Masonic History Of the 134th Grand Master

James F. Brown, Jr.

Ancient Craft Masonry – Initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason on August 12, 1975, passed to the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason on September 12, 1975, and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on October 24, 1975, in Morristown Lodge No. 231, Morristown, Tennessee. Demitted to Lancaster Lodge No. 54, Lincoln, where he served as Master in 1991.

Grand Lodge – Appointed Grand Chaplain in February 1994 by M : W : Steven F. Mattoon. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in February 1995 by M : W : Jerry L. Rittenburg. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in February 1996 by M : W : V. Kaye Ramsey. Elected and installed as Grand Junior Warden in February 1997 under M : W : Kenneth G. Fleming. Elected and installed as Grand Senior Warden in February 1998 under M : W : Don E. Rasmussen. Elected and installed as Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master-Elect in February 1999 under M : W : Dwight E. Smith. Installed as the 134th Grand Master of Masons on February 13, 2000.

Appointed Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Nicaragua. Previously served as a member of the Education Committee and the Grand Lodge Office Committee.

York Rite – Made a Royal Arch Mason, a Royal and Select Master in Morristown, Tennessee. Dubbed a Knight Templar in Morristown Commandery, at Morristown, Tennessee on April 29, 1976. Demitted to Lincoln Chapter No. 6, Lincoln Council No. 4, and Mt. Moriah Commandery No. 4 of Lincoln, Nebraska in 1998. Became a member of the "Coeur De Lion Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine" in August 1999.

Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite – Received the 4th through 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Knoxville, Orient of Tennessee in 1977. Elected a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in December 1999.

Shrine – Member since 1981 of Sesostris Temple of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in Lincoln, Nebraska. Commander of the Legion of Honor in 1989. Active in the Ritualistic Divan. Vice President of the Proficient Past Masters Club.

Order of Eastern Star – Member of Temple Chapter No. 271 in Lincoln, Nebraska since 1982. Served as Worthy Patron in 1985. Installed as Worthy Grand Patron of the

Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star in 1991. Served as a Grand Trustee from 1993 - 1997.

Rainbow – Awarded the Grand Cross of Color by the International Order of Rainbow for Girls in 1992.


DeMolay – Legion of Honor 2000.

Philip A. Lorenzen

Ancient Craft Masonry – Initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason on June 6, 1964, passed to the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason on August 4, 1964, and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on September 1, 1964 in Solomon Lodge No. 10, Fort Calhoun, Nebraska. Became a dual member in Shiloh Lodge No. 327, Omaha, Nebraska on October 7, 1987. Appointed and elected to various offices and installed as Worshipful Master of Solomon Lodge No. 10 in 1973. Certified as a Proficient Mason for eight years.

Grand Lodge of Nebraska – Served on various Grand Lodge Committees including chairman of the Finance Committee. Appointed Grand Junior Steward in February 1991 by M : W : James N. DeMoss. Appointed Grand Junior Steward in February 1992 by M : W : James L. Eatmon. Appointed Grand Orator in 1993 by M : W : Donald L. Pohlman. Appointed Grand Orator in February 1994 by M : W : Steven F. Mattoon. Appointed Grand Orator in February 1995 by M : W : Jerry L. Rittenburg. Appointed Grand Junior Deacon in February 1996 by M : W : V. Kaye Ramsey. Appointed Grand Senior Deacon in 1997 by M : W : Kenneth G. Fleming. Elected Grand Junior Warden in 1998 under M : W : Don E. Rasmussen. Elected Grand Senior Warden in 1999 under M : W : Dwight E. Smith. Elected Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master Elect in 2000 under M : W : James F. Brown, Jr. Installed as the 135th Grand Master of Masons in Nebraska on February 11, 2001.

York Rite – Made a Royal Arch Mason in Adoniram Chapter No. 13 at Blair, Nebraska; a Royal and Select Master in Triad Council No. 33 at Tekamah, Nebraska; and, became a Knight Templar in Jordan Commandry No. 15 Blair, Nebraska all at the one-day York Rite Festival held in 1971 in North Platte, Nebraska. Current membership is with Mackay Chapter No. 24, Tirad Council No. 33 and Jordan Commandry No. 15.

Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite – Received the 4th through the 32nd Degrees in the Valley of Omaha, Orient of Nebraska in 1984. Elected a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 1996. In 2000, became a 33° Honorary Elect, to be Coroneted in Charleston, South Carolina in October 2001. Elected and served as Venerable Master of Kadosh, Omaha Consistory 1998.

Shrine – Member in 1975 of Tangier Temple, Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Omaha, Nebraska. Club memberships include Vintage Iron, Past Masters, Square & Compass and Harley Escorts.

GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

M∴W∴ James F. Brown, Jr. made the following remarks as he presented the 2000 Grand Master's Humanitarian Award recipients:

"He must first be a Master Mason for thirty years. Secondly, he must have been active in at least three of the following five community activities. He could have held a political office such as mayor, city council member, county board member, natural resource district board member, school board member, or such other political office as may be available. He could have been active in his church either as an elder, a vestry member, Deacon, lay reader, or such other similar office. He could have been denoted as a Civic leader because of his involvement on boards of directors for local hospitals, nursing homes, financial institutions, or foundations. He could have been a volunteer for such charitable organizations as the YMCA, United Way, or Scouting. He could have been involved in such service organizations as the Lions, Sertoma, Kiwanis or Rotary. Lastly, he must have been active in the Masonic fraternity."

GOLD PAN AWARD

The Gold Pan Award was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in 1987 by the Grand Lodge of Alaska on the occasion of the Grand Lodge's sixth anniversary. The lodge selected should represent the best all around lodge in the jurisdiction of Nebraska. The Rock Maul is a sixteen-pound rock maul that has been used in a rock quarry for its intended purpose. It was inscribed and presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in the year of M : W : Byron C. Jenkins (1980), and has been awarded once a year since then to that lodge determined to have been the recipient by the selection process. The recipient of the Award is unknown until this announcement at Grand Lodge each year. The Grand Master presented the Rock Maul Award to Papillion Lodge No. 39 of Papillion.

GRAND ORATION

Dale Anderson, Grand Orator, Samaritan Lodge No. 158 of Chadron.

My heroes have always been Masons. Let me tell you about just a few.

One of my first heroes was a special neighbor named Henry Mammen. He was like a grandfather to us. On his way to town he would pass our house. He would bring us treats when he stopped to visit, laugh and make you feel good! He had that special spark that drew people to him. Henry was a Mason. It was his friendship and influence that caused me to join the fraternity.

When we were young we loved Saturday movies, starring Hopalong Cassidy, Roy Rogers and Gene Autry. When my children were old enough to watch these same movies, I learned from Masonic publications that all of these men were brothers. Even Gabby Hays was a member of the craft!

You often read that a historic figure had something about them that people noticed.

One of the greatest examples of this is provided by our first President of the United States, George Washington. Numerous books tell us about his life. His modest birth, early military service, his life as a frontiersman, farmer and surveyor. These same books tell about his education by fire during the French and Indian War; having horses shot from under him, nearby officers killed, the hat shot from his head! The defeats, the problems with supply, rebellious troops and English command would all come to bear on his performance during our revolution. Washington's greatness only began with his military success. Once the victory was won, he refused to become an emperor or dictator, as many repeatedly urged him to do. Instead, he helped set our nation on a path free from hereditary rule, a path of representative democracy. In Masonry we hear the words, "elevated for a time above his brethren." Washington personified this belief with his conduct while in office and by handing control of the presidency over to his elected successor, then returning to private life at his beloved Mt. Vernon.

President Washington had been encouraged to become Grand Master of all Masons of the United States. He responded that he was inadequately prepared to take such a high position. Thus, today, we have a Grand Master from each jurisdiction rather than one Supreme Grand Master. You may have heard the news reports that President George W. Bush took his oath of office on the same bible used at the Washington inauguration. That bible originally came from the local Masonic Lodge.

Another Masonic brother, Winston Churchill, would display these same leadership characteristics during the darkest days of WWII. When all looked lost for England, her armies defeated, thrown back to the beaches by the enemy, he refused to let go of the idea of an England free of oppression. While others were sending out peace feelers, he began, almost single handedly to rebuild a nations belief in itself. With an invincible will, he began to bring people within the light of his vision. The men of the defeated army had been brought home by any ship or boat that could be pressed into service, but it was the men of Royal Air Force, flying Spitfires and Hurricanes, who continued to attack the enemy bombers and their fighter escorts. Their skill and determination delayed and then postponed the planned invasion of England.

When our Masonic brother Franklin Delano Roosevelt led his nation into war, our forces, and those of our allies, would gather on English soil for the invasion of Fortress Europe.

During WWII, one of my lodge brothers was captured in the Battle of the Bulge. After being liberated from a German POW camp, he was sent to Scotland to wait for transport home. He was still waiting for a ride home when the Allies announced Victory in Europe. Scotland is well known for its fighting men and strong ties to Masonry, but it was another product of Scotland that was brought to bear on the victory celebration. In Gordon's words, "everyone seemed to have set aside a little something special for just such an occasion!"

President and Brother Harry S. Truman helped to complete the great task begun by FDR. He also is well known for serving as Grand Master of Missouri.

You have all heard of General and Brother George C. Marshall. This distinguished soldier served as U.S. Army Chief of Staff and later as Secretary of State to President Truman. Brother Marshall's European Recovery Plan rebuilt a war torn Europe and won him a Nobel peace prize in 1953.

In the Pacific, General and Brother Douglas MacArthur served with equal distinction. His efforts to rebuild Japan following the armistice exemplified his high ideals. His father, General Arthur McArthur was the first Post Commander at what would become Fort Robinson, Nebraska. This was in 1874.

Past Grand Master Tom Tye rates as a hero to me. As a newly appointed Grand Lodge Orator, I was to give an oration at each cornerstone ceremony. As so often happens in Masonry, we are helped by those who have gone before. His wonderful paper on the history of cornerstones provided invaluable information. Quoting, "The purpose of the Masonic Lodge is that of the builders of the great cathedrals of Europe; to construct and never to destroy, to erect an intangible 'building' of benevolent love and harmonious understanding." Speculative Freemasons symbolically lay the cornerstones of public buildings to be a reminder of the best and most noble use of those buildings.

The Grand Lodge performed cornerstone ceremonies at Dannebrog, Chappell, the Lincoln Grand Lodge office building, Plattsmouth Home Alzheimer's unit, Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children picnic shelter, the Presbyterian Church in Sidney; also the hospital, the lodge cornerstone and lodge dedication in Oshkosh, the hospital in St. Paul and a very cold cornerstone at the police station in Hastings.

The cornerstones at the Masonic Home Alzheimer's unit and the Home for Children, were special events. Also, dedicating the stone at the Grand Lodge office was historic.

One of the highlights of the summer was participating in the Masonic All-Star Marching Band Camp. Some of the brightest young people in our state attend this camp. The students say this is the best camp in the state! Masons and Eastern Star and dedicated adults help chaperone this event. You are planting seeds that will bear fruit for our fraternity in the future! They will always remember the fun and the friends from camp. Now, with e-mail, the students stay in touch until they can get back to camp again. Not only the organizers but the yeoman service behind the scenes deserves our thanks. Several Masons haul the instruments in a 14' U-Haul truck. It had plywood decks to

stack several layers of instruments. Drums under the first deck, horns and woodwinds on the upper decks. Unload, load, unload, load. By the final day, this crew was as polished as the students were! It looked like a bucket brigade as everyone pitched in to move hundreds of instruments into and out of the truck. You need to see this band. Even better, volunteer for an afternoon, an evening or more, and get acquainted with some of the nicest young people in our state. The performance by the band was incredible. The music while marching in the parade brought applause and smiles to everyone. You could feel the electricity in the air when the horns were lifted and the music began. The halftime show was great! It was as if you were watching your family members perform. What a pleasure!

As Grand Lodge officers, we are detailed to visit specific Nebraska lodges. Let me tell you about a brother I met while visiting the lodge in Long Pine. This brother had been a member for decades. When proficiency requirements were changed, he decided to drop his membership in protest. He was getting close to his 50-year pin, so his Masonic brothers began to pay his dues for him. On the night of my visit, a young lodge member had driven 20 miles to bring him to the meeting. He told me how thankful he was that his brothers kept their belief in him.

We met Dr. George Thompson in Sidney. He was a dentist in the military during WWII and Worshipful Master of Frank Welch Lodge No. 75, in 1945. This spry, 100-year-old brother came to the lodge for the fellowship and meal following the cornerstone ceremony. His brothers from the lodge told us about the people he had helped and his commitment to his community. The brother who was acting as his chauffeur shared some wonderful stories about this remarkable Mason. It was one of the nicest examples of Brotherhood, Masonry and Fraternity that I have seen.

Who are my Masonic heroes? The few examples from history or the silver screen that I had too little time to properly share with you or the men we have all met in our search for light! Somehow it is hard for me to relate to the perfect heroes of the screen or the larger than life historical figures in Masonry, but I can travel with and admire the men who enter our craft and begin a journey that can go as far as they choose to travel.

The Masons of Nebraska who belong to York Rite are sponsoring two ministers to the expense paid holy land pilgrimage. Our minister, Allen Schmidt, Pastor of the ELCA Church in Chadron will be one of them. The following comments are from one of his recent sermons. His text was based on the story of Jeremiah. When Jeremiah faced a task for which he felt inadequate, God encouraged him with the words; "I am with you to deliver you." The sermon then continued, "God is not looking for the best qualifications, or people who make the best prospects. That's not to say he would turn down those who truly are the best at certain things, because it is true that some of the most gifted people are also some of God's best servants; but that is a coincidence and not a requirement. God knows that the vast majority of men and women would like to think of themselves in the "I am only" category. But "I am only," is enough - with God's help. It is amazing what God can make of such people - people like you and me."

V∴W∴ Grand Chaplain Ivan Vrtiska invoked the blessing of Deity.

M : W : G Grand Master James F. Brown, requested that the Grand Secretary ascertain if there was a quorum present.

R : W : Grand Secretary Reginald S. Kuhn declared a quorum present for the transaction of business.

The Grand Master declared the 144th Annual Communication duly opened for the transaction of business and asked that the Grand Marshal proclaim the Annual Communication open in ample form.

At this time, Grand Master Brown appointed W: Brother J.L. Spray of Lincoln Lodge No. 19 as Parliamentarian for the 144^{th} Annual Communication.

The report of the Committee on Business and Rules was made by the R:W: Grand Secretary Reginald S. Kuhn, who then moved for its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

Reginald S. Kuhn, 19 & 134

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge. The Committee further recommends:

- 1. The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.
- 2. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.
- 3. Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.
- 4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.
- 5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.
- 6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits.
- 7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decision and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the Committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak after which a vote will be taken.
- 8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret ballot or other method at his discretion.
- 9. Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The motion was seconded and passed.

At this time, the Grand Master requested that Neil Henry, Chairman of the Membership Committee, come forward to present the traveling trophies. The two membership awards are given for the highest percent of positive growth – counting new members, reinstatements, suspensions and deaths. Each lodge received a traveling trophy that they can display in their lodge for one year before it is presented at the next annual communication. The winner in the small lodge division is Corinthian Lodge No. 83 in Wakefield. The winner in the large lodge division is Thistle Lodge No. 61 in Lexington.

It is apparent that several subordinate lodges are accepting the responsibility of conducting degree work within their own walls in lieu of abdicating to the popular One Day Format which has also proved to be of benefit in increasing membership. Due to

this resurgence of interest throughout the jurisdiction, the Grand Master has charged the Committee, together with the Grand Custodian's office, to prepare a Floor Work Manual covering multiple candidate classes.

At the Deputy Custodians' School held in Grand Island in September 2000, the subject of small classes was debated. Several suggestions were proposed, keeping in mind that the work should be conducted in such a manner that each candidate should receive as much personal attention as possible. It was also recognized that a reasonable time schedule should be maintained.

Fortunately, all three members of the Committee on Work were in attendance. Following a rough draft "walk through" of the suggested methods to accomplish the goal, it was agreed that the Committee on Work should prepare a Floor Work Manual for approval. Such a manual was prepared and copies were provided to all members of the Committee as well as the Grand Custodian. After consultation with all involved parties, a final draft was prepared and submitted to the Grand Master for his approval and/or suggested modifications.

A copy of this Floor Work Manual was attached for inclusion in the record. Due to the volume of pages involved, it has not been included in the individual delegates' packets. However, copies will be available through the Grand Lodge Office.

It is the opinion of the Committee on Work that as this manual does not constitute a change in bylaws, approval of its report will implement a procedure for conducting up to five (5) member classes subject to the Grand Master's permission.

The Committee wishes to thank the Grand Custodian and his Deputies for their full cooperation in preparing this manual and trust that the subordinate lodges will find it to be of great value in conducting their own small class initiations.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

My brethren, you have all been furnished with a copy of my Address as you registered with credentials, and the delegates all received a copy of my Recommendations, 45 days prior to this session.

The printed address of the Grand Master is as follows:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST ANCIENT AND HONORABLE FRATERNITY OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEBRASKA

My Brethren:

In accordance with Article X, Section 2 of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, it is my duty to present a written address to the 144th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge. In addition, I have submitted my Grand Master's Recommendations to the Jurisprudence Committee as required by Section 1-304 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws. Accordingly, this address will set forth the official acts of the Grand Master during the year preceding this Annual

Communication, and will summarize the general condition of Masonry within the jurisdiction of Nebraska. It will also contain the recommendations by the Grand Master of legislation that I deem necessary or expedient for the welfare of the fraternity.

CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

When I addressed the craft at the last annual communication, I presented my vision "2000 - A Benchmark for Progress" and I made a commitment to the members to be visible and share my vision of Masonry with as many lodges as possible. During my travels, I have learned that there are three essential ingredients of a successful lodge-regardless of the size of their membership.

- The presence of a "Selective" Membership Program in the lodge
- A dedication to ritual and the education of new members
- A strong spirit of Fraternity among the brothers

First, successful lodges adopt a selective membership program. They realize that some members will come to them through the efforts of appendant bodies, but an active membership base capable of sustaining and growing the influence of the lodge within the community will only be developed through the devoted efforts of the lodge membership. The key word in this program is "selective." Not every man should be a Mason! Two criteria should be applied to each prospect. First, will the prospect benefit from Masonry, and second, will he be an active member? The answer to these two questions is very subjective, but it must be addressed when you target a person for membership. Merely increasing our numbers is not what we need! Active, involved, and dedicated members is what we should strive to obtain. The "Targeting Program" advanced by the Grand Lodge Officers this year will help lodges recruit the type of membership that is needed to enhance the image of our fraternity.

The recruitment of new members does not end with the conferral of the degrees of Masonry. The real work begins with the education efforts that are directed to the new member. He must feel a sense of belonging. He must be convinced that his presence is appreciated and needed. He must become a master of some aspect of the ritual. When these needs are satisfied, you truly have a new Master Mason in your lodge. Dedicate yourself to the ritual and the education of a new member. "Posting" is what will accomplish this goal. Each lodge needs to post the new member so that he can be active. Education of the new member cannot be accomplished in a vacuum. It still requires a one on one relationship!

A membership program coupled with a dedication to the ritual and the education of new Master Masons is the work of the lodge. It is the responsibility not only of each officer of the lodge, but also, each member of the lodge. If neglected or shirked, the result is always a weakening of the lodge within its designated community. However, work without play is not desirable. A spirit of fraternity is one of the main reasons men choose to continue to be active in their lodge. Family activities are beneficial, limited community service is desirable, but activities that build a spirit of fraternity among the brethren are critical. We must never lose site of the fact that men join this fraternity to socialize with other men. Exclusive activities for the brethren must be scheduled and promoted regularly. Not every Mason is a ritualist, but every Mason is a brother. Successful lodges promote a spirit of brotherhood among its members.

I am confident that if we remember the three keys to success discussed above, we will continue to attract men of quality to our fraternity. Programs such as "2000 new Master Masons," "2000 Visits between Lodges," and "2000 Books read by Master Masons" are worthy attention directing activities, but we must continue to concentrate our efforts on insuring that our individual lodges are successful in our own eyes. Develop a vision for your lodge. Plan activities that help accomplish that vision. Encourage all Master Masons in your lodge to actively work toward the accomplishment of the vision. The result will be continued success for Nebraska Masonry!

NECROLOGY

Service to the fraternity is a privilege offered freely and voluntarily by members who have had the rare distinction to serve as a Grand Master. The knowledge and skill possessed by these members is gratefully acknowledged. When we lose a leader with this experience, the fraternity is never the same again. Fortunately, Masonry continues to inspire and develop future generations of leaders. However, we mourn the loss of the following Master Mason who served as Grand Master of Masons in Nebraska:

The youth of our state are worth the investment of our time, effort, and money. Say "Yes" when approached by our youth and all will benefit!

Nebraska was fortunate to have Brother Jason Wood serve as the DeMolay International Master Councilor and preside at the 33rd DeMolay Congress held in Orlando, Florida. His tenure was marked by a sharp increase in awareness and involvement with DeMolay. The members of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska commend Jason Wood for his efforts.

SHRINE OF NORTH AMERICA DEVELOPMENT

I attended the Shrine of North America's Annual meeting in Boston. The following are my impressions of the events that led to the change in membership requirements for the Shrine. First, let me say that the business session was extremely well orchestrated and efficiently administered. This statement is not to be construed as a criticism of the meeting; instead, it is a simple statement of how an organization should be administered when "change" is on the agenda.

My impression is that the change in membership requirement was accomplished in several distinct steps. First, the case was made that 46 members of the Shrine die every day of every year; therefore, a major problem for the Shrine of North America is the membership numbers. The numbers argument was made not in the vein of more members to provide financial support for the hospitals; but instead, more members are needed to support the labor-intensive programs that are necessary to support the hospitals (i.e., football games, transportation programs, Paper Crusades).

Second, a young woman and former patient of the hospitals made a presentation. She had undergone a series of surgeries to reconstruct her face. The result is a beautiful young woman who is well spoken and very appreciative of the Shrine and its hospital system.

The last point she made in her presentation was that more members are needed to support the hospitals. Again, the numbers argument was made.

Next, the legislative process began. Remember, this is the first day of the session and the first topic on the legislative agenda dealt with the membership requirements. The first piece of legislation was a request to change the membership requirement for a specific Shrine Center. Geography was the issue raised. The case was made that the Shrine Center was located in a remote area; thus, it was difficult to transport people to appropriate locations so that they could easily become a Scottish or York Rite Mason. The plea - give us a break so that we can build our membership base. Let us make a man a Shriner immediately after he becomes a Master Mason. A voice vote was taken and the legislation passed resoundingly.

The next piece of legislation was again a request to change the membership requirements for a specific Shrine Center. This time a problem was cited involving the Scottish Rite. A building shared by the Shrine and the Scottish Rite was the issue. There was the opportunity to sell the building, reportedly at a substantial profit, but the sale was vetoed by the Scottish Rite. Non-cooperation was the problem cited. Let us make a man a Shriner immediately after he becomes a Master Mason was the motion. A voice vote was taken and the legislation passed resoundingly.

The stage was set for the inclusive motion to allow a man to join the Shrine anywhere in North America once he becomes a Master Mason. Throughout the legislative process delegates/representatives with voting rights were allowed to present position papers either for or against a motion. Surprisingly, this piece of legislation had only one position paper presented on the opposition side. A voice vote was again taken. Although not as resounding, perhaps 85 percent for and 15 percent against, the motion passed. Effective at the conclusion of this vote, the sole requirement for membership in a Shrine Temple located in North America is that a man must be a Master Mason.

A break was taken. Immediately after the break, the Imperial Potentate withdrew his motion for a civic/social membership. "Smoke and Mirrors" is my interpretation of the social membership issue. The change in membership requirement to the Master Mason qualification was the agenda for this year! A civic member was never the real issue!

A lesson in how to implement change within an organization is what I have described. As a result, there is a new playing field for the Masonic family. The Scottish Rite, the Shrine of North America, and the York Rite each have identical membership requirements. A man must be a Master Mason to be eligible for membership in each one of these organizations. In my mind the playing field is level. Let us work together to insure the growth of each of these Masonic organizations!

CORNERSTONES AND TEMPLE DEDICATIONS

There are two major public ceremonies under the purview of local lodges-Cornerstones and Masonic Services. The promotion of the Cornerstone Ceremony is a responsibility of the Grand Marshal (Jack Nichols). The effectiveness with which he discharges this responsibility is a direct function of how active local lodges are in working with their communities in promoting this ceremony. Each and every Cornerstone Ceremony originates with a local lodge. This ceremony can be performed for any public structure

erected for educational purposes, religious purposes, or for the administration of justice and free government. During the 2000 year, the Grand Lodge of Nebraska was privileged to perform ten Cornerstone Ceremonies. The date, structure, location, and the lodge coordinating the activities are listed below:

LODGES CONSOLIDATED

If membership declines, develop and use a targeting program to rebuild membership. The Grand Lodge stands ready to assist lodges with their problems. Do not wait until the problems are severe. Early attention to your problems will generally result in a resolution of the problem. I am happy to report that there were no lodge consolidations during the year 2000!

- 2. It shall not be a Masonic offense for an appendant body to sell or dispense intoxicating liquors in a dedicated lodge building so long as such activities do not occur during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body."

Sec. 3-102 - ENUMERATED- Masonic offenses shall consist of but not be limited to:

- (h) The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held provided, however,
- 1. It shall not be a Masonic offense for a Lodge or appendant body to meet in a building not dedicated to Masonic purposes so long as there is no sale or dispensing of intoxicating liquors in the portion of the building which is used for Masonic purposes during a tyled meeting of the lodge.
- 2. It shall not be a Masonic offense for an appendant body to sell or dispense intoxicating liquors in a dedicated lodge building so long as such activities do not occur during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

M∴W∴ Steve Mattoon, Chairman

The Jurisprudence Committee was called to order at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 1, 2001, by Chairman Steven F. Mattoon, with the following members present: Jack H. Hendrix, John M. McHenry, and Dwight E. Smith. Regrettably absent due to health problems was M : W : Harry A. Spencer. Also in attendance were all Grand Lodge Officers, as well as Past Grand Master Jerry Rittenburg.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, the Committee on Jurisprudence met on January 15, 2001, and submitted to the Grand Master an agenda and report fifteen (15) days prior to the opening of the 144th Session of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

We find that the Resolution submitted before the close of the 2000 Session is in proper form, has the proper number of signatures, and may be presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for a vote at this Session.

With regard to the Grand Master's Recommendations, we find all to be in proper form and may be presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska for a ballot at this Session.

The complete revision of bylaws of Frank Welch Lodge No. 75 and McCook Lodge No. 135, having been reviewed by the Committee on Jurisprudence, were duly approved. The bylaws of Zion Lodge No. 234 were also reviewed by the Jurisprudence Committee. The Committee found that Article 7, Section 2, Subparagraph 3, regarding the Endowment Trust Fund is in conflict with Section 2-405 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska entitled "Life Membership and Perpetual Membership" and must be deleted. The Committee advised the Grand Master to contact Zion Lodge No. 234 and discuss options with regard to bequests for life memberships already received, including return of bequests to the member, forwarding the funds to the Grand Lodge for Perpetual memberships or contribution to the Endowment Trust Fund.

All other decisions by the Grand Master we find to be in proper form and within the laws of Masonry in Nebraska, and should be approved.

Chairman Mattoon abstained from any discussion or vote with reference to actions by the Grand Master concerning a member of Frank Welch Lodge No. 75 of which he is also a member.

The Committee then proceeded to elect Steven F. Mattoon as Chairman of the Committee on Jurisprudence and Jack Hendrix as Secretary of the Committee for the ensuing year. The Committee then proceeded to pass a motion commending Most Worshipful Brother James F. Brown, Jr. on his very successful year as Grand Master and commended his year of service to the fraternity.

The Committee on Jurisprudence stands ready and willing to aid and assist your Grand Master and your elected Grand Lodge Officers in any way we can to advise with reference to the laws of this Grand Jurisdiction and to aid our officers in the execution of their office as best we can.

Omit:

"except in an official ceremony of any Masonic lodge or appendant body thereof, in any portion of a lodge building where Masonic activities are held."

Add:

- " except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held provided, however,
- 1. It shall not be a Masonic offense for a Lodge or appendant body to meet in a building not dedicated to Masonic purposes so long as there is no sale or dispensing of intoxicating liquors in the portion of the building which is used for Masonic purposes during a tyled meeting of the lodge.

2. It shall not be a Masonic offense for an appendant body to sell or dispense intoxicating liquors in a dedicated lodge building so long as such activities do not occur during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body."

New:

Sec. 3-102 – ENUMERATED - Masonic offenses shall consist of but not be limited to:

- (h) The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held provided, however,
- 1. It shall not be a Masonic offense for a Lodge or appendant body to meet in a building not dedicated to Masonic purposes so long as there is no sale or dispensing of intoxicating liquors in the portion of the building which is used for Masonic purposes during a tyled meeting of the lodge.
- 2. It shall not be a Masonic offense for an appendant body to sell or dispense intoxicating liquors in a dedicated lodge building so long as such activities do not occur during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body.

Recommendation No. 2

Whereupon the Master shall put the question; "Is the brother proficient?" and this question shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present.

Add: "The candidate has satisfactorily answered the questions in the Standard Proficiency Manual and has completed the required examination in open lodge; "

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Philip A. Lorenzen, Chairman

The Committee on Finance met during the past year to perform the duties of the Committee as outlined in Section 1-318 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. Those duties include a periodic review of the books and records of Grand Lodge following procedures, which included:

- 1. A comparison of canceled checks to the check register including an examination of endorsements to assure proper application of payments.
- 2. Examination of support documents including invoices, expense records and other evidences of obligations to ensure proper payment was made.
- 3. Review of accounts to which items were charged selecting all items in excess of \$500 and randomly reviewing other disbursements of lesser dollar amounts.
- Review of the monthly bank statement reconciliations to verify the accuracy of bank statement reconciliations.
- 5. Review of income items including lodge assessments.
- 6. Review of Perpetual Membership and Scholarship accounts.
- 7. Discussion and review of monthly financial statements.

Following the close of each calendar year, the books and records of the Grand Lodge are reviewed through customary audit procedures by independent certified accountants who prepare and deliver their audit report to the Grand Lodge.

Revenues for calendar year 2000 totaled \$436,341.39, while the budget planned revenues at \$438,419.87, resulting in actual revenues being \$2,078.48 less than budgeted. On the expense side, few line items were greater than budgeted expenses. Overall, in compliance with Grand Lodge policies and procedures, no overall category of expenditure was in excess of budgeted amounts. The Grand Lodge operated in accordance with policies and maintained expenditures within budgeted appropriations. Total expenditures in 2000 were budgeted at \$438,415.22, an amount only \$4.65 less than budgeted income. Actual expenditures equaled \$433,914.65 in 2000, \$4,500.57 under budget.

The Finance Committee found satisfactory verification for all expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and was able to complete its auditing and review process in a timely manner thanks to the well maintained files and help and assistance provided by Chris Rudder as the Office Manager and the staff of the Grand Lodge office. The Committee reviews all expenditures for travel and other related

expenses incurred by Grand Lodge officers in performing their duties on behalf of the Grand Lodge. It was found that such expenses were properly documented and accounted for with receipts and other appropriate verification of such expenses being on file in the Grand Lodge office.

On behalf of the Grand Lodge, a thank you is extended by the Chairman to each Committee Member for your service and attention to detail in reviewing the financial activity of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

REPORT OF THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

These reports, of necessity, must be limited to a few of the high points in the happenings of the year. There is no room for the many small doings, such as re-tube the boilers, repair an outdoor drainway which was washing out, provide access to the auditorium for the handicapped and upgrade the computer system.

Among our more significant happenings is installation of the George Washington animated figure in the Memorial, near Assembly Hall thanks to the generosity of the

Supreme Council, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction. The kids love him. When you push a button, he stands up and delivers a Masonic message.

Other major improvements continue to be made at the Memorial. One of the most evident is a new irrigation system to water the grass and flowers on the grounds. As a result, we present a better-looking face to the world than ever before.

One of the largest projects undertaken is completion of modernization of the elevators, which are quite unique, in that they rise through the building at an angle. They are forty feet apart in Memorial Hall and ten feet apart in the Tall Cedars room in the top of the tower. Otis Elevator Company has the contract. Mr. Otis himself designed it.

Another major project is refurbishing of the George Washington Museum. The museum was furnished by the Scottish Rite Supreme Councils of the United States, Northern and Southern Jurisdictions. It was completed in the early 1960's and, because of lack of finances, was neglected through much of the 1990's. We are very fortunate that the Supreme Councils are offering to redo the museum, including rearrangement and updating of the displays, new lighting and redecorating. The Southern Jurisdiction has engaged Chris White Design to do a proposal for the work. This has just been completed and will be submitted to the two Supreme Councils and to our members at the annual meeting for their final approval. For its part, the Association has hired a curator to work with the designer and then be in charge of the museum and its exhibits. He is Stephen Patrick, a Mason who specializes in the eighteenth century. He has a Masters Degree in History Museum Studies.

It is estimated that the project, including rearranging and modernizing the exhibits, will cost approximately \$200,000.00. We are most grateful to the Scottish Rite Supreme Councils, Northern and Southern Jurisdictions for making this improvement possible.

One thing which will be of special interest is the Grand Lodge Month program. Each Grand Lodge is featured for a month. An exhibit is displayed at the Memorial to feature and honor the particular state and the State flag is flown over the Memorial. At the State's next Grand Lodge Session, the flag will be presented. Of course the more the Grand Lodge helps, the better the State exhibit will be. Since the program commenced on January 1, 2000, Nebraska's month should be January 2003.

Twenty percent of the Grand Lodges have followed Nebraska's lead and passed a fifty cents per-capita contribution to the Memorial. The new President, M.W. Paul Ellis has indicated that he will start a new program to convince more Grand Lodges to pass the per-capita contribution. We are thankful for the Grand Lodges who have passed this and hope there are many more which will follow suit when they remember their duty.

The Grand Lodge office staff has been in their new office for a full calendar year, during which time many interesting activities have transpired. In 2000 the Nebraska Grand Lodge Masonic Education Committee, at the request of the Grand Master, presented a list of five books that are recommended reading for Nebraska Masons. The ensuing purchases from Macoy's were impressive to Macoy's, but even more to the committee. Most of the books recommended were sold out early Saturday morning. Hopefully, these books didn't end up on dusty shelves. This recommended reading list will again appear in 2001 and will be announced at the Masonic Education Breakfast. However, if you didn't get the 2000 list, it will also be available.

As stated above, the Masonic Education Breakfast is alive and well. The committee has received positive response to the programs. At the 2000 Breakfast, more Nebraska Masons showed their interest in Masonic Education. Combining the talents of Thomas Hauder, Larry Jacobsen and John Parsons have produced an education presentation unequaled in Nebraska. The future is limited only to the size of the room.

In 2000 the Nebraska Grand Lodge Masonic Education Committee sponsored symposiums in May and October. In May we played Masonic Jeopardy, and in October we asked the question, "Would you like to be a Masonic Millionaire?" These symposiums were presented in four locations each time. Expanding to more locations is desired, but volunteers are needed. Attendance is improving, but could be better. The 2001 symposium dates will be announced at the Masonic Education Breakfast.

2000 must be described as a year of progress and excitement for the Masonic Youth Committee. This year, four \$1,000 scholarships rather than three \$750 scholarships were awarded. The Grand Lodge also approved the expenditure of \$1,000 towards the purchase of a laptop computer for Nebraska's first International Master Councilor, Jason Wood. The four scholarship award winners were: Erin Epley, Fullerton, winner of the Grand Master's Scholarship (new in 2000) and a member of Rainbow; Amy Jensen, Nebraska City, representing Job's Daughters; Kristin Broyhill, Dakota City, representing Rainbow; and Ryan Ocken, Alliance, representing DeMolay. Each recipient was an outstanding example of our youth leadership. They represented a group of twenty-seven excellent applicants for Grand Lodge Masonic Youth Scholarships. Our budget request for 2001 again includes awarding four \$1,000 scholarships.

Giant steps were taken in promoting a Nebraska Masonic Youth Leadership Weekend at a meeting held at the Grand Lodge office on November 19, 2000. Lunch was served courtesy of the Grand Lodge. Many adult and youth leaders representing Rainbow, Job's, DeMolay, Eastern Star and the Grand Lodge were in attendance. The planning session resulted in the following significant decisions being reached. First, the date and place of the leadership weekend will be September 28 and 29, 2002 at the Kearney Holiday Inn and related facilities, thanks in large part to the future adult leaders of Job's Daughters, Mary Louise Gillispie and Gene Wehrbein who gave up their workshop weekend in order to make the Kearney facilities available. Grand Lodge has signed a contract for the location

REPORT OF THE MASONIC-EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

Charles E. "Ched" House, President, Board of Directors

I am indeed privileged to be involved with your Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children at Fremont, and reporting to the Grand Lodge on the condition of the wonderful campus and those involved with its operation. Ben Harvey and his dedicated staff have the daily task of making a fine home, in which the children, currently ranging in age from 11 to 18, live, work and play. The children attend public school, some holding part time jobs. They work in their 4-H Club with a calf and lamb to care for and show, as well as other projects, which they choose. All have their respective homework, do household chores, help part time with yard work and clean up, and still have leisure time for themselves. The house parents each have a van to take their children to special events and wherever else they need to be, much as you as parents do for your children. Do these sound like normal home activities to you? That's what we wish it to be. All of this activity takes planning and direction, and the staff does a wonderful job of making it look easy.

We have had a rather high rate of resident turnover in recent history, and we are implementing a highly recommended houseparents-training program, which we believe, will cut down on turnover and increase our rate of retention. We have the facility that is second to none, and using it to its fullest capacity has always been our goal, but a difficult one to attain. We currently have a census of 26, but that is a retention of about half the number who is admitted. The processing of admissions takes a lot of staff time and effort, which could be directed to other duties. We anticipate higher than normal

turnover in houseparents during this training period, but we hope this does not occur. We have to have good houseparents to have good results with the children. Ben has been working with the Board for more than a year, and we believe that the program we chose is the right one and will bring us the results we desire.

When you come to the Achievement Day program the third Sunday in August, you will be so proud to see and use the new Alumni Picnic Shelter complete with its own kitchen and restrooms, located near the Administration Building, as you enjoy your barbecue meal. We have talked for years about building such a facility, but it was always put on the bottom of the list of important things to do.

Nebraska Masons have been very generous with their gifts and bequests to the Home over the 85 years at its current location and we take special care of these greatly appreciated funds. I speak for the devoted members of the Board, the staff and children, when I say THANK YOU from the bottom of our collective hearts. Your support and their hard work makes our Home Family continue to thrive and grow and you should be proud to know that you had a very important part in this great endeavor - truly a wonderful example of Masonry at work.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF LAW

Lester R. Seiler, Chairman

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 1, Section 3-102, Recommendation No. 2, Section 2-402, Recommendation No. 3, Section 2-310, and Recommendation No. 6, Section 2-512 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws are amended to read as follows:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1

Section 3-102-ENUMERATED-Masonic offenses shall consist of but not be limited to:

(h) The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held provided, however,

- It shall not be a Masonic offense for a Lodge or appendant body to meet in a building not dedicated to Masonic purposes so long as there is no sale or dispensing of intoxicating liquors in the portion of the building which is used for Masonic purposes during a tyled meeting of the lodge.
- 2. It shall not be a Masonic offense for an appendant body to sell or dispense intoxicating liquors in a dedicated lodge building so long as such activities do not occur during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2

Section 2-402 - PROFICIENCY - All those hereinafter initiated, passed, and raised, shall become proficient in each degree, and shall give proof thereof by examination in open lodge. Such examination shall consist of:

- Completion of a study of the Standard Proficiency Manual following each degree received.
- Verification by the Worshipful Master that the candidate has expressed knowledge of the material in the manual by answering, in his own words, the questions listed for the degree in which he is being examined.
- 3. Successful completion by the candidate of an examination in open lodge, consisting of answering questions from the First Section Lectures of the degrees as follows:

E.A. Degree - Starting with the words, "Give me a sign" and ending with giving of the "word."

F.C. Degree - Starting with the words, "Have you any signs..." and continuing to the end of the lecture.

M.M. Degree - Starting with the words, "Have you any signs..." and continuing to the end of the lecture.

No other Proficiency Examination shall be recognized in this Grand Jurisdiction. After such examination, the Master may declare the brother proficient. Such declaration and the recording of the proficiency of the brother shall be made in the degree in which the examination is made, providing no objection is raised; if objection is made and it becomes necessary to put the questions to a vote the ballot shall be determined in a lodge of Master Masons. Whereupon the Master shall put the question: "The candidate has satisfactorily answered the questions in the Standard Proficiency Manual and has completed the required examination in open lodge; is the brother proficient?" and this question shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present.

When a candidate for advancement fails to pass a satisfactory examination, the Master may direct him to become proficient and again present himself for examination.

Examination of all those hereinafter raised to the degree of Master Mason shall be had not later than ninety days following the conferring of said degree, but the lodge may for good cause shown extend the time, but not for more than six months after the degree is conferred; provided, that the Grand Master may extend the time for good cause shown. When a Master Mason has complied with the provisions of this section, a diploma shall be issued by the subordinate lodge of which he is a member, on the form prescribed by Grand Lodge.

An unaffiliated Master Mason in good standing in the Fraternity is entitled to be instructed and examined in any lodge as to his proficiency in the degree of a Master Mason, and upon being found proficient, this fact should be certified to the lodge electing him to membership.

Provided, that in exceptional cases, for good cause shown, the Grand Master may waive the provisions of this section.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3

Section 2-310 - DUTIES OF SECRETARIES - The Secretary of each chartered subordinate lodge shall, in addition to the usual duties incident to such office, include in his minutes the reports of committees on petitions and a record of the names of all persons rejected, suspended and expelled. He shall make all proper certificates of the standing of a Brother of his lodge upon proper request made by the Brother himself, or by any Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, or any regular Masonic body. Upon receipt of a petition for membership in his lodge, he shall at once pass the fee accompanying the same into the funds of the lodge as provided in Section 2-606. He shall obtain regular vouchers for, and report to the Treasurer, all sums appropriated for his own compensation or incidental expenses, and shall not retain them from funds received by him.

The Secretary shall also prepare monthly reports of statistical information of his lodge, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary, and shall forward such reports to the Grand Secretary not later than the 10th day of each following month. The Secretary shall also prepare an annual report giving additional information relative to his lodge on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such annual report on or before the 10th day of February following the close of each year. The Secretary shall also prepare an application for the Rock Maul Award, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such application to the Grand Secretary not later than the 15th day of November of each calendar year.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6

Section 2-513 - BYLAWS - Each chartered subordinate lodge may enact bylaws for its own government, provided the same are not inconsistent with the constitution and bylaws of this Grand Lodge, or with the fundamental principles of Freemasonry. No bylaw shall be valid until approved by the Grand Lodge or Grand Master. No bylaw or amendment thereto shall be adopted until a written proposal thereof shall have been presented at some previous regular meeting of the lodge. After adoption three certified copies thereof, with the amended section, if any, shall be forwarded to the Grand Secretary, two of which shall be retained by him, and the other returned to the lodge with an endorsement of action taken thereon. Every member of a subordinate lodge must sign its bylaws.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Section 2-601 - DUES AND ASSESSMENTS - Chartered subordinate lodges shall have discretionary power to assess annual dues and special assessments upon its members who are Master Masons in good standing. Such dues and assessments shall be uniform upon such members. The amount of the annual dues shall include Grand Lodge dues and shall be designated in the bylaws. Special assessments may be made payable in installments.

A brother desiring to demit shall be required to pay dues only for the time he is a member of the lodge, that is, to the end of the month in which he is demitted, but he shall be required to pay in full all special assessments.

A subordinate lodge's floating debt does not rest pro-rata on its members until so assessed. The dues owed by members to a lodge cannot be offset against any debts owed by the lodge to said members, except with the consent of the delinquent members.

Each lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April, for each initiation during the preceding calendar year, the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and the sum of Fourteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$14.50) as per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2001 with an automatic dues increase in the amount of \$1.00 per year for the next four years, and for each member. The Grand Lodge shall use \$.50 of the per capita tax for the publication and distribution of a Masonic education newsletter to each member. In addition thereto, in the case of reinstatement of suspended members, the per capita tax for the year of suspension shall be paid to the Grand Lodge with the annual report for the calendar year of reinstatement. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. Each subordinate lodge shall collect and transmit to the Grand Lodge with its annual returns the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each Master Mason affiliating therewith during the year covered by these returns; provided, that this shall not apply to any Master Mason in good standing at the time he presents his petition for affiliation.

By the phrase "good standing" is meant one who has affiliated within one year after receiving his demit.

The amount due the Grand Lodge may be sent in at any time between March 31 and April 5, and the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall add as a penalty One Cent (\$.01) per day for each member on the rolls as shown in the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge, to all lodges that neglect to send in their returns complete to the Grand Lodge as provided by Section 2-310, and pay their indebtedness to the Grand Lodge by the 10th of April. When the completed returns of any subordinate lodge shall not have been received by the Grand Lodge Office Committee by April 20, the Grand Master shall be notified of that fact, and the Grand Master shall, by himself, the Grand Custodian or a Deputy Grand Custodian, or some other brother appointed by the Grand Master, make personal investigations of such lodge, and secure returns as complete as may be, and the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall charge, upon the books of the Grand Lodge, the expenses of such visitation, to the lodge, unless the Grand Master be satisfied that good reason existed for such delay, shall order otherwise.

All settlements shall be made in accordance with the account of the Grand Lodge Office Committee, which shall base the same upon the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge. Unaffiliated brethren formerly belonging to lodges now extinct shall affiliate with a recognized lodge of Masons within one year of the date their lodge became extinct, and if no affiliation is received by the Grand Lodge, said brethren shall be considered suspended for non-payment of dues.

Section 1-406 - ALLOCATION OF FUNDS - The per capita tax of Fourteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$14.50) shall be divided as follows:

To the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children	\$.50
To the George Washington Masonic National Memorial	\$.50
To the Nebraska Masonic Home	\$2.00
To the General Fund	\$11.00
To the Masonic Education Newsletter	\$.50

The Initiation Fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and all affiliation fees shall be allocated to the General Fund.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Amend Section 3-102 as follows:

Existing Language:

Section 3-102 – ENUMERATED – Masonic offenses shall consist of, but not be limited to:

- (h) The dispensing or sale of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held provided, however,
 - It shall not be a Masonic offense for a Lodge or appendant body to meet in a building not dedicated to Masonic purposes so long as there is no sale or dispensing of intoxicating liquors in the portion of the building which is used for Masonic purposes during a tyled meeting of the Lodge.
 - 2. It shall not be a Masonic offense for an appendant body to sell or dispense intoxicating liquors in a dedicated lodge building so long as

such activities do not occur during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body.

Proposed Language:

Eliminate all of subparagraph (h).

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Amend Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS – paragraph three as follows:

Existing Language:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge...the sum of Thirteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$13.50) as a per capita tax...

Proposed Language:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge...the sum of Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) as a per capita tax...

Note: Codification will require an amendment also to Section 1-406 – Allocation of Funds, to change from \$13.50 to \$20.00 and General Fund from \$10.00 to \$16.50.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Part I, Chapter II, of the Bylaws to be amended as follows:

At the end of Chapter II, add a new section 1-204:

"Emeritus Officers of the Grand Lodge:

Any Brother who has served as Grand Secretary or Grand Custodian of the Grand Lodge for a period of ten or more years shall be given the title of Grand Secretary Emeritus or Grand Custodian Emeritus as applicable. On receiving the Emeritus title, the Brother shall be awarded a distinctive apron by the Grand Lodge, and the Brother shall be recognized as a Grand Officer Emeritus. This title shall be honorary only and shall not entitle the holder to any of the authority granted the regular Grand Lodge Officers.

The Roll of Deputy Grand Custodians
And Date of Appointment

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869.

In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment.
