

Masonic History of the 144th Grand Master

John T. Parsons

John T. Parsons was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in George W. Lininger Lodge No. 268, Omaha, on November 25, 1975. While serving overseas in the Air Force from 1977 to 1980, he affiliated with Okinawa Lodge No. 118, under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of the Philippines, and served as Junior and Senior Warden. While serving in Korea in 1983, he affiliated with Harry S. Truman Lodge No. 1727, chartered by the Grand Lodge of Scotland. Upon his return to Nebraska, he passed through the chairs in Lininger Lodge, serving as its Master in 1992. He also became a dual member of Papillion Lodge No. 39 in 1986, and of Porter Lodge No. 284, in Catasauqua, Pennsylvania in April 2010.

John joined Florence Chapter No. 61 Royal Arch Masons, Omaha Council No. 1 Cryptic Masons, and Mt. Calvary Commandery No. 1 Knights Templar in 1976. While on Okinawa, he became a dual member of the Okinawa York Rite Bodies, under the jurisdiction of the Grand York Rite of the Philippines. He served as High Priest of Okinawa Chapter No. 14 in 1979 and Commander of Okinawa Commandery No. 2 in 1978, and retains a life membership in those bodies. In 1985, he served as Illustrious Master of Omaha Council No. 1.

John served as Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Nebraska in 2003, the Most Illustrious Master of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons in Nebraska in 1997, and the North Central Regional Deputy General Grand Master for the General Grand Council of Cryptic Masons, International, from 1999-2002.

He joined the Omaha Valley Scottish Rite in the spring of 1976. He served as Venerable Master of the Omaha Consistory in 1994 and was named a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 1995. He was coroneted a 33rd Degree Inspector General Honorary in 1999. He is the director for the 31st Degree team, and is a member of the 33rd Degree team. He has served on the Omaha Valley Cathedral Board since 2001, and is the editor for the Omaha Valley News.

John joined Tangier Shrine in 1976, and is a member of Crescent Shrine Club, Ritual Divan, and Legion of Honor. He was initiated into Omaha Court No. 19, Royal Order of Jesters, in 1996.

John and his wife Pauline were initiated into Trinity Chapter No. 299, Order of the Eastern Star in 1976. John served as Worthy Patron in 1988 and again in 1989, while Pauline served as Worthy Matron in 1989.

John is a member of and has presided over numerous other Masonic bodies. He was initiated into Okinawa Chapter No. 264, National Sojourners in 1977, and into Joseph Warren Camp Heroes of '76 later that year. He served as chapter president in 1978 and as Camp Commander in 1979. He is now a member of Omaha Chapter No. 19, and served as its president in 1982. He is a Past Sovereign of Coeur de Lion Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Past Prior of Sir Galahad Priory, Knights of the York Cross of Honour; Past Prior of Sangre de Christo Tabernacle, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar

Priests; Past Sovereign Master of Sneh Bo' Aire Council, Allied Masonic Degrees, and the Royal Order of Scotland.

John was appointed Grand Historian by Most Worshipful Brother Kenneth G. Fleming in 1997, and served eight years in that capacity. He was appointed Grand Junior Deacon in 2005 by Grand Master Ivan A. Vrtiska; Grand Senior Deacon in 2006 by Grand Master Scott J. Krieger; elected Grand Junior Warden in 2007 under the direction of Grand Master Dean F. Skokan; elected Grand Senior Warden in 2008 under the direction of Grand Master Reginald S. Kuhn; and was elected Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect in 2009 under the direction of Grand Master Russ Reno. John was installed as the 144th Grand Master of the Most Worshipful, the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, on February 14, 2010, at the Scottish Rite Masonic Center in Omaha.

First Day – Public Opening Friday, February 4, 2011

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Miss Rachel Nerud, Grand Bethel Honored Queen, was asked to bring greetings from Nebraska Job's Daughters.

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M∴W∴ Parsons invited State Master Councilor Cameron Daiss to the podium to bring greetings and introduce the officers who presented the DeMolay Sponsoring Body of the Year and the DeMolay Mason of the Year awards.

DEMOLAY SPONSORING BODY OF THE YEAR AWARD AND THE MASON OF THE YEAR AWARD

State Master Councilor Cameron Daiss and State Senior Councilor Dalton Kock presented the awards for DeMolay Mason of the Year and Sponsoring Body of the Year.

This year's Mason of the Year has been a very active Mason, and has been an active supporter of the Masonic youth groups in his community for many years. He has served as Master of his lodge, Worthy Patron of his Eastern Star Chapter, and is a Past Associate Grand Guardian of Job's Daughters. He is a member of his local York Rite bodies and Tangier Shrine. He and his wife have worked to help orchestrate the triennial Nebraska Masonic Youth conferences, and they have sponsored the silent auctions held at each annual communication of the Nebraska Grand Lodge for a number of years, including this one. It is my distinct pleasure to present the Mason of the Year Award to Gene Wehrbein of Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6.

DeMolay Chapters must have at least three Master Masons on their Advisory Board and be sponsored by a Masonic Family Body. Each year, Nebraska DeMolay recognizes a group who has gone "above and beyond" as the Nebraska DeMolay Sponsoring Body of Year.

The 2010 recipient is a very active lodge and has been very supportive of Nebraska DeMolay generally for many, many years. They have made their building available again and again to our State Chapter even though there was not an active DeMolay Chapter in their community. Members of this sponsoring body approached the Nebraska Executive Officer and State Officers at Grand Lodge last year inquiring about reactivating a chapter in their community. By July 2010, they had secured advisors and DeMolay candidates. The lodge passed a Resolution to Sponsor a DeMolay Chapter and paid all fees. The first candidates were initiated in October 2010 and more followed at Grand Master's Class in November. This lodge has laid the foundation to ensure that Fort Kearney Chapter, which had been dormant for 25 years, will continue long into the future.

Nebraska DeMolay is pleased to present the Sponsoring Body of the Year Award to Rob Morris Lodge No. 46 of Kearney, Nebraska.

LODGE MEMBERSHIP AWARDS

The Grand Master requested that Steve Barchus, Chairman of the Membership Committee, present the traveling trophies. The two membership awards are given for the highest percent of positive growth – counting new members, reinstatements, suspensions and deaths. Each winning lodge received a traveling trophy to display in their lodge for one year. The winner in the large lodge division was Lancaster Lodge No. 54. The trophy in the small lodge division went to Franklin Lodge No. 264.

CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM (CHIP) AWARD

Grand Master John Parsons asked Kent Broyhill, President of the Nebraska Freemasons Child Identification Program Foundation, to present the CHIP Awards. The CHild Identification Program (CHIP) Award recognizes outstanding contributions, monetary or otherwise, in the promotion and assistance with CHIP events. One award is given to a member of the Masonic Family, and the second goes to an individual, company or charitable group that has met the award guidelines. Nominations for the awards are submitted by individual lodges to the Awards Committee for selection.

Kent announced the Pamida Foundation as the winner in the non-Masonic award category. Members of Superior Lodge No. 121 and Nelson Lodge No. 77 accepted the award on behalf of the Foundation.

Kent named Earl Robinett, a member of Cotner Lodge No. 297 in Lincoln, as recipient of the award in the Masonic Family category. Earl was not able to attend the Public Opening.

M : W : Parsons asked Kent Broyhill to remain on stage. W : B : Down John Maxell came forward to present Brother Broyhill with a CHIP Award of his own, acknowledging the many years he served as Chairman of the original CHIP committee and President of the Foundation Board, as Kent resigned from the position for the year 2011, but would still serve as a member of the Foundation Board.

CHANGE FOR THE TROOPS AWARDS

Grand Master John Parsons explained that there would be two categories of awards in the Change for the Troops program: Total Contributions and Total Per Capita Contributions. GRAND ORATION

Patrick D. Barger, Grand Orator

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren, and family ... Greetings! It is my honor to stand before you again as Grand Orator to share my thoughts concerning our mutual horizon through the success of the Masonic year we bring to a close. Throughout 2010 Grand Master John Parsons led numerous programs that brought Masonry into the limelight for many people who had theretofore never heard of us, or reminded those who had long since forgotten who we are and what we stand for.

In referring to the numerous outstanding opportunities to display Masonry's hallowed and respectful image through events covered by the news media, Grand Master John Parsons is quoted as saying, when referring to various lodges, "Their fervency and zeal for Masonry provides us with invaluable and positive exposure to the local communities." And that is important, as you will agree.

The undisputed pinnacle of his efforts to raise positive public awareness of our fraternity is the Grand Master's "Change for the Troops" program which provided long-distance telephone cards to all Nebraska military members deploying to a war zone, and let me tell you, it has been an unparalleled success. Numerous letters of appreciation from service members receiving a card has (and I quote the Grand Master) "again presented the

fraternity in a positive light in many local communities that, prior to this, had no idea what Masons do."

But our Grand Master's tenacious efforts to ensure Nebraska Masonry continues to prosper for generations to come did not limit itself to just the "Change for the Troops" program. He is also quoted as saying his major goal was "to leave the fraternity in better shape" than it was when he assumed its reigns, meaning he believes that no matter how good we are today, we cannot rest on our laurels and that continuous improvement is necessary for long term growth and prosperity.

And what is necessary to ensure our fraternity experiences long term growth and prosperity? Do we measure that in how many degrees we perform? Do we measure that in how much money we raise for charity? These things are very important to us, and rightfully so, but there are other things that are absolutely essential to us if we are to continue as a fraternity. In fact, they are the very things that make us Masons. Any number of community groups can do charity work. They all can bring in new members. But what makes us different from them? What makes us Masons?

I submit to you that it is the embracement of the fundamental principles of Masonry that makes us Masons. This was what the Grand Master was referring to when he mentioned those brethren demonstrating these principles to the news media who "provided us with invaluable and positive exposure to the local communities."

You are here today because you value Masonry as a way of life. Grand Master John Parsons' words are firmly grounded on those principles of Masonry that transcend time. The greatest ideals of Man are those that use our fundamental Masonic principals to clarify the hidden mysteries of life.

2010 was underscored by the tenets of Masonry to build upon those venerable ideals that established and have sustained our beloved fraternity generation after generation. When faced with the challenges of modern society and the worldwide decline Masonry has sadly experienced in the last fifty years, we cannot afford to scale back our personal commitment to its dignity. If we do, the fraternity will surely face extinction.

Speculative Masonry is the science by which morality is taught through the symbols and traditions associated with building King Solomon's Temple over 3,000 years ago. Like every science, Masonry is founded on various conceded principles. These principles teach a Mason that he must learn to govern himself with wisdom by practicing the Cardinal Virtues of Freemasonry, the first of which is Temperance.

Temperance calls for Masons to cultivate calmness of the mind and heart, and allows us to conquer the tides of emotions. Conflict is a fact of life, but you need not embrace it.

In addition to temperance, I submit that there are other virtues Masons live by as well such as integrity, wisdom, and accountability.

Integrity is the courage to be honest with yourself and others. Do not act for your own self-interest. Strive for humility, realizing that you are but a tiny speck in this massive universe.

And while Masons are born with intelligence, wisdom is acquired throughout their lives. Smart men learn from their mistakes, wise men learn from those of others.

Every action has a reaction. Masons are accountable for their actions and the affect they have on others. They choose carefully and are responsible for their choices. They offer

sincere apologies and atone for a misdeed. They face the reality that there are consequences for everything they do. They always seek the higher path, unencumbered by bias or personal gain.

Masons practice discretion and prudence and guide their destiny by the alliances they keep. They are mindful of what lies behind and what lies ahead, and prepare for their rendezvous with destiny. Masons attain great stature of character by holding to these virtues and duties, realizing that the act of striving towards these ideals ennobles the spirit, and elevates the character.

Without an expressed belief in these principles, no man can ever become a Mason. From these principles flows the Brotherhood of Man. Masons cannot pick and choose which of these principles apply when it is convenient, or use a few of them to defend the violation of various other principles, but adhere to all of them, all the time.

Our Masonic fraternity stands before the world today, not only as a spectacular monument of antiquity more pervasive than any other human institution, but as an organization that has maintained these everlasting principles upon which it was founded, as unbroken today as they were when Masonry emerged from the shadows of prehistory.

Masonry is also a broad system of Morals and Ethics. The tools and implements used at Solomon's Temple demonstrate to us the cultivation of the virtues we use to build our inner spiritual temples. These traditions serve as worthy examples for our imitation, and inspire us to love all that is good and true. Masonry thus becomes a system of spiritual education wherein is taught not only the virtues, but also the useful lessons of everyday life.

As the story goes, St. Francis of Assisi said to a younger Friar, "Brother, let us go into the village to preach." They went out and down the streets and through the marketplace and, after walking several miles and saying nothing to anyone, St. Francis and the Friar turned back, retracing their steps and once again they entered the Monastery. "But Father," asked the young Monk, "When shall we begin to preach?" "We have been preaching," was the reply. "As we walked, we were observed; our manner, our behavior, what we stand for. We have been preaching."

This, my friends, is Masonry. May it live on through us for countless ages, and may we be ever worthy to spread Masonic Light for the generations yet to come.

So, we prepare to close the 2010 trestle board our Grand Master crafted to help ensure the future of our beloved fraternity! You are to be commended for your efforts to rally behind his charge to uphold the impervious principles of Masonic virtue in the eyes of the public, so essentially necessary to our continued prosperity.

May God bless you, our beloved country, and the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons.

First Day – Formal Opening Session Friday, February 4, 2011

A tyled Lodge of Master Masons was opened by Papillion Lodge No. 39 and George W. Lininger Lodge No. 268.

The Deputy Grand Master led grand honors for Most Worshipful John T. Parsons, Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary determined that a quorum was present.

V∴W∴ Grand Chaplain Dennis E. Rix invoked the blessing of Deity.

The Grand Master declared the 154th Annual Communication duly opened for the transaction of business and asked that the Grand Marshal proclaim the Annual Communication open in ample form.

M∴W∴ Parsons asked all Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska to retire with the Grand Marshal to form a procession to be received by the Grand Lodge.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

Bruce A. Watkins, 300

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge. The committee further recommends:

- 1. The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures.
- Grand Master regarding procedures.

 2. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.
- 3. Amendments, which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.
- 4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.
- 5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.

- 6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits
- 7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decision and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak after which a vote will be taken.

8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret ballot or other method at his discretion.

9. Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary moved approval, and the motion was seconded and passed.

REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA MASONIC FOUNDATION

The Nebraska Masonic Foundation held its annual meeting Thursday, February 3, and I would just like to highlight a couple of items from that meeting for your information. As you are aware, the Foundation's building on North 10th Street in Lincoln continues to be the home for the Grand Lodge Office, the Nebraska Masonic Museum and also the main staging area for the Nebraska CHIP Foundation, and that relationship continues to be beneficial to all of the Masonic organizations throughout the state. We did have a little construction this year on the building due to a hail storm that came through Lincoln. We received a new roof, gratefully other than \$1000 deductible our insurance took care of the rest of that, so that was an unplanned, but wonderful improvement to the building. We also were able to purchase and update our computer server system. The Foundation owns the servers in the Grand Lodge Office, which we also then lease back to the various Masonic organizations that are in the building and also are able to maintain our historical membership records. Our fiscal year ends in May, so for the year ending May 2010, we netted about \$10,000 in actual net revenue and it looks that we're continuing on a similar track for this year. Finally, I want to thank all of our brothers who faithfully contribute to the Foundation. Each year we net between \$15,000 and \$20,000 of donations to the Foundation to enable us to provide the services that we do provide. Remember, brothers, this is your Foundation and we appreciate very much the support that you give.

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M : W :Parsons asked W : B :Jack Lorenzen to come to the East and report on the progress of the capital campaign for renovating the Lincoln Scottish Rite Center and moving the Grand Lodge Office.

"Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brothers, over 150 years ago, the Grand Lodge of Nebraska was formed, and during those years, we Nebraska Masons have faced many challenges and accepted many opportunities. Our fraternity has touched the lives of countless individuals by instilling the Masonic tenets of brotherly love, relief and truth in our members. Our members have, in turn, practiced those virtues in their daily lives and interactions with their families, with neighbors and their communities. We are assembled these days as our brothers have been in the past years to make decisions that will affect the future of our fraternity. This future brings with it challenges that we may not clearly foresee, but also opportunities from which we will strengthen and grow.

Some of us look with fondness on the past, a time when Nebraska Freemasonry's membership exceeded 50,000 men and the commitment to our lodges' efforts was strong. We share a proud history with our brothers from past generations who invested in the future of our fraternity – a future which we now enjoy. So it is, each generation of our fraternity is given the opportunity to invest in the future generations to follow, to continue to build upon our moral and Masonic edifices.

Since 1999, the Grand Lodge of Nebraska offices have been located at 1240 N. 10^{th} Street in Lincoln. This facility was originally purchased with the long-term goal of locating to another facility. With the change in the demographics of the neighborhood, the need for relocation has become more important.

Recently, a new relationship has been formed between the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and the Lincoln Valley Scottish Rite to renovate and share a common facility located on Centennial Mall in downtown Lincoln. This facility will be known as the Nebraska Masonic Center. Some of you may wonder why the Grand Lodge would seek such a relationship. I can share with you that these two organizations within our Nebraska Masonic family have come to realize that this is an opportunity to draw from the strengths of each organization. The Lincoln Valley Scottish Rite has been housed in a beautiful building built in 1918 two blocks north of the State Capitol, which is in need of updating and refurbishment. This new arrangement will address the challenges of renovating and preserving an historic Nebraska Masonic building, will offer a visible location that will highlight the work of the entire Nebraska Masonic family across our state, and will provide a safe and productive working environment for our staff.

The initial plans call for renovation of the Temple's east addition and relocation of the Grand Lodge and Lincoln Valley Scottish Rite offices into a remodeled space on the lower level. This will include renovation and expansion of the lobby area, a new conference room, office space for the Grand Lodge, Scottish Rite, and the Nebraska Shrine Bowl, as well as refurbishment of the elevator. A new south entrance off of L Street will eventually be developed, and the facility's infrastructure will be updated.

In 2009, the Grand Lodge of Nebraska and the Lincoln Valley Scottish Rite hired Paul J. Strawhecker, Inc., a fundraising consulting firm, to conduct a philanthropic planning study. Forty people affiliated with Nebraska Freemasonry were personally interviewed, and over 300 Masons completed an online survey by sharing their opinions and their feelings about the proposed project and a possible capital campaign to fund it. We learned that a sizable majority of Masons were in favor of the project and would likely give a financial gift to make it a reality. It had been hoped to launch the campaign a year ago, but the recession caused us to take a more conservative approach and the capital campaign work began this last November. The capital campaign will begin its efforts in the Lincoln area and will begin work in the Omaha area later this month. Several months from now, the campaign will begin work throughout the entire state. Brothers have been trained and are beginning to make visits to invite Masons and other affiliated with our fraternity to invest in this project.

Our campaign consultant, Scott Larsen, is with us today and is available to address questions you may have about the project and its campaign. He is available at the Nebraska Masonic Center's Capital Campaign booth in the display area. This display has information available for you to take back to your lodge. Please stop by and introduce yourself to Scott. The initial goal of this campaign is to raise \$1.75 million. It is the campaign's goal that approximately \$1 million of this will be raised from the Lincoln area, \$250,000 raised from the greater Omaha area and \$250,000 raised from the rest of the state, with the balance raised through planned gifts. No construction will begin until at least \$750,000 has been raised by the campaign, and we will not go into debt to complete this project.

At this time, I would ask Most Worshipful Sir Reg Kuhn if he has any comments to follow the remarks that I've just made."

Most Worshipful Kuhn took the podium and made the following additional comments:

"Thanks, Jack. Jack is part of the steering committee that has done untold work in preparing for this campaign. We have talked about this probably for the last three or four years, but we thought it was important to let the Craft know where it stands. It's begun and when you are contacted, as you will be, we hope that you will respond generously. The campaign is off, we're still a little bit in the quiet period, but we thought it was important that the Craft know the status of this. The Foundation is very much aware of this action and we'll continue to assist in any way that we can. As Jack said, Scott Larsen is out in the display area and if you have any questions of him, or Jack or myself, or other committee members, please do not hesitate. But we wanted to share with you the status of the project."

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Grand Master Parsons took the podium and made the following announcement:

"Brethren, I have an announcement. Shortly after the opening of Grand Lodge, Masonic charges were filed against R.W. Deputy Grand Master E. David Watts, R.W. Grand Junior Warden, and the W. Grand Senior Deacon. The Grand Secretary will read these charges pursuant to Section 3-302 of the Bylaws."

Grand Secretary Bruce Watkins read the charges as presented:

CHARGES AGAINST R.W. E. DAVID WATTS BY MICHAEL E. JONES, PGM

"As a Master Mason it is my opinion that membership in our beloved Fraternity is one of privilege and not a right. Membership in Freemasonry being of a voluntary nature, carries a critically high standard of personal conduct, personal decorum and one where the best interests of our brethren outweigh those of our own. As such, a member must preserve the reputation of the Fraternity unsullied.

THEREFORE:

I, Michael E. Jones, Past Grand Master 2002, and a member in good standing of Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, do hereby object to the installation of R.W. Brother E. David Watts, Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect, to the office of Grand Master of the Grand Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska, and submit the following charges of un-Masonic conduct.

BYLAWS AND RITUAL CITED:

 Introductory page of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska: 'the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska doth enact the following code of bylaws for its government and the government of its officers, subordinate lodges, their officers and all ancient free and accepted Masons sojourning within its jurisdiction.'

- 2. Part Three (Discipline) Chapter 1, Section 3-101: specifically, 'acts which tend to impair the good name of Freemasonry or which violate Masonic obligations or the laws and regulations of this Grand Lodge.'
- 3. Masonic Ritual, Master Mason Section, Obligation
- Masonic Ritual, Master Mason Section, Charge

CHARGES:

- 1. On or about November 21, 2010, R.W. Brother E. David Watts, while at the residence of a woman with whom Brother Watts acknowledges a two-year personal relationship although still being legally married to another woman, was involved in a domestic episode resulting in serious charges being filed by the Lancaster County Deputy Attorney.
 - In my opinion, this event violates provisions contained in Section 3-101 of the Bylaws, a Master Mason's obligations, and a Master Mason's charge.
- 2. On or about December 13, 2010, in a meeting with six Grand Lodge line officers, R.W. E. David Watts gave his word on the honor of a Mason that should he be bound over for civil trial as a result of the event enumerated in item 3 above, he would resign his position as Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master elect. That resignation was not delivered as promised.

It is my opinion that having not fulfilled his Masonic promise, he violated Sections 3-101 of the Bylaws, a Master Mason's obligation, and a Master Mason's charge.

SUMMARY:

It is my opinion that the events outlined in his charges demonstrate un-Masonic conduct and do impair the good name of Freemasonry.

CHARGES AGAINST R.W. REX J. MOATS BY MICHAEL E. JONES, PGM

"As a Master Mason, it is my opinion that membership in our beloved Fraternity is one of privilege and not of right. Membership in Freemasonry being of voluntary nature, carries a critically high standard of personal conduct, personal decorum and one where the best interests of our brethren outweigh those of our own. As such, a member must preserve the reputation of the Fraternity unsullied.

THEREFORE:

I, Michael E. Jones, Past Grand Master 2002, and a member in good standing of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, do hereby object to the installation of R.W. Brother Rex J. Moats, Grand Junior Warden, to a Grand Lodge office to which he may be elected or appointed for the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska, and submit the following charges of un-Masonic conduct.

BYLAWS AND RITUAL CITED:

- Introductory page of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska: 'the Grand Lodge of the Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska doth enact the following code of bylaws for its government and the government of its officers, subordinate lodges, their officers and all ancient free and accepted Masons sojourning within its jurisdiction.'
- 2. Part Three (Discipline) Chapter 1, Section 3-101: specifically, 'acts which tend to impair the good name of Freemasonry or which violate Masonic obligations or the laws and regulations of this Grand Lodge.'
- 3. Part Three (Discipline Chapter 1, Section 3-102(d); specifically, 'attempting, from captious or unworthy motives to arrest the legitimate work of a lodge.'
- 4. Masonic Ritual, Master Mason Section, Obligation.
- 5. Masonic Ritual, Master Mason Section, Charge.

CHARGES:

On or about December 14, 2010, R.W. Brother Rex J. Moats, initiated a
telephone call to the Secretary of Osceola Lodge No. 65 requesting that
Osceola Lodge No. 65 prefer Masonic charges against R.W. E. David
Watts, Deputy Grand Master, for un-Masonic conduct. The Masonic
charges drafted and forwarded to the Master and subsequently to the Grand
Master, were authored solely by Brother Moats upon his unsolicited
initiative.

The fact that Brother Moats, under his own unsolicited initiative, used his Grand Lodge office to convince the lodge to adopt the charges he drafted, exacerbates his action.

It is my opinion these activities violate provisions contained in Section 3-101 and Sections 3-102(d) of the Bylaws, a Master Mason's obligation and a Master Mason's charge.

SUMMARY:

It is my opinion that the activities outlined in these charges demonstrate un-Masonic conduct and do impair the good name of Freemasonry.

CHARGES AGAINST W. THOMAS L. HAUDER BY HICKMAN LODGE NO. 256

"This is a complaint from Hickman Lodge No. 256 to the Grand Master, Grand Wardens and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

Brother Thomas L. Hauder is hereby charged with non-Masonic conduct by reason of the following specifications:

First Section: That the said Thomas L. Hauder, a brother of Tabula Rasa Lodge No. 332 and currently serving as Grand Senior Deacon of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, A.F. & A.M., on or about the 3rd day of January, 2011 A.D., 6011 A.L., in the city of Lincoln, county of Lancaster, in the State of Nebraska, did engage in non-Masonic conduct to wit: Attempting to intimidate and coerce the Worshipful Master, Junior Warden and Secretary of Hickman Lodge No. 256 to file Masonic charges against a brother of Hickman Lodge, thereby attempting from captious or unworthy motives, to arrest the legitimate work of a lodge, a violation of Section 3-201, Section 3-206 and Section 3-301 of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, a violation of Masonic law and an enumerated Masonic offense under Section 3-102.

Wherefore it is demanded that the said Thomas L. Hauder be put on trial upon said charges and specifications and be dealt with according to the Masonic law and usages.

CHARGES AGAINST R.W. REX J. MOATS BY HICKMAN LODGE NO. 256

"To the Grand Master, Grand Wardens and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

Brother Rex J. Moats is hereby charged with the following non-Masonic conduct by reason of the following specifications:

First Section: That the said Rex J. Moats, a brother of Waterloo Lodge No. 102 and currently serving as Grand Junior Warden of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A:F: & A:M:, on or about the 3rd day of January 2011 A.D., 6011 A.L., in the city of Lincoln, county of Lancaster, in the state of Nebraska, did engage in non-Masonic conduct to wit: attempting to intimate and coerce the Worshipful Master, Junior Warden and Secretary of Hickman Lodge No. 256 to file Masonic charges against a brother of Hickman Lodge in violation of Section 3-201, Section 3-206, and Section 3-301 of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A:F: & A:M:, thereby attempting from captious or unworthy motives to arrest the legitimate work of a lodge, a violation of Masonic law and an enumerated Masonic offense under Section 3-102.

Second Section: That the said Rex J. Moats, a brother of Waterloo Lodge No. 102, and currently serving as Grand Junior Warden of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, A : F : & A : M : , on or about the 3rd day of January, 2011 A.D., 6011 A.L., in the city of Lincoln, county of Lancaster, in the state of Nebraska, did engage in non-Masonic conduct to wit: Prepared Masonic charges against a brother of Hickman Lodge in violation of Section 3-201, Section 3-206 and Section 3-301 of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A : F : & A : M : , thereby attempting from captious or unworthy motives, to arrest the legitimate work of a lodge, a violation of Masonic law and an enumerated Masonic office, under Section 3-102.

Third Section: That the said Rex J. Moats, a brother of Waterloo Lodge No. 102 and currently serving as Grand Junior Warden in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A:F: & A:M:, on or about the 6th day of January, 2011 A.D., 6011 A.L., in the city of Lincoln, county of Lancaster, in the state of Nebraska, did engage in non-Masonic conduct to wit: During a regular meeting of Hickman Lodge No. 256, did present evidence against a brother of Hickman Lodge No. 256 and attempted to influence and coerce the Master of Hickman Lodge No. 256 to accept the charges against the brother of Hickman Lodge, a violation of Section 3-201, Section 3-206, and Section 3-301 of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska A:F: & A:M:, thereby attempting from captious or unworthy motives, to arrest the legitimate work of a lodge, a violation of Masonic law and an enumerated Masonic offense under Section 3-102.

Wherefore it is demanded that the said Rex J. Moats be put on trial upon said charges and specifications and be dealt with according to the Masonic law and usage.

Brought by the following brethren of Hickman Lodge No. 256: Tom Trainor, Robert Cassidy, Keith Sandall, Michael Gray, Olin Boone, Gary Jarzynka, Ray Schwarz, Jerry Sievers, John Irons, Bill Haberlan."

Grand Secretary Watkins then indicated, "That concludes the reading of these charges."

After the charges were read, several brethren attempted to raise questions of the Grand Master, to which he responded: "This is not the venue for discussion. Please have a seat." After another inquiry, the Grand Master continued, "Pursuant to Section 3-302, the Grand Lodge cannot quash these charges and specifications. It is my duty as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge to decide whether a Masonic offense is charged. In this regard, I direct that the Jurisprudence Committee immediately convene to determine whether these charges are in the proper form and thereafter I will determine whether Masonic offenses are charged. We will continue with our regular agenda pending the report of the Jurisprudence Committee. Next thing on the agenda is the Nebraska Work Report. Phil?"

Still another inquiry came from the floor from Past Grand Master Donald Swanson, stating, "Most Worshipful Grand Master, I'd like to speak on the order."

To which M∴W∴ Parsons responded, "As I said to Most Worshipful Brother Krieger, this is not the time, nor the place. Please have a seat." (single gavel rap)

Insistently, a few brethren continued to question the Grand Master. Most Worshipful Parsons insisted the matter would be addressed at a later time in the proceedings and instructed all brethren to take their seats.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

Philip A. Lorenzen, Chairman

The charge of the Committee on Nebraska Work includes assistance to the Grand Custodian in his efforts of oversight to see that the ritual is precise, well presented, and that it is not perverted or subjected to wholesale change to fit the whims of self-appointed champions of a new cause. Change is good in many cases – as to the Masonic Ritual, it however, is timeless as to the lessons imparted – wholesale change risks loss of its basic

tenets. Ritual is a key component of that which separates us from other organizations. Masonic Ritual remains important and it is the bonding agent for many of us, with the lessons contained therein simply demanding of Masons a higher standard of self-imposed conduct. Masons are not confined only to civil or governmental law, every Mason's conduct is first governed by one's heart with his first responsibility to God and his brother, Masonic or not. The lessons are timeless, demanding, and just as applicable today as when first understood and stated. Ritual and lectures are not just words to be memorized and uttered back to the candidate, they are to be understood and applied as a guide to a Mason's daily life. The manner is which ritual is performed is the basis of a new Mason's view of our Fraternity and its seriousness. If we don't undertake ritual seriously, our candidates will certainly not take the meaning seriously. The view of many finds that Ritual is of generally good quality with many lodges working industriously on both floor work and ritual presentation. Yet there are lodges not yet capturing the spirit for consistent quality ritual. Quality of work is a matter of pride -if your lodge does not feel comfortable in the ritual, there are many brothers in other lodges who are willing to help, not in a condescending manner but quietly and graciously. The Grand Custodian and Deputy Custodians are always ready to suggest names of others in your area to help in the ritual. The support and encouragement of our Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother John Parsons and each of the Grand Lodge Officers is appreciated. Most Worshipful Brother Scott J. Krieger, Sr., Grand Custodian continues to take a good hands-on approach to provide incentive and encouragement to each subordinate lodge and its officers. Most Worshipful Brother Krieger's example encourages Deputy Custodians and proficient Masons in providing leadership in setting a high standard for proficiency in Nebraska. Using Most Worshipful Brother Krieger's level of memorization and style of delivery as an example is a lesson in achievement and is a high goal to strive to. As the Nebraska Grand Lodge finds ongoing success in both one day conferrals and in one-on-one conferrals in the lodge degree work, the Committee appreciates the efforts of the officers and members of subordinate lodges willing to take the time to learn the ritual, including lectures and to deliver them with feeling and understanding, enabling the new candidate to better appreciate the beauty and profound content of the Masonic degrees.

Members of the Committee on Nebraska Work attended and participated in the annual Deputy Custodians' School in Hastings in September. The efforts of the Deputy Custodians and their apprentices are acknowledged and applauded. Committee members also attended and participated in the Grand Custodian's schools of instruction held throughout the State. The schools of instruction are a great fellowship opportunity as well as a learning opportunity. Masters are encouraged to find ways to increase attendance—it is good to have several members of each lodge in attendance.

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Grand Master Parsons then began, "Now, at this point, I will ask our Brother Parliamentarian to address the questions that were raised while you were out of the room by Most Worshipful Brother Swanson and by R : W : Brother Watts. Starting with R : W : Brother Watts on point of order, what was your question?"

Deputy Grand Master Watts announced, "I wanted to clarify, I believe a point of order supersedes the work of a Grand Lodge and has the right to be heard from the floor."

Parliamentarian Most Worshipful Dean Skokan answered, "A point of order is a device in Roberts Rules of Order which are not formally adopted in the Grand Lodge. They are recognized as a set of rules to govern assemblies and meetings of such that they do not have the force of law of the Grand Lodge. The Grand Lodge Constitution provides that the Grand Master is the presiding officer of the Annual Communication, and in my judgment, that would give the Grand Master the ability to determine when and if comment from the floor is appropriate, and it would also give him the ability to rule on procedural matters before or after such comments were received. But it is clearly established in the Constitution that the Grand Master is the presiding officer at Annual Communication. And that is law, that is not Roberts Rules of Order, that's in the Constitution."

Grand Master Parsons returned to the podium and said, "Thank you. I would also remind you that there are no tweets, texts or anything else going on while we are in here. I will, number one, I would, you know refrain from doing it, cause it's a tyled meeting, and number two, if you do, first of all, it's gonna be ten bucks. I said any means of electronic communication and we're serious about that. So do not do it."

MORE LIGHT EDUCATION AWARD

M∴W∴ Parsons asked Denny Brydl, Chairman of the Grand Lodge Masonic Education Committee, to come forward to present the awards. Chairman Brydl stated 2010 was the first year for the More Light Education Award. It will be presented each year to the large lodge and the small lodge that research, plan, and implement an involved and rewarding Lodge Education Program. It is grounded on lodge internal education efforts and the lodge reaching out to the community to increase the understanding, benefits, and general overall knowledge of Masonry and the good it can and does accomplish.

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Grand Master Parsons announced that the workshops scheduled for the afternoon would begin at 12:30 pm in the Ballroom. The first workshop is a presentation on search and rescue dogs by SAR Unit, Inc. and their relevance to Nebraska Freemasons CHIP. The second program is on planning a cornerstone, presented by W : B : Wayne Vian of Grand Island. M : W : Parsons indicated that the Grand Lodge session would continue following the workshop with voting on the Grand Master's Recommendations and

Constitutional Amendments, and a leadership presentation for the 2011 Masters and Wardens will be held at 4:00 pm. He also made several announcements relative to the location of the Grand Lodge Office, hospitality rooms, vendors, and instructions for upcoming meetings, silent auction and meal functions.

The R:W: Deputy Grand Master called the 154^{th} Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful, the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska from Refreshment to Labor at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, February 4, 2011.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

M : W : B: Parsons asked M : W : B: Dwight Smith to come forward to give the preliminary report of the Jurisprudence Committee. M : W: Smith read the report:

The Jurisprudence Committee has reviewed all four complaints and finds them to be in acceptable form and offer the opinion that a Masonic offense is alleged in each of the four complaints under Section 3-102 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

Recommendations

We recommend that the two complaints against R : W : Brother Moats be consolidated and that trial commissions be appointed in each of the three cases.

We see nothing in the code to prohibit a brother facing these charges from standing for election. Further, it is our unanimous opinion that no brother charged, if elected, should be installed until charges against him are resolved.

Grand Master Parsons thanked M. W. Dwight for the report and stated, "Since we have received these and I am inclined to accept the Recommendations of the Jurisprudence Committee, however, before I do so, we're not going to put this up to a vote, but let's just call this a plebiscite. I just want to get a feel of the membership in the Grand Lodge on the situation today. So what I am going to do is I am going to ask for the next ten to fifteen minutes or so, if it goes that long, any of you to go to the microphone, state your name, lodge and if you are in favor of accepting this recommendation or not, and we'll go from there. I do not expect this to deteriorate into any type of vituperative exchange, nor do I expect anybody to stand up there and orate. So if you are going to get up there, get your thoughts together. Once you get there, you have two minutes to say your peace. Make it short and succinct, and we're going to have hopefully an equal amount on either side. Any questions? Okay, at this point I would ask if there's anybody that would like to speak in favor of the Jurisprudence Committee's Recommendations. Comments." After a long pause, and no response from the brethren, Grand Master Parsons continued, "Okay, anybody that wants to oppose the Jurisprudence Committee's Recommendations."

After another long pause with no response from the brethren, Grand Master Parsons concluded, "Brethren, the Jurisprudence Committee has reviewed the charges and found them to be in proper form. I now find that a Masonic offense is charged and I accept these charges. By the authority vested in me as Grand Master by the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge, specifically included, but not limiting, to Article X of the Constitution, I make the following Orders. I will appoint three trial commissions to be named here shortly, and I will direct that these trial commissions conduct the trial and complete its report within thirty days of this date. A prosecutor for those teams will be named later. Any appeals for the report of the trial commission will be determined by the Grievances Committee within thirty days of the filing of the appeal. The report of the Grievance Committee will be delivered to a Special Communication of the Grand Lodge specifically called for that purpose as soon as possible after the preparation of the Grievance Committee Reports. As we had before, these individuals will not be installed until the charge and appeals are resolved, and if any, is satisfied. I specifically forbid any member or officer of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska from installing any of these individuals until those things are resolved. I will continue to serve as Grand Master until it is determined whether or not E. David Watts can be installed as Grand Master, and the others would stay in their posts as well. I anticipate the determination will be made within sixty days. When that determination is made, either E. David Watts or the Deputy Grand Master will be installed as Grand Master and the others accordingly. I will accept no perks as Grand Master from the Grand Lodge during this time. Until the report of the trial commission is entered, all those individuals are entitled to attend and participate in the Annual Communication and any subordinate lodge activities. Brethren, these are difficult decisions and there are difficult days ahead. I recognize that reasonable men may disagree with orders or the decisions made here. I have made these decisions in what I

perceive to be the best interests of Nebraska Freemasonry and of the Grand Lodge and expect that they will be accepted as such.

We will now go on with the rest of the program as scheduled."

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M : W : B : Parsons announced the appointment of the Deputy Grand Custodians as tellers for this session, with W : B : Ron Grass as Chairman.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

M : W : B : Parsons asked Deputy Grand Master Watts to assume the lectern and preside over the discussion of the Grand Master's Recommendations. R : W : B : Watts gave the general instructions and indicated the voting would first be attempted by a show of raising the paper ballots in the air, then moving to a paper ballot if necessary.

Recommendaton No. 1

Amend Section 2-301 – ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT – by adding a third paragraph to the section so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized.

Sec. 2-301 – ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT – The elective officers of a subordinate lodge shall consist of a Master, Senior and Junior Wardens, Treasurer and Secretary. One officer may hold both elective offices of Treasurer and Secretary. The appointive officers shall consist of a Chaplain, Senior and Junior Deacons, Senior and Junior Stewards and Tyler. The offices of Marshal and Organist may also be appointed if desired.

The elective officers shall be elected by secret written ballot by a majority vote at the first regular meeting in November of each year. Anyone so elected should, if possible, accept the office. An election cannot be reconsidered by the lodge unless the member so elected declines. All appointive officers shall be appointed by the Master.

Each elected lodge officer, as outlined above, must successfully complete an open book test on the Constitution and Bylaws, in a form to be provided by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska via a web form or paper format. Such test is required to be completed only once by an individual in his lifetime. Successful completion will be noted in the individual membership records held at the Grand Lodge office. Tests must be submitted to and received by the Grand Lodge office via the web form, first class or electronic mail, within 30 days of the date of election reported by each lodge on the Election of Officers form. Tests will be scored by Grand Lodge Education Committee. Each elected officer, commencing with officers to serve in the year 2012, must complete the test within 30 days of his election. Failure to complete the test and submit the same within the timeframe referenced above in this paragraph, or failure to satisfactorily complete the test with a score of seventy percent (70%) or above, will void the election of that officer, and a special election will be held by that lodge to fill that vacancy within an additional 30 days.

A motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 1 was made and seconded. M : W : B : Parsons gave his rationale for proposing the Recommendation. After a brief discussion, the Deputy Grand Master called for the question and, by a show of raised ballots, the motion failed to gain a two-thirds majority vote.

Recommendation No. 2

Amend Section 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Sec. 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – Commencing January 1, 2012, the per capita tax shall be divided as follows:

The Initiation Fee shall be allocated to the General Fund.

Amend the third paragraph of Section 2-601 – PER CAPTITA TAX – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Sec. 2-601 – PER CAPITA TAX: Third paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). The initiation fee shall increase to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) on January 1, 2007. In addition, each Lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Eighteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$18.50) Twenty-four Dollars (\$24.00) as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2005 2011. The per capita tax shall increase at a rate of \$2.00 \$3.00 for the first year commencing on the first day of January, 2008, 2012, and one dollar per year for the next three four years. The said per capita tax shall accrue as follows: 2008 \$20.50, 2009 \$21.50, 2010 \$22.50, and 2011 - \$24.00, 2012 -\$27.00, 2013 - \$28.00, 2014 - \$29.00, 2015 - \$30.00, 2016 - 31.00. The Grand Lodge shall use \$.50 of the per capita tax for the publication and distribution of a Masonie education newsletter to each member distribute the per capita tax as provided in Section 1-404 of this code. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. In addition to the per capita tax as currently provided, commencing on January 1, 2006, each subordinate lodge shall pay to the Grand Lodge an assessment of \$1.00 per member to support the CHild Identification Program. Said assessment shall be due and payable in the same manner as the Grand Lodge per capita tax. The funds from this assessment shall be separate from the Grand Lodge per capita tax and shall be used for no other purpose than provided above.

A motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 2 was made and seconded. M : W : B : Parsons gave his rationale for proposing the Recommendation. After a brief discussion, the Deputy Grand Master called for the question and, by a show of raised ballots, the motion passed with a two-thirds majority vote.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The following proposed Constitutional Amendments were presented at the Annual Communication in February 2010 and thereafter submitted to the chartered subordinate lodges for their approval or rejection of bringing the question for ballot at the following session. A majority of the subordinate lodges approved thereof.

Proposed Amendment No. 1

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, and Grand Tyler, with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or their proxy proxies, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; provided however, no member shall hold more than two proxies for any and all subordinate lodges of which he is a member; and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

M : W : B : Parsons asked a signer of Constitutional Amendment No. 1 to state the position of the signers prior to the ballot. M : W : Russell Reno went to the microphone and stated that the signers brought the amendment in an attempt to encourage more officers to attend the Annual Communication and take what they learn back to their lodges.

A motion for the adoption of Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 1 was made and seconded. After a brief discussion, the Deputy Grand Master called for the question and, by a show of raised ballots, the motion passed with a majority vote.

Proposed Amendment No. 2

Amend **ARTICLE II – MEMBERS and ARTICLE V – OFFICERS** of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERS

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, and—Grand Tyler, and, if appointed, Grand Musician, with such other officers as it may from time to time create;

The office of Grand Musician may also be appointed, if desired.

GOLD PAN AWARD

The Gold Pan was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in 1987 by the Grand Lodge of Alaska on the occasion of the Grand Lodge's sixth anniversary. During Byron Jenkin's term as Grand Master, Nebraska was the first Grand Jurisdiction to grant recognition to the newly-formed Grand Lodge F :: & A :: M :: of Alaska, and this traveling trophy was presented in honor and appreciation of this action.

The Gold Pan is awarded annually to the Nebraska Lodge showing the greatest improvement or making the most significant contribution to Nebraska Masonry.

ROCK MAUL AWARD

The Large Lodge Rock Maul was presented to M : W : Byron C. Jenkins by the Omaha Area Past Masters of 1966 to be used as a Traveling Trophy. It is sixteen pounds in weight with a bronze head. The Rock Maul has been used for its original purpose in a stone quarry, and has been beautifully refurbished with a square and compass worked into the metal.

The Small Lodge Rock Maul was presented as a gift to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by the family of Past Grand Master Harold Hultman. In recognition of the celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States, and in honor of Grand Master Hultman, W : B : Herman O. Hansen, DGC, gold plated the head of a rock maul, engraved the handle with Masonic working tools, and gifted it to M : W : Hultman. This Rock Maul will now be presented at each Grand Lodge Communication to a Small Lodge deemed to be the Outstanding Lodge that year.

The Rock Maul Awards are presented by the Grand Master to a large lodge and a small lodge whose works most agree with the programs of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. The lodges selected represent the best all-around lodges in the jurisdiction of Nebraska.

As guidelines to award the Rock Maul, the following are used: officer leadership, attendance, bulletin or newspaper, ritual, enthusiasm, fellowship, temple appearance and condition, secretary reports, and programs other than regular meetings and ritual meetings held through the year.

In addition to the overall winning lodges, lodges that finished first and second runners-up also are recognized.

The Grand Master announced Lancaster Lodge No. 54 in Lincoln as recipient of the Large Lodge Rock Maul Award and Franklin Lodge No. 264 in Franklin as winner of the Small Lodge Rock Maul Award.

The 2nd Runner-up in the large lodge category was Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 in Plattsmouth, and the 1st Runner-up was Cotner Lodge No. 297 in Lincoln.

The 2nd Runner-up in the small lodge category was Jachin Lodge No. 146 in Holdrege, and the 1st Runner-up was Robert W. Furnas Lodge No. 265 in Scottsbluff.

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

The Credentials Committee is pleased to report the following for this, the 154th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska.

We have in attendance all Grand Lodge Officers, 18 Past Grand Masters, 22 Deputy Grand Custodians and 38 non-delegate Masons.

At the time of this report there are the following Masters, Wardens and Secretaries registered: There are 74 Masters in person and 27 by proxy; there are 38 Senior Wardens in person and 31 by proxy; there are 23 Junior Wardens in person and 37 by proxy; and there are 60 Secretaries in person and 35 by proxy.

We have 358 total possible votes with officers and proxies. We are also recognizing the Lodges that have all four delegate officers in attendance in person. They are Lodges 1, 32, 50, 54, 79, 146, 148, and 332. They will receive a certificate to display in their lodge. We thank them for their efforts to be present and a part of this Grand Communication.

At this time there are no Masters, Wardens, or Secretaries registered from the following Lodges: 9, 59, 103, 106, 110, 132, 165, 220, 221, 234, 241, 248, 263, 286, and 293. There have been no Masters, Wardens, or Secretaries registered for two years from Lodges 9, 73, 165, 221, 241, 248, 286, and 293, and for three years from Lodges 73 and 165.

We are pleased to have dignitaries present from the following jurisdictions: Prince Hall Masons of Nebraska, Grand Lodges of Manitoba, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Nevada, South Dakota, Virginia, Washington, and Wyoming.

We are also pleased to have in attendance representatives from the following Masonic-related organizations: Eastern Star, Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters, DeMolay, York Rite, Red Cross of Constantine, Scottish Rite, Shrine International, Sesostris, Tehama, and Tangier Shrine Temples, Daughters of the Nile, Social Order of the Beauceant, National Sojourners, The Nebraska Masonic Home and the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children.

Other attendance items that may be of interest are: there were 224 present at the Grand Master's Banquet on Thursday evening, there were 442 at the Public Opening Friday and 338 at the Membership Banquet Friday night.

M : W : B : Parsons thanked Delmar and the Credentials Committee, and asked for reiteration of the lodges absent for three or more years, and then stated:

"Brethren, you have heard the report and noted the absence of representatives from lodges which have been absent for three or more years. At this point, in compliance with section 2-514 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, I now declare that Lodges No. 73 and 165, having been absent for more than three years, they have forfeited their charters. They may regain those charters by attending the next annual communication. In the meantime, they are prohibited from engaging in any Masonic activity unless they first apply for and receive a dispensation from the Grand Lodge."

After the Credentials Report was given, it was found that a representative from Friend Lodge No. 73 did register Saturday morning while Chairman Delmar was giving his report. Grand Master Parsons amended his order to reflect that only the charter for Barneston Lodge No. 165 would be forfeited.

FINAL REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

John E. Lorenzen, Chairman

The 2010 Committee on Finance met during the past year to conduct its assigned duties as proscribed in Section 1–318 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

Following the close of each calendar year, the books and records of the Grand Lodge are audited by an independent certified public accountant.

Actual revenue and expenses, compared to budgeted, for 2010 are as follows:

The numbers show that \$9042 of investment income was needed to make up the difference between revenue and expenses – \$58,111 less than the investment draw budgeted for 2010. The results of the fiscal year show that the Grand Lodge Officers and staff have been good stewards of the funds of the Grand Lodge operating budget during 2010; however, the expenses of the Grand Lodge continue to exceed the annual revenue and thus, Nebraska Masonry is operating at a deficit, making it necessary to draw from the general investment fund to make up the shortfall.

The Committee on Finance found satisfactory documentation for expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and was able to conduct its work in a complete and timely manner.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

The printed Address of the Grand Master:

PREFACE

I have had the privilege of serving as a Grand Lodge officer since 1997 when M : W : B : Ken Fleming appointed me Grand Historian. I served in that capacity for eight years, and enjoyed all eight years immensely. Had my Grand Lodge journey stopped after that period, I would have departed happy in the knowledge that I had been able to contribute something to the Grand Lodge. Such was not the case, however, as M : W : B : Ivan Vrtiska appointed me to the advancing line, a further honor for which I am deeply indebted.

As I thought about what I wanted to say in this address, the magnitude of the task suddenly hit me. Normally, I can sit down and crank out articles, letters, and other written communications in fairly short order. I realized that I had a lot of things to say, people to thank, and emotions to try and express, all in a few short paragraphs. Merely recounting the experiences of my year as Grand Master or even talking about all my experiences as a Grand Lodge officer doesn't quite cover it, so I decided to talk about my Masonic journey from its beginning, over 35 years ago. Growing up in a small town in Pennsylvania, I was aware that my maternal grandfather was an active Mason, having served as master of his lodge, and as an officer and member in the York Rite bodies, Scottish Rite, and Shrine. I determined at a fairly early age to emulate his example and become a Mason. The first opportunity I had was when I was assigned to Offutt Air Force Base, where I met an individual who had just become a Mason in a lodge in Omaha. He signed my petition to George W. Lininger Lodge, and I was off and running. After completing my Blue Lodge degrees, I joined the Scottish Rite, York Rite, and the Shrine, and my wife and I both became members of the Eastern Star. The only goal to which I ever aspired was to serve as Master of my lodge. I achieved that goal, and everything I've achieved since then was beyond my wildest dreams. I am very grateful to all of you who have helped me along the way. First and foremost, I have to thank my wife Pauline for her support and encouragement. The fact that she also came from a Masonic family certainly helped, as her father, both grandfathers, and most of her uncles were Masons.

I am also fortunate in that as I traveled around the globe while in the Air Force, I met Masons in numerous states and countries, and came to realize and appreciate the global nature of our fraternity. There is an instant bond of friendship and trust that is established whenever you meet a brother, no matter what the language or cultural barriers may be. These ties and friendships have given me a love for the fraternity, and have inspired me to always try and do the right thing for the benefit of the craft. I have been truly humbled by being selected to serve as your Grand Master.

To our visitors, I extend a heartfelt welcome. You honor the Grand Lodge of Nebraska with your presence, and we extend to you and your jurisdiction our warm fraternal greetings. Over the years, I have been well received and have had a great time in my visits to other jurisdictions, and I hope you find our Annual Communication likewise friendly and uplifting.

YEAR IN REVIEW

In 2010 my goals were not to introduce a myriad of new programs, but rather to focus on what was successful in the past, to refocus some efforts on some areas that

needed attention, and finally, to support the men and women of our armed forces whose efforts enable us to enjoy the blessings of freedom that we enjoy in this nation.

In support of the first goal, we have encouraged lodges to participate in CHIP. It is a great program that not only helps safeguard children throughout the state, but projects a positive image of Masonry in the public eye throughout the state. Membership growth continues to be a goal, and in support of that effort, this year we introduced a pin only to be awarded to first time, top line signers of a petition. The first time an individual signs a petition is the most important time he will do so, because it demonstrates that he has made a personal commitment to the fraternity to get one of his friends, relatives or coworkers to join him in its good endeavors. This year we distributed over 70 pins to such individuals. Masonic unity was another goal this year. To that end, I actively participated in many events with the York and Scottish Rites, the Shrine, Eastern Star, and Masonic youth groups. While some of us may have more interest in the ceremonies of the Rites, or the fun and philanthropy of the Shrine, we are all Masons and bound by the same fraternal tie. We need to stress cooperation, not competition. Finally, we introduced the Change for the Troops program this year, which was originally started by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. It has been phenomenally successful, and my hat is off to all those who have contributed to the program.

I have submitted two recommendations this year. Recommendation No. 1 was originally submitted last year as a Resolution from the floor by Springfield Lodge No. 112. It had insufficient valid signatures, and thus could not be voted upon. I thought the proposal had merit, and informed the brethren of that lodge that I would submit it as one of my recommendations this year.

My second recommendation is an attempt to acquaint elected lodge officers with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge. All elected officers take an obligation to uphold and obey the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, but it is a little tough to do so if you have never read them. This is an effort to get people into the books so that they may become familiar with what they have sworn to uphold.

The following is a recapitulation of my activities and a summary of some of the important work of Nebraska Freemasonry during the past year.

VISITATIONS

This year I had the privilege to attend the Annual Communications of the Grand Lodges of Minnesota, Alabama and Iowa, as well as the Conference of Grand Masters of North America, the Midwest Conference of Grand Lodges, and the Imperial Shrine Session. I also attended the Annual Communication of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Nebraska, as well as the Prince Hall Midwest Conference of Grand Masters, both of which were held in Omaha. In all instances, I was the recipient of wonderful hospitality and was extended every courtesy. Over the years I have had the privilege to make many friends around the United States, and I look forward to continuing those friendships in the years to come.

I also enjoyed the Imperial Shrine Session and am grateful for the warm hospitality extended by the Tangier, Sesostris, and Tehama Shrine Centers during a wonderful week in Toronto.

During the year I, or a Grand Lodge officer, attempted to accept nearly every invitation we received from a subordinate lodge. If we missed an event to which we received an invitation, it was due to our oversight. However, if your lodge was not visited this past year, it is most likely because we were not invited. The Grand Lodge officers continue to confer the First Section of the Master Masons Degree when requested and did so at the Omaha One-day Degree Conferral on July 17. I encourage local lodges to use this resource as the degree work is of the highest quality. In addition, the Grand Lodge officers continued to portray the Eighth Degree of the Scottish Rite in all four Nebraska Valleys, as well as the Past Master's Degree in the Royal Arch Chapter of the York Rite. The ritual performance in these degrees is excellent, and demonstrates the continuing support by the Grand Lodge for the appendant bodies

GRAND LODGE COMMITTEES

I want to thank each member who served on a Grand Lodge committee. Your work is essential to the continued success of the Grand Lodge and its programs, and I fear your contribution to the fraternity can sometimes be ignored. I hope that you will look back on your service with a sense of satisfaction for a job well done. This past year many committees made significant progress in making their functions relevant. With the new goals and objectives which are being set before the committees, this level of relevancy will only continue to increase.

CHANGE FOR THE TROOPS

The one new program that I started this year was Change for the Troops, whereby individual lodges would collect their spare change after meeting and forward that change to the Grand Lodge office. The collected donation would be used to buy phone cards for troops deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan. I am extremely happy to report that the

program has been a rousing success, and has demonstrated the patriotism and support for our military among the Masons of Nebraska. Individual lodges, Shrine Centers and clubs, York and Scottish Rite bodies, and other Masonic related organizations around the state have all contributed. Thus far this year we have raised over \$24,000 and distributed phone cards to nearly 1,500 deploying men and women. I would like to personally thank W.B. Bill Nelson who orchestrated the issue of these cards to the troops as they deployed; to W.B. Glenn Mulholland who led the effort in the North Platte area; and to an anonymous member of Bellevue Lodge, a retired Air Force member now living in Australia, who made substantial financial contributions to the program. I am happy to report that this program will continue next year as well. Thanks again for all your support.

CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM (CHIP)

The Nebraska CHIP, begun several years ago under the leadership of Past Grand Master Ivan Vrtiska, has matured and grown into one of the best programs ever sponsored by the Masons of Nebraska. Under the able leadership of its President, Kent Broyhill, and a very active Board of Directors, Nebraska CHIP continues to be a vital tool for lodges. To date, Nebraska Masonic lodges have identified nearly 30,000 individuals. If your lodge has not yet participated in a CHIP event, I urge you to consider sponsoring an event.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation No. 1

Amend Section 2-301 - ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT - by adding a third paragraph to the section so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized.

Sec. 2-301 - ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT - The elective officers of a subordinate lodge shall consist of a Master, Senior and Junior Wardens, Treasurer and Secretary. One officer may hold both elective offices of Treasurer and Secretary. The appointive officers shall consist of a Chaplain, Senior and Junior Deacons, Senior and Junior Stewards and Tyler. The offices of Marshal and Organist may also be appointed if desired.

The elective officers shall be elected by secret written ballot by a majority vote at the first regular meeting in November of each year. Anyone so elected should, if possible, accept the office. An election cannot be reconsidered by the lodge unless the member so elected declines. All appointive officers shall be appointed by the Master.

Each elected lodge officer, as outlined above, must successfully complete an open book test on the Constitution and Bylaws, in a form to be provided by the Grand Lodge of Nebraska via a web form or paper format. Such test is required to be completed only once by an individual in his lifetime. Successful completion will be noted in the individual membership records held at the Grand Lodge office. Tests must be submitted to and received by the Grand Lodge office via the web form, first class or electronic mail, within 30 days of the date of election reported by each lodge on the Election of Officers form. Tests will be scored by Grand Lodge Education Committee. Each elected officer, commencing with officers to serve in the year 2012, must complete the test within 30 days of his election. Failure to complete the test and submit the same within the timeframe referenced above in this paragraph, or failure to satisfactorily complete the test with a score of seventy percent (70%) or above, will void the election of that officer, and a special election will be held by that lodge to fill that vacancy within an additional 30 days.

Recommendation No. 2

Amend Section 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Sec. 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – Commencing January 1, 2012, the per capita tax shall be divided as follows:

The Initiation Fee shall be allocated to the General Fund.

Amend the third paragraph of Section 2-601 – PER CAPTITA TAX – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Sec. 2-601 – PER CAPITA TAX: Third paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). The initiation fee shall increase to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) on January 1, 2007. In addition, each Lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Eighteen and 50/100 Dollars (\$18.50) Twenty-four Dollars (\$24.00) as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2005 2011. The per capita tax shall increase at a

rate of \$2.00 \$3.00 for the first year commencing on the first day of January, 2008, 2012, and one dollar per year for the next three four years. The said per capita tax shall accrue as follows: 2008 - \$20.50, 2009 - \$21.50, 2010 - \$22.50, and 2011 - \$24.00, 2012 - \$27.00, 2013 - \$28.00, 2014 - \$29.00, 2015 - \$30.00, 2016 - 31.00. The Grand Lodge shall use \$.50 of the per capita tax for the publication and distribution of a Masonic education newsletter to each member distribute the per capita tax as provided in Section 1-404 of this code. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. In addition to the per capita tax as currently provided, commencing on January 1, 2006, each subordinate lodge shall pay to the Grand Lodge an assessment of \$1.00 per member to support the CHild Identification Program. Said assessment shall be due and payable in the same manner as the Grand Lodge per capita tax. The funds from this assessment shall be separate from the Grand Lodge per capita tax and shall be used for no other purpose than provided above.

On July 15, 2010, I approved an amendment to the bylaws of Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 in Plattsmouth to increase the amounts paid to the Treasurer and Secretary for services to the lodge.

On July 30, 2010, I approved an amendment to the bylaws of Liberty Lodge No. 300 in Lincoln to increase the degree fees.

On September 10, 2010, I approved an amendment to the bylaws of Nelson Lodge No. 77 in Nelson to increase the annual dues.

On September 14, 2010, I approved an amendment to the bylaws of Ashlar Lodge No. 33 in Grand Island to increase the annual dues.

- b. Each candidate will be instructed using the Standard Proficiency Manual for each degree, and will be required to pass a proficiency examination before proceeding to the next degree; and
- c. Conferral of each degree will be witnessed by a member of the Committee on Work, a Deputy Grand Custodian or a Grand Lodge officer;
- d. Each candidate will be instructed that he must sign the Bylaws of his Lodge on his return home.
- Each candidate will be instructed that he must return to his home lodge and prove to the Master that he has completed all the questions in the Standard Proficiency Manual within the time period allowed in Section 2-402 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws;
- f. The attached checklist for the roles of the conferral will be completed prior to commencement of the degrees. Said list will be returned to the Grand Lodge Office at least one week prior to the conferral.
- g. The secretary of the host lodge will forward to the Grand Lodge Office immediately following the conferral a complete list of all candidates in attendance who completed the work, and will notify the secretaries of lodges for whom courtesy work was given of the names of those candidates who completed the work.

CONDITION OF THE CRAFT

This past year has been one of the best of my life. I have traveled across the state, renewing old friendships and creating new ones, from South Sioux City to Scottsbluff, from Chadron to Falls City, and points in between. The thing that has impressed me the most during all these travels is the dedication and devotion to Masonry and its principles that I have seen demonstrated. I have seen a passion for the fraternity, expressed by both new members in their twenties and recipients of 60-year membership pins; in diverse locations, including Plattsmouth, Broken Bow, Alliance, and Long Pine. In short, I am heartened by what I have seen and heard.

I have seen a renewed spirit of Masonic unity across the state. Friendship dinners, community activities, and cooperative charitable endeavors are all overt manifestations of this drive and spirit. This cooperative attitude in Nebraska serves as a model for much of the rest of the country to emulate. We need to thank the leaders of all the appendant bodies in Nebraska for helping to foster this attitude. I have seen situations in other parts of the country where egos, short-sightedness, and personal animosities have stymied such cooperation. We in Nebraska are extremely fortunate to be in such an environment.

This is a great time to be a Mason. There has been a renewal of interest in the Masonic fraternity, as evidenced by the number of Masonic related books, both factual and fiction, that have been published. There is a vast amount of Masonic related information available on line, and there have been a number of movies and television shows that have featured Masonic themes. What is most interesting about these books, articles, shows, and movies, is that they are generally much more pro-Masonry than they might have been ten or twenty years ago. The upshot of all this, is that we are getting more younger candidates. Many of these young Masons had a grandfather who was a Mason, but not a father, as their father's generation were not "joiners." Interestingly, some of these young Masons have now gotten their fathers to join, an interesting role reversal.

In order to keep these new Masons that were are obtaining, we need to make it worthwhile to come to lodge functions. Business meetings must be interesting, informative, and fairly short, followed by an opportunity for social time together. Since many of these newer members have young families, there should also be lodge events, such as picnics, dinners, and children's events, that encourage family participation, as well as community activities, like CHIP events, that put Masonry in the public's eye.

While the basic principles and tenets of Freemasonry have not changed, the means by which we teach those lessons and attract new members who believe in those principles and tenets, have changed. Masonry, after all, is a "progressive moral science." Unfortunately, not every lodge is willing to adapt to the changes in society. There are some lodges out there that are unwilling or unable to change anything: they have not obtained any new members; they have not engaged in any community activity; they have not attended the annual communications of the Grand Lodge; they have not attended any area meetings; they have, in fact, not even held lodge business meetings, although they may have "pencil whipped" minutes attesting to the fact that meetings were held. In short, they are a "Last Man's Club." In order for Masonry to flourish, those practices and attitudes must cease. In an effort to begin to change that mindset, I have decided to enforce those Grand Lodge bylaws that require lodges to attend annual communication. I hope this will be a wake-up call and that the true spirit of Masonry will energize those lodges into action.

During my year-long journey as Grand Master, there have been some potholes in the road, a couple of them large, but most of them minor. My only disappointment, and one that I share with many of my predecessors, is that I didn't accomplish all the things I set out to do. Those minor instances aside, this year has been a phenomenal experience. I have enjoyed all the great people I met and associated with this year, the once in a lifetime events I participated in, and the overall sharing of Masonic brotherhood with so many. I hope I have done an acceptable job in your eyes, and I know that with the help of each Nebraska Mason, the fraternity will continue to be in good hands as we proceed down the road.

CONCLUSION

It has been the highest privilege of my life to serve as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. I attempted to serve the Craft to the best of my ability and I hope to the satisfaction of you, my brothers. I earnestly pray that the Great Architect of the Universe will continue to guide our fraternity in its noble endeavors, and that He bless each of you in the coming years.

THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME

Mary Stapp, Executive Director

M∴W∴ Parsons asked Phil Lorenzen, a member of The Nebraska Masonic Home Board of Trustees, to come forward to bring the report from the Home.

Phil made the following remarks:

"On behalf of Jim Erixon, the President of The Nebraska Masonic Home in Plattsmouth, I bring you his personal greetings, the greetings of the Board of Directors and they're not with as much excitement as the greetings you'd get from Mary and Mary and Jo, and I hope you had a chance to visit the display. The report is written in the booklet. I'll refer you to that for details. I'll just touch on a couple of items this morning if I could real quickly.

Thank you for your support. Thank you for all that you do for The Nebraska Masonic Home. It's a marvelous facility. If you haven't visited, I ask you to come and visit. It's always open. My father died at that Home. It was the best care I had ever witnessed. He had been in other facilities and let me tell you from my heart that it is a fantastic facility and deserves your consideration and support.

The membership census is up a bit. We have a total of 90 residents right now, 22 men, 68 women. We have liberalized the admission requirements a bit. Now, on a pay basis, we will take Masons from other jurisdictions that are in good standing in other jurisdictions. We still take Masons, we take their widows and daughters and other qualifying female relatives. Of the total residents we have, 46 are regular way, 44 are pay basis. We've seen a shift that last few years that people are deferring their interest into The Home. When they come into The Home, it's a situation where their asset basis is depleting and we're finding that more are coming in on what we call a regular way and a regular way is an individual giving up their asset base, assigning their social security benefits and then we provide the balance of the care. And, again, we have 46 regular way, where we pay their way and 44 pay basis residents. We also have 8 couples that reside. The cost of that regular way basis takes from the endowment fund \$150,000 a month to make that happen. We're operating basically by depleting our asset base. The market has been unkind to us. It's coming back a bit. We are in the launching midst of a campaign to build a major addition. Five years ago, it was required that we be licensed under a change in the state law. That has cost us several million dollars to go through that process. The care is no better, but the documentation of the care is outstanding. We just went through a review by the State Department of Health Care and Licensure. We passed that in flying colors, but we were mandated from them that we need to launch our construction of improvement and so forth to take proper care of the residents with adequate space and so forth. So, that's where we are. You will be contacted. You know that there's a campaign that's kind of in the silent phase. Advancing beyond that, there will be an opportunity for giving.

The Grand Lodge gives very little to The Home. As you indicated, we're currently paying \$2.00 per member for The Home. That only pays a token amount of one resident's care during the year. So you'll hear more, but avail yourselves a knowledge of The Home, be proud of what it is, what it stands for and the care that is provided. It is an absolute assurance, it seems to me, we do

an actuarial study each year, that we will continue to provide care for those folks now in our custody and care on a regular way basis by your continued support and contribution, it potentially affords an opportunity for you should you need such a facility in the future."

The printed report is as follows:

As we look back on the Year 2010 it is with pride that I report to you that all the employees continue to work very hard as a team to maintain The Nebraska Masonic Home's excellent reputation. Every department provides excellent services to our Masons and their eligible female relatives on a daily basis.

As we started 2010, our census was 81 in January. As we ended the year, our census for December was 90. We were all pleased to see the census increase through the year. Our census today is comprised of 22 men and 68 women. As a result of our wide range of services, we continue to attract couples because they are confident the needs of each spouse can be met in the same facility. At this time we have 8 couples. Our residents consist of 46 Regular-way residents and 44 Pay-basis residents.

An incredible amount of discussions and planning has taken place throughout the year. Quarterly board meetings were held as well as a board retreat on June 30. The Board is to be commended on the decision made at the October 2010 Board meeting to move forward with the major building project and the total renovation of the 1924 Wing. With this decision being made, the Capital Campaign Fund Raising process also needed to move forward. I commend the Board of Trustees, The Board of Directors, and the Capital Campaign Committee members for their determination, hard work, and conviction that this project is a necessity for the future success of The Masonic Home. This project will ensure that we continue to provide excellent services to current and future residents.

Since the eligibility requirements were enhanced October 2006, it is a pleasure to report we have had eight (8) admissions as a result of those admission criteria changes. This number alone is reason enough to feel confident that the right decision was made when this change was implemented four (4) years ago.

The months of June and July are special because of Narcissus Kensington and Home Chapter No. 189. Those are the traditional months that each group comes to our facility with all the food for indoor picnics in our main dining room. In July when Home Chapter visits, we are pleased to welcome Grand Chapter Order of Eastern Star officers and their companions. We truly appreciate this ongoing interest and support. It is always a special treat to take Grand Chapter Officers on a tour and show them what a beautiful facility they are supporting. The residents enjoy these annual visits because of the many friendships they have made among our guests through the years.

The annual Boon Memorial Food Truck tradition continues to be one of our greatly-appreciated annual events. A special thank you goes to Richard Schlaman, project coordinator of the Food Truck, from Ashlar Lodge No. 33 for another very successful year as a result of his hard work. Our residents and Board of Trustees extend a very special thank you to the lodges and chapters for your annual commitment of giving to this worthwhile and long-standing project.

Thank you to the Tangier Shrine Chanters for officially opening our Christmas Season on December 7th with their beautiful musical program in our chapel.

We are pleased to welcome back many lodges and chapters to The Masonic Home as they have chosen The Home as a place to hold one of their regular monthly meetings. I'm sure the delicious meal we serve these groups is a definite drawing card also. Our residents and employees enjoy it when I take these groups on a tour. Every time someone sees The Home for the first time, I am always confident they will spread compliments about The Home to others.

To the Masters and Wardens Club of the Greater Omaha-Metro area I extend a special thank you from the residents, employees, and Board of Trustees. Our residents' Christmas party on December 23rd is a success because of you. The beautiful poinsettias you get each resident and the special individually-selected gifts you purchase for our regular-way residents is so generous. We truly appreciate the time and special attention that Dan Wellendorf devotes to this project as chairperson. We greatly appreciate the contributions that are made to this project by Masons throughout the area.

Thank you to all Masonic Lodges, Eastern Star Chapters, Shriners, Youth Groups and all individuals who show our residents regularly how much they mean to them by personal visits, special gifts, and monetary support. You are greatly appreciated.

To Grand Master John Parsons and his Grand Lodge Officers I extend a very special thank you for your ongoing support for the betterment of The Masonic Home. We also want to thank the Grand Lodge staff for their continued administrative support and being so available when we call.

To Worthy Grand Matron Jerrie Wilcox and Worthy Grand Patron Dennis Smith and the Grand Chapter Family I extend a very special thank you for another year of support and loyalty to The Nebraska Masonic Home and to the residents we are dedicated to caring for

REPORT OF THE MASONIC-EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

Charles E. "Ched" House, President, Board of Directors

M : W : B : Parsons asked if Ron Giesselmann was in attendance to present the report from the Children's Home.

Brother Giesselmann made the following remarks before referencing the printed report:

"Thank you Most Worshipful Master, I'm pleased to report that we've had a very successful year, and one of the things that we've been most successful at, our extracurricular activity for all of the kids, of which we have 28 now, we usually average between 30 and 32, but last year they had a record-setting number of 4-H awards and that number was 868, so we're very happy with that. The first quarter of this year and fourth quarter of last year in school, we had all of the kids pass their classes in school, so we're very pleased with that. Our campaigns have gone up. We have an outdoor basketball court now thanks to Vesta Chapter out of Omaha. We had a snowball fight there shortly before we left. And the Grand Lodge game room is up and running. We've had three snow days so far this year, and were able to use the game room for that. We also have a wellness center that we're using, and a rec room that's new this year. So thanks to the support from the Masons and Eastern Star of Nebraska, we can do these things for the children that need our care. So thank you very much."

The printed report from the President of the Board is as follows:

I am pleased to report that overall activities and operations at the Home are returning to a more normal pace, and Ron and his crew of dedicated staff did a great job of having to cut back and change activities to conserve expenses. The Home portfolio is regaining value at a steady pace and we owe, and have expressed to Brother James N. DeMoss and the team at Morgan Stanley, a very large Thank You for guiding our investments through the past two and half years keeping us in steady income for operations even though at a lower amount than normal.

We are in the process of changing our accounting program from a modified cash basis financial program to an asset keeper-depreciation program. Each year at our annual meeting after our accountant goes over the annual audit of statement of assets and fund balances, he comments that we use an accounting method other than the accepted norm for non-profit corporations. This year we asked why and he then explained that using the asset keeper - depreciation program, an all inclusive form of accounting, placing all values into one record system, we would then be eligible for possible grants and estate bequests and gifts, that we are not eligible for now, should they be offered. To do that required us to take a complete inventory of all personal properties and equipment valued at \$2000.00 dollars or more to be included with the value on all real estate, farms, and buildings we already maintain in other forms of records. Ron and Todd have either placed a numbered ID sticker or used the serial number where available of everything they tabulate, so as to help us account for things when replacement is required or reported missing. It's been a long process, but Gloria is converting all of this to one accounting program so we meet all requirements. This system will also make insurance claims much easier to process.

Todd has added four part-time house parents needed to meet new state requirements, and allowing us to increase our census to 32, one child per room, because he has determined that there are less places to place children, and more children to place.

Maria Dorn, our new Farm Director and 4-H leader, is with us full-time, having worked this winter as a part-time house parent as well as looking after normally reduced farm 4-H duties, and has been adding calves so that all children have at least one to show, and she is now looking for and will purchase five feeder calves so she can start a new 4-H project. Those feeder calves will be utilized the following year as show animals, which will help that program as well.

I am always happy to speak for the proud and hard working members of our Board who perform their duties on your behalf, and we again commend you as members of Masons and Eastern Star for your continuing personal and monetary support. The lives of the children of our wonderful Home are enriched by your kindness, thoughtfulness and support, and they will thank you for the rest of their lives. Truly, Masonry at work.

REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA FREEMASONS CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM FOUNDATION

Kent B. Broyhill, President

M : W : B : Parsons asked Kent Broyhill to come forward to present the report from the CHIP Committee.

Any Freemason who has ever worked a CHIP event has firsthand knowledge of how important CHIP is to the fraternity. The program has been a homerun since its founding in 2004. It has provided every lodge the opportunity to be relevant in their communities.

At the time of this writing, NECHIP has ID'd 29,816 kids, and there are more numbers to add from a recent event in Laurel. We are currently in a slow time of year for CHIP. Our 30,000th child is projected to happen in Imperial, NE when events pick up again in March.

Since the program's inception we have completed 225 CHIP events in Nebraska. This year we held 33 events over a 43-day period. Events such as the State Fair extend over multiple days. In 2010 alone, 4367 kids went through the program. Most events will ID between 100 and 200 kids.

We are now in a cycle of having to update or replace computers and backdrops. This is a scheduled process that keeps us current on technology. We have dispensed with printing the data and presenting an ID card to the parent. This was done as a security and cost cutting measure. Parents are now given just the CD containing all the info. The CHIP program does not retain any information on any client other than the permission slips. This past year we began scanning the slips and saving them in a data base. We then shred the original paper slip. This was also done as a security and space saving measure.

A couple years ago we began storing equipment at various locations throughout the state. This inventory check point / repacking / distribution method has worked well and has saved considerable transportation costs.

NECHIP board meetings are held on the first Friday of the month. We meet quarterly at the children's home in Fremont or via teleconference. Anyone wishing to attend a board meeting is welcome.

Those members who desire to make a gift to the NECHIP program may do so by contacting the Grand Lodge office. Nebraska CHIP is a 501(c)3 foundation.

The Grand Lodge of Cyprus has requested recognition and meets the requirement of recognition set down by the rules of the Committee on Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America and the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, Section 1-306 – Standards of Recognition. The Fraternal Relations Committee recommends full recognition of the Grand Lodge of Cyprus.

The printed report is as follows:

This year we have received no new requests for recognition by foreign Grand Lodges. The committee recommends that we not recognize the following jurisdictions at this time because of lack of recommendation by the Committee on Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America and they be carried forward for further consideration in the ensuing year.

United Grand Lodges of Serbia, Grand Lodge of the State of Guanajuato (Mexico), Grand Lodge of Cyprus, Grand Loge du Niger, The Grand Lodge of Estado de Aguascalientes (Mexico), The Grand Lodge of Estado De Guerrero (Mexico), The Grand Lodge of Montenegro, The Grand Lodge of the Kingdom of Morocco, The Grand Lodge of San Marino, Grand Lodge of Baja California (Mexico) and the Gran Logia "Occidental Mexicana" (Mexico).

The Committee continues to solicit for recognition from the various Prince Hall Grand Lodges in those jurisdictions where Prince Hall Grand Lodges and Grand Lodges under

the canopy of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America have entered into agreements of mutual fraternal recognition.

As always, the Grand Representative of Nebraska near other Grand Jurisdictions are urged to communicate with their counterparts; and, if possible, make arrangements to visit the jurisdiction they represent.

Thanks to the staff at the Grand Lodge Office for help with mailings and research. We are ever grateful.

W∴B∴ Roger Dill approached the podium wearing his Masonic All-Star Marching band logo sweatshirt. He commented how nice the sweatshirts are when the snow flies in Nebraska, and that the brethren could get their own band sweatshirt by going to the Grand Lodge website and order a variety of apparel online. Each item ordered helps to support the Masonic All-Star Band.

Roger mentioned that the band in 2010 brought together 255 students on Tuesday evening on June 15 and in 72 hours, by Friday evening, the band had learned enough music to put on a concert, were able to march down the street in formation, sounded and looked good, performed the pre-game National Anthem and the half-time performance for the Shrine Bowl. He noted that the students are amazing, and he hoped that when the brethren go back to the lodges, they decide to support a student and talk to the band directors and schools in their area. He added that the students could come back to the lodge following camp and give a presentation on their experience at band camp. If lodges don't have students in their area that can use the scholarship, Roger suggested that the scholarships be sent to the Grand Lodge to be used by other students in the state who wanted to attend and needed a scholarship. Brother Dill said that the band camp is always in great need of adult chaperones for day and night, for as many days as the adults are able, and room and board is provided. He thanked the brethren, the Grand Lodge and Grand Lodge Officers for the support given to the students and the camp. Brother Dill then referenced the printed report:

Once again the Masonic All-Star Marching Band Camp was a huge success. We had the largest band ever. The band was composed of 255 students from 98 different high schools. The students are nominated by their band directors and are some of the finest young musicians from throughout the state. The band is made up of students who have completed their freshman, sophomore and junior year in high school. One of our goals is to have the students take back what they have learned and become leaders in their local band.

Special thanks go the committee members, Grand Lodge staff, the band directors, JBA's, SBA's and chaperones who make this camp one of the best run camps in the state. This was the 16th year of the Masonic All-Star Marching Band and we are looking forward to many, many more.

The week was one of intense practice, fun evenings and no sleep. This year we practiced in Cook Pavilion instead of Memorial Stadium. The time saved in travel allowed the band to have more practice time and it showed in their final outstanding performance. We were also helped by the large number of returning students. It seems that once a student has attended our camp, they want to come back. One student even remarked it would take a court restraining order to keep her from coming back. We must be doing something right!

The students' way is paid for by \$250 scholarships provided by Masonic Lodges throughout the state, Eastern Star Chapters, Shrine, Scottish Rite and York Rite organizations, individual members and other donors. This year, DeMolay, Job's Daughters and Rainbows again donated the water bottles. This is a great way to introduce these fine organizations to the students, as their logos are on the bottles.

Our Masonic Band clothing line is on the Grand Lodge web site and is available to everyone. This helps defray other expenses. There are also many pictures of this year's activities on the site.

Thank you to Dave Watts for the use of his trailers to help store and move the band instruments from one place to another. The truck crew does a great job of keeping everything in order and helping us stay on time with our rehearsals. The different colored bands, donated by Dennis and Nan Rix, were a nice touch as well for organizational purposes.

A special "Thank You" goes to Michelle Fulmer who puts this camp together. The rest of us just follow her outstanding leadership.

The Band Camp does as much as any other program in promoting Masonry and Masonic values not only to the students but also to the parents, friends and relatives of the students. We receive many compliments on how well the students perform and how much they enjoy the camp.

The committee member's time, not to mention the committee's meek budget, doesn't give them the luxury of being able to visit each Lodge and deliver Masonic Education. The Masonic Education Symposium hosted two times a year, is a tool used to demonstrate how any member or Lodge can deliver Masonic Education to their members.

The Nebraska Masonic Education portal at www.nebraskamasoniceduation.com is dedicated to bringing together a wide variety of educational materials, presentations and short courses on Masonry. These materials are available for use by any Lodge or Mason seeking further information in Masonry. One of the more popular parts of the web site is the online discussion forum where Brothers can exchange ideas and opinions on Masonic Education.

This year, as in the past, the Masonic Education Committee begins the year with the Grand Lodge Masonic Education Breakfast. A very professional Masonic Education program is presented by the talented members of the committee. Masons from all over Nebraska have the opportunity to attend this presentation and go home with a little more knowledge about the Fraternity. In addition, the committee makes book reading

recommendations that enable the Masons of Nebraska to expand their Masonic knowledge even more.

The Masonic Education Symposiums are held in March and October. The committee is actively searching for someone to host the symposium in the Western part of Nebraska. These are professional programs, which will allow the attendees to walk away with Masonic history, philosophy, information, etc., about the fraternity. More importantly, it will give the attendees a demonstration of how to present Masonic Education to their Lodge. In addition, a game of Masonic Jeopardy is presented. The committee members enjoy this, as much as the attending Brethren.

The Nebraska Grand Lodge Masonic Education committee continues to support the Midwest Masonic Education Conference. This conference gives the committee ideas about how to better channel Masonic Education to the Masons of Nebraska. Many of the committee activities are aided, if not born by ideas picked up at these conferences. The conference gives the committee the opportunity to hear the successes and experiments of several surrounding states in Masonic Education. Member states are Kansas, Iowa, Michigan, Missouri, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Indiana, Ohio, North Dakota, South Dakota and Illinois, in addition to Nebraska. In 2010, the conference was held in Missouri. In 2011 it will be held in Michigan.

The quarterly section of the Nebraska Mason called "To Light" is a product of the Nebraska Grand Lodge Education Committee. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Larry Jacobsen, John Parsons and others, Masonic Education is delivered to the mailboxes of all Nebraska Masons. Thanks to utilizing the Nebraska Mason as a delivery method, four issues a year are being delivered. Articles are being provided by the SRICF and the Sts. John Lodge of Education in addition to members of the Education Committee.

The Nebraska Masonic Education Lodge (Sts John Lodge) continues to draw both attendees and presenters. Members of this Lodge share a desire to pursue more light in Masonry. More information about this Lodge will be available at the 2010 Grand Lodge. Dues are rather inexpensive and there are only two functions a year. There are 2 meetings per year. The meetings include papers being presented by members and of course, no Masonic gathering would be complete without a meal. Any member of the committee will be happy to give Masons more information and instruction on how to join.

Thanks to the members of the committee and other volunteers who take the time and effort to make the presentations. The committee thanks the lodges, and valleys who volunteer to support the committee in this task.

REPORT OF THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

Edward D. Nolte, Chairman

The Nebraska's George Washington Masonic Memorial Committee has two primary purposes—to educate Nebraska Masons on the history of the George Washington Masonic Memorial and to facilitate Memorial support among Nebraska Masons.

I first became involved with the George Washington Masonic Memorial Committee (GWMMC) in January of 2002, when then Chairman, M.W.B. Warren D. "Duke" Lichty, asked me to deliver Nebraska historical and Masonic artifacts to the Memorial, which features a display case highlighting the history of a State each month in the order in which that State joined the Union. We removed Nevada's (1866) artifacts, and replaced them with Nebraska's (1867) artifacts. As it turned out that year, Colorado, which followed Nebraska and became the 38th State in 1876, did not have a display, so Nebraska's display headlined for two months as the honored State.

The George Washington Masonic Memorial and Shuter's Hill on which it is located stand at the top of the King Street in Old Town Alexandria, VA. Shuter's Hill has a long and interesting history beginning before European settlers arrived, through the early years of our Nation, through the Civil War, and more recently as a revered Masonic site.

History of Shuter's Hill Before the George Washington Masonic Memorial

Native American hunters, who pre-date known tribal affiliations, were the first to use Shuter's Hill. In 1781, merchant John Mills built an elegant frame mansion and two small outbuildings for a laundry and garderner's house on the property. He operated the plantation and in the 1790s, he sold the plantation to Ludwell Lee, a lawyer, politician and planter, who grew rye that George Washington used for his whiskey distillery at Mount Vernon. In 1799, Benjamin Dulany, a wealthy planter, purchased the property as a summer home. The wooden mansion burned in 1842 and was replaced by a large brick house in the 1850s. At the beginning of the Civil War, Fort Ellsworth was built on Shuter's Hill as part of the Union Army's Defenses of Washington, and the Dulany mansion was occupied by the military. The brick mansion burned in 1905.

History of the Memorial and Its Namesake

The two Lodges most closely associated with George Washington were Fredericksburg Lodge, VA, his Mother Lodge, and Alexandria-Washington Lodge in Alexandria, VA, where he was elected Charter Master under the Grand Lodge of Virginia. W∴B∴ George Washington was initiated an Entered Apprentice on November 4, 1752, passed to Fellowcraft on March 3, 1753 and raised to Master Mason on August 4, 1753.

The Lodge at Alexandria, VA was first warranted by the Provincial Grand Lodge of PA on February 3, 1783 as Lodge No. 39. W∴B∴ Washington attended a St. John the Baptist Celebration there in June of 1784 and was later made an Honorary Member of the Lodge. On April 22, 1788, the Lodge received a Charter from the Grand Lodge of VA as Alexandria Lodge No. 22. The Lodge asked Washington to be its Charter Master, and he agreed. Washington was inaugurated as the First President of the United States on April 30, 1789 while holding the office of Master of Alexandria Lodge. After his death on December 14, 1799, the Lodge was renamed Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22.

In 1909, Brother Charles Callahan purchased several lots on Shuter's Hill, which he gave to the Lodge for the site of a fireproof Lodge Hall. M∴W∴B∴ Joseph W. Eggleston, Grand Master of VA, invited every U.S. Grand Master to assemble in Alexandria-

Washington Lodge on February 22, 1910 to form an Association to plan and build a suitable Memorial to W∴B∴ George Washington, the Mason, and with 26 Grand Lodges represented, the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association was formed. On February 22, 2010, this Association celebrated its centennial anniversary at that magnificent building.

Ten years later the concept of constructing a colossal building—a Memorial "lighthouse" to Washington—was approved by the U.S. Grand Lodges. The site was selected because it followed the ancient tradition for the location of temples on hilltops or mountains, and it was land with which General Washington was familiar – the very spot once proposed by Thomas Jefferson as the ideal site for the nation's Capitol.

The groundbreaking ceremony took place on June 5, 1922. Despite the great expense, the Memorial Association was determined not to borrow money. Construction only proceeded as money was collected for each stage of the project. On November 1, 1923, the Memorial's cornerstone was dedicated in a Masonic ceremony. President Calvin Coolidge; former President, Chief Justice, and Brother William H. Taft; and numerous other dignitaries performed the ceremony before a crowd of thousands of Freemasons. For 10+ years, Freemasons steadily and faithfully contributed to the construction of the Memorial. On May 12, 1932, the bicentennial year of George Washington's birth, the dedication of the Memorial took place with President Herbert Hoover participating.

After World War II, work on the Memorial's interior began in earnest. By 1970, the George Washington Masonic Memorial was completed. In 1999, the large square and compasses were added to the front lawn, a visible sign of the Masonic nature of the Memorial. A repository of many artifacts and the history of American Freemasons, the Memorial remains a lasting monument to George Washington, the Man, the Mason, and Father of our Country.

Support for the George Washington Masonic Memorial: You may not realize it, but every Nebraska Mason contributes to the construction, maintenance, repair, and operation of the George Washington Masonic Memorial. Every year the Grand Lodge of Nebraska contributes \$0.50 of the per capita fees for every Nebraska Mason. This year's official contribution was \$6,696.00. In addition, some members and Lodges contribute to the George Washington Masonic Memorial privately, but no records are kept by the Grand Lodge for these contributions.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

James F. Brown, Jr., Chairman

The Grand Lodge Office Committee is charged with the responsibility of overseeing the efficient operation of the Grand Lodge Office and its employees. Additionally, the committee manages the assets required by the Grand Lodge Office. In discharging this responsibility the committee met formally on one occasion and at other times through the use of email. The results of the actions taken by this committee follow:

- Mileage Reimbursement Amount The rate for eligible members of the Grand Lodge traveling in an official capacity is currently set at .30 per mile. The mileage reimbursement rate was raised to 0.40 cents per mile effective for the 2011 Masonic year.
- Grand Lodge Fixed Assets The committee reviewed the list of fixed assets owned by the Grand Lodge. Purchases in 2010 included two desktop computers, an Epson Scanner, UPS backup, Heartstart AED (purchased by band committee with Jerry Rittenburg memorial money), Hasler mailing system (leased new machine), and a Dell laptop computer. As a result of obtaining new equipment, numerous pieces were phased out in 2010, including the original server from 2002; four desktop computers; the old leased Hasler mailing system (surrended w/new lease), two inkjet printers; and the old UPS backup. The four desktop computers were given away to lodges in a random drawing. The remaining items will be disposed of through commercial avenues. If the items are unable to be sold, a notice may be listed in the Nebraska Mason offering the items at no cost. If no one comes forward, the items may be given to a charity or otherwise properly disposed.
- Committee Budget The 2011 budget request for the Office Committee was set at \$75.
- Grand Lodge Liability and Insurance Package The current status of the insurance package carried by the Grand Lodge was reviewed. The Grand Lodge Office provides health, dental and life insurance covering the two office employees. Current premiums are as follows: \$2579.16 per month health, \$99.36 per month dental, \$280.00 per year for \$25,000 life insurance. The committee approved the disbursement for life insurance on an annual instead of a monthly basis to avoid a monthly administration fee of \$15.00. The Grand Lodge Office Committee also decided to stay with the same insurance companies for 2011 Blue Cross/Blue Shield for health, MetLife for dental and United States Life for life insurance.
- CHIP Program Since the CHIP Foundation uses resources of the Grand Lodge, an Administrative Fee is charged to cover payroll, rent, and other elements of overhead. The fee was set at \$1275 per month for 2011. This is a decrease of \$55 per month over the 2010 fee.
- **Grand Lodge Office Employees** Raises for employees of the Grand Lodge were determined and communicated to the employees.
- Other The Grand Lodge Office Committee notes that lecture slides for the various degrees of masonry are available on PowerPoint from the Grand Lodge.

The Grand Lodge Office committee would like to acknowledge the professional manner in which the employees of the Grand Lodge Office perform their duties. Their competence and professional demeanor should be applauded by every mason in Nebraska! You are encouraged to stop by the Grand Lodge office the next time you are in Lincoln. Your presence is always welcome.

Again this year CHIP events were held throughout the state with great success. Grand Lodge also held a CHIP event at the Nebraska State Fair identifying several hundred children. It is hoped that the Masonic booth next year will be in a more conspicuous place so more children can be identified. Public donations make this project successful and we thank the CHIP committee members for their work at the events plus the solicitation of donations that make the events successful.

Other items left for the 2011 agenda include the promotional video or PowerPoint presentation for members and developing a Nebraska license plate with the Masonic logo that can be purchased through the state.

The Grand Lodge Office staff helped the Committee with news releases to Nebraska Lodges to be used to publicize installation of officers, awarding of scholarships, naming students to participate in the Masonic All Star Band Camp and presentations of year pin awards and Jordan Medals. These communications were done in a timely matter. The Committee truly appreciates the work of the Staff throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Brethren, as we end another Masonic year I regret to inform you that our numbers again have slipped. With all of the information available it appears to have fallen by 2.46%. I suspect that this number is actually higher since we have 16 lodges that do not, will not, or cannot report their activities to the Grand Lodge. We have 53 lodges that showed no activity for the year and accounted for a total loss of 86 members from our ranks.

On the brighter side, we have 20 lodges this year that showed positive growth. These lodges accounted for a gain in our membership of 90. Of these, only 6 of these lodges were from Omaha and Lincoln. The others are spread across the state. Masonic activities are up in the state, and currently there is interest being sparked by books and films that put Freemasonry in a positive light.

We had 2 lodges that consolidated this year, Trestle Board Lodge No. 162 and Composite Lodge No. 81. I suspect that in the next couple of years we will be seeing several more consolidations and some Lodges closing due to inactivity.

The net loss for the year was 321. We had 394 die, and 407 suspended for non-payment of dues. We cannot do anything about the deaths. The suspensions, on the other hand, are an area on which we all need to work. These 407 people need to be contacted if possible. We need to know why they are not paying and what we can do to get them back. I suspect many of these people have moved, died, or have not been notified of the dues owed to the lodge. All 407 of these suspended members need to be contacted and reinstated if possible. That, in itself, would bring our numbers into positive numbers.

Membership numbers in Nebraska do not have to be on the decline. Area recruiting dinners are being organized and we will be needing people to help. These lodges can be saved, and the other Masonic organizations in these areas can be rejuvenated at the same time. Masonic unity, Masonic companionship, Masonic fun, and Masonic activity are the answer.

If Lodges are out there that could bring in members, and are not because they feel they cannot do the work, contact the Grand Lodge, York Rite College, or your local Grand Lodge Deputy Grand Custodian. People can be brought in, you can bring them to other lodges, or they can be taken to area Festivals. The work can get done. It might be the spark that your lodge needs. Take a chance on a new member. Sign a petition, and get your lodge back on track.

FINAL REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Smith then summarized and read parts of the following printed report:

The Jurisprudence Committee was called to order at 10:00 am on Thursday, February 3, 2011 by M∴W∴ Brother Dwight Smith with the following additional members present: Most Worshipful Brothers Steven F. Mattoon, Les Seiler, Dean Skokan and Reginald S. Kuhn. Also present were all the Grand Lodge Officers, as well as Past Grand Masters V. Kaye Ramsey, Scott J. Krieger, Sr., Don E. Rasmussen, Charles W. Amidon, Michael E. Jones, Philip Lorenzen, Ivan A. Vrtiska, and James F. Brown, Jr.

The following were elected to serve as officers of the Jurisprudence Committee for the ensuing year: M : W : B : D wight E. Smith, Chairman and M : W : B : Reg Kuhn, Secretary.

The Minutes and Report from 2010 were approved with amendments, with the amended report reading as follows:

The Jurisprudence Committee was called to order at 10:00 am on Thursday, February 4, 2010 by M∴W∴ Brother Dwight Smith with the following additional members present: Most Worshipful Brothers Les Seiler, Dean Skokan and Reginald S. Pursuant to Section 1-304 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, the Jurisprudence Committee is to review all Resolutions delivered to the Grand Secretary, including a request for Bylaw revisions and determine within 45 days of delivery whether the Resolutions are in proper form.

Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge provides that at least 15 days prior to the opening of the session of the Grand Lodge, the Committee on Jurisprudence shall meet and submit to the Grand Master an agenda and report. The entire Jurisprudence Committee met by telephone conference on December 8, 2009, and submitted to the Grand Master an agenda and report.

With regard to the Grand Master's Recommendations, the Committee found that Recommendations 1, 2 and 3 are in proper form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the Resolutions submitted by the membership, the Committee found that Resolution No. 1 is in proper form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the permissions and dispensations, the Committee found as follows:

- 1. The action on March 24, 2009 granting Springfield Lodge No. 112 in Springfield permission to hold a special meeting on April 10, 2009, for the purpose of conducting business to include the payment of bills, reading of minutes, and receiving, reading and balloting on petitions.
- 2. The action on November 5, 2009 ruling that a motion passed at the regular communication held June 3, 2009 at College View Lodge No. 320 in Lincoln denying a member further advancement in Masonry was in conflict with Sectio0n 2-1101 of the Grand Lodge By-Laws and ordering it expunged from the minutes of the meeting; and further ruling that the Master of the Lodge has the authority to determine the status of the member in question and ordering that, once determined, that such decision be communicated with the Grand Lodge Office.
- 3. The action of December 14, 2009, pursuant to Section 2-612 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, ordering that all Lodge Secretaries disregard any communications from the Nebraska Masonic Home, its foundation, or any employee thereof until further notice. This order applied to solicitations of Lodge Secretaries to identify any brothers who might make a donation to a capital campaign for The Home, and further ordering that no such communications shall be read in lodge.

The other decisions, permissions and dispensations were reviewed and found to be proper. The Committee further reviewed the permissions and dispensations granted by the Grand Master from the time of his report to the beginning of this Grand Lodge session. The Committee on Jurisprudence found all permissions and dispensations to be in proper form and within the laws of Masonry of Nebraska, except as noted above.

With regard to the Bylaw Amendments that were approved by the Grand Master, the Committee found that all such approvals were proper.

The next order of business was the election of a Chairman and Secretary of the Committee. Upon motion duly made and seconded, M : W : B Brother Dwight E. Smith was elected Chairman and M : W : B Brother Reginald S. Kuhn was elected Secretary.

The Committee then proceeded to pass a motion commending Russell G. Reno on his very successful year as Grand Master. The Committee on Jurisprudence stands willing, ready and able to aid and assist your Grand Master and all of the elected Grand Lodge Officers to advise and assist them in any way we can with reference to the laws of our Grand Lodge's grand jurisdiction and to aid all of our officers in the execution of the duties of their office.

Resumption of 2011 Report:

Pursuant to Section 1-304 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, the Jurisprudence Committee is to review all Resolutions delivered to the Grand Secretary, including a request for Bylaw revisions and determine within 45 days of delivery whether the Resolutions are in proper form.

Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge provides that at least 15 days prior to the opening of the session of the Grand Lodge, the Committee on Jurisprudence shall meet and submit to the Grand Master an agenda and report. The entire Jurisprudence Committee met by telephone conference on December 7, 2010, and submitted to the Grand Master an agenda and report.

With regard to the Grand Master's Recommendations, we found that Recommendations 1 and 2 are in proper form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the Resolutions submitted by the membership, we found that Resolution No. 1 is in proper form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the Constitutional Amendments, we found that Amendments 1 and 2 are in proper form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the permissions and dispensations, the Committee found as follows:

- a. On November 29, 2010, the Grand Master granted a dispensation to Liberty Lodge No. 300 in Lincoln to hold a Special Meeting on December 16, 2010 for the purpose of conducting business to include paying of bills, reading the minutes, and receiving and balloting on petitions, which was found to be improper and not approved, citing Section 2-503 of the Grand Lodge By-Laws.
- b. On January 11, 2011, the Grand Master granted a dispensation to permit Springfield Lodge No. 112 to ballot on a petition that had not laid over for 28 days, which was found to be improper and not approved citing Section 2-905 of the Grand Lodge By-Laws.

The committee reviewed the other permissions and dispensations and found them to be proper. The Committee further reviewed the other permissions and dispensations granted by the Grand Master from the time of his report to the beginning of this Grand Lodge

session. The Committee on Jurisprudence found all permissions and dispensations to be in proper form and within the laws of Masonry of Nebraska except as noted above.

With regard to the Bylaw Amendments that were approved by the Grand Master, the Committee found that all such approvals were proper.

On January 10, 2011, the Jurisprudence Committee received an inquiry in writing requesting advice as to whether Section 2-313 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws applies to Grand Lodge Officers, and the meaning of Article X, Section 2 (d) and Article XI of the Grand Lodge Constitution. The Committee met on January 13, 2011 and issued the following response to the Grand Master:

"In response to your inquiry of January 10, 2011, the Jurisprudence Committee met to consider the issues raised in your letter. After careful consideration, we are of the unanimous opinion that Section 2-313 of the Grand Lodge By-Laws does not directly apply to Grand Lodge Officers.

However, we have also considered constitutional provisions relating to Judicial Powers of the Grand Lodge and would offer the following observations which apply to the situation set forth in your inquiry.

Article IX, Section 4 of the Constitution provides that the Grand Lodge has original (trial) jurisdiction over disciplinary matters involving members of the Grand Lodge. If Masonic Charges were filed by a member of the Grand Lodge during the Annual Communication against the Deputy Grand Master, you, as Grand Master may appoint a trial commission, and direct that the commission conduct a trial within a reasonable time (30 days) unless extended by agreement of all the parties. Appeals, if any, would be directed to the Committee on Grievances which would similarly be directed to conduct the required hearing within a reasonable time and report to a Special Communication of the Grand Lodge. We believe that Article X, Section 2(d) gives the Grand Master, during the Grand Lodge Session, the authority to appoint the Commission and establish the timetables for operation. The cited sections, would, in our unanimous opinion, delay the Grand Master's installation for a limited period of time. Installation of the junior officers would take place as scheduled, after election. It is also our unanimous opinion that you will remain as Grand Master until this process is completed."

Discussion was had regarding the issues raised by the Grand Master's inquiry and the Jurisprudence Committee's response.

M∴W∴B∴ Scott J. Krieger, Sr., PGM and Grand Custodian, presented a letter to the Committee. The letter raised several arguments directed to the Jurisprudence Committee's response to the Grand Master's inquiry. It asserts that Article IX, Section 4 of the Constitution for the Grand Lodge refers to the powers and authority over subordinate lodges, and the Grand Master's authority to preside over or discipline is only provided for when the Grand Lodge is not in session. It also refers to Section 3-302 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws and asserts that filing of Masonic Charges applies to a subordinate lodge. The assertions were discussed and responded to by the Jurisprudence Committee.

As a result of the approval of **Recommendation No. 2**, the Grand Lodge Bylaws **Section 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS** will be amended and will read as follows:

Sec. 1-404 – ALLOCATION OF FUNDS – Commencing January 1, 2012, the per capita tax shall be divided as follows:

To the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children	\$ 1.00
To the George Washington Masonic National Memorial	1.00
To the Nebraska Masonic Home	2.50
To the Masonic Education Newsletter	.50
To the General Fund –	
commencing January 2011	20.00
commencing January 2012	22.00
commencing January 2013	23.00
commencing January 2014	24.00
commencing January 2015	25.00
commencing January 2016	26.00

The Initiation Fee shall be allocated to the General Fund.

As a result of the approval of **Recommendation No. 2**, the third paragraph of **Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS** of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended immediately as follows:

Sec. 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS –

3rd Paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00). In addition, each Lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Twenty-four Dollars (\$24.00) as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2011. The per capita tax shall increase at a rate of \$3.00 for the first year commencing on the first day of January, 2012, and one dollar per year for the next four years. The said per capita tax shall accrue as follows: 2011 - \$24.00, 2012 - \$27.00, 2013 - \$28.00, 2014 - \$29.00, 2015 - \$30.00, 2016 - 31.00. The Grand Lodge shall distribute the per capita tax as provided in Section 1-404 of this code. Before any subordinate lodge shall be consolidated with another lodge, the per capita tax for the year preceding the year of consolidation shall be determined and paid. In addition to the per capita tax as currently provided, commencing on January 1, 2006, each subordinate lodge shall pay to the Grand Lodge an assessment of \$1.00 per member to support the CHild Identification Program. Said assessment shall be due and payable in the same manner as the Grand Lodge per capita tax. The funds from this assessment shall be separate from the Grand Lodge per capita tax and shall be used for no other purpose than provided above.

As a result of the approval of both <u>Constitutional Amendment No. 1 and Constitutional Amendment No. 2</u>, the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska <u>ARTICLE II - MEMBERS and ARTICLE V - OFFICERS</u> will be amended and will read as follows:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERS

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior

Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, Grand Tyler, and, if appointed, Grand Musician, with such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or the proxy, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; provided however, no member shall hold more than two proxies for any and all subordinate lodges of which he is a member; and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

ARTICLE V. **OFFICERS**

The officers of the Grand Lodge shall be styled and take rank as follows:

The Most Worshipful Grand Master

The Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master The Right Worshipful Grand Senior Warden The Right Worshipful Grand Junior Warden

The Right Worshipful Grand Secretary

The Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain

The Worshipful Grand Orator

The Worshipful Grand Historian

The Worshipful Grand Custodian

The Worshipful Grand Marshal

The Worshipful Grand Senior Deacon

The Worshipful Grand Junior Deacon

The Worshipful Grand Senior Steward The Worshipful Grand Junior Steward

The Grand Tyler

The office of Grand Musician may also be appointed, if desired.

The Committee then proceeded to pass a motion commending M∴W∴B∴ John T. Parsons on his very successful year as Grand Master and commended him and his officers for their year of service to the Fraternity.

The Committee on Jurisprudence stands willing, ready and able to aid and assist your Grand Master and all of the elected Grand Lodge Officers to advise and assist them in any way we can with reference to the laws of our Grand Lodge's grand jurisdiction and to aid all of our officers in the execution of the duties of their office.

At this time I would like to thank the other members of the Committee. On behalf the committee, I thank Michelle and Carol in the Grand Lodge Office for all their help.

M∴W∴ Parsons announced that the Deputy Grand Master has previously arranged to hold the 155th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in Kearney, Nebraska, February 2-4, 2012.

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M∴W∴ Parsons asked Grand Senior Warden Bruce A. Baker to confirm that the 156th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nebraska would be held in Kearney, Nebraska, January 31, February 1 & 2, 2013.

Grand Junior Warden Rex J. Moats moved for approval to hold the 157th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge A:F: & A:M: of Nebraska in Lincoln, Nebraska, February 6-8, 2014. The motion was seconded and carried.

♦

M.: W.: Scott J. Krieger, Sr., Past Grand Master and Grand Custodian, approached the microphone to make a motion that the Grand Master-elect, the newly elected Deputy Grand Master and the newly elected Grand Senior Warden be appointed as representatives to the Conference of Grand Masters and afforded the rights and privileges as if they were all installed properly. It was called for a second. The motion was seconded. After no discussion, the motion was voted upon by a show of hands. The Grand Master viewed the show of hands to be too close to call and asked for another vote. The second vote by a show of hands was also too close to call. The Grand Master instructed only those with credentials to participate in the vote. Grand Master Parsons then asked Grand Custodian Krieger to restate the motion. A member of the audience then asked for the motion to be restated one more time. Grand Master Parsons opened the ballot a third time and asked all brethren with credentials to hold up the green ballots in their packets and the raised ballots were counted for each yes and no vote. The motion carried 81 to 80.

REPORT OF PENDING RESOLUTIONS

R : W : B : Grand Secretary Bruce A. Watkins announced that he received the following three resolutions, which according to the Bylaws, subject to clearance by the Jurisprudence Committee, will be read and laid over until the session next year.

Resolution No. 1

Resolution to amend the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A : F : & A : M : of Nebraska.

ARTICLE IX POWERS AND AUTHORITY

Section 4. Its judicial powers are of two kinds:

ORIGINAL – Including the decision of all controversy between any of the subordinate lodges, or between one of them and a member or members of another, or between members of different subordinate lodges and the enforcement of discipline upon its own members and upon the subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction and the members thereof; except that no charges may be laid against a brother during Grand Lodge Annual Communication, discipline being the unrelinquished right of the subordinate lodge of which the brother is a member; and

APPELLATE – Embracing all matters of controversy or discipline proper for Masonic investigation, which may have arisen in any of the subordinate lodges—and over which it has not retained original jurisdiction. (the lined through portion to be deleted.) This also affects Chapter X, Section 3-1002 – Investigating Committee – When a controversy shall arise between subordinate lodges or between a lodge and its Master, or charges be preferred, or an informal complaint be made, the same may be filed with the Grand Lodge if in session, or during recess be lodged with the Grand Master...etc, etc...continue original wording. (Proposal to delete lined through verbiage as it would no longer be applicable.)

Rationale: Grand Lodge session is to be harmonious in order to properly conduct the business promoting growth and productivity of the order. Acrimony among brethren attending Grand Lodge session is deleterious to the well being of the fraternity.

Resolution No. 2

Resolution to amend the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: & A :: M :: of Nebraska.

ARTICLE III ANNUAL COMMUNICATION

The Grand Lodge shall hold a regular communication annually, location of said communication will:

- (a) be designated by the newly elected Grand Senior Warden for his probable term as Grand Master, and
- (b) must be approved by the majority vote of the Grand Lodge

to be amended to include: and

(c) Roberts Rules of Order will be governing and final authority for the conduct of any and all business during annual communication of the Grand Lodge.

Rationale: It is time to come out of the dark ages and adopt a rational means of conducting business. Utilization of Roberts Rules will ensure that any knowledgeable Brother serving as delegate will indeed have an equal voice and equal opportunity to be heard during the conduct of business.

Resolution No. 3

Resolution to amend the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A :: F :: and A :: M :: of Nebraska.

Part Three Discipline

Chapter 1. Masonic Offenses –

Section 3-103 Enumerated Masonic Offenses shall consist of, but not be limited to: (a) all acts prohibited by the laws of the Land, and involving moral turpitude <u>except no charges</u> shall be filed against a brother undergoing litigation in civil or criminal courts until the Brother has had every opportunity to establish his innocence and during the pendency of the action, the Lodge should do nothing that would injure his case.

Rationale: A brother unfortunate enough to be involved as defendant in a civil or criminal court activity has enough problems with which he must deal without his brethren compounding or jeopardizing his defense.

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V∴W∴B∴ Grand Chaplain Dennis E. Rix led the delegation in a closing prayer.

Following the prayer, M : W : Grand Master John T. Parsons closed the 154th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in ample form.

Following the close of the Grand Lodge, the Lodge of Master Masons was closed by members of Papillion Lodge No. 39 and George W. Lininger Lodge No. 268.

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869. In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
