organization that represents all of Masonry, we'll recognize that as your spokesman and deal with them accordingly."

By the time that they got the thing organized in Cedar Rapids, the war was over, and there was no need for people going into the camps. But now they had the Masonic Service Association organized, they wanted to do something, so what they did, they started to visit the military hospitals and helped those who came back wounded from overseas in World War I, and from that, the Masonic Service Association began.

In 1923, M.: W.: Carl H. Claudy, a Past Grand Master of the District of Columbia, a very prolific newspaper man, writer and nationally known editor, was hired as the executive secretary, and he started what is known as the *Short Talk Bulletin*. In 1923 each month he wrote a *Short Talk Bulletin* on the different Masonic subjects, and from that time to this very day, there are *Short Talk Bulletins* available and they are all still in print, almost 900 different issues. I don't care what kind of a subject you want to talk about Masonry, there is a *Short*

Talk Bulletin that covers it. If you want to talk about those lesser lights, if you want to talk about the rough ashlar or the perfect ashlar, if you wanted to talk about solicitation, if you wanted to talk about George Washington, Paul Revere, any subject you could think about that you want to talk about in Masonry or in your lodges, there is a Short Talk Bulletin that covers it. If your lodge was to meet every night from Monday through Friday, for four consecutive years, and if you use the materials that are available through the Masonic Service Association, you could have a different program every night without duplicating yourself.

It really breaks my heart when I go around to the different Grand Jurisdictions and a Master will say to me, "I really have difficulty planning meetings that will be of interest to my brethren," or "I have a difficult time writing trestle board notices, or monthly notices". Brethren, there are Short Talk Bulletins that cover all those subjects. I have brought with me today, packs with Your Masonic Hospital Visitor on the outside, and inside of that pack is a catalog, and the catalog has the publications of all the Masonic Short Talk Bulletins that were printed since 1923. They are categorized. You can pick out the subject you want. And for the ridiculous price of 35 cents plus postage, you can get any one of those subjects just by writing to us and letting us know.

Also inside of that packet, is a little yellow slip, and it's an application form for the *Short Talk Bulletin*. If you fill that out today, give me your \$3, I'll see to it that you start to get the *Short Talk Bulletin* in March. Now, this *Short Talk Bulletin* at the end of February is going to go from \$3 a year to \$3.50, so if you fill out this form and give it to me, I'll save you not only 50 cents, but also the postage. You're practically getting it for nothing. And I'll tell you something else, my brethren, if after you start to receive this *Short Talk Bulletin*, you feel that it's not the best buy you've had in Masonry, I'll refund your money to you personally. You have no obligation, and you're not taking any kind of a chance at all. If you like it, you keep it. If you don't like it, you write to me, and I promise you, I'll give you back your money. But you can take advantage of that \$3 subscription before the end of this month, so think about it if you would.

Every year, we come to the aid of some section of the world that's in peril, such as Hurricane Hugo that hit North and South Carolina and Puerto Rico a few years ago. The Masons in the United States, you and your Grand Lodge and other Grand Lodges around the country dedicated better than \$400,000 that went directly to that area to assist those that had been stricken by the devastation of that hurricane. Every penny that we collect goes to the devastated area. We don't take one penny for administration fees. Everything that is given to us is given to that area. The same way with the earthquake in San Francisco two years ago. We came to the aid of that devastated area and contributed better than \$200,000, all because of Masons being concerned about those around the country.

So you see, there are many things that are happening with the Masonic Service Association that people don't know about, and we wish they did, because the Masonic Service Association is not standing still, we're not marking time, we're going ahead. The materials that are coming out of our office are better than ever,

and I hope you'll take advantage of them. Every lodge in this state gets a copy of the *Short Talk Bulletin*. It probably goes to your secretary. Your Grand Lodge pays dues to the Masonic Service Association, and there helps to underwrite the cost of these things. Everything that goes out of our office goes out at less than cost. The *Short Talk Bulletin*, to mail them costs more than \$3.50, but we send them to you and we're glad to do it because they are helpful to every Mason. It makes our Masonic fraternity stronger. Take advantage of it, my brethren.

There is another branch of the Masonic Service Association that I would like to talk to you about. This morning, you know, we all got up, we took a shower, we shaved, we dressed, you had your breakfast, you read the newspaper, you drove your car, you did all kinds of things, tied your necktie, put on your shoes, and you hadn't even thought about it until I just mentioned it. It had never crossed your mind, because you take it for granted. But I want to tell you something, all over the United States at this very moment, there are men and women that can't do those simple chores. The veterans that are paying the price in VA hospitals right here in Omaha, in Lincoln, and up in Grand Island, and all over the United States, in 172 VA Medical Centers. They are paying the price so that we can meet today as Masons. They have given everything but their lives for us. They're not nice to look at. Some of them don't make sense when you talk to them. They're doctors, they're lawyers, they're school teachers, they're electricians, plumbers, mail carriers, all walks of life. One time, perfect specimens of manhood, or they would had never gotten into the service. But today they don't look so good. Families have deserted them, wives have divorced them, and they're lonely. We think about Alzheimer's Disease, we think of heart attacks, cancer, we think of sugar diabetes as being serious problems, and they are, very serious. But the most serious problem in the world today has affected every one of us in this room There isn't one of us that has escaped it at one time or another. And that illness, my brethren, is loneliness. Loneliness. If you've never been lonely, you're either a very lucky person, or you're living in a dream world, because it happens to all of us, but we have friends and relatives, families, loved ones, Masons, church people, that help us, that snap us back, and put us on the right level again. But these men and women in the VA Hospitals don't have that luxury. But you and I as Masons have men all around the country, and women and boys and girls, Rainbow Girls and DeMolay boys and Job's Daughters, going into those hospitals day in and day out, doing little things for those patients that they can't do for themselves. They're not too proud to bend down and tie somebody's shoe, they're not too proud to read the Bible or the newspaper to a blind or paralyzed veteran. They're not too proud to sit by their bed and talk to them, and show them that they are somebody. That we as Masons love them, and will never forget the sacrifices that they have made, for this great country because we live in the greatest country that God ever made. And if it wasn't for these people that sacrifice for us, we wouldn't be here today.

I'm very proud of the Masonic Service Association and the Hospital Visitation Program because it's been going on since the inception of the Veteran's Administration which came into being under President and Brother Harry S. Truman, Grand Master of Masons in Missouri, and also President of the United States in

1946 when the VA/VS was organized. And you and I as Masons had representatives there, and we've been on that council as charter members ever since. Every year we contribute better than 500,000 hours of voluntary service. Better than a half a million dollars is given to the hospitals for comfort items, for equipment in the hospitals, and every cent of that comes from volunteers, from you and your Grand Lodges and so forth. The dues that your Grand Lodge pays to the MSA, none of it goes to the Hospital Visitation Program. It is all voluntary contributions. The pennies, the dollars, the dimes that we get come from people like yourself and from your Grand Lodges who support this. It takes a great deal of money to operate the program, and we're doing it in fine style.

Here in your Grand Jurisdiction, Bob May right here in Omaha, goes into that hospital every day, and has volunteers helping him to do little things for those patients, making us look good, every one of us. Dave Cook is down in Lincoln. Ervin Kimball is up at Grand Island. Your Grand Master, back in October, invited me into the state, and we toured those hospitals for two days. He saw what actually happens to these people in those hospitals, and how much we're respected by the staff, and by the administrative sections of the hospital for what we're doing.

Yes, my brethren, we are really doing something worthwhile in this VA Hospital program. We get more accolades, more commendations, and more recognition for this program, than anything else that Masons do, because we just don't treat Masons, we're there to help anybody. We don't care who they are, where they come from, what the color of their skin might be, what their religious preference is. If they need help, if they need assistance, we're there as Masons to give it to them. If we want Masonry to grow, my brethren, this is the way it's going to have to be. We have to get out into our communities and show the world that we're not a secret organization. That we don't meet behind closed doors and do fanatic things. That we are loving and kind. That we're God fearing men and women. And that we serve our fellow man. Yes, better than a million dollars a day is contributed to charities throughout the United States by the Masonic fraternities. We don't pat ourselves on the back, but it's true and it's there.

In the Book of Matthew in the 25th chapter we read: "I was hungry and you fed me; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was sick and you ministered to me; I was naked and you clothed me; I was a stranger and you took me in; I was in prison and you visited me. Lord, when did I see Thee hungry and feed Thee? When were You sick and I ministered to Thee? When were You thirsty and I gave You a drink? When were You naked and I clothed Thee? When were You in prison and I visited Thee? And the Master answers, "When you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it also unto me."

That is the commission of every Master Mason that wears the white apron, that took the obligation of an Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft or Master Mason, at this altar or any altar around the world. To make the world a better place in which to live, to do his very best to serve his fellow man and his God. Some day when we stand before the Omniscient Judge, and it's going to happen to all of us. He's not going to ask us what kind of a car did we drive, how much money did we

have in the bank, what was your stock portfolio, how many titles did you have. Nay, my brethren, he's going to ask us one question, and how we answer that questions will determine where we spend our eternity. That question is this, "What did you do for others in my name?"

Bob May, Dave Cook, and Ervin Kimball will have no problem when facing that question, because they are serving their fellow man, and they are representing you and I in the best possible way.

M.: W.: Grand Master, would you come up here for just a minute, please? Grand Master, you've been an exceptionally fine Mason, and I mean that in every sense of the word. You've been an outstanding Grand Master, you've been a great friend, you've been an encouragement to me. I've told you this personally, and I tell you publicly now, that you're an inspiration. I've followed you around this country, and I have always sat back and admired you for being able to inspire people to do their very best. You and your wife Carole, are dear friends. If it wasn't for Masonry we would never have met. And I do love you dearly, and I love Carole also. Because of your support and your great inspiration to me, we have a little plaque here that we'd like to give you. It has no intrinsic value, but it comes from our heart. It's a certificate of appreciation which reads: "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to work together in unity. The Masonic Service Association of the United States presents this certificate of appreciation to Most Worshipful James N. DeMoss, Grand Master of Masons in Nebraska, with sincere appreciation for his interest and support in assisting and promoting our MSA Hospital Visitation Program in his state, and for his promotion of the use of all educational materials published by the Association. We commend him for his fine leadership during his tenure as Grand Master in Nebraska, and with this certificate goes our best wishes for continued success and service to our gentle craft." It's signed by Richard E. Fletcher, Past Grand Master, Executive Secretary, and yours truly. Grand Master, God bless you and thank you for being my friend.

GREETINGS FROM THE GRAND LODGE OF IOWA

Thank you, Most Worshipful Sir, distinguished guests, my brethren all. Two nights ago I attended a lodge meeting of Fervent Lodge No. 513 in Collins, Iowa, a small lodge of about 79 members. You delegates are the most important Masons in this room right now, and we do appreciate all that you do for Freemasonry in Nebraska and Freemasonry in general.

Most Worshipful Sir, if I might tell just one short story that I feel is very important. It's a story that really means a lot to me. It's a story of a wise old man that lived up in the hills of Tennessee. And this wise old man had the beautiful, unusual talent of clairvoyancy, in that he was always able to tell any of the hillside youngsters that lived in his community just exactly what they had in their hand or even in their pockets. But in every community there is always one skallywag, one borderline delinquent, one who is always getting himself into trouble and pulling the others into trouble along with him, and there was one such in this community. And one day he gathered his colleagues around him and he said, "Fellows, I've got an idea how we're going to outfox that old man up on the hill. He thinks he's so smart." He says, "We're going out in the woods

and we'll get a bird. And we'll go up to the old man's cabin, and we'll knock on the door, and the old man will come to the door, and I'll hold the bird up in my hand and I'll say, 'What have I in my hand, old man?' and he'll guess right, he always does. He'll say it's a bird. But then I'm going to say, 'Yes, old man, but is it dead or is it alive?' And if he says it's dead, I'll just open my hands up and let the bird fly away. And if he says it's alive, I'll just crush it to death before I open my hands up." Well, the boys went up in the woods, they got their bird, they went up to the old man's cabin, they knocked on the door and the old man came to the door, and the young man held the bird up in his hand and he says, "What have I in my hand, old man?" Without any hesitation whatsoever, the wise old man said, "Why it looks like you've got a bird there boy." "Yes," he says, "but is it dead, or is it alive?" Once again without any hesitation, the wise old man of the mountain said, "It is in your hands, my son, it is as you will."

My brethren, I would remind you all that so it is with things like freedom, and democracy, and the schools that we go to and the churches that we attend, and the Masonic lodges that we support. We can love these things, and nourish them and they'll flourish and fly like they've never flown before. Or we can starve them, and we can neglect them, and they'll die. It is exactly as the wise old man of the mountain said, my brethren, "It is in your hands." Please remember, brethren, that I am aware that as I am pointing one finger at you, I am pointing three at myself.

M : W : Sir, thank you so much for the many courtesies that have been extended to Barb and me. We've enjoyed a long-standing good relationship with the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, and to you, newly elected Grand Master, I wish the very best. My brethren all, thank you so much.

THE GAVELS

The Grand Master displayed the two gavels to be used interchangeably throughout the session: the first is the poi pounder, and there are identical ones on the Warden's pedestals that were presented to the Nebraska Grand Lodge by M : W : Brother McKee from Hawaii; the other gavel is a beautiful, hand-carved gavel out of cocabola wood which comes from the rain forest of the Amazons. This gavel was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska during the tenure of M : W : Herb Ronin. It was presented on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Colorado by Past Grand Master Charles Mantz, who was Grand Master of Colorado in 1955, and it was his wish that this gavel be used ad infinitum at least some of the time when the Grand Masters of Nebraska were presiding. On the face of it is a Grand Master's Jewel with the working jewel of a Master Mason.

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Following an explanation of the locations for the afternoon's workshops, the R:W: Deputy Grand Master called the session from Labor to Refreshment, to reconvene Saturday, February 8th at 9:00 a.m.

REPORT OF CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

W:. Norris Rusmisell, 46, Chairman

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters, and Brethren: Once again it is my privilege to bring to you the attendance numbers of this 135th Annual Communication held February 6, 7, and 8, 1992 in Omaha, Nebraska.

We have registered here at this session, 97 Masters in their elected right, and 57 Masters by Proxy; 55 Senior Wardens in their elected right, and 60 by Proxy; 45 Junior Wardens in their elected right and 57 Proxy. These offices are represented by 284 Master Masons. Also registered are 73 non-voting delegates consisting of Secretaries and interested Masons as well as 77 Dignitaries and 27 Deputy Grand Custodians for a total registration of 461. In addition, a number of ladies were present to attend social functions.

We are fortunate to have all but one of our Grand Officers present as well as 17 Past Grand Masters of Nebraska. Nebraska dignitaries present other than Grand Lodge Officers include representation from Eastern Star, Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters, DeMolay, York Rite and Scottish Rite Bodies, Imperial Order of the Shrine, Tangier Temple, Sesostris Temple, Tehama Temple, Prince Hall Grand Lodge, and National Sojourners from Iowa and Nebraska. Other Grand Jurisdictions present include Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

At the time of this report there is no representation from 32 lodges, which are: No. 32, 60, 61, 91, 103, 106, 111, 121, 125, 128, 134, 136, 150, 154, 164, 167, 177, 180, 191, 205, 211, 224, 248, 254, 262, 282, 285, 291, 301, 311, and 324. If there is any brother present who is a member of any of the above listed lodges, we ask that you contact the Credentials Committee at the registration table. We have been advised, however, that Lodges No. 61, 150, and 191 may be considering consolidation with another lodge and this perhaps could be the reason of their absenteeism. Lodges absent for two consecutive years are No. 91, 103, 167, and 254. The only Lodge absent for three consecutive years is No. 91.

For your information the Table Lodge Thursday evening was attended by 185 Masons and the Membership Dinner last evening had 330 Masons and guests present.

I am pleased to serve Most Worshipful Grand Master "James DeMoss" as his Credentials Committee Chairman, and I want to thank the other committee members, Frank Dougherty, Lincoln; Wesley Suggs, Papillion; Herb Taylor, Bellevue; Delmar Jones, Keamey; Bill Hurst, Lincoln; and Doyle Berg, Omaha. Their devoted time and efforts along with the excellent cooperation from Chris and Tish have made the registration much easier.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

M:.W:. James N. DeMoss

"My brethren, all of the delegates were furnished 45 days before the opening of Grand Lodge, back late in December, a copy of the Grand Master's Address, and as you registered you were given the final printed copy of it along with a supplemental address. If it is your wish, I will read that entire report. If it is not necessarily your wish that I read the whole thing, I would like to highlight just a few things, and go from there. Hearing no objection to that, we will proceed in that regard.

The printed address of the Grand Master is as follows:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST ANCIENT AND HONORABLE FRATERNITY OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA

My Brethren:

In accordance with Article X, Section 2(b), of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Nebraska, I herewith submit my written address to this 135th Annual Communication. This address will include a report of my official acts; my opinion of the general conditions of Masonry within this Jurisdiction; and certain recommendations for such legislation as I deem necessary or expedient for the welfare of our Fraternity. Further, inasmuch as §1-304 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge dictate that all recommendations to be contained in this address shall be submitted to the Jurisprudence Committee, all Grand Lodge Officers, and the Masters of all subordinate lodges not less than forty-five days prior to the opening of Grand Lodge, this entire Address will be submitted to those individuals as well as to the current Senior Wardens, Junior Wardens both installed and elect, and all Lodge Secretaries. This additional distribution is being made in keeping with the Grand Lodge Officers' philosophy of keeping our delegates to Grand Lodge informed of the acts, doings, and proposals to come before them, and to give them sufficient time to give thoughtful consideration to the Recommendations on which a vote will be taken on Saturday, February 8, 1992.

My first task in this Address is to attempt to convey to each Mason in the Jurisdiction of Nebraska my most sincere and heartfelt gratitude for having had

confidence in my abilities and given to me the opportunity to fill this exalted office for the past year. Someone once said that life is filled with mountain-top experiences. Surely this past year has been for me the highest achievable peak of such experiences. I have tried to give to the Fraternity of my time and talents in such a manner as to have been of service — in those places, times and situations — as I felt would best serve you who placed the governance of this Grand Lodge in my hands. I am painfully aware that not all of my actions this past year have met with the universal accord of all of my brethren.

As in years past, Freemasonry in Nebraska has made great strides this past year. The credit for those improvements is due not to your Grand Master but to each and every one of the thousands of Masons who have labored in the quarries of Masonry, thinking not of themselves but the welfare of others.

To each of the visiting dignitaries from other Grand Jurisdictions we offer a sincere welcome. We appreciate your taking time from your busy and demanding schedules to be present with us. We extend to you the hospitality and greetings of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and most sincerely hope that your time spent with us will be a one of fond remembrance on your part.

To the delegates and other members in attendance at this 135th Annual Communication, we extend a welcome as you come together to consider serious matters concerning your Grand Lodge. As in the past two years we have again structured this Communication with your primary concerns in mind. The Friday afternoon Workshops have been deliberately crafted to offer to you the concerns you have expressed. We hope that you arrived in time to take part in the Table Lodge on Thursday evening and found it to be an enjoyable time of festive association. Your thoughtful consideration of the items of business to be considered on Saturday morning is earnestly requested.

NECROLOGY

As of the writing of this Address, the faithful Secretaries of our Subordinate Lodges have reported to the Grand Lodge Office that 549 members of our gentle craft have been called to stand before that Great White Throne where it has been their portion to hear from Him who sitteth as the Judge Supreme the welcome words, "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

We give our thanks to the Grand Architect of the Universe that the Golden Chain of Past Grand Masters of Masons of Nebraska has remained unbroken this past year.

The Committee on Fraternal Dead, under the able leadership of our V :: W :: Grand Chaplain Michael E. Jones, will be presenting a suitable tribute to our departed brethren as an integral portion of this Annual Communication.

CORNERSTONES

1. On Sunday, May 5, 1991, I was received in a Special Communication of Beatrice Lodge No. 26, Beatrice, called for the purpose of hosting an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge, which was opened in ample form, to re-set

the Cornerstone Casket of the Gage County Courthouse in conjunction with the Centennial Observance of the courthouse. The Cornerstone, originally laid by the Grand Lodge in 1890, had previously been opened on September 9, 1990, under the supervision of the Grand Lodge, and the original casket removed. In spite of less than ideal weather conditions, there was a large crowd on hand for the festivities and greetings were brought by Nebraska's Governor Ben Nelson and several other of the elected dignitaries in attendance.

- 2. On Saturday, September 14, 1991, I was received in a Special Communication of Frank Welch Lodge No. 75 in Sidney, at which time an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened in ample form for the purpose of laying two cornerstones in the City of Sidney. At 10:30 AM, thirteen of the Grand Lodge Officers were in attendance when the Grand Lodge was invited to lay the cornerstone for the Sidney Volunteer Fire Department's newly finished and enlarged Fire Station. This is an impressive structure and is a most welcome addition to this vital service which provides fire protection over roughly a 700 square mile area.
- 3. Also on Saturday, September 14, 1991, at 2:30 PM, thirteen of the Grand Lodge Officers were again in attendance when the Grand Lodge was invited to lay the cornerstone for the Cheyenne County Community Center under construction in the City of Sidney. When finished, this facility will provide a far ranging array of services to a large geographic area and is an outstanding example of the cooperative efforts of a number of communities. Frank Welch Lodge No. 75, under the leadership of W.: Kent A. Talich, Master, had previously opened a Special Communication of that lodge for the purposes of receiving the Grand Master and hosting the Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge. A large crowd of interested spectators was on hand for the cornerstone ceremonies.
- 4. On Sunday, September 22, 1991, twelve of the Grand Lodge Officers were in attendance when I was received as Grand Master in a Special Communication of Fairbury Lodge No. 35, at which an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened in ample form for the purpose of Re-Setting the Casket in the Cornerstone of the Jefferson County Courthouse in Fairbury. The original cornerstone had been laid by the Grand Lodge on July 7, 1891. On July 17, 1991, the casket was, in commemoration of the Centennial Observance of the building, removed and the contents placed on permanent display. At the ceremony, which was held on the steps of the courthouse at 1:30 PM, new artifacts were included in the casket in an impressive ceremony attended by better than 300 people. Speakers at the event included two State Senators and the Governor of Nebraska.
- 5. On Sunday, September 28, 1991, twelve of the Grand Lodge Officers were in attendance when I was received as Grand Master in a Special Communication of Wahoo Lodge No. 59, at which an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened in ample form for the purpose of Re-Laying the Cornerstone of the Wahoo Masonic Temple. The original cornerstone, which had been laid in 1938, had been damaged by vandals in recent years and it was the desire of

the brethren of Wahoo Lodge that a new cornerstone be placed. The articles in the original casket were on display in the lodge rooms and a new casket was prepared.

6. On Saturday, November 9, 1991, the Deputy Grand Master was received as my personal representative at a Special Communication of Beatrice Lodge No. 26, at which an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened in due form for the purpose of laying the cornerstone of the magnificent new library building in the city of Beatrice. Many of the Grand Lodge Officers were in attendance on this cold, blustery day to take part in the ceremony. The entire Cornerstone Ceremony was televised through the Local Access Station. In spite of the weather, a large, interested crowd was on hand.

DEDICATIONS

On Saturday, November 16, 1991, I was received at a Special Communication of Melrose Lodge No. 60 in Orleans, at which an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened in ample form for the purpose of dedicating the new Masonic Temple erected by the brethren of Melrose Lodge. Nine of the Grand Lodge Officers were present to take part in the Dedicatory Service which was conducted before an audience which filled the beautiful new lodge room.

It is always a sad occurrence when a Lodge decides to surrender its Charter. On September 16, 1991, the Secretary of Wauneta Lodge No. 217 wrote to advise that it was the decision of the members to surrender their charter. On September 23, 1991, I directed the R : W : Grand Secretary, accompanied by the R : W : Grand Secretary.

Deputy Grand Master, to set up a meeting with the members of Wauneta Lodge No. 217 to discuss the matter with them in detail. I also requested that representatives of both Palisade Lodge No. 216 and Purity Lodge No. 198 of Imperial be present at the meeting to attempt to persuade the decision to surrender to be changed to one of consolidation. This meeting was held on October 3 with all of the above individuals or lodges in attendance. It was reported back to me that the decision had not been based upon apathy, but one of reasonable economic thought. However, Wauneta Lodge did agree to meet one more time to discuss the matter with their members. On November 7, 1991 a final decision was made by the members, at their regular communication, to surrender their charter as of December 31, 1991.

QUESTIONS AND DECISIONS

- 1. On March 6, 1991 I was advised by the Worshipful Master of Covert Lodge No. 11 that the Treasurer of the lodge wished to submit his resignation due to his unforseen move from this jurisdiction. I advised the Worshipful Master that under the provisions of §2-304 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws he could not accept such a resignation. I further advised him that the office would have to be filled by temporary appointment by him from meeting to meeting.
- 2. On April 21, 1991 I refused a verbal request from Springfield Lodge No. 112 to receive a petition, ballot and confer degrees all without regard to time. Although the intended petitioner was in the Military Service of the United States of America, exigencies of the service did not warrant the request.
- 3. On May 1, 1991, in response to a letter of April 30, 1991 from the Secretary of Bee Hive Lodge No. 184, wherein it was shown that on April 4, 1991 at the regular communication of the lodge a motion was entertained and passed to expel from membership a member of the lodge, I advised that such an action was a violation of §3-401 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws. I further directed that the minutes of the April 4, 1991 communication be amended to strike the matter from the minutes and that a copy of my letter be appended to said minutes as authority to strike. I further directed that an amended Monthly Report be forwarded to the Grand Lodge Office as expeditiously as possible.
- 4. On May 10, 1991, I issued a letter to the Master, Wardens and Brethren of all Subordinate Lodges directing that from and after December 31, 1991, it would be unlawful in this jurisdiction to use in whole, or in part, any Monitor while conferring degrees, except that version of the Monitor adopted by the Grand Lodge on February 2, 1991.
- 5. On May 10, 1991, I issued a letter to the Master, Wardens and Brethren of all Subordinate Lodges directing that from and after December 31, 1991, it would be unlawful in this jurisdiction to conduct, in whole, or in part, any Official Ceremony in this jurisdiction except those versions thereof as are contained in the Book of Ceremonies adopted by the Grand Lodge on February 2, 1991.
- 6. On June 24, 1991, the M:W: Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of F:& A:M: of Oklahoma wrote to me setting forth facts and circumstances, accompanied by supporting documentation, surrounding an incident within his

jurisdiction involving a member of a Nebraska Lodge who is a resident within the jurisdiction of Oklahoma. The matter had been referred to him by one of his lodges. It was his opinion that the matter did not warrant a Masonic Trial, but he had referred the matter to me for final decision. After a thorough review of the matter, and conversations with the Grand Master of Oklahoma, on July 11, 1991, I advised the Grand Master of Oklahoma that it was my decision that sufficient grounds to warrant a Masonic Trial did not exist.

- 7. On July 24, 1991, I advised the Secretary of Palisade Lodge No. 216, in response to his letter of July 22, 1991, that The Rev. Hugh H. Houchin, who wished to petition Palisade Lodge No. 216 for reinstatement, that such a petition could not be accepted by Palisade Lodge No. 216 and that jurisdiction in the matter of reinstatement now rests with Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 since Gothenburg Lodge No. 249, from which The Rev. Houchin was suspended for non-payment of dues, was consolidated with Platte Valley Lodge No. 32 in January 1987.
- 8. On August 26, 1991, upon request of the Grand Lodge Office, and after review of the matter, I appointed M.: W.: Paul R. Pierce, PGM, as my Personal Representative to assist Edgar Lodge No. 67 in the completion and submission to the Grand Lodge Office of the Annual Return for Edgar Lodge No. 67 for the period ending December 31, 1990.
- 9. On August 27, 1991, I refused a request for dispensation submitted by Lincoln Lodge No. 19 for irregular proficiency involving Brother Joel Beckenhauer, EA. A review of the matter revealed no irregularity in the matter with respect to the Bylaws of Grand Lodge. I further appointed W∴ Jerry L. Rittenburg, Grand Senior Deacon, as my Personal Representative to attend a Special Communication of Lincoln Lodge No. 19 to be held on August 27, 1991, to clarify and answer any questions which might arise at the meeting concerning this matter.
- 10. On September 16, 1991, in response to a letter from Covert Lodge No. 11, I ordered that the actions taken by Covert Lodge No. 11, in regular communication, which resulted in the issuance of a demit for Brother George Speliotes, be stricken from the minutes of said regular communication and that the brother be, and thereby was, reinstated to membership in Covert Lodge No. 11 as if said action had never been taken, and that a copy of my letter be appended to said minutes as authority for such action. Brother Speliotes had sought a dual membership with a lodge in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Unbeknown to Brother Speliotes, the Secretary of the lodge in Colorado requested, although such was not a requirement of Colorado Grand Lodge Law, a demit to permit membership in that lodge. Brother Speliotes, upon learning of the actions after the fact, had requested that the demit be reversed by Covert Lodge No. 11. When discussed by Covert Lodge, a member cited §2-1404 of the Bylaws, and questioned if the action under consideration was proper. The matter was referred to me and I took this action to resolve the matter as expeditiously as possible.
- 11. On October 28, 1991, I was telephonically advised by the Secretary of Mosaic Lodge No. 55 that a Brother had passed away on Saturday, October 26, and some guidance was needed. The brother had, at the last Regular Commu-

nication of Mosaic Lodge been elected to become affiliated with them but time had not sufficiently elapsed to permit issuance of a demit from the Brother's previous lodge, Plainview No. 204. After consideration of the matter I telephonically advised Mosaic Lodge No. 55 and Plainview Lodge No. 204 to consider the Brother as a dual member at the time of his death, and that either lodge could respond with proper Masonic Funeral Services as requested by the family. I further advised Plainview Lodge that the Brother should be dropped from their rolls on their October monthly report as deceased, and that the request for demit should be returned to Mosaic Lodge No. 55 without action. I also advised Mosaic Lodge No. 55 to report the Brother as a gain through affiliation and a loss through death on their October monthly report.

- 12. On November 25, 1991, I responded to a letter written October 31, 1991 by the Master of Nebraska Lodge No. 1, requesting guidance on a fund raising proposal pending before his lodge. The proposal consisted of the sale of advertising by the members of the lodge, for which a commission would be paid directly to the lodge, with the advertisements to appear in a commercially prepared directory of various federal, state, and local governmental offices along with educational and medical activities within the state. It was my decision that, while the proposed matter did not, in and of itself, appear to be a violation of our Masonic Law, I could not give permission for the venture since the sale of the advertising, by members of the lodge as representatives thereof, could lead to confusion wherein it might be interpreted by members of the public that Freemasonry, more specifically Nebraska Lodge No. 1, was involved in the sponsorship of this commercial venture.
- 13. On December 1, 1991, I returned, without action, a proposed total revision (re-write) of the Bylaws of College View Lodge No. 320 of Lincoln. The requested approval was not given because provisions of §'s 2-301, 2-513, and 2-515 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws had not been properly addressed or covered in the proposed revisions.
- 14. On December 5, 1991, I sent the Grand Custodian, as my Personal Representative, to the Regular Communication of St. John's Lodge No. 25 in Omaha. The purpose of this action was to bring about a satisfactory resolution to a pending request for demit submitted to the lodge better than four months prior to this time, and to insure that certain other documentation requested and required by Grand Lodge Officers be completed properly and submitted hereafter in a timely fashion.
- 15. On December 11, 1991, the Grand Lodge Office was contacted by an attorney in McCook who stated that he had been retained by the City of Danbury to effect the statutory transfer of the property in Danbury formerly owned and occupied by Boaz Lodge No. 185, which was consolidated with McCook Lodge No. 135 in September 1986. The records of the Grand Lodge Office indicate that permission to transfer the property to the City of Danbury was approved by then Grand Master Charles W. Amidon at the time of the consolidation approval. I requested Past Grand Master John M. McHenry to contact the attorney and advise that since a deed had apparently not been executed, or if executed, had

not been filed, the title to the property in question should now rest with McCook Lodge No. 135 in accordance with §2-207 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, and to extend such advice and assistance to the attorney as might be necessary to bring the matter to a satisfactory conclusion.

DISPENSATIONS

- 1. On February 25, 1991, I gave dispensation to Nebraska Lodge No. 1 to install the duly appointed Junior Deacon for the year 1991 at their regular communication on March 4, 1991.
- 2. On February 25, 1991, I gave dispensation to Beatrice Lodge No. 26 to install the duly appointed Junior Deacon for the year 1991 at their regular communication on March 11, 1991.
- 3. On February 25, 1991, I gave dispensation to Scribner Lodge No. 132 to install their duly appointed Senior Deacon for the year 1991 at their regular communication on March 5, 1991.
- 4. On March 4, 1991, I gave dispensation to Scotts Bluff Lodge No. 201 to confer the three degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry upon Mr. Byron Randolph Lane on Saturday, March 9, 1991, without regard to time. Mr. Lane, the son of the Worshipful Master of Scotts Bluff Lodge, is in the military service of the United States and would be available on that date.
- 5. On July 16, 1991, I gave dispensation to Mosaic Lodge No. 55 to confer the degree of Entered Apprentice upon Mr. Kyle E. Hughes, petitioner, on July 25, 1991 provided the report of the examining committee was favorable and the ballot on Mr. Hughes was clear. Mr. Hughes is a member of the United States Navy and was under orders to leave the Norfolk area shortly after July 25, 1991.
- 6. On August 6, 1991, I gave dispensation to Mid-West Lodge No. 317 to receive and refer to committee, prior to receipt of waiver of jurisdiction from Geneva Lodge No. 79, petitions from the following named individuals: George Burke, Arsenios Coolik, Philaret Taylor, Seraphim Weber, Simeon Davis, Macarius Washburn, and Simeon Goldstein.
- 7. On August 7, 1991, I gave dispensation to Frank Welch Lodge No. 75 to confer the three degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry upon Mr. Mark Carley without regard to time and waiving the provisions of §2-402 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge.
- 8. On August 28, 1991, I issued a dispensation waiving the provisions of §2-1204 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge to permit John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290 to Open a Lodge of Entered Apprentice Masons on Sunday, September 29, 1991, for the purposes of hosting a festive Table Lodge to be conducted by the Omaha Masters & Wardens Club to which prospective members and ladies of members and guests were invited, provided the instructions in a separate letter to the Masters & Wardens Club of the same date were followed.
- 9. On September 3, 1991, I issued a dispensation waiving the provisions of $\S2-905$ and $\S2-1002$ of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge to permit Geneva Lodge No. 79, A:F:&A:M:, of Geneva, to proceed to ballot without referral to

committee and on a collective basis upon the request for waiver of jurisdiction submitted to Geneva Lodge No. 79 on July 24, 1991 by Mid-West Lodge No. 317 of Hastings, over the following named petitioners previously rejected by Geneva Lodge No. 79: George Burke, Arsenios Coolik, Philaret Taylor, Seraphim Weber, Simeon Davis, Macarius Washburn, and Simeon Goldstein.

10. On September 4, 1991, a Waiver of Jurisdiction having been granted by Geneva Lodge No. 79 in favor of Mid-West Lodge No. 317 over petitioners previously rejected by Geneva Lodge, I issued a dispensation waiving the provisions of §2-1002 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge to permit Mid-West Lodge No. 317, A∴F∴ & A∴M∴, of Hastings, to ballot, on a collective basis, upon the petitions for initiation from the following named individuals: George Burke, Arsenios Coolik, Philaret Taylor, Seraphim Weber, Simeon Davis, Macarius Washburn, and Simeon Goldstein.

PERMISSIONS AND WAIVERS

- 1. On February 11, 1991, I waived the provisions of Section 2-402 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws to permit Mizpah Lodge No. 302 to proceed with conferring of the three degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry upon Mr. Leighton W. Smith, a duly elected petitioner, on leave from his duty station at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. At the same time I advised Mr. Smith to contact the Grand Lodge of Hawaii upon his return to Pearl Harbor to receive instruction in proficiency for his degree work. Formal notification of the circumstances surrounding this matter were forwarded direct to the Grand Master of Hawaii.
- 2. On March 8, 1991, I gave permission to Blazing Star Lodge No. 200 to temporarily move the charter of the lodge to an outdoor location for purposes of holding an outdoor degree in connection with their Lodge Centennial Observance to be held on June 29, 1991.
- 3. On March 31, 1991, I gave permission to Fidelity Lodge No. 51 to temporarily move their charter on April 2, 1991 to Rising City, Nebraska for a joint meeting with Composite Lodge No. 81.
- 4. On April 25, 1991, I gave permission to the Clyde Malone Community Center Foundation in Lincoln, Nebraska, a Charitable Foundation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, to solicit Nebraska Lodges for monetary donations to the Foundation. The Foundation was instructed to include a copy of my authorization letter with all solicitations.
- 5. On April 27, 1991, I gave permission to Crescent Lodge No. 143 to temporarily move their charter on June 20, 1991 to the Cedar Rapids, Nebraska Community Building for purposes of holding a catered dinner and Table Lodge.
- 6. On April 27, 1991, I gave permission to Nebraska Lodge No. 1 to temporarily move their charter on June 8, 1991 to the Bellevue Masonic Temple for purposes of opening a lodge of Master Masons to receive the Grand Master and host a joint meeting of the Grand Lodge Officers of Nebraska and Kansas.
- 7. On May 23, 1991, the Deputy Grand Master, on my behalf and during my absence from the jurisdiction, gave written permission to the Worshipful Master,

Wardens and brethren of Melrose Lodge No. 60 to commence construction of a new Masonic Temple in Orleans, Nebraska, in accordance with previously approved plans and specifications.

- 8. On May 26, 1991, I gave permission to Robert W. Furnas Lodge No. 265 to temporarily move their charter on July 1, 1991 to Gordon Howard's for the purpose of holding an outdoor lodge for their regular communication.
- 9. On June 16, 1991, I gave permission to the Nebraska State Chapter of the Order of DeMolay to conduct a solicitation for funds directly from individual lodges of this jurisdiction. The State Master Councillor was instructed to insure that a copy of my authorization letter accompanied all requests to the lodges.
- 10. On June 16, 1991, I gave permission to East Lincoln Lodge No. 210 to temporarily move their charter on July 13, 1991 to 8100 Old Cheney Road, Lincoln, Nebraska for the purpose of holding an outdoor lodge to confer the Master Mason degree.
- 11. On August 22, 1991, I gave permission to Ashlar Lodge No. 33 to solicit Nebraska lodges and individual members thereof for contributions to the Annual Robert W. Boon Memorial Food Truck Drive in support of the Nebraska Masonic Home.
- 12. On November 20, 1991, I gave permission to Aurora Lodge No. 68 to temporarily move their charter to either the Hamilton County 4-H Building located on the Hamilton County Fairgrounds in Aurora or to the Masonic Temple of Hampton Lodge No. 245 for the months of November and December 1991, and the months of January, February and March of 1992.
- 13. On November 20, 1991, I gave permission to Capitol Lodge No. 3 to temporarily move their charter to the Masonic Temple located at 2411 I Street in Omaha on January 18, 1992, for the purposes of holding an Open Installation of Officers of Capitol Lodge No. 3.
- 14. On November 20, 1991, I gave permission to Minatare Lodge No. 295 to move their charter back from Scotts Bluff Lodge No. 201 in Gering to the Minatare Masonic Temple, effective on January 1, 1992.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS

- 1. On October 31, 1991, pursuant to that authority delineated in §1-301 of the Bylaws, I appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Cotner Lodge No. 297 and a member of that lodge. As of the writing of this address the matter is still pending final resolution.
- 2. On November 14, 1991, pursuant to that authority delineated in §1-301 of the Bylaws, I appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Hickman Lodge No. 256 and a member of that lodge. As of the writing of this address the matter is still pending final resolution.

CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS

The Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America for 1991 began with some Committee meetings on Saturday, February 16th, at the Town and Country Resort Hotel in San Diego, California, the site of the entire conference for this year. It was the distinct honor of your Grand Master to have been elected. at the 1990 Conference, to serve as Chairman of the Conference Committee for this year. The Conference Committee, composed of eight seated Grand Masters, plus the Executive Secretary/Treasurer of the Conference, ex-officio, is charged with the responsibility of arranging the agenda for the conference, selecting speakers, proposing the rules of order for the conference, and various other duties as may be delegated to it by the conference. Nebraska was additionally represented at the Conference by James L. Eatmon, Deputy Grand Master; Donald L. Pohlman, Grand Senior Warden; Steven F. Mattoon, Grand Junior Warden; Don E. Rasmussen, Grand Secretary; Jerry L. Rittenburg, Grand Senior Deacon; Warren D. Lichty, Past Grand Master and then Deputy in Nebraska of the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, United States of America; Thomas W. Tye, Past Grand Master; John D. VerMaas, then Imperial First Ceremonial Master, Ancient and Accepted Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine of North America; and Charles A. Folsom, Past National President, National Sojourners, and Past National Commander, Heroes of '76.

The Conference was most ably presided over this year by the Grand Master of California, M : W : Ronald A. Sherod, as Chairman. His most able assistant as Vice Chairman of the Conference was M : W : W william G. Roberts, Grand Master of Nevada. During the Conference various groups such as the National Masonic Foundation on Drug and Alcohol Abuse, the Masonic Service Association, and the George Washington Masonic National Memorial, conducted their Annual Meetings. The Commission on Recognition, a standing committee of the Conference, also makes its annual presentation.

This was the third consecutive year that Nebraska has played a significant role in the Conference. In 1989 our then Grand Master Thomas W. Tye served as a member of the Conference Committee and was privileged to address that Conference with the official response to the welcome at the opening of the Conference. In 1990 our then Grand Master John M. McHenry, assisted by several other Masons from Nebraska, was responsible for and did an outstanding job of presenting to that Conference a Workshop on Nebraska's Standard Proficiency. This year, Thomas W. Tye, Past Grand Master, gave the Keynote Address to the Conference on Monday morning. M.: W.: Brother Tom's excellent remarks helped to set the tone for the entire Conference Theme — "Be Positive—Catch the Wave". Nebraska was also responsible this year for a Workshop on Public Awareness and Community Service.

Unfortunately, the Conferees rejected, after much debate, a proposal submitted by the Conference's Standing Committee on Fraternal Relations. The proposal was designed to serve as a suggested buffer type of action between the various Grand Masters and our related appendant or allied bodies, particularly the Shrine of North America. The almost irrational and jealous safeguarding of certain of our sister jurisdictions by their Grand Masters of what they perceive or understand as their sovereign right to dictate terms and conditions of operations of the various appendant or allied bodies operating within their jurisdictions is a matter of grave concern to the national leadership of some of those appendant or allied bodies, and is, in some cases, in direct conflict with the duly constituted legislative actions of those national bodies. This is a matter which, if not soon resolved in an amicable fashion, will have far-reaching repercussions within our Fraternity.

The conferees did accept, without debate, the report of the Masonic Renewal Task Force and did adopt a motion making the Masonic Renewal Task Force (now known as the Masonic Renewal Committee of North America) a standing and ongoing committee of the Conference. I will speak more of this Committee, of which Nebraska is an active participant, in the next section of my Address under The Condition of the Craft.

While in many ways this Conference, as frustrating as it may be at times, may seem to some to be of questionable importance, it is my firm opinion and strong recommendation that the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America continue to be supported to the utmost possible by Nebraska's Masonic leaders. M.:W.: Brother Thomas W. Tye stated in his Address to this body, referring to the Conference: "...it is the premiere conference for Masonry in North America where information is gathered and disseminated, new thoughts and ideas as well as old are discussed, and mutual problems are the topic of the day."

Finally, on this matter, it is my proud duty to inform you that at the 1992 Conference to be held in Arlington, Virginia on February 16 through 18, Nebraska will again be playing a significant role. Our Grand Secretary, R : W : Don E. Rasmussen, will be a primary participant in a Workshop to be presented at the Conference of Grand Secretaries on the subject of Masonic Ritual. We congratulate Brother Don on his selection for this important task and know that he will carry the banner of Nebraska proudly.

THE CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

1. OUR NEBRASKA MASONIC CHARITIES. The two primary charities of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, the Nebraska Masonic Home in Plattsmouth and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children in Fremont, continue to provide outstanding care to their residents. Brother Arthur R. Sharp, Executive Director of the Home at Plattsmouth, and Brother Benjiman H. Harvey, Administrator of the Home at Fremont, are both outstanding leaders in their respective positions and are to be commended for their stewardship of your charitable acts.

Any mention of either home and their success would not be complete without recognition of the dynamic leadership of M.: W.: Harry A. Spencer as President of the Board of Trustees of the Home at Plattsmouth and W.: Brother Charles E. "Ched" House as President of the Board of Trustees of the Home at Fremont.

Past Grand Master Spencer this year completed 50 years of service on the Board of Trustees of the Plattsmouth Home and was honored at a special dinner recognizing this singular achievement on September 22, 1991. In spite of his length of service on the Board, M : W : B Brother Harry is among the youngest of thinkers serving with this important group of Masons.

- W. Brother "Ched", who has served this Grand Lodge as our Grand Tyler this year, is a graduate of the Fremont Home having lived there many years in his youth, and brings to his challenging position a unique sense of empathy and a strong ability to lead the deliberations of his Board in the directions which are needed.
- 2. REVISED MONITOR and REVISED BOOK OF CEREMONIES. The Revision Committee, appointed by M. W. Thomas W. Tye in 1990, published the results of their exhaustive efforts this year following your approval at the 134th Annual Communication in February 1991. The work of this group of dedicated Masons will do much to improve the ritual and ceremonial work of this Grand Lodge and is owed a debt of gratitude from each of us.
- 3. PRINCE HALLGRAND LODGE OFNEBRASKA F.: &A.: M.: The bold step taken by the delegates to the 133rd Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge in 1990 in extending full Masonic Recognition to our Masonic Brothers of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska, F.: &A.: M.:, continues to this date to be unique in the scope of the action. While seven other Jurisdictions Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Minnesota, North Dakota, Washington and Wisconsin have mutually recognized their respective Prince Hall Jurisdictions for purposes of inter-visitation, no other has as yet been as all-encompassing in their cognitive actions as have we. Several other Jurisdictions are at this very moment moving forward with deliberate intent to effect a mutual recognition between their respective jurisdictions.

Our recognition actions of 1990 are a matter of understandable concern among some jurisdictions. Primarily, it appears that they are those jurisdictions who have not yet fully accepted that portion of the Standards of Recognition, as published by The Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America, which address the matter of Territorial Sovereignty. That Standard states, in part, when referring to a grand lodge requesting recognition, that it must be: "...an independent self-governing organization, having Masonic authority within the governmental territory over which it assumes jurisdiction — whether Country, Province, State or other political subdivision; or else shares such exclusive territorial jurisdiction with another grand lodge by mutual consent and/or treaty."

To date, no Masonic jurisdiction has taken any action to withdraw or sever Masonic relations with the Grand Lodge of Nebraska over our recognition of Prince Hall, nor is any anticipated. While the Grand Master of West Virginia has issued an edict forbidding his members from visiting any Masonic Lodge in any of those jurisdictions that have recognized Prince Hall in any manner, the

edict specifically states that Masons from the proscribed grand lodges are not prohibited from visiting West Virginia Lodges. Additionally, the United Grand Lodge of England has advised its members that "members of Masonic constitutions not recognized by the United Grand Lodge of England may be encountered in Lodges in North America under grand lodges which we at present recognize. (Note: The reference there is to those Grand Lodges which have recognized Prince Hall Grand Lodges) Until further notice, brethren of the English Constitution should not visit lodges under the grand lodges named above."

In an attempt to bring a semblance of order to the actions of the United Grand Lodge of England and to resolve whatever differences may exist, the Grand Secretary of the United Grand Lodge of England, Cdr. M.B.S. Higham, RN, PJGW, together with the Chairman of the External Relations Committee of the Board of General Purposes of the United Grand Lodge of England, V :: W :: Oscar Boehringer, PGSwdB, flew to Boston, and, on April 11, 1991, met with representatives of those jurisdictions who have recognized Prince Hall. Nebraska was most ably represented at that meeting by Past Grand Master Thomas W. Tye and our Grand Secretary, R :: W :: Don E. Rasmussen. I specifically asked M :: W :: Tye to attend as he was the seated Grand Master in Nebraska at the time of our recognition. While the final results of that meeting are not yet in and may not be realized for some time, it is indeed gratifying and noteworthy that the United Grand Lodge of England has extended herself to such a measure in attempts to bring this matter to a satisfactory resolution.

In the meantime, our relations with the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska, and with its constituent lodges and individual members, continues on the same high plane of enthusiasm and mutual respect which have been enjoyed since our initial recognition of each other.

4. ANNUAL RETREAT OF GRAND LODGE OFFICERS. For three years now, your Grand Lodge Officers have held a retreat at a location outside the boundaries of the State of Nebraska. In spite of the fact that it has been previously reported to you that these retreats are held at basically no expense to Grand Lodge, I still hear complaints from some individuals that those Grand Lodge Officers are taking an Annual Vacation outside Nebraska at the expense of Grand Lodge. My brethren, this simply is not true. All expenses of the individual Grand Lodge Officers and their families are their personal expense and no reimbursement of any kind from any Grand Lodge funds of any sort is made.

That point being hopefully now made, I will reiterate that at these sessions we review the future directions of the Craft, develop modifications of our plans where necessary, and establish details of the Grand Lodge Annual Communication such as you are now attending. Under Nebraska's unique Directorate Leadership, the overall responsibility for the formation of plans and organization of each Annual Communication are the responsibility of the Deputy Grand Master. He, the Deputy, is also responsible for establishing and seeing to fruition the various workshops which have proven to be of such value to our members.

In spite of being physically separated from so many of us by so many miles, your Deputy Grand Master "Sonny" Eatmon has done an excellent job for you for this session and deserves your specific thanks for a job well done.

- 5. THE NEBRASKA MASONIC FOUNDATION. Although the Nebraska Masonic Foundation is not a creature of the Grand Lodge, its well-being is directly related. It is my distinct pleasure to announce that on December 5, 1991, the Internal Revenue Service granted to the organization the Final Determination Letter of the Foundation's Exempt Status under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The actions of the Foundation's Directors, most importantly those of Past Grand Master John M. McHenry, for his personal contributions of time and effort in achieving this select status, are worthy of the highest accolades of the entire Masonic family of Nebraska. This is an organization of which you will be hearing more and more in the days to come. It deserves your support as the leaders of the Foundation strive to make the Foundation responsive to the varied needs of Freemasonry in Nebraska, and attempt to educate the general public of just who we are, what we stand for, and what we do.
- 6. NEBRASKA AS A NATIONAL MASONIC LEADER. My brethren, by the time this year as your Grand Master is over, I will have travelled to eighteen Annual Communications of other Masonic jurisdictions. These include the Grand Lodges of California, Colorado, District of Columbia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nevada, North Dakota, Prince Hall of Nebraska, Tennessee, Texas, Wisconsin and Wyoming. Additionally, either the Deputy Grand Master or the Senior Warden have attended as my Personal Representative the Grand Lodges of Idaho, South Dakota and Washington. Finally, Past Grand Master Byron C. Jenkins will be my Personal Representative to the Grand Lodge of Alaska. The combined membership of these Grand Lodges is roughly 1,082,000 Masons a pretty good cross-section of the total United States membership.

Without exception, at each of the Grand Lodges mentioned above, questions have been posed to us concerning any of a number of the specific programs your leaders have instituted and you the members have embraced in this Grand Lodge over the past few years which have made Nebraska the envy of so many. We were always more than happy to share any of our programs and plans, for it is our opinion that in such cooperation we will once again see our great fraternity commence to grow across this land, as it already has here in Nebraska. It is, my brethren, your acceptance of the need to change which has enabled you to achieve what so many only dream about.

7. MASONIC RENEWAL COMMITTEE of NORTH AMERICA. Again, on a national level, the Masonic Renewal Committee of North America has been established as an on-going standing committee of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America. Past Grand Master McHenry and myself are honored to serve as members of that committee. The Committee held two strategic planning sessions in 1991. The first was at the Lake of the Ozarks and the second in Tulsa, Oklahoma. It is encouraging to know that more than 60 Masonic leaders representing 30 Grand Jurisdictions have met together to

consider our future. Nebraska was represented at both of the strategic planning sessions by our Grand Senior Deacon Jerry L. Rittenburg and our Grand Junior Deacon V. Kaye Ramsey. Our two Deacons were selected to represent Nebraska due to the length of time they have to work as advancing Grand Lodge Line Officers. The intended results of this Committee are based upon a long range approach to the reversal of the diminishing of Masonic influence in our everyday lives and establishing agreement on a vision for Freemasonry for the year 2000.

- 8. ANNOTATION OF NEBRASKA MASONIC LAW. Frequently, during the time a Grand Master is serving in that office, questions are posed to him for a decision that requires an interpretation of our law. Some of these are relatively simple. Some, however, are quite complex and require extensive research through historical records to determine precedent which may or may not have been set by previous Grand Masters in like or similar situations. At one point in time Nebraska had an annotation of our law which was kept up to date and afforded a quick reference tool to be used in such cases. The location of that documentary reference tool has, for some years now, been one of the "hidden mysteries of masonry." One of my first acts as your Grand Master, therefor, was the appointment of a Special Committee charged with the responsibility of completing a full annotation of our law. This is a huge task. Past Grand Master Donald R. Swanson was selected to serve as chairman of this committee because of his experience, abilities, and known meticulous attention to detail. The committee has reported to me that it is hard at work on this onerous task. While the fruits of their labors have not yet fully ripened, the committee is owed our heartfelt thanks.
- 9. FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY. I personally applaud the delegates to the 134th Annual Communication in February 1991 for their concerns and actions involving Grand Lodge funds. The adoption of the balanced budget resolution indicates a desire to see that funds are handled in a responsible manner. The further adoption of an increase in the per-capita to be paid to Grand Lodge for operating funds is viewed as an endorsement of the programs for growth and improvement which have been instituted over the past few years. HOWEVER, the balanced budget is effective immediately, while the increase in available funds will not be realized until calendar year 1993. In keeping with the mandate for a balanced budget this year the Appropriations Committee has been forced to cancel any increases in available funds for the operating budget and to severely restrict or eliminate many of the previously budgeted items. The thoughtful consideration of the voting delegates to the proposal(s) of the Appropriations Committee for Grand Lodge year 1992 is earnestly solicited.
- 10. OUR DEPUTY GRAND CUSTODIANS. Nowhere in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska will you find a more dedicated group of men than in the ranks of this elite group. The time and effort they expend in behalf of our gentle craft is outstanding. I am aware of plans which have been discussed with them by our Deputy Grand Master which will increase their visibility and ultimate worth to this Grand Lodge. I congratulate them all, individually and collectively, on what

they have done in the past and for acceptance of the challenges which are ahead.

11. GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD. Again this year it was my distinct pleasure to continue this outstanding program instituted by M∴W∴ Thomas W. Tye two years ago. We have so many of our brothers throughout this great state that are entitled to recognitions such as this that it is difficult to make these coveted selections. However, on September 28, 1991, it was our pleasure to present the Grand Master's Humanitarian Award to W∴ Lloyd I. Edwards of Pomegranate Lodge No. 110 in Ashland. Then, on October 27, 1991, it was our pleasure to present the Grand Master's Humanitarian Award to W∴ Wayne H. Hardy of Custer Lodge No. 148 in Broken Bow. Both of these individuals are and have been deeply involved in their communities in many ways and have continued, for better than 30 years, to be active in the Masonic Fraternity. Both will have an opportunity to address the Informal Opening of Grand Lodge where they will be more adequately introduced.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In accordance with the provisions of Article X, Section 2(b) of the Constitution, I make the following recommendations, which, in my opinion and the opinion of the Grand Lodge Officers, are deemed necessary and expedient for the future welfare of the Fraternity in this Jurisdiction.

Recommendation Number 1. The Membership Committee, as well as numerous Lodge Secretaries, have once again requested that I place before the Delegates a recommendation to change the date on which a member is delinquent in the payment of his dues. Our current regulations on this matter are extremely lenient, and it is the feeling that this is a potentially destructive situation for many lodges. Many of our lodges struggle to have sufficient funds available throughout the year to meet their necessary obligations while we, in effect, permit our members to have a free ride for up to a whole year without meeting their individual obligations to the lodge. I therefore recommend that Section 2-605 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be changed to read as follows:

"Section 2-605 — LODGE DUES — The dues assessed by all chartered subordinate lodges shall be due and payable on January 1st of the year for which they are assessed and shall become delinquent on March 31st of the same year if not paid by that date.

On April 1 of each year, it shall be the duty of the secretary to notify, in writing, each member who may be in arrears for dues for the current year, of such fact and request payment thereof before April 30 of that year. If such member fails to pay his dues on or before April 30 of such year he shall automatically stand suspended for nonpayment of dues and entry thereof shall be made in the minutes of the lodge at the first subsequent stated meeting. It shall also be the duty of the secretary to notify, in writing, each member automatically suspended for nonpayment of dues. Such notice shall be deemed properly given when mailed by first class mail to the last known post office address of such suspended individual."

Recommendation No. 2. A review of the printed proceedings of this Grand Lodge has shown that, for at least the past 6 years, the Committee on Returns, a Regular Committee of this Grand Lodge, has reported to the Grand Lodge only once. That was in 1987. It therefor must be concluded that for 5 of the past 6 years the committee has not even met to perform the duties assigned by our Bylaws. Years ago, before the membership records were computerized, this committee was no doubt beneficial and necessary. Such is apparently no longer the case. I therefor recommend that:

Section 1-324 — RETURNS — be deleted in its entirety and changed to read: "Sec. 1-324 — (Not used)"

And that:

Section 1-301—NUMERATION AND CLASSIFICATION—be changed in the third paragraph to delete all references to the Committee on Returns.

Recommendation No. 3. Heretofore each subordinate lodge has been required to purchase, through the Grand Lodge, blank receipts for dues ("dues cards") to be issued to members upon payment of their annual dues. The Grand Lodge Office has now achieved the capability, and in fact does, furnish to each lodge secretary a fully personalized dues card for each member of each lodge on an annual basis, saving the individual lodges the expense of purchasing and preparing the dues cards. I therefore recommend that Section 2-604 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be changed to read as follows:

"Section 2-604 —DUES CARDS —HOW PREPARED —The receipt for dues, adopted for use in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall contain all the information contained in the form of receipt found on page 102 of the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge for 1913, printed on cards of convenient size to fit in the ordinary card case.

Said receipts shall be computer-generated in the Office of the Grand Lodge and furnished to each subordinate lodge without charge to the lodge."

Recommendation No. 4. In the past several years the specific duties of the Grand Secretary and certain of those of the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices have been altered by direction of various Grand Masters as a means of modernizing the operations of both entities and to make them more responsive to the general membership of this Grand Lodge, while concomitantly bringing about savings in terms of dollars and efforts expended. After extensive consultations with the current Grand Secretary, the entire Committee on Grand Lodge Offices, and conferral with the Jurisprudence Committee, the following revisions to §1-201 and 1-321 are deemed appropriate. Adoption of these changes will harmonize our Bylaws with currently accepted operating procedures. It is therefore recommended that:

Section 1-201 be hereby deleted in its entirety and the following substituted therefor:

"Sec. 1-201 — GRAND SECRETARY — The Grand Secretary shall have charge of the seal and jewels of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend and record the transactions of the Grand Lodge when meeting in Annual Communication; shall see to the drawing of all orders, certificates, documents and diplomas requiring the seal of the Grand Lodge, to include the affixing of the seal thereon; shall complete and carry on such communications with the various subordinate lodges of this jurisdiction, all appendant and/or allied bodies operating therein, and with such other jurisdictions as may from time to time be necessary to insure that a harmonious relationship exists between such bodies and this Grand Lodge, and to enforce attention to compliance with the constitution and laws of the Grand Lodge as may be necessary. The Grand Secretary shall be ex-officio a member of the Committee on Fraternal Relations and the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices. The Grand Secretary shall, in concert with the staff of the Grand Lodge Office, see that all subordinate lodges submit correct, complete and accurate annual reports as are required by §2-310 of these Bylaws. The Grand Secretary shall report to each Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge such statistical data concerning the status of the membership of this Grand Lodge as may, in his opinion, be appropriate, or as may be directed by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of such duties or other programs of the Grand Lodge to include the promotion of Masonry. The Grand Secretary shall receive as compensation for his services such amount as may be determined by the Appropriations Committee with the approval of the membership of the Grand Lodge."

AND ALSO THAT:

Section 1-321 be hereby deleted in its entirety and the following substituted therefor:

"SEC. 1-321 — GRAND LODGE OFFICES

- (a) The Committee on Grand Lodge Offices shall consist of five members, each to serve for a period of five years, and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. In case of a vacancy in the membership of the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices, the Grand Master shall immediately appoint a member to fill the unexpired term. This Committee shall recommend to the Grand Lodge the adoption of rules and regulations when such rules and regulations shall appear to be for the best interests of the Grand Lodge. Such rules and regulations shall be effective when approved by the Grand Lodge. The determinations of this committee shall be final until changed by the Grand Lodge.
- (b) The Committee on Grand Lodge Offices shall have authority, jurisdiction, and direct supervision over the Grand Lodge Office including the right to

approve the employment of all employees of that office, their salaries and working conditions.

- (c) The Committee shall have the responsibility for prescribing the business methods to be followed within the Grand Lodge Office, to include: (1) the approval of and adherence to those Office Policies and Job Descriptions created from time to time governing all employees of the Grand Lodge Office; (2) the keeping of all membership and related records; (3) the accounting and reporting of Grand Lodge income to include the receipt and deposit of all monies in approved accounts; (4) the preparation, final approval and payment of all expenditures on orders regularly issued and signed by the Grand Master or his designated representative; (5) the maintenance of appropriate levels of supplies for normal activities within the Grand Lodge Office, the use by Grand Lodge Officers and by Committees of the Grand Lodge, as well as those maintained available for use by subordinate lodges; (6) the collection, review and compilation of monthly statistics and activities from subordinate lodge secretaries as required under §2-310 of these bylaws; (7) notifying each subordinate lodge of any indebtedness due the Grand Lodge before the first day of December of each year and the closing of all accounts of subordinate lodges on the thirty-first day of December of each year; and (8) such other matters appropriate to the efficient administrative control of the Grand Lodge not otherwise fixed by the Constitution, Bylaws or other action of the Grand Lodge.
- (d) This committee shall, at least annually, effect a review of equipment available for use in the Grand Lodge Office, the Office of the Grand Secretary, and the Office of the Grand Custodian, and make such recommendations and changes therein as are appropriate and within budgetary restraints.
- (e) All recommendations made to the Grand Lodge with reference to changes in the salaries of Officers of the Grand Lodge shall be referred to this Committee for its review and recommendation before action by the Grand Lodge can be taken thereon."

Recommendation No. 5. The Committee on Work, at the request of the Deputy Grand Master, has been examining all of the ritualistic requirements of this Grand Lodge. The purpose of this review has been to revise some of the out-dated non-esoteric requirements presently practiced so that our presentation of ritualistic work may be as succinct and meaningful as possible without losing any of the ancient meanings. It has now been decided by that Committee, with the concurrence of the Grand Custodian and his Deputies, that the Proficiency Examination Procedures should be modified to eliminate the present necessity of opening a Lodge in the Degree on which the Candidate is to be examined and then going through the time consuming procedure of Calling-Off and then re-opening in the next higher Degree in order to proceed with a degree conferral. To permit this change will require that our law be changed to eliminate a conflict.

Since the ritual is the responsibility of the Committee on Work and the Grand

Custodian, it is therefore my recommendation that our law be changed as so that the phrase "...and examination of candidates..." which appears in the first sentence of \$2-504 — CALLING OFF AND ON — be deleted, so that the sentence WHICH NOW READS:

"The conferring of degrees and examination of candidates shall be conducted by the subordinate lodge opened upon the degree then under consideration."

BE CHANGED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

"The conferring of degrees shall be conducted by the subordinate lodge opened upon the degree then under consideration."

CONCLUSION

As I approach the conclusion of this, my twelfth consecutive year of service to this Grand Lodge as a Grand Lodge Officer, my heart is filled to overflowing with gratitude. Gratitude that our Heavenly Father has blessed me with the physical ability to complete my tasks — Gratitude to all of those stellar individuals who have occupied the Office of Grand Master before me and set the course for us to follow — Gratitude to you the members for having had the confidence in my abilities to serve you — Gratitude to all of the Grand Lodge Officers for the cooperation and support which has been so unselfishly and freely given over the years — Gratitude to the staff of the Grand Lodge Office, specifically to Chris Rudder and Tish DeMoss, for their acceptance of the challenges which have been placed before them and their accomplishment thereof over and beyond the call of duty — but most especially, gratitude and love to my wife, Carole, without whose constant and enduring love and support I would have been unable to surmount the challenges and vicissitudes which have come our way along this journey.

In all that I have done I have earnestly tried to do that which was thought best for Masonry — first, last and always.

The great strides which have been realized in Nebraska Masonry can only be attributed to YOU the individual and collective members who have, perhaps unknowingly, adopted that simple yet forceful philosophy contained in those ten small two letter words — "If it is to be, it is up to me."

Permit me, my Brethren, to close this my address to you with the following Prayer penned by Max Ehrmann in which he so eloquently states:

"Let me do my work each day; and if the darkened hours of despair overcome me, may I not forget the strength that comforted me in the desolation of other times. May I still remember the bright hours that found me walking over the silent hills of my childhood, or dreaming on the margin of the quiet river, when a light glowed within me, and I promised my early God to have courage amid the tempests of the changing years. Spare me from bitterness and from the sharp passions of unguarded moments. May I not forget that poverty and riches are of the spirit. Though the world know me not, may thoughts and actions be such as shall keep me friendly with myself. Lift my eyes from the earth, and let me not forget the uses of the stars. Forbid that I should judge others lest I condemn myself. Let me not follow the clamor of the world, but walk calmly in my path. Give me a few friends who will love me for what I am; and keep ever burning before my vagrant steps the kindly light of hope. And though age and infirmity overtake me, and I come not within sight of the castle of my dreams, teach me still to be thankful for life, and for time's olden memories that are good and sweet; and may the evening's twilight find me gentle still."

BY-LAWS APPROVED

On December 13, 1991, I approved an amendment to the bylaws of Wahoo Lodge No. 59 increasing the amount of their annual dues and changing the method of computation thereof.

(b) "Attempting to give the aid of Freemasonry, in organized or individual form, to any lottery of gift enterprise, or the sale, purchase, or drawing of lottery tickets."

M..W.: Grand Master called for a signer of Resolution #1 to approach the microphone at the altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. W..B.: Cleo Robinson, Jr., Secretary of Nebraska Lodge No. 1 spoke as the author and a signer of the resolution regarding lotteries and raffles.

The Grand Master called for discussion on the resolution, ruling that he would accept only two pro and two con speakers for no more than two minutes apiece.

Donald Field, Master of Blazing Star Lodge No. 200, Burwell, and Bob Van Valkenburg, Senior Warden of Liberty Lodge No. 300, spoke in opposition to the question.

By a show of hands, the resolution was defeated.

Resolution #2 — Resolution to change paragraph 2 of Section 2-301: "Officers - Election and Appointment," to read as follows:

The elective officers shall be elected by secret written ballot by a majority vote at the first regular meeting in November of each year. Anyone so elected should, if possible, accept the office. An election cannot be reconsidered by the lodge unless the member so elected declines. All oppointive officers shall be appointed by the Master.

LeRoy H. Rosenthal, Jr., East Lincoln Lodge No. 210 in Lincoln, elaborated on Resolution #2, regarding the traditional date for election of officers, and moved the adoption of the resolution. Motion was seconded.

By a show of hands, the resolution was passed.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

R:W: Deputy Grand Master James Eatmon presided over the discussion of the Grand Master's Recommendations.

Recommendation #1

Recommendation #1 to change Section 2-605 — Lodge Dues.

The Recommendation was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence and discussion from the floor ensued. The Deputy Grand Master called for the Tellers to receive the written ballot. There were a total of 271 ballots cast. Those balloting For: 166. Against: 105. A two-thirds vote of 181 was not achieved and the recommendation failed.

Recommendation #2

Grand Master's Recommendation #2, deleting Section 1-324 — Returns, and changing Section 1-301 — Numeration and Classification, was found to be in proper form by the committee. Following a brief explanation, the question was called and the recommendation was adopted.

Recommendation #3

Grand Master's Recommendation #3, to change Section 2-604 — Dues Cards, How Prepared, was found by the committee to be in proper form. Following discussion, the recommendation was adopted.

Recommendation #4

Grand Master's Recommendation #4 changing Section 1-201 — Grand Secretary and Section 1-321 — Grand Lodge Offices, was found by the committee to be in proper form. Following a brief explanation, the question was called and at the recommendation was adopted.

Recommendation #5

Grand Master's Recommendation #5, to change Section 2-504 — Calling Off and On, was found by the committee to be in proper form.

Following discussion, the recommendation was adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

FEBRUARY 1992

- 1. Following approval of the Committee's report at the February 1991 Grand Lodge Communication, the authorized editions of a Revised Standard Monitor and Ceremonies were published and made available to all Subordinate Lodges in late summer of 1991.
- 2. During 1991, the Committee also prepared a Standard Floor Work Manual. Samples of this Manual were presented for review by the Deputy Custodians during the Central School of Instruction which was held on September 20, 1991 in Grand Island, Nebraska.

This manual is in the process of being edited for final publication and will be available to all Subordinate Lodges on a "cost of reproduction" basis later this spring. It will be of valuable assistance to all Lodges in preparing their members for proper ritualistic floor work.

3. Although Degree Team competitions were scheduled for the fall of 1991, they were subsequently canceled for lack of interest. Only two teams from the Ceresco area and one team from the North Platte area indicated an interest in participating last year.

It is a recommendation of the Committee on Nebraska Work, that future competitions be arranged to portray the conferral of the Entered Apprentice Degree rather than the Second Section of the Master's Degree. This will allow more lodges with limited membership an opportunity to take part on an equal footing with those which have a larger membership from which to draw sufficient ritualistic participants.

4. It is also the recommendation of the Committee that the Ritual for closing any Lodge meeting be modified to eliminate the time consuming and redundant Lecture portion between the Master and Officers.

LODGE CLOSING PROCEDURE RECOMMENDATION

Current ritual dictates that five (5) classes of ceremonies must be performed in opening any Lodge. They are:

CONGREGATING
PURGING
TYLING
LECTURES
DECLARATION

In closing a Lodge, three (3) ceremonies must be performed:

TYLING

LECTURES

DECLARATION

As the Lectures between the Master and various officers during closing are almost exactly the same as in opening, it is recommended that this redundancy be eliminated during the closing ceremony.

Under this format the following procedure in closing is recommended:

When the Master is ready to close the Lodge, he asks the Senior and Junior Wardens if either has anything to bring before the Lodge, the Secretary if he has anything on his table and then the Craft if they have anything to offer for the good of Masonry.

The Master then raises the Lodge and asks the Senior Warden how Masons should meet, (WM, SW, & JW descend to the floor level.) The Master then asks the Junior Warden how they should act and then states how they should part and immediately gives his closing prayer.

The Master then declares the Lodge closed with words and motions contained in the present Ritual and instructs the Junior and Senior Deacons to perform their duties.

While the Senior and Junior Deacons are performing their duties the Master returns up his steps, keeping the pedestal to his RIGHT, remains uncovered until the Lesser Lights are extinguished, covers himself and when the Junior Deacon reports that he has completed his duty, the Master raps once and the Lodge is closed.

5. A suggestion has been made that the Proficiency Examination procedure should be modified to eliminate the present necessity of opening a Lodge in the Degree on which the Candidate is to be examined and then going through the long procedure of Calling Off and then Re-opening in the next Degree in order to proceed with the conferral.

During a meeting held in Kearney on Saturday, August 17, 1991, the following recommendation was presented.

Have the Grand Master make a floor Recommendation that the words "...and examination of candidates..." be deleted from Section 2-504.

With this change in the By-Laws, the procedure for examination will be as follows:

When an Entered Apprentice is ready for examination in that Degree, the Lodge is first opened in the Fellowcraft Degree.

While the Lodge is being opened, the Candidate is properly clothed for the Fellowcraft Degree except that the hoodwink and cable tow are not worn and the Apron is in the Entered Apprentice position.

As soon as the Lodge is opened, the Worshipful Master raps up the Senior Deacon and orders him to instruct the Stewards to present the Candidate for examination. The Stewards go to the Altar, salute the Worshipful Master, turn left and in going to the Preparation Room, the Junior Steward opens the door, and the Senior Steward exits first and takes charge of the Candidate.

The Senior Steward has Candidate knock thrice on the Preparation Room door. The Senior Deacon goes to the door, opens it, takes over the Candidate and conducts him West of the Altar on the Inside Line of March and on 1/3 Line facing North. The Senior Deacon then steps back one pace and remains in position during the examination.

The Examiner places himself North of the Altar, on the Inside Line of March and on the 1/3 Line, facing South, and proceeds with the examination.

If more than one Candidate is examined, the Senior Deacon and additional Brethren assist as required.

Upon completion of the examination and assuming the Master declares the Candidate proficient, the Senior Deacon takes charge of the Candidate, conducts him straight NORTH on the 1/3 Line to the North Outside Line of March, turns left and turns the Candidate over to the Senior Steward who then conducts him out of the lodge via the Preparation Room Door, preceded by the Junior Steward. The Tyler takes charge of the Candidate.

The Stewards immediately return to the Lodge by the Preparation Room Door, approach the Altar and salute the Worshipful Master and return to their chairs.

After the door is closed by the Junior Steward, the Tyler sees that the Candidate is hoodwinked, the cabletow is in the Fellowcraft position and the Apron is left in the Entered Apprentice Degree arrangement.

The Degree then proceeds as per the present ritual starting with the Worshipful Master ordering to the Senior Deacon to see that the Candidate is prepared for initiation.

Point of argument!

A Candidate for the Fellowcraft Degree has already been inside of a Lodge and the only difference between what he has seen would be the position of the Great Lights which he would not be aware of until after the Obligation anyway!

A Fellowcraft Mason could be handled in a same manner by first opening the Lodge in the Master Masons Degree.

If Candidates are to be examined in both the FELLOWCRAFT and MASTERS Degree prior to examining the Brethren in their individual Degrees, candidates would then be taken out of the Lodge by way of the Preparation Room door immediately following their **individual** examinations.

With this procedure, a great deal of duplication involving considerable wasted time, would be eliminated.

The Most Worshipful Grand Master is agreeable to this change, as well as the Grand Custodians and a consensus of the Deputy Grand Custodians.

REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC FOUNDATION

CHARLES W. AMIDON, PGM, #281 & #327

During the year 1991, the Foundation received from Internal Revenue Service it's permanent classification as a 501(c)(3) Tax Exempt Organization. Donors may rely on this classification until such time as they are actually notified of a change in status. From its incorporation in 1985 to the permanent classification the Foundation was operating under an advanced ruling, in which it was a 501(c)(3) Tax Exempt Organization subject to the permanent classification.

In 1991 the Foundation together with the Prince Hall Grand Lodge F.. & A..M.. supported the Drug Awareness Resistance Education program (D.A.R.E.). This program is coordinated by the Nebraska State Patrol and provides educational programs to students in 5th & 6th grade classes across the State by police officers. The Foundation purchased \$5,514.74 worth of supplies and materials for this program. The material indicated that it was being provided by the Masons of Nebraska. This was just one of the ways the Foundation helped promote, support and maintain the principals of Freemasonry and in the process benefitted the public at large.

The Grand Master requested that the Foundation help support the committee of Grand Masters of North America on Masonic Renewal. This particular committee is developing video tapes and other promotional aids in such areas as membership recruitment and retention and Masonic history. The Foundation contributed \$10,000.00 to help produce materials we can use in each of our Lodges. If we would have produced these materials using only the resources from Nebraska, we would have spent nearly \$200,000.00 in their production.

The Nebraska Masonic Foundation continues to administer funds from trusts, gifts and bequests for scholarship purposes. Funds are made available to every lodge in the State to give Masonic Scholarships in their community. Individual lodges can establish personal scholarships that are administered by the Foundation. The Pierce-Evergreen Scholarship was granted to Nichole Mittelstaedt who is attending Northern State University. Kimball Lodge established a Scholarship Fund this year and the Masons of the Kimball areas have generously

contributed to it. More than \$30,000.00 in scholarships have been given each year to Nebraska students. The Nebraska Masonic Foundation has now taken over the function of reimbursing Lodges for Guest Night Dinners. If your Lodge is holding a Guest Night you can be reimbursed for the meals of the guests. You should direct your request to the Foundation at P.O. Box 5348, Lincoln, Nebraska 68505.

As reported last year the Foundation has been successful in purchasing a building site for a building which will house the Grand Lodge offices, museum and library. The site is at the corner of 11th & J Streets in Lincoln, Nebraska, on the Lincoln Mall, which is a very prominent and assessable location between the State Capitol and the County City Building. The Fund Raising Committee is now in full swing and when contacted we would appreciate any support you would have for the building project. The land and building is estimated to cost approximately \$750,000.00 which of course is greatly reduced from the prior building plans of \$2,500,000.00.

The Nebraska Masonic Foundation thanks all brothers and friends who have made donations and contributions to the Foundation. We appreciate all your support and look forward to another good year in 1992.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES

Frank V. Lawson, Jr., 1, Chairman

In prior years the Grand Trustees had the responsibility for the management of the investment funds of the Grand lodge and the Nebraska Masonic Home.

A resolution adopted in the Nebraska Grand Lodge Session, February 2, 1990, authorized the transfer of The Nebraska Masonic Home Endowment and Bequest Funds to the recently formed Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation. Effective August 1, 1991, this transfer was made. The Foundation assumed the responsibility for the Home funds. A special audit was made of the Home funds for the period May 1, 1991 to August 1, 1991. Copies of this audit report are on file at the Grand Lodge Office.

This report, therefore, deals only with Grand Lodge investment funds. As explained before, the Grand Lodge investment funds are handled in two separate accounts—the Grand Lodge General (or unrestricted) Fund and the Restricted (or special) Fund. The latter encompasses the Stephen C. Houghton Fund the Emick Scholarship Fund as well as the Perpetual Membership Fund. A record of the separate interests of the various contributing entities is kept by the Grand Lodge Office.

In the tables below the figures for 1991 are from the auditors preliminary, yet-to-be-finalized report.

This was the third year of deficit operation. In a sense this is not surprising. Revenues are definitely flat and inflationary pressures keep pushing expenses up. It should be noted here that the dues increase passed at the 1991 Grand Lodge Session are being collected at the Lodge level this (1992) year but are not due to be paid to Grand Lodge until April 1993. This delay or lag should be kept in mind as future budgets are developed.

There was an additional item of note in 1991. Some bonds which were purchased at a discount some years ago matured and a capital gain of \$30,888 was realized. That is good news/bad news. The good news is that gain was realized. The bad news is that the gain is non-recurring, (incidentally, it is not included in Total Revenues above) and that the bond proceeds had to be reinvested at lower interest rates.

Restricted Funds

These funds include the Emick Scholarship Fund and the Stephen C. Houghton Fund. Total 1991 income was \$25, 836, which was down from \$27, 251 due primarily to declining interest rates. For 1991 disbursements were \$17,617 and the year-end fund balance was \$384,230.

Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

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The Grand Senior Warden to the Grand Lodge of Idaho, R : W : Brother James Davidson, was given the opportunity at this time to bring his greetings to the members of the Grand Lodge. His remarks were followed by greetings from R : W : Brother Doug Krimmer, the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin, and from W : Robert L. Bartholic, Grand Junior Deacon of the Grand Lodge of Colorado.



REPORT OF CHARTERS AND DISPENSATIONS

M∴W∴ Sir, there were four lodges that were on our list from last year that have not attended. No. 124 from Auburn did report this time and are doing very good. No. 68 at Aurora, the officers were here and progressing great. Oshkosh Lodge 286, there was a brother here, a proxy for the Master, Brother Paul Temple, but he never did show up, and no one did show up from Oakland Lodge No. 91. Your committee will continue to work on both those lodges and see if we can't bring them back in the fold. That's my report.

Upon a motion by Brother Madsen the report was seconded and approved by the Masons present.

R : W : Deputy Grand Master Eatmon assumed the gavel while the Grand Master presented the report of the Committee on Codification of the Law Committee for the absent Grand Junior Warden, Chairman.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

R:.W:. Steven F. Mattoon, 75, Chairman

(With the Deputy Grand Master presiding, this report was given by the Grand Master in the absence of the Committee Chairman.)

Your Committee on Codification of the Law respectfully submits its report relative to amendments or additions to the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge, as enacted at this communication.

That Subsection H of Section 1-401 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows, and that otherwise said Section 1-401 shall remain unchanged:

"Section 1-401 (h) The Board of Grand Trustees shall employ a certified public accountant to make an annual audit of the accounts of the Grand Lodge. An original of such audit shall be filed in the office of the Grand Lodge."

That Section 2-403 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-403 — REFUSING EXAMINATION — A brother refusing to qualify and pass an examination in the Master Mason degree as provided in Section 2-402 renders himself liable to charges. No one hereafter made a Master Mason shall be entitled to a certificate of good standing, certificate of transfer, demit, diploma, to hold an office in a lodge, nor to make application or join any lodge, society, or institution enumerated in section 3-102, Sub-section "g" of this Code until he has complied with said Section 2-402; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not apply to a brother whose only lodge membership is in a lodge in a Masonic Jurisdiction other than Nebraska."

That Section 2-708 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-708 — LODGE DEDICATIONS — CONDITIONS — A lodge room can be lawfully dedicated if occupied only by those organizations provided for in Section 3-102 (g) including a Chapter of the Order of Demolay, International Order of Job's Daughters, Rainbow for Girls, and a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, a Council of Royal & Select Masters, a Commandery of Knights Templar, a body of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, a Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, a Temple of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, a Chapter of the Acacia Fraternity and the Achoth Sorority."

That Section 2-802 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-803 — PETITIONS FORM AND WHERE PRESENTED — Peti-

tions for initiation must be submitted upon the form set out in the Appendix to this Code and for sale through the office of the Grand Lodge, or upon forms prepared by the subordinate lodge, which must in all cases embrace all of the matter contained within the form adopted by the Grand Lodge."

That Section 2-1209 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-1209 — MONITOR — The Monitor adopted by the Grand Lodge of this jurisdiction at its annual communication in the year 1991, is the adopted work of this Grand Jurisdiction. Nothing outside of our esoteric work is authorized and our monitorial work as published by this Grand Lodge shall be given or be permitted to be given in the conferring of degrees, at funerals, or any work of the subordinate lodge: Provided, that with the approval in writing of the Grand Master of this Grand Jurisdiction and of the Grand Master of any Grand Jurisdiction within which this Grand Jurisdiction is in fraternal relations, any subordinate lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction may invite members of such other Grand Jurisdiction to confer either or any of the degrees of Entered Apprentice Mason, Fellow Craft Mason or Master Mason upon a candidate of such other Grand Jurisdiction and to use the work of such other Grand Jurisdiction in such degree or degrees.

All of the work of the Subordinate Lodge, including opening and closing, shall be conducted in the English language."

That Section 1-324 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be deleted in its entirety and changed to read: "Section 1-324—(Not Used)."

That Section 1-301 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-301 — NUMERATION AND CLASSIFICATION — The committees of this Grand Lodge shall be of four classes, namely, Standing Committees, Regular Committees, Special Committees and Trial Commissions.

The Standing Committees shall be the following: Codification of the Law, Jurisprudence, Fraternal Relations, Fraternal Dead, Masonic Relief, Temple Building Advisory, Masonic Education, Board of Grand Trustees, Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund, George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, Nebraska Work, Finance, Appropriations, Grand Lodge Offices, Lodge Advisory, Public Relations, Membership and Youth. Except as otherwise provided by these Bylaws, all Standing Committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members and shall be appointed by the Grand Master within ten days after his installation.

The Regular Committees shall be the following: Grievances, Doings of the Grand Lodge Officers, Charters and Dispensations, Credentials and Entertainment of Distinguished Guests. The Regular Committees, except the Credentials Committee, shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members and shall be appointed by the Grand Master at least sixty days prior to the next Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge. The Credentials Committee shall

consist of not less than three nor more than seven members and shall be appointed in the same manner as other Regular Committees.

Special Committees may be appointed at the will and pleasure of the Grand Master or at the direction of the Grand Lodge.

The Grand Master shall appoint from time to time such committees for the purpose of conducting Masonic trials as in his judgment shall be deemed advisable; each committee shall consist of not less than three nor more than five disinterested Master Masons. Said committee shall be styled "Trial Commission." The Grand Master shall designate the President of such Commission. Three members shall constitute a quorum and a Master Mason appointed by the Commission shall act as its Secretary and in his absence the Trial Commission may designate some other Master Mason so to act. A majority of such Commission sitting at a trial shall decide all questions before it."

That Section 2-604 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-604 — DUES CARDS — HOW PREPARED. The receipt for dues, adopted for use in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall contain all the information contained in the form of receipt found on page 102 of the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge for 1913, printed on cards of convenient size to fit in the ordinary card case. Said receipts shall be computer-generated in the Office of the Grand Lodge and furnished to each subordinate lodge without charge to the lodge."

That Section 1-201 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be deleted in its entirety and the following be substituted therefor:

"Section 1-201 — GRAND SECRETARY — The Grand Secretary shall have charge of the seal and jewels of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend and record the transactions of the Grand Lodge when meeting in Annual Communication; shall see to the drawing of all orders, certificates, documents and diplomas requiring the seal of the Grand Lodge, to include the affixing of the seal thereon; shall complete and carry on such communications with the various subordinate lodges of this jurisdiction, all appendant and/or allied bodies operating therein, and with such other jurisdictions as may from time to time be necessary to insure that a harmonious relationship exists between such bodies and this Grand Lodge, and to enforce attention to compliance with the constitution and laws of the Grand Lodge as may be necessary. The Grand Secretary shall be ex-officio a member of the Committee on Fraternal Relations and the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices. The Grand Secretary shall in concert with the staff of the Grand Lodge Office, see that all subordinate lodges submit correct, complete and accurate annual reports as are required by Section 2-310 of these Bylaws. The Grand Secretary shall report to each Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge such statistical data concerning the status of the membership of this Grand Lodge as may, in his opinion, be appropriate, or as may be directed by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of such duties or other programs of the Grand

Lodge to include the promotion of Masonry. The Grand Secretary shall receive as compensation for his services such amount as may be determined by the Appropriations Committee with the approval of the membership of the Grand Lodge."

That Section 1-321 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be deleted in its entirety and the following be substituted therefor:

"Section 1-321 — GRAND LODGE OFFICES.

(a) The Committee on Grand Lodge Offices shall consist of five members, each to serve for a period of five years, and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. In case of a vacancy in the membership of the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices, the Grand Master shall immediately appoint a member to fill the unexpired term.

This Committee shall recommend to the Grand Lodge the adoption of rules and regulations when such rules and regulations shall appear to be for the best interests of the Grand Lodge. Such rules and regulations shall be effective when approved by the Grand Lodge. The determinations of this committee shall be final until changed by the Grand Lodge.

- (b) The Committee on Grand Lodge Offices shall have authority, jurisdiction, and direct supervision over the Grand Lodge Office including the right to approve the employment of all employees of that office, their salaries and working conditions.
- (c) The Committee shall have the responsibility for prescribing the business methods to be followed within the Grand Lodge Office, to include: (1) the approval of and adherence to those Office Policies and Job Descriptions created from time to time governing all employees of the Grand Lodge Office; (2) The keeping of all membership and related records; (3) the accounting and reporting of Grand Lodge Income to include the receipt and deposit of all monies in approved accounts; (4) the preparation, final approval and payment of all expenditures on orders regularly issued and signed by the Grand Master or his designated representative; (5) the maintenance of appropriate levels of supplies for normal activities within the Grand Lodge Office, the use by Grand Lodge Officers and by Committees of the Grand Lodge, as well as those maintained available for use by subordinate lodges; (6) the collection, review and compilation of monthly statistics and activities from subordinate lodge secretaries as required under Section 2-310 of these bylaws; (7) notifying each subordinate lodge of any indebtedness due the Grand Lodge before the first day of December of each year and the closing of all accounts of subordinate lodges on the thirty-first day of December of each year; and (8) such other matters appropriate to the efficient administrative controls of the Grand Lodge not otherwise fixed by the Constitution, Bylaws or other action of the Grand Lodge.
- (d) This committee shall, at least annually, effect a review of equipment available for use in the Grand Lodge Office, the Office of the Grand Secretary, and the Office of the Grand Custodian, and make such recommendations and changes therein as are appropriate and within budgetary restraints.

(e) All recommendations made to the Grand Lodge with reference to changes in the salaries of Officers of the Grand Lodge shall be referred to this Committee for its review and recommendation before action by the Grand Lodge can be taken thereon."

That Section 2-504 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-504 — CALLING OFF AND ON — The conferring of degrees shall be conducted by the subordinate lodge opened upon the degree then under consideration. To pass from a lodge of one degree to a lodge of another degree, the lodge may be first called to refreshment and then opened in the degree desired. The closing of a lodge in one degree also closes the lodge opened on all inferior degrees.

A lodge cannot be called off from one day or night to another day or night, except in cases of trials."

That Section 2-301 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-301 — ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT — The elective officers of a subordinate lodge shall consist of a Master, Senior, and Junior Wardens, Treasurer and Secretary. The appointive officers shall consist of a Chaplain, Senior and Junior Deacons, Senior and Junior Stewards and Tyler. The officers of Marshal and Organist may also be appointed if desired.

The elective officers shall be elected by secret written ballot by a majority vote at the first regular meeting in November of each year. Anyone so elected should, if possible, accept the office. An election cannot be reconsidered by the lodge unless the member so elected declines. All appointive officers shall be appointed by the Master."

Upon the motion of the Grand Master, the report was seconded and carried.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC RELIEF

Your Committee on Masonic Relief had several requests again this year for assistance one request didn't respond and came from California the other was for long term assistance and also was in need of some immediate help and after talking to the Grand Master, it was decided to give \$100.00 from our budgeted amount. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

B. Lynn Alexander, 54, Chairman

Recent surveys and studies in the Masonic Community predict that within a few years — perhaps by the turn of the century, half of all masons alive today will have passed into the eternal lodge. It is difficult for us to imagine what the Masonic Fraternity will be like if these predictions come to pass. There is no question that membership is declining. One by one, we see old lodges surren-

dering their charters, and members fading away. At the same time, we see that in parts of the world where Masonry has been dormant, there is a new enthusiasm for the Ancient Craft. Lodges are being opened, and grand jurisdictions are being reestablished. We need to put some of that enthusiasm into our own lodges.

One way to put enthusiasm into a lodge is to develop an aggressive Masonic Education Program. We mean a program that is something more than having a brother read a short article from a magazine during the meeting. We are looking for programs that involve the members in stimulating educational experiences. After all, our ritual lessons teach us that Masons should pursue learning throughout their lives. Like all institutions these days, we are short of money. That is true for your Grand Lodge. But money is not really a critical factor for Masonic Education. Ideas for Masonic Education can be found in your own community.

One suggestion for Masonic Education is to develop a discussion on the topics of the decline of masonic membership — what should we do about it — how can the fraternity become more active in the community — how can the fraternity be more interesting to younger men? Once the membership becomes accustomed to the discussion program, other topics can be offered. Subjects for discussion are endless; from questions about ritual, to masonic history, to activities of jurisdictions around the world. These discussions can be very interesting, and provide an incentive for attendance at lodge as well as for greater community interest in the lodge.

The sources for masonic information and topics for discussion are endless. Some ideas follow:

How about a field trip to visit locations of Masonic Cornerstones in the area. Civil authorities could be involved, and a little research in Grand Lodge Proceedings will provide historic background for each cornerstone.

Try a "Masonic Anecdote" program wherein members are invited to share short stories about lodge folklore, embarrassing ritual incidents, significant or interesting masonic encounters with other masons. Everyone has a story to tell.

Nearly every lodge has masonic artifacts; photographs, old aprons, charters and letters, swords, and memorabilia. Select some of these artifacts, and develop a program around them.

Arrange a visit to a local historical society or museum. Be prepared to discuss exhibits and their connection to the local lodge, or Nebraska masonic history. Again local authorities could be involved.

Develop a masonic father-son evening. Bring in a prominent person of interest to the boys. Go light on masonic recruiting, but show the boys that their father or grandfather is a mason. Make sure the community is aware of the event.

Develop a teacher appreciation evening to include spouses and guests. Honor the local educators, and make the point that masons are involved in the community, and appreciate education professionals. Get all the lodge members involved. Again make sure the community is aware of the event.

Try an education program that focuses on one of the craft degrees. In the Fellowcraft, the lodge might invite a local math teacher to give a talk about Phyutagoras and or Euclid and Geometry. A local architect could give a talk about orders in the architecture and or the types of columns. How about inviting a modern working mason to describe the methods of brick and stone-work construction? When appropriate, the lodge could be called to refreshment for these discussions. Some talks could be open to the public, and thus offer an opportunity to get non-masons into the lodge facilities, meet masons, and become interested in lodge activities. The idea is to use masonic education to make lodge attendance interesting to a broad range of people.

Don't forget the use of Table Lodges for masonic education. Table lodges always inspire interest. They are not difficult to organize, and the Education Committee can offer samples of rituals and advise. A table lodge is also an excellent opportunity to present a masonic education program. Table Lodges can, and should be tailored to the interests of your local lodge. A table lodge is an excellent format for lodge award activities, and with a little imagination a Table Lodge can be converted to a Festive Board to include spouses and guests.

Remember that the Grand Lodge Office has video tapes, and materials that are available upon request. Also members of the Education Committee are ready to offer suggestions, provide help, and give you further ideas. All it takes is a phone call. Don't forget that proficiency in ritual work is automatically an educational experience. One idea is to organize a groups for the purpose of learning ritual. During the course of proficiency practice, perhaps in a round-robin manner, discussion will develop and the participants will become more knowledgeable about masonic ideas. The bottom line is that a vigorous educations program will make lodge meetings more interesting, and will ultimately lead to a growing and active membership.

We should stop trying to make masonic education difficult. Instead we should look at masonic education as a tool to enhance and benefit the lodge as an institution, and the community as a whole. We need to use a little imagination and enjoy the blessings that will result.

It houses the Lodge which George Washington served as Master, and his picture is there at the head of the line of Past Master's pictures. Another Lodge room is a replica of the room in which Washington presided over the Lodge with its 18th century ambience and furnishings.

The Master's chair in the replica Lodge Room is one which Washington brought from his library at Mt. Vernon. Every year, after his installation, the new Master of Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22 is allowed to remove the protective ribbon and sit in George Washington's chair. What a feeling that must be! It is a thrill just to stand among the many, many things which belonged to or were used by Washington, in the replica room and in the magnificent museum, which contains the Washington Family Bible and so many other things.

In addition to the museum and the extensive Masonic library, the Memorial Building also houses displays which were furnished by almost every associated and appendant Masonic body you can think of. These display are all different, and are most colorful and interesting.

The George Washington Masonic National Memorial building is located high atop Shooters Hill in Alexandria, Virginia. In the 18th century, many people thought this should be the location of our National Capitol, but George Washington would not hear of it. He indicated that he owned a great deal of real property in and around Alexandria and that to locate the seat of National Government there would unduly increase the value of his property. He did not want to make money from the actions of his Government.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

The Committee on Finance met several times throughout 1991 and early 1992 to perform the duties as outlined in Section 1-318 of the Bylaws of Grand Lodge. At each of these meetings, the following audit procedure was followed:

- 1. A comparison of the canceled checks to the check register, as well as examination of endorsements.
- 2. Examination of support documents for disbursements and review of accounts to which the disbursements were charged selecting all items over \$500 and every fifth disbursement at random.

- 3. Review and reconciliation of bank statements.
- 4. Review of all income items and lodge assessment.
- 5. Review of the financial statements.

Total revenues for the year 1991 were \$389,391.92. 1991 budget revenue estimate was \$352,110.00, so that there was an excess of revenue over budget in the amount of \$37,281.92. It should be noted however, that \$30,888.00 of these excess revenues were generated by the sale, of certain investments by the Grand Trustees and that the amount of \$30,888.00 represents profit made by the sale of those investments so that actual total revenues exclusive of the aforementioned gain was \$358,503.92 some \$6,393.92 in excess of total revenue budgeted.

Prior to year end and in accordance with section 1-325, proper authorization to adjust subtotals budgeted was approved by the Appropriations Committee and the requisite number of Grand Lodge Officers. Over all, expenditures were \$9,903.00 under the amount budgeted for the calendar year 1991. Total expenditures for the calendar year in all categories was \$398,102.98. Our anticipated deficit in accordance with the 1991 budget adopted by this Grand Lodge was \$36, 996.00 and in actuality our deficit at year end was \$8,711.06 some \$28,284.94 less than the amount of deficit anticipated.

The members of the Finance Committee found satisfactory verification for all expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and were able to complete their audit procedures as hereinabove referred to with the fine aid and assistance of the office manager and staff of the Grand Lodge Office.

This committee's report which was adopted by this Grand Lodge in 1991 recommended that the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices be requested to establish written procedures for the expenditure of Grand Lodge funds, by including a voucher system for establishing responsibility for authorization and approval of expenditures and a designation of the appropriation from which to be paid. This recommendation was forwarded to the committee on Grand Lodge Offices by the Grand Master and is still being worked on by said committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GRAND LODGE OFFICES

Your Committee on the Grand Lodge Offices can report to you that because of the continuity of our office personnel and their knowledge and experience that we as a committee kept out of their way and allowed them to do their jobs. Our committee was not intrusive and I am sure that the staff appreciated it.

The equipment purchased during 1990 continues to allow us to save significant dollars in the area of mailing expense and the preparation and printing of the

Nebraska Mason and the Proceedings. Because of the squeeze on revenue to the Grand Lodge, the Grand Lodge Officers and the office staff has done an excellent job of controlling expenditures this past year.

The Grand Master submitted to our committee his recommendations regarding the proposed changes in the Bylaws with respect to the Grand Secretary and this committee. One of the changes would be to eliminate the requirement of a performance bond since the insurance industry has not written these types of bonds since 1965. In anticipation of the approval of the Grand Master's recommendations the committee adopted the following policy:

"With knowledge of the Grand Master's proposed recommendations to amend Section 1-201 and 1-321 of the Bylaws of Grand Lodge; and recognizing that if said recommendations are approved, a policy of this committee needs to be implemented relating to the requirement of a performance bond with reference to the Grand Lodge Office Manager; and recognizing that the insurance industry since 1965 has not written performance bond insurance; and recognizing that the Grand Lodge does have and carries Directors and Officers liability coverage which extends coverage to all officers (including the Grand Secretary) the Office Manager and all Trustees of the Grand Lodge in the amount of two million dollars.

Now, therefor, be it resolved that the committee on Grand Lodge Offices does hereby, in case the above resolution of Grand Master James N. DeMoss is approved, adopt as a policy, that Directors and Officers liability coverage shall be provided in a minimum amount of one million dollars covering all elected Grand Lodge Officers, the Office Manager, and the Grand Trustees with the cost of said insurance to be paid by the Grand Lodge".

Finally, as required under section 1-105 of the Bylaws, this committee sets the milage and per diem allowances for this Grand Lodge Session. Because of the budget constraints for the fiscal year of 1992 the mileage allowance is set at \$0.00.

Our major activity for the year 1991 was publishing of the "Nebraska Mason". Three issues were printed and distributed during the months of March, August and December, 1991. The Committee appreciates the fine articles and direction provided by M. W. James N. DeMoss and the coordination of the publication by Office Manager, Chris Rudder. The Committee would also like to acknowledge the support of the "Nebraska Mason" by the Order of the Eastern Star, the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children and the Nebraska Masonic Home, both financially and by the furnishing of articles for the "Nebraska Mason".

Under the organization of W.: Kenneth G. Fleming, Grand Marshal, the Grand Lodge reset the Cornerstone Casket of the Gage County Courthouse on May 5, 1991, in conjunction with the Centennial observance of the courthouse. Laid the Cornerstone for the Sidney Nebraska Volunteer Fire Department's newly finished and enlarged fire station on September 14, 1991. Laid the Cornerstone at the Cheyenne County Community Center in Sidney, on September 14, 1991. Reset the Casket in the Cornerstone of the Jefferson County Courthouse on September 22, 1991. And also relayed the Cornerstone of the new library building in the city of Beatrice, where the ceremony was televised through the local access station.

All Lodges are encouraged to use the several fine video tapes and films which are available through the Grand Lodge Office, including videotapes dealing with Masonic education and information for prospective members.

The Public Relations Committee plans to initiate further programs during the 1992 year and send a representative to the Masonic Midwest Public Relations Conference in the Summer of 1992.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP

Raymond L. Hartung, 54, Chairman

Actions of the 1991 Membership Committee were a continuation of those of 1989 and 1990. We continue to feel that the two most important factors bearing on membership are education within and education without our Fraternity. "Internal" education provides the knowledge necessary to instill pride in our members and equips them actively to establish and utilize Nebraska's still new program of "selective solicitation." Knowledgeable proud Masons, are with proper guidance, prepared for and eager to pass the word to qualified potential candidates. The second need, "external" education, should help make the public aware of our presence, showing them we are a Fraternity of good men who are the "World's Greatest Charity," and dispelling any of the derogatory images our detractors try falsely to create for us.

The committee has monitored a Lodge which has had active internal and external education programs, and observed other Lodges which were attempting to start similar programs with every expectation of success. The Lodge we primarily watched has, for several years, utilized programs which involve participation by the whole "Masonic Family" including Eastern Star, York Rite, Shrine, Job's Daughters, DeMolay, and Masons, their ladies, children and grandchildren. This Lodge, which meets every week, had a program for one major Masonic event each month and at least one Masonic Family activity each quarter. They were not at all "shy in public", holding their advertised Fifth Annual All Masonic Picnic at a very visible location where all could see them. Among their other high profile activities was a "Go-to-Church Sunday" with Masons walking several block through town to church, wearing aprons and gloves, accompanied

by their ladies (two abreast) led by their officers/ladies with the Master in his top hat. This activity, although approved by the Grand Master, generated concern on the part of some Brethren (especially Past Masters) who indicated they felt this Lodge activity might be somewhat presumptive. All fears were dispelled by their reception by the pastor and his flock and the many favorable comments at refreshments after services. What an excellent way for Masons to dispel the lies of our detractors that we are "anti-Christ", a "cult", a "religious organization" (what church goes to visit another en masse?), or a "secret society". This Lodge also allowed its large dining room to be utilized by a local service club (composed largely of Masons) as the distribution site for "Santa Claus" to present Christmas gifts to 600 needy children. More than 1,000, including the parents who accompanied the youngsters, actually saw the inside of a Masonic Lodge and another of Masonry's good works. And, the preliminary newspaper/radio/etc. announcements and front page article, with picture of Santa using the Masonic Lodge for this purpose, generated much positive publicity for the Lodge and our Fraternity.

The Lodge also was involved with the DeMolay Chapter in a "Day of Comfort" food collection for the needy. Nearly 1,000 pounds of food (including that purchased with donated cash) was collected within the Masonic Family and matched by a local grocer.

Other Lodges observed to have visible pride and reputation-building programs, included one hosting two "open-to-the-public" programs in their Lodge building (a quilt display and a health fair). Both were properly advertised, and well attended with resulting increases in Masonic stature. This Lodge, incidentally, has one Mason for every thirteen local residents and although the Lodge is located in a rather remote part of town almost any resident can direct a stranger to it.

Back to the monitored Lodge. It established a selective solicitation program for community leaders/businessmen of Masonic timber-with the emphasis on youth. A list of potential prospects was assembled, discussed, and then organized in an "order of contact" so that a "domino effect" could be implemented (get the ones who will have the most effect on positive attitudes of the others first, if possible). Contact was semi-formal, with two prospects invited together by two Lodge officers and two widely respected community leaders who were proud of being Masons (although several did not attend Lodge with great frequency). They met for dinner in the small private dining room of a good restaurant where conversation naturally turned to Masonry. All questions were answered including some posed by the Masons, such as did you know? And the "Modern Proficiency" is explained to dispel concern by those who "don't have enough time". To date this plan has met with great success. The Lodge raised 14 in 1991 (10 from 19 to their 30's), carried four more (all in their 30's) over to 1992, and showed its first membership gain in 23 years. This Lodge has become most enthusiastic, its meetings are "fun" and the future looks bright. Incidentally, three of their new MM's are coming regularly to Lodge, are visiting other Lodges, and show fine potential/interest in the possibility of future appointment as Lodge officers. We urge other Lodges to apply the above successful tactics.

The new Nebraska Table Lodge booklet developed by our committee in 1990 has been available since early 1991. It is easy to use and lists all information to conduct this interesting, popular, and pride/morale-building activity.

50, 60, and 70 Mason certificates currently are sent with appropriate pins to ensure a short, easy, yet dignified and impressive presentation by anyone who can read moderately well. A similar, light blue 25 year certificate has been designed, and upon final approval, should accompany 25 year pins early in 1992. The committee strongly recommends that every Lodge purchase and present the beautiful 25 year pins, thereby instilling pride in all who rate them and showing that the Lodge really does care—the dividends will far outweigh the meager expense(\$2.50).

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON YOUTH

The Grand Lodge Youth Committee continued to offer scholarships of \$500.00 each to outstanding members of our three Masonic Youth Organizations. These scholarships were presented at the annual meetings of the Youth groups by our Grand Master, James N. DeMoss.

This year six applications were received from girls of the Order of Rainbow and thirteen from the members of Job's Daughters. We regret to report that no applications were received from members of the Order of DeMolay. Our committee assembled to review all applications and to select the most deserving recipients. The quality of the applications truly demonstrates that we have some very fine young ladies in our youth organizations.

The scholarship for the International Order of Job's Daughters was presented to Alisa Lynn Landholm of Bethel No. 35, Oakland, Nebraska. Alisa is a Past Honored Queen of her Bethel, Past Grand Bethel Chaplain and has served in numerous other offices during her 7 year membership in Job's Daughters. Alisa has also participated in many school, community and church activities. An activity you often find Alisa doing is sharing her sign language skills. She had the opportunity to sign the music for closing ceremonies during the formal opening of the Supreme Session in Milwaukee, 1990. She is an excellent scholar and athlete.

Receiving the scholarship for the International Order of Rainbow for Girls was Tiffany Lynn Hall of Athena Assembly No. 124, Bellevue, Nebraska. Tiffany is a Past Worthy Advisor of her Assembly and has filled several other offices during her 5 year membership. She is currently Grand Service for Grand Assembly, a past Grand Representative by presenting: The American Flag Tribute, Rainbow Flag Tribute and Rose Lecture. She has been very active in her school, community and church. She plans to attend UNO.

When M : W : James DeMoss presented the scholarships, he extended thanks for all they have done for their youth organizations, their schools, and communities, and extended best wishes for a successful future.

Dad William G. Hurst was invested as Executive Officer for the State of Nebraska, Order of DeMolay at our Annual Grand Lodge Session in Grand Island, February 1, 1991 by Jerold J. Samet, Deputy Grand Master of the District of Columbia.

During the 1991 session of the International DeMolay Congress, Past Grand Master John M. McHenry was elected and invested as Executive Officer for the State of Nebraska, Order of DeMolay.

REPORT OF INSURANCE REVIEW COMMITTEE

On May 10, 1991, a special committee, the Insurance Review Committee was commissioned by M. W. James N. DeMoss, Grand Master. The Committee was charged with the responsibility of conducting a complete review of current insurance in effect for Grand Lodge to include adequacy of coverage and competitiveness of pricing. The Committee is further charged with the responsibility to explore alternative coverage available through commercial sources.

Pending litigation against a Lodge outside this jurisdiction brought to focus the importance of addressing the "state of insurance coverage in Nebraska."

The Committee commenced with a survey of the Subordinate Lodges to ascertain the present situation throughout the State. Data was received from 141 lodges. The Committee met on December 14, 1991, to evaluate the findings. A letter to all lodges was composed to be forwarded to all lodges summarizing the results. Suggestions for the more obvious areas of concern were also included.

Efforts are being made to formulate specifications to be used for the lodges. These will be made available to companies to see what alternatives can be examined.

The work of the Committee will continue. Concerns about Liability Coverage still exist and are being studied. As our labors continue, we will pass along any developments.

Just remember that every monetary, material, and/or labor gift, no matter how large or small, is received, recorded and acknowledged, with the same care and appreciation.

At this years MASONIC HOME EXECUTIVES ASSOCIATION of NORTH AMERICA national conference we were pleased to find again that our home, in spite of what we consider a high annual budget, continues to be second from the bottom of the list, for lowest total employees and lowest operating budget, of all of the childrens home members of the conference. If we could compare apples to apples, we may just be the lowest! We continue to operate with the lowest ratio of employees to residents, and yet maintain one of the most attractive and up-to-date campuses in the country. At the same time our residents continue to present themselves in the best manner, and seem to be proud of their current status. We want you to be proud of your home both in operation and appearance, and of the residents and graduates at all times. Take every opportunity you can to talk about the Home, and its activities.

I would again like to publicly thank Most Worshipful James N. DeMoss, for his continued interest in the Home and his service as its Financial Adviser. Our sound financial condition reflects his sound advice to our Finance Committee and their subsequent actions.

Speaking for the Board, the Staff, and the Children, we say THANK YOU from the bottom of our collective hearts. Its because of you that our Home can give these Children the best and most important opportunity to re-organize their lives, and regain their self respect, and set the new direction they so desperately need and seek. A most wonderful example of MASONRY at work!

REPORT TO THE STOCKHOLDERS OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

Harry A. Spencer, PGM, 227, President

I am particularly happy to welcome you to this our first annual meeting at The Nebraska Masonic Home. Previously all of our Annual Meetings were held at the Grand Lodge Office. There was a time when only one Trustee's meeting, usually the September one, was held at the home; now all of them are. With this annual meeting change, all of our Masonic Home activities are now centered at The Home where they belong.

This year has been another busy and eventful one. We have completed the remodeling of our 1952 facility. This included providing adequate administrative offices, adding 20 additional apartments on the third and fourth floors, building two exterior fire stairs for the three floors of the east and west wings as required by the Fire Marshal and the installation of a new generator. These improvements which cost us \$1,700,000 complete our major improvement program. At this time I want to especially thank Trustee Worshipful Brother Dick Brasel for the great amount of time and work he put in as Chairman of the Committee for these improvements.

We have moved all of our administrative offices to the second floor. For the first time in several years we no longer have a waiting list for apartments. We are now in the process of showing and renting the new ones. So far four of them are rented. It does take a little time for those who may be interested to make arrangements to relocate. We expect to have all of the new apartments occupied in the not too distant future.

As I am sure all of you know, we have tried to keep the rent of all of our apartments slightly below actual cost to avoid any possibility of taxable income, however, our auditors made a cost analysis which indicated we were too far below costs. So we were required to adjust our rates to avoid subsidizing residents who can afford to pay for their care. I mention this because you may hear some adverse comments on the rates we set this year. I can assure you these rates are still much more favorable than those charged by private facilities for the same service.

One of the most important developments of the year has been the activation of our Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation. As soon as we received confirmation from the IRS of its exempt status we completed the transfer of all Endowment Fund assets from the Grand Lodge Trustees to the Foundation. After a search for an investment manager we hired the firm of Lawson and Kroeker to serve in that capacity. We also appointed Worshipful Brother Thomas Tye as Executive Director of the Foundation and transferred his office as Director of Development for the Masonic Home to the Foundation. Worshipful Brother Tom has been actively on the job and will give you a report of his activities at this meeting.

Early in the year I appointed a special committee to work with a similar committee from the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star to see if it was possible to work out some arrangement so female members of the Star

whose Masonic membership connection was with a Grand Lodge outside of Nebraska could be admitted to the home. An agreement has been approved by the Board of Trustees and submitted to the Grand Chapter of the Easter Star. It will probably be presented to their next Grand Chapter session.

On occasion suggestions have been made that it might be possible to cut our budget by contracting out some of the services performed at the home. During this year your Board of Trustees explored the possibility of using outside contractors to handle the home's housekeeping as well as laundry service. We determined it was much more efficient as well as much more economical to continue our present arrangement rather than to contract out those services.

As in the past, we maintained a promotional display and information booth at Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter under the supervision of Mary Stapp our Assistant Director. This is a very good promotional activity. We served coffee and provided a convenient meeting place for those in attendance. We expect to continue this activity.

It will come as no surprise to you to learn that our health benefits for employees have become much more expensive. We have been hard hit by increases because of exceptional expense for two dependents. In an attempt to find some way to alleviate the problem of escalating costs, we hired a consultant to make a study of our program and to suggest any needed changes. On his recommendation we have made some adjustments to the program in an attempt to keep pace with our costs. We hope we can keep this expense within our ability to pay.

During the year we determined that it would not be financially desirable to repair the property at 1207 Avenue D to continue to operate it as a rental unit. Consequently, we had the improvements removed and taken off the tax rolls.

Residents in the home admitted the regular way as contrasted with apartment residents are on the increase. In January 1988 we had 33 such residents. As of October this year we had 52. We expect this figure to continue to increase.

Our budget for 1990-1991 is \$3,267,000. Of this amount only \$1,451,800 will be raised by current sources of income. This leaves a net amount of \$1,815,200 which must be paid from the income of our Endowment and Bequest Fund. Unfortunately, the estimated annual income from our Endowment and Bequest Fund for this year is \$1,527,969. So this year we will have to use approximately \$300,000 of our principal to meet our budget. Considering the fact that interest rates are declining and our return from investments for the next year could be less than for the current year, this is an alarming development and one that requires our earnest attention. We must either find some way to bring our budget within our income or increase that income if we are to continue to serve those who cannot care for themselves. I realize the primary job of the Executive Director of the Foundation is to increase our Endowment Funds, but his does not relieve us of responsibility. That job is equally ours as well as that of the Executive Director. I urge everyone who hears or reads this report to consider it his responsibility to do everything possible to motivate those who can help us keep sufficient funds coming in so that we may stay even with inflation and meet

all current needs.

As you will recall various amendments to our Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws were adopted at our last Annual Meeting. Notebooks containing the amended Bylaws, Rules and Regulations, and Articles of Incorporation have been prepared and distributed to all lodges. These are now available from the Executive Director for a nominal fee of \$6.

The late fall storms did some damage to our grounds. This is in the process of being corrected. I assume our Executive Director will give you a more complete report. Our underground fuel tanks have been examined and for the time being are OK. However, they will need to be replaced and stored above ground in the not too distant future. I mention this because it could be an expensive procedure.

During the year we installed a WanderGuard security system. Our residents can feel secure with this service. Also, we are no longer concerned about our Alzheimer residents wandering off. It was a needed improvement.

Our home's staff is doing an exceptional job of keeping our home at a high level of efficiency. You should know that Harriet Johnson, our Dietary Supervisor, received the New Member Award from the Nebraska Dietary Managers Association. Monte Hackwith, our Chief Engineer, has now qualified for an Omaha First Grade Engineer's Certificate and License. Mary C. Stapp, our Assistant Director, was honored at the Nebraska Health Care Association Awards Breakfast as Nurse of the Year by the Omaha District. Our Executive Director Arthur R. Sharp will give you a more detailed report on the staff. For my part I commend Brother Art for a job well done. In my judgment he is the ideal person to have in charge of our home. I feel comfortable with his excellent performance and commend him for it.

I also commend Worshipful Brother Thomas W. Tye for the job he is doing. As I mentioned, his position has been transferred to the Foundation of which he is now the Executive Director. Considering the fact that during the last 36 months we received sufficient funds to enable us to keep pace with our improvements, he faces a monumental task to keep up that pace. Having worked with Worshipful Brother Tom during the last few years I can assure you that he is equal to that task and will have no problem in doing so if he has your utmost cooperation.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank one of our Grand Lodge Trustees, Herman Wiebers who spent considerable time advising the Foundation Trustees on procedures to enable us to facilitate a smooth transition of our funds from the Grand Lodge Trustees to the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation. Brother Herman refused to consider a fee or an honorarium for the work he did. So a donation in the amount of \$1,000 was recorded in his name to the Foundation. We are very grateful to Brother Herman for the help he gave us.

I would be an ingrate if I did not publicly thank our Executive Director, Arthur R. Sharp; Worshipful Brother Tom Tye; Assistant Director, Mary Stapp; and all members of the Board of Trustees for the honor they paid me in promoting a Fiftieth Anniversary Dinner at the Cornhusker Hotel in Lincoln. It was an exceptional affair. One that will long be remembered by me and my family. I

also thank Worshipful Brother Gerald Patton who put that occasion on tape and presented it to me.

In closing, as I have said before, I find myself inadequate to the task of adequately expressing my appreciation for the work our Trustees have done through the year. Each and every one of them has participated fully and faithfully in all of our activities. So to each and every one of them I restricted myself to saying thank you for a job well done. I say to them it has been a real pleasure for me to serve as your President these last few years. With your kind of dedication my task has been much easier. As I have said before you exemplify Masonic charity and brotherhood at its best. I only hope your Brethren appreciate all the efforts you are making on their behalf.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

It is a pleasure for me to welcome each and every one of you to the first-ever Stockholder's Meeting held at our Masonic Home in Plattsmouth and to report to you that The Nebraska Masonic Home is right on track toward accomplishing its mission of responding to the needs of our elderly Nebraska Masons by furnishing infirmary care and independent living apartments to them and their eligible female relatives. Equally important—we are doing it within the approved budget for the home.

The caring attitude of our employees is what really sets The Nebraska Masonic Home apart from all other facilities. Of course it is nice to have a very efficient staff, which we do, but most important is to have a staff that will give of their time and energy to help our residents "do for themselves". Our focus is to help our residents be all that they can be, and this is indeed a difficult task. Our residents today are older, more frail, and much sicker than they have been in past years. It takes special people with an enormous amount of dedication to care for our aging brothers and sisters, and I am happy to report to you that we have such a staff here at The Nebraska Masonic Home.

Aspecial thanks must go to Mrs. Mary Stapp, the Assistant Director of the home, for her ever-faithful help and assistance during her first full year in this position. She is constantly searching for ways that our operation can be more responsive to the needs of our residents, a better place in which to work for our staff, and more efficient in terms of cost savings for the home which you, the stockholders and trustees, have entrusted to our care.

I would also like to mention at this time that Mary Stapp was the honored recipient of The Nurse of the Year Award for the Omaha District which was given by the Nebraska Health Care Association at their annual breakfast meeting

during their convention in October of 1991. This was not just a fine honor for Mrs. Stapp, but it was also a fine honor for The Nebraska Masonic Home. We are all very proud of her.

Our Dietary Director, Mrs. Harriet Johnson, also received a nice honor, that being the New Member of the Year Award from the Nebraska Dietary Managers Association. Mrs. Johnson, who attended a full year's schooling prior to receiving her certificate as a certified dietary manager, is very active in this organization; and we are very proud of her for receiving this honor.

Our Chief Engineer, Mr. Monte Hackwith, has also been awarded his First Grade Stationary Engineer's License by the City of Omaha and has been doing an excellent job of operating and maintaining the home, its equipment, and the grounds.

Our Housekeeping Supervisor, Glenda Seydlitz, has been and is currently enrolled in several classes through Metropolitan Community College in order to increase her knowledge of supervisory and administrative skills.

Mrs. Sonia Meredith, our Director of Nursing, continues to be a very valuable member of our staff and has also taken several courses offered through the Nebraska Health Care Association in order to improve not only her skills but also upgrade the skills of the personnel working in the Nursing Department. Mrs. Meredith has also initiated programs of Infection Control, OSHA and OBRA Compliance, Worker's Compensation Cost Control, Inventory and Medical Supplies Cost Control, a Quality Assurance Program, and Compliance with the Federal Self Determination Act regarding Advanced Medical Directives.

We feel very fortunate that during the past year we were able to hire an Executive Secretary, Mrs. Christine Abbott, who comes to us from Omaha College of Business where she has been employed as an instructor for the past five years. Chris is a Past Matron of her Eastern Star Chapter and has a good working knowledge of all phases of Masonry.

I would also like to thank Mrs. Frankie Cotner, our Secretary and Mrs. Patricia Jensen, our Comptroller, for the many extra hours of work they have contributed in order that the home can operate more efficiently. These administrative functions of the home operate at a high level of excellence and efficiency, and all the members of our management and administrative staff are dedicated to providing the very best of service to our residents as well as controlling our costs and expenditures.

I would also like to thank all of the Masonic Bodies which have given so much to The Nebraska Masonic Home. To the Grand Master and all the Grand Officers, as well as the office staff of the Grand Lodge, your help has been invaluable during this past year. To the officers and members of Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 A. F. & A. M., to Home Chapter No. 189 Order of the Eastern Star of Plattsmouth and to the Masters and Wardens Club of Omaha, I would like to say a heartfelt thank you. Home Chapter No. 189 in Plattsmouth has also been available to provide a delicious picnic dinner for our residents as well as

providing other help when needed. You all do so much for the home and it would be impossible to adequately convey our appreciation.

I would also like to give a special thank you to the Order of Eastern Star Grand Chapter; the Worthy Grand Matron, Mrs. Bonnie Brasel; the Worthy Grand Patron, Mr. James Brown; and Grand Secretary, Shirley Frink for the most generous contributions which were presented to the home at the Grand Chapter meeting last May. The Order of Eastern Star has always been very supportive, not just in terms of financial contribution, but also in many other ways.

We are again gratified by the work and dedication of Mr. Adolph Schlaman for coordinating the Robert D. Boone Memorial Food Truck. This annual gift of food is given to our residents of the home by Nebraska Masons from the Grand Island and central Nebraska area. Good news travels fast in Masonic circles and Brother Schlaman has begun to receive donations from across Nebraska from members of other lodges who wish to contribute to this fine project. This is indeed one of the most important contributions we receive during the year.

Once again this year Mr. and Mrs. Heuermann of Phillips, Nebraska have made us the benefactors of their charitable trust. This year's contribution is being used to purchase and install new carpet in the hallways of the 1924 wing. These halls were last carpeted at the time the apartments were first added in 1978.

A special thanks must also be given to Mr. Ben Harvey the Administrator of The Masonic-Eastern Star Childrens Home in Fremont for the wonderful day when he and his farm manager brought several of their children and many 4-H animals to the home for our residents to enjoy. This was truly a nice diversion and provided a lot of enjoyment for members.

Our thanks must also go to many others for their time, effort, and prayers which they have so generously shared with us. To Plattsmouth Area Ministerial Association for providing the residents with a weekly church service and monthly communion, we are most grateful. Thanks go to the school administrators and students who have contributed much by their support and presence at various activities of the home. To Mayor Ron Buethe of Plattsmouth and the City Council, we send our thanks for the excellent spirit of cooperation we have received in the many activities involving the City and its various departments. To the Narcissus Chapter, Kensington a special thank you for providing a residents' picnic each summer. This brings a great deal of enjoyment to all of our residents. To the Tangier Mobil Nobles and Chanters for their constant support and appearances at the home—a very special thank you.

It would truly be impossible to adequately thank our Board of Trustees who, under the dynamic leadership of the Honorable Harry A. Spencer, have given literally thousands of hours of work and service to our home. Ours is truly a working Board, and they are constantly on call to give advice to myself as well as the staff. The Trustees and staff of the home are always looking for innovative ways in which we can be of further service to our senior Masonic population.

I would be totally remiss if I did not give my personal as well as professional thanks to Worshipful Brother Dick Brasel for the faithful assistance he gave to

me as well as the home in overseeing the recently completed construction project. Dick made many trips to the home, sometimes as many as three or four a week, to work with our architect, the construction company and our Chief Engineer Mr. Monte Hackwith in order to ensure that every phase of the construction progressed smoothly and according to specifications.

This past year has not been without its frustrations. During the Halloween ice storm in October of this past year, we lost our city power for a period of approximately 36 hours. We were able to provide uninterrupted power to our facility thanks to the new generator which was part of last year's remodel project. This storm, however, did cost us the loss of four of our valued trees on our grounds and damage to some 23 others. At this point in time we are unsure of how many of these damaged trees will actually survive come spring.

The recent remodeling project on the 1952 wing caused some minor inconveniences for our residents and employees. There were many times when our work schedules had to be interrupted, and it was a constant challenge to continue to provide the excellent service to our residents that we are known for. The result of the remodeling project is 20 more beautiful apartments for independent living as well as new administrative offices and this beautiful new board room.

In conclusion let me say what a pleasure it has been the last four years to be a part of such a fine organization as The Nebraska Masonic Home. I am truly proud to be a part of the progress and innovation that is taking place here at our home. As in past years my pledge to each of you is that the entire staff of the home will do their very best to ensure we give our residents the very best care possible and to operate the home in an efficient and professional manner. Our commitment is to excellence. We ask each of you for your continuing support and prayers in caring for our brothers and sisters.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

As reported to you last year, the undersigned was employed as your Director of Development on March 1, 1990 having been given certain duties and responsibilities and reporting directly to the Executive Director and the Board of Trustees of The Nebraska Masonic Home. I wish to report to you that I am no longer the Director of Development for The Nebraska Masonic Home for on March 15, 1991 the Internal Revenue Service granted the tax exempt status of the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation giving it proper exemption under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. As a result thereof and a meeting of the Board of Directors of The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation on the 9th day of July, 1991 the undersigned was employed as the Executive Director of the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation and answerable to said Board and its President, Most

Worshipful Brother Harry A. Spencer.

I do however wish to give to you this report of my acts and doings during the past year. More than 20 presentations were made by the undersigned with the slide show presentation and distribution of materials on The Nebraska Masonic Home and its facilities. Those presentations were made to various Masonic organizations, Star Chapters, Masonic Lodges, and community organizations. We are always happy to offer this presentation as a program at any Masonic or community meeting and I urge anyone who is interested to make contact with me to schedule such a presentation. As reported to you last year we created the annual giving program entitled "The Caring Club" and at the time of the annual report in January of 1991 we had raised a little over \$61,000 with the final tabulation for the 1991 Caring Club exceeding \$82,000 for the year. This was most gratifying to your Board of Trustees and to your Director of Development and encouraged us to continue this program of annual giving. I am pleased to inform you that as of the preparation of this report the contributions to the Caring Club for 1992 exceeds \$66,000. Recognition and acknowledgement of our Caring Club members was printed in the December issue of the Nebraska Mason along with a short report with reference to the Caring Club Dinner held at The Nebraska Masonic Home on July 13, 1991. The Caring Club Dinner in 1991 was a tremendous success with well over 100 in attendance. We appreciate very much the efforts of the staff at The Nebraska Masonic Home in hosting the Caring Club Dinner. The Caring Club Dinner for 1992 has been scheduled for May 30, 1992 at Cody Park in North Platte, Nebraska to be catered by the Lexington BBQ Company. We hope again to have a good turnout and attendance by the Grand Master and Grand Lodge Officers as well as many members of the Board of Trustees of The Nebraska Masonic Home.

As a result of our continued effort to develop planned giving we have this year had a very definite increase in inquiries with reference to life annuities as well as charitable trust. Your Executive Director with the guidance of the Board of Trustees is moving, with the aid and assistance of a special committee to be appointed by the President, to create and enact forms which can be used for private and life annuities, benefiting not only the annuitant but The Nebraska Masonic Home. We are also working toward the formalization of trust agreements which can be highly beneficial not only to the donor but eventually to The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation and ultimately of course to the residents of The Nebraska Masonic Home.

During 1991 the home received close to \$362,000 in bequests and we have in progress approximately \$275,000 in bequests currently under administration or trust provisions and yet to be received by the home. We are eternally grateful for those individuals who see fit to provide for The Nebraska Masonic Home in their Wills and Trusts and the foundations, for without this continuing support we would soon be unable to continue the operations and provide for our residents in the manner in which they have become accustomed and in accordance with our Masonic obligations. We should continue to remember that in the future, even though our needs are great our donors give not solely because of those

needs but primarily for the results which we as Masons and as The Nebraska Masonic Home are able to achieve with the funds which we receive. The charity that talks results is the one that receives our attention and our continuing support and contribution. Your Nebraska Masonic Home Is A Charity Of Action And A Charity Of Results In The Finest Masonic Tradition.

We recommend that the report be forwarded to the Committee on Nebraska Work for their guidance. We can all be proud of the Grand Custodian and his Deputies for their efforts on behalf of the Craft during the past year, sometimes under trying circumstances.

In closing we exhort the Officers of the Subordinate Lodges to put forth as much effort as the Grand Master and his Officers on behalf of the Craft and we could see a growth in our membership.

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The Grand Master then requested and received a motion to reprint pages 285, 286 and 287 of the June 1962 Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in these proceedings. The motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. The stipulated pages are here reprinted.

PRESENTATION OF GAVEL, STRIKING BLOCK AND CASE

M:.W:. Herbert T. White, Past Grand Master:

M:W: Grand Master and Members of this Grand Lodge, I have a duty to perform this morning which is pleasant, yet overshadowed by the illness of the donor of this article. I represent here this morning in this presentation one who has been with us so much in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska that we really consider him a part of this Grand Lodge because he is a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Colorado and a former resident of Nebraska.

Some years ago when he was Grand Master of Colorado, his

term of office coincided very closely with mine as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. He has been afflicted with an incurable disease. This great Mason, M:W: Charles H. Mantz, is know in Colorado as "Mr. Mason". He was here a year ago and had hoped to be with us this year but because of the necessity for frequent confinement in the hospital and surgery, this great soul was unable to be here and has requested that I make this presentation for him. He is very fond of our Grand Master and he has sent along a letter which I would like to read at this time.

To The Most Worshipful Grand Master, Past Grand Masters, Grand Wardens, and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of The Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska:

Greetings to you my dear Brethren:

"Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity",— With that true and faithful love and affection which is the foundation and cement and glory of this ancient fraternity and of you and me therein.

For many years you, and each of you, have extended to me that warm fraternal friendship, regard, and wonderfully fine courtesies and attentions for which you are so justly famous, and I am deeply grateful to you for the same, and filled with appreciation and reciprocating affection.

At this time, if you will be so kind as to permit me, I should like to present to this M:W:. Grand Lodge this Masonic gavel, striking block, and case, for the use of M:W:. Brother, the Honorable Herbert A. Ronin, reigning Grand Master, and his successors in office "ad infinitum", with the fond wish to them that it raps only in peace and accord and achievement and for the Glory of the Grand Lodge.

Desiring this gavel to be unusual and unique - a "one of its kind" I designed it myself and had it fashioned and carved by Brother Lorn Wallace, our foremost wood-carver in Denver. It is made of "cocabola" a rare, hard, vary-grained cabinet wood found in the central rain forests of the Amazon River in Brazil. The striking block is of a distinct type of rosewood, comes from Indo China, and because of its ringing qualities is used by the natives out there to make their marimba keys. The box was fashioned by Brother Stephen Jones Smith, a Welsh cabinet maker. The silver plates were made platinum plated so they won't tarnish, and engraved by Brother Charles Glasman, a manufacturing jeweler. I forgot to say that the box is of old Colorado black walnut. A tree

nearly extinct here.

Now for the gavel and its design. Its style was adapted from a wooden hammer I saw in the museum at Cairo, Egypt, and also depicted on an ancient Egyptian Fresco. Its shape is that which we use "to break off the corners of rough stones". The handle is curved and flattened at the end so that the gavel stands upright on its base, and the whole is carved with a grapevine, leaves and bunches of ripe grapes.

The left face of the gave, as it stands upright on its base, depicts a scene from "that beautiful legend veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols and emblems". It is esoteric and its true interpretation is know only to you.

We stand on a hill west of Mount Moriah "where our weary brothers sat down to rest". In the background is Mt. moriah upon which King Solomon's Temple was being built. Immediately at our feet is a long mound of earth and small rocks - "due East and West". In the background to the north are Laurel shrubs and an Olive tree. Against the south face of the mound, and at its west end lies an uprooted small Acacia tree, and father to the east, or right, an hour-glass - "emblem of human life here, etc," with the sands run out. At the east end of the Mound stands a broken Ionic column with a plumb-jewel of the South, carved on its base. To the east of the broken column stands rampant the "lion of the Tribe of Judah", with its right forepaw resting on and supporting the top of the column and its right rear foot planted against the base of the column. On the lion's head rests the crown of King Solomon as depicted on an old stone freize.

The right face of the gavel is monitorial and its emblems symbols and furniture are found therein. It depicts, among other things, a Lodge room from the Grand Master's station in the East. Immediately in front of you, and at the bottom of the face, are the three steps and across the floor towards the top are the two steps, this bounding the room. In front of the three steps is delineated the Mosaic Pavement with the Blazing Star — an emblem of Divine Providence, in the center thereof. In the center of the Lodge stands the Altar with the Great Light open thereon and the Square and Compasses displayed - all as viewed by the Grand Master in the East. On the East face of the Altar is the rayed letter "G", and underneath at the base is the Master's Square, resting with anglepoint upward. About the Alta, in the proper positions, are the representatives of the three Lesser Lights. On either side of the Altar and in the West stand the two brazen pillars surmounted by the globes; the base of the pillar on the right

bearing a letter "J" and the one on the left a letter "B"; also, the symbol of the level and of the plumb respectively. Above all, at the top of the gavel face is a rayed "All-seeing eye"; to the left thereof a Sun and to the right a Moon and Stars; an ever-ready reminder of a Grand Master's position, his meaning, and his responsibilities.

On the front face of the gavel is a representation of a classical Past Grand Master's jewel. The compasses open on the quadrant of a circle, degreed. The square 'neath the compasses point downward and are resting on the quadrant. In the center between the sides of the square and the points of the compasses - a radiant sun. Surrounding all of this is a Wreath of wheat and laurel.

Surmounting the jewel as tho it were a crest is the "Trowel" - point downward. Herein lies the significance of this whole gift and what prompted it. "The Trowel is an implement, etc. etc.-; but we, as Free and Accepted Masons, are taught to make use of it for the more noble and glorious purpose of spreading the cement of brotherly love and affection; etc.,etc.,-".

*-Read the inscriptions on the base of the gavel and on the box.

I sincerely, hope that this gift pleases you and gives you some comprehension of the joy I have in making it. I most sincerely hope that you will cause your Grand Masters to make use of it at least a part of the time and not just lay it up in the archives of the Lodge as a Memorial. Then I will be with you in mind and spirit at all times. My affection and best wishes to you all.

Charles H. Mantz"

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The Grand Master then declared the several officers of The Most Worshipful, The Grand Lodge, Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, for the year 1992, installed in due and ample form and directed the Grand Marshal to proclaim the same to the Brethren, that they, having due notice thereof, may govern themselves accordingly.

Proclamation was duly made by the Grand Marshal.

The Grand Master then led the brethren in the Grand Honors.

PRESENTATION OF THE PAST GRAND MASTER'S APRON AND PAST GRAND MASTER'S JEWEL

Past Grand Master Charles W. Amidon made formal presentation of the Past Grand Master's Apron and Jewel to M : W : James N. DeMoss.

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Newly installed M∴W∴ Grand Master Eatmon announced the dates for next year's Grand Lodge as February 4th, 5th and 6th, 1992, in Kearney, at the Holiday Inn.

V∴W∴ Grand Chaplain Michael E. Jones led the delegation in prayer.

"Brethren, let us pray. Heavenly Father and Master of the Universe, as we prepare to depart, we give you thanks for affording us this chance to gather together to complete our fraternal labors. We thank you for the blessings being bestowed upon us as our fraternity strives to go forth in the promotion of brotherly love, relief and truth. As we prepare to depart, well up in each of us a sense of pride, dedication and commitment to our families, our communities, and our fraternity. Now we implore your blessing, to give each and every one here assembled safe journey home. For we ask it always in your name, Amen."

Following the prayer, M. W.: Grand Master James L. Eatmon then closed the 135th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in ample form.

The Roll of Deputy Grand Custodians and Date of Appointment

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869.

In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
