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






Masonic History of the 126th Grand Master

James L. Eatmon

Ancient Craft Masonry — Initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason on July 7, 1961; passed to the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason on September 8, 1961; and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on December 8, 1961, all in Kimball Lodge No. 294, Kimball, Nebraska. Served as Master of Kimball Lodge No. 294, Kimball, Nebraska, in 1967. Certified for past seven years as a Proficient Mason.

Grand Lodge — Appointed Grand Tyler in June, 1983 by M:W:Bevin B. Bump. Appointed Grand Marshal in June 1984 by M:W: Robert A. Metcalf. Appointed Grand Marshal in October 1985 by M:W: Charles W. Amidon. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in December 1986 by M:W: Wayne G. Luenenborg. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in February 1988 by M:W:Paul R. Eveland. Elected and installed as Grand Junior Warden under M:W: Thomas W. Tye in February 1989. Elected and installed as Grand Senior Warden under M:W: John M. McHenry in February 1990. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-elect in February 1991 under M:W: James N. DeMoss. Installed as the 126th Grand Master of Masons on February 8, 1992.

Served on the Grand Lodge Office Committee, both as member and chairman; Special Committees, Preparation of the Cipher, Modern Proficiency, Revised Monitor and the Revised Manual of Ceremonies.

York Rite Masonry — A member of Oregon Trail, Chapter No. 65; Temple Council No. 20; and Bethlehem Commandery No. 18, all in Scottsbluff, Nebraska. Inducted into Red Cross of Constantine on May 23, 1992.

Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite — Received the 4th through the 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Alliance, Orient of Nebraska, on April 2-5, 1963. Served as Wise Master, Alliance Chapter of Knights Rose Croix in 1978 and 1979. Venerable Master of Kadosh in 1984 and 1985. Elected a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor on December 8, 1967. Coroneted a 33° Inspector General Honorary on December 6, 1975.

Shrine — Member since 1963 of Tehama Temple of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in Hastings, Nebraska.

Order of Eastern Star — Member of Truth Chapter No. 262 in Kimball, Nebraska, since 1968.

International Order of Job's Daughters — Served as Associate Bethel Guardian of Bethel No. 12 in Kimball, Nebraska.

Other Masonic Bodies — Served as Director of the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska. Member of the Board of Trustees for the Omaha Home for Boys. Member of the Omaha Chapter No. 19, National Sojourners, Inc., Omaha, Nebraska.

Military Service — Retired from the United States Marine Corps as Corporal; served from April 6, 1945 to May 10, 1947.

Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-elect in February, 1992 under M::W: James L. Eatmon. Installed as the 127th Grand Master of Masons on February 7, 1993.

Served on Grand Lodge Office Committee, both as member and chairman; Special Committees; Public Relations Committee, and Leadership Committee. Also served as trustee on the Board of The Nebraska Masonic Home, 1990 - 1992.





Grand Master Eatmon directed Past Grand Master Thomas W. Tye to escort Office Manager Chris Rudder and Administrative Secretary Carol Schroeder to the East. He expressed his gratitude and that of his officers for these ladies' effort toward making this an enjoyable Annual Communication.

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Greetings were received from Miss Jennifer Phillips, Grand Worthy Advisor of the Grand Assembly of the Order of Rainbow Girls of Nebraska; and from Brother Brent Warwick, State Master Councilor of the Nebraska State Chapter, International Order of DeMolay.

M: W: Grand Master Eatmon expressed his gratitude and appreciation for the musical expressions provided during the presentation of guests by Abbot George Burke on the organ, and the beautiful vocal program provided by the Brothers of the Holy Protection Monastery.

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Past Grand Master Thomas W. Tye introduced the Mayor of Kearney, Ron Larson, who brought words of welcome from his lovely city.

At this time Grand Master Eatmon presented Marleen Dinklage, Worthy Grand Matron of the Order of Eastern Star. Worthy Grand Matron Marleen then presented a check from the In-Fall-Gathering to Arthur R. Sharp, Executive Director of The Nebraska Masonic Home.

Grand Master Eatmon called everyone's attention to the list of Emick, Grand Lodge Youth Committee and Houghton Scholarships printed in the program, indicating Masonic funds well invested in these young scholars.

ROCK MAUL AWARD

M:W: Grand Master Eatmon described the Rock Maul Award as one that is presented to one lodge each year by the Grand Master. The lodge selected should represent the best all around lodge in the jurisdiction of Nebraska. The Rock Maul is a sixteen pound rock maul that has been used in a rock quarry for its intended purpose. It was inscribed and presented to the Grand Lodge in the year of M:W: Byron C. Jenkins, and has been awarded once a year since then to that lodge determined to have been the recipient by the selection process. The recipient of the Award is unknown until this announcement at Grand Lodge each year. The Grand Master presented the Rock Maul Award to Bartley Lodge No. 228.

GOLD PAN AWARD

M:W: Grand Master Eatmon displayed the Gold Pan Award, which is, in fact, a pan that was used to pan for gold. It was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by the Grand Lodge of Alaska. It is a beautiful trophy presented each year to that lodge which has shown, in the determination of the selection committee, the greatest overall improvement, or the most significant contribution to Masonry in Nebraska. The Grand Master presented the Gold Pan Award to North Bend Lodge No. 119.

GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

M:W: Grand Master Eatmon made the following remarks as he presented the 1992 Grand Master's Humanitarian Award recipient:

"If you will look in the program, you will find that we have some stringent criteria that we have established for recognition of these individuals. First of all, we will not award this to more than two individuals in any calendar year. The individual that is entitled to receive this award. and there are many, ... must be a Master Mason and have been such for at least 30 years. He must have been active in at least three of the five following community activities: he could have held a political office such as mayor, city council member, county board member, NRD member, school board member, some other political office, whatever might be available where he resides; he could have been active in his church, either as an elder, a vestryman, deacon, lay leader, lay reader, whatever his particular denomination permits: he could have been denoted as a civic leader because of his involvement on boards of directors for local hospitals, nursing homes. financial institutions, foundations; he could have been a volunteer for such charitable organizations as the Y. United Way, Scouting, or similar organizations. He could have been involved in such service organizations as Lions, Sertoma, Kiwanis, Rotary, Optimists, and so forth. But lastly, he must have been active in the Masonic fraternity. In other words, these are the Masons that make the difference within their community. These awards are presented to them in their local community, and the entire community is invited to be present, particularly those organizations with which they have been involved."

The Grand Master then explained that due to his health Brother Ralph E. Jones, of Robert Burns Lodge No. 173, could not personally be with us today. However, Brother Jones did bring his greetings to all his brothers by way of a video tape which was viewed at this time.

GRAND MASTER'S RECRUITMENT AWARD

Last year a new award program was initiated by the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master's Recruitment Award. This program recognized the top 25 petition signers in the jurisdiction of Nebraska. The R:W: Deputy Grand Master read the names, and Most Worshipful Grand Master Eatmon had the honor of doing the presentations.

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THE GRAND ORATION

Philip A. Lorenzen, 10 & 327

Most Worshipful Grand Master Eatmon, Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters, and visiting Grand Masters, other visiting Masonic Dignitaries, Ladies, Sisters, Brethren, Friends:

It is a pleasure and an honor to address this 136th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska. If you refer to your program, be advised and take the smiles off your faces, that the start time doesn't govern the speaker, the stop time governs the speaker. I calculate that gives me 25 minutes.

I am pleased to hear the theme of the speech of the youth organizations and that of the Eastern Star. And I am pleased to hear the theme of the prayer of our Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain; I'd like to expand on that theme a bit if I could in my remarks.

As we gather to repeat the annual event of a review of our past years' activity and to set the stage for our ensuing years' work, a most exciting new focus is upon us. We are beginning the business of the implementation of the nation wide program designed by the Masonic Renewal Task Force. A program designed to enhance recognition of the values and benefits promoted by our Masonic Fraternity and to encourage increases in membership. A program which blends the efforts and talents of not only the Blue Lodge, but all of the appendant Masonic bodies, in two key ways. First, to provide tools for each local lodge to be better able to inventory their strong points and marshal those strengths to renew and revitalize the local lodge in implementing methods to better achieve growth in membership. Second, to enable us each to better understand who we are as Masons, and as members of the Masonic family, and to equip each individual lodge member with added knowledge of the fraternity and a renewed pride in the heritage and growth in the fraternity, and a pride in the contributions that our fraternity makes, to society, to the nation, to the world.

We are in the midst of challenges and criticisms by certain fundamentalist groups and others whom we feel are at best misguided; and at worst groups bent on discrediting and destroying Masonry. The attacks are reportedly founded on the basis that we are some sort of a cult, that we profess to be a kind of substitute religion, or that we are engaged in satanic activities. What a most unfortunate misunderstanding, or misinterpretation on their part of the innocence and good intentions of Masonry. The fact is that for most of us membership in the fraternity tends to enhance one's religious understanding and one's religious zeal. It would however, be hypocritical to think that all who profess to be religious would be good Masons or to think that all Masons would be good church members. We will always find perversions of the beliefs and teachings of any organized group or any organized activity. Still the whole of the organization, regardless of what organization it is, should not be judged by a misguided few.

We, like most organizations, tend to "preach to the choir," when what we need now more than ever, is to let the rest of the world know what manner of men we are, and what business we are about. Today as we face some of the most vocal tests of Masonry's intentions and beliefs, we cannot remain silent. Nor can we attack our accusers in an irrational fashion. We must seek to illustrate our idealism, our spirit of service to our fellow man, and our tolerance and encouragement of the freedom of pursuit of one's religious preference, by always living and always acting in a manner befitting what we profess to believe as Masons.

Each year it becomes more and more evident to me that although every Mason has heard the same teachings and lectures repeatedly, our love for and our understanding of Masonry is a bit different for each of us. I submit to you that it is in those subtle differences that we will continue to find our future, that we will continue to find new strength. Strength to revitalize the Masonic Fraternity and the whole family of Masonry; strength to enhance the ties of our families, strength to improve our communities and our Nation. Strength to make a positive difference in the world.

I have come to perceive that two of the greatest attributes are these:

One —that the lessons of our craft are timeless, the lessons of our craft deal with the relationship of individuals to one another and to God. No matter how much our environment changes, the necessity and fairness in our relationship with those around us, and the necessity of a proper relationship with our Maker, will never change.

Two—while the lessons of our craft will not change, we as lovers of the fraternity must change and be willing to adapt, if we are to assure that the ways in which we apply our beliefs and teachings will be meaningful and timely to each successive generation.

What are the timeless lessons of our Craft? They are numerous, and let me assure you they are too complex to talk about all of them here. But let me remind you and assure you, our beliefs and our lessons are not secret. It's time we stopped treating them as secret and started to let folks know what we are really about. Today, I want only to investigate for a moment, the lessons taught by the implements of the square, the plumb and the level, two of which our V :: W :: Grand Chaplain addressed in his prayer. These instruments many of you have seen applied repeatedly in the public cornerstone laying ceremonies of our Grand Lodge and which implements are, as most of us know, coincidentally the jewels representing the three principle officers of each lodge. Reflect with me for a moment on the passage of time and the evolution of those implements. Although their original counterparts were most certainly somewhat crude in appearance, and while we might find today's modern implements a bit more space age, or ergonomically correct, to use the phrase, the information conveyed by these implements never changes. Square is square, level is level, plumb is plumb, there is no deviation.

What was square, level, and plumb centuries ago can still be tested by these implements. Recognize that we may find that the passage of time and the pressures of the environment may have pushed components out of square, out of plumb, or out of level. And they may have done that with our lives in instances, but that is not the point I wish to make. The point I wish to make is this; that the lessons or the findings of these implements of Masonry have not changed. Neither will they ever change. So it is with the information that we as Masons convey, with the help and aid of the square, the plumb and the level. Truth never changes. We each periodically must test the conduct of our lives to assure that we are tuned in to the lessons conveyed by our working tools.

As we have just entered this new calendar year and Masonic year of 1993, most of you in this room have just assumed new offices and new responsibilities. The responsibility of new offices and responsibilities of carrying out new programs, new goals, and new challenges is not the responsibility of officers alone. We are called upon to assume leadership roles, or at the least to be very supportive in the activities and actions of our leadership. While it is recognized that our Masonic Lodges may have a unique way of imparting our lessons, our lessons are, as I said earlier, not secret, nor are our lessons exclusively ours. We must all continually focus on the basic rules of virtue, rectitude of conduct in all our dealings and before God, and equality as taught by the level, always keeping in mind that we each have a limited measure of time in which to accomplish our individual callings. We must constantly work to let others know what we as the Masonic Fraternity have to contribute to the betterment of our peers, and the betterment of society.

I am reminded of the elementary school teacher who asked her student, little Sonny, "Sonny, where are elephants found?" And he thought for a moment and his response was "teacher, elephants are very large animals, they hardly ever get lost." We don't want you to get lost Most Worshipful Grand Master, as you end your term.

The principals and lessons of Masonry are to me like elephants, they are very large and they hardly ever get lost, but we do entirely too often fail to keep them as vividly in our minds and our actions as we should. Let us each strive in 1993 and beyond, to live each day in such a manner so as to let our conduct be a testimony to the important tenets that Masonry espouses.

As we participate in our variety of Masonic activities we must never lose sight of the fact that while we know the good we seek to do, others may judge us not inappropriately by how we act and by what we say, not by what we profess to believe.

I identified earlier that I perceive the key attributes of Masonry as being twofold. The first being the uncompromising truths as taught by the implements or working tools of Masonry.

Now let me address for a moment what I view as the second key attribute of Masonry. That being, that Masonry is ever changing and adaptable to the changing environment in our world. But, to be adaptable it is imperative that we stay in focus to that changing environment. We are constantly in change. As the adage says "if we are not going forward, we are going backward, we cannot stand still." Those of you who have recently assumed leadership roles in the subordinate lodges may at times feel a bit overwhelmed by the charges made to each of you at the time of your installation ceremony. No doubt you have each resolved to make some changes in your administration. Each year fortunately brings new challenges, new changes and fresh ideas.

This year of change is perhaps a bit more visible than normal as we have just witnessed a couple of weeks ago the inauguration of a new United States President. Since we as Masons avoid discussions of religion and politics in our subordinate lodges be assured that I do not intend to engage in a political discussion. As Masons however, we do have a traditional role of involvement in the affairs of the State, so it is appropriate for us to give thanks for the leadership and achievements of prior administrations and to do all we can to enable the new administration to understand the work that must now be done and to be supportive of that work. We need to be supportive nationally, state-wide, and locally. The workings of government would certainly take a giant step forward if we could encourage everyone in government to be guided by the tenets of Freemasonry.

The point I wish to make by calling your attention to the business of the political arena is to consider your's and my perception of change. Change simply for the sake of change may be short sited and harmful rather than helpful. In a world where time seems to continue to be expended faster and faster, and change seems to accelerate with that passage of time, we cannot avoid meeting the challenges of change. Let us each resolve today to seek to implement changes in our fraternity and the world around us in a progressive nature, not a regressive fashion. Never be unwilling to make change because "that's the way we have always done it." But if the way we have always have done it is functional and it works, don't fix it. In short, "if it isn't broken, don't fix it." Let's not waste time redoing what already is tested and workable. Now I am not suggesting we alter our ritual or our ceremonies, I am rather suggesting that we try to apply our efforts in fresh ways. Fresh ways that meet the new incoming generations. Had our predecessors not been willing to make progressive changes to meet the challenges of each new year, Masonry would not have survived to be the institution we know and the institution we celebrate at this Grand Lodge Communication.

Change can at first blush present a frightening view, a fear of the unknown. But all one need do is reflect on the events of past decades and bygone centuries, to realize that progressive changes, changes wrought in the light of the truths we as Masons have come to understand and embrace, can release us from the fear of change. But, always measure and test the changes you determine to make with the tools and implements from which we profess to learn. The tools and implements of our Fraternity.

I close with a quote from Mahatma Ghandi who said: "The measure of one's life is not how long it is lived, but how well it has served." I commend those of you who have served long and well, may you continue to serve well and may you each serve long.

First Day — Opening Session Friday, February 5, 1993

M: W: Grand Master James L. Eatmon requested that the W: Grand Marshal proclaim the 136th Annual Communication opened in ample form.

The report of the Committee on Business and Rules was made by the R:W: Grand Secretary Pro-Tem, who then moved for its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES Virgil L. Tubach, 54

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A::F: & A::M: of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge.

The Committee further recommends:

1. The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.

2. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.

3. Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.

4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may then speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.

5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.

6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits.

7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decisions and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the Committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak first and the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee then permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak, after which a vote will be taken. 8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret written ballot or other method at his discretion.

9. Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The report was accepted by vote of the delegates assembled.

M: W: James L. Eatmon announced the appointment of M: W: Thomas W. Tye as Parliamentarian for this 136th Annual Communication.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

M:W: James L. Eatmon then appointed the Deputy Grand Custodians as Tellers for this session with W: Gene Sibley as Chairman, and directed that delegates cast their ballots for the election of the offices of Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden and Grand Secretary. All ballots were then collected by the Tellers.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

John VerMaas, 256

Most Worshipful Grand Master Eatmon, and brethren: On behalf of your Appropriations Committee, and as chairman of the Appropriations Committee, it is my duty to report the budget for the ensuing year, which is printed on pages 7 through 10 of your report packets. And so at this time I would just like to move that the proposed budget be reported as printed.

MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

Richard E. Fletcher Past Grand Master of Vermont Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association of America

My brothers, let me make a brief report on some of the activities of the Masonic Service Association, of which your Grand Lodge is a member. The Short Talk Bulletin is something we publish every month. There are now over 800 of them out there, and we have a catalog that lists them all. I am just going to touch on one in relation to a very serious problem which is occurring in this country and that you heard mentioned in the Grand Oration this morning. That is the situation with the Southern Baptist Convention, and the fundamentalist group within that convention who has taken control. Our December 1992 Short Talk was called Extremism vs. Freedom. It talks about what Freemasons can do to respond to the charges brought by Dr. James L. Holly, who is a member of the Southern Baptist Convention and President of Mission Administry to Men. I quote to you from his book, The Southern Baptist Convention and Freemasonry, one line; "Freemasonry is one of the allies of the devil, and we have the largest protestant denomination in this country studying this question." I want you to look around at the person next to you; I know in your mind you don't fit this description; do you really think anybody in this room does?

I wish to tell you that John Robinson, who wrote Born in Blood, has been very ill-near death-recently underwent successful surgery, having part of a lung removed, and is coming along very well now. He is donating \$5.00 from the sale of each copy of his new book, A Pilgrim's Path, sold between now and June 1, 1993, to a new center for Masonic Information, which is being administered through the MSA. John's new book tells about his path to becoming a Freemason; and he is now a Freemason. He had taken his first degree, and was very close to death in the hospital in Cincinnati when the Grand Master of Ohio went in and made him a Mason on sight. So we are creating a center for Masonic Information to combat the serious charges being brought against The Short Talk Bulletin is one step; the February 1993 us. Scottish Rite Journal- which is one of the best ever put out-is devoted entirely to this subject. And more is going to happen. A lot of negative things are happening, but I want you to understand that some positive things are happening as well.

Just quickly to mention a couple of other things; thank you for the disaster relief appeal on behalf of the Grand Lodges of Florida, Louisiana, and Hawaii. The total collected was \$584,300. On behalf of those Grand Lodges, we say thank you, to all of you.

In the foreign jurisdictions, there has been a tremendous amount of interest in what's happening in Russia. We have a publication that we call Emmasy Notes, that we put out every month. It's just a little newsletter. It's terribly overpriced—it's free. If any of you would like to receive it, just write your name and address on a piece of paper and we will put you on the mailing list. The Grand Lodge Nationale France chartered a Russian Lodge in Paris, in January1992, and in September of 1992, moved it to Moscow. There is a legitimate lodge in Moscow. If I had stood up three years ago and said that, you would have had me on a horse running me out of town. But it is happening. It was Judy's and my pleasure to represent MSA and attend a Grand Lodge Session in Paris. And there I was able to meet the master of this lodge and the senior warden, a man named Rimsky Korsokoff, who is a grandson of the composer. So good things are happening internationally.

The hospital visitation program continues to be perhaps the most visible thing we do and of course one of our past commissioners, and head of the executive commission is your own Past Grand Master, Judge Herb Ronin. Judge Ronin, I don't know just where you are sitting, but if you would just stand up I'd like you to get some recognition for that. The hospital visitation program continues to function well and we thank you very very much for your support.

And we thank you also for leading the way in joint recognition with Prince Hall Freemasons. This is becoming such an important issue. And in today's world those walls that we built so successfully years ago, are now turning into Masonic bridges, and that's important. I live in D.C. and there is a new lodge being created there called Sojourner Killwinning. All of the men, with rare exception, are black Masons from the Grand Lodges of Scotland, England, and Ireland, sojourning in the D.C. area. So, wonderful things are happening nationally, and internationally. When we get over this satanism foolishness then we are going to be able to do more things in Brotherhood. And in closing-in the spirit of Brotherhood-I'd like to share with you some words of Tenneyson that appear in our Scottish Rite 20th Degree, where he says in his test for knighthood,"to ride abroad addressing human wrong, to speak no slander, no nor listen to it, but teach high thoughts and amiable words, and courtliness, and the desire of fame and love and truth and all that makes a man." God Bless, and thank you my brothers for allowing me to speak.

GREETINGS FROM PRINCE HALL GRAND LODGE

Norman C. Hall, Past Grand Master

To my friend Sonny and to all the members of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, A:.F: & A:.M:., I bring you greetings from the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska F: & A:.M:., where the honorable Fred Nolan is Grand Master. And being the good baptist that I am, two things come to mind briefly; one to give a God fearing sermon, but I am not an ordained minister, so I won't do that; and two, that with a crowd like this I should at least get an offering. REPORT OF CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Norris Rusmisell, 46

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters and brethren: It is my privilege to bring to you the report of your Credentials Committee, for this the 136th Annual Communication held in Kearney, February 5 & 6, 1993.

Committee records indicate that we have 99 Worshipful Masters registered in person, and 53 by proxy; 53 Senior Wardens in person and 75 by proxy; 50 Junior Wardens in person and 76 by proxy. Those 406 chairs are represented by 202 elected officers and the remaining 204 are represented by proxies. Also registered are about 85 non-delegate Master Masters, all Grand Lodge Officers, 14 Past Grand Masters, 40 other dignitaries, and 28 Deputy Grand Custodians, as well as over 100 Ladies for a total attendance of over 600 people.

Dignitaries present in addition to our Grand Lodge Officers and Past Grand Masters include representation from the Eastern Star, Rainbow Girls, Job's Daughters, DeMolay, York Rite Masons, Scottish Rite bodies, Prince Hall of Nebraska, Imperial Shrine, Sesostris Temple, Tangier Temple, Tehama Temple, and National Sojourners. Other Grand Jurisdictions present include Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nova Scotia, Vermont, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

At the close of registration, there is no representation from 30 lodges, which are numbers 5, 9, 17, 35, 40, 64, 89, 98, 124, 134, 136, 162, 164, 232, 233, 235, 236, 240, 241, 271, 274, 277, 285, 293, 298, 301, 305, and 308. There are five lodges that have been absent for two consecutive years, which are : 134, 136, 164, 285 and 301. We understand, however, that there have been several consolidations of lodges or requests for consolidations that may not yet have been processed into the records as published, and this could possibly account for some of the asbenteeism shown.

For a matter of information only, the "Ladies at the Table" session Thursday evening was attended by 235 Masons and Ladies which is an increase of about 50 people over last year. There were 448 present for the "Western Roundup" dinner last evening which is an increase over last year of 118 people.

I have enjoyed serving as Credentials Committee Chairman for Most Worshipful Grand Master James L. Eatmon and wish at this time to thank the other members of the committee who have so graciously contributed their time, talent and efforts to make your Grand Lodge more efficient and enjoyable. Last, but by no means least our sincere thanks to Chris and Carol in the office, for without their preliminary work and continuous guidance this committee could not function satisfactorily.

Most Worshipful Sir, visiting dignitaries, brethren all. When one is called upon to perform a duty such as this it becomes difficult to put the many thoughts that pass through the mind in some logical order, because when we deal with death it is difficult to comprehend its' meaning and accept it without question, unless we reflect upon our religious teachings, which are bolstered by the many allegories of Freemasonry.

Masonry has taught us that logic and reasoning are important. That the plan laid down by the Master of all workmen is as large as the universe and our part in it is infinitesimal.

The great light of Masonry, our Holy Bible, gives us guidance in all our actions. Part of the 119th Psalm speaks to us:

"Teach me, Oh Lord, the way of thy statutes; and I shall

keep it unto the end.

Give me understanding, and I shall keep thy law.

Behold, I have longed after thy precepts."

It is important that we take time from our deliberations to honor the memory of our departed brethren. In this past year many of our brothers have passed to that "house not made with hands." Recommendation # 5 to change Section 2-406 — Members of Extinct Subordinate Lodges, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. Following discussion the question was called and the recommendation was adopted.

Recommendation No. 6

Recommendation # 6 to change Section 2-601 — Dues and Assessments, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. The original recommendation was amended to add the word "Committee" to the words "Grand Lodge Office." Following discussion the question was called and the recommendation was adopted.

Recommendation # 7 to change Section 1-201 — Grand Secretary, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. Following much discussion, the Grand Senior Warden called for the Tellers to receive the written ballot. There were a total of 294 ballots cast. For: 194. Against: 100. The recommendation failed to carry two-thirds and thereby failed.

After discussion the Grand Senior Warden called for the Tellers to receive the written ballot. There were a total of 339 ballots cast. For: 188. Against: 147. Invalid: 4. A two-thirds vote was not achieved and the recommendation failed.

Recommendation No. 9

Recommendation # 9 to change Section 2-601 — Dues and Assessments, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. After discussion the Grand Senior Warden called for the Tellers to receive the written ballot. There were a total of 291 ballots cast. For: 156. Against: 134. Invalid: 1. A two-thirds vote was not achieved and the recommendation failed.

Recommendation No. 10

Recommendation # 10 to change Section 2-601 — Dues and Assessments, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. After discussion the Grand Senior Warden called for the Tellers to receive the written ballot. There were a total of 293 ballots cast. For: 153. Against: 139. Invalid: 1. A two-thirds vote was not achieved and the recommendation failed.

Recommendation No. 11

Recommendation # 11 to change Section 2-601 — Dues and Assessments, with regard to the George Washington Masonic National Memorial, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. After discussion the question was called and the recommendation was adopted.

Recommendation No. 12

Recommendation # 12 to change Section 1-105 — Mileage and Per Diem, was found to be in proper form by the Committee on Jurisprudence. After discussion the Grand Senior Warden called for the Tellers to receive the written ballot. There were a total of 289 ballots cast. For: 189. Against: 98. Invalid: 2. A two-thirds vote was not achieved and the recommendation failed.

M:W: Grand Master Eatmon called upon the Grand Master of Colorado, the Most Worshipful John L. Harper, to bring greetings. M:W: Grand Master Harper spoke about a very special cornerstone ceremony his Grand Lodge has planned at the Denver International Airport.

M:W: Grand Master Eatmon called upon Frederick W. Clarke, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, to bring greetings.

M:W: Grand Master Eatmon called upon Richard Cooper, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Wyoming, to bring greetings. M:W: Grand Master Cooper brought tears to everyone's eyes with a story of a dying Master Mason who wanted to re-establish ties with his Lodge before joining his Maker.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GRAND LODGE OFFICES

James N. DeMoss, 325

TO: M: W: Grand Master and all Members of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, A: F: & A: M:

This report is intended as a synoptic overview of the actions of your Committee on Grand Lodge Offices during this Masonic year.

It is in no way designed as a detailed, day-to-day report of our activities.

This committee has again been a hard working committee during this past year. Meetings of the committee were held as deemed necessary rather than on a regular basis. Many one-on-one conversations were held among the several members regarding our responsibilities. To conserve cost of operating the Committee, all meetings involving the full Committee were conducted through telephone conference calls. Some of the Commitbusiness was also conducted by facsimile transmissions between and among the members.

The biggest problem faced within the Grand Lodge Office this past year has been the turn-over of help. Miss Tish DeMoss resigned from the position of Administrative Secretary, effective June 1, to accept other employment in the Lincoln area. Mrs. Victoria Bauer was hired as the replacement effective May 1, 1992. October 20, 1992 Mrs. Bauer left the position, reportedly for family reasons. On October 7, 1992 Mrs. Carol Schroeder was hired to fill the position. This turn-over has caused an understandable diminution in the rapidity of response to some requests from our lodges. However, the lodge secretaries have been most patient and we express our thanks to them for their understanding. Of greater concern to the Committee has been the loss of needed and valuable cross-training knowledge and abilities of operation within the Office.

The Committee must express its concern on the apparent growth in the workload being expected of the Office Staff. It must be recognized that this is a two-person office and two people can only accomplish so much within a given amount of time. Based upon guidance requested by the Committee and furnished us by the Grand Lodge Officers, a priority of operations list has been formulated and put into effect within the Office. As much as the office staff would like to respond to all requests on an immediate basis, there comes that time when the requestor must be advised that they will have to wait before their request is filled or acted upon. The tolerance of all individuals doing business with the Grand Lodge Office is solicited in this matter.

The Committee has kept a close contact with the Office Staff regarding equipment requirements. In December the Committee, after a thorough review of the matter, authorized the purchase of a Minolta Copy machine to replace the old one then in use. This capital expenditure of funds should enhance the ability of the office personnel in their duties.

All members of the Committee wish to express their thanks to the Grand Master and all Grand Lodge Officers for their support during this past year, and wishes to express its' appreciation to Mrs. Chris Rudder for the discharge of her duties during the year under sometimes trying circumstances.

Finally, as required under Section 1-105 of the Bylaws, this committee sets the mileage allowances for this Grand Lodge Session. Because of the budget constraints for the fiscal year 1993 the mileage allowance is set at \$0.00.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK Charles W. Amidon, 281 & 327

Most Worshipful Sir, Delegates, and Brethren:

Following approval at the Grand Lodge Session in February of 1992, final proofing of the revised CEREMONIAL WORK and the MONITORIAL WORK monitors was completed and copies were made available as promised.

A new FLOORWORK MANUAL was also completed after more than two years of hard work by many brethren and was reviewed by the Deputy Custodians at their annual meeting held in Grand Island this last fall. A final proofing was completed shortly thereafter and copies of this instructive manual were printed and distributed to all Lodges in this jurisdiction. One final task lies before the Committee on Nebraska Work. Due to the Monitorial revisions, it was also necessary to revise the "Cipher" book in order to bring both editions into sync. The Committee, in cooperation with the Grand Custodian, W:B:. Gus Scolaro and the additional help of R:W: Jerry Rittenburg, has completed the necessary revisions and this, too, is in the process of being reprinted for availability this spring.

It has been an enlightening experience preparing these several manuals and without the cooperation of many brethren and the acceptance of our efforts by the membership at large, none of the pleasing results would have been possible.

Last Fall, competition was held at North Platte and Ceresco in the Entered Apprentice Degree. In all, seven Lodges participated and the results were delivered to the Grand Master in early December of last year. The winning Lodges will be announced at the Grand Master's pleasure.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

"My brethren, all of the delegates were furnished 45 days before the opening of Grand Lodge, back late in December, a copy of the Grand Master's Recommendations, and as you registered you were given the final printed copy of my address. If it is your wish, I will read that entire report. If it is not necessarily your wish that I read the whole thing, I would like to highlight just a few things, and go from there. Hearing no objection to that, we will proceed in that regard.

The printed address of the Grand Master is as follows:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

My Brethren:

In accordance with Article X, Section 2(b) of the Constitution of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, I do hereby submit my written address to the 136th Annual Communication. This address will consist of a record of my official acts, my thoughts on the general condition of Masonry in the Grand Jurisdiction of Nebraska and recommendations for legislation I believe to be necessary and expedient for the good of our Fraternity. Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge requires me to submit all recommendations to the Jurisprudence Committee, all Grand Lodge Officers and to the Masters of the Subordinate Lodges in a period not less than forty-five days prior to the Annual Communication. This address and its' recommendations will also be submitted to the current Senior and Junior Wardens, and Secretaries of each lodge, that they may have time to study the acts, proposals and recommendations they will be voting on, on Saturday, February 6, 1993.

No words could possibly express the gratitude I feel toward the Masons of Nebraska for conferring upon this brother from the West the honor of serving as their Grand Master. In my personal visits to over thirty lodges this year, everywhere I traveled, I met with only brotherly love and friendship. My deepest thanks and appreciation to every Mason in this great jurisdiction. My special thanks to the Past Grand Masters, my Grand Lodge Officers and the leaders of the other bodies. No Grand Master has ever received finer support than has been extended to me.

To the visiting dignitaries from other Grand Jurisdictions, a most hearty welcome. I can only hope your experiences here will match those hospitalities and courtesies my Personal Representatives and I have received from your Grand Communications. I plan to visit with each and every one of you, that I may continue to learn from your wisdom and knowledge.

To the delegates attending this 136th Annual Communication, we are very aware of your sacrifice of time and resources. We have planned programs for the benefit, not only of yourselves, but for your wives. In this, we are continuing our desires to make Masonry in Nebraska family oriented. From the Thursday night "Ladies at the Table" to the Barbecue on Friday evening, our committee has had but one goal: when you are not at labor in the "Quarries," they want you to have fun.

NECROLOGY

As of the writing of this Address, the faithful Secretaries of our Subordinate Lodges have reported to the Grand Lodge Office that 583 members of our gentle craft have been called to stand before that Great White Throne where it has been their portion to hear from Him who sitteth as the Judge Supreme the welcome words, "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

We give our thanks to the Grand Architect of the Universe that the Golden Chain of Past Grand Masters of Masons of Nebraska has remained unbroken this past year.

Our gentle craft suffered a most tragic loss this year when Steven K. Jones, Deputy Grand Custodian of District No. 30 was overtaken by that fate which shall eventually overcome us also. He will be greatly missed by us all.

The Committee on Fraternal Dead, under the able leadership of our V: W: Grand Chaplain Benjiman H. Harvey, will be presenting a suitable tribute to our departed brethren as an integral portion of this Annual Communication.

CORNERSTONES

On Sunday, April 26th, an Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was called at Curtis, Nebraska for the purpose of laying the cornerstone of the new Methodist Church. Upon the request of Reverend Ray Norris, and assisted by W.B. Kent Augustine and members of McCook Lodge No. 135 and the Knights Templars, we proceeded to do so in Ample Form. The ceremony was very well attended by your Grand Lodge Officers, members of area lodges and the public.

On Saturday, May 9th, we assembled at the new High School in Bayard, Nebraska, where we had the honor of laying a cornerstone in Ample Form at the request of the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools. Once again, the attendance of area lodges and Grand Lodge Officers was outstanding. Special thanks to Worshipful Brothers Frank Smith and Ralph Townsend. On Saturday, October 3rd, the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Officers were received by the brethren of Samaritan Lodge No. 158, W:B: John Thompson presiding. An Occasional Communication of the Grand Lodge was then called, and we retired to the site of the Museum of Nebraska Art. After the welcome by Chancellor Nester, Brother Robert Monroe requested we lay the cornerstone, which we proceeded to do with the time-honored ceremonies. There was an outstanding attendance by the Grand Lodge Officers, area lodges and the public. Once again, we must give very special thanks to M:W.:Brother Thomas W. Tye for his planning, coordinating and involvement in every phase of this ceremony.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS

On October 31, 1991, pursuant to the authority delineated in Section 1-301 of the Bylaws, M:W: James N. DeMoss appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Cotner Lodge No. 297 and a member of that lodge. Trial was held on September 4, 1992 in this matter. Findings of the Commission were that the individual was guilty as charged. It was the judgment of the Commission that the individual be expelled from Masonry.

On January 30, 1993, pursuant to that authority delineated in Section 1-301 of the Bylaws, I appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Nebraska Lodge No. 1 and a member of that lodge. As of the writing of this address the matter is still pending final resolution.

CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS

The Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held in Washington, D.C. beginning on February 16th and ending February 18th, 1992. It was the privilege of your Grand Master, accompanied by Deputy Grand Master Pohlman, and Grand Junior Warden Rittenburg to represent the Grand Lodge of Nebraska at this conference. It was originally planned for our Grand Secretary Rasmussen to present a program at the Secretary's conference but an accident to Marie forced him to withdraw. However, the program was presented on his behalf by Right Worshipful Rittenburg. We were particularly impressed with the format of this conference. Beginning Sunday afternoon the Conference broke into three workshops, all well attended and very informative. The greatest value, to those of us who attended, was the opportunity to exchange freely any agreement or difference of opinion with the other Grand Jurisdictions who were present, and to learn from each other's experiences.

CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

1. MASONIC HOMES: As they have for the past several years, our two Masonic Homes represent our largest charities. Both continue to provide outstanding care to their residents, and they both represent the finest in Masonic endeavors. Brother Arthur Sharp is our Executive Director of the Home at Plattsmouth, and Brother Benjiman H. Harvey is Administrator of the Home at Fremont. Brother Ben was recently elected President of the Masonic Home Executives Association of North America.

A great deal of the success of both homes can be attributed to the fact that each continues to enjoy the leadership of two of the most dedicated brothers that any craft could wish for, Most Worshipful Harry A. Spencer, President of the Board of Trustees of the Plattsmouth Home, and Worshipful Brother Ched House, President of the Board of Trustees at Fremont.

2. PRINCE HALL GRAND LODGE OF NEBRASKA F.: & A::M::: We continue to enjoy the warm, delightful fellowship with these distinguished and dedicated Masons. Many other Grand Jurisdictions continue to observe, but are still withholding their own judgments and actions. None have taken direct punitive action against us.

3. GRAND LODGE OFFICERS' RETREAT: The retreat this year, was held at the Mahoney State Park near Omaha. Many plans were made, discussed, and implemented for the good of the Fraternity. As always, each of those attending paid all expenses for themselves and family, personally. Right Worshipful Don Pohlman was in charge, and did a great job in keeping the meetings on track in the mornings with fine leisure programs for the afternoons. A large portion of this Grand Lodge came from those meetings.

4. GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD: The purpose of this award is to honor an individual in his community who has been an outstanding citizen and Mason. This year, on May 16th, we had the privilege of conferring this award to W.: Ralph E. Jones of Stratton, Nebraska.

5. GRAND SECRETARY: Having been informed by Grand Master-Elect Pohlman that he was to be appointed to the advancing line, Right Worshipful Don E. Rasmussen asked to be relieved of his duties as Grand Secretary. Effective November 9, 1992, I appointed W.: Virgil Tubach to fulfill the duties of Grand Secretary Pro-Tem.

6. MASONIC RENEWAL TASK FORCE: This National Group sponsored by the Shrine, Scottish Rite, and Conference of Grand Masters, continues to develop programs of great value to our Fraternity. On December 19th, an all day training program in Kearney, Nebraska was held for your Grand Lodge Officers to school them in the latest methods of the Task Force. The school was conducted by Brothers Rittenburg and Ramsey, who will also be in charge of the Workshop program at this Grand Lodge.

7. COMMITTEE ON WORK: In their continuing efforts to render every possible assistance to the subordinate lodges to maintain excellence in ritual work, the Committee has prepared and distributed to the Deputy Grand Custodians and subordinate lodges, a floor work manual, to be used for instructional purposes only. The Committee is presently working on a revision of the Cipher, to bring it in line with the new work, and hopefully, correct errors in the present book. Your Grand Master, his officers, and the other members of the committee wish to express to M:.W:Charles A. Amidon our deep appreciation for his herculean efforts in the preparation of this manual.

8. DIRECTORATE LEADERSHIP: In keeping with the custom established several years ago, no programs or decisions that would affect future years were made without the 100% approval of the Line Officers. This was in keeping with the tradition of no wasted time or motion relative to the individual desires of the current Grand Master.

9. CONSOLIDATIONS: While the actual statistics are available in another part of this address, I wish to commend the action of those lodges who, faced with a declining population base, and /or deterioration of their facilities, chose, rather than sever their Masonic ties, to seek to unite with another lodge, thereby strengthening both.

10. GRAND LODGE 136TH ANNUAL COMMUNICATION: Like my predecessors, it is impossible for me to thank everyone who has contributed to this Grand Lodge. Right Worshipful Don Pohlman, who had the overall responsibility, and has spent so much time and effort; Most Worshipful Tom and Gloria Tye, our Kearney coordinators; and Most Worshipful John M. McHenry for the "Ladies at the Table." I also want to thank Corky Fleming, who Chaired the Social Committee, and all who assisted her; our workshop presenters; the Shriners; the Youth Groups; and Chris Rudder and the Grand Lodge Office Staff. If I listed every individual, I could fill two more pages of this address. God bless you all.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In accordance with Article X, Section 2 (b) of the Constitution, I wish to make the following recommendations, which in the opinion of the Grand Lodge Officers, are deemed necessary and expedient for the future welfare of the Fraternity.

Recommendation No. 1 -- MASONIC-EASTERN STAR STUDENT FUND

I Recommend Section 1-311 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be eliminated. This is the Masonic Eastern Star Student Fund to provide financial assistance for former students of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home, to enable them to further their education. This section is no longer necessary as none of the residents of the Home have qualified for some time. The Order of the Eastern Star has eliminated its committee. Should circumstances change, a special committee could be appointed by the two bodies.

Recommendation No. 2 -- DOINGS OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICERS

I recommend Section 1-317 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be eliminated. The functions of this Committee have been superseded by new procedures. Grand Lodge of Nebraska

Recommendation No. 3 -- ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT

I recommend Section 2-301 be amended to allow the office of Treasurer and Secretary to be combined should an individual lodge so wish.

Recommendation No. 4 -- PLURAL MEMBERSHIP

I recommend Paragraph 8 of Section 2-408 be amended by striking same and substituting the following. "A member holding plural membership in a lodge in this Jurisdiction shall have all the rights and privileges therein of other members and shall be allowed to hold office therein."

This would in effect allow a member to hold office in two lodges.

Recommendation No. 5 -- MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES

I recommend Section 2-406 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be amended by striking the reference to securing a demit and substituting the requirement of affiliation for it. The said section will then read:

"Section 2-406 MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES - a brother who was a member in good standing of a subordinate lodge at the time such lodge became extinct, and remains unaffiliated, shall for one year after such lodge ceases to exist, remain in good standing and shall have the same rights and privileges as members of a regular lodge, including the rights of membership, affiliation, visiting, avouchment, relief, demission, appeal, trial, and burial. But should he fail to pay his dues as provided by Section 2-601, and affiliate within such year, he shall be notified by letter sent to his last known address by the Grand Lodge Office at least thirty days before the next ensuing annual communication of the Grand Lodge, to show cause to the Committee on Grievances, if any he may have, why he has not paid his dues and affiliated with a recognized lodge of Masons.

When any such member shall refuse or neglect to answer a notice to appear and show cause why he should not be suspended for non-payment of dues and affiliating as above provided, his delinquency may be communicated to the Grand Lodge at any subsequent annual communication thereof, which facts, together with the Grand Lodge records showing his indebtedness, or his failure to affiliate, shall be deemed ample proof of the delinquency. If the brother be present, he shall be entitled to make such plea as he may deem proper, after which he shall retire, and upon such evidence and any other evidence which is submitted and received, a vote may be taken upon a motion to suspend the delinquent member indefinitely or to reinstate under such terms and conditions as the Grand Lodge may there direct."

Recommendation No. 6 -- DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

I recommend Section 2-601 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be amended by striking from the fourth paragraph the language "or having petitioned for affiliation and having been rejected has renewed his petition as often as once in each six months after rejection." So that said fourth paragraph reads as follows:

"By the phrase "good standing" is meant one who has affiliated within one year after receiving his demit."

I further recommend that Paragraph Five, Six and Seven be amended by striking the words Grand Secretary and substituting therefor the words Grand Lodge Office so that said paragraphs will read:

Paragraph 5:

"The amount due the Grand Lodge may be sent in at any time between March 31st and April 5th, and the Grand Lodge Office shall add as a penalty one cent per day for each member on the rolls as shown in the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge, to all lodges that neglect to send in their returns complete to the Grand Lodge as provided by Section 2-310, and pay their indebtedness to the Grand Lodge by the tenth of April."

Paragraph Six:

"When the complete returns of any subordinate lodge shall not have been received by the Grand Lodge Office by April 20th, the Grand Master shall be notified of that fact, and the Grand Master shall, by himself, the Grand Custodian, or a Deputy Grand Custodian, or some other brother appointed by the Grand Master, make personal investigations of such lodge, and secure returns as complete as may be. And the Grand Lodge Office shall charge, upon the books of the Grand Lodge, the expenses of such visitation, to the lodge, unless the Grand Master, being satisfied that good reason existed for such delay, shall order otherwise."

Paragraph 7:

"All settlements shall be made in accordance with the account of the Grand Lodge Office, who shall base the same upon the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge. Unaffiliated brethren formerly belonging to lodges now extinct shall affiliate with a recognized lodge of Masons within one year of the date their lodge became extinct, and if no affiliation is received by the Grand Lodge said brethren shall be considered suspended for non payment of dues."

Recommendation No. 7 -- GRAND SECRETARY

I recommend Section 1-201 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be amended to reflect the narrowing of duties where the Grand Secretary is no longer spending full time at the Grand Lodge Office.

"The Grand Secretary shall have charge of the seal of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend and record the transactions of the Grand Lodge when in Annual Communication; shall sign all orders, certificates, documents and diplomas requiring the seal of the Grand Lodge, to include the affixing of the seal thereon; shall complete and carry on such communications with the various subordinate lodges of this jurisdiction, all appendant and/or allied bodies operating therein, and with such other jurisdictions as may from time to time be necessary to insure that a harmonious relationship exists between such bodies and this Grand Lodge. The Grand Secretary shall be ex-officio a member of the Committee on Fraternal Relations and the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices. The Grand Secretary shall report to each Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge such statistical data concerning the status of the membership of this Grand Lodge as may, in his opinion, be appropriate, or as may be directed by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of such duties or other programs of the Grand Lodge to include the promotion of Masonry."

I recommend that Section 2-311 -- Surety Bond, be amended to substitute the words Grand Lodge Office for the words Grand Secretary, and to delete the second sentence of the first paragraph to bring the bylaws into compliance with the surety bond, so that section 2-311 will then read:

"Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge Office for bond protection to the lodge against misappropriation of lodge funds by its Secretary and its Treasurer.

All payments hereunder by subordinate lodges shall be paid annually to the Grand Lodge Office, who shall keep a record thereof. The Grand Lodge Office shall procure a surety bond from a company legally issuing such bond sufficient in amount to protect all of the subordinate lodges against misappropriation of its funds by its Secretary and by its Treasurer, and pay the amount thereof out of the money received for this purpose from such lodges. Said bond so furnished is to be conditioned for the full protection of the Grand Lodge and the several subordinate lodges."

I recommend that Section 2-514 -- Forfeiture of Charter, be amended by substituting the words Grand Lodge Office for the words Grand Secretary so that Section 2-514 will then read:

"The failure of any subordinate lodge to meet for four successive months, or to be represented at two successive annual communications of the Grand Lodge, or to make its annual returns or pay its Grand Lodge dues for two successive years, shall be sufficient ground for the forfeiture of its charter. It shall be the duty of the Grand Lodge Office to give immediate notice thereof to a subordinate lodge appearing by the records to be delinquent in returns and dues."

Recommendation No. 8 -- DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

I recommend that the annual per capita tax in Section 2-601 be increased by (.50) fifty cents to cover the increased costs of the Nebraska Mason.

Recommendation No. 9 -- DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

I recommend that the annual per capita tax in Section 2-601 be amended to include (.50) fifty cents for the support of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children.

Recommendation No. 10 -- DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

I recommend that the annual per capita tax in Section 2-601 be increased (.50) fifty cents for the use of the Grand Lodge General Funds because it is apparent that future operating costs will continue to increase.

Recommendation No. 11 -- DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

I recommend that the annual per capita tax in Section 2-601 be amended to include (.50) fifty cents for the benefit of The George Washington Masonic National Memorial. This memorial has always been of interest to this jurisdiction. We have heretofore led the way nationally, in providing for its financing. Now it is necessary that we do so again.

Recommendation No. 12 -- MILEAGE AND PER DIEM

It is my recommendation that Section 1-105 providing mileage and per diem be eliminated in its entirety. This will eliminate the payment of mileage and per diem for attendance at Grand Lodge.

CONCLUSIONS

I am now coming to the end of more than ten years as an active Grand Lodge Officer. It is with both relief and sadness that I hand the gavel to my successor. The past ten years have been the most happy and satisfying years of my life, because you, my Brothers, have made it so. In those respects you feel I have succeeded, you must take credit for this, yourselves; for each and every one of you have contributed to all successes. In those respects where you feel that I may have failed please charge the failure to your Grand Master's human frailties, and not to his lack of desire to please and serve you.

The Jurisprudence Committee has found all actions by the Grand Master, as printed in his Address to be in proper order and approve the same. M:W:Charles W. Amidon moved for acceptance of this report. Motion was seconded and carried.

REPORT OF CHARTERS AND DISPENSATIONS

Don Madsen, 11

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Visiting Grand Masters, and Brethren; I would at this time like to give the following report from the Charters and Dispensations Committee. There were only 3 lodges sited for non-appearance during the years 1991 and 1992, and only one lodge was absent from 1990-1992, that being Oakland Lodge No. 91. All three lodges checked in with this committee yesterday. I recommend that these lodges be sited for fulfilling their duties.

Upon a motion by Brother Madsen the report was seconded and approved by the Masons present.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

Steven F. Mattoon, 75

Your Committee on Codification of the Law respectfully submits its report relative to amendments or additions to the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge, as enacted at this communication.

That Section 1-311 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be deleted in its entirety.

That Section 1-317 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be deleted in its entirety.

That Section 1-301 be amended to delete all reference to the Masonic-Eastern Star Student Fund Committee and the Committee on the Doings of the Grand Lodge Officers.

That Section 2-301 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-301 -- ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT -- The elective officers of a subordinate lodge shall consist of a Master, Senior and Junior Wardens, Treasurer and Secretary. One officer may hold both elective offices of Treasurer and Secretary. The appointive officers shall consist of a Chaplain, Senior and Junior Deacons, Senior and Junior Stewards and Tyler. The offices of Marshal and Organist may also be appointed if desired.

The elective officers shall be elected by secret ballot by a majority vote at the first regular meeting in November of each year. Anyone so elected should, if possible, accept the office. An election cannot be reconsidered by the lodge unless the member so elected declines. All appointive officers shall be appointed by the Master."

That the eighth paragraph of Section 2-408 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows, and that otherwise said Section shall remain unchanged:

"A member holding plural membership in a lodge in this Jurisdiction shall have all rights and privileges therein of other members and shall be allowed to hold office therein."

That Section 2-406 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows and that the original of said Section be repealed:

"Section 2-406 -- MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES -- A brother who was a member in good standing of a subordinate lodge at the time such lodge became extinct, and remains unaffiliated, shall for one year after such lodge ceases to exist, remain in good standing and shall have the same rights and privileges as members of a regular lodge, including the rights of membership, affiliation, visiting, avouchment, relief, demission, appeal, trial and burial. But should he fail to pay his dues as provided by Section 2-601, <u>and affiliate within such year</u>, he shall be notified by letter sent to his last known address by the <u>Grand Lodge Office</u> at least thirty days before the next ensuing annual communication of the Grand Lodge, to show cause to the Committee on Grievances, if any he may have, why he has not paid his dues and affiliated with a recognized lodge of Masons.

When any such member shall refuse or neglect to answer a notice to appear and show cause why he should not be suspended for non-payment of dues and <u>affiliating</u> as above provided, his delinquency may be communicated to the Grand Lodge at any subsequent annual communication thereof, which facts, together with the Grand Lodge records showing his indebtedness, or his failure to <u>affiliate</u>, shall be deemed ample proof of the delinquency. If the brother be present, he shall be entitled to make such plea as he may deem proper, after which he shall retire, and upon such evidence and any other evidence which is submitted and received, a vote may be taken upon a motion to suspend the delinquent member indefinitely <u>or to reinstate under such terms and conditions</u> as the Grand Lodge may there direct."

That Section 2-601 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows, and that otherwise said Section shall remain unchanged:

"Section 2-601 -- DUES AND ASSESSMENTS -- Chartered subordinate lodges shall have discretionary power to assess annual dues and special assessments upon its members who are Master Masons in good standing. Such dues and assessments shall be uniform upon such members. The amount of the annual dues shall include Grand Lodge dues and shall be designated in the Bylaws. Special assessments may be made payable in installments. A brother desiring to demit shall be required to pay dues only for the time he is a member of the lodge, that is, to the end of the month in which he is demitted, but he shall be required to pay in full all special assessments.

A subordinate lodge's floating debt does not rest pro rata on its members until so assessed. The dues owed by members to a lodge cannot be offset against any debts owed by the lodge to said members, except with the consent of the delinquent members.

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April, for each initiation during the preceding calendar year, the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00), and for each member, the sum of Ten Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$10.50) as per capita tax. In addition thereto, in the case of reinstatement of suspended members, the per capita tax for the year of suspension shall be paid to the Grand Lodge with the annual report for the calendar year of reinstatement. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. Each subordinate lodge shall collect and transmit to the Grand Lodge with its annual returns the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each Master Mason affiliating therewith during the year covered by these returns; provided, that this shall not apply to any Master Mason in good standing at the time he presents his petition for affiliation.

By the phrase "good standing" is meant one who has affiliated within one year after receiving his demit.

The amount due the Grand Lodge may be sent in at any time between March 31 and April 5, and the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall add as a penalty one cent (\$.01) per day for each member on the rolls as shown in the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge, to all lodges that neglect to send in their returns complete to the Grand Lodge as provided by Section 2-310, and pay their indebtedness to the Grand Lodge by the 10th of April.

When the completed returns of any subordinate lodge shall not have been received by the Grand Lodge Office Committee by April 20th, the Grand Master shall be notified <u>of that fact</u>, and the Grand Master shall, by himself, the Grand Custodian or a Deputy Grand Custodian, or some other brother appointed by the Grand Master, make personal investigations of such lodge, and secure returns as complete as may be, and the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall charge, upon the books of the Grand Lodge, the expenses of such visitation, to the lodge, unless the Grand Master be satisfied that good reason existed for such delay, shall order otherwise.

All settlements shall be made in accordance with the account of the <u>Grand Lodge</u> <u>Office Committee</u>, which shall base the same upon the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge. Unaffiliated brethren formerly belonging to lodges now extinct shall affiliate with a recognized lodge of Masons within one year of the date their lodge became extinct, and if no affiliation is received by the Grand Lodge, said brethren shall be considered suspended for non-payment of dues."

That Section 1-406 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows and that otherwise said Section shall remain unchanged:

"Section 1-406 -- ALLOCATION OF FUNDS -- The per capita tax of <u>Ten Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$10.50)</u> shall be divided as follows:

To the George Washington Masonic National Memorial	8	.50
To the Nebraska Masonic Home	\$2	.00
To the General Fund	\$8	.00

The Initiation Fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and all affiliation fees shall be allocated to the General Fund.

I move the adoption of this Report and adoption of these Bylaw Amendments. Seconded and adopted.

The Grand Master then entertained a motion that the following reports, as printed and distributed to the delegates, be accepted without reading, and printed in the proceedings:

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES

Frank V. Lawson, Jr., 1

The primary remaining responsibility of the Grand Trustees is the management of the investment funds of the Grand Lodge and the annual selection of auditors to examine the financial records of the Grand Lodge.

This year your Trustees hired a new auditing firm, Dana F. Cole & Company, whose main office is in Lincoln.

As explained before, the Grand Lodge investment funds are handled in two separate accounts—the Grand Lodge General (or unrestricted) Fund and the Restricted (or special) Fund. The latter encompasses the Stephen C. Houghton Fund and the Emick Scholarship Fund as well as the Perpetual Membership Fund. A record of the separate interests of the various contributing entities is kept by the Grand Lodge Office.

In the tables below the figures for 1992 are from the auditors preliminary, yet-to-be-finalized, report.

This was the fourth straight year of deficit operation. While expenses were down, revenues were down even more. It should be noted that there is a significant delay or lag before dues increases reach the Grand Lodge coffers. The dues increase passed at the 1991 Grand Lodge session were collected at the local Lodge level in 1992 and will only in 1993 reach the Grand Lodge. Any dues action taken at the 1993 Grand Lodge session will not help until 1995.

Note also that the General Fund Equity continues to shrink. This cannot continue indefinitely. This year the Grand Trustees have begun to shift the mix of investments to include a significant portion of common stocks. This shift of policy will reduce income in the short run, but we believe it will better keep pace with the ebb and flow of inflation in the long run. It cannot, however, succeed in the face of persistent and continuing deficits.

Restricted Funds

These funds include the Emick Scholarship Fund and the Stephen C. Houghton Fund. These funds are invested in both common stocks and bonds.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION B. Lynn Alexander, 54

In the past year we have seen a disturbing rise in criticism directed against the fraternity from religious institutions and groups. This is not new of course, and periodically, over the centuries, Masonry has suffered from unreasonable religious attacks. In answering these attacks, it is not entirely satisfactory for us to attribute these problems to a particular faction of society such as "the religious right," or "religious fundamentalists." At the same time it is not appropriate nor advisable for the Fraternity to take any kind of aggressive posture toward any religious group or challenge. Such behavior on the part of the Fraternity will inevitably result in further criticism of our institution and unfavorable media scrutiny.

The best response to religious objection therefore, seems to be through legitimate, and thorough Masonic Education. Let's face the fact, my brothers, that most of us don't understand enough about our own fraternity, to enable us to defend our Craft in a discussion with a doubting brother, or with a religious critique. We should never argue with a critique, but instead have the ability to show how Masonry reinforces and enhances a good man's spiritual well-being. We should approach the problem from the positive position, and avoid the negative point of view.

In the past year, the Education Committee failed to get as fully organized as our Grand Master intended. However, we did manage to revive the monthly Masonic Education Lessons, which first appeared in 1988 and later were dropped. This year however, we asked each lodge to provide the Committee with names and addresses of Masonic Education points of contact, so that we could make an effort to ensure that each lodge in the jurisdiction had access to a lesson each month. The response of the lodges in terms of reporting their respective education committees, and to our Monthly Lessons exceeded our expectations. We have the impression that the lodges are using the Lessons to a greater extent than before.

The intent and design of the lessons is that each lesson should be concise and readable at a Regular Communication in about five minutes. The lesson should state a single specific education point or idea. The lesson should not rely upon speculation or myth about the fraternity and/or its' history. The lesson should offer the local Education Chairman the opportunity to expand discussion and develop innovative programs for the local lodge.

We think that we have done a fairly good job with these lessons, and many local chairmen have sent letters of encouragement as well as suggestions for future topics. We are delighted that the Lessons are being published in the Lincoln/Lancaster County area "Masonic News," which exposes the Lessons to Masons and non-Masons who do not regularly attend lodge or who are just recently learning about the Fraternity.

I respectfully suggest that as we Masons become more educated, we will more adequately answer the objections of our critiques.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GEORGE WASHINGTON NATIONAL MEMORIAL

Brethren, the George Washington Masonic National Memorial is in trouble. It is now about seventy years old, and like all buildings of that age, it has needed substantial repairs, such as new roofs and new, more energy efficient and more protective windows. Obviously, such repairs are necessary to preserve this beautiful building and its contents.

But repair costs in connection with such a monument, are themselves monumental. Methods of financing the support of this beacon of Freemasonry which have worked in the past no longer keep up with increased costs. Consequently, once this window and roof work is done to keep the rain and weather outside, all other repair work on the building has had to be suspended. There simply is not the cash flow to make it possible to do other less essential repairs. In fact, if things get worse, it may not be possible to keep the building open every day for tours. This would truly be a terrible loss, since Masons from all over America and all over the world come to the Washington D.C. area with the specific intent to visit this Memorial. What a disappointment it would be for a Mason to have a once-in-a-lifetime trip spoiled because the Memorial was not open when he was there.

In the past, this Grand Lodge has led the country in providing means to finance this magnificent structure, and the rest of the country followed. Now, it is necessary that we do so again.

The reason this is so is that the members of the George Washington Masonic Memorial Association are the fifty-one Grand Lodges in the United States. Since Grand Lodges comprise the membership of the Association, it is the Grand Lodges which must supply the solutions. And as with anything, one starts with the leaders. Nebraska is recognized as the most progressive Grand Lodge in the country, so it is the one asked to start the ball rolling. Many years ago, Nebraska led the way in increasing the raising fee from one dollar to five dollars, and the rest of the Grand Lodges followed. Today, this method of supporting the Memorial provides insufficient funds to cover essential costs.

Therefore your Committee asks you, our fellow members of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska again to show the way to the rest of the world by increasing the per-capita by fifty cents to be used for the support of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. Nebraska is recognized far and wide as a leader in Freemasonry, and if we do this, the rest of the Nation will follow. They have followed us before and will do so again. Please give us your support.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

The Committee on Finance met several times throughout 1992 and early in 1993 in order to perform the dutics as outlined in Section 1-318 of the Bylaws of Grand Lodge. At each of these meetings, the following audit procedure was followed:

1. A comparison of canceled checks to the check register, as well as examination of endorsements.

2. Examination of support documents for disbursements and review of accounts to which the disbursements were charged selecting all items over \$500 and every fifth disbursement at random.

3. Review and reconciliation of bank statements.

4. Review of all income items and lodge assessments.

5. Review of the financial statements.

Total revenues for the year 1992 were \$342,832.03. The 1992 budget revenue estimate was \$345,108.00, indicating that our actual revenues were some \$2,275.97 less than anticipated.

Interest income of course was down because of the lower interest rates in 1992 but we did have a gain of some \$2,579.54 on the sale of investments which was unanticipated. Overall, actual total revenues were very close to anticipated revenues as set forth in the 1992 budget.

Prior to year end and in accordance with section 1-325, proper authorization to adjust subtotals budgeted was approved by the Appropriations Committee and the requisite number of Grand Lodge Officers. Prior to this authorization there had been an over expenditure of line item 5500 for printed supplies for lodges which included floorwork manuals, new perpetual membership brochures and packets and other materials for our support lodges by some \$5,765.20. Because of the frugal nature of our Grand Master and his Grand Lodge Officers there was an excess in item 5200.100 Travel-Grand Master, and as a result \$5,800.00 was moved from that line item to cover the overage in line item 5500 in accordance with section 1-325. There were a few other slight over expenditures primarily due to two bulk rate postage increases in 1992 which were unanticipated as well as rate increases with reference to telephone and dealing with three different telephone companies in services provided not only to the Grand Lodge Office but to our Grand Master in Kimball and to the Grand Secretary in McCook. It is notable however to comment that the phone expenses exceeded budget not only because of the increased rate but also the increased usage by the Grand Master some 400 miles away from the Grand Lodge Office but that in like turn that telephone expense was more than offset by the unused travel of our Grand Master which far exceeded the increased telephone expense. Overall, the subtotal categories did not exceed budget. Total expenses for the year 1992 were \$381,181.49 which was \$16,511.54 under anticipated deficit. The Grand Lodge Officers, Staff and Employees should be commended for doing everything in their power to keep expenditures within the bare necessities and in finishing the year some \$16,000.00 under anticipated expenses.

The members of the Finance Committee found satisfactory verification for all expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and were able to complete their audit procedures as herein above referred to with the fine aid and assistance of the Office Manager and Staff of the Grand Lodge Office. Particular note should be made that all expenditures for travel and related expenses of your Grand Lodge Officers are fully documented and accounted for with all receipts verifying those expenditures to the satisfaction of your committee.

Your Committee on Finance further recommends to the Grand Lodge Officers and the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices that a

procedural standard for approval of expenditures when expenses checks are being executed should be created for the benefit of those individuals executing checks for the Grand Lodge. Such a procedure could be implemented whereby the actual bill or authorization for the expenditure is made available for each and every expense check executed so that the two individuals whose signatures are required on Grand Lodge expenditures can review those statements prior to placing their signatures upon the checks for expenditure of Grand Lodge funds. This would then allow the two individuals executing checks on behalf of the Grand Lodge to review those expenditures and approve or disapprove as necessity required. In the past, it has been the assumption of the Committee on Finance, that those individuals whose signatures appear upon the expense checks of Grand Lodge (usually the Grand Master and one other Grand Lodge Officer) have examined the expenditure and approved thereof.

Your committee chairman does very much appreciate the hard work of each and every member of the committee who give of their time to review the books and records of the Grand Lodge. This year, the term of Jerry L. Rittenburg expires and we extend to him our appreciation for his efforts to the committee on behalf of the Grand Lodge.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC RELATIONS Donald L. Pohlman, 41

Your committee on Public Relations met early in the year to review our existing public relations programs and to set goals for the ensuing year. Our Nebraska Mason is currently being printed on newsprint of tabloid size and is the best quality paper that can be produced at a reasonable price. Most of the layout, all of the labeling, and sorting by zip code is done by our own office staff which assures us of total and accurate control of postage and mailing. Even with these economy measures the cost of the three issues this year amounted to more than \$1.00 per member. The committee feels that one or two additional issues per year would be very beneficial.

Cornerstones and other public Masonic events are opportunities for us to tell the non-Mason about our organization. Russ Reno has developed news releases preceding and following these events. These news releases have been sent to the news media in the area of these events and have helped publicize our activities. Russ has also developed a news format form for Lodges to report their own activities to the news media in their area.

We have established a very extensive library of VCR tapes in our Grand Lodge Office. The tapes can be purchased by a Lodge or loaned to them on a cost free basis. These are becoming very popular with the Lodges and many of them are purchasing TV/VCR equipment to use these tapes. A listing of the available tapes is published in the back of the Officers Directory.

The Nebraska Grand Lodge belongs to the Midwest Conference of Public Relations. The conference consists of approximately 14 jurisdictions in the Midwest and is an excellent way to share public relations ideas. Philip A. Lorenzen attended this years' conference which was held July 24-26 at St. Louis, Missouri.

In the future I would suggest that this committee look at programs at the local level which would improve the public image of Masonry. These might include but not be limited to: highway sign programs, Lodge sign programs, Lodge open houses, highway billboard programs, and public service announcements similar to the Floyd Kalber tapes of a few years ago.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP *Philip O. Edwards*, 326

During our several meetings this year we attempted to pinpoint some of the problems relating to membership development and membership retention. Next was to develop or recommend some ideas or suggestions to address these problems.

A lack of 'knowledge' about Masonry appears to be a major stumbling block to many members and lodges. This lack of 'knowledge' includes the inability of many of our brethren to talk to non-members about the virtues of Masonry and why they should belong. Also many lodges are involved in doing ritual work and having business meetings. This often limits the members when a prospect asks 'what do you do?'

Our committee reviewed the available video tapes on file at the Grand Lodge Office regarding their usage for membership promotion. After the review, an article was prepared for the Nebraska Mason to inform the brethren as well as the lodge officers about the suggested usage of the video tapes. We do encourage the lodges to make use of these video tapes as there is some excellent information for use with prospective members. Some of the tapes are useful to our members as they are progressing through the degree work. The Masonic Renewal Committee of North America has prepared a manual and a series of video tapes for a Masonic Membership Development program. This manual is quite extensive and has many good ideas for lodges to consider in membership promotion and lodge development. The Grand Lodge Office has a copy of the manual and tapes. We encourage the lodge leadership to take the time to review this program and utilize the portions appropriate for them. A lodge may consider ordering their own manual and tapes for their own use.

Earlier this year Grand Master Eatmon wrote to all members who had been suspended for non-payment of dues. Some of the responses were shared with the committee. There were as many who wanted to 'resign or discontinue membership' as there were those who wanted to pay dues or continue their membership. There were quite a number who were reported as 'in distress' and, there were nearly as many reported as deceased.

Based on the responses, it is apparent that the Membership Sustaining Committee of some of the local lodges may not be following their dutics as stated in the Bylaws. Some of the responses indicate that there is little or no contact by some of the lodges to members who are delinquent to determine the reason(s) for non-payment. By some personal contact (telephone or visit), it is evident that some suspensions would not be necessary. Also by some personal contact, a lodge may find it needs to practice 'charity' toward a brother.

The Membership Sustaining Committee has an important part to play in the lodge's overall membership program. They should be working with the Secretary and Master during the year on members that are slow paying their dues and those who are delinquent. The Master of the lodge should impress on this committee its importance. He certainly could request progress reports during the year, especially after the delinquent list is developed. A review of delinquent members over a number of successive years will reveal that several names are repeats or 'regulars'. Special attention could be given these members earlier in the year.

We feel that moving the delinquency date to late spring could assist in reducing suspensions. This would give the committee a more desirable period to contact members with less influence from outside sources. With the current delinquency date of September 30th, the lodges are trying to collect delinquent dues during the latter part of the year. This is when there are other demands on our brethren's funds such as: the upcoming winter season, the various holidays, other end of the year expenses, and a billing for the coming year's dues, and in some cases a busy work season. No doubt these factors can affect a member's decision to discontinue membership.

To encourage new members to be proud of their membership in Masonry, we have obtained an additional supply of 'new member' pins. As new members are reported to the Grand Lodge Office on the monthly reports, Masonic pins will be sent to the lodge for presentation to the new members.

To maintain, and hopefully increase our membership, all of us must be proud of Masonry, be willing to talk about it, and be motivated about Masonry and our respective lodges. It is much easier to do this if we are enthused about Masonry, and our lodge is active and visible in the community. All of this takes dedication, and some time, by the brethren. In summary, membership is a responsibility of each member, and is something that has to be worked at, all the time.

LorRae served her assembly as Worthy Advisor, (2 terms), Charity (3 terms), Faith, Hope and in all bow stations. She has also held five different offices in the Grand Assembly. She participates in numerous church, community and school activities. This scholastically excellent student plans to attend Doane College in Crete.

Receiving the scholarship for the International Order of Job's Daughters was Angela Dawn Krull of Bethel No. 15, Fremont, Nebraska. Angela is a Past Honored Queen of her Bethel, Past Grand Bethel Chaplain, Sweetheart to Lewis M. Keene Chapter Order of DeMolay, and has served in numerous other offices during her 8 year membership in Job's Daughters. She has also participated in many school, community and church activities plus many Masonic family functions. She is an excellent scholar and musician. Her letters of recommendation compliment her on her "bubbly" personality, enthusiasm and leadership qualities.

The scholarship for the Order of DeMolay was presented to our current State Master Councilor, Brent Eric Warwick of Crusade Chapter, Omaha, Nebraska. c. Preparing articles for Masonic newsletters regarding the youth organizations.

Activities we continue to pursue include:

a. Production of a promotional brochure explaining the three youth organizations, membership requirements, how interested youth may become members and a mail-in letter indicating interest.

b. Hosting a statewide function for our three Masonic youth organizations. This would be a function that could promote appreciation, enthusiasm, visibility and membership in our Masonic family.

During the year, Brother Michael W. Stuhr, Craftsmen Lodge No. 314, was selected as Executive Officer for the State of Nebraska, Order of DeMolay. Brother Stuhr is a valuable member of our youth committee. We extend our congratulations to him.

Our report is concluded by again encouraging all Masons and their Lodges to do all we can for the good of our youth organizations - they are our future. Support them in their functions, activities and membership. Attend their meetings. Ask them to participate in your activities and to perform their Ritual work for you. They do an excellent job. As before - we are truly a Masonic family and must work together as a unified family.

REPORT OF THE AWARDS COMMITTEE

Steven Jones, 263, 265

During the 1992-93 Masonic year, the Awards Committee changed chairmanship and its scope of responsibilities widened. This committee is charged with consideration of Grand Lodge awards, recommendations for changes, initiation of additional awards and their implementation, and nominations to the Grand Master for those awards for which he is responsible. The Grand Masters' Humanitarian Award, Scholarship program, Rock Maul and Gold Pan Awards, Membership and Individual achievement awards were referred to this committee and we were charged with the development of an all-inclusive on-going awards program and the review of any existing awards to enhance their effectiveness.

Meeting several times this year, we judged that the program we will follow will require three to four years to review and implement. Four awards were targeted this year: the Rock Maul, Gold Pan

and two new awards, for Masonic Leadership and the Award for Achievement to non-Masons.

We developed criteria for each award. We sought to clarify differences between the Rock Maul and Gold Pan awards and maintain the integrity and objectives of the original presenters.

As speculative Masons, we use the implements of our craft to teach moral lessons. This landmark was followed by the committee in choosing to structure the Rock Maul and Gold Pan awards to fit the builder's use for the tools they exemplify.

The Rock Maul award, initiated by M: W: Byron C. Jenkins, is a stonemaul used in the quarries in the daily work of a stonemason. It was intended to recognize the Masonic excellence of a subordinate lodge and reward it. The committee developed a checklist of programs and activities of the Grand Lodge and the subordinate lodge which show progress in the daily activity of the lodge, working toward excellence which exemplifies the true spirit of Masonry in leadership, attendance, enthusiasm, fellowship, newsletters, reports, programs and ritual which the initiators desired. This checklist will allow each lodge to determine if they wish to strive for the award, and make the application and selection process easier.

The Gold Pan award, presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by M: W: Jim Williams, the first Grand Master of Alaska, was given because Nebraska recognized the Grand Lodge of Alaska by edict in 1981 and gave them independent life. This action came about also because of M .: W .: Jenkins acting on behalf of Nebraska. This trophy, presented to Nebraska in 1987 by M .: W .: Charles Gregg on behalf of Grand Master Williams, intends to be an "annual award to the Nebraska Lodge showing the greatest improvement or most significant contribution to Masonry in Nebraska." As the gold pan seeks to uncover treasure in cloudy waters and muddled earth, we intend that the Gold Pan Award give merit to the lodge which finds treasure to be shared by all in its own improvement or in the improvement of Masonry in Nebraska. Previous winners have added to the wealth of Masonry by increasing their own lodge's resources of programs, membership, benevolence, leadership or community involvement. We hope subsequent winners will bring with them riches which will benefit us all.

The last two awards will be more fully explained at the workshops held during this session. They are awards to be given by the individual lodges to their members and to their communities. The Masonic Leadership Award is an award to recognize a particularly active Mason within a lodge's membership for his work in the lodge or in his community. The Masonic Achievement Award to Non-Masons seeks to reward others in the lodge's community who have bettered our state and our world. Both of these awards are sponsored by Grand Lodge but are given by the individual lodges and are self-funded. The Awards Committee is in great hopes that these awards will serve as public relations tools which will enhance our ideas among ourselves and our fellows and our communities.

To the Grand Master, we express our appreciation for appointment to this committee and our humble acceptance of the mandates we were given. To the Grand Master-Elect we pledge our time and talents to see our committee's task completed. To the craft, we seek to work both with you and for you. We know changes are inevitable and even changes on the committee itself, will bring some good to us all.

Thank you for the ability to serve on this committee; it is our hope that our efforts were deserving of your confidence.

With the completion of Phase V, and the beginning of Phase VI, we are about 85% complete in our long range renovation plans. You will notice the changes taking place in the overall appearance of the home grounds through the landscaping work that is in progress, and the removal of a lot of older growth trees and shrubs due to winter kill to provide us with a long term program to enhance the overall appearance of the Home grounds. When this is accomplished our long term Capital Improvement project, as it now exists, will be complete. Our 77 year old facility remains young at heart, and appearance, and ready to provide care and comfort for deserving children for many years to come.

As fraternal members, you should know that your board members, both past and present, are proud to have been a part of this worthwhile endeavor. It would never have taken place without the wonderful financial support we have received from the caring and loving Masons and Eastern Stars of Nebraska. REPORT TO THE STOCKHOLDERS OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

Harry A. Spencer, 227, President

TO: Grand Lodge of Nebraska

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren:

As president of The Nebraska Masonic Home I present this brief accounting of some of our activities and problems for the year. I do so, however, on behalf of the Board of Trustees who, in addition to myself, are as follows: Frank V. Lawson, Jr., Gary W. Radil, Jay H. Speck, Gerald E. Patton, Robert A. Metcalf, Richard E. Brasel, Dale E. LeBaron, V. Kaye Ramsey, Donald L. Pohlman, Jerry L. Rittenburg, David L. Knutson, John M. McHenry, John S. Pierce and James N. DeMoss.

It has been a very busy and eventful year. By June we had made the necessary adjustments with the general contractor which completed the work on the remodeling of our 1952 facility. This remodeling included providing adequate administrative offices, adding 20 additional apartments on the third and fourth floors, building two exterior fire stairs for the three floors of the East and West Wings as required by the Fire Marshal, and the installation of a new generator. These improvements, which cost us \$1,700,000, completed our major improvement program. We are very grateful to Trustee Worshipful Brother Dick Brasel for the great amount of time and work he put in as chairman of the committee for these improvements. We moved all of our administrative offices to the second floor. For the first time in several years, we no longer have a waiting list for apartments. We are now in the process of showing and renting the new ones.

During the year the number of our residents reached 108. This is the highest total in our history. The number fluctuated between 101 and 108 during the year. The average age of our residents is 88. The oldest is Past Grand Master Benjamin Eyre who has been at the Home for eleven years. He reached his 104th birthday last May. He was presented with his 75 year pin during the year.

Due to the beneficence of the Oliver and Ferrol Barklage Foundation, memorials from the families and friends of Rex and Fern Gifford, Eleanor Norris, and Mary Scriven, and a donation from the Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star, an aviary has been added to the Home. It is a source of serenity and great pleasure to our residents.

Your Board of Trustees has made a proposal to the Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star to approve the admission of any Nebraska Eastern Star sister who is not now eligible for admission because her Masonic affiliation is in a jurisdiction other than Nebraska. This proposal will probably be considered at the next Grand Chapter session.

We are pleased to inform you that we now have available, assisted living services in our apartments for those approved applicants who need some assistance with their daily living needs but do not require infirmary care. The assisted living program is intended for those who need occasional service such as overseeing the proper administration of medication under the direction of a nurse, or who need assistance with bathing.

As usual, The Nebraska Masonic Home will have a promotional display and an information booth at Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter under the direction of Mary C. Stapp, the Assistant Director. We urge each of you to sample our coffee and examine our display. Our Assistant Director Mary will be happy to visit with you about the Home and its facilities.

Many thanks are extended to our Brother Adolph Schlaman for spearheading the Boon Memorial Food Truck that brings food items to The Nebraska Masonic Home each year the Saturday before Thanksgiving. Due to Brother Schlaman's generosity in being in charge of this event and the kindness of those brothers and sisters who donate to this project, the Masonic Home is once again humbly grateful.

It will come as no surprise to you to learn that our health benefit plan for our employees has become much more expensive. We have been hard hit by increases because of exceptional expense. In an attempt to find some way to alleviate the problem of escalating costs we hired a consultant who made a study of our program to see if there was any way we might mitigate this cost so that we can keep it within our ability to pay.

During the year, the Board of Trustees commissioned a longrange actuarial study. This involved a projection of future costs for those now resident in the Home. This was to enable us to more accurately plan our long-range needs and obligations before unforeseen problems arose. It also brought home the fact that we must increase our Endowment Support Fund to be sure we are able to meet our present commitments.

Our budget for 1992-1993 is \$3,179,830. Of this amount only \$1,397,300 will be raised by current source of income. This leaves \$1,782,530 which must be paid from our Foundation Support Fund. Unfortunately, the estimated income from our Foundation Support Fund for this year is \$1,580,000 so that we must go into our capital for at least \$200,000. Considering the present state of the economy, this is an alarming development and one that requires our immediate attention. We must either find some way to bring our budget within our income or increase that income if we are to continue to care for our Regular Way residents. While this task is primarily that of your Trustees, it is equally that of every Nebraska Mason. So, I urge each and every one of you who reads this report to consider his responsibility to do everything possible to motivate those who can help us to keep sufficient funds coming in so that we may stay even with inflation and meet all our current needs.

In response to appeals for funds by The Nebraska Masonic Home Caring Club, I have had Masons suggest to me that they are supporting the Home with their per capita assessment, but the per capita assessment which is now \$2 for every Nebraska Mason brings in only \$46,000 which amounts to 1-1/2 percent of our current budget. We hope to raise another \$75,000 through our Caring Club. It should, therefore, be obvious that we have an urgent need to increase our Foundation Support Fund. If you have not considered The Nebraska Masonic Home in your final will, I urge you to do so. In this way you may invest in the future of The Nebraska Masonic Home.

I have been disturbed that so many Masons do not know exactly what we do have at Plattsmouth. If you have never visited The Nebraska Masonic Home or have not done so in the recent past, I urge you to do so at the first opportunity. I assure you that you will be agreeably surprised at the facility you will find operating in Plattsmouth. It is a real tribute to Nebraska Masonry and an organization of which you can be justly proud.

Worshipful Brother Thomas W. Tye is now the Executive Director of The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation. He is willing and anxious to present a program on The Nebraska Masonic Home to any group wanting such a program. I assure you that it will be interesting and informative.

Our Home staff is doing an exceptional job of keeping our Home at a high level of efficiency. I commend our Executive Director, Arthur R. Sharp, for the job he is doing in working with the staff to maintain that high level of efficiency. I feel comfortable with his excellent performance and commend him for it.

In closing, I find myself inadequate to the task of expressing my appreciation for the work our Trustees have done throughout the year. Each and every one of them has participated fully and faithfully in all our activities. They spend considerable amounts of their time throughout the year attending meetings and working with committees of the Home. So that you may appreciate the sacrifice they make, I want you to understand that they receive no expense reimbursement of any kind for services rendered or expenses incurred in work for The Nebraska Masonic Home. They exemplify Masonic charity and brotherhood at its best. I hope that all of you appreciate the efforts they are making on your behalf.

A very special thanks must go to the various Masonic bodies who have given so much to the Home in terms of their time, service, and support: Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 for always being there when we need them; Home Chapter No. 189, OES of Plattsmouth for the delicious fried chicken picnic for our residents each summer; Narcissus Chapter Kensington for the very tasty covered dish picnic which our residents so enjoy; to the Masters and Wardens Club who sponsor our residents' annual Christmas Party and furnish gifts and poinsettias for all of our residents; the Tangier Mobile Nobles for the Annual Valentine Day Party; the Nebraska Grand York Rite Officers who visit each year and have lunch with our residents to renew old friendships and make new ones; to Mrs. Marleen Dinklage, Worthy Grand Matron; Mr. Charles Evans, Worthy Grand Patron; and Mrs. Shirley Frink, Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star for all of the wonderful support and cooperation which they provide to us each year.

Thanks to the generosity of the Oliver and Ferrol Barklage Foundation, memorials from the families and friends of Rex and Fern Gifford, Eleanor Norris, and Mary Scriven, along with a very generous donation from the Grand Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star, June 2, 1992, became a Red Letter Day at The Nebraska Masonic Home. That was the day our new aviary was delivered and began to provide enjoyment for many residents. Its' inhabitants are 25 very colorful and active tropical and exotic birds. In my five years at The Nebraska Masonic Home, I have never seen anything like the reaction our residents had to their newly-adopted feathered friends. Some of our residents who had not smiled for years were smiling, others were watching with interest when before nothing seemed to interest them. Other residents were moving their arms and pointing when they had not moved on their own for months. The transfer of the Endowment and Bequest Funds of the Home to The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation was very smooth thanks to Brothers Tye and Knutson.

Also during this past year we have installed a total Energy Management System in your Nebraska Masonic Home. This system will allow us to control the interior environment of our facility with much greater precision and result in a more economical use of our energy resources. The result will be a sizable reduction in our utility bills over the coming years. All this is just one of the many ways we are attempting to control the rising costs of operating a large health care facility like The Nebraska Masonic Home.

I would like to add my personal thank you to the Plattsmouth Area Ministerial Association for not only providing our weekly church services but also for being available to our residents for spiritual counseling when needed. Their services are truly appreciated.

Our Home Physician, Dr. Richard Hurd, M.D., also deserves our deepest gratitude. He not only directs the medical programs of our facility but also counsels with our sick and infirmed residents in a most loving manner. He makes himself constantly available for our residents' emergency medical needs. He also provides a great deal of help to the Home's administrative staff in matters of medical policy formulation and implementation.

During the past five years we have had a significant increase in our census at the Home. In January of 1988 our total population was 92 residents with 33 of them being Regular Way. During this past year we reached an all-time high census of 108 residents with 55 of them being Regular Way. This shows that in the past five years our Regular Way population has increased from 36 percent to 51 percent. This marked increase has provided the incentive for our Board of Trustees to initiate a very comprehensive actuarial study by the Milliman and Robertson actuarial firm to determine the future financial needs for our Regular Way residents.

It has been a pleasure for me to serve The Nebraska Masonic Home and the Masons of Nebraska over the past five years. I look forward to more years of service to our beloved fraternity. Thank you for this opportunity.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME FOUNDATION

It is again my pleasure to report to the Board and Stockholders of the Nebraska Masonic Home at its annual meeting in Plattsmouth on January 12, 1993. The year 1992 has been a most enjoyable and productive year for the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation and we look forward to 1993 with great anticipation.

Presentations have been made to Lodges and Star Chapters from Omaha to Scottsbluff, from Superior to Wood Lake and yes, even from Coleridge to Bartley. We criss-crossed this state spreading the word of The Nebraska Masonic Home and its Foundation. We talk about the Home, its present facilities and its' future. It always gives me great joy to talk about this QUALITY and the Home. The Executive Director of the Nebraska Masonic Home, Arthur Sharp, continues to have that commitment to quality as does your Executive Director of the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation; for both of us were fortunate enough to have had our mothers as residents of The Nebraska Masonic Home and were able to see first hand the quality care that each of them received while residents of the home.

Unfortunately, quality costs money. We try as best we can to stress the necessity of continuing to build upon our Foundation in order to be able to provide for our current residents as well as future generations in the manner in which our current residents have become accustomed. It is necessary that your Foundation provide approximately two and a half million dollars per year from its income to supplement the annual operating budget of The Nebraska Masonic Home to provide the QUALITY we demand for the benefit of our residents. Unless we continue to expand our foundation through gifts, bequests, trusts and annuities it will be necessary for us to use a portion of the principle of our Foundation funds in order to supplement the annual budget and continue this QUALITY of care. This is why everyone's consideration of The Nebraska Masonic Home is so vital to our continued existence. As before, I will be most pleased and privileged to present the programs to anyone and to encourage your phone calls so that we may have the further opportunity to personally visit with individuals who have a desire to continue the QUALITY and standards we are so proud of at The Nebraska Masonic Home.

The annual Caring Club continues to grow in number and we appreciate very much the annual contributions of those who have been, and continue to join our Caring Club, by giving an annual donation of \$250.00 or more to The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation to assist us in our continual quest for QUALITY. The Caring Club in 1992 raised over \$70,000 for your Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation and as of the first of December the current giving for the Caring Club exceeds \$55,000 and continues to grow through your generosity. The Caring Club Dinner for 1992 was held on May 30, 1992 at Cody Park in North Platte and a good time was had by all of those in attendance. The Caring Club Dinner for 1993 has been scheduled for July 10, 1993 to be held at The Masonic Home in Plattsmouth and I know we will have an excellent attendance. Again the Board of Directors of The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation extend to all Caring Club members an open invitation to attend the Caring Club Dinner, and we are in hopes that the Grand Master and Grand Lodge Officers will be in attendance and share with us their friendship and good counsel at this joyous occasion.

We continue to develop the planned giving program and continue to find increasing inquiries with reference to life annuities and charitable trusts, as well as interest in specific bequests through wills benefiting The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation. We have executed and are now in the life annuity business and have also been of assistance in securing the execution of various Wills and charitable trusts benefiting The Nebraska Masonic Home. If you or anyone with whom you are acquainted has an interest in providing for The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation through annuities, charitable trusts, or through provisions in your Will please feel free to contact your Executive Director and I will be more than happy to assist in any way possible to complete those desires. Resolution No. 1

Those provisions of the Masonic code requiring collection of \$5 from each newly raised Master Mason be deleted when amendment 11 funds commence.

Resolution No. 2

Let it be resolved that Section 1-314 — Committee on Nebraska Work be changed from consisting of three Past Grand Masters to shall consist of one certified Past Grand Master and two from the following — Past Grand Custodians, Deputy Grand Custodians, or Deputy Custodian Emeritus.

Resolution No. 3

WHEREAS, every Master Mason has, of his own free will and accord, entered into a sacred bond with each, every and all other Master Masons in good standing wherein he in part promised not to "cheat, wrong or defraud" a Brother Master Mason;


WHEREAS, any act or action by a Master Mason designed, intended or calculated to interfere with or cause others to interfere with, preclude or cause others to preclude a Mason in good standing from seeking membership in any organization mentioned in Section 3-102 (g), Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska would clearly constitute a violation of the aforesaid promise;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Section 3-102 be amended to the extent that the following language be incorporated therein:

"Any willful and intentional act or action taken by a Master Mason to interfere with or preclude, directly or indirectly, another Mason from seeking to become a member or continuing to be a member of any associated or appendant body specifically mentioned in Section 3-102 (g) herein, without first having filed a charge or charges against the brother pursuant to Section 3-301 herein, shall, be such act or action, be deemed to have cheated, wronged and defrauded the Brother."

V:W: Grand Chaplain Benjiman H. Harvey led the delegation in prayer.

Following the prayer, M: W: Grand Master James L. Eatmon then closed the 136th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in ample form.



The Roll of Deputy Grand Custodians and Date of Appointment

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869.

In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
