

Masonic History of the 149th Grand Master

John T. Maxell

John T. Maxell petitioned Shiloh Lodge No. 327 in Omaha, Nebraska, on December 1994. After being initiated as an Entered Apprentice on January 11, 1995, and passed to the Fellow Craft degree on February 8, 1995, he was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on February 23, 1995. Following a progression through the chairs, he was installed as Worshipful Master of Shiloh Lodge in 2001. He became a dual member in Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 on June 1, 2009, and John is a Charter Member of Albert Pike Lodge No. 333.

John served the craft on the Grand Lodge Membership committee from 2003 through 2005, and served as chairman from 2004 thru 2005. Was appointed to the Nebraska Freemasons CHIP Foundation as co-chairman in 2004 and still serves the committee to present day. John was appointed to the Masonic Relief Committee in 2007, serving as chairman from 2007 to 2012, and still serves on the committee.

John was appointed to Grand Lodge in 2005 by M : W : Ivan A. Vrtiska as Grand Tyler and has also served as Personal Representative, Grand Senior Steward, and Grand Marshal. John was appointed to the advancing line as Grand Junior Deacon in 2010 by M : W : Ivan A. John T. Parsons.

John joined the Scottish Rite Omaha Valley in 1995, became a member of KCCH in 2005, and was elected to Inspector General Honorary 33 degree in August 2011. John was Venerable Master for the Lodge of Perfection in 2007 and is member of the 4th, 8th and 14th degree, and presently serves as General Degree Director. He served as chairman of the Friends' dinner from 2008 thru 2014. He was elected to the Omaha Valley Scottish Rite Cathedral Board in 2014.

John joined Tangier Shrine in March 1995 and is member of the Arab Patrol, Racers, and the Legion of Honor where he served as Commander in 2003. He was appointed by Potentate Ralph Joos as Ambassador in 2007 and served through 2014.

Brother Maxell joined Papillion Chapter No. 114 Order of Eastern Star in 2010, the York Rite of McCook, NE in 2005, and the Nebraska Sojourners in 2010.

John is a member of Living Faith United Methodist Church. He served as usher, Sunday school teacher, membership chair from 2005 through 2013, and presently serves as Church Committee chair. John was appointed to the Omaha Home for Boys Board in 2009 and presently serves on the Development Committee as a trustee.

Grand Lodge Awards Breakfast Friday, February 5, 2016 8:00 a.m.

The 2015 awards were presented at the Awards Breakfast held Friday morning.

CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM (CHIP) AWARD

The CHild Identification Program (CHIP) Award recognizes outstanding contributions, monetary or otherwise, in the promotion and assistance with CHIP events. One award is given to a member of the Masonic Family, and the second goes to an individual, company or charitable group that has met the award guidelines. Nominations for the awards are submitted by individual lodges to the CHIP Foundation Board for selection.

The recipient of the award in the Masonic Family category was Waterloo Lodge No. 102 in Elkhorn.

The recipients of the award in the Non-Mason category were Brian Pendley & Tara Krepela of the Dentists at Village Point, nominated by Waterloo Lodge No. 102 in Elkhorn, and Lauri Rogers, MPCC Dental Assistant Instructor, nominated by Custer Lodge No. 148 in Broken Bow.

ROCK MAUL AWARD

The Large Lodge Rock Maul was presented to M∴W∴ Byron C. Jenkins by the Omaha Area Past Masters of 1966 to be used as a traveling trophy. It is sixteen pounds in weight

with a bronze head. The Rock Maul has been used for its original purpose in a stone quarry, and has been beautifully refurbished with a square and compass worked into the metal.

The Small Lodge Rock Maul was presented as a gift to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska by the family of Past Grand Master Harold Hultman. In recognition of the celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States, and in honor of Grand Master Hultman, W.B.: Herman O. Hansen, DGC, gold plated the head of a rock maul, engraved the handle with Masonic working tools, and gifted it to M.W. Hultman. This Rock Maul is now presented at each Grand Lodge Communication to a small lodge deemed to be the Outstanding Lodge that year.

The Rock Maul Awards are presented by the Grand Master to a large lodge and a small lodge whose works most agree with the programs of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. The lodges selected represent the best all-around lodges in the jurisdiction of Nebraska.

As guidelines to award the Rock Maul, the following are used: officer leadership, attendance, bulletin or newspaper, ritual, enthusiasm, fellowship, temple appearance and condition, secretary reports, and programs other than regular meetings and ritual meetings held throughout the year.

The recipient of the Large Lodge Rock Maul Award was Cotner Lodge No. 297 in Lincoln.

The recipient of the Small Lodge Rock Maul Award was Custer Lodge No. 148 in Broken Bow.

GOLD PAN AWARD

The Gold Pan was presented to the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in 1987 by the Grand Lodge of Alaska on the occasion of the Grand Lodge's sixth anniversary. During Byron Jenkin's term as Grand Master, Nebraska was the first Grand Jurisdiction to grant recognition to the newly-formed Grand Lodge F :: & A :: M :: of Alaska, and this traveling trophy was presented in honor and appreciation of this action.

The trophy, an authentic 12-inch Alaskan gold pan, is mounted on a 20-inch walnut plaque. Brass plates for the recipient lodges surround the gold pan.

The Gold Pan is awarded annually to the Nebraska Lodge showing the greatest improvement or making the most significant contribution to Nebraska Masonry.

The Gold Pan was awarded to Long Pine Lodge No. 136 in Long Pine.

NEBRASKA PILLAR AWARD

The Nebraska Pillar Award recognizes lodges that perform activities that lead to a successful year. Any lodge can earn this award. A plaque is awarded to lodges the first year they qualify and a plate is presented each subsequent year the award is earned. The one lodge earning the award for this year is a previous winner.

LODGE MEMBERSHIP AWARDS

Two membership awards are given for the highest percent of positive net growth – counting new members, reinstatements, suspensions and deaths. Each winning lodge received a traveling trophy to display in their lodge for one year.

The winner in the Large Lodge division was Springfield Lodge No. 112 in Springfield.

The winner in the Small Lodge division was Magnolia Lodge No. 220 in Emerson.

MASONIC VETERANS PARTNERSHIP (MVP) AWARDS

The Change for the Troops Program was started in 2010 by M∴W∴ John Parsons. In 2014, administration of the program was moved to the Nebraska Masonic Foundation and the name was changed to the Masonic Veterans Partnership. Awards are given in two categories for the program: Total Contributions and Total Per Capita Contributions. The top three lodges in each category receive a sculpture featuring the flag and bald eagle, and the top five lodges in each category receive certificates for their participation in and contribution to the program.

GRAND MASTER'S RECRUITMENT AWARD

REPORT OF THE MASONIC-EASTERN STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

Charles E. "Ched" House, President, Board of Directors

Grand Master Maxell asked Ron Giesselmann, Executive Director of the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children, and Most Worshipful Tom Hauder, board member, to bring greetings from the Children's Home and to present information on fund raising for the new Paden Cottage that will be built on campus in the next few years.

The printed report from the President of the Board is as follows:

1915 – 2015 One Hundred Years at our current Campus!

In 1898 the Grand Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star voted \$25.00 to start a home for children of Masons and Star members, and in 1900 a committee was appointed to collect and invest funds. In 1903 the first child was housed at the Masonic Home in Plattsmouth, but housing boys and girls of differing ages was hard to work with and the need for a permanent Home site to provide separate housing must be found. A search resulted in Fremont being chosen as the location. Ground was located and purchased by the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter, with help from Fremont Lodge and Star Chapter. The first Cottage was built in 1914 and the first child housed in 1915. Four more cottages were built and occupied in the first 15 years. The Home was established as a 501 (C), 3 Nonprofit Corporation. It was a huge task for the board members to get accomplished, but they got the job done well. Later they purchased a farm, adjacent to the north, so as to grow and utilize the milk, meat, and food provided by the animals. That, when added to the large vegetable garden that was planted and harvested each year, provided work and training for the 60 plus children on campus.

In 1965 times changed and the Home changed with it. Any children that could meet the homes admission requirements could be admitted. In 1972 Hartman cottage was closed for a 17 year period because of lack of girls for admission, and then a switch to more girls than boys caused Hartman to reopen after a complete renovation including heat, lighting, wiring, and air conditioning added, and Morris cottage was next for complete renovation and changed to be home to girls but done so as a change back to boys would be possible. Complete renovation was next at Veazie and then Truman.

During this period the farm operation ceased, and changed to the 4-H program managed by Ford Delp and establishing the Homes own 4-H club. It has been in operation ever since with lots of changes in the program to keep up with the times – the much better teaching tool than the old farm especially for the girls- and a wonderful program for everyone. We even have Band and Chorus to be proud of.

We have enjoyed another wonderful year of developing and encouraging our student residents as they grow toward adulthood. I speak for the interested proud and hard working members of the Board who performed their duties happily during this year of many challenges. We make an effort to operate within our budget, and put to best use the funds of which are provided by your timely and most welcome donations, gifts and bequests. The lives of the children of our wonderful Home have been greatly enhanced by your continued kindness, thoughtfulness and support, and they will thank you for the rest of their lives.

Our mission says it all: We provide quality care for children in an environment of love, security, and acceptance where they can grow and develop into well-adjusted individuals.

He expressed to the Brethren that the funds provided to the Children's Home are being put to excellent use, and reminded them how fortunate the Masons of Nebraska are to have such a fine home that is able to help so many children in their time of need.

The Masonic Home employees realize what a challenge it is in the competitive health care industry today to maintain our well-known statewide reputation of providing excellent, loving, and dignified care to all eligible Masons and their eligible female relatives.

Every employee remembers with such pride and satisfaction how rewarding the final results were after the State of Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services came into our facility unannounced on December 17 and 18 of 2014 to do a full facility inspection for The Home's licensure compliance for our Assisted Living and Nursing Care facility areas. I needed to regress and mention this again even though it was a year ago, because it is the solid proof to every employee that their hard work and dedicated service to The Home and its residents was recognized by the most critical eye in the industry. Receiving a deficiency free (perfect score) after a 1 ½ day survey had an incredible impact on our employees, management, and administrative staff. A deficiency free survey is extremely difficult to accomplish. We were told we were one of only two facilities in 2014 that received that rating in the State of Nebraska. I have total confidence that the administrative staff, management team, and each employee will continue to use this as a goal for future surveys.

It had such an impact with the State of Nebraska that Senator Kintner requested a proclamation be passed by the Legislature honoring our accomplishment for receiving a deficiency free survey. The proclamation was then presented to The Nebraska Masonic Home at a special program attended by residents, staff, and representatives from the Nebraska Health Care Association.

The Nebraska Masonic Home reached another very important level of recognition this year. On September 15, 2015, The Nebraska Masonic Home was officially approved as a CCRC (Continuing Care Retirement Community) by the State of Nebraska. This is the result of many hours of work by John McHenry, Chris Abbott, Mary Vrbka, and me.

We were also assisted during the final steps by Attorney Abbie Widger who submitted documents and worked directly with the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. This is an important accomplishment because even though we weren't recognized as a CCRC, we have always provided these levels and categories of services at The Home. It is also a huge monetary savings to The Home to have this CCRC classification with the Department of Health and Human Services.

The Masonic Home continues to be a premiere state-of-the-art Assisted Living/Long Term Care Facility/CCRC. The services The Home provides are all inclusive. There are 29 beautiful independent/assisted living apartments in the 1924 & 1952 Wings. It is with pride that four sizes of apartments are now available to all eligible residents. A 20-bed assisted living center on the 2nd Floor of the Spencer Wing provides a gracious environment for those transitioning through the facility. The nursing care facility located on the 3rd Floor of the Spencer Wing is licensed for 58 beds. Needless to say, the care provided to residents requiring 24-hour care in this area is excellent and delivered with dignity and respect. The Masonic Home's 14-bed private room Alzheimer's/Dementia Special Care Unit continues to be a much-needed area for the protection, safety and peaceful environment so necessary for those residents who will benefit from the Unit's services.

Fortunately, it has been an exceptionally busy year for interested residents and family members to come for tours and admission information for present or future needs for their loved ones.

As many of you know, this is a very personal and emotional time and process for all families and their loved ones. I must tell you . . . this has always been one of my most rewarding responsibilities after I became part of administration. The personal satisfaction after these meetings go well for all parties is remarkable. I must add how proud I always felt when I told families what a beautiful, caring, and dignified environment their loved one will enjoy if he or she comes to The Home to live. And with confidence, I knew every employee here would make my promises to these families and residents come true.

The average census through the year was 90 with a high of 96 in November. The census as of today is 23 men and 67 women for a total of 90 residents. There are 6 couples.

In 2015 we proudly admitted 27 new residents and said goodbye to 20 residents because of death.

A successful year at The Masonic Home greatly depends on the thoughtfulness of our many guests and visitors. Every June we are visited by Narcissus Kensington members of Omaha and treated to a delicious picnic dinner complete with a large selection of food and desserts. Also in July, Home Chapter No. 189 of Plattsmouth served our residents a traditional fried chicken picnic dinner which was delicious.

The Home's employees and residents are so pleased to receive the Grand Chapter of Nebraska Order of Eastern Star and their companions as our special guests at the Home Chapter Picnic. Many Grand Officers travel quite a distance to make the visit and take a guided tour following the picnic. The tour always results in compliments and praise after our guests see our beautiful facility.

The Masonic Home has had its very faithful and regular yearly visits from many Masonic Lodges, Eastern Star Chapters, Shrine Groups, Jobs Bethels, Rainbow Assemblies, and other individuals who have made The Masonic Home a place they favor greatly. Our residents appreciate every visitor immensely including the 4-H animals when the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children visits.

The Masonic Home is grateful that the Masonic family is so loyal to The Home and our residents. Many Masonic groups return to The Home yearly to hold monthly meetings and then stay to share a meal with our residents. A special plus was that most of these groups brought their ladies with them so our residents were treated to even more special visitors. We enjoy showing our facility to our visitors. Our employees appreciate the well deserved compliments our residents make as they visit with our guests. There is no better testimonial for our guests than to hear compliments from the residents that live here at The Home.

Through the years the tradition of the Boon Memorial Food Truck has changed, but the generosity and hard work of Richard Schlaman of Ashlar Lodge who chairs this fund raiser continues to be dedicated. Donations are mostly received from Masonic Lodges in the Central Nebraska area as well as an Eastern Star Chapter or Shrine Group. The lump sum of these funds raised is directly sent to The Home where the Dietary Manager then selects the groceries most needed for our residents' meals. The Boon Memorial Food Truck tradition is very much appreciated by the residents, employees, and Board of Trustees.

The Christmas season this year opened with a joyful band concert comprised of the youth from the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children. What an impressive performance it was. Congratulations to Band Director, Bob Olsen, for having the vision to bring another joy to these young peoples' lives. The youth enjoyed an evening meal with the residents following their performance. A special thank you to Ron Giesselmann and his staff for his continuous interest in The Masonic Home. Our residents and employees thoroughly enjoy their visits.

The Tangier Shrine Chanters performed their beautiful Christmas concert in the 2nd Floor Dining Room for a large attendance of residents on December 8. It is such a pleasure to serve these gentlemen a delicious evening meal prior to their excellent performance.

A special thank you to the Masters and Wardens Club of the Omaha Metro area for their holiday generosity to our residents. We truly appreciate the hard work and dedication by Dan Wellendorf, Chairman, of this annual holiday project. This monetary donation enables us to buy something special and needed for our regular-way residents. Thank you to the Masters and Wardens for helping make the Christmas season at The Nebraska Masonic Home a success.

On behalf of the residents, employees, and Board of Trustees a very special thank you is extended to Grand Master, John Maxell; the Grand Lodge officers; Grand Lodge office staff; Worthy Grand Matron, Brenda McGuire; Worthy Grand Patron Delbert Rogers; and the Eastern Star Grand Family. Thank you so much for your support during 2015. Both Grand families have shown their commitment to The Nebraska Masonic Home in so many ways through the years with annual visits, individual acts of kindness, or monetary donations. Each act of support is truly appreciated. The Masonic Home looks forward to an ongoing relationship of respect, friendship, and support with both grand Families.

GRAND ORATION

James A. Carlton, Grand Orator

Today is a special day for me. I have been given the opportunity to serve as the Grand Orator for the last three years, and now come to the end of that service. My first two Grand Orations were directed towards a grand theme, if you will. Today I want to speak to three separate topics that are important to me as a Nebraska Mason.

First, I want to share my thoughts about cornerstone ceremonies. The Grand Lodge conducted many cornerstone ceremonies this past year. As you can guess, each ceremony takes quite a bit of preparation by the Grand Lodge officers and, many times, a bit of driving to bring the team together. Some would say, why go to all this effort to put on a half hour presentation that possibly only a handful of people will observe.

We go to this effort because it is a part of our history and the duty of Masons. I can't think of many other occasions which provide such insight into an organization. For instance, a parade gives an organization a chance to march in uniform and hold up a sign, or possibly have a 20 second narrative read about them. But a cornerstone ceremony allows Masonry to be seen in public, with brethren wearing our regalia, including our mysterious aprons and top hat. We then accomplish a ceremony filled with ritual that displays in rather arcane fashion the symbology of using the tools of architecture to ensure the proper erection of a building. The ritual provides an insight into the beauty and gravity of the proceedings of Masonry, and I hope on occasion inspires an observer to become interested in becoming a member. The oration during the ceremony addresses the symbolism of the occasion, and also speaks to the history of the occasion – why the building was built, what it does for the community, and what led to the decision to build it. I know, from personally seeing the reaction, that we instill a sense of public pride in the community when we recognize their accomplishments. Then we enjoy the visibility that comes with having the cornerstone permanently placed on the building to mark our association with the event. All these benefits and no downside - I definitely believe in the value of cornerstone layings, and encourage you to look for opportunities in your communities to schedule them.

I would next like to share some thoughts about the Grand Lodge's College of Ritual proficiency classes. Two years ago I attended a presentation at Annual Communication that proposed an organized approach to achieving individual proficiency in the ritual. If no one signed up, the program would have been dead on arrival. Imagine the surprise when over 30 people from around the state signed up at the conclusion of the presentation. Two classes had to be formed to meet the demand – one in Lincoln, and one in Omaha. Each class met once a month and brethren proved up on the assignment from the past month. Each assignment was a manageable chunk, such as the questions and answers, or a second section lecture.

I signed up for the class because I had learned a large portion of the ritual, but was always "too busy" to find a custodian to work with me to finish learning the remainder. The agenda looked like the perfect answer to getting that done within one year. It turned out that a number of the students joined for that same reason. We lost a few brethren from the class during the year, but the rest formed an unusual bond, a sense of pride and satisfaction at achieving something really major in our Masonic lives. I really enjoyed the sessions towards the end of the year, and joined with all the brothers in graduating with distinction, which required us to give a new lecture during a live degree in lodge.

So during the course of one year, Nebraska realized 20 new proficient brethren. What an achievement! The Grand Lodge continued the class in 2015, and expanded it geographically to the west and north. I am proud to say we will award proficiency certificates to another 20 brethren at this Annual Communication. Brethren, I encourage all of you who want to become proficient to consider signing up for the course this year and getting started this month. I really think you will enjoy it, and I know your lodge will benefit greatly when you share your knowledge with them.

Last, I want to talk about our youth groups. I had what I refer to as a God moment in my life in 1994, but I didn't know it until years later. The Worshipful Master of my lodge said my duty as Senior Warden was to get involved with the Rainbow Assembly that met there. I went to a meeting, and then an advisory board meeting, and learned that the Assembly was struggling with membership and, unfortunately, had a very small board that was divided in purpose. With some attention from the lodge the Assembly grew, and even had a Grand Worthy Advisor named a couple years later.

I enjoyed my involvement with Rainbow, and began attending Grand Assembly. I was amazed at the marches, the poise of the girls, and the quality of the ritual. Annual communications are a thrilling experience that every Mason should take the time to observe. Later I was asked to join the Masonic Youth Foundation as a director. This got me involved with DeMolay and Job's Daughters across the state. I had the wonderful opportunity to be a part of the planning for the first youth conference, a session which was so successful we have continued it every three years for the past 15 years. The unity we have in Nebraska among the various Masonic bodies has made the conferences possible, and has put Nebraska on the map, with surrounding states sending youth and adults to our conference to enjoy the nationally known speakers, and the service projects. I think most adults in attendance get as energized as the youth do.

I also have had the opportunity for several years to serve on the Grand Lodge Youth Committee. In that role I participate in the selection process for the Grand Lodge scholarships. One of the required parts of each application is an essay on what that individual's youth group has meant to them. Again and again I read how shy, introverted young boys and girls have evolved into confident, outgoing leaders of their peers by learning the lessons of the ritual, speaking in public, conducting meetings, and performing service projects. I acknowledge that our youth groups will not solve the membership problems of our organizations, because of the numbers are too small. But I also know that we are providing life-molding experiences that create adults who will be responsible, contributing members of tomorrow's society. That alone makes our mission commendable.

The youth groups and the youth conference receive healthy financial support from individual Masons, and our various Masonic bodies, and I salute you for that. But even more important than that is the presence of we adults at a youth group meeting. By being there you might answer simple questions about what Masonry is all about, or help in

decision-making, or just listen to a personal problem. You might do nothing but watch, but you will be noticed, and you will be appreciated. I also know that if you haven't before, and now think you want to give up a few hours to attend a meeting, it may become a God moment in your life, and may forever redirect your Masonic journey. Very small risk, and very big reward...I hope you will give it a try.

First Day – Formal Opening Session Friday, February 5, 2016

Prior to the Public Opening, a tyled Lodge of Master Masons was opened by Brothers of Shiloh Lodge No. 327 in Omaha and Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 in Plattsmouth.

The Grand Lodge Officers assumed their stations. Deputy Grand Master Dennis E. Rix accepted the gavel from the Master of Shiloh Lodge No. 327. Deputy Grand Master Rix led grand honors. He then presented the gavel to Grand Master John T. Maxell.

M.W. Grand Master Maxell welcomed everyone and reminded them that they are in a tyled lodge, urging them to conduct themselves as Master Masons, and to please turn off cell phones and other electronic means of communication. Grand Master Maxell instructed the Deacons that if they hear a cell phone to confiscate it and bring it up front, to be returned to the owner after the meeting.

The Grand Master then requested that the Grand Secretary ascertain if there was a quorum present.

M : W : G Grand Secretary Reg Kuhn declared a quorum present for the transaction of business.

V∴W∴ Grand Chaplain Kevin R. Lindly invoked the blessing of Deity.

"Brethren, Let us Pray. Eternal spirit, giver of all life Whose essence is love, as we continue the journey of life, we ask for your blessed presence. Guide us into Your eternal plan. May we learn to love more graciously and more specifically. Bless our country, our Order, all of our officers and Masons everywhere. May our symbols of morality help us to turn away from the siren songs of our day. May we be steadfast in our Faith. We thank You for our families and bless every one of them. We thank You for Masonry and that we are part of Your work through the Craft. In Your name we pray, Amen."

The Grand Master then declared the 159th Annual Communication duly opened for the transaction of business and asked that the Grand Marshal proclaim the Annual Communication open in ample form.

M∴W∴ Maxell thanked the members of Shiloh Lodge No. 327 and Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6 for opening of lodge.

Grand Master Maxell announced, "As we have done in the past, we are going to reobligate ourselves as Master Masons. This will help to remind us of what our duties are now and for all time." He asked the Grand Senior Deacon to escort Deputy Grand Master Dennis Rix to the altar to be re-obligated in the Master Mason's Degree. Brethren were asked to fall in as they were able to in proper form, with their right hand resting on the shoulder of the brother in front of them and join him in the re-obligation, which was administered by Most Worshipful Grand Custodian Scott Krieger.

M : W : Krieger administered the obligation to R : W : Rix. The Grand Master thanked the Brethren for their participation.

Grand Master Maxell appointed M∴W∴ Dean Skokan as Parliamentarian for the 159th Annual Communication.

R∴W∴ Grand Secretary Reginald S. Kuhn brought the report of the Committee on Business and Rules, and then moved for its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

Reginald S. Kuhn, 134, 19

The business of an Annual Communication shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge A:F: & A∴M∴ of Nebraska, as amended. The order of business shall be as shown in the printed program for the Communication, or as may be revised by the Grand Master to expedite the business and procedure of the Grand Lodge. The committee further recommends:

- The Grand Master shall appoint a brother to serve as Parliamentarian of the Annual Communication. The Parliamentarian need not be a member of the Jurisprudence Committee. It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to advise and consult the Grand Master regarding procedures. Committee Reports shall be given by the Chairman or designated member from the
- East unless otherwise directed by the Grand Master.

February 2016

3. Amendments which have been brought to the floor for ballot: One of the signers of an amendment shall state the position of the signers prior to the ballot.

4. Officers speaking on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter may speak from the East. Members of the Grand Lodge may then speak from the main floor at a microphone near the altar or as directed by the officer presiding. Time permitting, other brothers may speak to the issue. Prior to speaking, each brother shall be recognized by the officer presiding and shall state his name and lodge before addressing the Grand Lodge.

5. No brother shall speak more than twice on any motion, resolution, committee report or other matter unless special permission is granted by the officer presiding. Members shall be recognized to speak in the order they rise unless the officer presiding shall otherwise direct. If more than one brother rises at approximately the same time, the officer presiding shall direct the order of speaking.

6. Time limits on speaking shall not be imposed unless the officer presiding shall announce time limits in order to expedite the business of the Annual Communication. Upon announcement, the officer presiding shall enforce the stated limits

7. When the Grand Lodge is passing upon the decision and formal recommendations of the Grand Master, the Grand Master shall first announce his position. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee will announce the position of the committee. Discussion will then be permitted with the Grand Master permitted to speak. Members of the Grand Lodge shall then be permitted to speak to the issue. Time permitting, other brothers may speak after which a vote will be taken.

8. When the voting method is not prescribed by the Constitution and Bylaws, it shall be by the usual sign of a Mason while voting. The Grand Master, or other officer presiding, may prescribe voting by secret ballot or other method at his discretion.

 Questions of procedure not provided for in the Constitution, Bylaws, or these rules, shall be determined by the Grand Master.

The Grand Secretary moved for adoption, and the motion was seconded and passed.

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M∴W∴ Maxell asked all Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska to retire with the Grand Marshal to form a procession to be received by the Grand Lodge.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

W∴B∴ Jack Lorenzen referred the brethren to the Report of the Finance Committee and the proposed budget for 2016 in the Annual Communication book, and announced that the Finance Committee met in 2015 to conduct its assigned duties as prescribed in Section 1-318 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska. The committee found all records to be in order, and he was pleased to report that it was not necessary to utilize any of the investment funds in order to meet the budget. He indicated that the books were independently audited by a certified public accountant. The Finance Committee found satisfactory documentation for expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and was able to conduct its work in a complete and timely manner.

VOTING ON GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATION NO. 1

Recommendation No. 1

Amend the third paragraph of Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS and amend Section 2-606 – FEES, MINIMUM RETURN – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such sections, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken:

2-601 - DUES AND ASSESSMENTS -

Third paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) Sixty Dollars (\$60.00).

Sec. 2-606 – **FEES, MINIMUM RETURN** – The minimum fees of the three degrees shall be *Eight-five* Forty Dollars divided as follows: \$65.00 \$20.00 for the degree of an Entered Apprentice Mason, \$10.00 for the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason and \$10.00 for the degree of Master Mason;...

M : W : B : John Maxell asked Deputy Grand Master Dennis Rix to assume the lectern and preside over the discussion of Grand Master's Recommendation. R : W : B :Rix gave the general instructions, announcing to the delegates that they would attempt to ballot upon the recommendations by a show of hands. If the results were inconclusive, a written ballot would be taken.

After explaining the recommendation and giving his rationale for presenting it, M : W : B : Maxell moved for the adoption of Recommendation No. 1. Fifth paragraph:

If the amount due the Grand Lodge is not received by April 10, the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall add as a penalty One Cent (\$.01) Ten Cents (\$.10) per day for each member on the rolls as shown in the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge, to all lodges that neglect to send in their returns complete to the Grand Lodge as provided by Section 2-310, and pay their dues and assessments to the Grand Lodge.

After explaining the recommendation and giving his rationale for presenting it, M : W : B : Maxell moved for the adoption of Recommendation No. 2. The motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 2 was seconded. No discussion was held on the matter. R : W : B : Rix called for the question and the recommendation was voted on by a show of hands. Recommendation No. 2 passed with a two-thirds majority vote.

Grand Master Maxell returned to the East.

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Most Worshipful Maxell asked Past Grand Master Gale Kenney to approach the East to bring greetings on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Washington.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEBRASKA WORK

Philip A. Lorenzen, Chairman

Most Worshipful Phil Lorenzen made the following comments regarding the report:

"The report of the Committee on Nebraska Work appears on page 44 of the Annual Communication book. Just to comment, Steve Green and Roger Deininger, the members of the committee, and I are just delighted with the performance of the ritual teams and the emphasis on that. That is so important to delivery in this Fraternity, so thank you for doing that. Just an update too, we are working on corrections to the cipher for the errors that are in the book.

The printed report is as follows:

It bears repeating that the yet unchanging charge of the Committee on Nebraska Work involves support of the Grand Master and current Grand Lodge Officers including direct assistance to the Grand Custodian in his efforts of oversight to see that the ritual is precise, well presented, and that it does not fall victim to unwarranted change just for the sake of change or with a goal of streamlining the work to make it easier to join and advance with little effort.

While we all know vividly that Freemasonry is not a substitute for one's obligations to religion, Freemasonry can be a strong partner of religion and each Mason's church affiliation. Every Mason at his initiation into the fraternity professes a belief in God and the fact that he, as a new initiate, places his trust in God. Yet too often some of us seem to drift away from that important professing of our belief in and trust of God. As we as a nation and other nations seem to focus on political correctness, we as Freemasons, I am not speaking on behalf of the Committee, but as a personal posture, believe that while we make it a key point to not to discuss religious differences or political differences in our lodges, we appear to have perhaps written the book on being tolerant of others and respectful of one another's opinions. Masonic membership and our obligations, it might logically follow, place Freemasons in a position to share that understanding with those around us by example and by our communications with those we refer to as the profane.

A quick glance at the changing moral posture of so many persons today and a seeming unwillingness to accept responsibility and searching to find the easiest path in

life—which is not necessarily the best path for society, may well be in fact a call to Freemasons to step-up more than ever to provide a positive influence on our neighbor, our community, our country and the World. The content and message of Masonic ritual is in fact timeless. We may have created electronic devices which work miracles, but the basis of each person's heart and soul; and his concern and love for his brother remains unchanged – we cannot improve on God's creation – but we are each aided by Masonry to follow the will of the Great Architect of the Universe in the manner in which we conduct our lives.

Visiting and witnessing ritual in many of Nebraska's subordinate lodges finds that the ritual in too great a number of lodges would seem to benefit from encouragement from the Grand Lodge as to stepping up to a new level of proficiency. THE GREAT NEWS IS THAT OF RENEWED INTEREST AND CHAMPIONING OF QUALITY RITIUAL. Current emphasis on the ritual through the two recent programs of (1) ritual competition and (2) the emphasis and encouragement of more Nebraska Masons becoming proficient by a formalized and well-managed study program. Congratulations to the Grand Lodge Officers for creating and continuing those programs and congratulations to all who are participating. Not only does success feel good, but enables one to continue to better understand the deep meaning of our ritual.

Quality of work is a matter of pride – if your lodge does not feel comfortable in the ritual, there are many brothers in other lodges who are willing to help, not in a condescending manner but quietly and graciously. The Grand Custodian and Deputy Grand Custodians are always ready to suggest names of others in your area to help in the ritual. Your Committee appreciates the efforts of the Grand Custodian and his Deputies, and of officers and members of subordinate lodges willing to take the time to learn the ritual, including lectures; and to deliver them with feeling and understanding, enabling the new candidate to better appreciate the beauty and profound content of the Masonic degrees.

Most Worshipful Mike Jones made the following comments regarding the report:

"Most Worshipful, Distinguished East, Grand Lodge Officers and Brethren all, the report for the Nebraska Masonic Foundation is found on page 47. It has been a stellar year for the Masonic Foundation with the introduction of our new and remodeled and now functional library and museum. We invite you to come and visit at your leisure. The Nebraska Masonic Heritage Committee has been very busy and they continue to have efforts to finalize all of our policies and procedures for the use of the artifacts and the contents of the library. You'll see in your packet, here comes the appeal, if you'll look in your packet, you're going to find a description of a way you can support the Nebraska Masonic Foundation Museum and Library project at different levels. All those that are directors of the Foundation, please stand. They'll be glad to help you if you've

lost this document; please find a way to support it. The minimum entry level is \$20. I think you can afford that and we encourage all of you to do so. We have some interesting artifacts in that museum. I'm not going to tell you what they are, but some go back thousands of years BC. So please come and visit, support it financially and we appreciate it."

The printed report is as follows:

This past year found the Nebraska Masonic Foundation concentrating efforts to advance the Nebraska Masonic Museum & Research Library. Early in the year meetings were held to outline and formalize a financial support system specifically for the museum and library. The final plan is illustrated by the levels of donations and subsequent privilege associated with each level. The levels created are shown at the end of this report.

We are now asking for positive responses to this fund raising effort. Some initial conversations have been conducted with potential major donors. It is important to note that all contributions are tax deductible.

On Saturday, September 5, 2015, the Nebraska Masonic Museum & Research Library was re-dedicated. We were very pleased with the attendance. Visitors toured the facility, examined the displays, including a unique exhibit featuring Prince Hall Masonry, and conversed with the docents, officers and other Masonic officials. In addition to the formal ribbon cutting, we hosted a reporter from the Lincoln Journal Star. Great press coverage also followed as the Omaha World Herald presented an extensive article regarding the George Lininger collection.

The Masonic Heritage Committee, composed of Chairman Chris Carter, Devin Charles, Micah Evans, Carl Diamond, Christopher Nigro, and Michala Bader have been diligently developing policies and procedures which will govern the access to and use of the resources of museum and library. It needs to be emphasized how much thought, research and detail the Heritage Committee put into crafting the final version. I invite all brothers to applaud their efforts and personally thank them when presented the opportunity.

A second component of the fund raising is for the general operation and advancement of the Foundation. This effort is still in development and is intended to evaluate opportunities that lead to positive outcomes for all components of our Masonic family. The challenge presented is "Can an approach be developed that reduces the competition for funds within our various Masonic organizations and yet offer benefits to all?" This will remain a topic for the upcoming year.

Overall, there was more activity in the Nebraska Masonic Foundation this past year. It appears we have successfully begun to achieve the goals of increased use and visibility of the museum and library and expanding the museum and library as set forth at the 2015 annual meeting.

Now that the museum and library project has been realized, we need to press harder in fund raising. Today, I invite each of you to participate with your gift to either the museum and library project or to the general fund. Have a conversation with any of the Foundation officers or board members.

On behalf of the Grand Master and Grand Lodge I would like again this year to thank all of the Brothers from the Lodges, the youth groups and especially the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star for their most generous contribution to the Masonic Veteran's Partnership (MVP).

As our second full year as the MVP, we made significant progress in purchasing another van in a total collection that ended with the MVP account totaling \$10,622, falling just short of what we require to assist in purchasing another vehicle for the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) in Nebraska. The program is 501(c)3 qualified, operating as part of the Nebraska Masonic Foundation and I highly encourage your donations in the upcoming year as there are two other programs we can support besides purchasing a vehicle that can help homeless Veterans and provide them an opportunity to get back on their feet.

Sec. 2-406 – MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES – A brother who was a member in good standing of a subordinate lodge at the time such lodge became extinct, and remains unaffiliated, shall, for one year after such lodge ceases to exist, shall remain in good standing and automatically become a member of the existing lodge geographically closest to the lodge that became extinct, and shall have the same rights and privileges as members of a regular lodge, including the rights of membership, affiliation, visiting, avouchment, relief, demission, appeal, trial, and burial. But should he fail to pay his dues as provided by Section 2-601, and affiliate within such year, and to pay dues as required by the lodge to which he has become a member by the provisions hereof, such brother is subject to suspension as otherwise provided in these bylaws. he shall be notified by letter sent to his last known address by the Grand Lodge Office at least thirty days before the next ensuing Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, to show cause to the Grievances Committee, if any he may have, why he has not paid his dues and affiliated with a recognized lodge of Masons.

When any such member shall refuse or neglect to answer a notice to appear and show cause why he should not be suspended for non-payment of dues and affiliating as above provided, his delinquency may be communicated to the Grand Lodge at any subsequent Annual Communication thereof, which facts, together with the Grand Lodge records showing his indebtedness, or his failure to affiliate, shall be deemed ample proof of the delinquency. If the brother be present, he shall be entitled to make such plea as he may deem proper, after which he shall retire, and upon such evidence and any other evidence which is submitted and received, a vote may be taken upon a motion to suspend the delinquent member indefinitely or to reinstate under such terms and conditions as the Grand Lodge may there direct.

Amend the seventh paragraph of Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS – by deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the deleted language stricken:

Seventh paragraph:

All settlements shall be made in accordance with the account of the Grand Lodge Office Committee, which shall base the same upon the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge. Unaffiliated brethren formerly belonging to lodges now extinct shall affiliate with a recognized lodge of Masons within one year of the date their lodge became extinct, and if no affiliation is received by the Grand Lodge, said brethren shall be considered suspended for non-payment of dues.

Amend Section 2-1302 – CERTIFICATE REQUIRED – by deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the deleted language stricken:

Sec. 2-1302 – CERTIFICATE REQUIRED – A subordinate lodge cannot consider a petition for affiliation unless accompanied by a Certificate of Good Standing, as hereinafter provided, or demit or its equivalent, provided that when the petitioner has lost his demit or Certificate of Good Standing which has been issued him from a lodge which has become extinct, he may make application to the Grand Secretary and upon proper showing receive from him a duplicate demit which certificate shall accompany the petition for affiliation. A petitioner who presents with his petition a Certificate of Good Standing from a subordinate lodge of this jurisdiction or one authorized by law of another Grand Jurisdiction shall not become a member of the lodge petitioned until he is elected and his demit or its equivalent has been obtained by said lodge.

After explaining the recommendation and giving his rationale for presenting it, M : W : B : M axell moved for the adoption of Recommendation No. 3. The motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 3 was seconded.

R : W : B : Rix gave the general instructions, announcing to the delegates that they would attempt to ballot upon the recommendations by a show of hands. If the results were inconclusive, a written ballot would be taken.

After discussion was held on the matter, R : W : B : Rix called for the question and the recommendation was voted on by a show of hands. Recommendation No. 3 passed with a two-thirds majority vote.

VOTING ON GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATION NO. 4

Recommendation No. 4

Amend Section 2-604 – DUES CARDS – HOW PREPARED – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken:

Sec. 2-604 – DUES CARDS – HOW PREPARED – There shall be two forms of receipt for dues adopted in this Grand Jurisdiction, including one for members with less than 50 years of good standing as a Master Mason, and one for members with 50 or more years of good standing as a Master Mason. The receipts for dues, adopted for use in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall contain all the information contained in the forms of receipt found in the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge for 2014, 2016, printed on cards of convenient size to fit in the ordinary card case. Said receipts shall be computer generated in the office of the Grand Lodge and furnished to each subordinate lodge without charge to the lodge.

If Recommendation No. 4 passes, the dues cards will be updated in the following manner, adding a different card design for those with 50 or more years of good standing as a Master Mason, and this text will be inserted into the Proceedings for 2016:

The text contained in the following forms of receipts for dues is adopted for the use of all subordinate lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction, and the use of any other form after January 1, 2016, is prohibited; all receipts for dues must be procured through the office of the Grand Secretary.

VOTING ON GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATION NO. 5

Recommendation No. 5

Amend the first, second, and third paragraphs of Section 1-202 – GRAND CUSTODIAN – by deleting certain language so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Sec. 1-202 - GRAND CUSTODIAN - The Grand Custodian shall attend all communications of the Grand Lodge, and under the direction and control of the Grand Master shall have the entire charge and supervision of the work, lectures, and ritual of this jurisdiction, and it is made his duty to enforce the thorough teaching and practice of said work, ritual and lectures, and immediately to report to the Grand Master any violation of this requirement and if it shall come to his knowledge that any subordinate lodge within the jurisdiction shall ignore, refuse, or fail to practice, in every respect, such uniform and established work as taught by him, it shall be his duty to instantly report the same to the Grand Master, who may arrest the charter of said subordinate lodge, and shall hold the same until such time as it shall comply with the requirements of the Grand Master aforesaid, or until the next communication of the Grand Lodge. The work of the Grand Custodian in conducting schools of instruction or otherwise shall not be interrupted by ealls upon him for Masonic funerals or other meetings or work, except under urgent circumstances which, in the opinion of the Grand Master, shall be sufficient to justify such interruption. He shall make a full and detailed report to the Grand Lodge of his official visits and acts and shall receive as compensation for his services such salary as set by the Grand Lodge, payable monthly, together with all necessary expenses in and about such work.

The Grand Master, may appoint not more than 40 Deputy Grand Custodians to assist the Grand Custodian in supervising the work, lectures, and ritual, and who shall serve at the will and pleasure of the Grand Master, receiving the sum of fifteen dollars per day while conducting Schools of Instruction, which shall be paid by warrants drawn in the regular manner. Any Deputy Grand Custodian or Apprentice who is absent from the annual Custodian school for three consecutive years will automatically lose his commission at the close of the third consecutive school, unless good cause can be shown to the Grand Master.

The Grand Master may, at his discretion, name as Deputy Grand Custodian Emeriti such number, not exceeding three in one year, of brethren as he may deem proper who have served as Deputy Grand Custodians, in this Grand Lodge.

After explaining the recommendation and giving his rationale for presenting it, M : W : B : Maxell moved for the adoption of Recommendation No. 5. The motion for the adoption of Recommendation No. 5 was seconded.

After discussion was held on the matter, R : W : B : Rix called for the question and the recommendation was voted on by a show of hands. Recommendation No. 5 passed with a two-thirds majority vote.

Grand Master returned to the East.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS – OPENING OF BALLOT

Grand Master Maxell directed the delegates to cast their ballots for the election of the offices of Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master-Elect, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, and Grand Secretary, stating the voting delegates must choose only one of the voting options. Delegates may either write in a name on the line provided on each ballot, or use the check box at the top of the ballot to advance the officers. If both methods were filled in, the ballot would be declared spoiled. He directed that the ballots be deposited in the locked ballot box in the back of the room and the ballot would remain open for approximately one hour. After that time, the ballot would be declared closed and the Tellers instructed to count the votes received for each office, to be reported later in the day.

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Most Worshipful Maxell asked the Grand Senior Deacon to escort Deputy Grand Master Lewis Smith of the Grand Lodge of Montana to the podium to bring greetings.

FINAL REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

John E. Lorenzen, Chairman

The 2015 Committee on Finance met during the past year to conduct its assigned duties as proscribed in Section 1–318 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska.

Following the close of each calendar year, the books and records of the Grand Lodge are audited by an independent certified public accountant.

Actual revenue and expenses, compared to budgeted, for 2014 are as follows:

After other activities affecting cash flow, such as cash on hand on January 1, prepaid Annual Communication and Annual Returns, prepaid expenses, and purchases of inventory assets, \$52472 in cash was on hand in the general fund on December 31, 2015, and an investment draw for operating expenses was not necessary. The results of the fiscal year show that the Grand Lodge Officers and staff have been good stewards of the funds of the Grand Lodge operating budget during 2015. An investment draw was not necessary in part due to most Grand Lodge Officers not claiming expense reimbursements for travel; incidental expenses for Annual Communication being held under budget; and the office staff keeping budget items for operating expenses, equipment, printing, supplies, computer and general expenses under budget.

The Committee on Finance found satisfactory documentation for expenditures within the books and records of the Grand Lodge Office and was able to conduct its work in a complete and timely manner.

VOTING ON RESOLUTION NO. 1

Grand Master Maxell asked Deputy Grand Master Rix to cover to preside over the voting on the Resolution.

The following resolution was presented at the 158^{th} Annual Communication in February 2015:

Resolution No. 1

This proposed amendment to the Constitution and By-laws of the Grand Lodge AF&AM of Nebraska, specifically, Chapter IV, Section 2-408, Chapter VI Section 2-601 and 2-602; is respectively offered for consideration by the Brethren and the Grand Lodge.

Paragraph 6 of Chapter IV, Section 2-408 currently reads as follows:

"Each of the lodges to which a plural member belongs, if located in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall pay to the Grand Lodge, such per capita tax, dues or contributions on such member as are now or shall hereafter be required by this Grand Lodge from its regular members."

So that when amended, it will read as follows, with the new language bold and italicized:

"Each of the lodges to which a plural member belongs, if located in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall pay to the Grand Lodge, such dues or contributions on such member as are now or shall hereafter be required by this Grand Lodge from its regular members. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, the per capita tax shall only be charged by a plural member's parent lodge for plural members of lodges located greater than 50 miles apart in this Grand Jurisdiction. In exceptional cases, for good cause shown, the Grand Master may waive the distance requirement of 50 miles provided above.

Paragraph 3 of Chapter IV, Section 2-408 currently reads as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the lodge, upon the selection of a brother for plural membership, to promptly report the fact to the lodge in which he maintains his parent membership. The Secretary of the lodge having plural members, shall keep a record of all such members, and shall make annual report to the Grand Secretary, listing the names of all such members, together with the name of the parent lodge and Grand Jurisdiction thereof. Such plural membership..."

So that when amended, it will read as follows, with the new language bold and italicized:

"It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the lodge, upon the selection of a brother for plural membership, to promptly report the fact to the lodge in which he maintains his parent membership. The Secretary of the lodge having plural members, shall keep a record of all such members, and shall make annual report to the Grand Secretary using forms provided by the Grand Lodge Office, listing the names of all such members, together with the name of the parent lodge and Grand Jurisdiction thereof, together with the names of any plural members exempted from payment of per capita as provided under this section. Such plural membership..."

If the resolution is approved for Chapter IV, Section 2-408, then Chapter VI Section 2-601 and 2-602 must also be amended to be consistent.

Paragraph 1 of Chapter VI, Section 2-601 currently reads as follows:

Chartered subordinate lodges shall have discretionary power to assess annual dues and special assessments upon its members who are Master Masons in good standing. Such dues and assessments shall be uniform on such members. The amount of the annual dues payable to each subordinate lodge by members must be designated in the bylaws in one of two ways: (1) lodge dues plus Grand Lodge per capita and assessments, or (2) a total amount that includes lodge dues and Grand Lodge per capita and assessments. Special assessments may be made in installments.....

So that when amended, it will read as follows, with the new language bold and italicized:

Chartered subordinate lodges shall have discretionary power to assess annual dues and special assessments upon its members who are Master Masons in good standing. Such dues and assessments shall be uniform on such members. The amount of the annual dues payable to each subordinate lodge by members must be designated in the bylaws in one of two ways: (1) lodge dues plus Grand Lodge per capita (unless such per capita is for a plural member excluded from assessment as provided in Section 2-408) and assessments, or (2) a total amount that includes lodge dues and Grand Lodge per capita, unless excluded for a plural member under Section 2-408 and assessments. Special assessments may be made in installments.....

Second sentence of Paragraph 3 of Chapter VI, Section 2-601 currently reads as follows:

In addition, each lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Twenty-four Dollars as a per capita tax commencing on the 1st day of January 2011.....

So that when amended, it will read as follows, with the new language bold and italicized:

In addition, each lodge shall pay annually for each member the sum of Twenty-four Dollars as a per capita tax unless excluded for plural members as provided in Section 2-408, commencing on the 1st day of January 2011. Plural members excluded from the per capita tax as provided in Section 2-408 shall be reported annually to the Grand Lodge by the Lodge Secretary using forms provided by the Grand Lodge Office.....

First sentence of Paragraph 1 of Chapter VI, Section 2-602 currently reads as follows:

Each subordinate lodge shall be liable for Grand Lodge dues upon all its members in good standing on the last day of the Masonic year, which would be December 31st.....

So that when amended, it will read as follows, with the new language bold and italicized:

Each subordinate lodge shall be liable for Grand Lodge dues, *except for any per capita excluded in Section 2-408 for a plural member*, upon all its members in good standing on the last day of the Masonic year, which would be December 31st.....

Rationale: Many lodges in the rural sections of Nebraska are struggling to remain viable with shrinking populations and membership. It is therefore common that masons become plural members to aid and assist their brethren in neighboring lodges. In many cases, neighboring lodges in the western 2/3rds of the state are more than 50 miles apart. The cost of travel between lodges by those brothers with plural membership can be significant; therefore, making them pay per capita tax for each lodge in which they are a member is an added financial burden and disincentive.

R : W : B : Rix asked one or more of the signers of Resolution No. 1 to state their position and rationale for the proposal. Worshipful Brother James Jones, a signer on Resolution No. 1, gave his rationale for proposing the Resolution, and moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 1. The motion was seconded.

After discussion, R : W : B : Rix called for the question and the ballot was voted on by a show of hands. The motion failed to receive the required two-thirds majority vote.

ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

M : W : B : John Maxell added the following supplemental comments to his Address before moving for its approval:

"Probably the biggest thing for me being Grand Master was learning to be a good servant and how thankful I am to have been the Grand Master. I talked about it at the beginning of the year what my motto was going to be and it was about Brotherly Love, and I saw that this year, brothers.

I had the opportunity to visit lodges and saw that love. I visited the lodge in Superior. I have to tell you, when I went down there, they had a golf outing and they invited me down there. I had been to Superior a few years ago and helped

them with a CHIP event and I always thought that was a strong lodge. When I got down there, they told me that they had been close to closing. But they had this tragedy that happened in their lodge. They lost their roof and the insurance money wasn't enough to cover that roof. So they decided, 'Let's get together. We'll buy the material, and we'll fix the roof.' What happened is every brother showed up, and they had enough money to paint the inside of their lodge and do other repairs. They had such a great time doing it that they decided to do other things. So they had bed races up and down the street to raise money; they had the whole community out there and they pushed beds up and down the street. They had limited it just to adults and the kids complained so much that they let the kids do it. They had such a great fundraiser that they decided to do a golf outing. So I went out and attended the golf outing thinking I hadn't played golf in a long time. They said, 'No, Grand Master, we just want you to help setup and take care of it.' I said, 'I can do that!' And then I saw another amazing thing. They had done such great work in that town that when they went to pay their bill, the guy who owned the golf course turned around and gave the money back to them. Thank you, brothers, because that's what we're talking about. We're talking about brotherly love, getting together, doing things and helping our community and helping each other.

I had the opportunity to go to Wood River and do an area meeting and I got one of the most touching gifts when I was out there. A member walked up to me and he gave me a one pound jar of honey and it had their name on it. That was the greatest gift I got all along. I got honey, you know, talk about love, the taste of honey, that was great! You probably saw the picture, I put it out on the blog. But I had those things happen to me all year long. I saw brotherly love that I didn't know existed. I tell you, we need to keep doing that and we need to get our brothers back into lodge and let them recognize that brotherly love. I asked, 'Bring a Brother Back' in September. I hope you guys do that on your own because if you get the guys back there, they see what we're doing, they see that friendship. Almost everybody puts on their ballot of why they joined is fellowship. We need to get them back in there. You can't have fellowship at home watching TV. You gotta get them into the lodge.

One of the things that I wanted to happen at the end of the year is to have an Annual Communication that was fun and enjoyable, that your wives would have fun coming here and that even though you weren't a voting delegate that you would show up and have a good time. I think we did that, haven't we brothers? Have we had a good time so far? (applause)

A couple of other things that I wanted to see happen this year, we put a budget together. Every Grand Master does this. I am proud to say that we were under budget. I'm also proud to tell you that we didn't touch the endowment this year, and that's only the second time that's ever happened in Grand Lodge. (applause) And that isn't because of me, that's because of your Grand Lodge officers. They eat a lot of their expense, guys. Everybody thinks it's a free ride when you get on this. I'll tell you, it is not and you need to pat the guys coming up the line that they continue to do that and be responsible. I thank my officers for being responsible. (applause)

When you're Grand Master, once in a while you get lucky and something falls in your lap that makes your year really special. That happened to me this year. We celebrated the 25th Anniversary of Recognition between us and Prince Hall.

We were the first, although Connecticut likes to argue that they were, but we have full recognition and I remind them every time I run into a brother from Connecticut. That is very special and I hope that relationship keeps going for another 25 years, and I believe it will.

We started off the year with a little controversy introducing the new petition, but I thought was important. We got the feedback that you couldn't print it off and it was too cumbersome, but I think in years to come, brothers, you will realize that's going to be a great tool, that you'll be able to fit a mentor with them and you'll know that the brother coming in is a friend more than a brother first, and that's important. Because if he's your friend, he'll be a great brother.

Again, I want to thank you for allowing me to serve you, and God Bless."

I was particularly honored to be invited to join and participate with the Nebraska Youth Groups, the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, Jobs Daughters International, and DeMolay International. I am particularly optimistic about the future of leadership in our country, state and the Masonic bodies seeing the quality of leadership in these organizations. We are blessed to have so many gifted young people in youth groups. It has been a particular honor to welcome Miss International Job Daughter Sarah Leeper from Nebraska, who set a high standard of leadership and has displayed her strong faith in her walk with the Lord. She has been a great example of how we should all live our life.

Two years ago, the Freemasons of Nebraska overwhelmingly voted to support the youth groups financially. The money voted through our dues will now be distributed to the youth groups through the Nebraska Masonic Youth Foundation. The Foundation will not limit nor reject any unreasonable request which will strengthen the youth groups. It is our firm conviction that by helping the youth groups, we will ultimately help ourselves through young adults who are engaged in their communities, who are prepared to be leaders, and who will speak positively of Masons and our warm support for their mission.

MASONIC ALL-STAR MARCHING BAND

In 1995, Grand Master Jerry L Rittenburg had a vision of providing Nebraska high school students involved in band an opportunity to travel to Lincoln and attend a five-day band camp. There, they would get to march in a Shrine parade and play at half-time at the Shrine Bowl football game. This was 21 years ago, and as I watched practices, the parade, and the performance of the 2015 Masonic Band, I like to think how proud Most Worshipful Rittenburg and his family would be at how the band camp has grown. This year, Nebraska's Masons, Eastern Star Chapters, appendant bodies and individual donors provided 247 campers from 83 different schools with rooms, meals and entertainment, while instructing them in the art of marching and mastering the musical pieces. The band camp is supported by Blue Lodges and Star Chapters from across Nebraska with 64 chaperones, band directors and band assistants this year.

The Grand Lodge Masonic Band Committee works hard each year to improve the camp for the kids and the community, and the move to Kearney has brought great

opportunities for the camp. The young adults participated in a free concert and ice cream social in the park on Friday evening. The citizens of Kearney got to see first-hand the hard work the participants put into their practice as well as the good work Masons do for all communities in Nebraska through our sponsorship of kids.

CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM (CHIP)

The Nebraska Masonic CHIP Program continues to be a cornerstone program for Nebraska Masons. It allows the Masons to promote child safety in our communities. We provide a safety net for children and peace of mind for their guardians with a record of a child's vital statistics. I thank the hundreds of Masons and volunteers who have donated countless hours to set up, promote, and work CHIP events across the state.

We had 22 CHIP events in 2015, served 1,922 kids, with the support of 525 volunteers. We had three CHIP events that were three highly visible and kept Masons in front of community: the Nebraska State Fair, Westroad Safety Expo (Omaha) and Methodist Children Hospital Safety Day. Again, thank you for all those of you in involved CHIP program in 2015.

THE NEBRASKA MASONIC HOME AND THE MASONIC EASTERN-STAR HOME FOR CHILDREN

The Nebraska Masons are very blessed to have two wonderful Masonic homes in the state, one for the care of children, our future, and one for the care of the elderly, our legacy.

Mary Stapp, Executive Director of The Nebraska Masonic Home in Plattsmouth, retired on December 31, 2015 after 18 years in that position and a 42-year career at The Home. Mary's stellar leadership has helped guide The Home to its current position as one of the leading elderly care facilities in the state. Her caring and ever positive presence will be missed; however, The Home will be in good hands with Mary Vrbka as the new Executive Director.

The Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children in Fremont celebrated its 100-year Centennial Celebration on August 8, 2015. The celebration highlighted current and past residents and an announcement was made to kick off a fund raising campaign for the building of a new cottage on the campus. We are fortunate to have an excellent and forward thinking leader in Ron Giesselmann, Executive Director of the Children's Home.

GRAND LODGE COMMITTEES

The dedication of the Nebraska Masonic committee members is the heartbeat of Masonry, helping our fraternity stay on course for future growth and success. This year, the Grand Lodge Officers' challenge was to raise the bar on its work and goals. The committees were required to set the 2015 goals in writing, and committees were required to meet twice at a Grand Lodge All Committee meeting.

I thank the Committees for their communication and for keeping the Grand Master informed of the process and the work they were doing to reach their goals. Communication is – and always will be – the most important asset between the committees, Grand Lodge, and the Grand Lodge office staff.

committees, Grand Lodge, and the Grand Lodge office staff.

The Grand Lodge Leadership hosted the 2nd Annual Leadership Conference, with keynote speaker Matt Nelson, Grand Standard Bearer from the Grand Lodge of Utah.

The Awards Committee worked on developing a new award and separating the Rock Maul and Gold Pan Awards, which have some overlapping criteria.

The Education Committee had the goal to pre-write all 2016 articles for the Nebraska Mason magazine, and To Light, revise the education website, and investigate means to deliver educational materials to Lodges on-demand, quickly and economically.

The Masonic Relief Committee completed all goals set by the Grand Master.

The Membership Committee is working to develop a Masonic Club for university-age men, and to form a Masonic Club in Lincoln.

The Masonic Veterans Partnership Committee continued to promote and advertise the fundraiser for the van for Veterans Home.

The Grand Lodge added a new committee partnering with the Boy Scouts, to build a long-term relationship with the Scouts and help local Blue Lodges sponsor a Boy Scout pack or Troop.

The Endowment Committee was also formed in 2015 with the purpose of overseeing the Grand Lodge building and keeping it in sound shape, making improvements as needed. The Endowment Committee raised \$30,000 from pledges and brick sales, which allowed the committee to do landscaping, have a wall built in the back lot, fix lighting, and repair the roof.

GRAND MASTER'S PROGRAMS

Name Tags

I asked all of the Lodges to purchase name tags for the members. The purpose was to help a newly raised Mason know the members and not feel like an outsider. Being able to address members by name relieves the anxiety of new Masons when approaching a member in conversation. He will become engaged in the Lodge and be less likely to be just another statistic on the suspension list at the end of the year.

One Goal - One Lodge

Each Lodge was asked to set one new goal and outline the steps they would take to reach those goals. The worksheet sent to the Lodges was to be filled out and returned to Grand Lodge, with the idea that the entire Lodge would adopt a project and united the membership in working together.

Lodge Grant Program

A Lodge must participate in **new** community-based fundraising activities which raise \$750.00 of **new** charitable funds. These charitable funds must then be donated to support either one of our Masonic Youth programs, CHIP, Youth Groups, the Band Camp, or a youth program in their community. It is imperative that these be **new** funds from a **new** fundraising activity for a **new** project. If the Lodge completes the fundraiser, they could apply for Grand Lodge funds which could be applied to projects such as maintenance or repairs on their Lodge buildings.

Bring a Brother to Lodge

Bring a Brother to Lodge is a program to be used at the September business meeting where Lodge officers and regular attendees would invite a Brother who had not attended in a while and reintroduce him to his Lodge and to Masonry. The Lodges were asked to make the Lodge meeting particularly special through a nice dinner, program, and a short meeting.

Rush Night

Rush Night is a program where the Grand Lodge officers visited several Blue Lodges and hosted a Membership night and dinner for prospective Masons. After the dinner, attendees were invited to the Lodge room where an Indiana membership video was shown, and participated in a Q&A session to inform potential candidates about the Masonic fraternity.

Grand Master's Trip

The first Grand Master trip to Key West, Florida was a planned trip where Masons and their ladies could enjoy 5 days of fun in fellowship, sun and fun.

MUSEUM AND LIBRARY GRAND OPENING

The grand opening of the Nebraska Masonic Museum & Research Library was held on Saturday, September 5, 2015, welcoming more than 100 Masons from around Nebraska, their guests, and the public. The grand opening and dedication included an exhibit to celebrate the 25th anniversary of "full and unconditional recognition" between the Prince Hall Grand Lodge and the A.F.& A.M. Grand Lodge. In attendance was M.W. Tommy Blan, Jr., Grand Master of Masons for the Prince Hall Grand Lodge; John T. Maxell, Grand Master of Masons in Nebraska; current and former line officers from both Grand Lodges; members of Prince Hall Eastern Star; the Nebraska Foundation Committee; and visiting brethren. One brother, Devin Charles, came from as far as Gering, Nebraska to videotape the event. Challenge coins, minted to celebrate the event, are available for \$20 as a fundraiser to support the conservation, restoration, and archiving of over 2,000 books and Masonic-related artifacts.

GRAND MASTER'S RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation No. 1

This recommendation would increase the amount of the initiation fee paid to the Grand Lodge for each candidate.

Amend the first sentence of the third paragraph of Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS and amend Section 2-606 – FEES, MINIMUM RETURN – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such sections, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken.

2-601 - DUES AND ASSESSMENTS -

Third paragraph:

Each Lodge shall pay annually to the Grand Lodge on or before the 10th day of April for each initiation during the preceding calendar year an initiation fee in the sum of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) Sixty Dollars (\$60.00).

Sec. 2-606 – FEES, MINIMUM RETURN – The minimum fees of the three degrees shall be *Eight-five* Forty Dollars divided as follows: \$65.00 \$20.00 for the degree of an Entered Apprentice Mason, \$10.00 for the degree of a Fellow Craft Mason and \$10.00 for the degree of Master Mason;...

Recommendation No. 2

This recommendation would increase the penalty paid by the lodges for late annual return payments.

Amend the first sentence of the fifth paragraph of Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Third paragraph:

If the amount due the Grand Lodge is not received by April 10, the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall add as a penalty One Cent (\$.01) Ten Cents (\$.10) per day for each member on the rolls as shown in the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge, to all lodges that neglect to send in their returns complete to the Grand Lodge as provided by Section 2-310, and pay their dues and assessments to the Grand Lodge.

Recommendation No. 3

This recommendation would change the affiliation of members of an extinct lodge.

Amend Section 2-406 – MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken:

Sec. 2-406 – MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES – A brother who was a member in good standing of a subordinate lodge at the time such lodge became extinct, and remains unaffiliated, shall, for one year after such lodge ceases to exist, shall remain in good standing and automatically become a member of the existing lodge geographically closest to the lodge that became extinct, and shall have the same rights and privileges as members of a regular lodge, including the rights of membership, affiliation, visiting, avouchment, relief, demission, appeal, trial, and burial. But should he fail to pay his dues as provided by Section 2-601, and affiliate within such year, and to pay dues as required by the lodge to which he has become a member by the provisions hereof, such brother is subject to suspension as otherwise provided in these bylaws. he shall be notified by letter sent to his last known address by the Grand Lodge Office at least thirty days before the next ensuing Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, to show cause to the Grievances Committee, if any he may have, why he has not paid his dues and affiliated with a recognized lodge of Masons.

When any such member shall refuse or neglect to answer a notice to appear and show cause why he should not be suspended for non payment of dues and affiliating as above provided, his delinquency may be communicated to the Grand Lodge at any subsequent Annual Communication thereof, which facts, together with the Grand Lodge records showing his indebtedness, or his failure to affiliate, shall be deemed ample proof of the delinquency. If the brother be present, he shall be entitled to make such plea as he may deem proper, after which he shall retire, and upon such evidence and any other evidence which is submitted and received, a vote may be taken upon a motion to suspend the delinquent member indefinitely or to reinstate under such terms and conditions as the Grand Lodge may there direct.

Amend the seventh paragraph of Section 2-601 – DUES AND ASSESSMENTS – by deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the deleted language stricken:

Seventh paragraph:

All settlements shall be made in accordance with the account of the Grand Lodge Office Committee, which shall base the same upon the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge. Unaffiliated brethren formerly belonging to lodges now extinct shall affiliate with a recognized lodge of Masons within one year of the date their lodge became extinct, and if no affiliation is received by the Grand Lodge, said brethren shall be considered suspended for non payment of dues.

Amend Section 2-1302 – CERTIFICATE REQUIRED – by deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the deleted language stricken:

Sec. 2-1302 – CERTIFICATE REQUIRED – A subordinate lodge cannot consider a petition for affiliation unless accompanied by a Certificate of Good Standing, as hereinafter provided, or demit or its equivalent, provided that when the petitioner has lost his demit or Certificate of Good Standing which has been issued him from a lodge which has become extinct, he may make application to the Grand Secretary and upon proper showing receive from him a duplicate demit which certificate shall accompany the petition for affiliation. A petitioner who presents with his petition a Certificate of Good

Standing from a subordinate lodge of this jurisdiction or one authorized by law of another Grand Jurisdiction shall not become a member of the lodge petitioned until he is elected and his demit or its equivalent has been obtained by said lodge.

Recommendation No. 4

This recommendation would allow an update to the membership dues cards.

Amend Section 2-604 – DUES CARDS – HOW PREPARED – by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken:

Sec. 2-604 – DUES CARDS - HOW PREPARED – There shall be two forms of receipt for dues adopted in this Grand Jurisdiction, including one for members with less than 50 years of good standing as a Master Mason, and one for members with 50 or more years of good standing as a Master Mason. The receipts for dues, adopted for use in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall contain all the information contained in the forms of receipt found in the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge for 2014, 2016, printed on cards of convenient size to fit in the ordinary card case. Said receipts shall be computer generated in the office of the Grand Lodge and furnished to each subordinate lodge without charge to the lodge.

If Recommendation No. 4 passes, the dues cards will be updated in the following manner, adding a different card design for those with 50 or more years of good standing as a Master Mason, and this text will be inserted into the Proceedings for 2016:

The text contained in the following forms of receipts for dues is adopted for the use of all subordinate lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction, and the use of any other form after January 1, 2016, is prohibited; all receipts for dues must be procured through the office of the Grand Secretary.

Recommendation No. 5

This recommendation would remove the limit on the number of Deputy Grand Custodians that could be appointed.

Amend the first, second, and third paragraphs of Section 1-202 – GRAND CUSTODIAN – by deleting certain language so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language shown in bold and italicized and the deleted language stricken.

Sec. 1-202 - GRAND CUSTODIAN - The Grand Custodian shall attend all communications of the Grand Lodge, and under the direction and control of the Grand Master shall have the entire charge and supervision of the work, lectures, and ritual of this jurisdiction, and it is made his duty to enforce the thorough teaching and practice of said work, ritual and lectures, and immediately to report to the Grand Master any violation of this requirement and if it shall come to his knowledge that any subordinate lodge within the jurisdiction shall ignore, refuse, or fail to practice, in every respect, such uniform and established work as taught by him, it shall be his duty to instantly report the same to the Grand Master, who may arrest the charter of said subordinate lodge, and shall hold the same until such time as it shall comply with the requirements of the Grand Master aforesaid, or until the next communication of the Grand Lodge. The work of the Grand Custodian in conducting schools of instruction or otherwise shall not be interrupted by calls upon him for Masonic funerals or other meetings or work, except under urgent circumstances which, in the opinion of the Grand Master, shall be sufficient to justify such interruption. He shall make a full and detailed report to the Grand Lodge of his official visits and acts and shall receive as compensation for his services such salary as set by the Grand Lodge, payable monthly, together with all necessary expenses in and about such work.

The Grand Master, may appoint not more than 40 Deputy Grand Custodians to assist the Grand Custodian in supervising the work, lectures, and ritual, and who shall serve at the will and pleasure of the Grand Master, receiving the sum of fifteen dollars per day while conducting Schools of Instruction, which shall be paid by warrants drawn in the regular manner. Any Deputy Grand Custodian or Apprentice who is absent from the annual Custodian school for three consecutive years will automatically lose his commission at the close of the third consecutive school, unless good cause can be shown to the Grand Master.

The Grand Master may, at his discretion, name as Deputy Grand Custodian Emeriti such number, not exceeding three in one year, of brethren as he may deem proper who have served as Deputy Grand Custodians, in this Grand Lodge.

LODGE CONSOLIDATIONS AND EXTINCTION

As the population shrinks in some of the small communities, we continue to see more and more consolidations.

I approved the following consolidations:

Mitchell Lodge No. 263, Mitchell, merged with Scotts Bluff Lodge No. 201, Gering, effective March 3, 2015.

Friendship Lodge No. 239, Chapman, merged with Lone Tree Lodge No. 36, Central City, effective November 11, 2015.

On December 9, 2014, after consultation and personal discussions with the brethren of Monument Lodge No. 293 in Arapahoe, Nebraska, their lodge went dark. It was their decision to voluntarily fail to meet the provisions of Section 2-514; and after careful consideration, the Grand Master determined that the charter should be forfeited, and said charter was surrendered to the Grand Lodge as a result thereof.

With the approval of this Grand Master's address and in accordance with Section 2-406 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, the members that remain unaffiliated at this time will be automatically suspended for nonpayment of dues.

APPROVAL OF ONE-DAY CONFERRALS

As provided by Section 2-1202, I approved the requests of the following lodges to confer the Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft and Master Mason Degrees on more than one candidate at a time on the indicated date. Same lodges were allowed to accept and agree to requests for courtesy degrees for the approved multiple candidate conferrals from other lodges in their area.

These approvals were granted subject to the following conditions:

During the conferral of each degree, each candidate will:

- a. Be received in each degree in the prescribed manner;
- b. Be caused to attend prayer and be asked the proper question in the Entered Apprentice Degree;
- c. Receive the obligation in each degree while positioned behind the Altar; and
- d. Receive instruction on the Working Tools, all lectures and the charge of each degree.

In addition, the following conditions will apply:

- a. The number of candidates for any one-day conferral will be limited to not more than fifteen (15);
- b. The number of candidates who may attend the one-day conferral from any one lodge is limited to three (3);
- c. A public records criminal history check will be obtained on each candidate by the Grand Lodge Office, a copy of which will be provided to the investigating committee at the home lodge of the candidate. The fee for such public records criminal history check shall be paid by the candidate. The fee for the public records criminal history check shall be determined annually by the Grand Master and set out on the List of Candidates described in paragraph (d) below;
- d. A minimum of thirty (30) days prior to the commencement of the degrees, the enclosed List of Candidates form must be submitted to the Grand Lodge Office, along with the fee stated thereon to cover the public records criminal history check for all listed candidates;
- e. The top line signer of each candidate's petition or the candidate's assigned mentor must be present at all degree work. Each candidate must have a different top line signer or assigned mentor present at the degrees.
- f. Prior to the degree work being started, a count will be made to ensure that each candidate has a unique mentor. If the candidate does not have a unique mentor, then they cannot proceed with the degree work. It is the responsibility of the Host Lodge to ensure this requirement for mentors is followed.
- g. Each candidate will be instructed using the Standard Proficiency Manual for each degree, and will be required to pass a proficiency examination before proceeding to the next degree;
- h. Conferral of each degree will be witnessed by a member of the Committee on Work, a Deputy Grand Custodian or a Grand Lodge Officer;
- i. Each candidate will be instructed that he must sign the Bylaws of his Lodge within thirty days of his conferral;
- j. Each candidate will be instructed that he must return to his home lodge and prove to the Master that he has completed all of the questions in the Standard Proficiency Manuals within the time period allowed in Section 2-402 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, and receive his diploma;
- k. Each candidate will be instructed that he must wait thirty (30) days to apply for membership in any Nebraska Masonic appendant body, and that the requirements of paragraphs (h) and (i) above must be completed prior to any application being made.
- The attached checklist for the roles of the conferral will be completed prior to commencement of the degrees. Said list will be returned to the Grand Lodge Office at least one week prior to the conferral; and
- m. The secretary of the host lodge will forward to the Grand Lodge Office immediately following the conferral the completed copy of the List of Candidates form with signatures of those who completed the work. Said form shall be certified by the supervising Member of the Committee on Work, Deputy Grand Custodian or Grand Lodge Officer as to the attendance of the first line petition signer for each candidate and completion of the work. The secretary of the host lodge will also notify the secretaries of lodges for whom courtesy work was given of the names of those candidates who completed the work.

REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA FREEMASONS CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM FOUNDATION

M : W : B : Maxell asked Stephen Kennedy, President of the Nebraska Freemasons CHIP Foundation, to come forward to present the report.

Worshipful Brother Kennedy referenced the printed report and mentioned that the Masons have been supporting CHIP for eleven years. He added that nearly 41,000 children have gone through the program within that time. He said that he is proud that CHIP is such a great program for all of the Nebraska Masons to hang their hats on and they should all be proud that we can provide such a wonderful service for families, and that it provides great exposure for Masonry in the communities. He mentioned that the CHIP board is trying to put together an instructional video that would show the proper way to organize and setup a CHIP event, and that the board is looking for help from knowledgeable Masons who may be able to assist with that.

The printed report is as follows:

I once again wish to thank everyone who helps to make NE CHIP a success. It is the efforts of all of the volunteers at each of these events that make NE CHIP possible. This is our 11th year and we have reached 41,526 kits. That's 41,526 children ID's processed and given to parents in the last 11 years. Fellowship and service are a major part of the cornerstone of Masonry. Working together to plan, fund, and complete these events brings Lodges and their communities closer together. Appendant bodies such as Eastern Star, Job's Daughters, Rainbow, and DeMolay provide much support to this cause. At these events we see the interaction among the volunteers and the families of the children come together in a warm and caring fashion. Please consider helping at an event so you can also observe the fun and fellowship of helping others.

We continue to upgrade older laptops and older peripheral equipment as needed and as funds allow. The cost of each kit has risen, but our support staff is diligent in finding cost effective sources for our supplies. This year we once again purchased laptops directly from a supplier and obtained better quality equipment. With this method we purchase the software separately, but this does allow us to tailor the equipment to what is more durable and fits our purpose. The equipment used and the process of completing a child's ID kit has evolved over the years. We continue to look at ways to make ours the most complete ID kit that parents can receive.

NE CHIP board meetings are held on the second Friday of the month. We meet at the Grand Lodge office in Lincoln or via teleconference. Anyone wishing to attend or participate on the teleconference is welcome. Please contact Michelle at Grand Lodge for meeting locations and times.

It is a privilege to present this report as Grand Secretary. I appreciate the continuing opportunity to serve our Fraternity and to labor with each one of you.

After several years of staff transition, the Grand Lodge has been reaping the benefits of a complete staff. These benefits come in many forms, but it is always gratifying when Grand Secretaries from other jurisdictions compliment me on the professionalism and helpful attitude of our office staff. Our Records Administrative Secretary, Debbie Galli, has been with us for over a year and is a pleasure to work with. Debbie works closely with our lodge secretaries, and is often the first person who welcomes visitors to our office. Michelle Fulmer continues her outstanding service as our Business Manager. The Grand Lodge is extremely blessed to have Michelle as an integral part of the Grand Lodge team. She possesses amazing abilities to coordinate the many and varied activities of the Grand Lodge.

We continue to expand the use of the Grand Lodge office building. After extensive work this summer, the Masonic Heritage Committee opened our Masonic Library and Research Museum. With the additional space provided in our new location, more of our historical and literary collection is now displayed and accessible. Through the generous contributions provided by members to the Nebraska Masonic Endowment Fund, the retaining wall at the west end of our property was repaired and landscaped. This project greatly improved the appearance of our property in the neighborhood.

I am very pleased to report that the membership records of every past Nebraska Mason have now been entered on an accessible computer data base. Carol Schroeder, our former administrative secretary, started this project when she worked at the Grand Lodge and continued to assist with data entry after her retirement. This was a monumental undertaking and we are grateful for Carol's commitment to seeing this project to completion. These records are also available to the lodge secretaries through the database web interface for their own lodge.

PRESENTATION OF THE ARTIFICER AWARD

Love of Western Star Lodge No. 2 in Nebraska City and John J. Mercer Lodge No. 290 in Omaha for successfully completing all of the requirements.

REPORT OF THE MASONIC ALL-STAR BAND COMMITTEE

K. Roger Dill, Chairman

Most Worshipful Maxell asked Chairman Roger Dill to approach the podium to bring the report from the Masonic All-Star Marching Band Committee.

Worshipful Brother Dill made the following remarks before referencing the printed report:

"Thank you, Most Worshipful. I am Roger Dill and I am very privileged to be the Chairman of the Band Camp. The Band Camp keeps growing and keeps getting bigger. Because of that, we need more help, and I am going to get into that in just a minute. But I keep hearing all of these accolades about Michelle. Tremendous accolades about she does this, she does that. I've asked her for years to find me a shirt without the hump in the front and she can't do it!

Anyway, I want to talk to you a little bit about the band camp. The report is on page 37 of the booklet and you can read that. The Band Camp is growing. It's getting bigger every year and that does mean that we need more help. I am so thankful for the Grand Lodge men and the Past Grand Masters, all who have come to the Band Camp, and for the most part, I think they've enjoyed the Band Camp experience. Our new Grand Master drives a trailer out there every year so that we can have all of the instruments stored and safe. The instrument crew even has their own shirts, and they're doing their own thing out there. We are also getting new shirts for the chaperones this year so that we can keep up with them.

The chaperones are the biggest thing that we're short of. We need help in the evening with people who will start their work at 7:00 in the evening and go through the activities that we have planned for the students. On Tuesday night we take news release pictures; the chaperones help with that, and then you have to listen to the band do their first practice. That's not always good. We have a lot of people who come that say 'look how great I am.' The trumpets are too loud and the drums say 'I can play louder than you can.' But then you see it on Friday night when they do a concert, and that's three days. The transformation is just amazing with what you hear out of these students. So that's the Tuesday activity. Also on Tuesday night, you have a floor that you're in charge of and you have a meeting to make sure we haven't lost a student, and you go over what they're going to do the next day. So it's a very important job that somebody has to let these students know 'This is what's going to happen tomorrow, this is what you need to do to prepare, be sure you have the right shoes to go marching in, and things like that,' so it's an important position. Then

you also get to knock on their door at 6:00 o'clock in the morning and wake them up, and we don't just say 'Are you up?' We make them open the door so that we know they're up. Then you have breakfast and then you have the day to yourself. You can do whatever you want to do. Most of them sleep a little bit, go have lunch, take a nap in the afternoon and whatever.

On Wednesday, night, oh no, you have to go with them and watch a movie. We ask you to maybe help pass out a little bit of popcorn. That's a tough duty. And then you have another meeting that night to go over what they're going to do on Thursday. Thursday night, heaven forbid, you have to go to a dance with them. Again, we're asking you to do an awful lot. You don't have to dance, but you're there to help support those students. Then another meeting Thursday night. This past year, Most Worshipful John showed up Thursday. He went to the dance, he took care of a floor and a meeting, he woke them up the next morning, and then I think he took a nap. But just the fact that the Grand Master took the time out of his extremely busy schedule to come and spend a day with the students, it just boggles my mind how you people do this. It really does. It just amazes me that you will take that time.

I'm very passionate about Masonic Marching Band, but know that these other people have that same passion. So Thursday night, we're dancing. Friday night, now you have to go listen to their concert that they worked on and how good they sound now, and then you have to go to the bowling alley and spend a couple of hours at the bowling alley. Tough duty, I can tell you that. It's really hard. But we need people to do that. We go back to the dorms then and you help them with their checkout packet, go over what they have to do for Saturday, which is do a parade and a pre-game and half-time show and you get them prepared. We are really looking for people who will come on at 7:00 o'clock in the evening and help these kids.

We have people who come on at 7:00 in the morning and help them until 7:00 o'clock at night. We feed you and we have a place for you to sleep. It doesn't cost you a dime to be out there. And we can use help all week, we can use help one night, like Most Worshipful did. I don't think you did it Friday night did you because you had so much to do on Saturday? (Grand Master Maxell: 'No, I helped Friday and then just stayed up all day Saturday. That's why you saw pictures of me sleeping when I could.') Holy cow, what a crazy guy. Anyway, if you would like to help and we would love to have your help, let Michelle know. We have forms to fill out that show when you help. If you stay all week, we can give you a backpack, we can give you a new shirt, and we do a lot of things for you. Really, think about it; think about coming out and spending time with some of the best kids in the state. They're super kids; we have so few problems, but just having an adult there really makes a difference. So I thank you very much for your time and thank you, sir, and for everything that you people have done."

The printed report is as follows:

They came, they practiced, they relaxed, they performed, they went home, and the 21st annual Nebraska Masonic All-Star Marching Band Camp was over for another year. It hardly seems possible that the camp goes that quickly but it does. This was our third year at Kearney and it just keeps getting better. Michelle and the band camp committee continue to hone and refine the camp in an effort to make it a better experience for the students. This year we added an ice-cream social to our Friday night concert in the park.

The ice cream is for the audience to enjoy after the students have performed. We also added a small card with a star and thank you for the armed service members who attend the concert. They were passed out as the band played Salute to America's Finest which plays each of the service songs. As the veterans stood for their respective song, the band assistants handed each one a card and thanked them for their service to our Country. This brought tears to many of the veterans...and chaperones.

Our numbers were up to 247 students from 86 different high schools this year and are likely to continue upward. Almost every high school student who attends and is eligible to return wants to come back. These students are recommended by their band directors as some of their best players and it shows by the sound that the band produces. The size of the band is a new experience for almost everyone and the excitement you see on their faces as they hear the sound is amazing. We get some students from small high schools who have never marched before and they end up being good marchers and very excited about taking what they have learned back to their own high schools. This is a tribute to our directors and the chaperones that make this camp very enjoyable for all. The students attend for free. Their way is paid for by scholarships provided by Masonic Lodges throughout the state, Eastern Star Chapters, Shrine, Scottish Rite and York Rite organizations, individual members and other donors.

I would like to thank the DeMolay, Job's Daughters and Rainbow Girls for donating the water bottles for the band camp. This is a great way to introduce these wonderful organizations to the students, as their logos are on the bottles.

Go to the Grand Lodge website and take a look at what we do. The band camp does as much as any other activity in promoting Masonry and Masonic values not only to the students but also the parents, friends and relatives of the students.

As chairman of this committee, I would like to thank the committee members, the staff of the Grand Lodge, the Grand Lodge Officers, the band directors and the chaperones and band assistants for their hard work in making this a week of enjoyment for everyone. We are always in need of chaperones so if you would like to take a week, a day or an hour and help with the camp let us know. We guarantee a good time.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE OFFICE COMMITTEE

Bruce A. Baker, Chairman

M : W : Maxell invited M : W : Bruce A. Baker, Past Grand Master, to the podium to present the report from the Grand Lodge Office Committee. Past Grand Master Baker made note the members that make up the committee, indicating that they met several

times throughout the year via phone and one meeting at the Grand Lodge office. M.W. Baker also noted that he met with the lodge secretaries the day before on behalf of the committee regarding trying to collect lodge dues via credit card and that it is an ongoing process. It is also contained in the printed report. The committee is aware of the desire for that and he echoed what has been said many times throughout the meeting that the Grand Lodge of Nebraska has an excellent office staff and they make the committee's job very easy in that respect.

The printed report is as follows:

Per section 1-361 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge AF&AM of Nebraska, the Grand Lodge Office Committee is charged with overseeing the efficient operation of the Grand Lodge office, employees, assets and supplies required to serve the Lodges that make up the Nebraska Grand Lodge. The Grand Lodge Office Committee met several times during 2015 via phone & email, and once formally. The following report highlights the actions taken by this committee.

The mileage reimbursement rate for eligible Grand Lodge official travel remains at \$0.40 per mile for the 2016 Masonic year.

The Committee reviewed the list of "Grand Lodge fixed assets" and noted the addition of a Bose speaker system to be used for Band Camp, and the iPad that were discussed and approved at the 2014 meeting. Given the age and predicted life expectancy of the current server & desk top computers, coupled with the fact that money had been allocated in the 2015 budget for the purchase, it was agreed to purchase new computers before the end of the year.

The budget for the Grand Lodge Office Committee was established at \$150.00 for 2016.

The insurance package for the two full time employees was reviewed and approved. It should be noted that the estimate for the 2016 healthcare coverage which renews on February 01, with BC/BS is anticipated to be \$150.00 to \$175.00 less per month. The current monthly premiums are as follows:

Healthcare with BC/BS \$1,522.33

Dental with Metlife \$114.32

Life with United States Life \$51.90

The Grand Lodge office staff consists of 2 full time employees (Michelle & Debbie) and 1 part time employee (Carol). A new employee evaluation process was implemented this year; the Committee reviewed the evaluations, and the responsibilities of the employees to determine compensation commensurate with their experience and responsibilities.

The Office Manager's goals set and completed for 2015 were reviewed, and additional goals discussed and set for 2016.

The Committee established the CHIP administrative fee at \$1175.00 per month. This amount is based on Michelle's CHIP salary and the percentage of office space, utilities and Grand Lodge resources used by the CHIP program.

The establishment of the Nebraska Masonic Endowment Fund, which is intended to provide financial support for the maintenance, repair and improvement of the Grand Lodge Office building. The directors of the Foundation are the Grand Lodge Office

Committee Chairman, the Grand Secretary, the Grand Lodge Office Manager, and two Brothers appointed by the Grand Master.

The Committee would like to acknowledge the efforts of the Nebraska Masonic Heritage Committee, Chairman Christopher Carter, and Michelle Fulmer for a job very well done with the Grand Lodge Library & Museum this past year.

Efforts to determine if establishing a procedure allowing the Grand Lodge Office to collect Lodge annual dues via credit card is feasible continues. Discussed having a member of the Grand Lodge Office Committee speak at the Secretaries Workshop to discuss how & who should be contacted if they ever have concerns or issues.

In conclusion, the Grand Lodge Office Committee acknowledges and appreciates the efficient and professional demeanor displayed by the Grand Lodge Office staff in the performance of their daily duties. Every Nebraska Mason can be proud of the Grand Lodge Office building and staff; you are encouraged to stop by for a visit when in Lincoln as you are always welcome.

M∴W∴B∴ Eatmon entered into that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens on August 28, 1999. W∴B∴ John Ferguson handcrafted this beautiful wood gavel and case in honor of his father-in-law. The gavel or wood maul was commissioned as the James L. "Sonny" Eatmon Traveling Gavel on February 3, 2006.

Symbolic of the operative craft working as Masons in the construction of Ancient Monumental Edifices and the intricate detail of ornamentation, it is appropriate that this gavel or wood maul work in our lodges to demonstrate leadership and concern to the fine details of fellowship among our speculative craft and thus encourage visitations among our lodges and brethren.

This gavel will depart Annual Communication each year with the Lodge of the New Grand Master. It will be the responsibility of at least four brethren, of which at least two must be officers of that lodge, to visit another lodge within 30 days and to carry and deposit the gavel to the visited lodge. That lodge will then hold the same obligation of visiting and depositing the gavel in another lodge within 30 days.

The gavel was presented to R∴W∴ Dennis E. Rix and Fremont Lodge No. 15.

REPORT OF THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

M::W:: Russell G. Reno, Chairman

The George Washington Masonic National Memorial made strides in 2015 to restore the building to its original state with the intent to continue to shore up the structure following the one-two punch of an earthquake and hurricane in 2011.

Last year, the pyramid atop the Memorial was restored after nearly a year of work. The clean, bright and restored stonework and louvers of the pyramid are now as they were when the Memorial was dedicated in 1932 and provide a foreshadowing of what the Memorial will be when the restoration is complete. The pyramid emphasizes the original concept of the Memorial as a lighthouse or beacon spreading the light of Freemasonry to the four corners of the world.

Each year on Washington's birthday – February 22nd – the Memorial Association honors his memory at a Gala Birthday Celebration. In 2015, a wreath-laying ceremony was held at Washington's tomb at Mount Vernon.

Following, the George Washington Symposium was held with the theme "Liberty's Alliance: Washington, Lafayette and Europeans' Support of American Independence."

The evening celebrants enjoyed a concert by The Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic featuring patriotic, Masonic, and classical music. A gala banquet featured toasts to Washington. The final event for the evening was the presentation of the George Washington Memorial Award to Dr. Stuart Leibiger, who made the presentation, "Washington and Lafayette: Father and Son of the Revolution."

The George Washington Memorial Society was created to raise awareness of and support for the Memorial. There are now 138 members who made an initial contribution of \$1,000 and pledged \$250 annually. Charter Membership is open to any Mason. Members receive a unique patent of membership and a high-quality medal and lapel pin and their name on a permanent plaque. Application is available on the Memorial's website at: www.gwmemorial.org.

The Dedicatory Tree Program was conceived to beautify the Memorial grounds, reduce erosion and run-off, provide a habitat for birds and wildlife and to establish a tree canopy. To date, 657 trees have been installed in memory or recognition of Masons and organizations.

Light, a publication of the Memorial, is available online and 145,000 copies are sent across the United States.

The Memorial's website at www.gwmemorial.org and its Facebook and Twitter sites continue to be improved and updated to reflect the changes, programs, projects and events at the Memorial and the activities of the Memorial Association.

Interior and exterior repairs, restorations, improvements and upgrades to the building and grounds continued in 2015. A major project was the restoration and painting and the installation of LED lighting in the South Lodge Room. The restoration of the North Lodge, which suffered significant damage from the earthquake, was completed. A large section of the north wall was removed and rebuilt as the interior wall had become separated from the structural concrete wall. The restoration and repair of the northeast and southeast stairwells also was accomplished. Other completed projects were the installation of handicap ramps throughout the building making the Memorial entirely handicapped accessible.

Several large exterior cornerstones were cut out and reinstalled as they had moved out of alignment. All exterior mortar joints were cut out and re-mortared and lead weather cap was installed on all the joints. With completion of the pyramid, the scaffolding has been moved to the exterior section of the tower from the seventh to the ninth levels.

One goal of the Memorial is to have all Grand Lodges support their Memorial with a \$1 per member annual contribution. Twenty-six Grand Lodges contribute \$1 per member and Nebraska is the only Grand Lodge to pay \$1.50 per member. One Grand Lodge also pays \$15 per initiate, one gives \$10 per initiate, 18 contribute \$5 per initiate, another contributes \$3 per initiate. An annual per member contribution is the fairest and the best way for all the Grand Lodges and thus all the Freemasons of America to support and ensure the continuation of their Memorial.

Not one cent of public funds has ever been nor will ever be received by the Memorial Association. The Memorial belongs to the Freemasons of the United States and was conceived to honor the memory, character and legacy of Brother George Washington, our first and greatest President and our foremost Freemason.

The Memorial provides many opportunities to support its work, including:

- Regular Membership in the Society is available for a \$500 donation and an annual \$250 donation.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Thanks to the efforts of M.W. Russ Reno, the Public Relations Committee helped get substantial press coverage from the Lincoln and Omaha media relating to the opening of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska Museum and Research Library in September, 2015. Additionally, Masons were recognized with media coverage for cornerstone dedications at the Fremont Health Center and the Nebraska Building at the Grand Island Nebraska State Fairgrounds. In October, an article in the Omaha World-Herald called attention to the legacy of M.W. George Lininger, whose art collection was the foundation of the Joslyn Art Museum.

In spite of these media successes, the committee had a few setbacks with several knowledgeable members stepping back from the committee. Several new members have joined the committee in 2015, bringing considerable professional experience. Our goal is to reinvigorate the Public Relations Committee's mission and reach several milestones in the coming year.

The committee has several goals in 2016:

- Develop a social media policy for the use and benefit of Nebraska Lodges. In light of controversial events in other Grand Lodge jurisdictions, a policy will essentially instruct members to "govern themselves accordingly" in public posts, which may inflame opinions without accomplishing anything or reflect poorly on Freemasonry and Freemasons in Nebraska.
- 2. Encourage Lodges to establish a social media Facebook or Twitter page. An educational forum can be held around the state to help Lodges who may not know how to establish a page or keep it up-to-date.
- 3. Create inexpensive, short videos of welcome, news, congratulations, or other topics. These videos may be uploaded at no cost to hosting sites like vimeo or YouTube, and sent to the membership or potential members through the Lodge Secretaries. Because the production is inexpensive, the videos may be replaced or updated as necessary.
- 4. Encourage Lodges to reach out to media about incoming officers' installations, CHIP events, year pin presentations, scholarships or other news. The Public Relations committee recommends that appropriate criteria be developed, awarding points toward the Grand Lodge Gold Pan or Rock Maul awards.
- 5. Expand the Grand Lodge of Nebraska's subscription to e-mails, which can be sent at minimal cost (based on the number of e-mails in the database). The onus of subscribing is on the members themselves, rather than Grand Lodge, in the interest of time and work. Monthly e-mails can be sent with information, news, updates and inform members of events in a timely manner.

6. A monthly Grand Lodge trivia contest via an e-newsletter or social media pages would help generate interest and attention in Grand Lodge videos, e-newsletters, or social media pages. Such questions might include "What year was John Mercer Grand Master?" or "Name three Lodges named after people in Nebraska."

These goals are modest in nature but may have a large impact across Nebraska. The committee believes they are achievable, and we anticipate reporting favorably on the status by the next Annual Communication.

REPORT OF PENDING RESOLUTIONS

R : W : B : Grand Secretary Reginald S. Kuhn announced that he received three resolutions to amend the Bylaws. Amendments to the Bylaws, if found to be in proper form, will be read and laid over until the session next year.

Resolution No. 1

Amend **ARTICLE II - MEMBERS and ARTICLE V - OFFICERS** of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge A:. F:. & A:.M:. of Nebraska by adding and deleting certain language, so that such section, as amended, will read as follows, with the new language italicized and the deleted language struck out:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERS

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplain, Grand Orator, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Steward, Grand Tyler, and if appointed, *Grand Master's Personal Representative (up to three)*, and Grand Musician. With such other officers as it may from time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or the proxies, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; and such past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

The officers of the Grand Lodge shall be styled and take rank as follows:

The Most Worshipful Grand Master

The Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master

The Right Worshipful Grand Senior Warden

The Right Worshipful Grand Junior Warden

The Right Worshipful Grand Secretary

The Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain

The Worshipful Grand Orator

The Worshipful Grand Historian

The Worshipful Grand Custodian

The Worshipful Grand Marshal

The Worshipful Grand Senior Deacon

The Worshipful Grand Junior Deacon

The Worshipful Grand Senior Steward

The Worshipful Grand Junior Steward

The Grand Tyler

The Office of Grand Master's Personal Representative (up to three) may be appointed, if desired.

The Office of Grand Musician may be appointed, if desired.

Rationale: Grand Master's Personal Representatives make it possible for the Grand Master to fulfill obligations at times that he would otherwise be unable to due to schedule and geographic limitations. This amendment would not require the appointment of a Grand Representative, but leaves the decision up to the Grand Master.

Resolution No. 2

This proposed amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, specifically, **Section 1-101 (Annual Communications)** is respectfully offered for the consideration by the Brethren and the Grand Lodge.

Section 1-101 currently reads:

Sec. 1-101 -ANNUAL COMMUNICATIONS - The stated Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge shall be held at such place as shall be designated by the newly elected Grand Senior Warden for his probable term as Grand Master with the approval of the Grand Lodge, beginning on the first Friday of February, at such hour as the Grand Master may designate. A Master Mason's Lodge shall first be opened. If representatives of the constitutional number of seven subordinate lodges be found present, the Grand Lodge shall be declared open for the transaction of business, and the Grand Master shall announce all necessary appointments and fill vacancies in the standing committees.

So that when amended it will read as follows:

Sec. 1-101 -ANNUAL COMMUNICATIONS - The stated Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge shall be held at such place as shall be designated by the newly elected Grand Senior Warden for his probable tem1 as Grand Master with the approval of the Grand Lodge, beginning on any Friday in September following Labor Day commencing in 2019, at such hour as the Grand Master may designate. A Master Mason's Lodge shall first be opened. If representatives of the constitutional number of seven subordinate lodges be found present, the Grand Lodge shall be declared open for the transaction of business, and the Grand Master shall announce all necessary appointments and fill vacancies in the standing committees.

Rationale: Grand Lodge has been held in February since 1988. On multiple occasions there has been inclement weather which impacts the ability of our members and guests to attend our Grand Lodge. By moving Grand Lodge to any Friday in September following Labor Day removes the inclement weather as a barrier to attending Grand Lodge.

Resolution No. 3

This proposed amendment to the Constitution and By-laws of the Grand Lodge AF&AM of Nebraska, specifically, **Article II of the Constitution** as it addresses who is considered a voting member of the Grand Lodge.

Article II currently reads as follows:

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplin, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Tyler, and if appointed Grand Musician, with such other officers as it may time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or their proxy, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; provided however, no member shall hold more than two proxies for any and all subordinate lodges of which he is a member, and such Past Grand masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges.

So that when amended, it will read as follows, with the new language bold and Italicized:

The Grand Lodge shall consist of a Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Junior Warden, Grand Secretary, Grand Chaplin, Grand Historian, Grand Custodian, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Senior Steward, Grand Junior Deacon, Grand Tyler, and if appointed Grand Musician, with such other officers as it may time to time create; together with the Masters and Wardens and Secretaries or their proxy, duly constituted, of the chartered subordinate lodges under its jurisdiction; provided however, no member shall hold more than two proxies for any and

all subordinate lodges of which he is a member, and such Past Grand Masters and Past Deputy Grand Masters as are members of subordinate lodges. Past Masters of subordinate lodges shall also be considered members of the Grand Lodge when they are present at Grand Lodge as long as they have not missed the preceding two year's Grand Lodge sessions. Past Masters considered members of Grand Lodge will not be authorized to designate a proxy.

Rationale: The amendment if approved would have multiple purposes. First, it will allow those individuals that have served the craft in their subordinate lodges to have a voice during grand lodge regardless of whether they have a proxy. Second, this amendment should encourage members to attend the annual communication. Currently numerous other Grand Jurisdictions have similar rules in place.

FINAL REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

M.: W.: Dwight Smith, Chairman

Most Worshipful Smith summarized and read parts of the following report:

The meeting of the Jurisprudence Committee of the Grand Lodge A.F. and A.M. of Nebraska was called to order on Thursday, February 4, 2016 at 10:00 A.M. by M.W. Brother Dwight E. Smith, Chairman. The following members were present: Most Worshipful Brothers Steven F. Mattoon, Dean Skokan, Les Seiler and the following Grand Lodge Officers: M.W. John T. Maxell, Grand Master; R.W. Dennis E. Rix, Deputy Grand Master; R.W. Richard D. Myers, Grand Senior Warden; R.W. Patrick D. Barger, Grand Junior Warden; M.W. Reginald S. Kuhn, Grand Secretary; V.W. Kevin R. Lindly, Grand Chaplain; W. James A. Carlton, Grand Orator; W. Dennis H. Brydl, Grand Historian; M.W. Scott J. Krieger, Sr., Grand Custodian; W. Donald E. Rife, Grand Marshall, W. Robert W. Moninger, Grand Senior Deacon; W. Ronald Stites, Grand Junior Deacon; W. Stephen C. Kennedy, Grand Senior Steward; W. Jay Jones, Grand Junior Steward; W. Paul D. Rutherford, Grand Tyler; W. Brothers Alex Straatmann, John Fairlie and John Ferguson, Personal Representatives of the Grand Master, as well as Past Grand Masters: M.W. Thomas L. Hauder; and M.W. Joe D. McBride.

The following were elected to service as officers of the Jurisprudence Committee for the ensuing year: M : W : B : D wight E. Smith, Chairman and M : W : B : D ean Skokan, Secretary.

The Minutes and Report of the Committee from February 5, 2015 were reviewed and approved.

Pursuant to Section 1-304 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, the Jurisprudence Committee is to review all Resolutions delivered to the Grand Secretary, including a request for Bylaw revisions and determine within 45 days of delivery whether the Resolutions are in proper form. Section 1-304 of the Bylaws of the Grand Lodge provides that at least 15 days prior to the opening of the session of the Grand Lodge, the Committee on Jurisprudence shall meet and submit to the Grand Master an agenda and report. The entire Jurisprudence Committee met on January 19, 2016 and submitted to the Grand Master an agenda and report.

The Committee considered the Grand Masters Recommendations for amendments to the Grand Lodge Bylaws, and the following action was taken: On motion by M : W : B : Dean Skokan and seconded by M : W : B : Les Seiler, Recommendations One, Two, Three, Four and Five were approved as to form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the Member Resolution, the Committee determined as follows: On motion by M:W:B: Les Seiler and seconded by M:W:B: Steven F. Mattoon, Resolution One was approved as to form and can be submitted to be balloted upon at this session.

With regard to the Amendments to Lodge Bylaws that approved by the Grand Master, the committee found that all such approvals were proper.

With regard to the Permissions, Dispensations and Actions of the Grand Master, the Committee found as follows:

On motion by M : W : B : Les Seiler and seconded by M : W : B : Dean Skokan, the other Permissions, Dispensations and Orders were approved.

On motion by M : W : B : Dean Skokan, seconded by M : W : B : Les Seiler, the Permissions, Dispensations and Orders contained in the Supplemental Address were approved.

R.W. Richard D. Myers, Grand Senior Warden, presented a request that he had previously sent to the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee requesting a ruling as to the appointment of a member of the Jurisprudence Committee in 2017. His request contains two issues: Whether Section 1-302 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws, which provides that each member of a standing committee, including the Jurisprudence Committee, shall serve for a period of one year, with no committee member to serve more than five consecutive years, conflicts with Section 1-307 of the Grand Lodge By-laws, which provides that members of the Jurisprudence Committee shall be appointed to a term of five years; and whether members of the Jurisprudence Committee can serve multiple five year terms consecutively.

On consideration of the request for a ruling on the matter, the Jurisprudence Committee finds as follows: Subsection (a) provides "Except as provided by these Bylaws, all standing committees shall consist of five members and shall be appointed by the Grand Master within ten days after his installation." This subsection makes an exception of a provision in the Bylaws which governs appointment and members of a standing committee; therefore Section 1-307 governs the appointment and members of the Jurisprudence Committee.

The first paragraph of Section 1-307 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws provides in part as follows: "The Jurisprudence Committee shall consist of five Past Grand Masters. The chairman of the committee shall be chosen by its members to serve for a one year term. The Grand Master shall annually appoint one member to the committee to serve a term of five years, and members may be reappointed to serve additional terms." This provision allows for appointment of members to multiple five year terms, including consecutive terms

On motion by M:W:B: Dean Skokan and seconded by M:W:B: Steven F. Mattoon, the finding and ruling of the Jurisprudence Committee was approved and should be included in the report of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Codification of the Law:

The Committee then proceeded to pass a motion commending John T. Maxell on his very successful year as Grand Master and commended him and his officers for their year of service to the Fraternity.

The Committee on Jurisprudence stands willing, ready and able to aid and assist your Grand Master and all of the elected Grand Lodge Officers to advise and assist them in any way we can with reference to the laws of our Grand Lodge's grand jurisdiction and to aid all of our officers in the execution of the duties of their office.

At this time I would like to thank the other members of the Committee. On behalf the committee, I thank Michelle and Debbie in the Grand Lodge Office for all their help.

1. Pursuant to approval of Grand Master's Recommendation No. 2, The fifth paragraph of Section 2-601 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

If the amount due the Grand Lodge is not received by April 10, the Grand Lodge Office Committee shall add as a penalty Ten Cents (\$.10) per day for each member on the rolls as shown in the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge, to all lodges that neglect to send in their returns complete to the Grand Lodge as provided by Section 2-310, and pay their dues and assessments to the Grand Lodge.

2. Pursuant to approval of Grand Master's Recommendation No. 3, Sections 2-406, 2-601 and 2-1302 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws are amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-406 – MEMBERS OF EXTINCT SUBORDINATE LODGES – A brother who was a member in good standing of a subordinate lodge at the time such lodge became extinct, shall remain in good standing and automatically become a member of the existing lodge geographically closest to the lodge that became extinct, and shall have the same rights and privileges as members of a regular lodge, including the rights of membership, affiliation, visiting, avouchment, relief, demission, appeal, trial, and burial. But should he fail to pay his dues as provided by Section 2-601 and to pay dues as required by the lodge to which he has become a member by the provisions hereof, such brother is subject to suspension as otherwise provided in these bylaws.

The seventh paragraph of Section 2-601 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

All settlements shall be made in accordance with the account of the Grand Lodge Office Committee, which shall base the same upon the table as printed in the preceding year's proceedings of the Grand Lodge.

Section 2-1302 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-1302 – **CERTIFICATE REQUIRED** – A subordinate lodge cannot consider a petition for affiliation unless accompanied by a Certificate of Good Standing, as hereinafter provided, or demit or its equivalent. A petitioner who presents with his petition a Certificate of Good Standing from a subordinate lodge of this jurisdiction or one authorized by law of another Grand Jurisdiction shall not become a member of the lodge petitioned until he is elected and his demit or its equivalent has been obtained by said lodge.

- 3. Pursuant to approval of Grand Master's Recommendation No. 4, Section 2-604 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:
 - **Sec. 2-604 DUES CARDS HOW PREPARED** There shall be two forms of receipt for dues adopted in this Grand Jurisdiction, including one for members with less than 50 years of good standing as a Master Mason, and one for members with 50 or more years of good standing as a Master Mason. The receipts for dues, adopted for use in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall contain all the information contained in the forms of receipt found in the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge for 2016, printed on cards of convenient size to fit in the ordinary card case. Said receipts shall be computer generated in the office of the Grand Lodge and furnished to each subordinate lodge without charge to the lodge.
- 4. Pursuant to approval of Grand Master's Recommendation No. 5, Section 1-202 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws is amended to read as follows:
 - Sec. 1-202 GRAND CUSTODIAN The Grand Custodian shall attend all communications of the Grand Lodge, and under the direction and control of the Grand Master shall have the entire charge and supervision of the work, lectures, and ritual of this jurisdiction, and it is made his duty to enforce the thorough teaching and practice of said work, ritual and lectures, and immediately to report to the Grand Master any violation of this requirement and if it shall come to his knowledge that any subordinate lodge within the jurisdiction shall ignore, refuse, or fail to practice, in every respect, such uniform and established work as taught by him, it shall be his duty to instantly report the same to the Grand Master, who may arrest the charter of said subordinate lodge, and shall hold the same until such time as it shall comply with the requirements of the Grand Master aforesaid, or until the next communication of the Grand Lodge. The work of the Grand Custodian in conducting schools of instruction or otherwise shall not be interrupted, except under urgent circumstances which, in the opinion of the Grand Master, shall be sufficient to justify such interruption. He shall make a full and detailed report to the Grand Lodge of his official visits and acts and shall receive as compensation for his services such salary as set by the Grand Lodge, payable monthly, together with all necessary expenses in and about such work.

The Grand Master, may appoint Deputy Grand Custodians to assist the Grand Custodian in supervising the work, lectures, and ritual, and who shall serve at the will and pleasure of the Grand Master. Any Deputy Grand Custodian or Apprentice who is absent from the annual Custodian school for three consecutive years will automatically lose his commission at the close of the third consecutive school, unless good cause can be shown to the Grand Master.

The Grand Master may, at his discretion, name as Deputy Grand Custodian Emeriti such number of brethren as he may deem proper who have served as Deputy Grand Custodians, in this Grand Lodge.

Fraternally, Dwight E. Smith, 205, Chairman Steven F. Mattoon, 75 John M. McHenry, 19 Les Seiler, 317 Dean Skokan, 15 M : W : B : Dwight Smith moved for the adoption of the report of the Jurisprudence Committee. The motion was seconded and carried.



Worshipful Brother Anthony J. (AJ) Johnson, hospital representative for the Masonic Service Association, presented Most Worshipful John Maxell with a framed certificate of appreciation from the Masonic Service Association for support received from the Grand Lodge of Nebraska in 2015.

The Roll of Deputy Grand Custodians And Date of Appointment

The first reference providing for an "Assistant Custodian" was made in 1869. In 1870, the Committee on Work recommended the establishment of five districts and the appointment of an equal number of brethren. These, together with the Grand Lecturer, were to constitute a "Board of Custodians" to serve for five years. From that time until now, there have been appointed assistant custodians. It is the purpose here to list all that have, at any time, served the Grand Lodge. They are listed in terms of first appointment. The number following each name represents the lodge of which each was, or is, a member.
