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



Ancient Craft Masonry — Initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason on March 13, 1973; passed to the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason on August 14, 1973; and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on January 8, 1974, all in Frank Welch Lodge No. 75, Sidney, Nebraska. Served as Master of Frank Welch Lodge No. 75, Sidney, Nebraska, in 1984.

Grand Lodge — Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in February 1989 by M::W:. Thomas W. Tye. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in February, 1990 by M::W:. John M. McHenry. Elected and installed as Grand Junior Warden under M::W:. James N. DeMoss in February, 1991. Elected and installed as Grand Senior Warden under M::W:. James L. Eatmon in February, 1992. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-Elect in February, 1993 under M::W:. Donald L. Pohlman. Installed as the 128th Grand Master of Masons on February 13, 1994.

Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of South Carolina — Previously served on Committee on Masonic Relief, Public Relations, and Grand Lodge Office Committee. Served as Chairman of the Committee on Codification of the Law from 1990 - 1993.


Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite — Received the 4th through 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Alliance, Orient of Nebraska in 1989.

Ancient Craft Masonry — Initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason on January 9, 1958; passed to the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason on February 13, 1958; and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on March 20, 1958, all in East Lincoln Lodge No. 210, Lincoln, Nebraska. Served as Master of East Lincoln Lodge No. 210, Lincoln, Nebraska, in 1967; served the lodge as Chaplain several years. He has also served on the lodge's Board of Trustees for two terms.

Grand Lodge — Appointed Deputy Grand Custodian in 1984, and served as Grand Custodian from 1985 - 1990. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in February 1990 by M: W: John M. McHenry. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in February 1991 by M: W: James N. DeMoss. Elected and installed as Grand Junior Warden under M: W: James L. Eatmon in February, 1992. Elected and installed as Grand Senior Warden under M: W: Donald L. Pohlman in February 1993. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-Elect in February 1994 under M: W: Steven F. Mattoon. Installed as the 129th Grand Master of Masons on February 5, 1995.

Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Missouri – Previously served on Committee on Grand Lodge Offices, Finance and Nebraska Work.

York Rite — Made a Royal Arch Mason in Capstone Chapter, at Lincoln, Nebraska on February 16, 1985. Made a Royal and Select Master in Lincoln Council No. 4, at Lincoln, Nebraska on October 14, 1992. Dubbed a Knight Templar in Mt. Moriah Commandery No. 4, at Lincoln, Nebraska on November 17, 1992. Became a member of the Coeur De Lion Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine in 1994.

Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite — Received the 4th through the 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Lincoln, Orient of Nebraska in 1960. Elected a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in December 1987.

Shrine — Member since 1963 of Sesostris Temple of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in Lincoln, Nebraska. Active in the Hillbilly Club, the Ritualistic Divan and was involved in starting the Proficient Past Masters Shrine Club.

Order of Eastern Star — Member of Lincoln Chapter No. 148 in Lincoln, Nebraska since 1960. Served as Worthy Patron in 1980 and 1986. DeMolay - Senior DeMolay in Lincoln Chapter Order of DeMolay.

Rainbow — Awarded the Grand Cross of Color by the International Order of Rainbow for Girls in 1994.

Other Masonic Bodies — Appointed Trustee of the Nebraska Masonic Home in 1990. Member of the Board of Directors, Nebraska Masonic Foundation and the Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation. Member of National Sojourners.



GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon made the following remarks as he presented the 1994 Grand Master's Humanitarian Award recipient:

"We have some stringent criteria that we have established for recognition of these individuals. First of all, we will not award this to more than two individuals in any calendar year. The individual that is entitled to receive this award, and there are many. ... must be a Master Mason and have been such for at least 30 years. He must have been active in at least three of the five following community activities: he could have held a political office such as mayor, city council member, county board member, NRD member, school board member, some other political office, whatever might be available where he resides; he could have been active in his church, either as an elder, a vestryman, deacon, lay leader, lay reader, whatever his particular denomination permits; he could have been denoted as a civic leader because of his involvement on boards of directors for local hospitals, nursing homes, financial institutions, or foundations; he could have been a volunteer for such charitable organizations as the Y, United Way, Scouting, or similar organizations. He could have been involved in such service organizations as Lions, Sertoma, Kiwanis, Rotary, Optimists, and so forth. But lastly, he must have been active in the Masonic fraternity. In other words, these are the Masons that make the difference within their community. These awards are presented to them in their local community, and the entire community is invited to be present, particularly those organizations with which they have been involved. This year it was our pleasure to present this award to Brother Elsworth L. Abbott of Falls City Lodge No. 9.

Brother Elsworth Abbott expressed his appreciation for the honor bestowed upon him.

ROCK MAUL AWARD

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon described the Rock Maul Award as one that is presented to one lodge each year by the Grand Master. The lodge selected should represent the best all around lodge in the jurisdiction of Nebraska. The Rock Maul is a sixteen pound rock maul that has been used in a rock quarry for its intended purpose. It was inscribed and presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in the year of M: W: Byron C. Jenkins and has been awarded once a year since then to that lodge determined to have been the recipient by the selection process. The recipient of the Award is unknown until this announcement at Grand Lodge each year. The Grand Master presented the Rock Maul Award to North Bend Lodge No. 119.

GOLD PAN AWARD

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon displayed the Gold Pan Award, which is, in fact, a pan that was used to pan for gold. It was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by the Grand Lodge of Alaska. It is a beautiful trophy presented each year to that lodge which has shown, in the determination of the selection committee, the greatest overall improvement, or the most significant contribution to Masonry in Nebraska. The Grand Master presented the Gold Pan Award to Wood Lake Lodge No. 221.

GRAND ORATION

Philip A. Lorenzen, 10 & 327

Most Worshipful Grand Master Mattoon, Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters and visiting Grand Masters, other visiting Masonic dignitaries, Ladies, friends, Brethren:

Each year as we convene the annual Grand Lodge Communication two major political events typically have taken place. First, we have heard the State of the Union Address by the President of the United States. Second, we have heard the State of the State Address by Nebraska's Governor. It always seems to me that the timing of Grand Lodge early in each new calendar year appropriately coincides with those two acknowledgments of the affairs of government. As Most Worshipful Steve and his wife Cathy greeted us here this morning and as Most Worshipful Steve conducts this Grand Lodge Communication, we celebrate another successful Masonic year — and we launch upon the next year's work. In a sense, we sort of gather for our own State of the Fraternity observations.

Typically, at our Saturday morning business session, accolades are given to the Grand Master for the work and efforts he has expended during his term. While that is appropriate, a Saturday morning thank you fails to recognize the sacrifice that a wife and family make to help ensure the Grand Master's ability to energetically serve this Masonic Fraternity for his term. Take a minute with me to stand up and applaud Steve and thank Cathy and their daughters for the work and travel they have completed this past year on our behalf.

Like the State of the Union and the State of the State Address, our Masonic Fraternity has some good news to report and some areas of concern and uncertainty. Not unlike our State and our Nation, we take the occasion of this time of the year to reflect on our achievements and then to labor to set the course for the next year. We have cause for celebration but we also recognize there

remains much work to do. Perhaps in the areas of membership, community involvement, activating not so active members, more effort in youth work.

A moment ago when I asked Most Worshipful Steve's family to stand, you all could not help but note how proud Steve and Cathy are of their daughters, Kendra and Stephanie. Both of them are active teen-agers involved in a host of school activities and are both active Job's Daughters. It is appropriate and obvious that Most Worshipful Steve continues to emphasize the support of the activities of young people and their youth organizations. Our Masonic Fraternity has taken a strong interest in young persons in the past and be assured that Jerry Rittenburg and the other current line officers will continue to endeavor to be supportive of our young persons, their organizations and the dedicated adult leadership that is so absolutely essential to keep those groups strong. The appearance and the comments of the leadership of the Job's, the DeMolay and the Rainbow here today delighted us. The appearance of their adult leaders and advisors serves as witness to the dynamic future those groups will continue to enjoy. Let each of us pledge our attendance at their events to demonstrate the sincerity of our support.

Speaking of young persons, this time of year precedes an important event for the Nobles of our appendant body, the Shrine. In the next few months, the Shrine Circus will visit the Shrine Temples in Nebraska.

How many of you are going to the Shrine Circus this Year?

How many of you have attended the Shrine Circus in the past? Most all of you? — Good!

One of the great things about the circus is that each of us, no matter how many years old or how many years young, revert back to the days of our childhood when it comes to the thrill of the big top. The air fills with anticipation as we are greeted by our Shrine clowns. We find our seats, we view the entrance of the Potentate and his Divan. Act follows act, Clowns do their best to amuse the audience. Then the announcer following a drum roll says "...Ladies and Gentlemen, Girls and Boys, Children of all ages, in the center ring, high above us...". All eyes follow the beams of the spotlights to watch the tight rope walker. The hair on the back of our necks stands on end and we increase the speed at which we consume our popcorn and our cotton candy. But the excitement and thrill we feel must be pale compared to that of the performer. All eyes are on him. His one size too small outfit glitters in the spotlight as he moves out onto the wire. He holds the audience in his hand with his every step.

Unfortunately, we cannot all be the high wire artist. But it would be my observation that too many in this world and too many in our Masonic Fraternity become too content to simply be the spectator, to sit back and consume our cotton candy — maybe getting a sugar high, but not coming even close to the thrill experienced by the person on the high wire. Understand that we need both the performer and the audience to complete the picture and make the circus show. Both roles are important and both have their place. As we have gathered here today, all of us are at the same time, part of the act and part of the audience.

Each of you here has a particular role to complete. Everyone of us is part of the event. So it must be when we return home to our subordinate Lodges to carry out the programs and activities of the local lodge. As officers of the subordinate lodges or in such other Masonic leadership roles as you hold, each of us must strive to be a part of the performance. Each must also strive to get the rest of the organization off the sidelines, out of the cheap seats, into the spotlight and become a part of the show.

Just be cautious of this one risk — the goal of all of our activities must be not to bring too much attention to the individual, but rather to bring attention to the Masonic Fraternity as we work to be a contributor to the quality of life in each of our communities and as we labor to get attitudes and standards of conduct more and more on track with the visions of our forbearers. Masons have much to be proud of and it is important that in your local lodges through your meetings, through your ritualistic work, through your education committee activities and through your community involvement that you enable each of your brethren to gain a renewed sense of that pride.

As you leave this Grand Lodge Communication on Saturday, please take with you two commitments: First, that you will go back to your home Lodge with a desire and a resolution to get into the ring. That you will become more like the daring performer on the high wire — not be just a spectator content on watching from the shadows. Second, that you will continually encourage your fellow Masonic Lodge members to step out of the bleachers and become a part of the show. We must continue to grow and build the Masonic Fraternity and strive to make its ideals and its influence felt in each of our communities. The eyes of youth are on us, the eyes of our critics are on us. Together lets challenge ourselves to be world class performers.

I would like to close with a poem that I have used on other occasions. It is a poem written by my friend and Brother, Birman Warrick, past master of my Lodge, Solomon No. 10. It goes like this:

Isn't it interesting that Princes and Kings and clowns that caper in circus rings; And ordinary people like you and me all are builders for eternity. Each is given a bag of tools, a shapeless mass and a book of rules; and what do we make 'ere life is flown? Either a stumbling block or a stepping stone.

First Day — Opening Session Friday, February 3, 1995

M: W: Grand Master Steven F. Mattoon requested that Michael E. Jones, W: Grand Marshal proclaim the 138th Annual Communication opened in ample form.

M: W: Steven F. Mattoon announced the appointment of M: W: James N. DeMoss as Parliamentarian with M: W: Thomas W. Tye as alternate for this 138th Annual Communication.

The report of the Committee on Business and Rules was made by the R: W:Grand Secretary Virgil L. Tubach, who then moved for its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

Virgil L. Tubach, 54

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge

A:F: & A:M: of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge. The Committee further recommends:

1. The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.

2. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.

3. Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.

4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other members of Nebraska Lodges may speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.

5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.

6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits.

7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decision and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the Committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak after which a vote will be taken.

8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret ballot or other method at his discretion.

9. Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The report was adopted by vote of the delegates assembled.

NECROLOGY

James F. Brown, Jr., 54, Grand Chaplain

"There is no such thing as a natural death. Nothing that happens to a man is ever natural, since his presence calls the world into question. All men must die, but for every man his death is an accident. Even if he knows it and consents to it, he views it as an unjustifiable violation. Perhaps this statement seems to be a harsh indictment of our ultimate faith, but it is consistent with the teachings of Masonry. Our Fraternity is devoted to enhancing the life which each of us live. Each of the degrees of Masonry are devoted to principles which can assist us in living our lives as we progress from youth through middle age to old age. In general we are to pursue ends that give our existence meaning such as devotion to individuals, to groups, or to causes. We are to continually engage in social, political, intellectual and creative work. We must always remember that our life has value, so long as we attribute value to the life of others, by means of love, friendship, or compassion. So at this time we want to take a few minutes to remember and to celebrate the lives of our fellow brothers whether they are with us today or whether they walked with us in earlier days. One such man is Past Grand Master T. Leo Stines of Central City. T. Leo was always available for Masonic service; as a custodian, to give a memorial service for a brother Mason, or to install a lodge. Masons who know him paid tribute to him for his ultimate devotion to the craft. He was a Brother who learned, lived, and promoted Masonry. He will always be remembered for his service and Christian love. But there are others who walked this great state, enjoyed and enhanced its great beauties, and served Masonry in their communities. The song "The Lamb of God" which will be sung by Worshipful Brother Bob Rhodes of Utica Lodge No. 96, and the accompanying slide presentation is in honor of their lives."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL DEAD

James F. Brown, Jr., 54, Grand Chaplain

Again we are called on to acknowledge the loss of a loved one, overtaken by that fate which shall eventually overcome us also. No power or station, no virtue or bravery, no wealth or honor, no tears of kindred or friends can avert that destiny.

Six hundred and seventy-two times this phrase could have been repeated for our masonic brothers during the past year. We mourn their loss but celebrate their lives. On February 26, 1994 Masonry in Nebraska lost a great leader---Past Grand Master T. Leo Stines. He was Worshipful Master of Lone Tree Lodge No. 36 in 1958, and appointed Deputy Grand Custodian in 1960. In 1967 Grand Master John Bottorf appointed Leo Grand Marshal, and in 1971 Grand Master Russell L. Fickes appointed T. Leo Grand Junior Deacon. Leo served as Grand Master in 1976. He also served as Grand Custodian in 1984-85, and was Nebraska's Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Missouri, his native state. Leo was also a Scottish Rite Mason with a K.C.C.H. designation, a member of Tehama Temple of the Shrine and a former member of the York Rite. He was also a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Again, we mourn his loss but celebrate his life.

We should always remember that Masons believe in immortality.

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters and Brethren.

It is my privilege to bring to you the report of your Credentials Committee for this 138th Grand Lodge Communication, held February 2, 3 and 4, 1995 in Kearney, Nebraska.

This committee is charged with the duty of being sure that all Masters and Wardens have properly completed credential forms before being registered and furnished voting materials.

At the time of this report, committee records indicate that we have registered 99 Worshipful Masters representing that office in person and 32 representing that office by proxy; 48 Senior Wardens representing their office in person and 40 by proxy; 48 Junior Wardens representing the office in person and 43 by proxy, and 79 non delegate Masons.

Also present are all Grand Lodge Officers, 17 Past Grand Masters, 44 other dignitaries, 22 Deputy Grand Custodians and over 150 Ladies. Nebraska dignitaries present in addition to the Grand Lodge Officers and Past Grand Masters as mentioned above include representation from York Rite bodies,

Scottish Rite bodies, Grand Council or Cryptic Masons of Nebraska, Imperial Shrine, Tangier Temple, Sesostris Temple, Tehama Temple, National Sojourners, Eastern Star, Rainbow Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay.

Other jurisdictions present include delegations from Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Prince Hall of Nebraska, South Dakota, Wyoming, Indiana, Minnesota, Missouri, Vermont and Mystic Order of Veiled Prophets, Grotto of North America.

At this time records indicate no 1995 voting delegates from the following 35 lodges: No's 4, 17, 21, 38, 41, 43, 44, 48, 64, 87, 89, 104, 111, 124, 126, 137, 159, 165, 173, 177, 180, 184, 233, 234, 236, 241, 248, 261, 277, 285, 291, 293, 305, 308 and 323. Of the above lodges six have been absent for two consecutive years which are 48, 111, 173, 177, 184 and 291. One lodge, 233 has been absent for three successive years.

For your information, attendance at some of the sessions were as follows: Ladies at the Table Thursday evening was attended by 175 Masons and their Ladies. The Public Opening Friday morning had over 600 in attendance and the membership banquet last evening had 399 present.

It has been an honor to serve Most Worshipful Grand Master Steven Mattoon as chairman of his Credentials Committee and I personally would like to thank the other committee members who have tried to make this a better Grand Lodge Communication. These gentlemen are Ralph Gerry from Omaha, Delmar Jones from Kearney, Wesley Suggs of Papillion, Doyle Berg of Omaha, Frank Daugherty from Lincoln and lastly Roger Anderson from Kearney, who graciously consented to fill in when we had a late cancellation. Also a huge THANK YOU for the girls in the office, Chris, Carol and Lorie, for without their dedicated help, the Credentials Committee would not function.

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ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

"My brethren, all of the delegates were furnished 45 days before the opening of Grand Lodge, back in late December, a copy of the Grand Master's Recommendations, and as you registered you were given the final printed copy of my address. I would like to highlight just a few things, and go from there. Hearing no objection to that, we will proceed in that regard."

The printed address of the Grand Master is as follows:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND LODGE, ANCIENT FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA

My Brethren:

In accordance with Article X, Section 2(b) of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Nebraska, I herewith submit my written address to this 138th Annual Communication. This address will include official acts, general conditions of Masonry and recommendations for such legislation as I deem necessary or expedient to the welfare of our Fraternity.

I first wish to express to each and every Mason in the jurisdiction of Nebraska my heartfelt gratitude and appreciation for the opportunity to serve as your Grand Master for the past year. This has been the greatest experience of my life and one which I will always treasure.

As in past years great strides have been made in Freemasonry in Nebraska this past year. The credit for these improvements is due to the Masons in the Lodges in every corner of this State who have continually labored for the good of Freemasonry. All accomplishments this past year within Grand Lodge are due to the hard work and efforts of my Grand Lodge Officers with whom I have had the honor and privilege to serve.

To each of the visiting dignitaries from other jurisdictions and from within the State of Nebraska, we offer a sincere welcome. We hope that your attendance and participation will be enjoyable and meaningful.

To the delegates and other members in attendance at the 138th Annual Communication, we extend a welcome as you gather to consider serious matters concerning Grand Lodge. As in the past several years, we have again structured this Communication with your primary concerns in mind. We hope that the Friday afternoon workshops will be of great interest and benefit to you as leaders within your Lodges and for the good of Masonry in general.

NECROLOGY

As of the writing of this Address, the faithful Secretaries of our Subordinate Lodges have reported to the Grand Lodge Office that 577 members entered into that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. Notably, on February 26th, we mourned the loss of Past Grand Master T. Leo Stines (1976).

The committee on Fraternal Dead, under the able leadership of our V :: W :: Grand Chaplain James F. Brown, Jr., will be presenting a suitable tribute to our departed brethren as an integral part of this Annual Communication.

CORNERSTONES

The Grand Lodge and its officers have been privileged to hold several Cornerstone Ceremonies throughout the State this past year. At each ceremony the attendance was outstanding as was the aid and assistance from our local Lodges. Your Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Officers appreciate the opportunity to bring your Grand Lodge to public ceremonies of this nature in order that we may openly and publicly demonstrate our ideals and our beliefs. This year, your Grand Lodge had the opportunity of laying five Cornerstones. Each instance was of an unusual nature and a credit to the fraternity.

On April 16, 1994, we were privileged to lay a Cornerstone in Kimball, Nebraska, for a building housing the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Soil Conservation Service. It was an honor that the first Cornerstone laid during 1994 was a government building in a neighboring community to the Grand Master.

On June 12, 1994, a Cornerstone was laid in North Bend for the Senior Citizen's Center. Members of North Bend Lodge No. 119 were not only actively involved in the planning and fund raising for this Senior Citizen's Center, but also did the landscaping and laid the sod for this community project.

On August 6, 1994, a Cornerstone was laid for the addition to the Temple Building of Wood Lake Lodge No. 221. Although the community of Wood Lake is small in number, the Lodge turned out in large numbers and coordinated the Cornerstone with a Centennial Celebration, tribute to widows, and sponsorship of a community celebration.

We were privileged to lay a Cornerstone in Geneva, Nebraska, for a new addition to the public library, on October 15, 1994. Geneva Lodge No. 79 organized this Cornerstone Laying. This Lodge has promoted and organized the laying of several Cornerstones in their community the past several years.

Lastly, on November 20, 1994, the Grand Lodge was privileged to lay a Cornerstone for the Western Nebraska Community College Sidney Center in Sidney, Nebraska. This meant a great deal to me as Grand Master, to be allowed to lay a Cornerstone for an educational building in the community in which I was born and raised. I greatly appreciate the support of my local Lodge, Frank Welch Lodge No. 75.

Findings of the Commission were that the individual was guilty as charged. It was the judgment of the Commission that the individual be expelled from Masonry.

On November 17, 1993, pursuant to the authority delineated in Section 1-301 of the Bylaws, M: W: Donald L. Pohlman appointed a Trial Commission to conduct a Masonic Trial in a matter involving Springfield Lodge No. 112 and a member of that lodge. Trial was held on February 24, 1994 in this matter. Findings of the Commission were that the individual was guilty as charged. It was the judgment of the Commission that the individual be suspended, but such sentence of suspension shall itself be suspended for so long as this individual shall comply with all of the terms and conditions of his Probation Order. If the individual shall fulfill the terms and provisions of such Probation Order, in all respects, then upon the successful completion of the five-year period of probation, the sentence of the Trial Commission shall expire and be of no further force and effect. In the event this individual should fail to fulfill the terms and conditions of the Suspension of the sentence of the Trial Commission shall cease with the result that the individual shall thereupon be suspended indefinitely from Springfield Lodge No. 112.

CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS

The Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held in Arlington, Virginia on February 20, 21 and 22, 1994. We not only had an opportunity to visit the George Washington Memorial, but to hold part of our meetings in this magnificent structure. Attending the Grand Master's Conference with me were Jerry L. Rittenburg, Deputy Grand Master, Virgil L. Tubach, Grand Secretary, V. Kaye Ramsey, Grand Senior Warden, Warren D. Lichty, Jr., Past Grand Master and Charles A. Folsom, Past National President, National Sojourners.

The Conference was presided over this year by M :: W :: Werner H. Morlock, Grand Master of Virginia. Grand Master Morlock was extremely ill at the time of the Grand Master's Conference and subsequently passed away. M :: W ::Thomas T. Irvin, Grand Master of Georgia, served as Conference Vice-Chairman and M :: W :: Robert F. Hannon, Grand Master of Arizona served as Committee Chairman. During the Conference, various groups such as the National Masonic Foundation on Drug and Alcohol Abuse, the Masonic Service Association and the George Washington Masonic National Memorial conducted their Annual Meetings. The Commission on Recognition, a standing committee of the Conference, also made its annual presentation.

The Masonic Renewal Committee was formed by the Conference of Grand Masters in 1991 as a standing committee. The Masonic Renewal Committee presented a report on the programs and materials available, and membership seminars held. A Strategic Planning Guide for all Grand Masters was also provided. The Grand Master's Conference is attempting to give more emphasis to the exchange of ideas and programs between Grand Lodges. Breakout sessions were held on Masonic Renewal, Lodge Leadership and Development, Freemasonry and Religion and Relevancy of Ritual. In addition, an open forum was held on Public Relations, Fraternal Relations and Miscellaneous Topics. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska continues to have an active part in the Conference of Grand Masters. Deputy Grand Master Jerry L. Rittenburg was appointed to the Time And Place Committee. We congratulate Brother Jerry for this honor.

MID-WEST CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS

In the last several years a Mid-West Conference of Grand Masters has been formed involving jurisdictions in the Mid-West area. A three day meeting was held this year in Peoria, Illinois, on August 12, 13 and 14. Attending the conference this year with me was Deputy Grand Master Jerry L. Rittenburg. This conference affords an outstanding opportunity for exchange of ideas, between neighboring Grand Lodges, as to problems being encountered, possible solutions and innovative programs. The site for the Mid-West Conference of Grand Masters changes each year and is tentatively scheduled to be hosted by Nebraska in 1999.

THE CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

1. Directorate Leadership

Several years ago, representatives of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska attended the Grand Lodge of Michigan for the purpose of reviewing and studying a report received by the Grand Lodge which was to define the major problem with Masonry. The professional study ended with the simple comment that the major problem is "lack of continuity of leadership". Several years ago during the time that Thomas W. Tye served as Grand Master, the Grand Lodge Officers adopted "Directorate Leadership". This form of leadership requires that the Grand Master voluntarily relinquish to his Line Officers the powers and authorities normally granted by the Constitution and Bylaws to the Grand Master. The current Line Officers continue to be committed to the "Directorate Leadership". We practice in this State an ongoing policy of not making decisions nor making appointments to Line, committees, boards, as well as major policy decisions, without first presenting those matters to the Line Officers for approval. All

individuals, projects and actions require the full support of the Line Officers. By and through this method, there continues to be greater continuity in programs and planning over several years, thereby accomplishing goals set out for the good of Masonry and the entire Craft, irrespective of the individual or individuals under whose term the project may be instituted or subsequently completed.

As a result of "Directorate Leadership" and in order to advance the planning for Grand Lodge activities, the Grand Lodge Officers the last six years have held a retreat at a location outside the boundaries of the State of Nebraska, involving all officers and their spouses. We continue to hear complaints from some individuals that the Grand Lodge Officers are taking a vacation outside of the State at Grand Lodge expense. Please be assured that all expenses of the individual Grand Lodge Officers and their families are their personal expense and that there is no reimbursement from any Grand Lodge funds. I thank Deputy Grand Master Jerry L. Rittenburg for organizing the Retreat held in the summer of 1994.

2. Youth Organizations and Youth Committee

I have always had a strong interest in the Masonic youth organizations. I am a Senior DeMolay and have the privilege of receiving the Chevalier Degree. Although I have not had the opportunity to be directly involved in Rainbow for Girls, the initiation ritual which I was privileged to observe at Grand Assembly was one of the most moving and beautiful ritual ceremonies which I have ever had the opportunity to witness. Currently my daughters Kendra and Stephanie are serving respectively as Honored Queen and Chaplain of Job's Daughters Bethel No. 25 in Sidney.

During the past year I had the opportunity to address the Grand Assembly of Rainbow and the Grand Bethel of Job's Daughters. As a Senior DeMolay, it was a particular honor to be present and witness the Initiatory Degree and DeMolay Degree for the Grand Master's Class of DeMolay in Hastings, Nebraska, on October 29, 1994. The current State Master Councilor of DeMolay is Brother Jason Sibley. I had the unique opportunity to be involved in the conferral of the Master Mason Degree upon Brother Jason Sibley at Lancaster Lodge No. 54 on December 10, 1994. Almost all Brothers participating in the Degree were either active DeMolays, Senior DeMolays, DeMolay Advisors or DeMolay Honor Recipients.

You may be assured that we have outstanding leadership, both youth and adult, in each of our Masonic youth organizations. The Youth Committee under the guidance of Ivan Vrtiska is in the process of developing programs and making plans to advance the Masonic youth organizations within the State of Nebraska. Hopefully during the summer of 1995, a statewide Masonic youth group event will be held, sponsored by the Youth Committee.

I truly believe that the Masonic youth organizations are the foundation of our future. I encourage all Lodges and the members therein to support and become actively involved in the Masonic youth organizations within their community and area.

3. Imperial Shrine

During the last several years, there have been various Resolutions presented at Imperial Shrine promoting the disassociation of the Shrine from Freemasonry. In 1993 a Resolution was again presented to Imperial Shrine to be voted upon in July of 1994. This Resolution once again deleted the requirements of Masonic affiliation in order to belong to the Shrine. The Resolution was actively supported by the then Imperial Potentate. After much debate during the year and discussion at Imperial Shrine, the Resolution was overwhelmingly defeated by a margin of 75%.

Although the various Brethren may have either been for or against said Resolution, the research which prompted the Resolution and the response thereto contain certain lessons. As with many Masonic organizations, the membership of Shrine is decreasing. This decline in membership may have a very serious effect upon the ability of the Shrine to sponsor the Shrine Hospitals and Burn Clinics. We must all be aware of the negative consequences of decline in membership in all of the Masonic organizations, including the various charities supported by Masonry. The lesson which came across loud and clear from various Masonic leaders is that we must all work together and support each other in order to stop the decline in membership and solve mutual problems of membership which exist amongst all of the Masonic organizations.

4. Religion and Freemasonry

In the fall of 1992, I was directed by then Grand Master James L. "Sonny" Eatmon, to attend a conference and symposium on Religion and Freemasonry held in Guthrie, Oklahoma. This conference was called in order to address potential action to be taken at the Southern Baptist Convention in the summer of 1993, which proposed action basically condemned Freemasonry. Through the actions of various Grand Lodges, the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry Southern Jurisdiction U.S.A., the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry Northern Jurisdiction U.S.A. and the Masonic Service Association, a great deal of information was prepared and distributed and as a result thereof, the Resolution proposed at the Southern Baptist Convention was defeated.

However, there continue to be critics and attacks on Freemasonry by religious leaders. In response to these criticisms and potential action which must be taken, during 1994 a Committee on Freemasonry and Religion was established by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska under the chairmanship of Brother Roy Kiser. This Committee is available and can be of assistance to any Brother or Lodge who is encountering questions concerning Freemasonry and Religion.

Dr. Gary Leazer was Director of the Interfaith Witness Department of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board prior to the Southern Baptist Convention held in the summer of 1993. Dr. Leazer conducted an investigation into Freemasonry, held conferences with leadership of Freemasonry and incorporated his findings in a report. He concluded that Freemasonry was not a religion and that membership in Freemasonry should be left to the decision of each member of the church. His report was highly controversial within the Southern

Baptist Conference. Dr. Leazer will be our featured speaker during the Friday afternoon session. I encourage all of you to attend this presentation.

5. Area Meetings

The Line Officers recognize that often times there is a feeling of distance between the local Lodges and the officers of Grand Lodge. In an attempt to develop better communication and in order to prepare for the 1995 Grand Lodge Session, Area Meetings were held in 13 sites throughout the State of Nebraska during the fall of 1994. These Area Meetings were conducted by the various officers of Grand Lodge. Discussions were held on upcoming Resolutions and Recommendations to be voted upon at Grand Lodge, the voting procedures at Grand Lodge and development of leadership materials within the local Lodges. I would like to thank the Lodges who hosted the 13 Area Meetings for their support.

6. The Nebraska Masonic Foundation

Although the Nebraska Masonic Foundation is not a creature of the Grand Lodge, its progress and well being is directly related. In December of 1991, the Internal Revenue Service granted to the organization the Final Determination Letter of the Foundation's exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Board of Directors of the Foundation, under the direction of Past Grand Master Robert A. Metcalf, is pursuing a fund raising effort and proceeding with plans for the start of construction of a library/museum. The Nebraska Masonic Foundation deserves your support as the leaders strive to make the Foundation responsive to the various needs of Freemasonry in Nebraska in an attempt to educate the general public as to what Freemasonry stands for.

7. Committee on Work

The Committee on Work has been extremely active during the past several years. Their hard work and efforts have culminated in publication of a revised Cipher and a Continuous Floorwork Manual. I would like to especially thank Past Grand Master Charles W. Amidon, Past Grand Master James L. "Sonny" Eatmon, Deputy Grand Master Jerry L. Rittenburg, Grand Custodian Gus Scolaro and Worshipful Brother Gene Sibley for their hard work on this Committee the past two years.

8. Humanitarian Award

Again this year it was my distinct pleasure to continue this outstanding program. A great many Brethren throughout the State are entitled to recognition, which makes the selection very difficult. On December 8, 1994, it was our pleasure to present the Grand Master's Humanitarian Award to W. Elsworth L. Abbott of Falls City Lodge No. 9 in Falls City, Nebraska. Brother Abbott has been deeply involved in his community in many ways and has continued for better than 48 years to be active in the Masonic Fraternity. Brother Abbott will be introduced and presented at the Informal Opening of Grand Lodge.

9. Grand Lodge Office

During the spring of 1994, we received notice that the building in which the Grand Lodge was located at 1630 K Street was being sold and that it would be necessary that we vacate the building. An extremely suitable replacement facility was located at 1530 South Street and the move was completed in August. We apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused to the Lodges and in particular the Secretaries thereof during this transition period. I encourage all of you to stop by the Grand Lodge Office at its new location whenever you are in Lincoln. I also would like to thank the Office Committee, our Office Manager, Chris Rudder and our Administrative Secretary, Carol Schroeder for the long hours of work and their assistance in locating the office building, coordinating the remodeling thereof and the actual move.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In accordance with the provision of Article X, Section 2(b) of the Constitution, I make the following Recommendations, which in my opinion and the opinion of the Grand Lodge Officers, are deemed necessary and expedient for the future welfare of the Fraternity in this jurisdiction.

Recommendation No. 1 — Surety Bond

I recommend that Section 2-311 -- Surety Bond, be amended to substitute the words Grand Lodge for the words Grand Secretary, and to delete the second sentence of the first paragraph to bring the bylaws into compliance with the surety bond, so that Section 2-311 will then read:

"Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge for bond protection to the lodge against misappropriation of lodge funds by its Secretary and its Treasurer. All payments hereunder by subordinate lodges shall be paid annually to the Grand Lodge which shall keep a record thereof. The Grand Lodge shall procure a surety bond from a company legally issuing such bond sufficient in amount to protect all of the subordinate lodges against misappropriation of its funds by its Secretary and by its Treasurer, and pay the amount thereof out of the money received for this purpose from such lodges. Said bond so furnished is to be conditioned for the full protection of the Grand Lodge and the several subordinate lodges."

Recommendation No. 2—Grand Secretary

I recommend Section 1-201 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be amended to reflect the narrowing of duties where the Grand Secretary is no longer spending full time at the Grand Lodge Office. "The Grand Secretary shall have charge of the seal of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend and record the transactions of the Grand Lodge when in Annual Communication; shall sign all orders, certificates, documents and diplomas requiring the seal of the Grand Lodge, to include the affixing of the seal thereon; shall complete and carry on such communications with the various subordinate lodges of this jurisdiction, all appendant and/or allied bodies operating therein, and with such other jurisdictions as may from time to time be necessary to insure that a harmonious relationship exists between such bodies and this Grand Lodge. The Grand Secretary shall be ex-officio a member of the Committee on Fraternal Relations and the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices. The Grand Lodge such statistical data concerning the status of the membership of this Grand Lodge as may, in his opinion, be appropriate, or as may be directed by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of such duties or other programs of the Grand Lodge to include the promotion of Masonry."

Recommendation No. 3 — Lodge Dues

I recommend that the first paragraph of Section 2-605 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be amended to read as follows:

"The dues assessed by all chartered subordinate lodges shall be payable on January 1st of the year for which they are assessed and shall become delinquent on the 1st day of June of the same year, if not paid by that date."

I further recommend that paragraph two be deleted and replaced with the following:

"On June 1, of each year, it shall be the duty of the secretary to notify in writing each member that is in arrears for dues of the current year of such fact and request payment thereof on or before September 30, of the same year. If such member fails to pay his dues on or before September 30, of such year he shall automatically stand suspended for non-payment of dues and an entry thereof shall be made in the minutes of the Lodge at the first subsequent stated meeting. It shall also be the duty of the secretary to notify, in writing, each member automatically suspended for non-payment of dues. Such notice shall be deemed properly given when mailed by first class mail to the last known post office address of such suspended individual."

CONCLUSION

It is hard to believe that one year has passed since I was installed as Grand Master. During this one year period of time, several beliefs which I held about Masonry were confirmed. Masonry is progressing in Nebraska.

Although we have and may continue to have slight declines in membership, it is my firm belief that we have indeed turned the corner and that not only will membership increase, but the strength of the leadership in the Lodges will continue to grow.

We have an outstanding and totally positive relationship with all of the Masonic bodies within the state of Nebraska

This Grand Lodge and the Brethren in this Grand Lodge are committed to the teachings and goals of Freemasonry.

I have several individuals who I would like to thank for their support and assistance the last several years:

4. To my wife, Cathy, my daughters, Kendra and Stephanie, my father, Frank J. Mattoon and my sister and brother-in-law Susan and Kent Talich for their love, support and sacrifice in order that I could serve in this capacity. My only regret is that my mother, Treva, passed away several months before I was installed as Grand Master.

5. Most of all, to you my Brethren, for your confidence in electing me to this honor and for your support during the past year.

With your continued support and with the outstanding leadership under Deputy Grand Master Jerry L. Rittenburg and the remaining officers of Grand Lodge, I have no doubt that Masonry will progress and grow during 1995 and future years.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

REPORT OF NEBRASKA COMMITTEE ON WORK

Immediately following the Grand Lodge Communication in February of 1994, the Committee began work on two important assignments: 1. Completion of the authorized <u>CONTINUOUS FORM FLOORWORK MANUAL</u> 2. Final proofing of a revised CIPHER

Several meetings and much correspondence was necessary from spring to late fall to accomplish these tasks.

The Committee is pleased to report that preparation of the <u>CONTINUOUS</u> <u>FORM FLOORWORK MANUAL</u> as authorized at the 1993 Grand Lodge Communication was completed during 1994 and a copy was mailed to each subordinate Lodge in late November of 1994. Additional copies will be made on a "cost of reproduction" fee basis.

Also, the long and tedious task of proofing the revised CIPHER was completed and this, too, is now available at a cost to be determined by the Grand Lodge Office Committee.

At last year's Communication, the Committee became aware of the effort and expense St. John the Baptist Lodge of Research No. 330 had expended in preparing musical tapes for proposed use in our Masonic ritual. As work on the Monitor had been completed and published, it was apparent that inclusion of additional music would present a significant financial expenditure by the Grand Lodge to reprint entirely new revised Monitors. To the credit of St. John the Baptist Lodge of Research, its position on use of its suggested degree music was modified as explained in a letter received from the Lodge by the Committee dated June 7, 1994. A disclaimer was added to the music packaging which

advised users that the music was "not a part of the official work of the Grand Lodge."

With this disclaimer, the Grand Master was advised in writing that the Committee on Nebraska Work took the position that no change in the Monitor was now necessary.

The Committee was represented at the Annual Deputy Grand Custodian School of Instruction held in Grand Island, Nebraska on September 23 and 24, 1994. Degree competition in the Entered Apprentice Degree was held in Kearney, Nebraska on Saturday, October 29, 1994 and the results of the judging were forwarded to the Grand Master shortly thereafter. Time and place of the announcement of the winner will be at the discretion of the Grand Master.

The Committee wishes to express its gratitude to several individuals who gave of their time and talents to bring the <u>CONTINUOUS FORM FLOORWORK</u> <u>MANUAL</u> and revised Cipher to fruition as follows: M : W : James L. "Sonny" Eatmon, Past Grand Master; M : W : John M. McHenry, Past Grand Master; W : Augustine S. Scolaro, Grand Custodian; W : Arthur S. Dye, Deputy Grand Custodian and, of course, our Grand Lodge Office Manager, Chris Rudder and her able assistant, Carol.

Most Worshipful Charles W. Amidon moved for the adoption of the report of the Committee on Nebraska Work. The motion was seconded and carried favorably.

VOTE ON TABLED RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 1 — Move to add to Section 1-104 the following:

"The counting of these described votes shall be by written ballot only."

The Jurisprudence Committee determined that the resolution was signed by the appropriate number of delegates to Grand Lodge. The proposed resolution is however confusing in stating "counting by written ballot" when it is believed that the signers intended to use the word balloting rather than counting. It is not permissible to change the wording without unanimous consent of Grand Lodge and the Committee, for the benefit of the Committee on Codification of the Law presumes that the intent of the proposed resolution was that all balloting would be by written ballot which would of course require a written ballot on every action taken by Grand Lodge. The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the

resolution is in proper form and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 1 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. W: B: Dean Taylor of Wahoo Lodge No. 59 spoke as one of the signers, and moved for adoption of Resolution No. 1.

The Grand Master called for discussion on the resolution. Past Grand Master $M \therefore W \therefore$ Sonny Eatmon and $R \therefore W \therefore V$. Kaye Ramsey, Grand Senior Warden spoke in opposition of the resolution.

A show of hands was called for and the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 2 — PURPOSE: To recognize the Grotto of the Mystic Order of the Veiled Prophets of the Enchanted Realm of North America and the International Order of High Twelve within the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge, A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska.

Part Three Discipline: Chapter 1 Masonic Offenses: Section 3-102 (g) now reads:

"Making application to, or joining any lodge, society of institution that shall provide as a condition, precedent that one shall be a Master Mason in good standing, or shall have taken the degrees of Entered Apprentice Mason, Fellow Craft Mason, and Master Mason, provided that this inhibition shall not apply to York or Scottish Rite bodies, the Order of the Eastern Star, the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Red Cross of Constantine, National Federated Craft, Allied Masonic Degrees, the National Sojourners, the Past Grand Masters Association, the Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, the York Rite Sovereign College of North America, or to organizations which do not require the taking of any obligation and which do not have any secret ritual or ceremony."

Change Section 3-102 (g), adding "the Grotto of North America and the International Order of High Twelve" so that it now reads:

"Making application to, or joining any lodge, society, or institution that shall provide as a condition precedent that one shall be a Master Mason in good standing, or shall have taken the degrees of Entered Apprentice Mason, Fellow Craft Mason, and Mater Mason, provided that this inhibition shall not apply to York or Scottish Rite bodies, the Order of the Eastern Star, the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Red Cross of Constantine, National Federated Craft, Allied Masonic Degrees, the National Sojourners, the Past Grand Masters Association, the Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, the York Rite Sovereign College of North America, the Grotto of North America, the International Order of High Twelve or to organizations which do not require the taking of any obligation and which do not have any secret ritual or ceremony."

The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the proposed resolution has the required number of signatures and that it is in proper form and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication. In accordance with the request of the Grand master on August 3, 1994, as to whether this Resolution may be separated and a separate ballot taken with reference to the Grotto of North America and a separate ballot with reference to the International Order of High Twelve, the Committee on Jurisprudence advised the Grand Master that it was their opinion that the resolution must be submitted for ballot as written and that a separation of this proposed resolution could not be had without the unanimous consent of Grand Lodge.

Any requests for unanimous consent of Grand Lodge to separate must occur prior to any vote on resolution number two as originally submitted.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 2 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. When none of the signers came forward Grand Master Mattoon opened the floor for discussion.

W: B: Don Monnette of Stella Lodge No. 105 moved for unanimous consent to consider the two organizations separately. The motion was seconded but did not receive unanimous consent.

 $W \therefore B \therefore$ John Holzhey of Nebraska Lodge No. 1 spoke in favor of the resolution and moved for adoption.

The Grand Master called for discussion on Resolution No. 2. W: B: John D. VerMaas of Hickman Lodge No. 256, Past Grand Master M: W: Warren D. Lichty and W: B: Charles A. Folsom spoke in opposition to the resolution. W: B: A. L. "Pepper" Aasgaard and W: B: Robert Van Valkenburg spoke in favor of the resolution.

There being no further discussion, a written ballot was called for. Resolution No. 2 had a total of 234 ballots cast — 115 for and 119 against — the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 3 — To amend Bylaws, Part One, Chapter III, Committees, Section 1-304, Jurisprudence, to add the following sentences:

"No less than 15 days before the opening of Grand Lodge the Committee shall serve on the Grand Master, by deposit in first class mail, or by deposit at the Grand Lodge Office, an agenda for its meeting prior to the opening of Grand Lodge. Said agenda shall set out with reasonable certainty any questions the committee expects to raise relative to the recommendations of the Grand Master or his decisions rendered during his term." The Jurisprudence Committee determined that the Resolution is signed by the requisite number of signers and is in proper form to be submitted for vote.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 3 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. W: B: Bruce Curtiss of Plainview Lodge No. 204 spoke as one of the signers, and moved for adoption of Resolution No. 3.

There being no further discussion, a written ballot was called for. Resolution No. 3 had a total of 236 ballots cast — 166 for and 70 against — the resolution passed.

Resolution No. 4 — WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska to restrict service in all elected and appointed positions within Grand Lodge to only those who are members in good standing in one or more subordinate lodges of Nebraska, and who maintain legal voting residence within the geographic boundaries of this grand jurisdiction,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, Article VI. Eligibility, of the Constitution and Chapter III. Committees, of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska be amended to include the following language.

"No person shall be eligible for election or appointment to serve, or shall be allowed to continue to serve in any, office or on any committee of the Grand Lodge who ceases to be a member in good standing of a subordinate lodge **and** who does not maintain his legal residence within the State of Nebraska."

The Jurisprudence Committee found that said Resolution contains the requisite number of signers but attempts, however, to amend both the Constitution and Bylaws in the same Amendment. It is the opinion of the Committee on Jurisprudence that this is not permissible as each requires a separate procedure. Amending the Constitution requires submission to subordinate Lodges for their approval or rejection in accordance with Article XIII of the Constitution. The proposed amendment attempts to change the provisions of Article II, Article V, and Article VI of the Constitution as well as Chapter III of the Bylaws of Grand Lodge. The Resolution itself states "Now therefor be it resolved, Article VI. Eligibility, of the Constitution and Chapter III Committees, of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A:.F.: & A:.M.: of Nebraska be amended to include the following language". Amendments to the Bylaws procedure as set forth in Section 1-502 of the Bylaws and the procedure for amending the Constitution require different procedures and can not be combined in one resolution. It is therefore the opinion of the Committee on Jurisprudence that Resolution Number Four is not in proper form and cannot be submitted for ballot at this Annual Communication.

Resolution No. 5 — WHEREAS, it is not in the best interest of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska to maintain any provision in its Bylaws which

would allow one member to obstruct the orderly and timely conduct of its business,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That portion of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska which now reads:

"Section 1-502 -- Amendments -- These Bylaws or any of them may be amended or repealed by the Grand Lodge, only in one of the following two manners. A proposed amendment may be made by the members of Grand Lodge as defined in Article II of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge. Every proposed amendment by the membership shall be reduced to writing and shall be signed by five or more members. It shall then be entered on the minutes and lie over until the next Regular communication, provided, however, that if unanimous consent is given by the Grand Lodge, a proposed amendment may be considered and be acted upon at the communication at which it is introduced.

Be amended to read:

"These Bylaws or any of them, may be amended or repealed by the Grand Lodge, only in one of the following two manners. A proposed amendment may be made by the members of Grand Lodge as defined in Article II of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge. Every proposed amendment by the membership shall be reduced to writing and shall be signed by five or more members. It shall then be entered on the minutes and lie over until the next Regular communication, provided, however; if consent is given by two-thirds of those present and qualified to vote, a proposed amendment may be considered and be acted upon at the communication at which it is introduced."

The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the requisite number of signatures are present and that Resolution Number Five is in proper form to be submitted and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 5 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. When none of the signers came forward Grand Master Mattoon opened the floor for discussion.

Past Grand Master M: W: Sonny Eatmon, Past Grand Master M: W:Donald Swanson and Past Grand Master M: W: Harry A. Spencer spoke in opposition to the resolution. W: B: Robert Van Valkenburg spoke in favor of the resolution.

A show of hands was called for and the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 6 — To amend Bylaws Part One, Chapter III Committees, Section 1-301 by adding the following sentences to the second paragraph of said Section 1-301:

"To avoid conflicts of interest in the actions, and review of actions, of certain standing committees, and to avoid even the appearance of impropriety, no member shall serve on more than one of the following five committees: (1) Finance; (2) Appropriations; (3) Nebraska Work; (4) Grand Lodge Offices; and (5) Jurisprudence. Any member serving on more than one such committee, or appointed to a second such committee, shall elect which committee to serve and shall by said election resign from any other of said five committees."

The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the requisite number of signatures appears on said proposed resolution and that it is in proper form to be submitted for ballot at this Annual Communication.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 6 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. W: B: Bruce Curtiss of Plainview Lodge No. 204 spoke as one of the signers, and moved for adoption of Resolution No. 6.

The Grand Master called for discussion on the resolution. $W \therefore B \therefore$ Gene Sibley of Lancaster Lodge No. 54 and $W \therefore B \therefore$ Ronald D. Grass of Tekamah Lodge No. 31 spoke in opposition of the resolution.

A show of hands was called for and the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 7 — To create a new Bylaws Section in Part One, Chapter III as Section 1-321 (or other appropriate numbers) as follows:

"1-321 Standing Committees - Limitation of term. No member of a Standing Committee may serve more than two consecutive full terms on any Standing Committee of the Grand Lodge."

The Committee finds that the proposed resolution carries the requisite number of signers. The proposed resolution however provides that the new Bylaw shall become effective upon passage, thus eliminating the necessity of the Bylaw going to the Committee on Codification of the Law as required by that section of our current Bylaws (Section 1-315). This provision of our Bylaws provides that the Committee on Codification shall digest the amendments and Grand Master's recommendations approved by the Grand Lodge: and after harmonizing the same as far as possible with the sections of the Bylaws so amended, it shall submit them in the form of finalized Bylaws at the same Communication. The approved report of this Committee shall constitute the amended Bylaws adopted by Grand Lodge. Rather than to find the proposed Resolution in improper form and in order to allow a vote at this 138th Annual Communication; the Committee on Jurisprudence advises that the resolution, prior to its effectiveness, if passed, must comply with current law and be submitted to the Committee on Codification of the Law and the favorable approval of that report before the resolution shall become law. With this advisory, we find that a vote can be taken with reference to Resolution Number Seven at this 138th Annual Communication.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 5 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. When none of the signers came forward Grand Master Mattoon opened the floor for discussion.

Past Grand Master M: W: John McHenry, W: B: Don Monnette and W: B: Bruce Curtiss spoke in opposition of the resolution.

A show of hands was called for and the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 8 — WHEREAS, It is in the best interest of the Grand Lodge A:F: & A:M: of Nebraska to give as many qualified Past Worshipful Masters of subordinate lodges opportunities to serve in elected and appointed positions of the Grand Lodge;

WHEREAS, Limiting terms of service on the Jurisprudence Committee to a maximum of three consecutive one year terms rather than the current five year terms, will accomplish the aforesaid; and,

WHEREAS, The Jurisprudence Committee should be advisory only the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge, its reports, rulings and opinions not necessarily being binding upon either the Grand Master or the Grand Lodge.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska which now reads:

Section 1-304 - Jurisprudence - This committee shall consist of five Past Grand Masters. The chairman of the committee shall be chosen by its members to serve for a one year term. The members of the initial, five member committee shall be two Past Grand Masters selected by all the Past Grand Masters in attendance at the Regular Communication in which this section becomes effective, with one member serving for a one year term and one serving for a two year term; two Past Grand Masters, appointed by the Grand Master, with one serving for a three year term and one for a four year term; and one Past Grand Master selected by the first four members, who will serve for a five year term. Thereafter, the Grand Master shall annually appoint one member to the committee to serve for a term of five years. In the event of a vacancy, the Grand Master shall immediately fill the vacancy with such appointee serving the unexpired term of the original appointment.

The committee shall be advisory to the Grand Master. The committee shall determine matters of Masonic law which is referred to it by the Grand Master, and shall make its report to the Grand Lodge. The decisions of the committee on Masonic law shall be conclusive except as finally determined by a majority vote of the membership of the Grand Lodge.

Be amended to read:

Section 1-304 - Jurisprudence -- This committee shall consist of five members, each to serve for one year. The chairman of the committee shall be chosen by its members to serve for a one year term. The members of the five member committee shall consist of two Past Grand Masters elected by the Grand Lodge from a slate comprised of the most recent five Past Grand Masters at the time this section becomes effective and three Past Masters from a slate of ten Past Masters nominated by the Grand Master. The two Past Grand Masters and three Past Masters receiving the highest number of votes cast shall be declared elected. Each year thereafter the slate of Past Grand Masters shall be comprised as before, but with this addition, the names of the two Past Grand Masters serving on the committee shall be added.

In the event of a vacancy, the Grand Master shall immediately fill the vacancy with such appointee serving the unexpired term of the original appointment.

Every member of the committee shall be limited to a maximum of three consecutive one year terms.

The committee shall be advisory only to the Grand Master and to the Grand Lodge when in session. All committee opinions on Masonic law and matters relating thereto referred to it shall be made in writing. The committee shall annually make a report to the Grand Lodge which includes all such opinions. All decisions of the committee on Masonic law shall only be conclusive when ratified by a majority vote of the membership of the Grand Lodge.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Upon passage of the above, all seats on the Jurisprudence Committee shall become and be vacant and the successors to those then serving shall be filled in accordance with the aforesaid Bylaws as amended.

The Jurisprudence Committee determined that the resolution is signed by the requisite number of signers and is in proper form to be submitted for vote.

M: W: Grand Master Mattoon called for a signer of Resolution No. 8 to approach the microphone at the Altar and state their position and move for the adoption of the resolution. W: B: Bruce Curtiss of Plainview Lodge No. 204 spoke as one of the signers, and moved for adoption of Resolution No. 8.

The Grand Master called for discussion on the resolution. Ed Reed of Western Star Lodge No. 2 and W.: Phil Lorenzen, Grand Orator spoke in opposition of the resolution.

A show of hands was called for and the resolution failed.

Resolution No. 9 — WHEREAS, It is in the best interest of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska to take advantage of the years of experience and service of Past Worshipful Masters of its several subordinate lodges.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, These portion of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska which now reads:

Section 1-102 Chartered Subordinate Lodges -- How Represented. Each chartered subordinate lodge shall be represented at the communications of the Grand Lodge by its Master and Wardens, or by their proxies thereunto appointed. Each subordinate lodge shall have three votes in the Grand Lodge, which may be cast by the representatives present.

Section 1-104 -- Votes in Grand Lodge Every officer and member of the Grand Lodge, except the Grand Tyler, shall be entitled to one vote in his individual right and no other, nor shall any member vote by proxy, except as provided in Section 1-102 of this code. A majority of votes cast shall determine all questions, except as provided in Section 1-102 of this code. A roll-call shall be ordered at the request of three members.

Be amended to read:

Section 1-102 Chartered Subordinate Lodges -- How Represented. Each chartered subordinate lodge shall be represented at the communication of the Grand Lodge by its Master, Wardens and Past Masters, or by their proxies thereunto appointed. Each subordinate lodge shall have a minimum of three votes in the Grand Lodge, however, Past Masters in good standing of every subordinate lodge shall be members of Grand Lodge, have one vote for each full year of service as Worshipful Master of a lodge, in addition to any other votes to which he may be entitled as a Master or Warden.

Section 1-104 -- Votes in Grand Lodge Every officer and member of the Grand Lodge, except the Grand Tyler, shall be entitled to one vote in his individual right and no other, nor shall any member vote by proxy, except as provided in Section 1-102 of this code. A majority of votes cast shall determine all questions, except as provided in Section 1-102 of this code. A roll-call shall be ordered at the request of three members.

The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the requisite number of signers have signed the proposed resolution, but that the proposed resolution is in violation of the Constitution of Grand Lodge which no Bylaw can change. Article II of the Constitution provides who shall be members of the Grand Lodge. Past Masters are not members of the Grand Lodge unless they are specifically included in Article II of the Constitution. Resolution Nine is therefore not in proper form and cannot be submitted for vote.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

Harry A. Spencer, 227 & 184

The Jurisprudence Committee was called to order at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 2, 1995, by Chairman Harry A. Spencer, with the following members present: Robert A. Metcalf, Jack H. Hendrix, John M. McHenry, Thomas W. Tye. Also in attendance were all Grand Lodge Officers as well as Past Grand Masters James N. DeMoss and Charles W. Amidon.

Everyone present was welcomed by Chairman Spencer and invited to participate in the proceedings of the Jurisprudence Committee with the right to ask questions and participate in every way in the discussions, actions, and proceedings of the Committee on Jurisprudence. Chairman Spencer appointed Thomas W. Tye as Secretary for the Committee for the purposes of this meeting and asked that Brother Tye present the report on the floor of Grand Lodge on his behalf.

1. A report of the Committee on Business and Rules was received and reviewed by the Jurisprudence Committee. The business of the 138th Annual Communication will be governed by the rules therein set forth. The Committee found the report and rules to be in proper form, and approved the report without change.

2. The committee reviewed all recommendations being made by the Grand Master and found that Recommendations, One, Two, and Three are all in proper form and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication.

3. The Jurisprudence Committee then began it's review of the Resolutions which were presented at the close of the 137th Annual Communication. There were nine separate proposals submitted to the Grand Secretary prior to the close of the 137th Annual Communication. In accordance with a request by the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Officers dated August 3, 1994 directed to the Jurisprudence Committee, a specific review was held with reference to each proposal and opinions rendered to the Grand Master on August 24, 1994 as well as November 10, 1994. A complete review of those recommendations were considered at this time by the Committee on Jurisprudence and separate discussions held with reference to each proposal and determinations with reference thereto as follows:

Resolution No. 1 -

"The counting of these described votes shall be by written ballot only" (Section 1-104). The Committee determined that the resolution was signed by the appropriate number of delegates to Grand Lodge. The proposed resolution is however confusing in stating "counting by written ballot" when it is believed that the signers intended to use the word balloting rather than counting. It is not permissible to change the wording without unanimous consent of Grand Lodge and the Committee, for the benefit of the Committee on Codification of the Law presumes that the intent of the proposed resolution was that all balloting would be by written ballot which would of course require a written ballot on every action taken by Grand Lodge. The Committee on

Jurisprudence finds that the resolution is in proper form and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication.

Resolution No. 2 -

Dealing with the recognition of Grotto of North America and the International Order of High Twelve. The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the proposed resolution has the required number of signatures and that it is in proper form and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication. In accordance with the request of the Grand master on August 3, 1994, as to whether this Resolution may be separated and a separate ballot taken with reference to the Grotto of North America and a separate ballot with reference to the International Order of High Twelve, the Committee on Jurisprudence advised the Grand Master that it was their opinion that the resolution must be submitted for ballot as written and that a separation of this proposed resolution could not be had without the unanimous consent of Grand Lodge.

Any requests for unanimous consent of Grand Lodge to separate must occur prior to any vote on resolution number two as originally submitted.

Resolution No. 3 —

Pertaining to the submission of an Agenda by the Jurisprudence Committee. The Jurisprudence Committee determined that the Resolution is signed by the requisite number of signers and is in proper form to be submitted for vote.

Resolution No. 4 —

Pertaining to qualification of individuals to hold office or act upon any Committee. The Jurisprudence Committee found that said Resolution contains the requisite number of signers but attempts, however, to amend both the Constitution and Bylaws in the same Amendment. It is the opinion of the Committee on Jurisprudence that this is not permissible as each requires a separate procedure. Amending the Constitution requires submission to subordinate Lodges for their approval or rejection in accordance with Article XIII of the Constitution. The proposed amendment attempts to change the provisions of Article II, Article V, and Article VI of the Constitution as well as Chapter III of the Bylaws of Grand Lodge. The Resolution itself states "Now therefor be it resolved, Article VI. Eligibility, of the Constitution and Chapter III Committees, of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge $A \therefore F \therefore \& A \therefore M \therefore$ of Nebraska be amended to include the following language". the Bylaws and the procedure for amending the Constitution require different procedures and can not be combined in one resolution. It is therefore the opinion of the Committee on Jurisprudence that Resolution Number Four is not in proper form and cannot be submitted for ballot at this Annual Communication.

Resolution No. 5 —

Amending the Bylaws (1-502). The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the requisite number of signatures are present and that Resolution Number Five is in proper form to be submitted and can be balloted upon at this Annual Communication.

Resolution No. 6 —

Amending Section 1-301 of Chapter III to restrict service on certain standing committees. The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the requisite number of signatures appears on said proposed resolution and that it is in proper form to be submitted for ballot at this Annual Communication.

Resolution No. 7 -

Jurisprudence Committee, Past Masters as members - elected. The Committee finds that the proposed resolution carries the requisite number of signers. The proposed resolution however provides that the new Bylaw shall become effective upon passage, thus eliminating the necessity of the Bylaw going to the Committee on Codification of the Law as required by that section of our current Bylaws (Section 1-315). This provision of our Bylaws provides that the Committee on Codification shall digest the amendments and Grand Master's recommendations approved by the Grand Lodge: and after harmonizing the same as far as possible with the sections of the Bylaws so amended, it shall submit them in the form of finalized Bylaws at the same Communication. The approved report of this Committee shall constitute the amended Bylaws adopted by Grand Lodge. Rather than to find the proposed Resolution in improper form and in order to allow a vote at this 138th Annual Communication; the Committee on Jurisprudence advises that the resolution, prior to its effectiveness, if passed, must comply with current law and be submitted to the Committee on Codification of the Law and the favorable approval of that report before the resolution shall become law. With this advisory, we find that a vote can be taken with reference to Resolution Number Seven at this 138th Annual Communication.

Resolution No. 8 —

Limiting terms of members of standing committees. The Jurisprudence Committee determined that the resolution is signed by the requisite number of signers and is in proper form to be submitted for vote.

Resolution No. 9 -

Past Masters as members of Grand Lodge. The Committee on Jurisprudence finds that the requisite number of signers have signed the proposed resolution, but that the proposed resolution is in violation of the Constitution of Grand Lodge which no Bylaw can change. Article II of the Constitution provides who shall be members of the Grand Lodge. Past Masters are not members of the Grand Lodge unless they are specifically included in Article II of the Constitution. Resolution Nine is therefore not in proper form and cannot be submitted for vote.

A review was then made of the Grand Master's permissions, dispensations, and decisions as submitted to the Committee on Jurisprudence in accordance with the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge. The Committee unanimously approved all of the Grand Master's permissions, dispensations, and decisions as set forth in his address. The Committee took particular note of the fact that Grand Master Mattoon did, on several occasions throughout his year of office, request opinions of your Committee on Jurisprudence and that we were most pleased and happy to convene, study, and advise our Grand Master and his officers with reference to those matters referred throughout the past year. The Committee commends Most Worshipful Brother Steven F. Mattoon on his year as Grand Master of this Grand Lodge and continues to offer its aid and assistance whenever requested and does congratulate Most Worshipful Brother Mattoon on a very successful Grand Lodge year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

During this year we received requests from the Grande Loja do Estado do Rio Grande do Norte of Brazil, Grande Loja Maconica do Estado de Rondonia, Grande Loja Regular de Portugal, Grande Loge du Senegal, Grande Oriente do Brasil, and Grande Loge Nationale Togolaise. The committee recommends recognition of the Grande Loja do Estado do Rio Grande do Norte of Brazil, Grande Loja Maconica do Estado de Rondonia Grande Loja Regular de Portugal, and Grande Loge du Senegal. The cross recognition is to become effective upon ratification by both Grand Lodges. Recently we received a request from the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts requesting recognition and visitation between Grand Lodges. The committee recommends full recognition of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts on the same basis that we recognize any other Grand Lodge. The committee further requests the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts grant full recognition to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Nebraska. The cross recognition is to become effective upon ratification by both Grand Lodges.

The committee defers action on Grande Oriente do Brasil and Grande Loge Nationale Togolaise until we receive a report on their regularity and jurisdictional limits.

As a carry-over from last year, the committee has not acted on the request from the Grand Lodge of France for recognition. We presently recognize the French National Grand Lodge, and the committee has agreed to continue to defer action on recognition of the Grand Lodge of France pending the resolution of the question as to their regularity. No further information has been received to modify our decision. We expect a report from the Commission on Recognition for the Conference of Grand Masters before proceeding.

Full recognition of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut has been accomplished with unanimous approval of cross recognition at their 121st Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut held October 7-9, 1994.

As always, the Grand Representatives of Nebraska near other Grand Jurisdictions are urged to communicate with their counterparts; and, if possible, make arrangements to visit the jurisdictions they represent.

Correspondence regarding clarification of some legal questions related to the structure of the various Masonic bodies was shared this year. As finalization of those questions is reached, progress can again proceed in developing a comprehensive program of coverages.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES

Frank V. Lawson, Jr., 1

The primary responsibility of the Grand Trustees is the management of the investment funds of the Grand Lodge and the annual selection of auditors to examine the financial records of the Grand Lodge.

Again this year, the audit was performed by Dana F. Cole & Company.

As explained before, the Grand Lodge investment funds are handled in two separate accounts — the Grand Lodge General (or unrestricted) Fund and the Restricted (or special) Fund. The latter encompasses the Stephen C. Houghton Fund and the Emick Scholarship Fund as well as the Perpetual Membership Fund. A record of the separate interests of the various contributing entities is kcpt by the Grand Lodge Office.

In the tables below the figures for 1994 are from the auditors preliminary, yet-to-be-finalized, report.

Operating income, although less than in 1993, was again positive. That it was down compared to 1993 was due more to less income, down \$22,240 or 5.6%, than to higher expenses, which were up only \$1,771 or 0.5%.

The two largest decreases in income were membership dues and investment income. Last year we explained that investment income would decline as we shifted assets to more growth oriented investments. The low point of this current income effect of this policy likely will have been 1994. The decline in dues received is a result of the continuing decline of membership.

Restricted Funds

These funds include the Emick Scholarship Fund and the Stephen C. Houghton Fund, and the Disaster Relief Fund. These funds are invested in both common stocks and bonds.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Thomas W. Tye, PGM, 46, Chairman V. Kaye Ramsey, 290 & 317 David L. Knutson, 302 James Allen, 210 Philip A. Lorenzen, 10 & 327

The Committee on Finance met several times throughout 1994 and early in 1995 in order to perform the duties as outlined in Section 1-318 of the Bylaws of Grand Lodge. At each of these meetings, the following audit procedure was followed:

1. A comparison of the canceled checks to the check register, as well as examination of endorsements.

2. Examination of support documents for disbursements and review of accounts to which the disbursements were charged selecting all items over \$500 and every fifth disbursement at random.

3. Review and reconciliation of bank statements.

4. Review of all income items and lodge assessments.

5. Review of the financial statements.

Total revenues for the year 1994 were \$374,128.97. The 1994 budget revenue estimate was \$375,069.00, indicating that our actual revenues were \$940.03 less than anticipated. Overall, actual total revenues were very close to anticipated revenue as set forth in the 1994 budget, less than \$1,000.00 different. Our budgeting process is getting better and is very accurate.

Some specific line item expenditures were exceeded. However, in all cases except one, the category appropriations were not exceeded. Annual communication expenditures were approximately \$900.00 under budget in spite of a contract problem with the Cornhusker Hotel in which the Grand Lodge was subject to a \$5,000.00 penalty provision. Thanks to the Hotel and your Committee a reasonable settlement was reached, paid to everyone's satisfaction, and we were able to stay under budget in this category. Installation expenses were approximately \$450.00 under budget. Travel and Related expenses were

\$11,164.99 under budget. Salaries and Related expenses were approximately \$1,730.00 under budget. Occupancy and Related expenses were \$7,892.69 under budget in spite of some unexpected equipment and office maintenance expenses. Postage expense will definitely go up in 1995 as all rates were increased as of January 1st. Insurance and Administrative expenses is the only category that exceeded budget. You will note that insurance costs in ALL areas went up higher than the appropriations committee anticipated by \$1,761,14. This will be addressed by the Committee on Appropriations and the Grand Lodge Officers to authorize the added expense but attention to this ever increasing cost should be kept in mind when the 1995 budget is under consideration. Committee expenditures were under budget by \$4,168.37. Note should be taken of our Contributions which were within budget, totalling \$63,332,18. The 1994 budget anticipated an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$11,46. In actuality, your 1994 Officers were under budget by \$23,994.42. Hopefully, some accumulation can be continued for replacement of equipment which is always a continuing problem.

The Members of the Finance Committee found satisfactory verification for all expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and were able to complete their audit procedures as herein above referred to with the fine aid and assistance of the Office Manager and Staff of the Grand Lodge Office. Again, particular note should be made that ALL expenditures for travel and related expenses of your Grand Lodge Officers are fully documented and accounted for with all receipts verifying those expenditures to the satisfaction of your committee. We hope that the work of this committee not only satisfies the membership as to the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and its Office Manager, but that it is of some help to the professional paid auditors who examine all books and records of the Grand Lodge and verify their accuracy in a published audit each year, received by your committee and the Grand Lodge Officers upon completion of their yearly audit. That written report with any recommendations of the auditors is usually received by Grand Lodge in March or April following the close of the calendar year and is on file in the Grand Lodge Office. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GRAND LODGE OFFICES

To: M. W. Grand Master and all Members of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons.

This has been a very busy year for this committee.

On or about the first of June, we received notice that the building containing our offices had been sold and that we should vacate the premises by the end of August. This necessitated several meetings of this committee, along with many phone calls among the committee members.

Our office manager, Mrs. Chris Rudder, spent many hours looking for and at possible office space. Several sites were examined and found either too expensive or for other reasons not suitable space for our purposes. Mrs. Rudder found the office space at 1530 South Street in Lincoln. The members of this committee examined the space and with certain renovations to be made by the owners, agreed on the conditions of the lease. With the approval of the Grand Master, the Chairman of this committee signed the same on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

The new office space was renovated to the point of being usable and we moved the office August 13 and 14, 1994. Several things were not completed when we moved and caused the office to function in a limited capacity for the next few days. Both the office manager, Mrs. Chris Rudder and the Administrative Secretary, Mrs. Carol Schroeder deserve a lot of credit for their patience and perseverance during this period. The office is now complete and should be a very functional facility for the next several years.

Cross training of the office staff has continued, time permitting, during the year. During the absence of the office manager, Mrs. Carol Schroeder, the administrative secretary, handled every question in a very professional manner. Cross training is and will continue to be a very high priority for our staff.

This committee approves and recommends that the mileage paid to the Deputy Grand Custodians either by the subordinate lodge or the Grand Lodge be increased from \$0.20 per mile to \$0.25 per mile.

Due to Grand Lodge budget constraints this committee sets the mileage to be paid for those attending Grand Lodge and entitled to mileage at \$0.00.

I wish to thank Most Worshipful Steve Mattoon for the opportunity to serve on this committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL

The leadership which the Grand Lodge of Nebraska displayed in being the first Grand Jurisdiction to enact a per-capita amount to support the Memorial is still bearing fruit. After Nebraska, as reported last year, Delaware, Vermont, New Jersey and Missouri passed similar per-capita support. Since then, Ohio has followed suit. It is likely that one or more additional Grand Lodges will take similar action at their next Grand Session.

This, plus success with some money-raising projects such as the Grandfather Clock, a label card program which was run in several states which have not passed a per-capita and the Mount Vernon Christmas tree ornament have helped to provide funds which allow us to go forward with restoration and repair projects which never seem to end. When we look at all the big ticket items which have to be done, we are especially grateful to those Grand Lodges which have picked up their share of the burden and to those Brothers who have contributed by making a purchase or otherwise contributing.

We hope a lot of you responded to the Christmas tree ornament offer. Both ornaments are truly beautiful and very much display Masonry. It is a pleasure to see them on the tree. One of them is a golden square and compass and the other depicts George Washington laying the first cornerstone of the National Capitol.

With a little increase in cash flow, we are able to begin doing some projects. In the last year, we were able to do quite a bit of plaster repair and painting, install a donation display at the portico, trim trees and install a new floodlight on one parking lot. One other big accomplishment was to create a new 15 minute videocassette of the Memorial.

Projects planned for next year include replacing the sidewalk up the hill to the front entrance to the Memorial, completing better lighting for the parking lots, installing a fire alarm/detection system and air conditioning the dining room. A very large project which is just under way is compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act. In a monumental building such as this, it is a great undertaking.

These projects are reported to you with gratitude because Nebraska has done its part in helping to provide the funds to make it possible to begin such programs.

They need our support and we need to experience the enthusiasm of those younger than most of us.

Our committee continues to field concerns about the barriers our adult bodies build to our future. Instead of barriers and criticisms of our youth, we need to build bridges of strength for our family. We should ask what we can do to make our youth groups stronger, fortunately many of you do extend beyond yourselves to envision our future. A big THANK YOU to all those concerned and dedicated family members.

As in the past, we continue to offer scholarships to outstanding members of our three Masonic Youth Organizations. This year each scholarship was \$750. The scholarships were presented by our Grand Lodge Officers at the annual meetings of each youth group. Each applicant is required to prepare a brief essay, "How my Youth Organization has Prepared Me for My Continuing Education." As evidenced by their writings, the youth do appreciate and benefit greatly from their involvement in our Masonic Family and will undoubtedly continue their Masonic commitment.

This year nineteen applications were received from Job's Daughters, six from the Order of Rainbow and four from the Order of DeMolay. The quality of the applications received makes it extremely difficult to select only one winner from each organization but it makes us extremely proud of our youth. Many of our youth were listed in the World Herald's All-State Academics.

The scholarship to the International Order of Job's Daughters was presented to Janice Christine Haack of Bethel #69, Omaha, Nebraska. Janice has been active in her Bethel for over seven years; has held fifteen different offices including Honored Queen; chaired many committees; participated in seven Grand Sessions and three Supreme Sessions. She is very active in ritualistic work, having won several first places in competitions at both Supreme and Grand Sessions. She does not limit her talents to Job's Daughters but shares them with her school, cheerleading, church and community. She has been active in the National Honor Society, Junior Achievement, National Council on Youth Leadership, French Club, Youth Deacon, DeMolay Sweetheart, Students for Environmental Awareness and traveled in France; all while holding a part time job and maintaining a GPA of 4.17. Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Brothers all:

It is with great pleasure that I bring you greetings from the Children and Staff, and the Board of Directors of the Masonic- Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont. Executive Director Ben Harvey and his very capable staff are to be commended for the superb job of operations of the Home. Our current resident count is 33 with 3 empty beds ready and waiting to be occupied. We currently are experiencing a lesser number of boys of young age requiring our services, and a higher number of girls. This resulted in empty beds at Morris Cottage with no beds available at Veazie and Hartman cottages, and a waiting list of those desiring admission. This could be temporary or a long lasting trend. We have made adjustments so as to use our facilities to the best advantage by re-assigning Morris Cottage from a boys to a girls facility after some minor changes in furnishings and decorations. On February 21st 5 girls from Veazie Cottage became the first to be residents of the newly assigned Morris Cottage. We are again accepting applications to fill any available beds. Our constant desire is to operate efficiently and full, but we won't compromise our fine quality of child care just to be full.

Our mission is to provide a family oriented living experience, accommodating as many children as we have space available. We support and enhance with loving care their lives as members of our home family. We make a determined effort to instill self respect, cleanliness, good morals, respect for others, and responsibility, in our family values based environment. Church attendance is encouraged and of their own choice, and they attend public school, and develop good study habits. We prepare them for life after leaving the home through our off-campus living program and assist those who have prepared themselves for higher education when they attend an institution of their choice. We have been complimented many times for the appearance and deportment of our children when they are out in the public eye, and it's because they are proud of themselves and their home, and are regaining their self respect and confidence.

With the completion of Phase V, and well along on Phase VI, we are about 88% complete in our long range renovations plan for our 79 year old campus. The greater portion of the work already done has been on the building interiors, but now you will notice the changes taking place in the overall appearance of the home grounds through the landscaping work that is in progress. Our Landscape Architect has provided us with a long term program to improve the overall appearance of the Home campus. Work to give our entranceway a handsome and inviting new look is complete with a new fence, new and better lighting and bronze signs, combined with new landscaping and plantings. The installation of new lighting for the balance of the circle was to have been done at a later time frame, but was moved ahead of other planned projects because of current needs. Other areas will be addressed as time and funds will allow. We gratefully appreciate those benefactors who specify their funds be used for this purpose. Your board members, past and present, are proud to have been involved in the worthwhile endeavor. We very much appreciate your continuing support. Our goal must always be to maintain our facilities in good structural and aesthetic condition, keeping the surrounding area from growing old and unsightly, and at the same time adding facilities as they become a desired part of our plan. The Board has voted to proceed and a contract has been let to construct a multi-purpose barn at the farm. It will provide Ron Meyer an all-weather arena/work area where all the children may work their 4-H project animals at the same time whenever they desire. We have talked for several years of such a structure, but others things always took its place on the drawing boards because of need. Now seems to be the appropriate time, and it will provide the desired location of signage dedicating the farm area THE LEONARD A. JOHNSON 4-H FARM. A cornerstone laying ceremony is planned as a part of the Sunday, August 27, 1995 4-H Achievement day program.

As always, proper care and secure investment of all of our donated funds is a prime task of our Board's Finance Committee along with its appointed Financial Adviser, James N. DeMoss, PGP, PGM. Brother Jim has served us without compensation since May 1984, and we can't thank him enough for what his expertise has accomplished for the Home. The Committee and the Board are most appreciative of his dedicated service. After researching other alternatives the Board has signed a year to year renewable agreement with Brother Jim allowing him a nominal fee for his continuing services as he goes into retirement January 1, 1995. Masons and Eastern Star members have been very generous with their gifts, and we can't say THANK YOU enough. Please be assured that every monetary, material, or labor gift, no matter how large or small, is received, recorded, and acknowledged with the same care and appreciation.

We are looking forward to June 24 - 28, 1995 when we will play host to the Masonic Homes Executives Association of North America as it meets in Omaha, Nebraska. Our Home and the Plattsmouth Masonic Home will each share in this worthwhile experience. While attending the conference in Florida this year we learned again that our home still operates with the lowest total employees, lowest operating budget, and lowest ratio of employees to residents, of all of the childrens home members of the conference. We have accomplished that while maintaining one of the most attractive and up-to-date campuses in the country.

I speak for the devoted members of the Board, the Staff and the Children, when I say THANK YOU from the bottom of our collective hearts. It's because of their hard work and your un-ending support that our Home Family continues to thrive and grow. Again, a most wonderful example of Masonry at work.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The Nebraska Masonic Home Plattsmouth, Nebraska

TO: Stockholders of The Nebraska Masonic Home

In this 91st year of our operation, as President of The Nebraska Masonic Home it is my responsibility to give a brief accounting of some of our activities and problems for the year. I do this on behalf of the Board of Trustees who in addition to myself are as follows: First Vice President, Frank V. Lawson Jr.; Second Vice President, Gary W. Radil; Third Vice President, Jerry L. Rittenburg; Secretary, Jay H. Speck; Dr. Robert L. Bass, Richard E. Brasel, Marlo Burg, James N.

DeMoss, David L. Knutson, Sanford H. Nelson, John M. McHenry, Robert A. Metcalf, John S. Pierce, and V. Kaye Ramsey.

The past year has been a busy and a productive one. It has passed so quickly it is hard to realize that 12 months have elapsed since our last annual meeting.

I give this report saddened by the fact that one of our faithful trustees, Brother Dale E. LeBaron, a Past Potentate of Sesostris Temple of the Shrine, entered his eternal home January 12, 1994. During the year we also lost two former Trustees, Brother Robert Spire and Most Worshipful Brother T. Leo Stines who was a Trustee Emeritus. Because it is appropriate to remind us of the beautiful memory of these dear friends and brothers, I quote these words from the memorial given by Most Worshipful Brother Metcalf in his tribute to Brother Dale.

"A beautiful memory more precious than gold Of a friend whose worth can never be told. Happy and smiling; always content, Loved and respected wherever he went. To a busy and beautiful life came a peaceful end. He died as he lived--everyone's friend."

At our February Trustees' meeting we elected Worshipful Brother Sanford H. Nelson as a Trustee to fill the vacancy created by the passing of Brother Dale. Worshipful Brother Sam, a retired naval officer, is the present Potentate of Sesostris Temple of the Shrine. He has spent 35 years in public education, is a Past Master of East Lincoln Lodge No. 210 and has served as Master of three Scottish Rite Bodies. As an interested and active Mason he has also served a three-year term on the Board of the Children's Home.

As our Executive Director Brother Arthur Sharp will tell you, the acuity rate for our residents is high. The increasing census is high. During October 1994 we had 112 residents, the highest in our history. The increasing census made it necessary to add three full-time nursing assistants and one part-time registered nurse to the nursing staff. It also necessitated moving some third floor intermediate care residents to the second floor. We have reached the point where more than two-thirds of the residents receive some type of infirmary care.

Our budget for 1994-1995 exclusive of depreciation is \$3,602,500. This compares with \$3,586,800 for 1993-1994, an increase of only \$15,700. Considering the increasing food, health, insurance, and labor costs, it indicates your trustees, with the assistance of staff, are keeping close watch on the budgets of their respective committees. The bad news is our revenue budget which we estimate will increase \$64,500 this year will only raise \$1,556,000 leaving a deficit of \$2,046,500 which must be raised from other sources. The projected income from The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation (formerly the Endowment and Bequest Fund) will be \$1,593,153 leaving a shortfall of \$453,347 for which we must invade the principal of that fund.

I remind you that The Nebraska Masonic Home is the main charity of Nebraska Masons; however, I am afraid this fact is forgotten by many of our members. Every Nebraska Mason contributes \$2 from his dues to the support of The Home. This raises less than \$45,000 annually. No other Grand Lodge funds are received for the operation of The Home. We pay \$10,000 annually for support of the Grand Lodge office and contribute \$12,500 for the support of The Nebraska Mason, our Grand Lodge newspaper. I mention this to show that 99 percent of our budget must be raised by the Trustees from other sources, and we need the help of every Nebraska Mason who is able to do so. It is only because of the past generosity of those Masons and their female relatives who have contributed to our Endowment and Bequest Fund (now The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation) over the years that we have been able to keep our Home operating at its present level. With the decreased returns on investments the past two years we are encroaching on the principal of that fund which cannot continue indefinitely. It is for this reason I urge each and every one of you who is able to do so to remember The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation in your will. In this way we can support The Nebraska Masonic Home long after we have entered the portals of the hereafter.

During the calendar year of 1994 we received funds or bequests from the following estates and trusts: Mabel A. Kilmer Estate, Isabelle Barkdoll Estate, Virgil Wilson Trust, Mary Boyer Trust, Beulah G. Palmer Trust, Loretta Chapman Estate, Lela H. Johnson Estate, Maude M. Manning Estate, Virginia S. Jennings Estate, Susanna Jobst Trust, Gordon Wilson Estate, S.E. Torgeson Trust. We have also received \$1,000 from the Omaha Scottish Rite Bodies, \$1,000 from the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star, \$2,500 from Mr. and Mrs. John Kemmerling, and \$5,000 from Earl and Ann Riggs. These amounts are in addition to the Caring Club receipts which are accounted for otherwise.

Speaking of the Caring Club, I have authorized the Executive Director of our Foundation, Most Worshipful Brother Thomas Tye, to give a written report on his activities. Most Worshipful Brother Tom is speaking today at a Sojourner's Convention in Arizona.

Incidentally, Most Worshipful Brother Tom will include information on the Caring Club in his report. I will only mention that from May 1, 1993 to April 30, 1994 The Caring Club raised \$73,383.87. From May 1, 1994 to December 31, 1994 we have received \$43,641.00. Incidentally, Most Worshipful Brother Tom has submitted his resignation as Executive Director of The Foundation to be effective at the close of April 30, 1995. I have appointed a committee which includes Worshipful Brother Gary Radil, Right Worshipful Brother Jerry Rittenburg (who will be Grand Master), and Right Worshipful Brother V. Kaye Ramsey (who will be Deputy Grand Master) to review the position of Executive Director of The Foundation. Worshipful Brother Gary will serve as Chairman of the committee. They are authorized to investigate all of the ramifications of the position as well as to recommend a job description to the Board of Trustees.

This fall we finalized a contract with Cigna Insurance company for Workers' Compensation Insurance. This will get our Home out of the high-risk pool and

will save The Home approximately \$30,000 per year on Workers' Compensation Insurance. According to our agent Dan Loring, our Home is the first nursing home ever to be taken out of the high-risk pool. This is primarily due to the excellent safety training program promulgated by the Safety Committee which is headed by our Assistant Director, Mary Stapp.

Our insurance committee, after reviewing the escalating costs of our Home pension plan which is a defined benefit plan recommended terminating it and enhancing our 401(k) plan. Your Board of Trustees voted to do so. We have engaged Ameritas Life Insurance Corporation to provide actuarial and other services attendant on the termination of our pension plan effective as of April 30, 1995, with any excess funds to be allocated to participants in the pension plan. The funds are to be distributed on a nondiscriminatory basis. Any plan adopted is to be in accordance with the requirements of approval by the pension guarantee corporation and the Internal Revenue Service.

I informed you at our last Annual Meeting that the plaintiffs in the Barkdoll litigation had appealed the decision in our favor to the Intermediate Appellate Court. The Intermediate Appellate court or the Nebraska Court of Appeals affirmed the decision of the trial judge. The plaintiffs have now appealed the decision of the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court. In this case the plaintiffs claimed an oral contract to convey property which they had been farming to the Barkdolls.

On the litigation side we are also processing an appeal in a federal tax matter in the Beulah G. Palmer estate under the will which was prepared by a Lincoln attorney. Beulah Palmer bequeathed the residue of her estate to a trust. Under the trust for a period of 21 years until death, whichever first occurs, the trustee is to distribute 50 percent of the net trust income with one nephew to receive 20 percent and one grandniece to receive 30% of such net income. During the term of the trust the trustee is to distribute the other 50 percent of the net income in equal shares with 25 percent being paid to Trinity United Methodist Church of Lincoln, Nebraska, and 25% being paid to The Nebraska Masonic Home of Plattsmouth, Nebraska. Upon the death of both of the individual beneficiaries or the expiration of 21 years from the decedent's date of death, whichever event first occurs, the trust will be terminated. All net trust funds remaining on hand, both principal and income, will be distributed in equal shares with one-half to Trinity United Methodist Church and one-half to The Nebraska Masonic Home. The funds placed in the trust amounted to \$1,896,337.

The Internal Revenue Service audited the federal estate tax return for the Beulah G. Palmer estate after the period had expired during which the will could have been reformed or corrected to meet applicable requirements. The Internal Revenue Service disallowed a charitable deduction for the two charitable beneficiaries on the basis that the trust created a "split-interest" gift whereby an interest in the same property passed both to private parties and to charities. In the instance of a "split-interest" gift in trust under the Internal Revenue Code and Regulations, it is necessary that the trust or a charitable remainder uni-trust

which was not the case under the decedent's will. As a result of the disallowance of the charitable deduction, the additional federal estate tax to be paid would be in excess of \$500,000. Through our attorney we interceded with the attorney for the State and personal representative to hold up the payment of the tax and permit us to litigate this payment.

Despite the technical correctness of the petition of the Internal Revenue Service the result is extremely inequitable, and it appeared appropriate that an effort should be made to challenge the position of the Internal Revenue Service. Our attorney contacted the Trinity United Methodist Church as to their position in the matter. They were desirous of contesting it but were unwilling to incur additional expense for doing so. We have both now hired Baird-Holm Law Firm which has agreed to accept the case and appeal on a contingency-fee basis. Under this arrangement, we will be responsible for only the out-of-pocket expense.

On October 26 Brothers Gary Newcomb and Leon Wright delivered a complete set of lodge furniture to The Home. This furniture was from a lodge that had become dormant and consolidated with Bartley Lodge No. 228. The Home is now able to hold a regular lodge meeting without transferring furniture from Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6.

In the past I have commented on the high caliber of our supervising employees and have pointed out honors extended by their peers. Our Assistant Director, Mary Stapp, during the year received a Bachelor's degree in Health Care Management Magna Cum Laude. Our Executive Director, Arthur Sharp, is serving on the Executive Board of The Masonic Homes Executives Association of North America. He has also been invited to become a member of the American College of Nursing Home Administrators. This is a select group with only a few members from each of the various states. Art has also been elected to serve a two-year term as president of the Board of Directors of the Lincoln Employee Assistance Program. I should mention that one of our Trustees Most Worshipful Brother Robert Metcalf was selected as the Outstanding Mason of the Year by the Order of DeMolay.

Your Trustees have authorized your Executive Director and Assistant Director to supply coffee and cookies for the hospitality room at Grand Lodge as we did last year. I hope that all of you will take advantage of this hospitality and urge your brethren to do likewise.

Our Deputy Grand Master represented our Trustees at the Masonic Home Executives Association of North America's annual meeting. He found the conference to be an informative and educational one and recommended that we continue to send a Trustee to the conference. Incidentally this year's meeting will be held in Omaha June 26-28, 1995. We have registered all of our Trustees and urge them to attend the conference. On Sunday, June 25, The Home will host a tour of our facility and an evening meal followed by entertainment.

Trustee Dr. Robert L. Bass, Chairman of our Health Affairs Committee, called the Board's attention to the recent rise in tuberculosis deaths. On his recommen-

dation our Board instructed our staff to rigidly comply with our requirement of health screening for new applicants, particularly for infectious diseases.

During the year I was pleased to see an article on The Nebraska Masonic Home in Bee Hive Lodge's monthly bulletin. Bee Hive is the lodge in which I was initiated and now hold dual membership. I urge each of you to urge your lodges to do the same if they publish a bulletin.

I remind you that our Deputy Grand Master Right Worshipful Jerry Rittenburg, our incoming Grand Master, has been an active Trustee of The Nebraska Masonic Home for the past four years. He is a dedicated Mason, is very knowledgeable on Home affairs, and has an intense interest in its operation. Under his leadership The Home and the Grand Lodge will move forward together.

I take this opportunity to express the appreciation of the Trustees to all the lodges, chapters, councils, commanderies, masters and wardens, Eastern Star chapters, and the Omaha Scottish Rite and other groups who have helped to make the year a pleasant and joyous one for The Home's residents. I suggest you urge your friends to visit The Home if they have not done so. When they see the wonderful job being done by our Executive Director and his staff, I am sure they will be interested in helping with this outstanding program.

I am especially grateful to our Executive Director, Brother Arthur Sharp; our Assistant Director, Mary Stapp; our Controller, Robert Kenney; and our Executive Secretary, Christine Abbott for the help they have given me personally during the year. I commend them and the rest of the staff for a job well done. I can truly say our Home has never been in better shape.

As I have said before there is no way I can adequately express my appreciation for the work done by our Trustees on their regular and special committees. I have never worked with a group of individuals more conscientious and dedicated than they are. As I have said before, they exemplify Masonic charity at its best. For every one of them it is a labor of love which requires them to contribute of their substance as well as of their time. If our entire membership could really know how much work these brothers render in their interest, I am sure they would be much more responsive to our financial needs.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Nebraska Masonic Home Plattsmouth, Nebraska

TO: The Stockholders and Trustees

Once again it is a pleasure for me to welcome all of you to this, the 92nd Annual Meeting, of The Nebraska Masonic Home Stockholders and Trustees. As in the

years past, your Masonic Home continues to move forward in our mission of providing loving and dignified care for the aging Nebraska Masons and their eligible female relatives.

This past year has been one of constant challenges for the staff of our Home. The ever-changing state and national legislative scene, the changing and everincreasing technology, the advances in medical science and the resulting changes in how we provide care and treatment to our residents, and the staffing requirements have been a constant challenge due to the changing population of our Home.

During the past year our entire administrative and management staff worked diligently on several projects which have helped our Home control the costs of operation and, in several instances, saved a considerable amount of money.

One of the largest projects has been in conjunction with the new Workers' Compensation Law, L.B. 757, which mandates the establishment of safety committees in all businesses. Working closely with our labor attorney, Mr. Mark Theisen, of the Baird-Holm Law Firm, we were able to reorganize our long-standing safety committee into a more functional and efficient group of dedicated employees who have worked very hard at making our Home a much safer place for our residents to live and our employees to work. As a result of our Safety Committee, under the very capable leadership of our Assistant Director Mary Stapp, we have reduced our days lost due to work-related incidents from 252 in 1992 to 15 in 1993. As a result of this, The Nebraska Masonic Home is the first nursing facility ever to be removed from the Workers' Compensation high-risk pool and be reclassified into a lower rate group. The net effect of this is an annual savings of approximately \$30,000.

Another of these projects involved getting competitive bids, and renegotiating our contract for long distance telephone service. This contract was renegotiated within the past two months, and has had a net effect of lowering our long distance charges by about \$160 per month; we are currently 11.5 percent under our telephone expense budget projections for this year.

During the past year we have become a member of the Nebraska Food Bank. As a 501(c)(3) organization we are eligible to get food and medical supplies from the Nebraska Food Bank operation in Omaha which results in a savings of about \$350 per month on our food bill.

Our administrative and management staff continue to look at several other areas of our operation for the opportunity to conserve our resources and hold the line on costs. In this time when medical costs are still outrunning inflation, we are still dead even with last year's operating expenses and are 4.4 percent or \$86,000 under our year to date budget. This, I believe, is a direct result of total staff dedication to operating efficiently and economically while continuing to provide the very highest quality care for our Masonic brothers and their eligible female relatives.

During the past year our expanded activities program has come into full bloom. Under the direction of our Activities Director, Mrs. Sandi Rippe, we are offering our residents a full schedule of activities to help improve their quality of life. Let me outline for you a few of the activities that are available to our residents. Sandi made arrangements with the Henry Doorly Zoo for our residents to enjoy this excellent attraction at a greatly reduced cost for our senior citizens. She arranged for a picnic at the Platte River State Park, a trip on the Belle of Brownville, a tour of the beautiful fall colors at Arbor Lodge, a ride on "Molly the Trolley" in Nebraska City, shopping trips to the various malls in the Omaha metro area, and resident participation in open class craft competition and a day at the Cass County Fair. During September our residents assisted with decorating The Home's float for the Kass Kounty King Korn Karnival parade. Many of our residents also enjoyed a historical and educational trip to view a replica of the Nina which was docked in Bellevue during the fall. In addition to these outside activities, our residents also enjoy many activities here at The Home. One of the most popular activities is the reminiscence story hour where each of the residents participating in the group gets to tell a story about the topic for the day. This story hour is led by one of our very active volunteers, Mr. Cliff Shaffer, who also leads a Bible study class and bridge lessons every week. Between all of these activities and our ever-crowded craft room, our residents can stay as busy as they desire on any given day.

During the past year a great many people and organizations have contributed greatly to your Masonic Home. A very special thank you must go to our very active and progressive Board of Trustees. They have been, as in past years, ever ready, willing, and able to contribute of their time and expertise to the staff of our Home in order that we may operate at the most effective and efficient level possible.

Our thanks must also go to Most Worshipful Steve Mattoon, Grand Master; his Grand Lodge officers; and the Grand Lodge office staff for their continuing support and encouragement.

One of the highlights each year is the arrival of the Robert W. Boon Memorial Food Truck organized by Brother Adolph Schlaman. The Food Truck brings nearly a semi-trailer load of food supplies to The Home for our residents. Brother Adolph and Brother Edward Rhoda also pass out candy and other treats to every resident of The Home. Many thanks to the lodges, chapters, and individuals of central Nebraska who donate money to fund this worthy project.

A very special thank you must go to Mr. Ben Harvey, Administrator of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for children for taking a day out of his busy schedule to bring several children and their 4-H animals to The Home for our residents to enjoy. Our residents look forward to this event each year with great anticipation; it is truly one of the highlights of the year for them.

I would also like to thank Mr. John Furstenberg, Executive Director of the Omaha Home for Boys, for the contributions he has made to our Home. One of the most important was his appearance as a clown, during National Clown Week, to entertain our residents.

A very special thanks must also go to the various Masonic bodies who have collectively given so much of their time, resources, and effort for the enjoyment of our residents:

- to the Masters and Wardens Club of Omaha for furnishing the gifts and poinsettias for our residents' Christmas party and for the Omaha World-Herald subscriptions which give our residents so many hours of enjoyment.
- to Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 for always being there when we need them for special projects as well as always welcoming our male residents to lodge meetings and occasionally furnishing transportation for them to attend lodge. We are especially proud this year that Mr. David Meredith, the husband of our Director of Nursing, Sonia Meredith, will be installed as Worshipful Master this coming Saturday.
- to Home Chapter No. 189 OES for the delicious fried chicken picnic in The Home's dining room for our residents each summer and for always welcoming our residents and furnishing transportation to chapter meetings.
- to Narcissus Chapter No. 269 Kensington for the covered dish picnic which has become an annual event that brings so much enjoyment to our residents.
- to the Nebraska Grand York Rite officers for their annual visit to The Home to have lunch and visit with our residents as well as have an information session and tour of The Home.
- a very special thank you must go to Mrs. Mary Lou Erickson, Worthy Grand Matron; Mr. Robert C. Todd, Worthy Grand Patron; Mrs. Shirley Frink, Grand Secretary; and the Grand Family of the Order of Eastern Star for the help and support they have given our Masonic Home. Our residents truly enjoy their annual visit and their attendance at many of The Home's functions and events.
- and finally, to all the Masonic bodies and their membership for the hundreds of contributions in terms of time, talent, and hard work in order that our residents' lives may be made more comfortable and enriched.

During this past year, the State Board of Nursing Licensure informed us that because we are not a state-licensed nursing facility we could not use Care Staff Members (C.S.M.'s) to pass medications to our residents. The Nebraska Masonic Home was not subject to any penalty for this; however, our Director of Nursing and all other professionally licensed nurses were in danger of losing their licenses if they were on duty at the time a C.S.M passed meds. This made it necessary for us to go back to the practice of having our professional nurses pass all medications. This resulted in an increase in our personnel budget as we were not able to utilize our lower-paid personnel for our med passes. In spite of this we are still 0.5 percent under our nursing salary budget year to date.

The Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Trustees was quite active this past summer looking at several options which are available to increase our Home's census. The committee brought several suggestions to the Board of Trustees at the September meeting; however, no motions were brought to the floor to bring any of these to reality. My hope for the upcoming year is that many of these options will come before the Board in the form of a motion to be voted upon so that we can increase the census of The Home and have the resulting increase in revenue. This would cut down on the amount of money which The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation must provide for the daily operation of The Home.

During this past year our Chief Engineer, Mr. Monte Hackwith, has studied for and successfully passed the test for the National Institute for Uniform Licensing of Power Engineers. Monte is now licensed as a First Class Power Engineer. He is qualified to work in any state in the union on any type of stationary or power equipment.

A very special congratulations must go to our Assistant Director, Mrs. Mary Stapp, upon her graduation, Magna Cum Laude, in Health Care Administration and Management. This was accomplished entirely on her off-duty time while in her present position and former positions as Administrative Assistant and LPN Supervising Nurse. In addition to this great accomplishment, she has put in a great many extra hours and given up many weekends and holidays during her 22 years of employment with The Nebraska Masonic Home in order for The Home to maintain the high quality care for which we are recognized throughout the industry and state. I truly believe that all of the people connected with The Nebraska Masonic Home owe Mrs. Stapp a very special thank you for all her work, dedication, and accomplishments.

My sincere gratitude must also go to our very dedicated staff. Great works cannot happen without a great staff to make it happen. To Mrs. Sonia Meredith, Director of Nursing; Mr. Bob Kenney, Controller; Mrs. Chris Abbott, Executive Secretary; Mrs. Frankie Cotner, Secretary/Receptionist; Mr. Monte Hackwith, Chief Engineer, Mrs. Sandi Rippe, Activities Director; Mrs. Glenda Seydlitz, Housekeeping Supervisor; Ms. Sandy Hamilton, Dietary Supervisor; and Ms. Amanda Stapp, Accounting Assistant; I give a very special thank you for all the contributions you make to our Home and our very special residents. These people are truly the heart and soul of our Nebraska Masonic Home.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation

I am pleased to submit this report to the Board of Directors of The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation and to the stockholders of The Nebraska Masonic Home at your annual meeting in Plattsmouth on January 10, 1995.

In the fall of 1994 I tendered my resignation as Executive Director to President Spencer and so advised the Board that my time in the future would be limited. The Board requested that I remain as the Executive Director, at half salary,

through the fiscal year ending April 30, 1995, so that a study could be made and a replacement employed prior to my departure. The past several years of my association with The Nebraska Masonic Home, first as a Trustee and then as your Executive Director of The Foundation have been tremendously rewarding for me and I hope for The Home. It has been my honor and privilege to work with Most Worshinful Brother Harry A. Spencer, President of the Board of Trustees. Brother Harry was appointed to the Grand Lodge line by my father in 1959 having given many prior years of service to our fraternity. Working with Harry in Grand Lodge as well as on The Home Board has made me realize that he is one of the youngest-thinking members of our fraternity that I know. His body may not be what it was 60 or even 70 years ago, but his mind, his enthusiasm, his concern and love for his brethren are as young as the newlymade Master Mason, standing in the northeast corner of the lodge--eager and ready for new challenges, new experiences, filled with hope. In looking through my father's scrapbook one day I found many writings and poems written by his first law partner, Hector Sinclair, as well as some written by my father. He had saved a clipping from a 1925 edition of the Western Newspaper Union that certainly is descriptive of Harry.

The Board of Trustees of this Home and The Foundation are the most dedicated and caring people I have ever worked with. Each day brings a new learning experience for each of us, and we have grown and learned each day ever keeping in mind the care and welfare of those for whom we work. I thank each of your for your concern, your guidance, and your good counsel. If nobody smiled and nobody cared, And nobody helped us along, If each and every minute looked after himself, And the good things all went to the strong: If nobody cared just a little for you, And nobody thought about me; And we stood all alone in the battle of life; What a dreary old world it would be. Our annual giving through the Caring Club continues to be a successful program for The Home. We average about \$70,000.00 per year in giving through the Caring Club, and I hope the program will be continued by the Board and my successor. It has also served as a means to convey information about The Home to members and interested people throughout the entire country.

There continues to be a great deal of interest in annuities. A gift annuity makes it possible to transfer cash or marketable securities such as stocks or bonds to The Nebraska Masonic Home Foundation and in exchange, you and/or someone else you designate will receive fixed payments for life, and at a rate usually better than you can get at the bank. Additionally, you get a tax deduction for the gift made. The current rates adopted by The Home for gift annuities are as follows:

Even though our needs are great, our donors give not solely because of those needs but primarily for the results which we, as Masons and as The Nebraska Masonic Home, are able to achieve with the funds which we receive.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF THE LAW

Dwight E. Smith, 205

Your Committee on Codification of the Law respectfully submits its report relative to amendments or additions to the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge, as enacted at this communication.

That the following be added as paragraph five of Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge, and that otherwise said Section shall remain unchanged:

"No less than 15 days before the opening of Grand Lodge the Committee shall serve on the Grand Master, by deposit in first class mail, or by deposit at the Grand Lodge Office, an agenda for its meeting prior to the opening of Grand Lodge. Said agenda shall set out with reasonable certainty any questions the committee expects to raise relative to the recommendations of the Grand Master or his decisions rendered during his term."

That Section 2-311 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2-311 — SURETY BOND — Every subordinate lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge for bond protection to the lodge against misappropriation of lodge funds by its Secretary and its Treasurer. All payments hereunder by subordinate lodges shall be paid annually to the Grand Lodge which shall keep a record thereof. The Grand Lodge shall procure a surety bond from a company legally issuing such bond sufficient in amount to protect all of the subordinate lodges against misappropriation of its funds by its Secretary and by its Treasurer, and pay the amount thereof out of the money received for this purpose from such lodges. Said bond so furnished is to be conditioned for the full protection of the Grand Lodge and the several subordinate lodges."

That Section 1-201 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-201 — GRAND SECRETARY — The Grand Secretary shall have charge of the seal of the Grand Lodge; shall personally attend and record the transactions of the Grand Lodge when in Annual Communication; shall sign all orders, certificates, documents and diplomas requiring the seal of the Grand Lodge, to include the affixing of the seal thereon; shall complete and carry on such communications

with the various subordinate lodges of this jurisdiction, all appendant and/or allied bodies operating therein, and with such other jurisdictions as may from time to time be necessary to insure that a harmonious relationship exists between such bodies and this Grand Lodge. The Grand Secretary shall be ex-officio a member of the Committee on Fraternal Relations and the Committee on Grand Lodge Offices. The Grand Secretary shall report to each Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge such statistical data concerning the status of the membership of this Grand Lodge as may, in his opinion, be appropriate, or as may be directed by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary shall devote such time as his duties may require for the efficient and prompt completion of such duties or other programs of the Grand Lodge to include the promotion of Masonry."

That the first paragraph of Section 2-605 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"The dues assessed by all chartered subordinate lodges shall be payable on January 1st of the year for which they are assessed and shall become delinquent on the 1st day of June of the same year, if not paid by that date."

AND, that paraagraph two of Section 2-605 of the Bylaws of this Grand Lodge be amended to read as follows:

"On June 1, of each year, it shall be the duty of the secretary to notify in writing each member that is in arrears for dues of the current year of such fact and request payment thereof on or before September 30, of the same year. If such member fails to pay his dues on or before September 30, of such year he shall automatically stand suspended for non-payment of dues and an entry thereof shall be made in the minutes of the Lodge at the first subsequent stated meeting. It shall also be the duty of the secretary to notify, in writing, each member automatically suspended for non-payment of dues. Such notice shall be deemed properly given when mailed by first class mail to the last known post office address of such suspended individual."

The amendments to the Bylaws shall become effective after the close of this Grand Lodge Communication.

W. Dwight E. Smith moved for adoption of the report of the Committee on Codification of the Law. Motion was seconded and passed.

The Officers of St. John The Baptist Lodge of Research requested permission to give the following report. Permission was granted by Grand Master Mattoon.

St. John The Baptist Lodge of Research Father Arsenios Coolik

Thank you very much Most Worshipful Grand Master and Worshipful Sirs and my Brethren. I really am indebted for you sparing a few moments of your time to give me a chance to tell you what our Lodge of Research has been doing after its first year since it has been chartered. I will try to be brief, although you all know we live in a monastery and Brother George Burke is the Abbot of the Monastery, and as Mark Twain put it years and years ago, he was referring to a trait that Abbot George had in that he was a longwinded Irish wordmill. One of the things that Mark Twain forgot to add is that this is somewhat contagious. So I will try to subdue that for the purposes of everyone getting out on time.

Our lodge since February of 1994 has made significant accomplishments and I would like to just briefly explain them. We have had an expansion of our members, we have gone from 15 to now 19. I understand we will be having a 20th member soon. And we also have made a resolution to have outreach for associate members either out-of-state or unable to travel to give them access to the knowledge and research we are uncovering in our lodge. We have also begun the growth of a rather expansive library, and we have participation with other out-of-state lodges in research conference and also in active lodge. In doing this we have also received international notoriety from several Grand Lodges of other countries which I will mention and although we had to go to a pretty extensive financial expense to setup a lodge, get everything we needed. we have also been able to setup a large financial base. Our members as I mentioned are now at 19 and we have received requests from associate members from many states and many other countries. We have received petitions to become associate members from California, Minnesota, Connecticut, Maryland, Manitoba, Argentina, and Yugoslavia. So here we find that hopefully the Grand Lodge will also receive notoriety if we are good Masons and do our work well that this Lodge of Research will have International outreach. We also in our lodge have now made accessible to all members and all associate members tape recordings of the actual presentation part of our meetings. For those Brothers who could not come as an associate member they will not only just receive a newsletter or a report of what happened, but they will also receive an audio tape of the actual presentations which can be put into an album form and which will be sold to non-members at the end of each year in an album form. To give you an idea of the type of presentations which are active in our lodge, just taking the last meeting of just last week, we had a reading from a report given in 1870 given by Reverend Oliver Clark, when he gave a report on the All-Seeing Eye. That was read by our Secretary Brother Seraphim, we also had a long presentation of music which was done by one of the Brothers of the Monastery, and he sang through various anniversary odes of Masonic music that first were published in 1860. These settings were put to music by a brother Amadais Mozart. Then we had a very ancient and very interesting proving up ritual which was demonstrated by two of the Brothers from rituals that were active in the year 1760 in England and Ireland that were published in the book "Three Distinct Knocks". Then our Brother Deb Hartman gave a very interesting report on what he titled his Musings on Masonry, giving a report on what he has seen happen in the recent years in Masonry, things that were advantageous to the craft, things which are detrimental to the growth of the brotherhood. Also then we had a report from our Worshipful Brother Virgil Tubach, he gave a report on the recent history of growth of Freemasonry and Fraternal Recognition in countries around the world, especially in countries that were previously Communist. When this was all done we had realized that the lodge meeting had gone over 3 hours long. and in a sense a Masonic miracle had taken place because we later found out that one of the members was praying for the meetings to end. And so, being good Masons and seeing the pattern we might set, and therefore deter other members, we quickly made a resolution to limit our presentation part of the meetings to one hour. So we are putting restraints on ourselves. I would like to just say that our lodge, as many of you know, and have seen, had put out last year the 4 cassette album on blue lodge degree Masonry. We now are heading toward a sale of 300. That means that now between 200 and 300 lodges throughout the United States and Canada are now using this work for beautification of the work. We have had a request from the York Rite Bodies to produce an album which will give all of the York Rite Degree music and we have gone through all of these extensive books on Music and we have found after literally over 100 hours of research we have put together, codified and entered into computer all of these songs through all of the degrees. We have actually performed this in our chapter, council and commandery degrees. We have found that there are within the 9 degrees of York Rite, 38 songs which are incorporated into the degree. We hope, and our goal next year is to have a 10 cassette album to produce to offer not only for the craft but also Masons at large. In doing all this we have been able to set up a financial base and now we have an outstanding bank account of over \$3,000 which will enable us to further expand our library and which now, as I mentioned before, we have extensive research documents and extensive books on not only Masonic music, Masonic Ritual history, but a long list of books on anti-Masonic history. One of the things that we uncovered that was mentioned at our meeting which is interesting to note on anti-Masonry is that in this country the very first political convention that ever took place in the government of our country was not a convention put on by either Republican or Democratic party, but it was the anti-Masonic party which first had its convention and started the national conventions which took place after that, which shows how strong the bodies of anti-Masonry were, if in fact they actually started an historic progression of what turned out to be the most prominent conventions which happen yearly from the Democrat and Republican parties.

Two of us, Abbot George Burke and myself did travel to the Iowa Masonic Library and we spent two days there with the head librarian Keith Harrington, and with our help he retrieved and brought out for our inspection numerous books on Masonry, the oldest one went back to 1705. These books were so rare

they could hardly be handled, with his help I was able to photograph 2800 pages of Masonic ancient ritual and history and we have incorporated this by photographing and then reproducing them on a photographic enlarger, making prints and then xeroxing the books, and now we have these books in our library. Keith Harrington, who many of you know from the Iowa Masonic Library, is a wonderful man and probably one of the most knowledgeable of men on Mason ritual and history. He said that surely once these 2800 photographs are developed that seated in Nebraska will be the most widely documented library on Masonic ritual and music in the world outside of Iowa. So we see this as a great accomplishment.

In closing I would like to say that even though we have done all of this we feel that all of our efforts have paled to insignificance compared to the work and the historic event that has just taken place in this Grand Lodge assembly. And as Roscoe Pound said 3 decades ago, before he left this earth for a better place, that as true Masons we should recognize the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of Man, so in recognition of this historic event, where this Grand Lodge has recognized and put forth their belief that the brotherhood of man is paramount to Masonic virtue, I would like to make this presentation to the Grand Lodge. This is a mounted plaque reproduction of an original Masonic "Our Father, the Lords Prayer" which was done in 1875 and painted by J. Miller, one of our Brothers of 120 years ago. I also have a duplicate of this which I presented to the Grand Lodge of Prince Hall Masons. I caught Brother Russell before he left and made the presentation to him. So it is our hope that as a plaque like this hangs in the Prince Hall Grand Lodge and also in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska it will mark this historic event and show to all that have gone before us and all those Brothers who will come after us that it was the work of us here who have been courageous to do what should have been done decades ago.

Grand Master Mattoon thanked Brother Coolik for the presentation orally and also the plaque, assuring all that it will hang in the Grand Lodge Office.

Grand Master Mattoon also gave special thanks to Brothers Kevin Leapley for the excellent job he does as the sound expert and Del Hamilton, our official photographer, who work tirelessly during Grand Lodge Annual Communication.

PRESENTATION OF THE PAST GRAND MASTER'S APRON AND PAST GRAND MASTER'S JEWEL

M: W: Past Grand Master Thomas W. Tye, with the assistance of M: W: Past Grand Master Frank J. Mattoon, made the formal presentation of the Past Grand Master's Apron and Jewel to M: W: Steven F. Mattoon.

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R: W: Virgil L. Tubach announced that he had received the following resolutions, which according to the bylaws will be read and laid over until the session next year.

RESOLUTION

I recommend that the annual per capita tax in Section 2-601 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws be increased one Dollar (\$1.00) for the use of the Grand Lodge General Fund because it is apparent that future operating costs will increase.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: The constitution of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska does not allow Past Masters to be members of the Grand Lodge.

THEREFORE: Be it resolved that the Constitution be changed as follows:

ARTICLE II

Now reads: The Grand Lodge shall consist of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, and Grand Tyler, with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens or the proxies, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

TO READ: The Grand Lodge shall consist of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward and Grand Tyler, with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with Masters and Wardens or the proxies, duly constituted, of chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; and such Past Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Past Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Grand Lodge Bylaws be and they hereby are amended, as follows:

CHAPTER IV GRAND LODGE FUNDS

Sec. 1-401 - INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT AND BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES -

(a) The Board of Grand Trustees shall consist of three (3) members, each to serve for a period of three years, and who shall be appointed for such terms as shall retire one member thereof annually. Vacancies shall immediately be filled by the Grand Master. A majority of such Board shall, as it deems wise and prudent, establish investment policies for the Grand Lodge as to general types of securities, bonds and interest bearing obligations, and the percentage of Grand Lodge funds to be invested in securities and other obligations.

(b) The Grand Trustees appointed shall be members in good standing of subordinate Lodges under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, and shall be selected because of their experience and recognized ability in the investment or banking field. All trustees shall be residents of the State of Nebraska, and if any Trustee shall cease to be resident of this State, or shall cease to be a member of a subordinate Lodge under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge his place as Grand Trustee shall be declared vacant by the Grand Master, and a new Grand Trustee appointed immediately.

(c) The Board of Grand Trustees shall select its chairman and secretary from its membership.

(d) The Grand Trustees shall serve without pay, but shall be reimbursed for actual expense incurred covering mileage, hotel rooms and meals. They are also authorized to expend such sums as may be necessary for financial advice and service from funds appropriated by the Grand Lodge for that purpose. They may also expend such sums for legal services and court costs as they may deem necessary for the proper monitoring of the investments.

(e) The Board of Grand Trustees may by majority vote select a professional management firm to invest and reinvest the funds of the Grand Lodge in securities, bonds and interest bearing obligations. Any investment management firm selected shall have been in business at least five years and shall have a net worth of at least \$100,000. Upon written approval of such selection by a majority vote of the Grand Master, the Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Secretary, the Board of Trustees may employ such firm. Any professional management firm may be terminated and a new one employed, utilizing the same procedure.

(f) The professional investment management firm shall have such powers to buy and sell, invest and reinvest the funds of the Grand Lodge within the investment policies established by the Board of Grand Trustees and to hold such investments for the ownership and benefit of the Grand Lodge, as shall be set forth in its written contract. Such contract shall provide the custody of Grand Lodge investment funds shall repose with a State or Federally Insured Financial Institution, as well as provisions for the transfer of funds and renditions of such statements of account and reports as shall be recommended by the Board of Grand Trustees. An annual written report of the professional investment management firm and Board of Grand Trustees shall be made at each annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

(g) Except as provided in the contract with the professional investment management firm, all funds, securities, real estate and other property held by this Grand Lodge shall be carried in the name of the Grand Lodge A:.F:. & A:.M:. of Nebraska, and all deeds conveying real estate and all mortgages mortgaging real estate or personal property and releases or assignments thereof, or assignments or transfers of stock, certificates, or other securities or such other legal documents having to do with the sale, transfer, investment, reinvestment or management of said funds, securities or property, shall be executed by the Grand Master or the Chairman of the Board of Grand Trustees and the Grand Secretary upon authorizations of the Board of Grand Trustees. (h) The Board of Grand Trustees shall monitor the actions of the professional investment management firm and submit semi-annual reports to the Grand Master with comments and recommendations. They shall also employ a certified public accountant to make an annual audit of the accounts of the Grand Lodge. An original of such audit of the accounts of the Grand Lodge shall be filed in the office of the Grand Lodge.

(i) Except as provided in the contract with the professional investment management firm, the Board of Trustees shall designate the depositories for all funds and securities of the Grand Lodge under such terms and conditions as it shall deem proper.

Sec. 1-405 - GENERAL FUNDS, <u>SPECIAL FUNDS</u> AND PERPET-UAL MEMBERSHIP FUND - That hereafter the funds of this Grand Lodge shall be the following: General Funds, Perpetual Membership Fund and <u>Special Funds</u>.

The General Fund of this Grand Lodge shall consist of the securities and monies presently in said Fund. The General Fund shall be the operating funds of the Grand Lodge, into which shall be deposited all income of this Grand Lodge from whatever source derived, with the exception of monies paid to the Perpetual Membership Fund and income therefrom. The expenses of this Grand Lodge, as appropriated by this Grand Lodge, shall be paid from the General Fund. Surplus monies in the General Fund shall be invested and reinvested by the professional investment management firm under its written contract with the Grand Lodge.


There is hereby established a Perpetual Membership Fund. All monies tendered with applications for perpetual membership and all income therefrom shall go into said Fund, which shall be administered as provided by the Perpetual Membership Plan adopted by this Grand Lodge. This Fund shall be separate and distinct from all other funds.

There is hereby established a Special Fund, which shall consist of monies gifted or bequested to the Grand Lodge with restrictions on their use. The Fund shall be separate and distinct from all other funds.

For the purpose of investment management, the Perpetual Membership Fund and the Special Fund may be managed by the investment manager as a single portfolio and be held in a single custody account. The Records of the portion of such account/portfolio belonging to the Perpetual Membership Fund and other special funds held by the Grand Lodge shall be kept by the Grand Lodge Office.

Following the prayer, M :: W :: Grand Master Steven F. Mattoon then closed the 138th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in ample form.

The Roll of Deputy Grand Custodians and Date of Appointment

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869.

In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
