

Masonic History of the 143rd Grand Master

Russell G. Reno

Russ Reno was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in Alliance Lodge No. 183 on March 24, 1977. After moving to Lincoln, he joined Cotner Lodge No. 297 in 1990, where he served as Master in 2002. He also is a member of Lancaster Lodge No. 54 in Lincoln, and is a charter member of Tabula Rasa Lodge No. 332 in Lincoln and Sts. John Lodge of Education No. 331.

In February 2003, he was appointed Grand Chaplain by Most Worshipful Brother Kenneth D. Beebe, followed by appointments as Grand Junior Deacon in 2004 by Grand Master Les Seiler and Grand Senior Deacon in 2005 by Grand Master Ivan A. Vrtiska. He was elected Grand Junior Warden under the direction of Grand Master Scott J. Krieger, Sr. in 2006, Grand Senior Warden under the direction of Grand Master Dean F. Skokan in 2007 and Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect under the direction of Grand Master Reginald S. Kuhn in 2008.


Russ is a past chairman and member of the Grand Lodge Public Relations Committee from 1988-2004, and chairman of chaperones at the Masonic All-Star Marching Band in 2003. He received the DeMolay Mason of the Year Award in 1998.

Additional Masonic-related memberships:

- Joined the Alliance Valley of the Scottish Rite in 1977, and affiliated with the Lincoln Valley in 1988.
- Joined Sesostris Shrine in Lincoln in 1988. Past director (1990-1993), past president (1994-1995) and member of Ritualistic Divan.
- Became a Royal Arch Mason and member of Capstone Chapter No. 64, a Cryptic Mason and member of Lincoln Council No. 4 and a Knight Templar and member of Mount Moriah Commandery No. 4 in 2004.
- Past Associate Bethel Guardian of Job's Daughters Bethel No. 63 in Lincoln from 1988-1993. He was elected Associate Grand Guardian in 1996-1997, and is a recipient of the International H.I.K.E. Board's Volunteer Award.
- Initiated into Omaha Chapter No. 19, National Sojourners in 2004. He also was initiated into Joseph Warren Camp, Heroes of '76 in 2007.

His family has been active in the Masonic family as well. His wife, Julie, is a Past Grand Guardian of Job's Daughters and a recipient of the Royal Purple Degree. Julie is a Past Honored Queen of St. Paul Bethel No. 71, and Past Guardian of Bethel No. 3 Alliance and Bethel No. 5 Lincoln. She is a member of Naphis Temple No. 66 of the Daughters of the Nile.

Daughters Heather Younger and Natalie Kent are Past Honored Queens of Job's Daughters Bethel No. 63, Lincoln, and both earned the Lily of the Valley Award, and Heather received the Royal Purple Degree and is a Past Guardian of Bethel No. 63. The two sisters are members of Naphis Temple of the Daughters of the Nile. Natalie is a member of Beulah Chapter No. 40, Order of Eastern Star in Norfolk. Natalie and Heather also served as Sweethearts of Dr. Frederick Eiche DeMolay Chapter in Lincoln. Son-inlaw Erik Younger is a member of Lancaster Lodge No. 54 and Sesostris Shrine.

Masonic History of the 144th Grand Master

John T. Parsons

John T. Parsons was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in George W. Lininger Lodge No. 268, Omaha, on November 25, 1975. While serving overseas in the Air Force from 1977 to 1980, he affiliated with Okinawa Lodge No. 118, under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of the Philippines, and served as Junior and Senior Warden. While serving in Korea in 1983, he affiliated with Harry S. Truman Lodge No. 1727, chartered by the Grand Lodge of Scotland. Upon his return to Nebraska, he passed through the chairs in Lininger Lodge, serving as its Master in 1992. He also became a dual member of Papillion Lodge No. 39 in 1986.

John joined Florence Chapter No. 61 Royal Arch Masons, Omaha Council No. 1 Cryptic Masons, and Mt. Calvary Commandery No. 1 Knights Templar in 1976. While on Okinawa, he became a dual member of the Okinawa York Rite Bodies, under the jurisdiction of the Grand York Rite of the Philippines. He served as High Priest of Okinawa Chapter No. 14 in 1979 and Commander of Okinawa Commandery No. 2 in 1978, and retains a life membership in those bodies. In 1985, he served as Illustrious Master of Omaha Council No. 1.

John served as Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Nebraska in 2003, the Most Illustrious Master of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons in Nebraska in 1997, and the North Central Regional Deputy General Grand Master for the General Grand Council of Cryptic Masons, International, from 1999-2002.

He joined the Omaha Valley Scottish Rite in the spring of 1976. He served as Venerable Master of the Omaha Consistory in 1994 and was named a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 1995. He was coroneted a 33rd Degree Inspector General Honorary in 1999. He is the director for the 31st Degree team, and is a member of the 33rd Degree team. He has served on the Omaha Valley Cathedral Board since 2001, and is the editor for the Omaha Valley News.

John joined Tangier Shrine in 1976, and is a member of Crescent Shrine Club, Ritual Divan, and Legion of Honor. He was initiated into Omaha Court No. 19, Royal Order of Jesters, in 1996.

John and his wife Pauline were initiated into Trinity Chapter No. 299, Order of the Eastern Star in 1976. John served as Worthy Patron in 1988 and again in 1989, while Pauline served as Worthy Matron in 1989.

John is a member of and has presided over numerous other Masonic bodies. He was initiated into Okinawa Chapter No. 264, National Sojourners in 1977, and into Joseph Warren Camp Heroes of '76 later that year. He served as chapter president in 1978 and as Camp Commander in 1979. He is now a member of Omaha Chapter No. 19, and served as its president in 1982. He is a Past Sovereign of Coeur de Lion Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Past Prior of Sir Galahad Priory, Knights of the York Cross of Honour; Past Prior of Sangre de Christo Tabernacle, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests; Past Sovereign Master of Sneh Bo' Aire Council, Allied Masonic Degrees, and the Royal Order of Scotland.

John was appointed Grand Historian by Most Worshipful Brother Kenneth G. Fleming in 1997, and served eight years in that capacity. He was appointed Grand Junior Deacon in 2005 by Grand Master Ivan A. Vrtiska; Grand Senior Deacon in 2006 by Grand Master

Scott J. Krieger, Sr.; elected Grand Junior Warden in 2007 under the direction of Grand Master Dean F. Skokan; elected Grand Senior Warden in 2008 under the direction of Grand Master Reginald S. Kuhn; and was elected Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect in 2009 under the direction of Grand Master Russ Reno. John was installed as the 144th Grand Master of the Most Worshipful, the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, on February 14, 2010, at the Scottish Rite Masonic Center in Omaha.

DEMOLAY SPONSORING BODY OF THE YEAR AWARD AND THE MASON OF THE YEAR AWARD

State Senior Councilor Cameron Daiss and State Junior Councilor Dalton Kock presented the awards for DeMolay Mason of the Year and Sponsoring Body of the Year.

DeMolay Mason of the Year Award was presented to Kent Broyhill, Past Master of Omadi Lodge No. 5, South Sioux City. W∴B∴ Broyhill is a successful businessman, leader in his industry and an innovative Mason with initiative and commitment to blue lodge, other Masonic bodies, Masonic youth, and in fact, all youth. He is a leader in his community and served as a leader of his industry's professional group on a statewide basis, which included advocating before the Nebraska Legislature. In the 15 years since he began working with Masonic youth, he served as an adult leader of Lynn Brohill Assembly No. 12, and is active on the state level as well. His leadership resulted in imaginative activities and garnered him tremendous support from parents and members. To many of the members, he became a real dad to them for his work. He received the state's highest honor and continues as an ambassador for the group. But that wasn't the extent of his service to Masonic youth. GRAND ORATION

Patrick D. Barger, Grand Orator

Most Worshipful Grand Master, brethren, and family. Greetings! As has been the custom of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska's Annual Communication for many years, it is my honor to stand before you as Grand Orator to share my thoughts concerning our mutual horizon through the success of the Masonic year we bring to a close and the enthusiasm for the one about to embark. As you know, and have been reminded of several times this morning, Grand Master Russ Reno crafted a roadmap for the 2009 Masonic year entitled, "Freemasonry: Values in Action." My interpretation of his use of the word "values" includes not only his reference to Masonic ethics and beliefs, but also to the fundamental principles of Masonry we deem of significant value and which we put into action. In keeping with the Grand Master's theme, let's take a moment to review the common characteristics of things people value.

I'm sure we can agree very few of the things we value in life came easily. I'm not referring to your worldly possessions, but I'm referring to the success stories of your life, such as your family, your health, or your country itself. Only in rare cases did any of us stumble upon something of great value by waiting around for it to come to us.

Masonry is also an experience of tremendous value, the success of which we shouldn't hope to stumble upon by waiting around for it to come to us. You are here today because you value Masonry as a way of life. Grand Master Russ Reno's theme was firmly grounded on those values of Masonry that transcend time. The greatest and most enduring ideals of man are those that use our fundamental Masonic principles to clarify the mysteries of life. They transcend all ages and have been interpreted over the centuries to apply to the problems of the time. Because of our preceding brothers' labor upon the grand edifice that is the Masonic way of life they valued so much, as well as our own labors in that respect, we are able to provide Masonic charity to the stranger, the fatherless, the widow, and many who are less fortunate than we are. It also teaches us to use the common gavel of Masonry to break off the corners of our individual rough ashlars to transform them into one as perfect as we can make it here on earth. When it's all said and done, Masonry helps reassure us of the significant value of our own lives.

In Speculative Masonry, our wages are not earned in coin. They are the internal rewards earned through acts of kindness, good deeds, and the gift of our time and effort to others. It's no accident that our ancient brethren's hard labor of building with stone is the metaphor through which Masonry's instruction is imparted to us. Nor is it by chance that he who seeks the degrees of Masonry is repeatedly tested for his willingness to proceed further. And if he is to be a Mason, he will, because Masonry, even at its most fundamental stages of initiation, is a gift he values and desires to put into action.

Through the allegory of Masonry, each Master Mason becomes an architect. Each supervises the spiritual contribution and construction of his own "house not made with hands." Each builds into the structure of his soul the values of beauty, harmony, and knowledge. 2009 was underscored by the tenets of Masonry to build upon the ideals we value that established and sustained our beloved fraternity generation after generation. When faced with the challenges of modern society and the worldwide decline Masonry has sadly experienced in the last 50 years, we cannot afford to scale back our personal commitment to its value. If we do, the fraternity would surely face indisputable extinction.

So, we prepare to close the 2009 trestle board our Grand Master designed for a successful Masonic Year that through your hard work, helped ensure the future value of our beloved fraternity! Likewise, we prepare to launch the 2010 Masonic Year Deputy Grand Master John Parsons has masterfully crafted for our labors. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

Bruce A. Watkins, 300

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A∴F∴ & A∴M∴ of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge. The committee further recommends:

- The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.
 Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the
- East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.
- Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.
- Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.
- No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.
- Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated
- When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decision and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak.

Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time

permitting, other brothers may speak after which a vote will be taken. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret ballot or other method at his discretion.

Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary moved approval, and the motion was seconded and passed.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS – OPENING OF THE BALLOT

M∴W∴ Reno declared the ballot for the Election of Officers open. He gave instructions for the proper balloting process. Delegates could choose to either write in the names of the officers for whom they wished to vote, or could check the box advancing all officers. The checkbox would result in a vote to retain the Grand Secretary and advance the current Grand Junior Deacon to Grand Senior Deacon, advance the Grand Senior Deacon to Grand Junior Warden, advance the Grand Junior Warden to Grand Senior Warden, and advance the current Grand Senior Warden to Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect. M∴W∴ Reno noted that only one option could be used. If ballots are received with names written in, as well as the box for advancement checked, the ballot will not be counted. Ballots should be placed in the ballot box at the back of the lodge room and the ballot will remain open for about one hour, at which time the ballot will be declared closed and turned over to the tellers for proper counting.

M∴W∴ Reno asked all Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska to retire with the Grand Marshal to form a procession to be received by the Grand Lodge.

TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF MUTUAL RECOGNITION WITH THE PRINCE HALL GRAND LODGE OF NEBRASKA

The brethren present from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska were asked to come forward. M:W: Reno explained that this year marked the twentieth anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska becoming the first grand jurisdictions to enter into mutual recognition, thus setting the benchmark for others to follow. M:W: Reno asked Eric Critchlow, Grand Master, to bring greetings from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska. Plaques were exchanged between the two Grand Masters commemorating the anniversary, reading "The Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska F: & A:M: and the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A:F: & A:M: celebrating our twentieth anniversary of recognition, February 1990 to February 2010. – We led the way."

Following the exchange of plaques, two brothers who were instrumental in orchestrating the joint recognition, M : W : Charlie Amidon and M : W : Edward Medlin, were asked to come forward. Charlie took the microphone:

"Tom Tye said 'It's time to recognize Prince Hall.' And, he appointed a committee of three from our grand lodge. I was fortunate to be on that, with Don Pohlman, and Jim DeMoss. And, the Prince Hall picked out Ed Medlin and Wright Robinson and Don Moore as their representatives. Here's what we came up with and I'm going to tell you how we arrived at it. That committee met during the summer of 1989 at the Omaha Home for Boys board room. That first meeting we walked in there and it was like UMW and General Motors. Whose ox is going to get gored first, you know, or it might have been like Martin Luther King sitting at one side of the table and George Wallace on the other. It wasn't quite that bad. But there was that little bit of, you know, who wants to putt here. And, we talked and talked and after about four meetings, we came up with this resolution. We finally said, 'Let's quit horsing around and let's do it the right way.' And here's what we said, and if you were here, you saw this, and if you weren't, it's in the 1990 Proceedings.

Inasmuch as the Committee on Fraternal Relations in this Grand Jurisdiction has in this report recommended the approval of a resolution to recognize the Prince Hall Grand Lodge F : & A : M : of Nebraska, I do hereby recommend and ask for a favorable adoption of the following resolution.

WHEREAS, the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge F : & A : M : Of Nebraska, Incorporated, has existed in the state of Nebraska since 1919, and in America since 1775, and does profess the same Masonic principles and ideals of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge <math>A : F : & A : M : Of Nebraska, and

WHEREAS, both Grand Lodges desire to remain autonomous within themselves and operating hereafter as herebefore with their own Grand Master, rules and regulations, lodges and membership, and

WHEREAS, both Grand Lodges desire to fraternally recognize the other as a duly constituted Masonic lodge within the state of Nebraska,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that it is mutually agreed by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of

Nebraska and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge $F :: \& A :: M :: of Nebraska on this 3^{rd}$ day of February, A :: D :: , 1990, and we will dwell together in peace and harmony, and each does hereby extend their solid fraternal recognition to the other as a duly constituted Grand Lodge of Masons within the state of Nebraska. And in the spirit and brotherly love, relief and truth, hereby accord to the other wheresoever assembled all Masonic rights appertaining, subject always to the rights, powers and authority of the Grand Masters, and the Masters of the constituent lodges to preside over their respective Grand Lodges and lodges.

It's a lot of words, but brethren, you started the landslide around the United States. Correct me, (Deputy Grand Master) John (Parsons), we're up to over 40 now, aren't we, of grand jurisdictions who've joined Nebraska? I think it's going to take another 150 years to fill in those few 9 or 10 that we're short, but we've got the time and we'll do it. Since that time we've had many, many wonderful associations between the two. After this went on the floor of the Grand Lodge, we voted on it and as soon as the vote was taken, I took off for my motel room and I called up my counterpart, Ed Medlin, standing here, from their Grand Lodge. They met by special arrangements at exactly the same time we did and voted on this issue. And I said, 'Ed, we got our vote.' He said, 'Don't tell me what it is. We're voting right now, I'll call you back.' So I said, 'Okay, when you call back we're going to record this.' Now, if you were here, you heard this; if you were not here, you're going to hear it now, that original conversation between Ed Medlin and me."

Charlie: Grand Lodge, Ed Medlin please, Charlie Amidon calling.

Ed: This is Ed Medlin.

Charlie: Ed, have you, are you ready to talk?

Ed: I am very pleased and happy and ready to talk.

Charlie: Okay, now what I wanna do is read you a kind of a formal statement and then I'd ask you to respond in kind...

Ed: All right.

Charlie: When I'm finished, and we are tape recording this.

Ed: Yes, we are taping this also.

Charlie: Okay. Most Worshipful Edward F. Medlin, we wish to report that during its 133rd Annual Communication at 10:32 a.m., February 3, 1990, M∴W∴ Thomas W. Tye, Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, placed the mutually drawn resolution to extend full recognition to the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, Incorporated, on the floor of the Grand Lodge for a show of hands vote. We are pleased to report the result of the voting was almost unanimously affirmative. Therefore, on behalf of the Most Worshipful, the Grand Lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, and assuming your grand lodge is mutually agreeable, we extend to you, the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, Incorporated, our fraternal hand of fellowship. May our mutual concern for our fellow man be the beginning of a never-ending, but always

expanding, respect for the principles and tenets of our beloved fraternity. And we are very proud to make that announcement, Ed.

Ed: Brother Amidon, hearing the resolution as presented by you to me, and the results of your grand lodge, I am happy to say that as of about 10:20, our Grand Master, Normal C. Hall, placed on the floor of this Grand Lodge, the same vote concerning that resolution as you stated, and by unanimous consent, and by a standing vote, passed this Grand Lodge with great pleasure by all of the brothers in reference.

Charlie: That is wonderful news Worshipful Brother Ed, and we will immediately report this to the Grand Lodge and we will play our responses to all of the delegates assembled.

Ed: We are very happy about this occasion.'

M : W : Norman Hall took the podium to say a few words:

"I think most scholars, Masonic scholars would agree that Masonry is a progressive science. I think most Masons would agree to a generally accepted definition of Masonry described as a beautiful system of morality veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols. I think that definition has been derived from the tenets of the institution, friendship, morality and brotherly love which supports that definition. We as a people are a product of our society and the cultures for which we all come from. We are familiar with the culture of the United States and its history, but when we became Masons and you look at the tenets of the institution...(change of recording tape)...individual thinking against that proposition, we have to make a choice and a decision.

We celebrate 20 years, but we should be celebrating thirty, because the process and conversation began in '79 with Grand Master Robinson, and I think Grand Master Jenkins of your Grand Lodge. It took ten years for it to progress to the point where we agreed to this resolution, and I happened to be Grand Master at the time in either '84 or '85 when we had our first meeting at Macio's Restaurant in Omaha, Nebraska when all of the Grand Lodge Officers, you couldn't come together with us as formally, so we had to do it informally, and we had a great meeting, and that started the process. And then at the particular time in history when the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A:F: & A:M: and the Prince Hall family had leadership that was progressive enough, and it takes the leadership, you can't do it without it, to make this decision, at the time the decision was made, you can imagine the turmoil that it created. Connecticut had just started with a partial recognition. Nebraska, in our debates, we finished off saying 'no partial, we're gonna do it complete.' We were ostracized and everything happened contrary to some of the brothers. I know we took a lot of heat, and you'd be surprised at some of the heat we took.

I'll be done in just one minute, Grand Master. (laughter) I just wanted to tell you that what happened in Nebraska at that time, we were the first, as you heard, but you never know the consequences of a decision made until after time has passed that the ripple of it can manifest itself in different ways and if you think about what the Grand Master just said, we did 20 years ago, everybody was kicking it, but now 20 years later we have 40 others. That's progress. That's a progressive movement, and as time will deal with us personally, Masonry will still be what it

is. The tenets are not going to change, but when we abide by the tenets, we will change."

The Masons assembled applauded and gave a standing ovation to the presentation. M : W : Reno expressed his thanks to the Prince Hall Masons for their attendance.

The Nebraska Masonic Foundation held its annual meeting Thursday, February 4, which was attended by the Grand Lodge Officers and interested brethren. The following matters were considered and acted on at the annual meeting of the members and directors of the Foundation: Financial statements for the fiscal year ending May 31, 2009, were presented and approved. The profit and loss statement showed a net loss of \$9,261.02. The balance sheet as of that date showed total assets of \$439,000.00, with no liabilities. The income from the operations itself was positive. The loss resulted from unrealized losses on the investment accounts that have since been reversed for this fiscal year. Discussion was held regarding the future relocation of the Grand Lodge Office to the Scottish Rite Building in Lincoln. These actions are continuing in conjunction with the officers of the Lincoln Scottish Rite to endeavor to locate the Grand Lodge Office and museum in the Scottish Rite Building in Lincoln. Michelle Fulmer, Office Manager, updated the meeting on improvements and maintenance on the existing building in Lincoln. We approved acquisition of a new computer system that is outdated since the passage of five years to protect our membership records and other matters in the office. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

Freemasonry is a men's fraternity with its first principle for admission being that of a belief in a supreme being – for most of us clearly stated as a belief in God. That belief in God is the cornerstone for our ritual. Further, it is ritual that separates us from other organizations. Masonic Ritual remains important. The presentation of our Degrees and our ceremonies and the lessons and messages delivered by the ritual is not the only focus of Freemasonry, but be assured it is a very important component of Freemasonry. Ritual is the bonding agent for many of us and it simply demands of Masons a high standard of self-imposed conduct. The lessons are timeless, demanding, and just as applicable today as when first conceived. Ritual and lectures are not just words to be memorized and uttered back to the candidate, they are to be understood and applied as a guide to a Mason's daily life. The manner in which ritual is performed is the basis of a new Mason's view of our fraternity and its seriousness. If we don't undertake ritual seriously, our candidates will certainly not take the meaning seriously.

The charge of the Committee on Nebraska Work including oversight to see that the ritual is precise, well presented, and that it is not perverted or subjected to wholesale change to fit the whims of any self-appointed champion of a new cause. The view of many finds that Ritual is of generally good quality with many lodges working industriously on both floor work and ritual presentation. Yet, there are still lodges not yet capturing the spirit for consistent quality ritual. Quality of work is a matter of pride – if your lodge does not feel comfortable in the ritual, there are many brothers in other lodges who are willing to help. The Grand Custodian and Deputy Custodians are always ready to suggest names of others in your area to help in the ritual. The support and encouragement of M : W : B :Russell G. Reno and each of the Grand Lodge Officers is appreciated. M : W : B : Scott J. Krieger, Sr., Grand Custodian, continues to take a good hands-on approach to provide incentive and encouragement to each subordinate lodge and its officers. M:W:B: Krieger's example encourages Deputy Custodians and proficient Masons in providing leadership in setting a high standard for proficiency in Nebraska. Using M. W. B. Krieger's level of memorization and style of delivery as an example is a lesson in achievement and is a high goal to strive to. As the Nebraska Grand Lodge finds ongoing success in both one day conferrals and in one-on-one conferrals in the lodge degree work, the committee appreciates the efforts of the officers and members of subordinate lodges willing to take the time to learn the ritual, including lectures and to deliver them with feeling and understanding, enabling the new candidate to better appreciate the beauty and profound content of the Masonic degrees.

In 2009, the committee, engaging the resources and efforts of Worshipful Brother Gerald Verbeek, Grand Custodian Emeritus, and M : W : B : S Scott Krieger, prepared a suggested format for the Master's declaration of the purpose of a called communication and then transitioning from a tyled lodge meeting to an open public setting for installations, cornerstone and other ceremonies or public activities while the lodge still remains open, to be closed as may be proper by the officers after such public activity. By approval of this report, those guidelines are confirmed and approved by this Grand Lodge Communication. Those guidelines to be implemented as may be determined by the Grand Custodian.

In recognition of the celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States, and in honor of Grand Master Hultman, W : B :Herman O. FINAL REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

John E. Lorenzen, Chairman

David G. Krogh, a member of the Finance Committee, presented the report.

Due to changes to the committee structure approved by recommendation in February 2009, this report will combine the actions of the 2009 Finance Committee with the budget approval for the 2010 Finance Committee.

The 2009 Finance Committee met during the past year to conduct its assigned duties as proscribed in Section 1–318 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. Those duties include a periodic review of the books and records of Grand Lodge procedures, which included the following:

- Compared canceled checks to the check register, including an examination of endorsements, to assure proper accounting for payments.
- 2. Examined supporting documents, including invoices, expense records and other evidence of obligation, to ensure proper payment was made.
- 3. Reviewed accounts to which items were charged selecting all items in excess of \$500 and randomly reviewing other disbursements of lesser dollar amounts.
- 4. Reviewed monthly bank statement reconciliations to verify their accuracy.
- Reviewed income items, including lodge assessments, and traced to bank statements.
- 6. Reviewed the following funds: General, Scholarship, Perpetual, and Relief.
- 7. Reviewed and discussed monthly financial statements.
- 8. Counted Petty Cash.

Following the close of each calendar year, the books and records of the Grand Lodge are audited by an independent certified public accountant.

The numbers show that \$22,496 of investment income was needed to make up the difference between actual revenue and actual expenses – \$50,802 less than the investment draw budgeted for 2009. The results of the fiscal year show that the Grand Lodge Officers and staff have been good stewards of the funds of the Grand Lodge operating budget during 2009; however, the expenses of the Grand Lodge continue to exceed the annual revenue and thus, Nebraska Masonry is operating at a deficit, making it necessary to draw from the general investment fund to make up the shortfall.

The Finance Committee found satisfactory documentation for expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and was able to conduct its work in a complete and timely manner.

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

The Credentials Committee is pleased to report the following for this, the 153rd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

We have in attendance all Grand Lodge Officers, 14 Past Grand Masters, 19 Deputy Grand Custodians and 61 non-delegate Masons.

At the time of this Report there are the following Masters, Wardens and Secretaries registered:

There are 67 Worshipful Masters in person and 22 by proxy, there are 34 Senior Wardens in person and 37 by proxy, there are 32 Junior Wardens in person and 34 by proxy and there are 49 Secretaries in person and 25 by proxy.

It has indeed been a pleasure to serve as Chairman of the Credentials Committee this year for M : W : Russ. I want to personally thank the other brothers on the committee who have spent many hours at the registration table to help make this an enjoyable Grand Lodge Communication. They are Frank Dougherty, Robert Mike Hoagland and Gordon Brown.

I also give a huge thank you to Michelle and Carol at the Grand Lodge Office who work so hard to make this Grand Lodge Session run smoothly.

With possible corrections or additions due to late registrations, I move for the adoption of the report of the Credentials Committee.

M : W : B : Reno thanked Delmar and the Credentials Committee for the time they spend at the registration table during Annual Communication and the excellent job they have done in performing those duties.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

M : W : B : Reno asked Deputy Grand Master John Parsons to cover to allow him to bring the supplemental address:

"Brethren, you have all been furnished with a copy of my Address as you registered with Credentials, and the lodges all received a copy of my Recommendations 45 days prior to this session. I'll make just a few comments gleaned from that Address, but I encourage you to look through it to see what your Grand Lodge and its officers have accomplished the past 12 months. In it you will also find out about resources that are available to you, so please look it over.

This year, we did a lot of traveling in an attempt to get the programs of the Grand Lodge near to every lodge. In fact, the state was divided into nine areas, which brought us to within 90 miles of every lodge in the state except four, and that was a minimum of four times. These visits included the Lodge Leaders Forums where we met with Masters and Wardens, the Area Meetings in the Fall and training in the Lodge Leadership Program and the Enrollment Program. I am also very proud of our committees. They work very hard on our usual activities and, in addition, this past year they made several other significant contributions, such as the launch of an online education program and a blog by the Masonic Education Committee, completion of public service announcements which have been sent to Nebraska radio stations by the Public Relations Committee, the raising of funds to help brethren in need by the Masonic Relief Committee, development by the Membership Committee of a plan to hold friendship dinners across Nebraska for interested men who want to learn more about Freemasonry, the revision of the Lodge Leadership Training program by the Lodge Leadership Committee, which is a new committee this year, the outreach of the Nebraska Masonic Heritage Committee to provide historical information to the brethren at Annual Communication, and through their work with the Monell-Lininger Collection. Those were all great achievements that I'm proud to point to.

My greatest concern wrapping up this year is how much the planning materials were used by our Masters last year. We made great efforts starting in 2008 to put monthly lodge planning information on the website and followed it up with the

Lodge Planning Guide near the end of 2008. As I mentioned, we took the Lodge Leadership Program to all corners of the state last year. I am anxious to see the results of that effort in the coming years.

But, recently I've had my doubts about our effectiveness. Two weeks ago, our 2009 losses stood at about 3.3%, and it will go higher after all lodge reports have been submitted. This is a higher percentage of losses than at least in the last nine years, and perhaps longer when our final numbers are in. Granted, there were three lodges that decided in 2009 to purge their membership of more than 100 brothers that they had been carrying on the books for a number of years. I can only hope that in 2009 lodges provided their members a positive experience and as a result, the continued good works on your part in 2010 will build on that success, resulting in a reversal of this trend. Otherwise, these numbers may indicate that our lodges have turned a corner and obviously, it is not a positive corner. It's inescapable to me that our lodges must offer our brothers a product. M∴W∴B∴ Johnny Onkst mentioned that yesterday. You have to know your product. We have to offer our brothers a product that they want. I repeat my message of the last twelve months. Our biggest problem isn't membership. It's a lack of programs in the lodges that will keep brothers interested, which creates a desire to attend lodge and a program that caters to their needs. That requires the kind of planning taught in the Lodge Leadership Program, the Enrollment Program and other offerings from the Grand Lodge. Last year, I said to the 2009 Masters, "If it's not you, then who? Who will step up to advance their lodge. What master will put his responsibility high on his priority list and dedicate the time it really takes to make his lodge better?" It's an honor to be called a Past Master, and it is an honor when you have given your all to your lodge. And, of course, that requires hard work and time. It is my hope that those attending this Annual Communication will reach that goal. If it is to happen, then it will be necessary for lodge officers to sit down together, plan multi-year programs that annually address the weaknesses of their lodge and then dedicate the time and effort it takes to improve their lodge.

I applaud the 2009 officers who took advantage of the opportunities to learn and to grow, and who applied them to their lodge last year. You are true leaders and I expect your lodge is headed down a road toward greater camaraderie and growth. Brothers, we are fighting for our very existence and a way of life, as M : W : B : Craig Hummel said, "It's a way of life." Young men today are looking exactly for what we offer. All we need to do is provide it, they will join, and if you keep offering it, they will stay.

I extend to all of you my heartfelt thanks for allowing Julie and me the experience to serve our fraternity. Freemasonry is in the very fabric of my family and has a strong presence since our marriage 35 years ago. The past 12 months will rest among the very best of my lifetime memories. To lead an organization that stands for such high values is truly a noble effort, but it's you and only you who made that possible. It was your trust and your confidence in me that gave me the wherewithal to even consider this undertaking. You honored me with a great responsibility and I only hope that I lived up to your expectations and that my service in some way repays you for the confidence you showed in me. Thank you."

The printed Address of the Grand Master:

Brethren

Welcome to the 153^{rd} Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. In compliance with Article X, Section 2 of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, and with great pride, pleasure and humility, I present this written address for the 153^{rd} Annual Communication. Legislative proposals I have tendered as Grand Master, consisting of recommendations, were forwarded to the Jurisprudence Committee and this jurisdiction's lodges not less than 45 days prior to the 153^{rd} Annual Communication as set forth in Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge. These recommendations were presented at all Area Meetings held in fall 2009.

This address presents for your review the official acts of the 143rd Grand Master during the preceding Masonic year.

To our visiting brethren outside this jurisdiction, and the representatives of appendant Masonic Bodies and organizations, I thank you for your attendance and I hope you get as much from this session as I have gained from your gatherings. Over seven years of service as a Grand Lodge Officer, one of the highlights has been the friendships developed with brethren across the state line and around the world. We have built strong bridges that reinforce the fraternalism and brotherly love of our gentle craft. Thank you for your friendship, support and guiding example throughout this journey.

To the brethren of Nebraska, it is my pleasure to welcome you to your 153rd annual session of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. This truly is "your" session. You will decide whether the Grand Master's recommendations and the resolutions of your brothers are worthy of passage. In the past year, I have acted in your stead and you will pass judgment on the decisions, actions and activities of the Grand Lodge since we last met in session. It is you who set the course for your Grand Lodge, your lodge and your brothers. After shouldering this responsibility for 12 months as your representative, it is now in your hands to make a final determination as to its worthiness.

PREFACE

Every brother who has been approached about taking the first step into the line advancing to the office of Grand Master considers the personal sacrifices that will be necessary in order to live up to the men who previously served that high office. I can assure you, it is an ominous decision. After reading all Proceedings while writing *The Sesquicentennial History of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska*, I became acutely aware of the awesome responsibility of the Grand Master and high character of the men who held this office. To say the least, living up to that high standard is intimidating.

With that thought in mind, I took the oath of office fully aware of the expectations of the brethren across Nebraska, the Grand Lodge Officers and my own view of this office and my charge to always act in the best interests of our fraternity and its members. I hope the following confirms my commitment to that goal.

Besides journalism, my other major at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln was political science, and I've often wondered what it would be like to hold the position as a representative of the people. Then, I became involved with an even higher calling in Freemasonry. Our fraternity demands even larger qualities that make our brothers and society more empathetic, industrious, responsive to the human condition and an example of living life in a meaningful and fulfilling way.

After acting on your behalf the past 12 months, I thank the brothers of Nebraska for the courtesies shown my wife, Julie, and me, and the honors you have given the office of

the Grand Master. I haven't encountered anything more special in my life than your kindness, helpfulness and regard.

The following record is my response to your ongoing support and trust this past year. It is my sincere hope you found something in our activities that inspired and encouraged you to make your lodge better.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Two important people in my life are responsible for my involvement in Freemasonry; my wife, Julie, and my father, Norval Reno, who joined later in life and then encouraged me to join. He passed nearly seven and one-half years ago without realizing I would serve this Grand Lodge. The beginning of my interest was Julie's active involvement in Job's Daughters in St. Paul. After we married and moved to my hometown of Alliance, she accepted the position of Guardian of the local Bethel. I saw the positive impact of that organization on the lives of young women, and I became irrevocably hooked on our fraternity. Since 1976, Julie or I have served as officers of a Masonic body, and the past 22 years, Julie has been very supportive of my involvement. She provides appreciated and valued advice and many hours of personal time for me and the fraternity. The road would have had more potholes and detours without her help and suggestions.

To our children, Heather and her husband Bro. Erik Younger, and Natalie and her husband Brian Kent, and their beautiful one-year-old daughter, Lydia, I offer my sincere thanks for their understanding in recent years, especially this past year. Although both daughters realized benefits from their involvement in our fraternity and understand its importance, my involvement doesn't make up for the countless hours away from their family activities. Julie and I agree, it's time for a closer focus on our family and we look forward to enjoying more time with them.

Thanks, too, for the support of my brothers in the lodges where I have membership: Alliance No. 183, Tabula Rasa No. 332, Lancaster No. 54 and Cotner No. 297, where I served as Master. Thank you all for your support throughout the year. Although the distance is far from my home lodge, Alliance No. 183, to Lincoln, the brothers there were tremendously supportive all year and helped make the 2009 programs operational in the Panhandle. Thanks especially to W∴ B∴ Todd Harris, my Personal Representative, who worked endlessly on the fraternity's behalf. I will never forget "my" gift when officially visiting Alliance Lodge. Appropriately, a dozen red roses were sent to Julie in recognition of her sacrifices while I served as Grand Master. At that visit, it was our pleasure to host two Past Grand Masters of Wyoming. M∴W∴B∴ George Smith, also a member of Alliance Lodge No. 183, was unknown to most of the brethren there. I encountered him during a visit several years before while attending Wyoming's Annual Communication. He informed me he was a member of Alliance Lodge and we promised to meet there when I became Grand Master. It was an enjoyable evening made even better by the presence of M∴W∴B∴ Jack Nixon, Past Grand Master of Wyoming, who joined M : W : B : Smith for his return to his home lodge.

Of course, I can't give enough thanks to the brothers who elected me to office and the lodge leaders who worked the 2009 program. Also, their wives afforded me, our Grand Lodge Officers and our ladies the greatest hospitality and the best food. My waist expanded two inches, which is a testimony to their good cooking.

The 2009 Grand Lodge program was based on the successes I experienced in leadership roles in our fraternity, and the established Grand Lodge programs that have proven to work well in the past. Those who implemented them experienced a good year and their lodge and brothers are better for it.

There are those who have passed but ignited my fire or kept it burning at critical points in my Masonic career, and I can't thank them enough. W : B : Bob Lawrence, my mentor at Alliance Lodge, taught me the tenets of Freemasonry and instilled my respect for the fraternity. W : B : Harlan Adams was a gentle and dedicated Mason, and in his soft-spoken way pestered me for years to get active in Cotner Lodge until I ran out of excuses. Their contributions to Freemasonry, Mason by Mason, deserve perpetual remembrance in this address.

My final thanks are given to those men who preceded me as Grand Master. Each added an ingredient to my knowledge base that helped me this past year. Also, I am thankful to M : W : B : Ken Beebe who appointed me Grand Chaplain in 2003, and M : W : B : Les Seiler who appointed me Junior Deacon in the advancing line the next year. In addition, R : W : B : Mike Birnstihl, Grand Senior Warden Emeritus, was integral to my appointment. I was honored that he could participate in installation and assist in placing the Grand Master's jewel on my shoulders.

FIVE-YEAR PLAN

Before the start of the 2009 Masonic year, the advancing line officers completed a five-year plan to address the fraternity's needs. Of the 90 action items in the plan, progress was made on 45 of them. Some action items were slated to occur each year, while others were planned to evolve over the five-year timeframe. I was encouraged that many of the action items were addressed with at least some success, and I hope greater progress will occur on the remainder in the coming years.

EMPHASES DURING YEAR

Our theme in 2009 was "Freemasonry: Values in Action." Three symbols represented our focus on Masonic values: the perfect ashlar reflected our efforts to become better Masons, fathers and husbands; the trowel stood for ensuring brotherly love in our lodges; and the third rung of Jacob's ladder, meaning charity, encouraged us to take our Masonic values outside the walls of our lodges.



In our Lodge Leadership Training, we urge Masters to hold at least one monthly activity, other than a lodge meeting. Monthly activities were suggested to the 2009 Masters for use in their lodge. My philosophy and experience is that holding at least one monthly activity of interest to the brethren attracts long-absent brothers to lodge, builds excitement among active members and a preference for participating in lodge, and external activities expose the community to the good works of the lodge, thus attracting more men to join. We can make thousands of men Masons, but unless we offer them something of interest in our lodges that is rewarding, they will leave and our membership efforts will be fruitless. Lodges must have a good product to sell if they want men to buy into Freemasonry.

The monthly activities were tied to 2009's three symbols.

The Perfect Ashlar: May – Family activity; July – Read a Masonic book, start an online course prepared by the Masonic Education Committee, donate Masonic books to a local library, your lodge library and/or the Grand Lodge Library; October – Take wife to Ladies Festival Weekend.

Trowel: March – Support Masonic Relief Fund; September – Hold a Back to Lodge Night; November – Support the George Washington Masonic Memorial; December – Support the move of Grand Lodge Office Project.

Third Rung of Jacob's Ladder: April – Community service program; June – Donate time or money to CHIP, schedule a CHIP event, or at least send a donation to help spread the good word; August & September – First statewide blood drive in Nebraska's history; November – Veterans Day observance, or perform The Vacant Chair Ceremony.

It was my hope that the lodge leaders who implemented the 2009 program experienced a successful year and set a precedent for the Masters who follow. It's inescapable that all the Grand Lodge can do is provide resources. The success of our lodges relies on the leadership and hard work of their officers, and especially their Masters, who must make their lodge the number one priority during their year of service. The Grand Lodge's programs and trainings are based on proven best practices of successful Masters, and they serve as a resource for all serious leaders intending to truly and positively impact their lodge.

FOCUS ACTIVITIES

Slated among the monthly activities previously mentioned were featured events to demonstrate to lodges possible activities they could hold, including: Ladies Festival Weekend, Back to Lodge Night and a blood drive.

Blood Drive: Never has a statewide blood drive been held in Nebraska by one organization. No other group has a greater presence in our state than Freemasonry, which is found in more than 120 communities with 13,000 members. But, it wouldn't have been possible without the excellent leadership of its chairman, Grand Tyler W∴B∴ Phil Edwards, and the expertise of the Nebraska Community Blood Bank located in Lincoln. The goal was to increase the exposure of the lodge in the community by holding a highly visible activity, and staging it in lodges, if possible, so residents could see the inside of the lodge and learn more about our fraternity. W.B.: Edward's persistent contact with lodges resulted in 60 lodges taking part in the drive, or 40 percent of lodges in the state. The Nebraska Community Blood Bank organized blood donation centers across Nebraska so each lodge could hold a drive in their community. The results were gratifying. More than 1,100 pints of blood were donated in August and September at Masonic blood drives during a time of the year when supplies typically are low. This event was preceded by the signing of a proclamation in July by Gov. Dave Heineman declaring August and September "Freemasonry: Giving the Gift of Life" months in Nebraska. The state was divided into four regions, and awards were presented to lodges in three categories: highest percentage of members donating blood; highest percentage of non-members donating blood; and highest total donations. Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy spoke to the award recipients in a ceremony at the Govenor's Residence and assisted in presenting the awards.

Back to Lodge Night: September was designated for this activity to invite longabsent brothers back to lodge. It was suggested that lodges hold a dinner before their September meeting and present the Rusty Nail Degree, which reviews the passwords, signs and grips. In addition, proclamations were signed by Masonic-related organizations encouraging active brothers to visit their lodge that month and speak about their involvement in those organizations. It was hoped the ceremony would reduce the the discomfort from not recalling the ritual, brothers involved in other organizations would consider getting involved in their lodge, and an introduction to other Masonic-related bodies would keep brothers active in the fraternity.

Ladies Festival Weekend: The idea for this event was taken from England where lodges annually treat their wives to a special weekend at an exotic place where they cater to their every need as thanks for supporting their involvement in Freemasonry. Grand Orator W.B. Patrick Barger and his wife, Diane, chaired the event and planned a relaxing and superb weekend for the nearly 40 couples who attended. Held in Omaha the weekend of October 9, it opened with a reception. The next morning and afternoon, couples took off on their own, or were transported to three venues throughout the day: Joslyn Art Museum, Lauritzen Gardens and Durham Western Heritage Museum. Or, they could shop in the Old Market. That evening, a succulent meal of prime rib was prepared at the Scottish Rite Masonic Community Center and toasts were made to honor our ladies. The event was highlighted that evening by a performance of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) Symphony Orchestra, which played music composed by Freemasons. Bro. Tyler White, conductor, assembled a program of thoroughly enjoyable music, and members of the faculty of the UNL School of Music performed several pieces as well, including the Grand Lodge's Musician Bro. Mark Clinton, associate professor of piano and co-chair of the piano area. Thanks to W:B: Barger and Diane, who is a UNL associate professor of clarinet; the weekend was highly successful and garnered the thanks of the ladies in attendance.

TRAVELS OF GRAND MASTER & OFFICERS

I was born and raised in Alliance in the Nebraska Panhandle, and received the degrees of Masonry in Alliance Lodge No. 183. I am acutely aware of the feelings of isolation that exist further west, and I was resolved this year to attempt to bridge that gap.

Several activities were held equally across the state to visit lodges, hold trainings, gather opinions on the services of the Grand Lodge and the future of our fraternity. Those efforts were:

- Lodge Leaders Forums were scheduled from late February through April, with a make-up session in Ainsworth in June. (My thanks to Bro. Carl Willert who used his private plane to fly me to Ainsworth. It was a most interesting ride, especially on the return flight as we watched damaging storms cross Eastern Nebraska.) The central communities in the nine training areas served as hosts of the forums. Invited to the forums were the Master and Wardens. It was refreshing to hear the perspectives of our brothers, and I thank them for their candid responses. A summary of the comments was reported in *The Nebraska Mason*, and a more detailed report was given to Grand Lodge Officers. Despite our effort to set more meetings closer to lodges, only about one-third, or 51 lodges, were represented.
- Area Meetings were revived in 2009 to discuss the Grand Master's
 recommendations that will be presented at this session, explain the activities of
 Annual Communication and encourage discussion about area activities and
 opinions on the fraternity and Grand Lodge services. These were well attended
 and there was general agreement that they are beneficial.
- It is the custom of the Grand Lodge to assign officers to visit several lodges during the year. In 2009, officers attended lodge meetings or activities and in some cases maintained contact if there were issues that needed attention.
- The Masonic Education Committee held Educational Symposiums in the spring and fall at various locations, and one member visited many lodges in Central and Western Nebraska to gauge the effectiveness of the Grand Lodge's and local lodge's educational efforts. I congratulate W∴B∴ Mike Webb for his innovation, industriousness and commitment of time to travel the state on behalf of the committee. His final report contained many helpful ideas that will serve to

direct the committee to meet the educational needs of our Nebraska brethren. This dedicated and hard-working committee demonstrates to all Grand Lodge committees how to effectively accomplish their goals, assess needs and organize to provide those needs. My hearty thanks for their ongoing contributions to our fraternity.

As noted in the subsequent section, 16 training programs were held within 90 miles of all but four lodges in the state.

All told, Grand Lodge Officers were within 90 miles of all but four lodges in the state a minimum of four times in 2009, and as much as seven times or more. We met our goal to reach out to all lodges and brothers in the state to learn, teach, advise and assist. My sincere thanks are extended to the Grand Lodge Officers for their commitment. It required many more hours from home and work, but I hope positive results will be visibly obvious with the passing of time. You are the most committed of the brethren in the state and I admire and respect you for your service in 2009.

Through all the travels about the state, brothers from nearby communities came to know each other better and I was delighted to hear that on occasion discussion turned to working together on degrees and supporting each other's activities. It is my hope seeds were planted that will bring our lodges closer together and result in a stronger fraternity in our state.

Annually, your Grand Lodges Officers are assigned lodges to visit and assist them, if needed. It is the responsibility of the Grand Junior Warden to monitor the progress of the officers in this task. R:W:B: Bruce Baker put together an effective program in 2009, and I thank him for his thoughtful consideration to improve this process. A kit was constructed for the use of officers to help lodges, which included:

- The last five years of annual reports for each assigned lodge.
- Each lodge's average age of members, and numbers by age category.
- Visitation talking points.
- Components of a strong lodge.
- Lodge rebuilding program.
- Membership plan.
- Other support materials.

This kit better prepared the Grand Lodge Officers to meet with lodges, understand their challenges and provided suggested approaches to address them.

LODGE LEADERSHIP & ENROLLMENT PROGRAMS

In recent years, the Grand Lodge developed two effective training programs: Lodge Leadership Program and Enrollment Program, which can be found on the "Downloads" page of the Grand Lodge website.

The Lodge Leadership Program contains chapters on various aspects of operating a lodge and leading it to success. Each chapter was written by Masters who were successful in that areas.

The Enrollment Program provides a means to inform petitioners about Freemasonry, and increases his commitment to the lodge each step he takes toward becoming a Master Mason.

There were two important developments in training in 2009: a committee of professional trainers and dedicated brothers was created to restructure these programs to be more effective; and the trainings were offered within 90 miles of nearly every lodge across the state.


The Lodge Leadership Committee was established to not only add more professionalism to our training programs, but also to make professional trainers available

to more effectively present the programs. The committee rewrote the Lodge Leadership Program and tested their work at several training locations.

It was my commitment to take these resources within easy access of every lodge in the state in 2009. The state was divided into nine training areas. All but four lodges are located within 90 miles of the central lodge in each area. It was rewarding to me that the Grand Lodge Officers, on rotation, gave up four weekends from August through October to conduct trainings across the state. Only two of the 18 planned trainings were cancelled due to lack of interest (representation of a minimum of three lodges at each training location was required). The esteem of the brothers should be directed to those lodge leaders who took the time to either attend the trainings in their area or traveled to another area if that date didn't work for them. It is hoped that what they learned resulted or will result in positive, long-term improvements in their lodges. This effort complemented and completed the hard work performed in previous years.

GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC MEMORIAL

One hundred years ago this month, Grand Masters from around the country, including Nebraska Past Grand Master Milton Hull, who was sent by the then-Grand Master Harry Cheney to represent him, gathered in Alexandria, Virginia, to discuss the construction by the Masonic fraternity of a memorial to W : B : George Washington. The beautiful George Washington Masonic Memorial is the result, and it houses artifacts belonging to Washington, books, information about his Masonic experiences, as well as additional background about Freemasonry and its appendant bodies. It stands as a tribute not only to our greatest Mason, but also to Blue Lodge Masonry, and the bodies that comprise our fraternity.

That's why an emphasis was placed this year on raising funds for the George Washington Masonic Memorial. I have visited the Memorial several times and marveled at its contents and the positive message and programs it provides about our fraternity and its influence on Washington and the other founding fathers.

It was built at a time when the great resources of our fraternity could construct local and state Masonic buildings of great beauty, and then give additional funds for this Memorial too. Today, the cost to maintain this structure is demanding. It is of great significance that Washington was a member of our fraternity which professes the qualities found in a democratic government. This, my brothers, is an important message we must ensure will continue to speak clearly and loudly to the world. Annually, tens of thousands of visitors from around the world visit the Memorial to learn more about the relationship between Washington and Freemasonry. It must continue as a beacon for our fraternity and our country.

Therefore, I will recommend at this Annual Communication that we join other states that have made as part of their per capita a \$1 contribution to the Memorial. Nebraska Masons led the way by being the first jurisdiction in the country to enact a 50-cent per capita contribution. Now, it is time for us to contribute more to keep up with the everincreasing costs to maintain this magnificent facility.

WASHINGTON MEMORIAL LODGE

In the past 12 months, I have promoted the start-up of Washington Masonic Memorial Lodge, whose purpose would be to raise funds and encourage lodges and others to contribute to the Memorial. Falling under the Bylaws as a Special Purpose Lodge, it would meet at two time-periods a year at dinner meetings. Because it is intended to be a statewide lodge, meetings would be held across Nebraska. Members in nine areas of the state would promote holding fundraising events, such as a George Washington Dinner. Educational presentations would be offered for presentation at these events on Washington, the Revolutionary War and the Colonial period. In addition, every other year, the lodge would take a trip to locations that were significant to Washington and the Revolutionary War.

More than 70 brothers have informed me they are interested in joining Washington Masonic Memorial Lodge. My intention was to put it together following this Annual Communication. During the year, I have been approached by many of those brothers asking when the lodge would be started. Seeing the interest, I hoped to make initial efforts earlier, but the pressing business of my office prevented that from happening. I apologize to those anxious brothers, but I pledge it will be a top priority after this Annual Communication. Plans are proceeding for a trip to Virginia this fall for the members of this lodge.

The concept of a lodge dedicated to assist in raising funds for the Memorial has captured the attention of the Memorial staff. Executive Director George Seghers has invited me to present this concept to the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America at its meeting in Arlington, Virginia, later this month in hopes it can be emulated elsewhere.

PROCEEDINGS ONLINE

A project of the George Washington Masonic Memorial is to place all Proceedings of every Grand Lodge online for the use of researchers. The Grand Lodge of Nebraska agreed to participate in the project and Proceedings from 1857-1905 are now online. The documents are word searchable. They can be found at:

Each year, more Proceedings will be scanned until all are online, which should take about four years.

AWARDS PROGRAM

I applaud lodge leaders who participate in the Grand Lodge awards program. The purpose of awards is to encourage lodges to take constructive actions benefitting their lodge. Recipients of awards have not only taken positive steps to improve their lodge, but they also give their lodge pride in achieving the reward. It's a double win, and it sets a precedent for future leaders to emulate. Ask any lodge leader who has earned an award, and he'll tell you this is the result.

In recent years, the number of applicants for awards has fallen. A few years ago, the awards program was revised, and one concern was the length of the entry forms. Having a major hand in this revision, I can assure you that the length of these forms is less than in other jurisdictions which I viewed, and numbered as many as 26 pages while still eliciting entries from nearly all lodges in that state. The content of the awards entry forms, though longer than previous forms, do a much better job to help Masters develop ideas for lodge activities. They are another Grand Lodge resource to help lodges plan interesting and meaningful terms for their brethren.

Awards can be a starting point to build a stronger lodge, and Grand Lodge awards offer various levels of recognition for large and small lodges as well as individuals. Congratulations to the lodges and brothers who earn awards at this Annual Communication. You are helping to construct a healthier lodge, which could be your long-term legacy as Master.

GRAND MASTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

It was my pleasure to present Bro. G. Charles Thone, former Nebraska Governor and former member of the U.S. House of Representatives, the Grand Master's Humanitarian Award in January 2010. Bro. It was a wise move at the 2009 Annual Communication when the brethren approved the Grand Master's recommendation to significantly reduce the number of Grand Lodge committees. The move streamlines our committee structure by consolidating similar functions and dispensing with committees. I look forward to even greater productivity.

CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM (CHIP)

The Child Identification Program (CHIP) continues its good deeds all across Nebraska. To date, the parents of more than 26,000 children have taken identification kits home at no cost to themselves since CHIP came into existence more than five years ago. The need for child identification has not ebbed since the beginning of the program. In fact, holding a program in your community does not mean your duty is done. Children grow older and change their appearance, their friends and their "hang outs." If your lodge hasn't held a CHIP event recently, it's time to do so again. This is a tremendous opportunity for every lodge to gain exposure and support from the community, besides the obvious benefit of protecting children.

The officers of Nebraska CHIP continue their responsibilities with great effectiveness. Their commitment of time, distribution of CHIP materials and attendance at the events is admired. They are ably led by W : B : Kent Broyhill. There is a special place in heaven for these volunteers who do so much to protect the young people of Nebraska.

Per Grand Lodge Bylaws, an assessment of \$1 per member is designated for Nebraska CHIP. The Grand Lodge also supports CHIP through the time of Grand Lodge Office Manager Michelle Fulmer, who completed her first full year as the State CHIP Coordinator.

CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS

It was my pleasure and honor to serve as vice chairman of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America held February 15-17, in Garden Grove, California, under the shadow of Disneyland. I'm not certain I'll be able to live down the photo in the conference proceedings of the officers wearing Mickey Mouse ears. But, that was a mere moment of time in what was a productive session.

Also representing the Grand Lodge of Nebraska at the conference were Deputy Grand Master John Parsons, Grand Senior Warden E. David Watts and Grand Secretary Bruce Watkins, who attended the Grand Secretaries Conference.

Fifty-seven jurisdictions were represented at the Conference from Canada, Mexico and the U.S., as well as visitors from many Grand Lodges around the world, including the Philippines, Iran (in exile), Armenia, Romania, Russia, Brazil, Bulgaria, Azerbaijan, Moldova, Paraguay, United Grand Lodge of England and others not identified in the proceedings. This conference is evidence of the quality of Freemasonry around the world. The Grand Lodge Officers and their ladies in attendance represent those held in the highest regard in their jurisdiction, and this aspect of my service to the brethren in Nebraska will be sorely missed. We have certainly enjoyed meeting the many good Masons and their ladies across this globe.

The conference officers and planning committee met on site in June 2008 to plan the conference. As vice chairman, I served on the planning committee and chaired the nomination committee, which selected the 2010 conference officers.

Our host, the Grand Lodge of California, organized an impressive conference and set the benchmark for those that follow. California Grand Master Larry Adamson was a gracious host. Reports and annual meetings were held for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, MasoniChip International, Masonic Renewal Program, Masonic Service Association and National Masonic Foundation for Children.

Nebraska was honored to have M : W : B : S Scott Krieger again serve on the Committee on Information for Recognition. The committee hears requests from around the world for a positive report so jurisdictions will be more inclined to recognize their Grand Lodge. It is a specialized area particularly suited to M : W : B : K rieger's thoughtful and considerate approach to matters of contention, yet balanced by his knowledge of Masonic law and tenacity to assure it is followed to the letter. His work on the committee speaks well for him and Nebraska Freemasonry.

MIDWEST CONFERENCE OF GRAND LODGES

It was Nebraska's turn in 2009 to host the Midwest Conference of Grand Lodges, a gathering of top Grand Lodge Officers from Kansas, South Dakota, North Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Manitoba and, of course, Nebraska. The event was held August 14-16, in Omaha. Other Grand Lodge Officers attending were: Deputy Grand Master John Parsons, Grand Senior Warden E. This annual gathering is an opportunity to share information and experiences about our various approaches to the common challenges facing Freemasonry, and to build relationships with our counterparts. Jurisdictions ranging from small to large memberships are represented, which provides for varied and interesting perspectives.

Under the leadership of Nebraska, we changed the approach from presentations that merely updated key activities in each jurisdiction to discussing issues confronting our fraternity. We took this approach on the recommendation of Grand Senior Warden R:W:B: E. David Watts who witnessed meaningful discussions of issues at the Rocky Mountain Masonic Conference. This venture proved to be valuable and will be continued at future meetings.

Another concern was the lack of information about planning the conference from one year to the next as it passes from jurisdiction to jurisdiction. With no history of costs, each jurisdiction starts at the beginning with no background information to assist them in planning and budgeting. Nebraska proposed an amendment to the Bylaws to create offices comprising the expected Grand Masters of the three upcoming host jurisdictions for the conference, and the Past Grand Master of the previous host jurisdiction. This passed with no objections, and I believe it will make the annual conference even more meaningful, productive and worthwhile.

Your Grand Lodge advancing line provided very helpful input while planning the conference and its activities. Additional thanks are extended to Grand Senior Steward W∴B∴ John Maxell and his wife, Deb, for their hard work to coordinate the plans and activities of the conference. Their contacts in the Omaha Masonic community resulted in an excellent experience enjoyed by the conferees. Thanks also to the Omaha brethren who provided the top notch service to our visiting brethren and their ladies.

The Deputy Grand Custodians continue to work with our lodges providing needed instruction in our work, which ensures the message of our degrees is clearly and accurately presented. This is an important function of the Grand Lodge, and my most sincere thanks are extended to these brothers for their high level of commitment.

GRAND LODGE OFFICE MOVE

A decade ago, the Nebraska Masonic Foundation purchased the current building where the Grand Lodge Office is located. At the time, it was expected our offices could reside there for 10 years before it would be necessary to find another home. That time has arrived. Since then, we have added the Child Identification Program (CHIP), and materials for that program, as well as our ever-expanding library and museum, records, Masonic All-Star Band materials and instruments have filled our building. In addition, the neighborhood has changed, and not for the better, which causes concerns for employees and historical items.

Discussion began in 2007 that a possible good location could be the Lincoln Scottish Rite building. Talks began in earnest in 2008 and the past year has seen the discussion move to the funding stage. Grand Senior Warden R : W : B : E. David Watts and M : W : B : Reg Kuhn are steering the Grand Lodge's efforts, and we owe them a huge thank you for taking the time to ensure a proposal is a win-win for the Grand Lodge and the Scottish Rite in Lincoln.

The project was divided into three phases: improve the facade, entrance to the building and build the Grand Lodge Office; replace the heating, ventilation and air conditioning system; and provide for an adequate library and museum.

Paul J. Strawhecker, Inc., an Omaha consulting firm that works with nonprofit organizations on fundraising, was hired to study whether it was possible to raise the funds necessary to prepare the building to house the Grand Lodge Office. After concluding the study, Strawhecker reported that the funds could be raised for the first two phases. We will continue to consult with Strawhecker throughout the fundraising process.

IMPERIAL SHRINE SESSION

San Antonio, Texas, was the site in July of the 135th Session of the Imperial Council, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. Not only was the location beautiful, but the hospitality

afforded the Grand Masters was humbling from all members of the Shrine. Of particular note, the officers of the Shrine in Nebraska were even more gracious and accommodating. My lady and I thank the Nobles of Sesostris Shrine, Tangier Shrine and Tehama Shrine for providing our costs to attend and for the wonderful evening dinners.

It was obvious from the presentations and discussions on the floor of the session that the Shrine truly understands the need for thriving Blue Lodges. As was stated at the session, the healthiest Shrine Temples are those that actively support their local lodges. We are fortunate in Nebraska that strife is at a minimum between our bodies, and we sincerely appreciate the Shrine's contributions to our fraternity and society. Throughout the year, I have tried to repay that support.

Groundbreaking legislation was passed at Imperial Session. While rejecting an attempt to close three hospitals, Nobles gave authority to its hospital board to determine the extent of service each hospital could provide, which opened the door to reduce services to save money. In addition, approval was given for the hospitals to accept payments for service from insurance companies, the federal government and others.

BIENNIAL SESSION OF THE SCOTTISH RITE

Just three weeks after the release of Dan Brown's book, *The Lost Symbol*, which focuses on Freemasonry, the 104th Biennial Session of the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Southern Jurisdiction, was held in Washington, D.C. in October. The session was impressive and the accommodations were outstanding. Our thanks to the Scottish Rite for hosting my wife and me at this event. We also enjoyed a detailed tour of the House of the Temple, which is the epicenter of Brown's book.

Brown wasn't able to attend the session, but he sent his regards which were placed at the setting of every attendee at the banquet, which stated in part, "In the past few weeks, as you might imagine, I have been repeatedly asked what attracted me to the Masons so strongly as to make it central point of my new book. My reply is always the same: 'In a world where men do battle over whose definition of God is most accurate, I cannot adequately express the deep respect and admiration I feel toward an organization in which men of differing faiths are able to 'break bread together' in a bond of brotherhood, friendship, and camaraderie.' Please accept my humble thanks for the noble example you set for mankind. It is my sincere hope that the Masonic community recognizes *The Lost Symbol* for what it truly is . . . an earnest attempt to reverentially explore the history and beauty of Masonic Philosophy. Yours sincerely, Dan Brown."

Congratulations are due Bro. Chuck Sederstrom who was named Supreme Grand Inspector General (S.G.I.G.) of Nebraska by Sovereign Grand Commander Ronald Seale. S.G.I.G. Sederstrom exhibits innovative and constructive attributes as the leader of the Nebraska Scottish Rite, and he is deserving of this high honor. We have enjoyed getting to know our S.G.I.G. better during the past year, and wish him well in this important post in Nebraska Freemasonry.

THE LOST SYMBOL

The release of Dan Brown's latest book, *The Lost Symbol*, in which Freemasonry played the key role, was eyed warily by the fraternity. It wasn't known how he would position Masonry, and his track record with other organizations that were the subject of his previous books didn't portend a positive outcome. Braced for the possible impending mischaracterization, a website was placed on the Internet to answer any misconceptions that would occur. When it was released Sept. 15, it was a welcome surprise that Brown held our fraternity in high regard. That didn't prevent several glaring errors about Freemasonry in the book, but on the whole we were pleased. Attempting to capitalize on the attention, the Grand Lodge website included a page encouraging viewers to learn

more about Freemasonry, which had three links to frequently asked questions, information about Masonry and membership information.

Taking it a step further, ads were placed on the search engine Google. When Nebraskans were looking for information about Freemasonry, the ad steered them to our website. Initially, we witnessed a spike in visitors to our website, which proved the cost of the ad was worth the expenditure.

The Masonic All-Star Band Committee annually turns this event into a premier show during halftime of the Shrine Bowl Football Classic and in the Shrine Bowl Parade. Last year, 241 high school students attended the camp, learned the finer points of marching and received top notch instruction in performance. Our thanks are given to the Masonic lodges, Eastern Star Chapters and others who provided scholarships so these students could participate and share their musical gifts at the Shrine Bowl. In addition, the committee members work very hard to keep costs down and provide adequate assistance to ensure the students have a positive experience and are protected.

MASONIC CHARITIES GOLF TOURNAMENT

Although I gave up golf more than a couple decades ago, I enjoyed heading back to the greens in North Bend for the Masonic Charities Golf Tournament. This requires significant effort from the organizers and I thank them for their many hours of hard work to raise funds for the Nebraska Masonic Foundation, The Nebraska Masonic Home and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children. What a fun way to raise money for our charities. Getting into the spirit of the tournament, it became obvious a new award needed to be presented and I suggest it for next year . . . the Golfer Closest to Beaning the Grand Master. When I first walked onto the practice putting green, I heard several golfers in the distance yell, "FORE!" Instead of hitting the ground, I strolled right into the path of the ball and it zipped over my head by only a few feet. Yes, it's been a long time since I've golfed, and perhaps it will be even longer before I return. Nevertheless, I hope all golfers will support this tournament and, who knows, if you've been away from the course long enough, you may just win the award I've proposed.

MASONIC EASTERN-STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children continues to provide a safe, loving and positive environment for children. Under the leadership of Executive Director Ron Giesselmann, and the dedicated work of the Home's staff, the lives of many young people have been re-directed toward success. People who serve youth understand the following, "One hundred years from now it won't matter what kind of car I drove, what kind of house I lived in, how much money I had in the bank, nor what my clothes looked like. But, the world may be a little better because I was important in the life of a child." I

congratulate Ron and his staff for their life-changing service to young people. It was my pleasure to attend the Home's 4-H Achievement Day, and witness the positive impact of the 4-H on the youth.

MASONIC YOUTH ORGANZATIONS

A Masonic youth group is where my love for our fraternity was born. Working with Job's Daughters for 30 years has been one of the most rewarding experiences in my life. Along with my love for Job's Daughters, I came to equally respect DeMolay and Rainbow for Girls. Julie and I always enjoy being around youth and we both had a good time visiting the state meetings of these three bodies.

Their challenge is the same as our Blue Lodges; adult leadership, planning member-appealing terms and membership. However, their needs in these areas are even more acute than in most of our lodges. I'm certain you've heard the frequent appeal for adults to work with our youth. I renew that appeal here. Tomorrow's leaders of our fraternity, locally and statewide, may very well be a member of a Masonic youth group. I am an example of the impact a young girl in Job's Daughters or Rainbow may have on our beloved fraternity. Were it not for Julie's desire to return to work in Job's Daughters, I might never have joined Freemasonry. I have seen that situation, as well as fathers joining lodge, repeated time and time again in Cotner Lodge and other lodges. When you think about it, you actually may be making your lodge stronger by working in a Masonic youth group. And, what more important contribution can you make in life than encourage youth to seek a better path in life? I can't think of one.

THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

The Nebraska Masonic Home provides excellent care for our brothers, their wives and widows and other female relatives. The staff at the Home has the best interest of the residents at heart in everything they do. My greatest frustration is with our brethren. Regularly, the Grand Lodge Office is contacted by the Home to confirm a supposed brother's membership so a relative can reside there. All too often, the related brother didn't pay his dues and the unfortunate relative cannot move into the Home. Life is fragile and, as we have learned the last two years with the severe recession, there is no guarantee we'll have the funds we will need if we become disabled or need to move to a retirement or higher-care facility. Brothers, The Nebraska Masonic Home will be there for you and your relatives in the event these situations occur. Please, don't take your membership for granted. It could spell the difference in your and your female relatives' quality of life. It is the least expensive long-term care investment you can make. We assisted in this awareness by issuing "Your Benefits as a Master Mason" document to all Nebraska Masons. Refer to the Grand Lodge Office staff section of this report for more information.

NECROLOGY

In 2009, 340 of the brethren in our subordinate lodges went to their eternal home. Our Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain, Jim Lapaseotes, will conduct a memorial service during our Annual Communication which will pay fitting tribute to these brethren.

RELIEF

Our Committee on Masonic Relief stepped up its activities in 2007, and the committee hasn't slowed down since. Thanks to the hard work of our Grand Senior Steward W.B. John Maxell, a Relief Fund Gift Shop was launched on the Grand Lodge website offering apparel embroidered with the square and compass. Funds received above the cost of each item were deposited in the Relief Fund. To date, very few

items have been purchased, but we hope the brethren will look to this site when ordering apparel.

A Masonic Relief pin was sold in 2009 emblazoned with the phrase, "Providing relief takes more than a handshake." W : B : Maxell spearheaded this effort and we appreciate the participation of the brethren in purchasing so many pins.

W : B : Maxell came up with another good idea to raise funds at Annual Communication. By adding \$20 to the cost of the meal at Annual Communication, which is the price of the pin, brothers received with their meal a vegetable other than Masonic green beans, and preferred seating. It was a fun idea, but the puzzled look on the caterer's face when we requested two vegetables was equally gratifying.

A number of requests were received from lodges seeking relief for brothers. The first question asked by the Relief Committee when these requests arrive is, "What is your lodge doing to support the brother in need?" When a lodge ballots to accept a brother, it also accepts first responsibility for his welfare. Lodges are expected to provide for a brother when it is necessary. After the lodge has provided appropriate support, then requests should be made to the Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Relief.

GRAND LODGE STAFF

Any brother who has had contact with the Grand Lodge Office well knows our competent, efficient and knowledgeable staff. Office Manager Michelle Fulmer is so organized that she can handle all the critical programs of the Grand Lodge and help organize the Grand Master as well. I have appreciated her suggestions and knowledge of Grand Lodge processes, which opened many doors of possibilities. She is a guiding light for neophyte Grand Masters. Administrative Assistant Carol Schroeder is equally organized and keeps our records and communications with lodges in order. I recall the day she came to me frustrated when the wife of a former brother sought admission to The Masonic Home, and although he was a member for several decades, she couldn't be admitted because he dropped his membership without realizing its impact on his wife's future. Carol asked if there was something we could send our brothers to inform them of this benefit. We brainstormed a bit and developed the following, which is now sent to all newly-made Master Masons, and was included in a mailing to all Masons late last summer. It's innovative thinking like this by Michelle and Carol that increases the value of our membership in Freemasonry.

Your Benefits as a Master Mason

Every year you pay your dues, you ensure your right to the benefits of membership. Keep this document with your important papers as a reminder of the benefits extended to you, your family and descendants through your membership in Nebraska Freemasonry. Make copies of this document and give them to members of your family so they are aware of the benefits they enjoy as a result of your membership. These benefits are available if you are in good standing (with dues paid to date) or were in good standing at the time of your death.

As a Freemason in good standing with the required years of membership, you and your female relatives (wife, widow, mother, sister, daughter, grandmother or granddaughter) are eligible to apply for admission to The Nebraska Masonic Home. The Masonic Home offers a full continuum of care to eligible applicants who need long-term care or assisted living services for medical or personal reasons. An eligible applicant can select from the pay-by-the-month plan or the asset surrender plan, depending on his/her financial situation. For more detailed information on The Masonic Home or to request an application, please contact The Nebraska Masonic Home in Plattsmouth, NE (402) 296-7300.

- You are eligible to join other appendant bodies of the Masonic fraternity such as the Shrine, the Scottish Rite, York Rite, Eastern Star and others.
- Your female relatives for generations to come will be eligible to join the Order
 of the Eastern Star and Job's Daughters, which require relationship to a Master
 Mason.
- You may visit other lodges in your area and throughout the world recognized by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.
- If you face personal challenges, you may request aid from your lodge or the Masonic Relief Committee of the Grand Lodge.
- You have the satisfaction of knowing that your dues and participation in Freemasonry help many deserving people in your community, our state and around the world through the many philanthropies supported by our fraternity.
- Upon your death, you have the right to receive a Masonic funeral service.
- And, most importantly, you can take part in the activities, fellowship and camaraderie of the Masonic fraternity and your brothers.

This is followed by information about the brother, date of birth, date raised and lodge, to assist relatives in confirming their relationship to him.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS **RECOMMENDATION NO. 1**

Amend Section 2-310 - DUTIES OF SECRETAIRES deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the deleted language struck out:

Sec. 2-310 – DUTIES OF SECRETARIES – The Secretary of each chartered subordinate lodge shall, in addition to the usual duties incident to such office, include in his minutes the reports of committees on petitions and a record of the names of all persons rejected, suspended and expelled. He shall make all proper certificates of the standing of a Brother of his lodge upon proper request made by the Brother himself, or by any Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, or any regular Masonic body. Upon receipt of a petition for membership in his lodge, he shall at once pass the fee accompanying the same into the funds of the lodge as provided in Section 2-606. He shall obtain regular vouchers for, and report to the Treasurer, all sums appropriated for his own compensation or incidental expenses, and shall not retain them from funds received by him.

The Secretary shall also prepare monthly reports of statistical information of his lodge, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary, and shall forward such reports to the Grand Secretary not later than the 10th day of each following month. The Secretary shall also prepare an annual report giving additional information relative to his lodge on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such annual report on or before the 10th day of February following the close of each year. The Secretary shall also prepare an application for the Rock Maul Award, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such application to the Grand Secretary postmarked not later than the 31st day of December of each calendar year.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2

Amend Section 3-102 - ENUMERATED by adding certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized:

Sec. 3-102 - ENUMERATED - Masonic offenses shall consist of, but not be limited to:

(h) The dispensing, sale or consumption of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held *before or* during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3

Amend **Section 1-404** – **ALLOCATION OF FUNDS** by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

Sec. 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – The Commencing January 1, 2005, the per capita tax shall be divided *and paid* as follows:

January 2011 and thereafter	1.00
To the Nebraska Masonic Home	2.00
To the Masonic Education Newsletter	.50

commencing January 2011	20.00

The Initiation Fee shall be allocated to the General Fund.

If Recommendation No. 3 passes, the following Section must also be amended in the following ways to change references to the allocation of funds and to maintain consistency within the Bylaws.

Amend the third paragraph of **Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS** by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

Sec. 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS –

Third paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). The initiation fee shall increase to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) on January 1, 2007. In addition, each Lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Eighteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$18.50) as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2005. The per capita tax shall increase at a rate of \$2.00 for the first year commencing on the first day of January, 2008, and one dollar per year for the next three years. The said per capita tax shall accrue as follows: 2008 - \$20.50, 2009 - \$21.50, 2010 - \$22.50, and 2011 - \$23.50 and 2011 - \$24.00. The Grand Lodge shall use \$.50 of the per capita tax for the publication and distribution of a Masonic education newsletter to each member. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. In addition to the per capita tax as currently provided, commencing on January 1, 2006, each subordinate lodge shall pay to the Grand Lodge an assessment of \$1.00 per member to support the CHild Identification Program. Said assessment shall be due and

payable in the same manner as the Grand Lodge per capita tax. The funds from this assessment shall be separate from the Grand Lodge per capita tax and shall be used for no other purpose than provided above.

LODGE BYLAW AMENDMENTS APPROVED

The following amendments to lodge Bylaws were approved during the past year: On March 19, 2009, I approved an amendment to the Bylaws of Porter Lodge No.

106 in Loup City to increase the annual dues.

On April 13, 2009, I approved an amendment to the Bylaws of Custer Lodge No. 148 in Broken Bow to increase the annual dues and to change the provisions with regard to suspension of a member to align the lodge Bylaws with the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge.

On April 13, 2009, I approved an amendment to the Bylaws of Mizpah Lodge No. 302 in Omaha to change the amount required by the lodge Bylaws to be donated for Masonic purposes in a calendar year.

On May 1, 2009, I approved a complete revision of the Bylaws of Long Pine Lodge No. 136 in Long Pine.

On September 11, 2009, I approved an amendment to the Bylaws of Bee Hive Lodge No. 184 in Omaha to increase the annual dues.

On January 4, 2010, I approved an amendment to the Bylaws of Western Star Lodge No. 2 in Nebraska City to increase the amount the secretary receives for his services at each regular or special communication of the lodge.

APPROVAL OF ONE-DAY CONFERRALS

As provided by Section 2-1202, I approved the requests of the following lodges to confer the Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft and Master Mason Degrees on more than one candidate at a time on the indicated date. Same lodges were allowed to accept and agree to requests for courtesy degrees for the approved multiple candidate conferrals from other lodges in their area.

These approvals were granted subject to the following conditions:

During the conferral of each degree, each candidate will:

a. Be received in each degree in the prescribed manner;

- b. Be caused to attend prayer and be asked the proper question in the Entered Apprentice Degree;
- c. Receive the obligation in each degree while positioned behind the Altar; and
- Receive instruction on the Working Tools, all lectures, and the charge of each degree.

In addition, the following conditions will apply:

- a. The number of candidates for any one degree will be limited to not more than twenty-five;
- b. Each candidate will be instructed using the Standard Proficiency Manual for each degree, and will be required to pass a proficiency examination before proceeding to the next degree; and
- c. Conferral of each degree will be witnessed by a member of the Committee on Work, a Deputy Grand Custodian or a Grand Lodge Officer;
- d. Each candidate will be instructed that he must sign the Bylaws of his lodge on his return home.
- e. The attached checklist for the roles of the conferral will be completed prior to commencement of the degrees. Said list will be returned to the Grand Lodge Office at least one week prior to the conferral.
- f. The secretary of the host lodge will forward to the Grand Lodge Office immediately following the conferral a complete list of all candidates in attendance who completed the work, and will notify the secretaries of lodges for whom courtesy work was given of the names of those candidates who completed the work.

PERMISSIONS AND DISPENSATIONS

On February 10, 2009, I granted dispensation waiving the provisions of Section 2-312 to permit Omadi Lodge No. 5 in South Sioux City to install their 2009 Chaplain, Junior Deacon and Junior Steward out of time.

On February 13, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-704, I gave permission to the Omaha Valley Scottish Rite to obtain a list of addresses from various lodges for the purpose of inviting them to a Friendship dinner in Fremont.

On March 6, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-207, I granted permission to DeWitt Lodge No. 111 to retain the seal of the lodge in the museum of Blue Valley Lodge No. 64 in Wilber after consolidation.

On March 9, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-704, I gave permission to the Grand Lodge Membership Committee to receive a list of all members who were suspended in 2008 for the purpose of following up for possible reinstatement.

On March 16, 2009, pursuant to the provisions of Article X, Section 1(d) of the Constitution, I granted dispensation to Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 in Plattsmouth to confer the Entered Apprentice degree on a candidate without the 3rd Section lecture, and to give the lecture to the candidate at a later date.

On March 19, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Tabula Rasa Lodge No. 332 in Lincoln to move their charter throughout the 2009 calendar year to various locations within Lincoln, for the purpose of holding regular and special communications. The notification requirements of Section 2-502 must be met.

On March 24, 2009, as provided by Section 2-503, I granted permission to Springfield Lodge No. 112 in Springfield to hold a special meeting on April 10, 2009, for the purpose of conducting business to include the payment of bills, reading of minutes, and receiving, reading and balloting on petitions.

On March 31, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of Plainview Lodge No. 204 in Plainview to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

On April 1, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Seneca Lodge No. 284 to move their charter for the regular communication in April 2009, as well as the regular communications in November, 2009, through April 2010, to Stub's Fine Dining located one mile east of Thedford on Highway 2, for the purpose of winterizing the lodge building to conserve lodge resources.

On May 27, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-612, I approved the request of Cement Lodge No. 211 in Wood River for the Grand Lodge to send a flyer via e-mail to all subordinate lodges advertising a golf tournament fundraiser.

On May 28, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Mid-West Lodge No. 317 in Hastings to move their charter on June 27, 2009, to a farm located 5 miles west of Doniphan for the purpose of holding an outdoor Master Mason degree.

On June 1, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Scribner Lodge No. 132 in Scribner to move their charter for the regular communications in July and August, 2009, to Hooper Lodge No. 72, for the purpose of holding the meetings in an air conditioned building.

On June 5, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of Long Pine Lodge No. 136 in Long Pine to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

On July 6, 2009, I appointed Stephen C. Kennedy to serve as a board member for the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children.

On July 27, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of Alliance Lodge No. 183 in Alliance to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

On July 30, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-704, I gave permission to Sesostris Shrine Center to obtain a list of all Masons in good standing in Nebraska for the purpose of reconciling it with their own membership records.

On August 3, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Cotner Lodge No. 297 in Lincoln to move their charter on September 14, 2009 to 17280 NW 12th Street, for the purpose of conducting a pasture lodge.

On August 4, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-612, I gave permission to a member of Long Pine Lodge No. 136 in Long Pine to circulate a survey via e-mail to all subordinate lodges for the purpose of compiling information on the history of lodge buildings in Nebraska.

On August 5, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to McCook Lodge No. 135 in McCook to move their charter on August 18, 2009, to a lodge member's residence for the purpose of holding an outdoor lodge meeting.

On August 25, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Wallace Lodge No. 279 in Wallace to move their charter on September 7, to a low valley two miles south and two miles east of Wallace for the purpose of holding the regular communication in an outdoor setting.

On August 25, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of BeeHive Lodge No. 184 in Omaha to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

On August 26, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-612, I granted permission to Ashlar Lodge No. 33 to sponsor the annual Robert W. Boon Thanksgiving Memorial Food Truck to benefit The Nebraska Masonic Home, and to send a letter to Nebraska Lodges requesting contributions for the same.

On September 1, 2009, I did not approve the request of Springfield Lodge No. 112 in Springfield to postpone the September regular communication to a later day of the month due to the absence of the majority of the lodge officers, because the Grand Master does not have the authority to waive provisions of individual lodge Bylaws except by means of a formal Bylaws amendment.

On September 4, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-612, I gave permission to the Masters and Wardens Club of Greater Omaha to obtain a list of all lodge Secretaries for the purpose of sending a letter regarding funding for the annual Christmas parties at The Nebraska Masonic Home and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children.

On September 15, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of Corinthian Lodge No. 83 in Wakefield to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

On September 15, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 in Plattsmouth to move their charter on September 24, 2009, to The Nebraska Masonic Home, for the purpose of conferring a Fellow Craft degree.

On September 23, 2009, I granted permission to Ark Lodge No. 335 of Oakland, Iowa, to open a lodge of Master Masons at the Omaha Valley Scottish Rite Center on October 3, 2009, for the purpose of holding a reception in honor of the new Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Iowa. No degree was to be conferred.

On October 22, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-704, I gave permission to Franklin Lodge No. 264 in Franklin to obtain a list of all Nebraska Masons residing in zip codes in the Franklin area for the purpose of inviting them to visit the lodge.

On October 31, 2009, I denied a request for official recognition from the Widows Sons Masonic Riders motorcycle organization, and encouraged the group to continue to organize and operate as they had done to date since approval of the organization by the Grand Master in 2008. The organization and its members will continue to operate under the scrutiny of the Grand Master and are subject to his authority.

On November 3, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of Wallace Lodge No. 279 in Wallace to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

On November 5, 2009, I ruled that a motion passed at the regular communication held June 3, 2009, of College View Lodge No. 320 in Lincoln denying a member further advancement in Masonry was in conflict with Section 2-1101 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws and ordered it expunged from the minutes of the meeting. I further ruled that the Master of the lodge had the authority to determine the status of the member in question and ordered that, once determined, such decision be communicated to the Grand Lodge Office.

On November 6, 2009, I did not approve an amendment to the Bylaws of Omaha Lodge No. 288 in Omaha that would have appointed a finance committee to prepare an annual budget because it would limit the authority of the Master and his plans for the year he serves in that position.

On November 11, 2009, under the provisions of Section 2-502, I granted permission to Omaha Lodge No. 288 in Omaha to move their charter on Sunday, January 3, 2010, to the Omaha Scottish Rite Center, for the purpose of holding an installation of officers.

On November 12, 2009, I issued an order to Abu Bekr Shrine Center in Sioux City, Iowa, that a request for permission be made to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska prior to any future circulars are mailed to Nebraska subordinate lodges or members thereof.

On December 21, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-704, I gave permission to Long Pine Lodge No. 136 to contact all Nebraska lodges regarding a raffle to be held by the lodge in conjunction with the 125th anniversary celebration of the lodge.

On December 23, 2009, under the provisions of Section 3-102, I approved the request of Custer Lodge No. 148 in Broken Bow to conduct a raffle pursuant to the Nebraska Small Lottery and Raffle Act.

RATIONALE (from brethren submitting Resolution): The Grand Lodge must currently withdraw from the endowment fund each year to cover day-to-day operating expenses (in 2009, it is projected to withdraw approximately \$60,000). In order for the Grand Lodge to be proactive and effective in achieving its stated Mission and Vision, it must be solvent and able to pay its operating expenses from dues alone, thereby reserving the proceeds of the endowment fund for charitable, fraternal and other activities and programs devised to advance Freemasonry in the state of Nebraska.

At a meeting of the Jurisprudence Committee held on March 4, 2009, to review the member resolutions submitted at the 152nd Annual Communication, the committee found that Resolutions 1 and 2 were not in proper form to be voted on at the 153rd Annual Communication in 2010. The committee notified the sponsors of the resolutions in writing of the findings and gave the sponsors 30 days from the date of the letter to bring the resolutions into proper form. No amendments to Resolutions 1 and 2 were received at the Grand Lodge Office.

The Jurisprudence Committee found Resolution No. 3 to be in proper form to be voted on with a note that Section 1-406 referred to in the original Resolution No. 3 be amended to read Section 1-404 due to the approval of Grand Master's Recommendation No. 1 at the 152nd Annual Communication.

TRIAL COMMISSIONS

In the Trial Commission for a member of Covert Lodge No. 11, the individual was found guilty by the Commission and expelled from the Masonic fraternity on June 17, 2009.

CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

Entering my service to the brothers in Nebraska, I realized our most challenging problem is lodge leadership. At this point, I'm not certain that situation has largely changed despite seven years of Lodge Leadership Program training. Our focus in 2009 was to get this training close to all the upcoming lodge leaders, which we attempted and is mentioned in greater detail in an earlier section. In addition, M : W : B : Reg Kuhn granted approval in 2008 to:

- Create a website for incoming Masters titled "Lodge Leaders '09," which contained 2009 dates of events and activities, monthly updates of leadership information and guides to make a lodge plan for the coming year.
- Develop a "Lodge Planning Guide" to help incoming Masters plan an effective program for their lodge in 2009. This was sent following the election of officers to every Master-elect. Besides 2009 plans, it included a step-by-step program to help him make a plan in key areas of lodge success.

At Annual Communication one year ago, during a meeting with 2009 Masters, I asked their opinion of these leadership-building tools. Their comments recognized them as useful and the need was expressed to repeat them. I left feeling our lodges had moved in a very positive direction. However, in my travels, in discussions with Masters and brothers, and as reflected in the entries for the awards program, it appeared few Masters utilized this information. And, even if the information wasn't used, I'm not certain much planning occurred except repeating activities held in lodges year after year.

This lack of planning is reflected in our membership numbers. At the time of this writing, our losses stand at about 3.3 percent. This is a slightly higher percentage of losses than in previous years when they have fallen between 2.5 percent to 3 percent. I expect the 2009 losses to grow even more when every lodge has filed their report. Granted, three lodges decided in 2009 to purge their membership of more than 100 brothers they had carried on the books for a number of years. But, these numbers indicate our lodges aren't offering brothers a "product" they want.

I repeat my message of the last 12 months: our biggest problem isn't membership, it's a lack of programs in lodges that will keep brothers interested, wanting to attend lodge and that cater to their needs. That requires planning. It's the kind of planning taught in the Lodge Leadership Program, the Enrollment Program and other offerings from the Grand Lodge.

Who will step up to advance their lodge in the coming years? What Master will put his responsibility high on his priority list and dedicate himself and spend the time it really takes to make his lodge better? As I said to the 2009 Masters last year at this time, "If it's not you, then who?"

Those who believe serving as Master is about gaining a title have missed the point. It should be an honor to have earned the designation of Past Master. It is an honor when you have given your all to your lodge, and that requires work. Serving as Master is more than a title. It's responsibility to care for and nurture your lodge so it's stronger for years to come.

It is my hope that those attending the 2010 Annual Communication will be the group that will reach that goal. If it is to happen, then it will be necessary for lodge officers to sit down together, plan multi-year programs that annually address the weaknesses of their lodge and then dedicate the time and effort it takes to improve their lodge. I applaud the 2009 Masters who took advantage of these opportunities to learn and grow, and who applied them to their lodge last year. You are true leaders, and I expect your lodge is headed down a road toward greater camaraderie and growth.

I also have concern about the many brothers who believe we must continue to "under price" membership in our highly-respected fraternity by maintaining low dues. Since its birth, Freemasonry has attracted visionaries and builders who were instrumental in creating great societies and adorned them with stunning buildings. As operative Masonry evolved to speculative Masonry, the movers and shakers in our world joined because of the camaraderie and intellectual stimulation offered during their meetings. Our fraternity constructed significant edifices that stand today as a tribute to their industriousness and commitment to Masonry.

Our fraternity constructed significant edifices that stand today as a tribute to their industriousness and commitment to Masonry. Across our nation, we see buildings such as the George Washington Masonic Memorial, the House of the Temple and other houses for Grand Lodges, the Scottish Rite, the Shrine, and many more. In our own state, it was obvious in the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children, The Nebraska Masonic Home, and our Shrine and Scottish Rite centers, and local lodge buildings. Today, however, many buildings are barely being maintained, and it is next to impossible to even consider constructing a new Masonic building for the lack of funds.

While writing the history of our Grand Lodge, I came across the dues paid by our brethren to our state body in the 1940s. Applying the Consumer Price Index (CPI) to those dues, today we would pay more than \$70 to the Grand Lodge to keep pace with the comparable amount our forefathers paid, while today our per capita is about \$50 below that amount. Applying the CPI to Lodge dues 60 years ago would make dues even higher. And, compared to the fees to take the degrees then, today's fees should be several hundreds of dollars higher. My brothers, we live the precepts of our organization by providing the resources to make a difference in this world, our nation, our state and our communities.

I have heard of interested men asking about the cost of lodge dues. When told the amount, they state it's not too high a monthly cost, without even considering that's actually the annual cost. I'm not advocating an across-the-board, large increase in dues, but we shouldn't run from higher dues either. I fear we have cheapened membership in our fraternity to the point that the luster of membership is tarnished.

Instead, it is past time to ensure the buildings where we meet are maintained for use in the future. It also is time that we have the resources to make our communities more aware of our fraternity. If Freemasonry is truly as worthy an organization as we espouse, then today's dedicated Masons would have no qualms about higher dues to at least preserve what now exists. If not, then we will continue to lose our buildings, and more and more lodges will close. Our membership will continue to fall and more lodges will close.

Resources beget more resources. When lodges and the Grand Lodge have larger funds, we can adequately inform worthy men about our fraternity and establish programs to keep our brothers active. It's time for us to ask ourselves the value we each place on membership in our organization, and what it's worth to make it stronger so our Masonic values will continue to have a presence and influence in communities across Nebraska.

CONCLUSION

As I stated earlier, knowing the men who have held the office of Grand Master in recent years, and having read the proceedings of all those who came before us, I remain humbled by the experience and the many brothers who have honored the office of the Grand Master this past year. My greatest hope is that the many activities and the hard work of myself, the Grand Lodge Officers and committees, will make an obvious difference resulting in a healthier fraternity in Nebraska. I await the outcome of so much thinking, planning and implementation of programs as our efforts sink in, take hold and begin to reveal themselves in our lodges. Pray that is the case.

M : W : B : Reno asked R : W : B : Dave Watts to approach the East and give a report on the move of the Grand Lodge Office.

'Most Worshipful Grand Master and brethren. In 1999, the Masonic Foundation purchased the building which currently houses the Grand Lodge Offices as a temporary home, with hopes of relocating to an adequate facility within 10 years. In 2007, the Grand Lodge advancing line began to look for a new home for our Grand Lodge Offices, the reasons being the need for more space for our museum and house our CHIP program, the desire to improve the visibility of the Grand Lodge, the deterioration of the neighborhood, but primarily out of a concern for the safety of our employees. We looked at options either to buy land and build, buy an existing property or options to rent from the Lincoln Valley Scottish Rite or possibly another lodge in Lincoln. The Grand Lodge advancing line officers spent much of 2007 discussing the options and finally determined the existing Scottish Rite building located on Centennial Mall and a block from the State Capitol provided the visibility and image Nebraska Masonry sought, a premium museum location to display our Masonic heritage, a venue to educate the public on Masonry, but foremost, this option offered the most bang for our buck, if you will, compared to any of the other options we looked at.

In 2008, the Grand Lodge advancing line officers met several times with the Lincoln Valley Scottish Rite and determined the best option for the Grand Lodge was to negotiate an agreement with the Lincoln Valley to cost-share in the improvements and share tenancy in the facility. We hired an architect to work with a committee made up of members from both organizations to develop a conceptual plan and to determine the estimated costs for the improvements. Last year at the 2009 Annual Communication, we presented conceptual drawings and estimated costs to complete the project to the brethren, which is laid out in three phases. These phases may be done independently or concurrently, depending on funds available. Phase one of this project would consist of relocating the Grand Lodge Offices, relocating the Scottish Rite Offices, and renovation of the existing space currently rented to the Shrine Bowl. Included in this phase are improvements to the façade of the east side of the building, along with some mechanical and electrical improvements to accommodate the move. Phase two of the project consists of major mechanical and electrical improvements to the remainder of the building, along with renovations of the banquet room and the lower floor facilities. Phase three of this project would consist of museum renovations, including mechanical and electrical work to provide climate control, as well as security systems and display cases for our items of significant value, some of which are currently in storage. Realistically, a portion of the phase three expense would need to be recognized during the phase one project in order to create space for our Grand Lodge museum items and to allow the Masonic Foundation to vacate and sell the existing Grand Lodge building, the proceeds of which would tentatively be earmarked for new museum improvements.

In the Spring of 2009, both organizations agreed to hire an Omaha firm, Strawhecker and Associates, to conduct a feasibility study to determine if the funds could be raised to improve the building prior to us moving forward with any agreement. We received the report in January and Strawhecker believes a majority of these funds can be raised and a capital campaign should be launched in the near future if we determine to move forward. The Grand Lodge and the Lincoln Valley have continued working toward and are very close to an

agreement for governance that will provide both entities with equal control of the facility and equal protection of each other's investments in this project. Both organizations are very excited about the possibility this offers to Nebraska Masonry and Scottish Rite Masonry. For those of you that know me, I like to see progress, and I can be impatient at times, and working with the Masonic organizations, to say the least, is a challenge for me. But we are moving forward and I believe that we will be able to launch a capital campaign in the near future. I am also optimistic that with a little luck we could be ready to break ground yet in 2010.

The Strawhecker report provided us with a great deal of information about our organizations and our members and the issues that we as the Grand Lodge Officers and we as the Grand Lodge need to address to ensure the health of our fraternity in years to come. We were especially pleased that the support for this project for Masons in greater Nebraska was equal or greater than those polled in the Lincoln area. But the greatest support for this project came from our Omaha Masons, which speaks volumes about the commitment to Masonry across our entire state.

Since the elections are over, I also want to share a couple results from the report that I found especially interesting and were a surprise to Strawhecker's team. First, the members of our organizations are very conservative when it comes to the amount they're willing to give, not the number of Masons willing to give, but the amount that we're willing to give. Now, I got a chuckle out of that because I was going to say that I know Masons are cheap, but maybe we're just conservative. The second result that they were surprised by was that Masons are deeply committed to their organization. They said the commitment of Masons to this fraternity is higher than what they see in most churches. So we may be cheap, but we are deeply committed to this fraternity.

My response to Strawhecker was that I wasn't surprised at all. You see, neither Paul Strawhecker or Scott Larson are Masons, so neither understand the tie that binds us together; that bond that you can only experience through family. And, it's that tie that can't be explained. It's a tie that has to be experienced. Brethren, I believe that never before in Nebraska Masonry has an opportunity of this magnitude been put before the Craft and I truly believe that this opportunity and the benefits it will offer for the years to come will give Nebraska Masons a reason to contribute to this cause. If any of you have questions, I'll stick around after the session. Most Worshipful, this concludes my report. Thank you."

REPORT OF THE MASONIC RELIEF COMMITTEE

John T. Maxell, Chairman

The Grand Lodge Committee on Relief is happy to report that for the second year in a row our relief fund has not been a line item on the Grand Lodge Budget. This means the committee has become self-supporting. This has been accomplished by the Masons in the state of Nebraska who have helped with their donations, time, and purchase of fundraiser materials.

This year, the committee has put together a fund raising campaign that should allow it to continue to help our brothers, and families. This will be accomplished by running an online store through the Nebraska Grand Lodge website. The profits from the sale of items sold will go directly to the Masonic Relief Funds. In addition to these profits, the committee sold lapel pins, received funds from area lodges during Masonic relief month

(February 2009), and Billy Dittmer of Mid-West Lodge No. 317, Hastings, Nebraska.

The committee answered five requests for relief and denied one. Over \$2,000 dollars has been distributed. The committee has raised over \$4,600 dollars and has a balance in their account of \$12,489.90 dollars.

DEPUTY GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

M : W : B : Grand Master Reno asked R : W : B : John T. Parsons for the Address of the Deputy Grand Master.

Brethren, I am very honored and humbled to stand before you today. As I was preparing this address, a lot of things crossed my mind, the first of which was, "What do you say in a situation like this, and how do you say it?" With that in mind, I took out copies of previous Grand Lodge sessions from my bookshelf, and looked through them to see what my predecessors had said. I found that the addresses of the Deputy Grand Masters ranged from non-existent through short and to the point speeches, and finally to full-blown, longwinded orations. I hope this falls into the category of relatively short, clear, and to the point.

The distinguished brethren who have preceded me in this position all had some great concepts, ideas and programs. For one reason or another, some of those concepts, ideas, and programs flourished, while others did not fare as well. Additionally, there is a natural tendency for the "new guy" to want to leave his mark on his term, so that it will go down in posterity as significant and noteworthy. Often, these attempts to influence posterity last for a year or so, and then disappear as the next set of "great ideas" formulated by somebody else appears on the scene.

I am also a believer in the concept that good ideas never go away. They may morph or change a bit, but they really never disappear. I also believe that there are underlying and fundamental values and themes that form the foundation for our great fraternity and these never really change. Consequently, in putting together my agenda for this year, I have attempted to continue those programs which have proven successful; to modify and retain other good ideas; to re-emphasize some of those values and themes central to our Craft which perhaps have been downplayed a bit; and finally, to introduce initiatives that appeal to some of our core values as Freemasons.

The Child Identification Program (CHIP), begun by Past Grand Master Ivan Vrtiska, is a great example of a good idea that never goes away. That program has been a resounding success in Nebraska. Many of our lodges have used this program as a way to get involved in their communities, and overall, the fraternity has achieved a great deal of positive publicity as a result. At the 2009 Nebraska State Fair, over 1,300 children were enrolled

in CHIP, far more than any other previous or comparable efforts by any other organization. Consequently, when a prospective member comes up to you and asks, "What do Masons do here in the community?" you won't have to scratch your head to come up with an answer. I will continue to urge individual lodges to conduct CHIP events in their communities. It is a method by which we can do the right thing for the children in the community; establish good public rapport, and as a result of those two things, perhaps attract some good men to our ranks.

Masonic unity is a theme that also should recur year after year. Masonry is a family and, like some families, too often we have spats among the relatives. I've often heard comments to the effect that "He's not a good Blue Lodge Mason. He spends all his time at Shrine (or Scottish Rite or fill in the blank)." My bottom line philosophy on all this is that we're all Masons, and there is a niche for everybody. Some people may enjoy the social aspects of the Shrine, or the staged ritual of the Scottish Rite, or the degrees of the York Rite, or working with our Eastern Star sisters, more than they do in sitting in a lodge meeting. That's the beauty of the Masonic family: there's something of interest for everybody. We all share the same basic values and we all work toward a common good: the betterment of society and ourselves. We need to view all the disparate elements of Masonry as complementary and not competitive. To that end, I would encourage each of you to develop closer working relationships with the appendant bodies, the Eastern Star, and the youth groups. I plan on supporting the activities of those bodies this year as best I can.

The blood drives instituted last year by Grand Master Russ Reno were a good idea and were successful in some, but not all areas of the state. As with CHIP, blood drives focused on the contribution of the local lodges to their communities. This year, I would encourage lodges who had successful blood drives to continue to build upon that success, and reschedule a drive at a date and time that would best suit the people in their lodge and in their local area. For those lodges that did not conduct a blood drive last year, explore the possibilities of doing one this year.

Ritual and Masonic decorum, while traditional elements of our fraternity, have perhaps suffered a bit in recent years, and deserve to be re-emphasized. Ritual is what separates us from the service and social clubs of the world. Ritual is the means by which we inculcate the values, lessons, and symbolism of the Craft on new members. Make an effort to learn the ritual and deliver it properly, so that the new members will be impressed and will wish to return and take part in the degree work. Similarly, we need to restore a bit more decorum while the lodge is at work. While I am not advocating that the lodge atmosphere ought to be "stuffy," I am saying that we need adhere to certain standards. For example, loud sideline conversations that drown out the degree work in progress; the Worshipful Master attired in t-shirt, shorts, and flip-flops, showing up to confer a degree; and cell phone conversations conducted while the lodge is at work, are all examples of lapses in Masonic decorum. We need to adhere to a higher standard so that our new initiates realize that they have joined a world-class brotherhood.

Charity is another bedrock tenet of our fraternity. Over the past several years, the Grand Lodge has conducted several fund raising efforts, offering such things as pocket watches, hats, coins, and pins to the membership, with all the proceeds going only to Masonic charitable endeavors. I hope to continue that tradition next year so that the Grand Lodge, in conjunction with the local lodges, may be better enabled to assist "poor distressed brother Master Masons, their widows, and orphans."

Finally, I'd like to discuss two programs, one of which was started under M : W : B : Ivan Vrtiska and continued under M : W : B : Dean Skokan, while the other is new. Both programs, however, have deep roots in Masonic tradition, and involve support to our armed forces.

Masonry and the military have been inextricably intertwined since the very beginnings of Freemasonry in North America. Military lodges were chartered by the Modern and Ancient Grand Lodges of England, the Grand Lodge of Scotland, and the Grand Lodge of Ireland. These lodges were attached to various regiments in the British Army, and were active in the colonies prior to the American Revolution. Similarly, several lodges, chartered by Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, were attached to units of the Continental Army, and lodge meetings were held where the army set up camp, in locations such as Morristown, New Jersey, Newburgh, New York, and Valley Forge. After the war, the lodges were disbanded, but other Masonic lodges were established to support American forces in other later conflicts.

Nebraska issued a dispensation during the Civil War for Monitor Lodge. That lodge accompanied elements of the Union Army for several years, meeting in various locations. After the war, that lodge was also disbanded. With Monitor Lodge as an example, M : W : B : Vrtiska established Swisher Lodge, as a traveling lodge, and issued a dispensation allowing it to meet in Afghanistan. It also met later in Iraq, supporting the fraternal needs of the brethren deployed to those locations, but it is not now deployed. Currently, there is only one lodge meeting in Iraq: a lodge chartered by the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Maryland. There are no other Masonic lodges, chartered by any other grand lodge, meeting in either the Afghan or Iraqi theaters of operations. I hope to remedy that situation.

The new program that I propose to start is called "Change for the Troops." This was started two years ago by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, and they have had great results. The program provides a 300-minute calling card to any member of the armed forces deploying to Iraq or Afghanistan. The funding to purchase those phone cards is provided through contributions by members of individual lodges. At the conclusion of each lodge meeting, the brethren present throw any loose change they have into specially marked containers. At the end of the month, the lodge secretary sends a check for the donated amount to the Grand Lodge, and that in turn, goes into the account to purchase the phone cards. To date, over a quarter of a million dollars has been so raised by Pennsylvania Masons.

Over the next year, there will be a large number of Nebraskans, particularly Nebraska National Guardsmen, deploying overseas, most of them to Afghanistan. I feel confident that Nebraska Masons will show the same level of support for those troops that our Pennsylvania brethren displayed through their efforts.

In closing, I'd like to thank you all for your support, and I know that with your continued help and assistance Nebraska Masonry can demonstrate its timeless virtues and continue to grow and prosper in the future. Thank you and God Bless!

The Traveling Gavel was presented as a gift to the Grand Lodge by the Family of Past Grand Master James L. "Sonny" Eatmon, (GM 1992) in 2005. M:W:B: Eatmon entered into that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens on August 28, 1999. W:B: John Ferguson handcrafted this beautiful wood gavel and case in honor of his father-in-law. The gavel or wood maul was commissioned as the James L. "Sonny" Eatmon Traveling Gavel on February 3, 2006.

Symbolic of the operative craft working as Masons in the construction of Ancient Monumental Edifices and the intricate detail of ornamentation, it is appropriate that this gavel or wood maul work in our lodges to demonstrate leadership and concern to the fine details of fellowship among our speculative craft and thus encourage visitations among our lodges and brethren.

This gavel will depart Annual Communication each year with the Lodge of the New Grand Master. It will be the responsibility of at least four brethren, of which at least two must be officers, of that lodge to visit another lodge within 30 days and to carry and deposit the gavel to the visited lodge. That lodge will then hold the same obligation of visiting and depositing the gavel in another lodge within 30 days.

The gavel was presented to Deputy Grand Master John T. Parsons and George W. Lininger Lodge No. 268 in Omaha.

The Jurisprudence Committee was called to order at 10 am on Thursday, February 4, 2010 by M∴W∴B∴ Dwight Smith with the following additional members present: M∴W∴ Bros. Les Seiler, Dean Skokan and Reginald S. Kuhn. Also present were: Russell G. Reno, Grand Master; John T. Parsons, Deputy Grand Master; E. David Watts, Grand Senior Warden; Bruce A. Baker, Grand Junior Warden; Scott Krieger, Grand Custodian; James Lapaseotes, Grand Chaplain; Thomas Hauder, Grand Senior Deacon; John B. Ferguson, Grand Junior Steward; Patrick D. Barger, Grand Orator; Ben F. Hughes, Grand Historian; Joe D. McBride, Grand Marshal; Dennis Rix, Personal Representative of the Grand Master; Philip Edwards, Grand Tyler; as well as Past Grand Masters Don E. Rasmussen; Donald Pohlman, Charles W. Grand Lodge of the State of Guanajuato (Mexico), Grand Lodge of Cyprus, Grand Loge du Niger, The Grand Lodge of Estado de Aguascalientes (Mexico), The Grand Lodge of Estado De Guerrero (Mexico), The Grand Lodge of Montenegro, The Grand Lodge of the Kingdom of Morocco, The Grand Lodge of San Marino, Grand Lodge of Baja California (Mexico) and the Gran Logia "Occidental Mexicana" (Mexico).

The committee continues to solicit for recognition from the various Prince Hall Grand Lodges in those jurisdictions where Prince Hall Grand Lodges and Grand Lodges under the canopy of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America have entered into agreements of mutual fraternal recognition.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

M : W : B : Reno asked Deputy Grand Master John Parsons to assume the lectern and preside over the discussion of the Grand Master's Recommendations. R : W : B : Parsons gave the general instructions and indicated the voting would first be attempted by a show of raising the paper ballots in the air, then moving to a paper ballot if necessary.

Recommendaton No. 1

I recommend that **Section 2-310 – DUTIES OF SECRETAIRES** be amended as follows by deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the deleted language struck out:

Sec. 2-310 – DUTIES OF SECRETARIES – The Secretary of each chartered subordinate lodge shall, in addition to the usual duties incident to such office, include in his minutes the reports of committees on petitions and a record of the names of all persons rejected, suspended and expelled. He shall make all proper certificates of the standing of a Brother of his lodge upon proper request made by the Brother himself, or by any Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, or any regular Masonic body. Upon receipt of a petition for membership in his lodge, he shall at once pass the fee accompanying the same into the funds of the lodge as provided in Section 2-606. He shall obtain regular vouchers for, and report to the Treasurer, all sums appropriated for his own compensation or incidental expenses, and shall not retain them from funds received by him.

The Secretary shall also prepare monthly reports of statistical information of his lodge, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary, and shall forward such reports to the Grand Secretary not later than the 10th day of each following month. The Secretary shall also prepare an annual report giving additional information relative to his lodge on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such annual report on or before the 10th day of February following the close of each year. The Secretary shall also prepare an application for the Rock Maul Award, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such application to the Grand Secretary postmarked not later than the 31st day of December of each calendar year.

A motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 1 was made and seconded. M : W : B : Reno gave his rationale for proposing the Recommendation. There being no discussion, Deputy Grand Master called for the question and, by a show of raised ballots, the motion passed with a two-thirds majority vote.

Recommendation No. 2

I recommend that **Section 3-102 - ENUMERATED** be amended as follows by adding certain language, so that such section will read as follows, with the new language italicized:

Sec. 3-102 – ENUMERATED – Masonic offenses shall consist of, but not be limited to:

(h) The dispensing, sale or consumption of any intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, except in an official Masonic ceremony, in any portion of a dedicated lodge building where Masonic activities are held *before or* during a tyled meeting of any lodge or appendant body.

A motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 2 was made and seconded. M : W : B : Reno gave his rationale for proposing the Recommendation. After discussion, by a show of raised ballots, the motion failed to obtain the required two-thirds majority vote.

Recommendation No. 3

I recommend that **Section 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS** be amended as follows by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

Sec. 1-404 – **ALLOCATION OF FUNDS** – The Commencing January 1, 2005, the per capita tax shall be divided *and paid* as follows:

If Recommendation No. 3 passes, the following Section must also be amended in the following ways to change references to the allocation of funds and to maintain consistency within the Bylaws.

Amend the third paragraph of **Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS** by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

Sec. 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS –

Third paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). The initiation fee shall increase to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) on January 1, 2007. In addition, each Lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Eighteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$18.50) as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2005. The per capita tax shall increase at a rate of \$2.00 for the first year commencing on

the first day of January, 2008, and one dollar per year for the next three years. The said per capita tax shall accrue as follows: 2008 - \$20.50, 2009 - \$21.50, 2010 - \$22.50, and 2011 - \$23.50 and 2011 - \$24.00. The Grand Lodge shall use \$.50 of the per capita tax for the publication and distribution of a Masonic education newsletter to each member. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. In addition to the per capita tax as currently provided, commencing on January 1, 2006, each subordinate lodge shall pay to the Grand Lodge an assessment of \$1.00 per member to support the CHild Identification Program. Said assessment shall be due and payable in the same manner as the Grand Lodge per capita tax. The funds from this assessment shall be separate from the Grand Lodge per capita tax and shall be used for no other purpose than provided above.

A motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 3 was made and seconded. M : W : B : Russ gave his rationale for proposing the Recommendation. After discussion, by a show of raised ballots, the motion passed with a two-thirds majority vote.

The Grand Lodge Education Committee consists of Bob Whipple, Dale Anderson, Denny Brydl, Eduardo Casas, Jeremy Myers, John Parsons, Larry Jacobsen, Mike Webb, Ron Stites, and Tom Hauder. These brethren work very hard to support the many projects of the committee. The committee is constantly on the lookout for more brethren with the same desire to assist in bringing Masonic Education to the Masons of Nebraska. More support is needed from the Western and Northern parts of Nebraska. Experience is not necessary, everyone else started with limited knowledge in Masonry and only the desire to learn and share their knowledge with others.

The Education Committee launched the Nebraska Masonic Education portal at www.nebraskamasoniceducation.com. This site is dedicated to bringing together a wide variety of educational materials, presentations and short courses on Masonry. These materials are available for use by any lodge or Mason seeking further information in Masonry. One of the more popular parts of the website is the online discussion forum where brothers can exchange ideas and opinions on Masonic Education.

The quarterly section of the Nebraska Mason called "To Light" is a product of the Nebraska Grand Lodge Education Committee. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Larry Jacobsen, John Parsons and others, Masonic Education is delivered to the mailboxes of all Nebraska Masons. Thanks to utilizing the Nebraska Mason as a delivery method, four issues a year are being delivered. Articles are being provided by the SRICF and the Saints John Lodge of Education in addition to members of the Education Committee.

All Masons enter in Masonry with an obligation to seek more "Light in Masonry." The Grand Lodge Education Committee has taken on the charge to direct Nebraska Masons to sources of the light of Masonic education. The committee member's time, not to mention the committee's meek budget, doesn't give them the luxury of being able to visit each lodge and deliver Masonic Education. The Masonic Education Symposium is held two times a year, as a tool used to demonstrate how any member or lodge can deliver Masonic Education to their members. The Masonic Education Symposiums are held in March and October. These are professional programs, which allow the attendees to walk away with Masonic history, philosophy, information, etc., about the fraternity. More importantly, it will give the attendees a demonstration of how to present Masonic Education to their own lodge. In addition, a game of Masonic Jeopardy is presented. Many of the committee members enjoy this, as much as the Masons that attend. Mike Webb stepped up this year to assist in bringing Masonry to anyone in the Western half of Nebraska who requested it. Mike held several mini-symposiums to bring Masonic Education into the Blue Lodge.

This year, as in the past, the Masonic Education Committee begins the year with the Grand Lodge Masonic Education Breakfast. A professional Masonic Education program is presented by the talented members of the committee. Masons from all over Nebraska have the opportunity to attend this presentation and go home with a little more knowledge about the fraternity. In addition, the committee makes book reading recommendations that enable the Masons of Nebraska to expand their Masonic knowledge even more.

Masonic Education should be a part of the monthly business meetings. The internet is a valuable source of Masonic information. Masonic Education can be brought into the business meeting simply by finding a 5-10 minute definition of a Masonic Symbol. Another method is to hold a short discussion, whether during the business meeting or after. Many members have opinions of "meaning of Masonic symbolism," "Masonic values," "potential of Masonry influence in current society," etc. Many times during these discussions, members find that their opinions change, after hearing a different slant on the topic. Many times, the discussion is difficult to end, and continues after the meeting is over.

The Nebraska Grand Lodge Masonic Education Committee continues to support the Midwest Masonic Education Conference. This conference gives the committee ideas about how to better channel Masonic Education to the Masons of Nebraska. Many of the committee activities are aided, if not born by ideas picked up at these conferences. This conference gives the committee the opportunity to hear the successes and experiments of several surrounding states in Masonic Education. This conference includes the jurisdictions of Kansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Manitoba, Michigan, Missouri, Minnesota, Ohio, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. The 2010 conference will be held in Kansas City on May 7 - 9.

The Nebraska Masonic Education Lodge (Saints John Lodge) continues to draw both attendees and presenters. Members of this lodge share a desire to pursue more light in Masonry. There are 2 meetings per year, on St. John the Baptist Day and St. John the Evangelist Day. The meetings include papers being presented by members and of course, no Masonic gathering would be complete without a meal. Any member of the committee will be happy to give anyone more information and instruction on how to join.

The Masonic Education Committee continues to request brethren who have e-mail addresses, to give it to the Grand Lodge. Contacting the Grand Lodge is all it takes to get

your e-mail address on the list. This will enable a member to be notified about Masonic Education activities in the area, not to mention Grand Lodge activities.

Thanks to the members of the committee and other volunteers who take the time and effort to make the presentations; to the Grand Lodge Officers and Grand Lodge staff for the great support the committee receives; and to the lodges and valleys who volunteer to support the committee.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

James F. Brown, Jr., Chairman

The Grand Lodge Office Committee is charged with the responsibility of overseeing the efficient operation of the Grand Lodge Office and its employees. Additionally, the committee manages the assets required by the Grand Lodge Office. In discharging this responsibility, the committee met formally on one occasion and at other times through the use of e-mail. The results of the actions taken by this committee follow:

- Mileage Reimbursement Amount No change was made in the mileage reimbursement rate for eligible members of the Grand Lodge traveling in an official capacity. The mileage reimbursement rate remains at 30 cents per mile
- **Grand Lodge Fixed Assets** The committee reviewed the list of fixed assets owned by the Grand Lodge. There were no purchases of equipment during 2009 and none of the current fixed assets were deleted.
- Committee Budget The 2010 budget request for the Grand Lodge Office Committee was set at \$60.
- Grand Lodge Liability and Insurance Package The current status of the insurance package carried by the Grand Lodge was reviewed. The Grand Lodge Office provides health, dental and life insurance covering the two office employees. Current premiums are as follows: \$2,355.20/month health, \$85.36/month dental, \$37.57/month for \$25,000 life insurance. The term life insurance was increased from \$15,000 to \$25,000 for the 2010 Masonic year. The Grand Lodge Office Committee decided to stay with the same insurance companies for 2010 Blue Cross/Blue Shield for health, MetLife for dental and United States Life for life insurance.
- **Grand Lodge Office Policies** The Grand Lodge Office Policy Manual was reviewed and updated during the current year.
- **CHIP Program** Since the CHIP Foundation uses resources of the Grand Lodge, an Administrative Fee is charged to cover payroll, rent, and other elements of overhead. The fee was set at \$1,330 per month for 2010. This is an increase of \$30 per month over the 2009 fee.
- **Grand Lodge Office Employees** Raises for employees of the Grand Lodge were determined and communicated to the employees.

The Grand Lodge Office Committee would like to acknowledge the professional manner in which the employees of the Grand Lodge Office perform their duties. Their competence and professional demeanor should be applauded by every mason in Nebraska! You are encouraged to stop by the Grand Lodge Office the next time you are in Lincoln. Your presence is always welcome.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Edward W. Nolte, Chairman

The purpose of this report is to do the following:

- Identify the Nebraska Grand Lodge Membership Committee members, who supported the Grand Lodge and the Masons of Nebraska for 2009.
- Describe what the committee did in the way of leadership, management, and activities to improve and increase membership in 2009.
- Show the results achieved from this effort.
- Analyze what was successful, what was not, and what needs additional emphasis
 in the future.

The Committee: The Grand Lodge Membership Committee for 2009 consisted of brothers Ed Nolte as Chairman, Steve Barchus, Patrick Barger, C. Scott McDaniel and John Wonder, with Randall Ogier and Stan Thayer serving as ad hoc members, and R:W:B: E. David Watts, 2009 Grand Senior Warden, as our advisor and strong supporter. The committee worked hard this year to make significant improvements in Masonic membership across Nebraska.

Leadership, Management and Activities: Beginning at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge A.F.&A.M of Nebraska in February 2009, the Grand Lodge Membership Committee did the following:

- Briefed the membership on the overall status of membership over the last 50 years to present the "big picture" of where we have been, where we are currently, and where we are going relative to membership in Nebraska.
 - o Showed how membership has declined from a high of 48,000 members in 1958 to 13,498 members at the end of 2008.
 - o Showed the steady decline of 2-6% per year each and every year of the last 50 years for a total loss of 72% of our membership strength.
 - o Described the goal of raising 1,000 to 1,200 new Masons.
 - Challenged the members to each make a difference and help turn around the decline.
- Met with the other committees at the All-Committee Meeting in Fremont in April.
- Held several planning meetings in Omaha and Lincoln to develop a comprehensive plan to address all aspects of membership in very large, large, medium, and small lodges across Nebraska.
- Briefed the Grand Lodge Line Officers in Lincoln on our plans and obtained approval of that plan.

- Divided the state into 18 regions with each region containing 5-10 lodges, which
 would or could work together to increase activities for their members, improve
 lodge visibility to those who might want to become a Mason, improve relevance
 to their community, and improve the ability to deliver the degrees for new
 Masons
- Worked with the Membership Chairman and the Master in each lodge through the briefing, Grand Lodge website, and questionnaires.
- Established a concept of Friendship Dinners, which has proven successful in Omaha, Council Bluffs, Fremont, and elsewhere to ensure that lodges had a proven tool to help increase membership.
- Fostered and promoted the concept of One-Day Degrees, again proven successful in large and small communities in Eastern Nebraska over the last 10 or more years, to provide a cadre of Masons who are capable of performing quality ritual work and all facets of the degrees to initiate, pass, and raise prospective members.
- Offered to help set up the Friendship Dinners, One-Day Degrees, or any other activity for those that requested support.
- Developed and distributed a questionnaire for all lodges to survey what lodges are doing in the way of activities, functions, meetings, ritual proficiency, Masonic service, and what they needed most.
- Challenged each Mason in Nebraska to bring in just one new member because neither the Grand Lodge Officers, the Membership Committee, nor the Master of each lodge can do what needs to be done by themselves—it takes every brother to be a part of the solution.

The Results: At the beginning of 2009, there were 13,498 Masons in Nebraska in 148 lodges, and at the end of 2009, instead of raising 1,000 to 1,200 new Masons and showing an increase in membership, there are 13,073 Masons in Nebraska in 147 lodges, representing a loss of 425 Masons and 1 lodge. At a macro level and on the positive side, lodges across Nebraska raised 256 new Masons, affiliated 22, obtained 28 dual members, reinstated 109, and obtained 21 from consolidation for a total of 436 gains. On the loss side, lodges lost 33 members to demits, 326 to death, 458 to suspensions, 3 to withdrawals, 18 to termination of dual memberships, and 23 to other causes for a total of 861 losses. The difference between gains and losses resulted in a reduction in membership of 425 brothers.

The Analysis: The results obtained from the Nebraska Grand Lodge Membership Committee's leadership, management, activities, and efforts were certainly not what we had worked to achieve. However, some results from the membership numbers show where we need to focus our attention in the future.

Raising New Master Masons: For 2009, Nebraska Masonic lodges raised 256 new Masons, which is respectable, but it was down by 72, or 22%, from 2008's 328 raisings and well below the stated goal of 1,000 to 1,200 new Masons. The drop from 2008 is a significant enough difference to say that we should place additional emphasis on raising more new Masons. Statistically, losses from all sources is such that unless we can generate numbers approaching 1,000, total membership will nearly always show a loss. While there is no "magic or symbolic number," a Grand Lodge target of 1,000 new Masons in 2010 with a monthly "thermometer chart" is a worthwhile goal. We need to work to engage each Member in this activity to be successful. Everyone needs to be engaged, and if necessary, we need to incentivize them to be engaged.

Other Membership Increases: These sources for 2009 included 22 affiliations, 28 dual memberships, 109 reinstatements, and 21 consolidations for a total of 180 additional members. For 2008, these same categories were 72 affiliations, 49 dual memberships, 118 reinstatements, and 56 consolidations for a total of 295 new members. Therefore, affiliations were down by 50 (69.4%) and dual memberships were down by 21 (42.9%), and overall was down approximately 115 or 39%. Consolidation reflects the closure of a lodge and is merely a means of keeping the books. When one lodge consolidates with another, one lodge shows a total loss of membership and the gaining lodge shows an equivalent increase, a zero sum issue within the membership statistics. While the membership numbers do not change, the loss of that lodge is significant. Of particular note, the loss of DeWitt Lodge No. 111 caused the 21-member increase for Blue Valley Lodge No. 64 in Wilber. However, the community of DeWitt lost the presence of the local Masonic lodge that had been a part of that community since 1883.

Membership Losses: Losses in membership derive from six sources: Demits, Deaths, Suspensions, Withdrawals, Termination of Duals, and Other. In 2009, membership losses included 33 demits, 326 deaths, 458 suspensions, 3 withdrawals, 18 terminations of duals, and 23 others for a total of 861 losses.

Demits: The 33 demits are a mixed category because a demit could be from one Nebraska lodge to another Nebraska lodge and, therefore, not result in an overall loss of membership for Nebraska. However, if the demit is from Nebraska to another State, it is a loss for Nebraska, but not for Masonry in general. Demits show a reduction from 69 in 2008 to 33 in 2009, but this is not an area for significant concern.

Deaths: Death claimed 340 of our Nebraska Masonic brethren this year, and of all of the factors that affect membership, this is the one for which we have no control or direct input. With a generally aging membership, this is a fact that always has and always will continue to affect our membership. While our losses in this category are 31.1% less than 2008's 473 losses, each brother made a contribution to our fraternity and some made significant contributions. Each brother is missed by his family, his community, and his lodge.

Suspensions: The largest, single source of loss to our total membership is suspensions, mostly for non-payment of dues. In 2009, 458 Masons or 3.5% of our total membership was suspended. This number is more significant to the overall membership equation than any other single factor in either the gains or losses column. In fact, it was larger than the combined total of all sources of gains for 2009. With suspensions as the largest source of membership loss, not just for 2009, but year after year, we need to examine the causes of this sustained decline. Are we not impressing upon our candidates the long-term commitment involved in becoming a Freemason? Are we not sufficiently explaining the significant difference between casually joining a fraternity and becoming a Freemason? In our overall zest for membership, are we enabling our members to bypass Blue Lodge involvement? What is it that these departing members think or feel that Nebraska Freemasonry owes them that they were not receiving? Why do some refer to Masonic value and others to Masonic cost? Why did these brethren not bond or find value the way the other 96.5% did for 2009? The topic of suspensions requires significant Grand Lodge leadership and Membership Committee attention to reduce this number as much as possible.

In analyzing suspensions, it is necessary to look at results by the lodge size. I have categorized our lodges into four groups based on their 2009 membership rolls: Small Lodges (50 or fewer members), Medium Lodges (51-100 Members), Large Lodges (101-

200 Members), and Very Large Lodges (201-500 Members). Analysis of suspensions relative to these lodge size standards is shown in the table below.

From the Table above, the average number of suspensions per lodge among all Nebraska lodges was 3.11 members, derived from dividing the total number of suspensions (458) by the number of lodges (147), but due to the great difference in the membership size of our lodges, ranging from 11 to 495 members, Small Lodges have suspension rates that are 20% of this overall average and Very Large Lodges have suspension rates that are 373% of this number. Therefore, this is intuitively not a fair comparison. A better comparison among the various-sized lodges is the Average Suspensions per Capita within the four groups. From this metric, we find that as lodge size increases, the number of suspensions per capita increases. In fact, Very Large Lodges suspend their Members at per capita rates nearly 2.25 times that of Small Lodges, 1.66 times that of Medium Lodges, and 1.13 times that of even Large Lodges. Why? Is it geographic, is it cost driven, or is it attachment to the lodge and the community?

Geographic Question: Are all of the very large-sized lodges that experience the highest suspension rates just in Omaha and Lincoln?

Answer: No, not exclusively. Of the 18 lodges in the very large-sized category, 13 are located in Omaha and Lincoln. However, 5 of these 18 lodges are not in Omaha or Lincoln and include Springfield Lodge No. 112 in Springfield; Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 in Plattsmouth; Fremont Lodge No. 15 in Fremont; Mid-West No. 317 in Hastings; and Rob Morris Lodge No. 46 in Kearney. Of note, among the 18 lodges in this category, just 3 lodges, or 2% of all lodges in Nebraska, suspended 112 Members, which is 53.6% of the total amount for this category and 24.5% of all suspensions for all lodges in Nebraska. Additionally, half of all suspensions come from just 11 of the 147 Nebraska lodges, with the other 50% coming from the next 69 lodges. Among this group of 80 lodges, which suspended at least one Member, 4 suspended at least 10 Members, 6 suspended 10-20 Members, 2 suspended 30-40 Members, and 1 lodge suspended 47 Members. In fact, 67 lodges did not have a single suspension. They are to be commended.

Cost and Attachment to the Lodge/Community Questions: Do the Very Large Lodges that produce higher suspension rates also have high cost of membership that members are reluctant to continue to pay?

Answer: The answers to these questions were beyond the Membership Committee's review this year, but are something that could and should be addressed in the future.

Questionnaire and Results: The Grand Lodge Membership Committee developed and sent a questionnaire to all 147 lodges in Nebraska requesting information to better serve their needs in the areas of membership and membership activities. We received 58 responses for a 40% response rate. Here is a sampling of some of the questions and the responses.

From this questionnaire, with the limited response of less than half of the lodges, and not attributing any answer to any particular lodge, it was generally determined that most lodges are doing most of the degree work with some difficulty with lectures; supporting Masonic youth groups and charities; and supporting academic scholarships and CHIP. However, there is limited participation in one-day degrees, multiple lodge cooperation in putting on these degrees, and friendship dinners. These are three areas for potential expansion of these proven tools to increase membership in the future.

The committee conversed via e-mail during January to review the applications for the major awards. We were pleased, overall, at the quality of submissions, but are again concerned with the small number of submissions received for all awards.

The **Gold Pan** award had two (2) submissions, down from four (4) in 2008. The **Rock Maul** award had fifteen (15) submissions, up slightly from thirteen (13) in 2008. There were six (6) submissions of the new combined application for the **Nebraska Pillar** and **Grand Master's Leadership** awards, compared to six (6) for the Pillar award and four (4) for the Leadership award in 2008.

The committee strongly urges all lodges to aggressively compete for all the awards as a means of developing an interest in your lodges and communities.

The committee would like to thank Grand Master Russ Reno and his Grand Lodge Officers for their concern and support, as well as Michelle and Carol in the Grand Lodge Office for their assistance throughout the year.

REPORT OF PENDING RESOLUTIONS

R:W:B: Grand Secretary Bruce A. Watkins announced that he received the following three resolutions, which according to the Bylaws, subject to clearance by the Jurisprudence Committee, will be read and laid over until the session next year. The resolutions are resubmissions of a resolution which was not voted upon at this Annual Communication, and one that was voted upon at this Annual Communication, but failed to receive the necessary votes.

Resolution No. 1

Governance by:

Section 1-104 – Votes in Grand Lodge

Section 1-404 – Allocation of Funds Section 1-502 – Amendments

Proposed Resolution:

1) To prohibit any votes for (3) consecutive years on any resolution brought before the Grand Lodge to be voted upon which changes, or proposes to change Sec 404, Allocation of Funds, from the time a second failing vote has been recorded on any resolution, or proposed amendment, to the established level of Fund Allocations then in place and/or published in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska Constitution and By-Laws in Section 1-404.

2) Any similarly proposed change to Code Sec 1-404, when brought forth by Resolution and duly signed by five (5) voting members of any lodge within the Nebraska Jurisdiction, <u>shall not be considered as a new proposal for change</u> to a previously defeated resolution **in the prior two** Grand Lodge annual sessions when the subject pertains solely to the change in amounts of fund allocations with new years of enforcement indicated in the proposed resolution.

Resolution No. 2

Amend **ARTICLE II** – **MEMBERS** of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERS

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, and Grand Tyler, with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or their proxy proxies, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; provided however, no member shall hold more than two proxies for any and all subordinate lodges of which he is a member; and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

Rationale: Brothers in lodge leadership positions need to be aware of what transpires at Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge so they are better prepared to serve as Master of their lodge, and so they can offer insight about how their Grand Lodge should address challenges and opportunities facing our fraternity. This applies to every Master no matter how many times he has served in office. Providing several proxies to one brother to represent one or several lodges and officers limits the exposure of lodge leaders to the programs and the direction of their Grand Lodge. This amendment to the Constitution requires a higher commitment from lodges and their leaders to represent their lodge at Annual Communication and exposing them to plans, information and ideas they will be able to apply in their lodge. The Grand Lodge is comprised of the leaders of our lodges, who should be committed to their obligation and be involved in their Grand Lodge.

Resolution No. 3

Amend **ARTICLE II** – **MEMBERS and ARTICLE V** – **OFFICERS** of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERS

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, and—Grand Tyler, and, if appointed, Grand Musician, with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or the proxies, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

The officers of the Grand Lodge shall be styled and take rank as follows:

The Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master

The Right Worshipful Grand Senior Warden

The Right Worshipful Grand Junior Warden

The Right Worshipful Grand Secretary

The Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain

The Worshipful Grand Orator

The Worshipful Grand Historian

The Worshipful Grand Custodian

The Worshipful Grand Marshal

The Worshipful Grand Senior Deacon

The Worshipful Grand Junior Deacon

The Worshipful Grand Senior Steward

The Worshipful Grand Junior Steward

The Grand Tyler

The office of Grand Musician may also be appointed, if desired.

<u>Rationale</u>: We have talented brothers who can add much to the quality of Grand Lodge activities during the year and Annual Communication due to their musical abilities. This amendment would not require the appointment of a Grand Musician, but leaves the decision up to the Grand Master.

Resolution No. 4

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CODIFICATION OF LAW

Rex J. Moats, Chairman

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 1, the Grand Lodge Bylaws Section 2-310 – DUTIES OF SECRETARIES will be amended and will read as follows:

Sec. 2-310 – DUTIES OF SECRETARIES – The Secretary of each chartered subordinate lodge shall, in addition to the usual duties incident to such office, include in his minutes the reports of committees on petitions and a record of the names of all persons rejected, suspended and expelled. He shall make all proper certificates of the standing of a Brother of his lodge upon proper request made by the Brother himself, or by any Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, or any regular Masonic body. Upon receipt of a petition for membership in his lodge, he shall at once pass the fee accompanying the same into the funds of the lodge as provided in Section 2-606. He shall obtain regular vouchers for, and report to the Treasurer, all sums appropriated for his own compensation or incidental expenses, and shall not retain them from funds received by him.

The Secretary shall also prepare monthly reports of statistical information of his lodge, on forms provided by the Grand Secretary, and shall forward such reports to the Grand Secretary not later than the 10th day of each following month. The Secretary shall also prepare an annual report giving additional information relative to his lodge on forms provided by the Grand Secretary and shall forward such annual report on or before the 10th day of February following the close of each year.

As a result of the approval of Recommendation No. 3, the Grand Lodge Bylaws Section 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS will be amended and will read as follows:

Sec. 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – The per capita tax shall be divided and paid as follows:

The Initiation Fee shall be allocated to the General Fund.

As a result of the approval of <u>Recommendation No. 3</u>, the third paragraph of Section 2-601 – DUES AND <u>ASSESSMENTS</u> of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended immediately as follows:

Sec. 2-601 - DUES AND ASSESSMENTS -

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). The initiation fee shall increase to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) on January 1, 2007. In addition, each Lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Eighteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$18.50) as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2005. The per capita tax shall increase at a rate of \$2.00 for the first year commencing on the first day of January, 2008, and one dollar per year for the next three years. The said per capita tax shall accrue as follows: 2008 - \$20.50, 2009 - \$21.50, 2010 - \$22.50 and 2011 - \$24.00. The Grand Lodge shall use \$.50 of the per capita tax for the publication and distribution of a Masonic education newsletter to each member. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. In addition to the per capita tax as currently provided, commencing on January 1, 2006, each subordinate lodge shall pay to the Grand Lodge an assessment of \$1.00 per member to support the CHild Identification Program. Said assessment shall be due and payable in the same manner as the Grand Lodge per capita tax. The funds from this assessment shall be separate from the Grand Lodge per capita tax and shall be used for no other purpose than provided above.

R:W:B: Rex Moats moved that the report be approved. The motion was seconded. With no discussion, the Report of the Committee on Codification of Law was adopted, as summarized, by the Masons assembled.

The Roll of Deputy Grand Custodians And Date of Appointment

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869. In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
